Dear Dr. Silver:

This will acknowledge receipt of your telegram with regard to allotment of funds for German Jews who can be assisted to get to Palestine. A check for some \$4,000 was made out to the Keren Hayesod to be cabled to Nahum Goldmann in Geneva. As I understand it, 1,000 German Jews will be assisted in this way to reach Palestine.

In connection with the meeting of the Administrative Committee of the United Palestine Appeal on Tuesday evening, September 19th, I am hoping it will be possible to have at least preliminary discussion of the 1940 campaign. Do you think it would be possible for you to ask Rabbi Jonah Wise that prior to the 19th there be a preliminary meeting of representatives of the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal to sound out sentiment for the 1940 campaign? I don't think that it is too early at all. Perhaps at the same time there could be some discussion between you and Rabbi Wise as to when a meeting of the Allocations Committee might be convened.

Approximately \$8,000,000 has been distributed to the constituent agencies of the United Jewish Appeal. I think it likely that in October a \$9,500,000 figure will have been reached and exceeded. It is essential, of course, that the treasurers not be held up in allotment of further funds by the failure of the Allocations Committee to meet and to make decisions as to the first two, three or four million dollars above the \$9,500,000 that will then have been distributed.

The "Night of Stars" Year Book will go to press early next month. You will recall that this is termed the United Palestine Appeal Year Book. It would be most helpful if we could have an extended article by you dealing with the achievements and prospects in Palestine and the relation of Palestine to the Jewish situation in Europe.

The outbreak of war in Europe has raised questions with respect to Palestine that are of special concern to the United Palestine

Appeal, entrusted with the responsibility of raising funds in

America for the upbuilding program in Palestine.

It is vital that the friends of Palestine and all those engaged in raising funds for the United Jewish Appeal, which includes the United Palestine Appeal as a major beneficiary, should understand the situation in its new aspects.

In brief, it may be said that the possibilities of proceeding with our activities in Palestine are not only continuing but seem more favorable than any we have had in some time. Isolated for the time being at least from the zone of war, Palestine is again emphasized as a secure, free haven for Jewish immigration. The holocaust of war has enlarged the number of refugees beyond count, as tens of thousands have fled over the borders of Poland.

Insofar as Germany and her protectorates are concerned, the advices we have thus far received indicate that no effort is being made to detain those who wish to emigrate. Thus, for example, 2500 were enabled to leave for Palestine within a single week.

It should also be stressed that advices with respect to the departure of these immigrants state that "the Palestine Government is cooperating" in their admission. There has been no formal revision

of the political situation respecting Palestine that existed before the war but evidence thus far in hand is being interpreted as consideration by the Government of the new situation.

The recent Congress at Geneva adopted a budget for the coming year that for normal activities would require a total of some \$10,000,000. Beyond that a further loan of \$5,000,000 for constructive purposes was decided upon. The new hardships inflicted upon Jewish communities in Europe, especially for refugees, make evident our responsibility and opportunity to increase the absorptive capacity of Palestine. We are in constant communication with the Jewish leadership in Palestine as to requirements and developments. The appeals that have come to us from Dr. Chaim Weizmann and from the members of the Jewish Agency Executive refer, on the one hand, to the vital necessity of maintaining the structure that already exists in Palestine, and, on the other hand, of providing the facilities whereby the country may make room for the thousands of Jews whose need and longing for Palestine have been intensified by war conditions.

A more comprehensive analysis of the situation is embodied in the attached memorandum which is sent to you for your personal information. If there are special questions beyond those treated in the memorandum which you need to ask, I trust you will not hesitate to keep me advised of them so that you may be properly informed.

The Palestine requirements, not to speak of the grave issues in Europe, impose upon American Jewish communities an increased responsibility for the raising of large, cash funds promptly. It is my earnest hope that communities now in the process of conducting campaigns for the United Jewish Appeal will find a new challenge to generosity in the war-time needs; and that communities which have concluded their drives will press upon their contributors the urgency of making payments of pledges as rapidly as possible.

In view of several questions that have come to me, may I point out that the United Jewish Appeal is fully empowered to proceed with its fund-raising activities in the United States under the terms of the rules and regulations issued by the Department of State of September 5th, 1939 with respect to fund-raising.

Let me take this opportunity of thanking you for the service you have given to the cause of Palestine upbuilding during the past year. It is a service finding its reward in the strengthening of the Jewish community of Palestine and its capacity to give permanent home and freedom to thousands of other Jews.

May the New Year bring you and yours happiness and comfort to all our people.

Attached herewith is a copy of a cablegram from Leo Herrmann who has been most helpful to us in coordinating our sources of information with respect to London and Jerusalem.

The intensification of the British blockade would seem to cast doubt upon the likelihood of an early visit to America by Dr. Weizmann. In the meantime, some action must be taken to safeguard the U.P.A. position before the Allocations Committee. It would, of course, solve all the problems if the formula idea which you originally contemplated would be generally accepted. There is a possibility that in view of the present confusion and uncertainty there would be less chance of the J.D.C. taking an academic position.

The J.D.C. is, I believe, in a quandry. I have had no official word as to the position in which they find themselves as a result of the invasion of Poland, but Mr. Lamport tells me that on several occasions Mr. Baerwald has expressed himself to the effect that they were not entirely sure that refugee immigration would be possible at this time. Moreover, there have been rumors to the effect that the J.D.C. was informed that it could not operate in Germany; presumably, that might include Nazi-occupied Poland.

There has been a great barrage on the J.D.C. from all parts of the country with requests for exact information as to how J.D.C. funds can be or will be expended in Germany, Poland or elsewhere in Europe. It would seem, therefore, that the J.D.C. is on the defensive.

At the same time, the report has come to me that the J.D.C. has prepared a budget for \$5,000,000 covering the next three or four months. I cannot tell whether this represents a definite statement of obligations that can be taken care of, or is merely a propaganda document to anticipate a meeting of the Allocations Committee. It is un-

likely that at a meeting of the Allocations Committee representatives of the J.D.C. would make the kind of statement Mr. Lamport attributes to Mr. Baerwald at another occasion.

On the other hand, the information from Palestine indicates that there is no diminution of the possibility of using funds for Palestine. If a meeting of the Allocations Committee is to be held in October and if we are to be represented on the basis of a "hearing", do you wish to take any further action at this time to urge a visit from competent persons from abroad?

I am looking forward to seeing you on Tuesday.

We did not have ample time on Tuesday for me to bring to your attention a special situation that exists in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

We asked the community to adopt a quota of \$50,000. Instead a total quota of \$48,000 was decided upon, with \$20,000 assigned to the United Jewish Appeal. We are trying to exert pressure upon the Jewish community leadership to secure a revision of the budget so that it will more closely approximate our request for \$50,000.

September 20, 1939

In 1938 Tulsa gave to the United Jewish Appeal agencies, i.e., J.D.C., U.P.A., and N.C.C., the sum of \$15,200 out of a total amount raised of \$43,500. In other words, the planned increase for 1938 is miserably inadequate as compared with 1938.

Albert Finston, whom you will recall as the Chairman of the 1938 campaign, is said to be one of the most influential men in determining the budget. The only pressure that can be brought to bear effectively it seems, is by a telephone call by you. Mr. Finston is located at the Philtower Building, Tulsa, Oklahoma. May I suggest that you telephone Mr. Finston and urge him to prevail upon his associates to adopt a \$50,000 budget or certainly, far more than the \$20,000 originally assigned.

Will you please have your secretary inform me of the results of this conversation so that it may be incorporated in our records and guide us for further information?

With respect to the decisions of the Administrative Committee of the United Palestine Appeal:

- 1. You were authorized to appoint a committee on negotiations with the JDC on the 1940 campaign. Whom do you wish to designate for the committee, and shall I send letters of notification to them?
- 2. In view of the fact that the Allocations Committee is not to meet on October 3rd and, according to Mr. Ittleson, may not meet until the latter part of October do you feel that we should get into communication with London and Jerusalem with a view to the importation of the technical experts frequently referred to? The assistance of a man like Dr. Georg Landauer, who is completely familiar with the European picture as well as with the Palestine situation, may be helpful.

Although I have nothing definite on which to base the assumption except as one responds intuitively to atmosphere, I have a feeling - strange that it seems - that the JDC is not anxious to renew the UJA for 1940. Although the opposite would seem to be desirable from the JDC's point of view, nevertheless I have observed that communications have been conducted which might place the JDC in a separate campaign. But then the JDC has always refused to recognize the fact that the American Jewish communities have a will of their own. Since we will probably not receive from the JDC the total picture of its obligations and prospects it might be advisable to have counsel along these lines from our own experts.

3. You will recall that you were authorized to appoint a subcommittee of three with power to act in the case of Ben Zion
Pecker, an employee in the New York campaign. The previous
sub-committee, consisting of Dr. Goldstein, Mr. Lamport and
myself, had offered Pecker three months salary in recognition
of his previous service to Palestine fund-raising projects.
This he has refused to accept. Blitz says there is no employment for him in the New York UJA or in the New York UPA.
Pecker has probably been with Palestine fund-raising organizations some fifteen years. Dr. Goldstein and Mr. Lamport

Employment for refugees and prevention of food shortage in Palestine stressed A decision to raise one million dollars to aid in strengthening Jewish positions in Palestine was reached at the conference of national Jewish organizations held in New York City on Sept. 17. All labor Zionist organizations and many fraternal and trade unions endorsed this resolution and pledged their unqualified support. The Gewerkschaften Campaign will at once begin its efforts to raise the necessary sum, it was pointed out, since no time may be lost under the present grave circumstances. The funds raised will be utilized to create employment opportunities in Palestine for the tens of thousands of refugees which are expected to stream into Palestine from the war torn countries, to strengthen and expand Jewish economic positions in that country and to aid the pioneer movement in Poland, Rumania and other European lands. Under the chairmanship of the noted Jewish labor leader Joseph Schlossberg, the conference was addressed by Mr. A. Dickenstein, delegate of the Histadruth - General Federation of Jewish Labor in Palestine, David Pinski, famous playwright, B. Zuckerman and Isaac Hamlin, general secretary of the National Labor Committee as well as numerous leaders in American Jewish life. Baruch Zuckerman, prominent leader and vice-president of the Zionist Actions Committee, spoke of the calamity now facing the Jews in eastern Europe and pointed out that alongside of the relief work that will have to be done, it will also be necessary to save the Hechalutz movements in those countries and the agricultural training farms which they have built up. Funds are also necessary to prepare the country for the many thousands of people from the war torn countries who will turn to Palestine in search of a new home. Mr. Abraham Dickenstein analyzed the position of Palestine in the present struggle and stressed the need for developing new industries in that country to prevent shortages of food and manufactured articles, should the war extend to the Mediterranean. Such industrial and agricultural development, he stated, would also provide employment and new economic positions for the many refugees that are clamoring to be admitted into Palestine. The conference gave voice to the grief of American Jewry at the misfortune that has overtaken the Jews of Poland and called upon American Jewry to meet the new responsibilities that have been imposed upon them by the mounting need for assistance.

Dr. Alois Rothenberg is the well-know leader of the Austrian Zionists and director of the Palestine Bureau. By "the present schedule" he means the schedule which expires September 30th, 1939. The certificates for this schedule are valid until the end of October, 1939.

The reason that Vienna has in the last moment such a large number of Palestine immigrants is to be ascribed to the fact that the Palestine Government, about two weeks ago, as I informed you in my memorandum of yesterday and in accordance with the attached copy of letter which we have just received from the British Passport Control Office in New York, instructed the local Consulates to include wives and children in the certificates granted to the heads of families. Up to now a special certificate was required for each member of the family which resulted in the departure of many immigrants for Palestine who left their wives and children behind them.

I have not yet discussed salary with Mr. Bach, awaiting the opportunity of judging his abilities in preparing the two aforementioned items.

After a formal education through public, high school and the Wharton Division of the University of Pennsylvania, I became associated with the Public National Bank and Trust Co. of New York. One of the few granted that opportunity, I was graduated through every department of that institution and given a thorough grounding in all phases of banking practice. At the same time, I supplemented my specialized training with courses in economics and credit analysis at the American Institute of Banking. Two years after joining the Public National Bank I was appointed Assistant Manager of its branch at 160th Street and Broadway, and at the end of a like period I was transferred to the Main Office to analyze and report on the financial and operative capacity of borrowing accounts.

In 1930 I accepted a position with the National Safety Bank and Trust Co. as Assistant Cashier in charge of its Credit Department. In that office I was responsible for my staff's collecting such information as was pertinent to the credit worthiness of the bank's borrowing clients, but it was my particular duty to analyze for, and submit to the bank's Credit Committee the financial set-up of the more substantial borrowers.

Early in 1933 I resigned from the National Safety Bank in order to take up residence in Palestine. While there, I became associated with "The Palestine Post" and was appointed editorial manager of the paper's Tel Aviv office. Responsible for the coverage of all intelligence relating to that city and its environs, I was given a generously free hand in my own choice of correspondence, and contributions to the paper under my own by-line included articles on a diversity of subjects. At the same time I reported on the economic progress of Palestine for various other papers.

In 1938, I resigned from "The Palestine Post" and returned to the United States. Since March of this year, I have been associated with the New York World's Fair Corporation in its Banking Department.

As for such other facts which might be of interest to you, I might mention that I am married, have a family and am a native American.

Are you making arrangements to meet Rabbi Jonah Wise in New York on October 2nd, particularly since there will be no meeting of the Allocations Committee?

In addition to the discussion of future matters it seems to me that some definitive action ought to be taken with respect to Chicago, which has remitted \$950,600 on account of the 1939 campaign out of what was to have been a total allotment of some \$1,600,000 to \$1,700,000.

Our other friends seem to have been most shy about pressing Chicago for additional funds even though the subject has been raised and intervention promised at every meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal. There is no reason why, when the United Jewish Appeal agencies need funds so badly, Chicago should have thousands of dollars lying in the bank because of a whim bound up with the decisions of the Allocations Committee.

Attached hereto is a copy of a letter which has been issued by an organization called "The American Friends of a Jewish Palestine. I have discussed this matter with Mr. Lipsky, who feels that the wisest course might be to issue a press release to the English-Jewish and Yiddish newspapers emphasizing that none of the regular Zionist organizations have any part in this new fund-raising instrument. Attached hereto is a proposed publicity item in this connection. Does it have your approval?

We assure you that we have the most practical, direct and far-reaching program for the saving and safeguarding of tens of thousands of lives. Our forsaken brethren who cannot come to the United States or other countries but who can be aided to gain entry into Palestine look to you and your friends for help in this hour of dire and terrible anguish.

I shall try to make this letter cover most of them. 1) I suggest that we designate the same people on our Negotiating Committee with the JDC as last year, adding Goldman as a member of the Allocations Committee. 2) Inasmuch as the Allocations Committee cannot meet on October 2nd, it might perhaps be advisable to postpone the meeting until the coming of Dr. Weizman and Eliezer Kaplan which I hope will not be delayed beyond October. In that case, we shall not the assistance of any other expert such as Dr. Landauer. 3) I am agreeable to having Messrs. Lipsky, Liebovitz and Rimsky act on the committee to dispose of Pecker. 4) At the last meeting of the UPA, it was suggested to contact Ussishkin with reference to the holding of JNF funds in the common treasury of the UPA. Has that been done either by yourself, or by Dr. Goldstein? 5) I shall try to get in touch with Rabbi Jonah Wise in New York on October 2 and take up with him the case of Chicago. 6) I think it would be wiser to ignore the circular letter sent out by the "American Friends of a Jewish Palestine". 7) I approve of the action which you have taken in engaging the services of Mr. Reuben E. Bach. Please do not engage him for any long period of time as yet. Perhaps a month to month arrangement would be satisfactory. This would give us a chance to find out whether he is our man, and in the second place, whether we would actually require the services of such a man for a long period.

We shall be establishing a precedent in assuming responsibility for distributing Keren Hayesod funds for transporation of European immigrants to Palestine without authorization from Jerusalem. Dear Dr. Silver:

I observe that copies have been sent to you of correspondence arising from a cablegram sent on September 20th by Dr. Alois Rothenberg of Vienna asking that \$36,000 be made available from America to assist 600 persons with certificates to reach Palestine.

The question that concerns the United Palestine Appeal is whether the funds involved are to be taken from the general treasury of the United Palestine Appeal and to be indicated as ear-marked distribution of funds, or whether the Keren Hayesod treasury alone is to be responsible for such payments, as was true in the case of the \$4,070 sent to Dr. Goldmann in Geneva for emigrants from Germany, and the \$3,000 sent to aid stranded delegates to get to Palestine.

Under the terms of the United Palestine Appeal contract, unless superseded by another contract or agreement, the officers of the United Palestine Appeal are bound to distribute the income equally between the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth, with no deductions possible from the United Palestine Appeal treasury for specified purposes outside the contract.

As I indicated to you in an earlier letter, Dr. Goldsein has very emphatically raised this point and has insisted that checks be turned over to the Jewish National Fund as usual.

Attached herewith is a copy of an original letter dated September 21st, sent to you by Dr. Solomon Goldman as Acting Chairman of the Emergency Committee for Zionist Affairs.

Dr. Goldstein, as President of the Jewish National Fund, as Co-chairman of the United Palestine Appeal and as the head of the agency authorized to receive one-half of the United Palestine Appeal income, has directed me to turn over checks to the Jewish National Fund in the usual manner. Dr. Solomon Goldstein, Acting Chairman of the Emergency Committee for Zionist Affairs, Co-Chairman of the United Palestine

Appeal and President of the Zionist Organization of America, asks that all funds be held in the treasury of the United Palestine Appeal without distribution, except as directed by the Emergency Committee.

For the sake of regularized procedure and also, the less important, for my peace of mind, I should like to have specific instructions from you in accordance with which I may act as to the distribution of funds.

I note that Miss Szold, Dr. Magnes,
Julius Simon and others have been in cable communication
with the Palestine Economic Corporation asking that the
Palestine quota of the joint drive be increased by large
funds to be used in Palestine for urgent social and relief work and that such funds be administered by a
special committee "appointed by you (P.E.C.) with right
cooption". It seems to me rather strange that the P.E.C.
should have to be the instrumentality through which funds
belonging to the United Palestine Appeal are to be distributed. Isn't the Jewish Agency for Palestine sufficiently competent and representative to deal with funds
in the normal manner? All too often, in cases of emergency,
our funds have been used to set up new instrumentalities
completely outside traditional Zionist authority.

Dear Dr.Silver:

In a way I feel regretful at having left New York at this particular period. But when I visualize the petty bickering and inconsequential intrigue that surrounds the very ordinary business of forwarding money to Palestine I feel that it is just as well that I could get away from the fetid atmosphere. Any way, it is far more important to reassure some of these communities that not only must they have campaigns but raise more money than ever before.

Miss Cohen of the office has been in touch with me constantly with regard to developments. I do hope that it hasn't been too much of an annoyance to you to be called by her frequently at my suggestion. There have been so many conflicting commands in New York--and, as far as I am concerned, it is you who must give the final word.

Probably you will fix a date for a meeting of the Negotiating Committee when you get together with Rabbi Jonah Wise on October 2nd.

As regards the inquiry with regard to the transfer of money. A cable was sent to Kaplan by Rabbi Goldman covering the inque raised at the last meeting of the UPA Administrative Committee. Mr. Useishkin received a copy of the cable--elso by cable. The answers that have been flowing back and forth since then indicate that.

Mr. Bach has not been engaged for any definite period of time. He understands that he is on trial and if we have any evidence of his satisfactoriness his exployment will be continued. We need a person of such qualifications permanently, to my mind. Not necessarily because of high-sounding economic and statistical reasons but for the very pressic purpose of giving the UPA office figures as and when we need them. We have someone of that type in the UJA office but no one ever considered it important enough for the UPA. Essentially he must be an auditor as well as a statistician, who could offer breakdowns of our reports, keep in touch with the Council of Federations (which floods us with inquiries constantly) and provide a backstop for our financial activities. Bach may or may not be the man.

You will receive a sopy of Mr.Ittleson's third or fourth letter in regard to some m terial on Palestine he has been requesting. It relates primarily to the Jewish National Fund. The latter has the answers already but Fisher is reluctant to lat anybody see any data on the National Fund, even though it was forwarded from Jerusalem for the specific purpos of meeting Mr.Ittleson's inquiries.

The motivation of Mr.Ittleson's questions is a different matter.

Dear Mr. Montor:

If you recall, when I had a conference with you, I explained that it was difficult to know exactly what facts and material we needed in order to report clearly and precisely on the activities as well as the finances of any national organization.

Our reports, after they have been approved by the agency, are submitted to members of a special National Agency Committee, appointed by the Council. The members of the committee often raise questions which seem to them to indicate either inaccurate statements or statements which are not clear. Since we have a number of such questions on the report which we prepared for the United Palestine Appeal, and since preparing the report, you have also submitted to us the complete financial audit, it is necessary to rewrite the report, and in order to clarify such statements as were questioned, I am wondering whether you can give me information on the following points: (For this purpose, I am sending you back the complete report.)

#### (1) Page 1, paragraph 1:

Concerning funds for emergency in 1938, we are told that one third of the Jewish National Fund "share" is under the control of the Jewish National Fund, which decides as to its application in consultation with the Jewish Agency. Is this correct? If so, the agreement should be restated, and I should be glad to have your suggestions.

#### (2) Page 1. Other agreements for the joint campaign(1):

Are not the traditional funds received by the Jewish National Fund from specific collections, such as boxes, trees, etc., also excluded in the explanation of what monies collected by the Jewish National Fund should be turned over to the United Palestine Appeal? Should not traditional funds therefore be included in point (1) of that statement?

#### (3) Page 1. The Palestine Foundation Fund:

Does the mandate (in any specific article) recognize the Jewish Agency as the supreme authority? If so, can we have a copy of the specific article in which this is stated?

#### (4) Page 1. The Jewish National Fund:

We are asked what other individual agencies in America collected funds for the Jewish National Fund, and what amounts collected by each were sent through the Jewish National Fund for transmission to Palestine. We are also asked "Is all of the money collected in America sent to Palestine through the American Jewish National Fund office?" I recall your saying that no money is sent direct to Palestine to the Jewish National Fund. Is this correct? Is money collected by such organizations as Hadassah and others turned over to the United Palestine Appeal by the Jewish National Fund?

In this connection I have received from Mr. Fisher a copy of the schedule of income and expenses of the Jewish National Fund for the period October 1, 1937 to September 30, 1938. This statement indicates that besides income from traditional funds, income has been received from the following sources:

Community chests \$ 15,873
New York City income 68,892
General collections and unspecified 47.668

Total \$132,433

The income of the United Palestine Appeal from the Jewish National Fund for 1938 (in your audit) shows \$324,996 income to the United Palestine Appeal from the Jewish National Fund. Does this amount include these three items? What other income received by the Jewish National Fund is turned over to the United Palestine Appeal? I notice that the Jewish National Fund does not show any receipts from such agencies as Hadassah, etc., which, I understand you to say, transmit Jewish National Fund money through the American office.

#### (5) Page 2. The Mizrachi Palestine Fund:

We are asked what orthodox agricultural and educational institutions are maintained by Mizrachi, and what ones are maintained by the Palestine Foundation Fund and the Jewish National Fund. We are also asked why Mizrachi has been increased by the United Palestine Appeal from an income in 1936 of \$45,274 to an income in 1937 and 1938 of \$69,800.

#### (6) Page 3:

I am sending you revised Tables I and II. In Table I, I have accounted for all income and expenditures, including national campaign cash receipts and cash disbursements, distributions and balances. In these figures I have excluded the New York campaign, which, according to your audit, had been deducted. In Table II, I have indicated the total amount <u>pledged</u> (including New York campaign money deducted in Table I) and have deducted the expenditures (including campaigns both national and New York and distributed sums, and I have assumed that the balance represents your shrinkage on pledges made. Is this correct?

- (7) If (6) is correct, then all figures included in Table I, Income and Disbursements and Distribution, are cash figures. That is, shrinkage for non-collectible pledges has been deducted.
- (8) We are asked whether you consider service charge payments to the Zionist Organization of America, Mizrachi Organization, and Poale Zion-Ziere Zion as cost for money raising.

#### (9) Page 5:

In the budgets of the two major agencies, Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth, what portion of the total of \$10,955,000 is expected from America? What part from long time loans?

#### (10) Page 6. Table III:

We are asked whether we can secure a report to show the disbursements in Palestine of the Mifal Bitzaron to which the United Palestine Appeal has disbursed money through the Palestine Foundation Fund and the Jewish National Fund.

I have asked Mr. Fisher for a statement for the income and expenditures for the Palestine Jewish National Fund. As you know, I have included the Keren Hayesod for the period October 1, 1937 to September 30, 1938.



Dear Bob:

Al Livingston asked me today about the organization referred to in the enclosed letter which he has just received.

He has been burning up since the spring of 1938 when he says he was "inveigled" into heading a campaign in Rock Island for this Vaad Bitachon. His brother in law, a doctor from Des Moines, was in charge of this particular campaign of Vaad Bitachon in the spring of 1938, and came to Rock Island and induced Al Livingston to head a campaign, and they had a meeting at which the brother in law spoke and raised that night a total of over \$900, none of which was in a contribution of less than \$50. Two days later the check was forwarded and it went down in the history of Rock Island as the fastest campaign they ever had.

Al says he was told that it was for a defense fund, which you can't prove by me, but he was sore about it all afterwards and mentioned it to he several times last year. Now this letter comes to him just prior to our campaign and he is all het up about it, and has asked me to send it on to you and to see if you cannot prevail on someone to cut it out while our campaigns are on. I note that it comes from UPA headquarters building and that there are some important UPA names on the Board. I note also that this is no request for immediate action and that they disclaim any conflict with the public fund raising campaign for Palestine, but the fact that they ask for the continuence of the committee and prepare the way for a future call does not sit well at this time.

I have discussed with Mr. Goldhamer the content of your letter which came to hand today and we have realized since the beginning of the War that the J.D.C. particularly would be harassed with many new and difficult problems. We are forwarding herewith a further check for \$50,000 to apply on Cleveland's allotment to the United Jewish Appeal.

We are, of course, concerned with you in your efforts to function in this overwhelming disaster which the War itself is visiting upon Jewry throughout Europe and the pressures which it places upon the United Jewish Appeal with its greatly inadequate funds and machinery. In the light of this situation, is it not possible that American Jewry would do well to concentrate to a larger extent upon the adjustment of those Refugees who have come here and those who can be removed from the scene of conflict, rather than to attempt the almost futile program of offering relief to the hundreds of thousands whose fate is so uncertain and to whom the tender of any kind of relief at this time may be of no avail.

We know that the Committee of the United Jewish Appeal is giving serious thought to this and the many other problems now befire it and we will undoubtedly be apprised of your decisions or plans from time to time.

c. The relation of the National Refugee Service to the United Jewish Appeal. It is true that the National Refugee Service, during the past few weeks, has been deluging everyone with appeals more heartrending than those of Mizrachi requesting additional funds for its program, but what is ignored or not known by many officers of the United Jewish Appeal is that hundreds of thousands of dollars are being spent throughout the country for what is actually the national refugee program, locally administered. A great deal of such amounts are really deducted from what otherwise would go to the United Jewish Appeal.

You will recall that on several occasions in the past I have questioned the value of some of the United Palestine Appeal regional offices. You expressed the belief that nothing should be done at this time to disturb the framework we had erected, particularly since our plans for the coming year were not definite.

The case of Chicago, however, is of a special character. At the present time it is not manned at all, since S. Pereira Mendes, who had been the regional director for the United Jewish Appeal in the midwest area, and who supervised the United Palestine Appeal regional office in Chicago, severed his connection with the United Jewish Appeal in September. He has become director of the Chicago office of the American Jewish Congress.

Mr. Mendes has been kind enough to look after certain matters, as a volumeer, because of his real interest in Palestine. It is obvious, however, that he could not give much time to the operation. The net effect is that a stenographer is in charge of the office and obviously has neither the authority nor the competence to conduct any United Palestine Appeal activity either in Chicago itself or in the midwestern area.

Two procedures are possible: (a) to dismiss the girl and close the office until such time as our plans shall have been determined upon or (b) move the office from its present location at 160 North LaSalle Street to the same building in which Mendes works for the American Jewish Congress. This would make it possible for him to drop in once in a while to supervise the activities.

My own feeling is that the first suggestion is more economical and more appropriate, particularly since

added to our other complications in Chicago is the fact that the young lady who has been the secretary there since the office was established two years ago is seriously ill and would have to be replaced by an entirely new person.

What is your thought in the matter?

I trust that a real effort will be made by Dr. Wise to bring about an e rly consideration of and to focus attention upon Palestine at the sessions of the Inter-Governmental Committee.

The attached cablegram from Eliezer Kaplan, Treasurer of the Jewish Agency, is in response to an inquiry I cabled on the day that there appeared in the Jewish Telegraphic Agency News a statement attributed to Pinchas Ruttenberg that 50,000 Jews were starving in Palestine.

The inquiry from Mr. Kaplan in regard to Alaska seems to have been stimulated by intensive activity here on behalf of that project. Official reports indicate slight likelihood of the development of the scheme, while LDB sees emphasis on the project as most undesirable from the American Jewish point of view.

At this critical hour, when the Yishuv is being confronted with an alarming array of new tasks and problems, we are addressing ourselves to you in connection with the forthcoming "Night of Stars", in the earnest hope that our Department of Social Service, founded by Henrietta Szold, be included among the beneficiaries, as in the past.

As you doubtless know, in 1936 and in 1937 our Department of Social Service was permitted to benefit from the proceeds of the performances of "Night of Stars" in the amount of \$5,000, each time, to be applied to the social needs of immigrants. At the time, the late Mr. Felix Warburg, the late Mr. Harold Jacobi, Dr. Stephen S. Wise and Mr. George Backer were kind enough to intervene in our behalf, and it is thanks to their joint efforts that our Department was included among the beneficiaries.

Since then the refugee problem in Palestine has become all the more acute, the Yishuv finding it increasingly difficult to cope therewith, after over three years of disturbances in Palestine and particularly now in the present crisis.

We know that in 1938 the proceeds of "Night of Stars" were detoted exclusively to the United Balestine Appeal. It is our earnest hope, however, that the Allocations Committee of the "Night of Stars" will this year adhere to its custom of including our Department of Social Service, built up with so much effort and sacrifice by Miss Szold, among the baneficiaries, and will instruct the proper authorities to set aside a sum for this purpose, in keeping with the needs and the problems of the hour.

Dear Dr. Silver:

At Mr. Ittleson's request I met with him at his office today for some fifty minutes in discussion of various items, starting off with the date and time of a meeting of the Allocations Committee.

The meeting will be held on Monday, October 30th at 3:30 P. M. Mr. Ittleson suggested his office as the meeting place. He is due in Boston next week and will speak to Mr. Kirstein about the date of the meeting, to which Mr. Kirstein had previously assented in general terms.

Mr. Ittleson felt that he had not received all the information that he requested from me about three months ago, most of the information relating to the Keren Kayemeth and some of it to the Keren Hayesod. I expressed the belief that the larger part of his request for information was satisfied through the transmission to him of copies of the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth reports which were prepared for the delegates to the Geneva Congress. He, however, did not feel the specific questions had been answered. Some of the material to which he referred was given to me last week by Mendel Fisher after having been forwarded from Jerusalem. However, I have not submitted the material to Mr. Ittleson because of my uncertainty as to the uses to which it would be put.

Mr. Ittleson clarified this question for me by saying that the Allocations Committee would have to be guided as to "priority" in its further distribution of funds by determining to what extent expenditures by each of the organizations were urgent and which could be postponed. He felt that the Allocations Committee should have before it as much information as possible with respect to specific details of expenditures by the various organizations. I assured him that the members of the Allocations Committee would be given the material that they required in ample time for their consideration.

Mr. Ittleson said that he had received a visit from Rabbi Newman, who had requested his personal aid for illegal immigration into Palestine. Mr. Ittleson said that he might be willing to look aside if others were sponsoring such activities, but he could not share in it. He did not believe that illegal immigration into Palestine was wise.

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver - 2 -October 23, 1939 It was his opinion that the meeting of the Allocations Committee on October 30th could not do more than consider the immediate and "preemptive" request of the National Refugee Service without making any allocations to the other two bodies. I pointed out to him, however, that by the time of the meeting of the Allocations Committee probably all of the first \$9,500,000 will have been distributed and that the treasurers of the United Jewish Appeal will not be able to issue any checks, since they will not be under instructions from the Allocations Committee as to the method of distribution. He did not think that the members of the Allocations Committee would require any technical assistance for their meeting but suggested that there be prepared for their consideration figures that would show the amount of cash received as of the date of the meeting, the cash still owing on pledges and an estimate of the probable total receipts of the campaign. In referring to the amount still held by Chicago, Mr. Ittleson said that he had discussed the question with Mr. Lasker and saw no reason why Chicago should withhold the payment of funds that it has available. He recognized that the situation would have to be handled delicately, but nevertheless it was obvious that Chicago had a duty to the United Jewish Appeal and that its campaign for 1939 was conducted under certain regulations prescribed within the terms of the United

Jewish Appeal.

Mr. Ittleson seemed concerned about the prospects for 1940, especially in relation to a general relief campaign. He envisaged the possibility of a drive similar to the one headed by Mr. Hoover during the War. In the event that a fundraising effort were conducted for general purposes in Europe it would be difficult, he thought, for a Jewish campaign to be run simultaneously. I disagreed with him, pointing out that the devastation and destruction in Europe have not by any means reached the stage of 1914-1918 and that none of the countries at war has yet required assistance from abroad with the exception of Poland, whose status was still uncertain. Whatever might be the future necessities for a general relief campaign, it seemed patent that the Jewish relief obligations had to be carried on and the plans should be discussed now for 1940. But Mr. Ittleson felt that the 1940 question would have to be left aside for the time being since the situation was changing so rapidly.

I made the point that in 1940, all other things being equal and the neutral situation remaining what it is, Palestine would perhaps be in a better position, as far as campaigning is concerned, than Europe. Mr. Ittleson did not think so, having reservations on the prospects in Palestine. Regardless of what individuals might think privately or say privately they would have to give large sums to a general relief campaign if it were launched. Mr. Ittleson, moreover, did not share my own optimistic expression that the United Jewish Appeal could raise at least as much if not more in 1940 as in 1939.

Among questions I put to Mr. Ittleson was one asking whether he felt that the unification of fund-raising efforts in the United Jewish Appeal had not contributed to a harmonious spirit in American Jewry in 1939. His answer was noncommittal, saying that he did not have sufficient contact with the communities to know whether or not that was true. He did say, however, that New York would not have raised as much money as it did without a unified campaign.

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver October 23, 1939 - 3 -Altogether, Mr. Ittleson seemed satisfied with the results of the United Jewish Appeal drive, saying that he would not have believed in January, 1939, that over \$15,000,000 would be raised. Concern over the prospects of the New York Federation drive, now about to be launched, was expressed by Mr. Ittleson. Federation is going out to the community for \$7,500,000. If that is raised it would mean that New York Jews had been called upon to give some \$14,000,000 within a brief period of time. He did not know whether New York could stand that kind of pace. Federation leaders were now testing the ground to see whether the use of the Federation machinery in the New York United Jewish Appeal campaign had in any way affected the possibilities of getting as much and more money for Federation needs. I did not go into any detail with Mr. Ittleson on the question of procedure in the Allocations Committee, although his primary thought was that the National Refugee Service would have to get money before anybody else and that the Allocations Committee would have to act circumspectly. To judge that he might interpose obstacles in the way of a formula that would give Palestine an adequate share would be only a surmise. #### Replies to Queries in connection with Jewish Mational Fund Budget for 5699

A. and B.

The item of \$2,275,000 represents "Loans, Bills and Angagements", and originates from previous land purchases, which date back to different periods. Interest, if any is included in the payments of which the said amount consists.

The said amount is being repaid in the course of the current fiscal year (5699), according to the maturity dates of the various items of which it consists. In the Course of the 10 months of the current fiscal year (1st Cotober 1938 - end of July 1939) the amount of \$1,990,000 has been repaid, at due dates. The balance, being \$385,000, is due for payment in the remaining two months, August and September 1939.

G.

The item of \$2,400,000 represents the budgeted cost of land whose acquisition for purposes of colonisation was planned at the beginning of the current fiscal year. As a result of external factors, only a part of the purchases budgeted could so far be carried out. On the other hand, a number of purchases not included, originally, in the budget, have been carried through, as a result of changed situations, possibilities and requirements. Enclosed please find the list of areas acquired in the course of the first 10 months of the current fiscal year, as well as the cost thereof. You will observe that the total (composed of items both budgeted and not budgeted) amounts so far to \$4,446,507. The difference between the original estimate of \$3,400,000 and the said amount of \$1,446,000 is to be presumably expended in the near future, the time and the extent \$5 which we shall be enabled to effect new purchases, involving the expenditure concerned, depending on the condition of the land market and other factors.

Mr. James Becker telephoned me this morning to say that he was speaking on behalf of the Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal and that he was asking me, at the request of yourself and Dr. Goldman, for audits by specific years of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, the Keren Hayesod, the Keren Kayemeth and the Zionist Organization of America.

The manner of Mr. Becker's request may have been part of his temperament but I found it rather rude and abrupt.

I expressed the thought that the Zionist Organization of America was not a constituent of the United Palestine Appeal and, although its audits were publicly available, I saw no reason why the United Palestine Appeal should submit an audit of the Z.O.A. to the Allocations Committee. He insisted, however, that a grant was made by the United Palestine Appeal to the Zionist Organization of America and that accordingly the Allocations Committee had a right to demand such an audit.

May I take the liberty of expressing my own thought that the Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal is called upon to determine how funds raised in 1939 shall be allotted as between the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal, and I don't see what purpose other than that of a general "fishing expedition" is served by supplying the Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal with material for the years 1936, 1937 and 1938.

In the meantime, however, as a result of my telephone conversation with you this afternoon, I have dispatched the attached cable to Mr. Kaplan in Jerusalem requesting the material referred to by Mr. Becker. It can be taken for granted that in view of the difficulty of transportation it may be many weeks and perhaps even months before this material reaches the United States. Is it conceivable that the decisions of the Allocations Committee will be delayed pending the receipt of this material?

In accordance with our telephone conversation I shall not submit any audit of the Z.O.A. to the Allocations Committee on the ground that the Z.O.A. is not making any application for

Considering the precise planning that seems to have been initiated by the J.D.C. people, is not my suspiciousness of motives with respect to the audits of the past three years, that are now required, justified?

### MEMORANDUM

November 2, 1939

To: Dr. Stephen S. Wise

From: Henry Montor

I note the discussion that is going on with regard to a lecture to be given by Duff-Cooper in New York City.

I note with similar interest that the United Palestine Appeal is expected to be one of the organizations to share in the cost of the undertaking.

Insofar as the United Palestine Appeal as a campaign is concerned, sponsoring an address by Duff-Gooper at this particular time is of no avail. That, of course, has nothing to do with the general propaganda value of such an address.

Ought we not to think earnestly of the barrage of criticism that has been directed at Duff-Cooper and at other visiting Englishmen during the past few weeks? Everywhere the suspicion is directed at them that they are helping to drag America into the war and that they have come here specifically for that purpose.

Have the Zionists a right at this time, particularly when the neutrality legislation is still being discussed, to effer a platform to Buff-Gooper for statements that may be — and undoubtedly will be — maliciously misinterpreted to the effect that the war is being fought to save Palestine for the Jews.

This morning I was visited by Samuel Goldsmith, who has accepted the post of Secretary of the Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal. He was accompanied by Henry Bauling, who is the Budget Director of the Chicago Federation, whom Mr. Goldsmith brought to New York to assist him in the preparation of material and recommendations for the Allocations Committee.

The conversation with Mr. Goldsmith covered more than two hours and a wide range of subjects concerned with the responsibilities of the United Jewish Appeal and the functions of the United Palestine Appeal.

Mr. Goldsmith felt it important to receive all figures and reports that had been referred to by Mr. Becker in his original letter to me last week, in which he asked for the statements of the Keren Hayesod, the Keren Kayemeth and the Jewish Agency for the years 1936, 1937, 1938 and 1939. Some of the questions Mr. Goldsmith asked went as far back as 1920. He was interested in having a year by year account of the expenditures by the three above listed agencies for every year from 1920. He was also interested in having a year by year account of the amounts in cash forwarded from the United States by the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth.

In reply to my question as to why it was necessary to have such material going as far back as 1920, Mr. Goldsmith said that it was important to build up a picture as to the extent and the continuity of interest in Palestine, in the United States, together with a picture of what had been accomplished in Palestine during that period.

Mr. Goldsmith asked if I had any figures as to the amounts that had been raised during these periods by Hadassah, Gewerkschaften and the Hebrew University. I said that the United Palestine Appeal did not have this material, and that he would have to turn to the organizations themselves. This, apparently, he is planning to do.

Mr. Goldsmith indicated that the Allocations Committee should have before it some idea of what other agencies in the United States, outside the United Palestine Appeal, were making available for Palestine.

I have turned over to Mr. Goldsmith copies of the monthly reports issued by the Keren Hayesod from October, 1935 through August 1939. I also made available to him the audited reports from 1937 to 1939 of the Keren Hayesod, the Keren Kayemeth and the Jewish Agency. It should be noted that these reports were merely transcripts of the documents published at the bienniel Zionist Congresses. I also made available to Mr. Goldsmith the audited report of the United Palestine Appeal for the past three years. There is therefore no material that has been requested by, or on behalf of, the Allocations Committee that has not already been made available, except in the specific form demanded by Mr. Becker in his original letter of inquiry.

I have failed to turn over to Mr. Goldsmith the audited report of the Zionist Organization of America for the past three years, as per your instructions.

Mr. Goldsmith felt that the Allocations Committee would be governed by the question of priorities in need. The Allocations Committee was confronted with the reality that it would have somewhere between five and six million dollars to distribute; a maximum of three million dollars during the calendar year 1939 and the other three million dollars during 1940. It would have to determine which obligations were immediately inescapable. In this connection, he reported that the National Refugee Service will, by the end of 1939, have spent \$2,700,000. The Joint Distribution Committee, he stated, has already spent \$5,460,000, involving approximately \$1,160,000 in expenditure beyond the income of these organizations from the 1939 campaign, as regards the first \$9,500,000. In other words, the money was spent and, in a sense, constituted an obligation upon the Allocations Committee.

I felt that this was fallacious reasoning, and that the United Palestine Appeal could have borrowed \$1,000,000 from the banks, sent the money to Palestine and thereupon turned to the Allocations Committee and said that a commitment had been incurred and it was now a responsibility of the Allocations Committee to meet it. Surely it was not sound thinking on the part of the Allocations Committee to be forced into a position of meeting obligations recklessly or thought-

lessly incurred by the organizations which would ultimately appeal to it for allocations.

The contention might be raised in the Allocations Committee, Mr. Goldsmith said, that the United Jewish Appeal is an American fund-raising body and that American obligations must be met first. To which I replied that the United Jewish Appeal had been publicly recognized as a refugee fund and that it was a campaign launched by the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal which, between them, had made an allocation to the National Refugee Service. It had been made emphatically clear to the Jewish communities of America that the funds were being raised for Europe and Palestine and also for America; that emphasis had been placed on the fact that there was a definite limitation as to the amount which the National Refugee Service might ultimately receive.

Toward the close of the discussion, Mr. Goldsmith expressed the view that it was possible that the decisions of the Allocations Committee might be governed by the adoption of formulae, first with respect to the the \$3,000,000 that might be available during the calendar year 1939 and another with respect to the other \$3,000,000 ultimately to be made available.

Among the factors that the Allocations Committee would have to consider, Mr. Goldsmith felt, was the will of the great masses of contributors who, he thought, might be more moved by the elementary needs of relief than by the long range program of reconstruction; by the expenditures already incurred and the commitments made on behalf of the particular organizations represented; by the actual urgency of the requirements stated by each of the organizations in their applications to the Allocations Committee; by the record of income of the constituent organizations over a period of years.

Mr. Goldsmith had some critical observations to make with regard to the National Refugee Service and the method of its functioning. He also felt that the Joint Distribution Committee had been mistaken in many of its policies during the past. He felt that the whole idea of trying to reconstruct the economies of nations as the responsibility of the Joint Distribution Committee was wrong.

In general, my impression was that Mr. Goldsmith doesn't have a prejudice for Palestine, but rather that his thinking is molded with a prejudice toward the requirements in the first place of the National Refugee Service, of whose Executive Committee he is a member, and toward the Joint Distribution Committee.

I believe that Mr. Goldsmith will be as scrupulous and precise in analyzing the finances of the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Refugee Service as he is trying to be in scrutinizing

the finances of the United Palestine Appeal and its agencies.

It is apparently the intention of Mr. Goldsmith to draw up a memorandum to be made available for the meeting of the Allocations Committee on November 15th. In that memorandum he apparently intends to summarize his findings after conducting a financial investigation of the three organizations and also to submit certain recommendations as to urgencies of requirements.

At noon time today I met with Dr. Georg Landauer and Mr. Kurt Blumenfeld for the purpose of discussing a number of matters which were to be submitted to the Allocations Committee. I had, during my conversation with Mr. Goldsmith, in the morning, arranged for Mr. Goldsmith to meet, on Saturday afternoon, with Dr. Landauer as the one man who perhaps more than any other knows all the facts with respect to the Keren Hayesod, the Keren Kayemeth and Palestine generally, and who has been given authority by both the Jewish Agency Executive and the Keren Kayemeth to deal with the facts involved in the case. I think that the opportunity given to Mr. Goldsmith to meet with Dr. Landauer will be most helpful to our interests.

Dr. Landauer suggested that he draw up a memorandum to be submitted to the members of the Allocations Committee prior to their meeting on November 15th, in which he would emphasize various grades of urgency in the \$5,000,000 application made to the Allocations Committee. Thus he will anticipate any observations that may be made by Mr. Goldsmith, or by members of the Allocations Committee, as to the relative urgency of oneitem against another, or as between the urgency of requirements between the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee.

One remark made by Mr. Goldsmith that I found of special interest was that he foresaw no possibility of a separate drive in 1940. He felt that the communities would not stand for it. This was said in connection with an observation made by me that the Allocations Committee members ought to keep in mind that will to a unified campaign which made possible the United Jewish Appeal for 1939, and also to keep in mind the fact that if a grave injustice were done to the cause of Palestine, the possibility of continuing the unified campaign which was so essential for American Jewry and for all the causes, would be seriously impeded. It was at that point that he declared that regardless of the will of the separate organizations, American Jews would demand a unified campaign.

or pieres MEMORANDUM November 10, 1939 ISIDOR COONS FROM: HENRY MONTOR RE: Miami, Fla. May I state my very vigorous and formal dissent over your intention of your own accord as an officer of the UJA to wire to Miami at this time accepting the proposed tentative allotment of \$45,000 out of what I understand is to be a total budget of \$110,000. It is you who have consistently taken the position that the UJA is dissolved as of 1939 and that no decisions of any kind can be made with respect to 1940 until such time as a United Jewish Appeal for 1940 is constituted. You even took the position a few days ago that you would have to secure the consent of Rabbi Wise in order that we might have one or more men for a few weeks for training purposes in order to be adequately prepared for 1940. I owe a very definite responsibility to Dr. Silver that the interests of the United Palestine Appeal and of the United Jewish Appeal should not be compromised by hasty action which involves not alone Miami but the nation as a whole. I am sure that you will be ready to give me the courtesy of taking no action by the UJA until this matter shall have been submitted to Drs. Silver and Wise for their joint decision. You, who have such long experience in these matters, know how gravely our acceptance on November 10th of a quota of a campaign to be held in January, 1940, would affect the decisions of other communities either in that area or throughout the country. We have been trying for some time to arrange a meeting of the Negotiating Committees of the JDC and UPA. It has been felt that the time is either not available or not opportune. Surely, the decision that affects Miami is of such importance as to warrant notifying Miami that we shall let them know at the earliest possible moment. Surely, we shall be losing nothing by this delay, for \$45,000 is the least amount that we can expect under any circumstances. BC

Dear Dr. Silver:

I regret to inform you that the meeting of the Negotiating Committees of the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee that was to have been held on Wednesday morning, November 15th, has been cancelled by the Joint Distribution Committee.

I have been notified that the reason for the cancellation is the fact that Mr. Baerwald has left for a rest and will not return to New York until after the 15th. The Joint Distribution Committee officers felt that Mr. Baerwald's presence was essential and they did not wish to disturb him during his rest period. Upon his return to New York the Joint Distribution Committee will communicate with us to arrange a definite date when the first meeting of the Negotiating Committees can be held.

At a meeting called this afternoon by the Council of Federations, at which were present representatives of the Joint Distribution Committee and Mr. Lipsky and myself, Mr. Joseph Hyman stated that the Joint Distribution Committee felt that no meeting of the Negotiating Committees is possible until after the Allocations Committee shall have met. Moreover. he declared that the annual meeting of the Joint Distribution Committee would take place in Chicago on December 2nd and that a number of urgent matters of policy would be considered at that time. In addition, Mr. Hyman stated that the Joint Distribution Committee had been conducting negotiations with various bodies and that the United Palestine Appeal was only one of the many institutions with which they had had to conduct negotiations in order to determine their plans for 1940. The Joint Distribution Committee had to keep in mind the possibility and perhaps the necessity of a non-sectarian campaign for 1940 with the Red Cross or other bodies. However, he declared that the Joint Distribution Committee had appointed a Negotiating Committee, but it had so many daily urgent requirements to meet that its officers did not have the physical time to meet with the United Palestine Appeal on the question of 1940.

It may be said that the statement by Mr. Hyman was perhaps the first clear indication of the endeavor by the Joint Distribution Committee to make other arrangements for 1940, if possible. Mr. Hyman in this connection said that if the Joint Distribution Committee discovered that its needs for 1940 might, for the sake of argument, amount to \$25,000,000, it would have to consider the framework in which its campaign would be conducted.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I have your letter of November 8th.

Mr. Blaustein and I, sometime ago, conferred with Mr. Montor. Subsequently I met with Mr. Montor and Mr. Lipsky and recently again with Mr. Szold and Mr. Lipsky.

In July, following the suggestion of Messrs. Lipsky and Montor, I formulated a memorandum for Mr. Montor to be submitted by him as his own memorandum, to the Executive which at that time was in Geneva at the Zionist Congress. (It should be mentioned that this statement was not satisfactory to Mr. Montor. See attached letter of Mr. M., and memo.)

The two points you mention in your letter are covered in this memorandum. Thus we would give effect on our own initiative to the two points raised by you, but not as an obligation imposed by a formal agreement. I fear a formal agreement would severely harm the J.T.A. and create the impression that the J.T.A. is under Zionist control, as well as place the Zionist Organization in the unfavorable light of exercising that control.

You will, I am confident, appreciate the principle underlying this procedure. Every newspaper or agency wishes to employ a correspondent who is persona grata with the powers that be in the country in which he is stationed. This is as beneficial to the smooth functioning of the agency as it is to the country where the correspondent works. However, it is an entirely different matter, if, let me say, the Associated Press or the New York Times would enter into a formal agreement, say with the British Government that whoever they appoint as their correspondent in London must be approved by the British government. Would you have confidence in the news of the New York Times if you were to learn that such an agreement existed?

The j.T.A. at all times maintained a fair attitude toward the Zionist Organization. The very fact that during the last five years the j.T.A. continued this fair attitude entitles us to the respect and confidence by the Zionist Organization.

Dr. Silver Nov. 13, 1939 As far as point two is concerned, you, Mrs. Jacobs, and Mr. Arthur Lamport are already members of our Board. We shall be glad to add more Zionists on our Board because we recognize the deep interest Zionists are taking in Jewish events the world over. However, it would be impossible for us, and I trust you will agree with me, to concede the right to the Zionist Organization to appoint members on our Board. If we were to do this we would have to consent to a similar arrangement with other bodies. Sometime ago a similar suggestion was made to us from another quarter, and we did not hesitate to turn it down. We are most anxious indeed, and we have proven it in our work, to serve our people with the utmost of our ability and in a spirit of devotion and earnestness. We desire the most amicable relationship with the Zionist Organization. The J.T.A. today is a communal enterprise guided by a board of responsible Jewish leaders. Not a single member of our board or executive committee at any time has made the slightest suggestion to inject any kind of bias into our work. I was thrilled by the definite stand you took in Lucerne. will never forget how outspoken you were in denouncing the principle of controlled news services. For this very reason your opinion means so much to the J.T.A. We want to make our contribution in order to be rid of what you term a "bother some problem", but it seems to me you would be the last person to advocate a course which would cast reflection on the status of the J.T.A. as an independent agency. More than ever our people require a truly effective news service in these so critical times. So much is at stake today that to continue the present chaotic situation is against the best interests. The J.T.A. in its many years of work has created many valuable contacts not only with newspapers, but with statesmen, embassies, governments, etc., etc. The J.T.A. is an asset and has great potential possibilities which are not utilized. To strengthen the J.T.A. today, to enable us to extend our service, to send more American newspaper men to Europe, is of prime importance to our people. It is an imperative necessity that the lines of communication should not be broken off. Following your suggestion I recently addressed a letter to the Palestine Emergency Committee asking it for a grant of \$16,667 to the J.T.A. I did not mention the Palcor issue in that letter. This request, I strongly feel, should be acted upon without regard to the Palcor issue. I am confident that the J.T.A.-Palcor situation will be solved satisfactory to all, but in the meantime every delay which prevents our proceeding in extending our service and launching the Overseas News Agency, is an irretrievable loss. The work of the J.T.A. -- raicor or no Palcor -- is directly and indirectly of great importance to the Zionist Organization. We have during all these years readily cooperated with the Zionist Organization despite Palcor, and I feel it would be a generous, but deserved action on the part of the Zionist Organization to extend a helping hand to us at this time without waiting until the Palcor issue is solved.

Nov. 13, 1939 -3-Dr. Silver I understand that at the last meeting of the Palestine Emergency Committee it was decided to defer a decision to the follow-ing meeting. November 13, 1939 Mr. Louis Lipsky 386 Fourth Avenue New York City Dear Mr. Lipsky: When the officers of the Keren Hayesod consider the renewal of the agreement for the United Palestine Appeal to cover 1940, may I suggest that they keep in mind the necessities of the United Palestine Appeal as a campaign structure? During the course of the year there are many men throughout the country who give service in various ways to the building up of support for the United Palestine Appeal, Through their capacity as leaders in local drives, as major contributors or as workers in the ranks. It seems to me, therefore, that there should be represented on the United Palestine Appeal Administrative Committee and in other offices that may be created, a greater number of those men who, whether living in or out of New York, are truly the bulwark for the continued and expanding existence of the United Palestine Appeal as a fund-raising instrument. I am wondering whether it is necessary to restrict the . United Palestine Appeal officers to the technical basis of assigning 50% to one of the agencies in the United Palestine Appeal and 50% to another. Many of the men whom I would suggest for places in the United Palestine Appeal bodies are not particularly concerned with one agency or another, but who are devoted friends of the United Palestine Appeal as a whole. May I take the liberty, therefore, of hoping that some provision will be made for recommendations by the United Palestine Appeal itself, before final decisions are made with respect to the officers of the United Palestine Appeal? # UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL

Dear Dr. Silver:

On Saturday, November 11th, Judge Rothenberg and I attended a luncheon and meeting called by the Board of Directors of the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the plans for 1940 and the relation thereto of the Welfare Funds.

The meeting was opened by Mr. Shroder, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Council, who stated the problem as the Council for Federations sees it.

The position of the Joint Distribution Committee with respect to 1940 was then described by Mr. Hyman. Most of his statement was defensive in character, as though to ward off criticism because the J.D.C. had not yet met with the United Palestine Appeal. He declared that the J.D.C. officers were confronted with extraordinary problems which gave them no time whatever to deal with the technical aspects of planning a 1940 campaign or of conferring with the U.P.A. as to the renewal of the 1940 United Jewish Appeal. Moreover, the J.D.C. was awaiting the results of the Allocations Committee decisions. In addition, there is an annual meeting of the J.D.C. to be held in Chicago on December 2nd and at that time the position would be reviewed and some policy decided upon.

In the meantime any action is premature and again and again Mr. Hyman reiterated that the overwhelming demands from abroad were so urgent in character and required so much time for action that no moment was left for consideration of 1940 problems with the U.P.A. Mr. Hyman also indicated that the J.D.C. was in constant negotiation with the Red Cross, with the Quakers and with the Commission on Polish Relief. The J.D.C. did not know at this time whether these discussions would result in a great non-sectarian campaign, of which the J.D.C. would be a part. The J.D.C. would let the communities and other interested parties know as soon as plans in this direction have been clarified.

To indicate the confusion that exists in the community and also to illustrate the many problems with which the J.D.C. is called upon to deal Mr. Hyman referred to the receipt of a letter from the American Jewish Congress in which the proposal is made that a "mass campaign" be undertaken throughout America to interest those small givers who, it was said, are not brought within the scope of the

normal Welfare Fund drive. These small gifts from the "mass" would be turned over for administration to the J.D.C.

In a statement subsequent to that of Mr. Hyman, I said that the U.P.A. took the position that its fund-raising instrument in the communities was the Welfare Fund wherever a Welfare Fund existed. Moreover, the proposition that had been forth-coming from the American Jewish Congress did not have the approval or sympathy of the U.P.A.

The U.P.A. had taken the position that it was sympathetic to a renewal of the U.J.A. and regardless of the fact that the Allocations Committee had not yet made or decided upon allocations the U.P.A. was prepared to meet with the J.D.C. to consider methods and terms of the 1940 U.J.A. In consonance with proposals broached at an earlier meeting of the Council the U.P.A. had undertaken explorative discussions with the Gewerkshaften and Hadassah. The Gewerkshaften did not express an interest in entering a U.J.A. for 1940. No meeting had yet been arranged with Hadassah.

The conditions in Palestine require far larger sums from America than ever before. It was not necessary to dwell upon these at length since those attending the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Council were constantly in touch with developments both in Europe and Palestine, but even though the U.P.A. recognizes that its needs for 1940 are extensive it nevertheless knows that the possibility of raising greater sums must come through unified action both as regards the J.D.C. and the U.P.A. and as it relates to unified fund-raising within the community itself.

Judge Rothenberg, in a blunt statement, said that the report by Mr. Hyman on the negotiations conducted by the J.D.C. made it very clear that the J.D.C. was already planning the 1940 activities even though not with the U.P.A. If the position were such that the J.D.C. and the Red Cross were to have a joint 1940 campaign there was a responsibility upon the J.D.C. to see to it that the U.P.A. should not be kept in the dark. Either the U.P.A. should be invited to share these discussions or the U.P.A. should be informed that there was no intention of including it in a 1940 drive, so that when January 1st, 1940, arrives the U.P.A. would not be in the embarrassing position of not knowing what its 1940 plans were.

Judge Rothenberg, describing the results not only of the 1939 U.J.A. but of other similar fund-raising enterprises in the past, declared that the union of forces does not reduce the funds available for the participating agencies but actually enlarges the amounts available for all causes.

In replying to the question raised by Judge Rothenberg, Mr. Hyman said that "nothing would be done by the J.D.C. without the complete concurrence of all elements in the American Jewish community".

Statements on the position of Ort were made by Mr. Louis Boudin and Mr. Harold Altshul. The willingness of the Ort to join in a U.J.A. for 1940 was stressed.

Mr. Hamlin, on behalf of the Gewerkshaften Campaign explained why his group did not wish to join in a unified drive in 1940. He took the position that the Welfare Fund may be preventing creative thinking in the community and may be reducing the community structure merely to a fund-raising instrument. He felt that the Gewerkshaften is not merely a fund-raising instrument but represents a philosophy of Jewish life and that its elimination from the field of campaigning would remove an important influence upon the Jewish masses.

Mr. David M. Watchmaker, representing the Welfare Fund of Boston, declared that there was a demand for unification in the community not only of all overseas agencies but of the overseas drive with all local philanthropies. He envisaged the day when Boston would raise funds for all causes, local, national and overseas, instead of having them divided into a Federation and a Welfare Fund drive. Regardless of the decisions of national bodies Boston would have a unified drive.

This statement was also echoed by Mr. Jacob Blaustein of Baltimore. He was also present in his capacity as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. Mr. Blaustein declared that a decision on the 1940 U.J.A. should be reached as soon as possible.

Mr. Samuel Finkel, director of the Hebrew University, spoke of the needs of the University in relation to 1940, and said that the willingness of the Hebrew University to enter into a unified drive would depend on the conditions. He wondered, for example, whether a grant to the Hebrew University for its current needs would prevent the University from making appeals for capital needs.

Mr. John L. Bernstein of Hias expressed willingness for Hias to enter into a unified appeal but said that the amount made available to it would have to be proportionate not only to the income it was already receiving but to the increased requirements for 1940. In 1938, he said, Hias had raised \$375,000; \$175,000 of this amount coming from New York City, \$150,000 from members and \$50,000 from Welfare Funds. In the first nine months of 1939 \$400,000 had been obtained: \$200,000 from New York City. \$140,000 from members and \$60,000 from Welfare Funds.

There followed statements by Mr. William Rosenwald on the National Refugee Service and by Mr. Joseph Goldstein, representing the Rochester Welfare Fund, who urged unification of all the agencies represented within the U.J.A. for 1940.

Mr. Edward A. Norman said that he represented a new organization which was trying to unify campaigns for private, educational and cultural institutions in Palestine. Without identifying them he said they were nine men who constituted a nucleus for these activities and that their hopes for 1940 were to obtain \$150,000. He did not specify the institutions which he meant, but probably such bodies as the Maritime School, Habimah, etc. etc.

Judge Rothenberg said that one question that would have to be solved before a 1940 campaign could be decided upon was whether the unified drive would get funds for each group equal to the amount it had raised in the past. It would be unwise to go into a drive when the total ultimately available would represent a diminution in the sums already raised. At the same time Judge Rothenberg, in referring to criticism that had been heard of New York during the session, pointed out that the New York U.J.A. had raised almost three times the sum that had been obtained by the J.D.C. and U.P.A. in the previous year.

I raised the question as to what attitude the Welfare Fund representatives present could express as to the total goal that might be set for a 1940 unified Jewish appeal, whether the communities were prepared to raise the larger sums that would inevitably be necessary.

Mr. Shroder thought that no answer could be given to that question since it would depend upon conditions - economic, etc. Mr. Monsky of Omaha said that he could answer the question only in an indirect way by saying very emphatically that a separation of the U.J.A. would have the inevitable effect of reducing the level of giving throughout the country.

- 4 -November 14, 1939 Dr. Abba Hillel Silver Mr. Harry Greenstein from Baltimore said it was unthinkable to have separate drives locally. Mr. Shroder believed that the removal of friction had increased local giving. The wrecking of U.J.A. would hurt every community as well as the causes that had been in the U.J.A., Mr. Shroder declared. This point of view was also reiterated by Mr. Goldhamer of Cleveland. Dr. Solomon Lowenstein of New York, in a closing note, said that community leadership would have to keep in mind the fact that local needs would have to be met as well as international obligations. May I submit for your consideration the following points: (1) On page 3 in clause (2) of the suggested resolution it is made to appear that the distribution is to be based on "\$1,500,000 to the United Palestine Appeal, \$3,650,000 to the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee".

In view of the effort made by Dr. Weizmann and others in London to have some participation, even though remote, in the Coordinating Foundation, would it not be helpful for the language of the resolution to read that the Allocations Committee has determined upon \$3,650,000 in specific recognition of (a) \$500,000 in obligations assumed towards the passengers of the St. Louis, and (b) the \$800,000 that has been underwritten for the functioning of the Coordinating Foundation.

Would it be possible for you to write a minute of your own as to what transpired at the Allocations Committee with special reference to the Palestine phase of the discussion to indicate on what basis the allotment of \$1,500,000 to the United Palestine Appeal was agreed upon? Was it in specific relation to refugee and relief requirements or on the basis of general obligations of the United Palestine Appeal?

#### THANKSGIVING LETTER

November 20, 1939

Dear Mr. - - - - -:

On Thanksgiving Day, Americans will gather around the family hearth to offer thanks for the peace and well-being that have been granted to us in this hour of stress and strife for millions of men and women across the seas. We have many things indeed to be thankful for. The fires of freedom and telerance burn bright in our land. We darkness and no horror of impending disaster throw shadows upon our normal life.

But as we celebrate this festive occasion in the security and comfort of our homes, we shall not be able to erase from our mind thoughts of those in European lands who unfortunately have little to be thankful for. Homeless, their families broken up, fathers and sons killed on the battlefield, mothers and children without shelter or feed - hundreds of thousands have been reduced to desperate circumstances by the ravages of war and cruel oppression.

On Thanksgiving Day you will no doubt wish to give a token of your concern for those who seek to find the road back to happiness. Through the United Jewish Appeal you can help save lives and provide homes for the large numbers of our people who are today on the threshold of destruction.

We trust that in giving thanks you will remember to GIVE - to give out of the depth of your feeling for the oppressed and the homeless - to give out of gratitude for the happiness that you and yours enjoy in this blessed land of democracy and peace - TO GIVE SOMETHING FOR THOSE FROM WHOM EVERTS THING BUT PAITH IN YOUR HELP HAS BEEN TAKEN AWAY.

#### Digest - Rochester, N. Y.

The United Jewish Welfare Fund of Rochester will formally open its campaign at a dinner meeting on Sunday evening, November 26th and continue the appeal until December 6th.

A campaign goal of \$142,000 has been adopted, which represents an increase of about 30% over the total sum raised last year, i.e., approximately \$108,000. Of this 30% approximately 90% is being allocated to overseas needs, including an allocation to the local Refugee Committee. A total of about \$110,000 is being allocated for overseas agencies, or 80% of the total budget. The United Jewish Appeal has been allocated \$90,000. The excess over the goal, if any, will probably be appropriated to overseas causes.

The application originally submitted to the Welfare Fund by Drs. Silver and Jonah B. Wise was for an allotment of \$150,000. After his meeting with the Budget Committee on October 16th, Mr. Coons reported that the UJA's request was not unfavorably received. He was of the opinion that in order to secure this amount approximately \$200,000 would have to be raised as \$40,000 additional would be required for other agencies, administrative expenses, shrinkage allowance, etc. Mr. Coons believed then that the UJA would receive not less than \$100,000. Present at this meeting were the following: Arthur M. Lowenthal, President of the Welfare Fund; Dr. A. J. Appelbaum, Chairman of the Budget Committee; Jacob M. Kammen, Executive Secretary of the Fund; Anna Wolfe, Assistant Secretary; Benjamin Goldstein, James Weil and Joseph Goldstein.

Field representative Goldby reported that at the big gifts meeting addressed by Arthur M. Lamport on November 15th, at which 60 people were present, the sum of \$46,515 was pledged by 42 individuals, as compared with the \$30,820 pledged in 1938. Included in the amount raised thus far this year is a tentative gift of \$9000 made by Simon Stein, \$5000 of which is definite, with the understanding that he will give an additional \$1000 for every \$9000 raised. Mr. Goldby feels that a 50% increase over last year must be maintained if the goal is to be achieved, which leaders confidently expect, based on the standard set thus far.

The UJA has been allotted \$25,000 from the 1938 surplus on which \$21,500 has been paid to date. This does not in any way affect the 1939 allocation. An additional payment of \$2500 on account of this allotment has been promised within a few days; the final payment of \$1000 to follow ten days later.

The sum of \$5000 has been received representing payment of an advance pledge made by the Welfare Fund, which is to be credited against the UJA allocation.

Mr. Joseph E. Silverstein is acting as secretary of the Welfare Fund. Rabbi Philip S. Bernstein has also actively participated in preliminary arrangements for the campaign.

In November 1938 Rochester conducted a campaign for a quota of \$100,000 and raised the amount of approximately \$108,000. The allotments made to the participating organizations in the United Jewish Appeal, all of which have been

paid, are as follows: JDC \$25,000; UPA \$16,500; NCC \$1500, making a total of \$43,000. An allotment of \$1500 was made for local German refugee work.

Rochester has a total population of 328,132, based on the 1930 census, of which 22,500 is Jewish.

In accordance with the suggestion in your letter to Weisgal of November 14th, he had a talk with me concerning the Palestine Pavilion and its continued participation in the World's Fair of 1940. The following is the gist of his statement;

It seems that the Board of Directors of the Palestine Pavilion, the Executive and the Administrative Committees of the Zionist Organization have decided that the Palestine Pavilion should continue in 1940. Similar action was taken at a joint meeting, presided over by Dr. Wise, of representatives of all the Zionist bodies including the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth. This meeting was called specially for the purpose of considering the 1940 status of the Pavilion. A budget of \$90,000 was adopted. This budget covers administration, maintenance, repairs, reconditioning and the introduction of certain new features.

It was agreed that the various Zionist bodies including the Jewish National Fund and the Keren Hayesod should contribute about one half of this sum; the other half is to be raised through Welfare Funds, Community Chests and other methods. Hadassah and the ZOA each agreed at subsequent meetings to give \$5,000 with a possibility of increasing it later to double this amount. The Keren Hayesod and the Jewish National Fund have been asked to contribute \$15,000 each.

I was not present at any of these meetings. Weisgal has prepared a letter to the Welfare Funds requesting appropriations. Following my suggestion, the required amount was placed at \$230,000, which if collected, would make possible the total liquidation of the Keren Hayesod and the Jewish National Fund underwritings in 1939, namely, \$130,000.

Weisgal believes, and I agree with him, that because of the universal favorable impression, even among those who originally were opposed to the Pavilion, it should be possible this year to secure greater support from local communities and Welfare Funds.

Weisgal is of the opinion that in 1940 the Pavilion should be utilized, more systematically, to bring the message of the United Palestine Appeal to the attention of the visitors. He claims that because of the change in the situation resulting from the war, with Palestine almost wholly dependent upon American support, the exhibits should be so conceived as will impress the public with the necessity of their support to maintain and enlarge

- 2 -November 20, 1939 Dr. Abba Hillel Silver what has been achieved in Palestine. This would involve the United Palestine Appeal in an expenditure of approximately \$5,000. But quite apart from this expenditure, which may perhaps be reduced, he asks my personal cooperation in planning the rearrangement of the exhibit for 1940, so as to reflect the work of the United Palestine Appeal and its V relationship to Palestine. Weisgal maintains that whereas the Pavilion was visited by more than two-and-a-half million people, no consistent, organized effort, with the possible exception of Hadassah, was made by any of the Zionist V bodies or fund-raising institutions to invite small groups to the Pavilion in order to stimulate their activities on behalf of the Pavilion. With some changes that are being contemplated in the inner structure of the Pavilion, he is of the opinion that valuable propaganda could be dom on behalf of the United Palestine Appeal if an organized effort were made to invite small groups of leading non-Zionists throughout the country. especially leaders in the various Welfare Funds, to come to the Pavilion as guests of the United Palestine Appeal, thus bringing them into closer contact with Jewish achievements in Palestine and the work of the United Palestine Appeal. This is a piece of work that must be very carefully planned and prepared sufficiently in advance to be effective. The Pavilion itself is not, equipped to do this kind of a job. He therefore thinks it ought to be undertaken directly by the United Palestine Appeal. Whatever one's opinion regarding the wisdom or lack of wisdom of the Palestine Pavilion at the World's Fair, it seems to be the universal opinion that the Pavilion has made a very excellent impression, that it has been of service to Palestine and that as a piece of Zionist and Palestine educational propaganda, it has been excellent. Weisgal suggests that when you are next in New York you, he and I should get together to discuss the questions raised. If that is impossible, he would like to arrange to stop over in Cleveland and see you personally. A meeting in New York would probably be preferable. As far as the booklet on the "Refugee Problem and the Absorptive Capacity of Palestine" is concerned, I think that five thousand copies would be adequate for distribution, and that an add tional note ought to be included somewhere in the front or the back of the booklet about the work of the U.P.A. Subject: Funds Obtained Through Labor Organizations

A dispatch from Washington in the New York Times today discloses that the International Ladies Carment Workers Union has turned over to the Joint Distribution Committee \$110,000 out of a total raised of \$235,000. I assume that this money will be forthcoming through the New York campaign of the United Jewish Appeal.

It seems to me that the final abnouncement of the distribution of the funds raised by the members of the Union is the best proof if this were required of the inadequacy of that type of fund-raising. As I recall, the gift of a half day's pay through the Union was heralded at the time the action was announced as one of the greatest sources of income for the United Jewish Appeal in New York City.

It is apparent, however, that appears men and women can be prevailed upon to contribute adequately through their local community, the end result for reasons which are inevitable and which we can all understand, is not commensurate with the requirements of our organizations and with the modern techniques of fund-raising. It is particularly strange to observe that those people in New York City who are vigorously opposed to mass fund-raising have, nevertheless, given their full support to this particular method which, I think it will be agreed, gives to the United Jewish Appeal, through the Joint Distribution Committee, an in-adequate sum.

Union is definitely nermful rather than helpful, because, as you have noticed from various memoranda that have come to this office from various welfare funds throughout the country. That the United Jewish Appeal is being penalized not merely for that portion of income allotted to the Joint Distribution Committee, but virtually in every instance for the entire sum which has been contributed either by the particular Union or by the particular employee's group in that locality.

The only purpose of this memorandum is to urge that the whole question be considered more thoroughly, whether it he in New York or nationally, before endorsement is given to this particular type of fundraising which debars the United Jewish Appeal as such from making its appeal to hundreds of thousands of men and women who are Jews.

It is true that in some instances the only method of approach to a Union is through a Joint Board or through the International of the Union, but it seems to me that if the action were undertaken locally and not on the basis of Unions but rather upon the basis of an appeal to individuals, the end result would be more happy than the one announced this morning in the New York Times.

My dear Mr. Montor: In reply to your letter of November 20 conveying the results of a meeting with Mr. Weisgal about the Palestine Pavilion - personally, I am of the same opinion with reference to the Palestine Pavilion this year, as I was last year. As I prophesied at the very outset, the project cost Palestine public funds a pretty penny - money that could have been used, in these desperate times, for constructive work in Palestine. There will be a similar, if not a larger deficit, in 1940. However, I am confident that my point of view will not prevail this year any more than it did last year. From what you say, the KH and the KK will make direct contributions to the Pavilion Fund for next year. Why, then, should the UPA which only raises money for these two agencies make a separate contribution? Surely all the proaganda for Palestine that the UPA can make will be made, or can be made, directly through the KH and the KK as well as the ZOA and the Hadassah which you state have also agreed to contribute to the Fund. I would suggest that you do not involve the UPA in any way in this project. I have no desire to meet Mr. Weisgal either in New York or in Cleveland. I prefer to be as far away from this gentleman as possible. Any communications which he has to make can very well come through you. With best wishes, I remain Cordially yours, AHS: BK

My dear Mr. Montor: With reference to the inquiry of Mr. Samuel Blitz concerning the proposed "Night of Stars" in Cleveland, I should like to have you convey to Mr. Blitz the following: The Jewish Welfare Fund of Cleveland will have no objection to the Jewish National Fund putting on a "Night of Stars" in a hall seating about two to three thousand people. This I made clear to Mr. Gallin when he called on me. From modest beginnings, they have now come into a consideration of a "Night of Stars" in the large Public Hall of Cleveland, senting some eleven thousand people. Such a project involving largescale community solicitation for the distribution of tickets, etc. etc., and absorbing the energies of many of our people, would be strongly opposed by the Jewish Welfare Fund. I would advise Mr. Blitz strongly to discourage the local group from embarking on such a project. With all good wishes, I remain Very cordially yours, AHS: BK

Without having additional facts at my disposal, I
must view with alarm your memorandum of November 21st, in which
you were kind enough to inform me that Dr. David Tannenbaum is
to visit the Pacific Coast on behalf of the Jewish National
Fund.

You were also courteous enough to attach a copy of the itinerary of Dr. Tannenbaum, who will go all the way from Columbus to San Francisco. Dr. Tannenbaum is an excellent representative of any obganization and I am sure that his visits to the various communities will be helpful from a general Palestine point of view.

However, there is another consideration involved. There is no definite decision that there will be a renewal of the United Jewish Appeal for 1940. But, as you know, we are in the midst of negotiations which will in all likelihood eventuate in a United Jewish Appeal. Under the circumstances we must continue to be very careful in planning any activity that might even seem to Jeopardize or conflict with the interests of the United Jewish Appeal.

You did not indicate clearly what the functions of Dr. Tannenbaum are to be. I am wondering about the wisdom of his visits to a number of communities which are about to engage in campaigns, particularly since I surmise, for lack of information to the contrary, that Dr. Tannenbaum may see some of the people in these communities about the Jewish National Fund loan. Toledo is in the midst of a campaign in which a large sum of money is involved, for the United Jewish Appeal. Nevertheless, Dr. Tannenbaum was there on November 14th. Dr. Tannenbaum is now in Denver, which is about to launch a large sized campaign. The west coast cities will be thinking of their 1940 United Jewish Appeal campaigns at the time when Dr. Tannenbaum will be there on an interest that might seem to be disparit.

May I spagest that you give me some reassuring details in connection with the tour of Dr. Tannenbaum?

Dear Mr. Lipsky: In accordance with the cordial suggestion which you made and which was also endorsed by Dr. Israel Goldstein, I have taken the liberty of making some suggestions with regard to the composition of the Administrative Committee of the United Palestine Appeal. This time, I assume, is being studied by the committees representing the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth. It is becoming constantly more clear that our effectiveness as a common fund-raising instrument for the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth is dependent upon the friends and champions we obtain in the various communities throughout the country as well as in New York City. Members of the Administrative Committee of the United Palestine Appeal ought, therefore, to be judged not solely on the basis of their representative character as regards tha Keren Haye sod or the Keren Kayemeth, but even more especially as to their standing as contributors to the United Palestine Appeal, as actual workers in campaigns or as leaders of causes or movements actually engaged in raising funds for the United Palestine Appeal. I attach herewith two lists as follows: (A) A list giving the Administrative Committee of the United Palestine Appeal as I think it ought to be composed; and (B) A list of the Administrative Committee of the United Palestine Appeal as it exists at the present time. I also enclose (C) Observations on the names of those individuals whose elimination I suggest giving the reasons for my suggestions. Naturally, It involves a risk in making formal suggestion for the elimination of any name, but I am sure you will expect me, in justice to the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth, to give you my impressions of the activity or inactivity of men in relation to the United Palestine Appeal. #### SAMUEL BONCHEK

He is not in any way active in any part of the New York City campaign of the United Palestine Appeal. In 1938 he contributed \$30 and in 1939 \$25 to the United Jewish Appeal. Mr. Bonchek is quite active in the Gewerkshaften campaign. It seems to me that the United Palestine Appeal ought, in fairness to the criticism it has voiced on frequent occasions, eliminate those people who are active in another campaign and whose presence on the UPA official bodies gives people the impression that the UPA endorses numerous separate campaigns that are under way.

#### MRS. MOSES PL EPSTEIN

She contributed nothing to the United Palestine Appeal in 1938 and \$20.00 to thto the United Jewish Appeal in 1939. The interests of Hadassah are important but they are, from time to time, in definite conflict with those of the UPA. On that basis Mrs. Epstein ought also to be eliminated. It might be said that neither Mrs. Epstein nor Mr. Bonchek has attended any meeting called by the official bodies of the UPA.

#### HARRY P. FIERST

He contributed \$50 in 1938 and pledged \$75.00 in 1939. He has not attended meetings.

#### LEIB GLANTZ

He made no contribution whatever in 1938 and contributed not a single penny to the United Jewish Appeal in 1939. Whatever activity he may be indulging in on behalf of Palestine is contributed to the Gewerkshaften campaign. Why should people who contribute nothing and do no work be the determining factors in the policies of the UPA?

#### RABBI I. M. KOWALSKY

He contributed \$25.00 in 1938 and nothing whatsoever to the United Jewish Appeal in 1939. It seems to me that there is precedent for the removal of such names from our lists in the rules of the World Zionist Congress which provide that no man can be a delegate who has not made a specified contribution to the Keren Hayesod.

#### JOSEPH KRAIMER

He has been on the list for several years, not because of his activity in Newark but because he was Nasi of the Order Sons of Zion. He has not held that post for more than a year. He should not be a member.

#### ABRAHAM KRUMBEIN

He contributed \$100 to the UPA in 1938 and not a single penny to the United Jewish Appeal in 1939.

#### JOHN L. LIEBOWITZ

Our records show no contribution in 1938 and a \$50 contribution in 1939. He is not particularly active in the campaign in his own community.

#### DR. HARRIS J. LEVINE

He made no contribution to the UPA in 1938 and made no contribution to the United Jewish Appeal in 1939. Again, we have representation without taxation.

#### DAVID PINSKI

His name may be very helpful to the interests of the Gewerkshaften campaign but has no value to the UPA. He has made no contribution to the UPA in 1938 and nothing whatever to the United Jewish Appeal in 1939.

(C) (cont'd)

MRS. SOL ROSENBLOOM

I am suggesting that Charles J. Rosenbloom of Pittsburgh, who is the active figure in the family, should be named in her place.

LOUIS SEGAL

His contribution in 1938 was \$42.50. The United Jewish Appeal records show no contribution in 1939. Mr. Segal's interests are definitely tied up with those of the Gewerkshaften campaign.

MORRIS WEINBERG

The UPA books record a pledge in 1938 of \$500, of which \$300 remains unpaid. The United Jewish Appeal books for 1939, though perhaps erroneous, has thus far failed to disclose a contribution for 1939.

The following material will, I believe, serve to complete some of the answers to your questions which I left unfinished in my letter to you of November 20th.

Question (5): In relation to the Mizrachi institutions maintained by the Palestine Foundation Fund and the Jewish National Fund, we may list five separate sources of income and support. These are the Keren Hayesod, the Keren Kayemeth, the Mifal Bitzaron, the refugee funds of the Immigration Department, and the Palestine Agricultural Settlement Association, known as PASA.

Sizeable loans have been made to Mizrachi kibbutzim by the Keren Hayesod, the Keren Kayemeth, the Mifal Bitzaron, and PASA both separately and jointly. During the period beginning October 1, 1937 and ending March 31, 1939 such loans, totaling 199,637, were made to the following Mizrachi colonies: Kfar Haroeh, Kfar Pines, Kfar Avraham, Kfar Hassidim, Kfar Rodges, Tirath Zvi, Kfar Hittim, Kvutzath Arieh, Sdir Yacov, Mikveh Israel, Ramat Hashomron, Kfar Yavetz, Machar, Kfar Ivri, and the settlement B of Hapoel Hamisrachi.

Aid is extended by the Keren Hayesod to the educational institutions of the Mizrachi. The annual grant of the Keren Hayesod to that part of the Education Department budget is £17,000.

Loans made directly to individuals by the Keren Hayesod are distributed without regard to affiliation. Some twenty percent of such loans, amounting to \$4,000, were made to members of the Mizrachi from October 1, 1937 to March 31, 1939.

The Immigration Department during that period expended \$2,000 for the training of Misrachi chalutzim, and \$8,000 for aid to immigrants upon their arrival. Refugee funds totaling more than \$1,000 were distributed among Sdir Yacov, Kfar Haroch, and Kfar Avraham. Expenditures of Youth Aliyah include \$8,369 in Redges, \$9,159 upon the Mizrachi Girls Home in Jerusalem, \$1857 for the Mizrachi Girls Home in Tel Aviv, and \$4,758 in the colony of Nehemiah.

The Labor Department of the Keren Hayesod in the same period allocated ±8,500 to various Mizrachi organizations and to Mizrachi workmen. Additional

expenditure included an outlay of £3,000 for support of Labor Department activities in which the Mizrachi participates. The Jewish Agency, acting through the Keren Eayesod, allocated \$3,396 for religious needs of the Mizrachi community. The Keren Hayesod bought shares to the amount of 1,000 in the loan fund Kupat Milve of Hapoel Hamizrachi, and 1793 in the Mizrachi Bank.

Question (10) relating to the expenditures of the Mifal Bitzaron in Palestine brings the following report of Mifal Bitzaron allocations for the period August 1,1936 to September 30, 1938:

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver The Temple East 105th Street at Ansel Road Cleveland, Ohio Dear Dr. Silver: I attach herewith a revision of the Minutes of the meeting of the Allocations Committee held in Mr. Ittleson's office on November 15th. Revision was delayed a bit by the fact that it was not until the 22nd that I received a statement on the Minutes previously sent you from two members of the Committee. I have underlined those sections of the Minutes which are either new or represent revisions or modifications. An attempt has been made to include all suggestions and modifications set forth in the letters received from individual members of the Committee and, at the same time, to approximate an amalgam of the diverse judgments and opinions expressed in those letters. I trust that the result is reasonably satisfactory. Dear Mr. Goldsmith:

Your very clear letter and minutes of November sixteenth covering the actions of the Allocations Committee:....

The minutes constitute the agreement exactly as I understand it, excepting that under the final settlement made at the last moment, the \$250,000 earmarked item "to be held in reserve pending a report by the Negotiating Committee with respect to a gift or gifts to be made to organizations dealing with Christians refugees" was fixedly allocated to the JDC, with the proviso, however, that if the Negotiating Committee ordered it to go to Christian refugees, the JDC would reserve it for such purpose, expending same 50% to Protestants and 50% to Catholics.

I think the other gentlemen will confirm that understanding, and that future divisions of money on the basis of 70-30 were to be based on what \$1,500,000 is to \$3,900.000. In other words, the last second settlement was made on the basis that \$5,400,000 was being allocated between the Palestine Appeal and the JDC. I definitely remember Rabbi Silver writing these figures on a piece of paper, in explaining his last proposal to Mr. Ittelson.

As to the last two paragraphs in your letter, I approve of sending reports to the officials of the United Jewish Appeal as proposed therein, and also letter to Mr. Rosenberg in regard to the Rosenwald Family Association.

When I left the meeting, I thought that the Allocations Committee as it existed had adjourned sine die. There is no further work for it to do.

Dear Samuel:

Thank you kindly for the minutes of the meeting of the Allocations Committee held last Thursday, November 15th, at Mr. Ittleson's office.

I regret exceedingly that I could not until this minute find the time to read and comment on your report. While the report is in substance correct I feel that in some places it reflects rather the discussion of the committee than its crystallized opinion.

On Page 2, Paragraph 3, beginning with the word "discussion" you fail to record that Dr. Silver and I recognized the Coordinating Foundation as a responsibility of the United Jewish Appeal and not alone of the Joint Distribution Committee. Even with regard to the S. S. St. Louis it was pointed out that it had become a national emergency for which funds were solicited outside of the UJA and JDC.

This being my impression I feel that your second clause on Page 3 should read with respect to the remainder \$5,150,000, the following distribution to be made:

\$1,500,000 to the United Falestine Appeal \$500,000 to the S. S. St. Louis \$500,000 to the Coordinating Foundation \$2,650,000 to the American Joint Distribution Committee"

Consequently clause 4 on the same page should be corrected to read "In relation which the two sums appropriated, namely, \$1,500,000 for the United Palestine Appeal and \$2,650,000 for the Joint Distribution Committee bear to each other."

The resolution re the National Refugee Service and the United Palestine Appeal adopted at the beginning of the meeting is I believe nullified in view of our subsequent action.

In view of our prolonged discussion prior to Mr. Cohen's appearance before the Committee, your report should indicate clearly that it was our intention to divide the sum allocated between Protestants and Catholics....

My dear Mr. Goldsmith:

Let me thank you for your kindness in forwarding me the minutes of the last Allocations Committee. I have one or two important suggestions to make in order to clarify the language of the resolutions. On page 3, relause 2: "With respect to the remaining \$5,150,000 etc...\$3,650,000 to the American Joint Distribution Committee", the following should be added "which includes (a) \$500,000 in obligations assumed towards the refugees of the SS St. Louis" and (b) "\$500,000 for the Refugees Coordination Foundation".

Last summer, the United Palestine Appeal was officially approached for its consent to such an appropriation from the Allocations Committee. I took the matter up with London and Jerusalem, and after prolonged correspondence, they agreed to the arrangement. The resolutions of the Allocations Committee should reflect the affirmative attitude on the part of the UPA representatives to this specific allocation. Furthermore, because of these two large commitments, which Dr. Goldman and I recognized, we agreed to the percentage arrangement which was finally adopted. Otherwise you will readily see that the 2/3-1/3 arrangement on which we insisted, is not reflected in the resolution as you phrase it.

There appears to be some miscalculation in clause 4 - concerning the distribution of funds if less than \$15,500,000 be received. We agreed that the distribution would be on the ratio of clause 2, excluding, of course, from the total of the JDC allocation, the two \$500,000 items. Otherwise the ratio would be less than thirty percent in both instances (2 and 4), which, of course, was in nobody's mind.

You will recall that one of the concessions that Dr. Goldman and I finally made in order to bring about a unanimous agreement, was that contained in clause 3, whereby all funds raised above \$15,500,000 would be divided not on the basis of 2/3-1/3, but 70%-30%.

Again, I was under the impression that the first resolution referring to the financial emergency of the N.R.S. and the UPA was made in anticipation that another meeting of Allocations Committee would have to be held, but since we finally came to a complete understanding on all allocations, I assumed that the first resolution was automatically nullified. However, I am not pressing

With reference to the note on the first page of the Minutes in re Ben Cohen: I think it should also be mentioned that it was the unanimous thought of the Committee that if such a contribution be made, it should be divided equally between Protestants and Catholics. I think that it will need considerable re-arrangement. In inviting these people, please do not indicate to them their exact place on the program. The opening evening program, for example, seems especially top-heavy. It is not important to have both Landauer and Blumenfeld at the first session, nor Rabbi Goldman. I believe that the latter's speech should be left for the banquet on Sunday evening, along with that of Dr. Israel Goldstein and one or two others. Our banquet program in the evening should be carefully built up. Last year, it was not as good as it might have been. 

Attached herewith are the following memoranda:

- (A) A memorandum from Henry Montor to Arthur M. Lamport and I. Edwin Goldwasser as co-treasurers of the United Jewish Appeal in relation to a \$40,000 appropriation made to the United Jewish Appeal by the Hofheimer Foundation of New York of whose Board of Directors Mr. Goldwasser is a member.
- (B) A memorandum from Mr. Goldwasser to Henry Montor in which he states that the \$40,000 allotment to the National Refugee Service by the Hofheimer Foundation is not to be considered part of the sum obtained by the National Refugee Service.

I contend that a great wrong is being done to the United Jewish Appeal and its constituent agencies by the withdrawal from our resources of a sum which has been made available to one of the participating agencies. As I understand it, the Hofheimer Foundation makes grants solely for use in the United States. Mr. Goldwasser takes the position that the grant by the Hofheimer Foundation to the National Refugee Service cannot become part of the proceeds of the United Jewish Appeal because that would contravene the terms of the grant. That reasoning seems to be fallacious because both the JDC and UPA have during the year received amounts specifically earmarked for their specific work and yet the total amount has either been turned over to the UJA or the respective organizations have been debited by the United Jewish Appeal in the distribution of funds from the latter's treasury.

If the Hofheimer Foundation has made a grant of \$40,000 to the National Refugee Service the situation ought to be cared for in the following manner: The Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal should revise its original decision and allocate to the National Refugee Service \$560,000. In this way the National Refugee Service could retain the \$40,000 it has or will have and the UJA will not have to deduct from distributions to the National Refugee Service any amount that the NRS might have received.

\$40,000 is a handsome amount in any language and I would, therefore, ask that you give me further instructions as to what ought to be done either in your name or my own, although I believe that action ought to be initiated by you since you are not only the National Chairman but also a member of the Allocations Committee.

The argument of Mr. Goldwasser might equally well be applied in the case of the proceeds of the Night of Stars which was conducted by the United Palestine Appeal in New York City. Every person who bought tickets for that show or in other ways contributed to it made his contribution specifically for the settlement of refugees in Palestine. I do not see, therefore, why on Mr. Goldwasser's line of logic, the proceeds of Night of Stars should be turned over to the UJA or that amount to be deducted from the allotment eventually to be made to the UPA.

I assume that in accordance with the conversations between you these \$40,000 will not be turned over to the United Jewish Appeal by the National Refugee Service but will be deducted by the Treasurers from the sum which the National Refugee Service is scheduled to receive on the basis of the decisions of the Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal.

COPY November 29, 1939 MEHORANDUM 70 Mr. Montor FROM Dr. Landsmer In answer to the four questions contained in Mr. Smold's letter of Movember 25thi I. Mr. Istorik's proposal is that there be created in London a central Jewish relief exchange clearing office. All relief funds gathered throughout the world, especially England and Amorica, are to be paid into the account of this central clearing office, to be converted in London into the required foreign currency of the respective countries receiving grants from the various relief bodies. The foreign ourrency is to be offered to the Bank of England. This procedure would represent a service to England "which will not be forgosten". II. The grounds on which I objected to Mr. Istorik's proposals are: A. Insofar as the British funds are in need of foreign ourrency. they must in any case buy these monites from the Bank of England. Therefore this part of the project is not an especial argument for setting up a world-wide cential office in London. By the way, according to the information at my disposel, the amount of foreign currency needed by the British relief organizations during the next months will be inconsiderable. B. For American relief organizations, foremest among them the Joint Distribution Committee and Rias, it would be a very complicated procedure to transfer their funds first to a country with foreign exchange regulations, like England, at a time like this. And it is supposed that such a procedure would involve losses. C. It is a somewhat strange course to pursue to send money from a neutral country like America to a belligerent munity like England in order to distribute funds from England to other belligerant or neutral countries. I have the feeling that such a course is, in general principle, imadvisable and an organisation like the Joint Distribution Committee would not work in this way. For the time being, it is not advisable for the Jewith Agency to transfer its dollar income, or any part of it, to London, for 1. If, for instance, the Jewish Agency would wish to purchase commodities in the United States, difficulties would result out of a general agreement to transfer all dollar currency to England, at the disposal of the Bank of England. 2. If the United Palestine Appeal buys pounds Sterling in New York and remits this Sterling by cable to Jerusalem, the Jewish Agency has a better rate of exchange than by being bound to accept at all times the official rate of the Bank

of England. During the war a difference of rates of exchange for Sterling in America and England may develop and in this case it is likely to prove disadvantageous if the Jevish Agency were bound to get its money from London.

3. Although Mr. Istorik points out that a wholesale offer of dollar currency means a great service to Great Britain in war time, the Jewish Agency has not yet decided whether it ought not keep its political freedom with regard to such matters. As has already freedom, taking into account the uncertainty of exchange rates developments.

Questions III and IV are answered by the above.

In the meantime however, we feel that you should advise Mr. Isterik that we are not in a position to act favorably on his sugression. We should add that another complication presents itself by reason of the fact that we are obliged to rander monthly accounting to our State Department under the terms of our neutrality regulations with respect to all remittances to belligerent countries. To show substantial transmissions to the Bank of England, which would later find their way to both neutral and belligerent countries, might be difficult to explain. We are of the opinion, therefore, that we should continue to make our transmissions in accordance with your instructions directly from New York appropriations.

Dear Dr. Silver:

Thank you for your observations that I offered for the program at Washington. Naturally all these items are subject to revision and change. My purpose has been to try to give form to each of the sessions so that a person attending any one of them would feel repaid for the visit.

I note your suggestion about Landauer and Blumenfeld, and would think that Blumenfeld would be better for Saturday evening, and Landauer for Sunday morning.

The reason I suggested Dr. Goldman for Saturday evening was with the thought in mind that if he closed the session it would give it an appropriate finish since the rest of the evening might seem technical; and that you would close the session on Sunday morning just before the luncheon. Would you prefer to reverse it? That is, you close the Saturday evening session, and have Dr. Goldman speak on Sunday morning. Dr. Wise could then close the afternoon session. Dear Mr. Peiser: Dr. Silver has been good enough to send me a copy of your letter of November 27th in which you refer to the views of Mr. Lessing Rosenwald regarding the addits of the United Palestine Appeal. Reference is made to the view that the United Palestine Appeal figures do not compare favorably with those of the Joint Distribution Committee. When I hear each observations the first or the second time I am inclined to attribute them to a lack of information. But when I hear the charge repeated the fifth time I must frankly say that it might indicate a failure to take all precautions to observe that the United Palestine Appeal and its agencies provide audits that are more detailed and more comprehensive than any submitted by any organization in the world, including any in the United States. In the first place, there is published annually and biennially, particularly in connection with the sessions of the World Zionist Congress, a fully documented financial statement describing how every single penny has been expended in Palestine. Moreover there are monthly reports of the Sewish Agency for Palestine, fully detailing every ttem of expenditure during that particular month. Insofar as the United Palestine Appeal is concerned. you will recall that I sent you recently a copyof the audited statement of the United Palestine Appeal as prepared by Klein, Hinds & Finks, Certified Public Accountants, for the period ending June 30, 1939. A similar audit will be available after December 31st, 1939. That audit not only details the expenditures of the United Palestine Appeal for the current year, but also for the years 1936, 1937 and 1938, together with an indication of how the income in each particular year has been derived. I am conding you herewith another copy of that audit together with material which was submitted recently

by the United Palestine Appeal to the Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal. Both these documents may prove of interest to Mr. Rosenwald.

There is no reason whatever for anyone associated with the United Palestine Appeal to be on the defensive with regard to our figures.
