Dear Mr. Warburg:

In accordance with our conversation of yesterday, I am herewith sending you a series of reports prepared by certified public accountants on the United Palestine Appeal itself and on the agencies in Palestine financed with the support of the United Palestine Appeal.

The material which I herewith attach for your information includes the following:

(A) The balance sheets of the Keren Kayemeth (Jewish National Fund) for the three years, 1936, 1937 and 1938;

(B) The balance sheets of the Keren Hayesod (Palestine Foundation Fund) for the years 1936, 1937, 1938 and 1939;

(C) The report of the Central Bureau for the Settlement of German Jews, a department of the Jewish Agency, for the period from December 1933 through March 31, 1939;

(D) A report of the funds administered by the Jewish Agency for Palestine which were made available for the settlement of German Jews by the Council for German Jewry of England;

(E) the auditors' report of the United Ralestine Appeal for the year 1938.

Klein, Hinds & Finke, the auditors of the United Palestine Appeal, inform me that the audited report for the year 1939 on the United Palestine Appeal will be ready within the next two days. A copy will be forwarded to you promptly.

May I again say that it is less than in good taste, aside from being less than American, for anyone to make any comment upon the activities of the United Palestine Appeal without having gone to the trouble of asking for a report on those activities. You ought to feel free to say to anyone who asks you about the United Palestine Appeal that our financial reports are available at any time covering all phases of our program. Moreover, I should appreciate the opportunity of meeting any persons who feel that they need further explanations of documents which have been prepared by certified public accountants.

What is actually happening is that a number of people, who for some reason have no concern with Palestine, are endeavoring to create a pretext for their lack of interest by referring to extraneous matters and then they refuse to ask for the material which would clear up their misunderstanding or their distortion of the points on which, apparently, they are confused.

I deeply appreciate your own personal interest in making clear to those people who have approached you that all they need to do is to ask for reports and they will receive them. The Palestine movement undoubtedly conducts the most democratic system of accounting that the Jewish world knows. These reports are published annually and biennially for everyone who has the time and the interest to read them.

Dear Dr. Silver:

Dr. Weizmann is interested in having a special kind of letter from you which he thinks will be useful.

At a recent meeting at the home of the Warburgs' he heard many stories, with which you are familiar, of the failure of Palestine funds to provide reports. Naturally, Dr. Weizmann was indignant, knowing as he does how meticulous and regular these reports are.

He feels, however, that there is no reason why the Palestine funds should continue to be kept on the defensive, that, rather, they should place themselves on the offensive. He wonders, therefore, whether he could receive from you a letter in which reference would be made to the fact that in relation to the Allocations Committee the United Palestine Appeal provided all the material that was requested but that you felt that there was inadequate information provided by the other agencies; that you did not see Certified Public Accountants' reports of the Joint Distribution Committee and of the National Refugee Service, and that the reports that were submitted were tentative and general in nature rather than the specifications as are provided by such bodies as the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth.

If you send such a letter to Dr. Weizmann could you let me have a copy?

Dear Dr. Silver:

Attached herewith is a copy of a letter which was addressed to Rabbi Jonah B. Wise by Sidney Hollander, President of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds.

I do not think that Mr. Hollander or the Council is playing fair in this matter. It was my understanding that the Council would submit a list of names from whom the United Palestine Appeal and Joint Distribution Committee could make selections. Instead, Mr. Hollander has been "smart" and selected three names, placing upon the UPA and JDC the omis of rejecting any or all of them, if they are to be rejected. This, of course, creates an embarrassing situation.

That issue aside, however, I think that the list of three submitted by the Council is "loaded". I do not think that either Mr. Shroder or Mr. Blaustein is so adjusted tempermentally that he could look with particular fairness, impartiality and sympathy upon the needs of Palestine. Undoubtedly these men desire to be "fair", but inevitably in every individual there is developed a series of inhibitions or points of view which consciously or unconsciously color judgment. I remember particularly the vigorously condemnatory point of view that was taken by Mr. Shroder in connection with the anticipated visit by Dr. Weizmann.

I do not know whether the letter addressed by Mr. Hollander to"Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, Joint Distribution Committee, "was a typographical error on the part of some stenographer or a deliberate act on his part. I hope that the UPA will not be put in the position of having to turn down these men and the JDC will have accepted them. I am sure that these names will probably be acceptable to the JDC.

What is the further procedure in this matter? Personally, I believe that you ought to talk by telephone to Rabbi Wise not as regards the individual persons suggested but as regards the general principle of the Council giving us three names and saying take them or leave them.

My dear Mr. Montor:

I have also received a letter from Mr. Hollander similar to the one he wrote to Rabbi Jonah Wise. I share your reactions to that letter. I would suggest that upon your return to New York. you get in touch with Mr. Coons, and together have a conference with Mr. Lurie and advise him that the method adopted by Mr. Hollander, of designating three specific representatives, is a very unwise one, that it would put the UPA or the JDC in the unpleasant position of having to reject one or another of the names presented. It would be far preferable if the Council would present to the UJA the entire list of its Welfare Fund committee from which the JDC and the UPA, by agreement, would then indicate who would be acceptable.

With reference to the loan of \$200,000 for the K.K. and the K.H. - formal action should be taken on such an important matter by the Executive of the UPA.

I read the letter which Mr. Warburg wrote to Mr. Adolph Held of the Jewish Labor Committee. We should oppose the inclusion of the Ort in the New York City Campaign. It will mean the loss of perhaps another quarter of a million dollars to the JDC and the UPA.

A copy of the letter which you sent me, signed by Mr. Monheimer of Seattle, should be sent to Mrs. de Sola Pool, president of the Hadassah.

I approve of your suggestion to grant a bonus of \$150 to Mr. Edward Levine for the extra services which he rendered to the UPA.



Dear Mr. Keller:

This will acknowledge your inquiry of February 23, as to whether the United Palestine Appeal has received the proceeds of the Hight of Stars.

The Recutive Committee of the United Palestine Appeal has re-garded the proceeds of the Hight of Stars as in suspension, and any action to change that eltuation must come from the Recutive Com-mittee, which will consider your inquiry at its next meeting.

The United Palestine Appeal Executive Committee took this atti-tude with regard to the proceeds of the Hight of Stars because of the fact that the United Jewish Appeal, with whose fund-raising program the United Palestine Appeal is associated, did not receive an adequate report of, or a remittance on account of, a pledge made to the United Jewish Appeal by the Hoffeelmer Foundation.

you So that you may have the record before you. I should like to call attention to the following facts:

1) On May 16, 1939, the New York United Jewish Appeal submitted a letter to the Mathan Mofheimer Foundation, Inc., Mrs. Letter Mofheimer, Fresident, asking for a goatribution to be made to the United Jewish Appeal.

2) On May 31, 1939, on the letterhead of the Matham Hofheimer Foundation, Mrs. Helen M. (Arthur) Hofheimer wrote to the United Jewish Appeal of Greater Mew Tork, attention of Mrs. David Levy, Ghairman of the Women's division, that at a meeting of the Board of Directors held on April 12, 1939, a grant of \$40,000 was made to the Mational Goordinating Committee.

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Mr. Willen stated, "Tou may enter it, however, as a pledge of \$40,000 made to the New York compaign of the United Jewish Appeal, via the National Coordinating Committee. Flease credit the gift to the Womens Div-ision. Flease report it to the national office of the United Jewish Appeal, so that when the time comes for allocation of funds to the various agencies, we will know that a gift of \$40,000 has been made by the Foundation, through the compaign, directly to the MCC. The UAA of New Tork will, of course, receive full credit for this gift." sent directly to the Mational Coordinating Committee.

4) It should also be noted that on May 16, 1939, Mr. Henry Ittleson wrote a letter to Dr. I. Edwin Gold-wasser, saying: "I have this day sont a formal and formidable document to the Eathen Hofhelmer Founda-tion, Inc., placing before them an appear for a sub-stantial grant on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal of Hew York. As I have some suspicion that you know something of the work of the Joint Distribution Com-mittee, the Hational Coordinating Committee, and perhaps also the United Falestine Appeal, I hope that you will use your excellent persuasive powers to see to it that this appeal receives generous and thought-ful consideration by the foundation."

It is very evident from the foregoing condensation of cor-respondence that a pledge was made to the United Jewish Appeal in the amount of \$40,000, although it was earmarked for the Bational Goordinating Committee. The original application was made by the United Jewish Appeal, so that there could be no mis-understanding as to the relation between the United Jewish Appeal and the Bational Goordinating Committee, two of its beneficiaries.

Nevertheless, although there has been no formal and written repudiation of this pledge, the attitude seems to be taken that the United Jewish Appeal is not entitled to this \$40,000, despite the very clear terms of the application and the manner in which the amount was originally pledged. In this connection, the fol-lowing additional correspondence is pertinent.

5) On October 10, 1939, Mr. Arthur M. Lamport, co-Exec-utive Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, wrote a memorandum on a conversation which he had with Dr. I. Edwin Goldwasser in con-mection with the Hofhelmer Foundation. In that memorandum, Mr. Lamport wrote as follows: "The Hofhelmer Foundation by Law is limited to give gifts only to American Institutions, therefore, if a gift is given to the United Jewish Appeal direct, it would be in breach of the articles contained in the Trust. He, Dr. Goldwasser, therefore recommended that the \$40,000 be paid direct to the Hational Goordinating Gommittee, whose activities are limit-ed to the United States of America and in order to rectify and ad-just this payment direct to them, the Allocation Gommittee should be should be

informed of the fact and therefore make an allowance in the intended grant to the Sational Goordinating Committee of \$40,000 to balance the \$40,000 received directly from the Hofheimer Foundation. Therefore, please adjust our records to indicate that this pledge will be paid direct-ly to the Estional Goordinating Committee."

Subsequently, checks were forwarded to the Mational Coordinating Sommittee, on account of this pledge from the Hofheimer Foundation.

6) On November 29, 1939, Mr. I. Edwin Goldsmasor wrote to Mr. Arthur M. Lamport in part as follows: "In my last statement to you over the telephone I told you that the Bofheimer Foundation withdrew its appropriation from the WA because of the point raised by Mr. Montor. The check for \$25,000 was returned by WA to the Mofheimer Foundation. There was never any remittance of \$40,000. In brief, the WA has lost this appropriation and the Foundation will spend the money in such manner and for such purposes as it may decide. This action, of course, fortunately is beyond the control of any suggestion from the WA."

7) On February 2, 1940, on the personal stationery of I. Edwin Goldwasser, a letter was sent to Mr. Arthur N. Lamport, Executive Go-Chairman of the United Jewish Ap-peal of New York Gity, referring to a letter which Mr. Lampôrt, on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal had ad-dressed to Mrs. Hofhaimar, Fresident of the Hathan Hofheimer Foundation. Mr. Goldwasser wrote, in his capacity as secretary of the Foundation, "I beg to in-form you, because of certain demands made by Mr. Montor and his refusal to agree to the terms under which the grant had necessarily to be made under the permissive provisions for grants by the Bofheimer Foundation, the Board of Trustees rescinded the appropriation and re-quested the return of the check on account." of I.

8) On February 20, 1940, Mr. I. Edwin Goldwasser, on his personal stationery, wrote to Mr. Arthur M. Lamport to ask, "whether you will join me in making request of Mr. Montor immediately to have the proceeds of the "Might of Stare" remitted to the New York City Campaign."

There are two major points that I should like to call to the at-tention of the Treasurers of the United Jewish Appeal: a) No proof has been presented that there was from on the part of the New York United Jewish Appeal is connection with the making of the application to and receiving a pledge from the Hoffheimer Foundation. Moreover, according to the con-versation between Mesers. Lamport and Goldwasser, as recorded in a memorandum from Mr. Lamport dated October 10, 1939 (see item 5). Mr. Goldwasser recognized that the \$40,000 from the More Trundation, although made to the National Goordinating Momiltee, we nevertheless obarge against the mount which

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the National Coordinating Committee would ultimately receive from the proceeds of the United Jewish Appeal;

b) the Executive Committee of the United Palestine Appeal, which receives its funds from the Hight of Stars, Inc., a separate entity, will act upon the matters herein set forth at its next meeting.



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

Dear Mr. Montor:

This is about our "Palestine and Middle East". You may know that the Magzine is "economic" in its contents only not in cost of production. In 1939 it brought us a loss of over LP. 600. So with the approach of the New Year we had to decide whether to discontinue the publication. You know how we love this extravagant child of ours. It was very difficult to make up our minds. The war situation hit the paper first because in Palestine it led to a marked diminution in the number of advertisements and even of subscribers. At the same time it led to a rise on the production costs. We decided finally to continue and the Palestine and Middle East will appear in 1940 too. We have done what we could to reduce expenditure by reducing the size of the Magazine and using a cheaper paper and cover, which resulted in considerable economies on mailing costs, etc. What we maintain is the editorial standard of the Magazine.

Now we revert to the proposal as discussed with you in New York viz. that you subscribe for 2000 copies to be dispatched from here according to a list of persons to be supplied by you. This means that mailing will be undertaken by us and you will not have to bother with delivery.

Our calculations show that we can undertake this at an annual fee of \$2. - per subscriber. We would propose the following: that you should now enter into a trial arrangement with us for 1000 subscribers only and for a period of six months. This would mean an allocation on your part of \$1000 only which is very reasonable and worth while trying.

It is hardly necessary to dwell on the qualities of the Palestine and Middle East in general. One point we would stress however. There must be a natural spread of pessimism amongst Jewry outside Palestine regarding our present situation and immediate outlook. We are glad to say it is unfounded and nothing is more needed at present for the successful continuation of Zionist activities and intensified campaigns for the National Funds than a knowledge of concrete facts and comments coming from Palestine itself.

Should you decide in the affirmative, we would appreciate a) telegraphic advise, b) dispatch by "Clipper" of the mailing list together with a cheque covering the first three numbers (amounting to \$500 in the case of 1000 subscribers).

Rabbi Jonah B. Wise called me yesterday afternoon to inquire why the United Palestine Appeal had not turned over to the United Jewish Appeal the sum of \$50,000 representing the proceeds for the UPA from the "Night of Stars" production.

I told Rabbi Wise that the amount was being held in suspense by the UPA until formal action was taken by the Hofheimer Foundation with respect to the \$40,000 gift which had been pledged to the United Jewish Appeal in the New York campaign and which indirectly, according to Mr. Goldwasser, was later withdrawn completely. There has been no official communication from the Hofheimer Foundation announcing the withdrawal of its pledge of 1939.

Rabbi Wise pointed to the serious financial situation that prevailed and urged the UPA to turn over the \$50,000.







In confirmation of our telephone conversation of today, I am indicating to Mr. Louis Lipsky and Dr. Israel Goldstein, who represent the United Palestine Appeal on the committee planning the New York campaign, your revised views on the participation of ORT in the New York City United Jewish Appeal. As I understand it, you are agreeable to the inclusion of ORT if the amount allocated to it does not exceed \$100,000.

Inasmuch as you and Dr. Goldstein have agreed to this position, and Mr. Lipsky will probably also assent in view of the stand that both of you have taken, I assume that this decision would be generally satisfactory. I do not know of anyone in the United Palestine Appeal who is set firmly against the inclusion of the ORT. It is understood, of course, that your own attitude toward ORT is based upon the pressure which the ORT is bringing to bear and upon the nuisance value which the ORT has through its labor sponsorship. Undoubtedly it will be very hammful to the United Jewish Appeal in New York City if the labor leaders should make up their minds to conduct a continuous fight on the United Jewish Appeal instead of concentrating on the constructive job of fund-raising for ORT.....

However, for the record, I should like to enter my own views which are opposed to the admission of the ORT into the United Jewish Appeal. My understanding is that the labor leaders are asking for \$200,000 for the ORT. Blitz informed me that the ORT would compromise on \$100,000. It was on that basis that your assent was forthcoming.

It should be noted that the Jewish Labor Committee, in which Mr. Dubinsky and Mr. Adolph Held are active, contributed \$15,000 to the U.J.A. in 1939. The Amalgamated Clothing Workers Union, which is headed by Sidney Hillman, an opponent of Dubinsky, and the International Ladies Garment Workers Union, which is headed by Dubinsky, contributed \$150,000 to the New York U.J.A.

There are two bases on which another organization ought to be included in the United Jewish Appeal in New York City. One is, frankly, that of the blackmail value which can be exerted by

Executive Director Henry Montor a powerful organization, and the other is the financial value to be derived from the active participation of an organization in an enlarged campaign.

An analysis of the New York U.J.A. should take into account the following facts: \$1,000,000 must go off to the National Refugee Service, an additional \$65,000 will not be available because of the fact that the Baron de Hirsch Fund is giving \$100,000 to the National Refugee Service direct, and \$40,000 from the Hofheimer Foundation will go to the National Refugee Service direct. At least \$500,000 must be deducted for the expenses of conducting the campaign.

Inasmuch as the general expectation is that not over \$5,000,000 will be raised in New York City in 1940, although I trust that this expectation will prove erroneous, it is clear, then, that perhaps \$3,000,000 to \$3,500,000 may be available for the U.J.A. If the United States, outside of New York City, should contribute as it did last year some \$11,000,000, it would mean that the total income of the U.J.A. for 1940 may range from \$14,000,000 to \$14,500,000.

To yield to the ORT, then, may be advisable from the point of view of the political implications of a ruthless campaign by the labor leaders, but (A) it will diminish the income of the U.J.A. and, of course, of the U.P.A., without a proportionate increase in income arising out of the activity of the labor groups. (B) It will be an opening wedge for the inclusion of other agencies. The J.T.A. and the Council of Federations, which were excluded last year from the New York City campaign on the ground that the United Jewish Appeal was composed exclusively of the U.P.A., J.D.C., and N.R.S., will be justified in asking for inclusion in 1940. (C) It will start the precedent which will encourage many other groups in the conviction that threats and the raising of hullaballoo and the invocation of the weapon of blackmail are irresistible by Jewish leadership.

But since these remarks are made for the record, they are probably not very important.

Executive Director Henry Montor I had luncheon yesterday with Harry L. Lurie, Executive Director of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, in order to discuss with him problems of relationship between the Council and the United Palestine Appeal.

(1) The major topic of discussion was the representation on the Distribution Committee of the United Jewish Appeal for Welfare Fund communities. You will recall that in a letter written many weeks ago, Sidney Hollander, President of the Council, had suggested William Shroder, Jacob Blaustein and Ira M. Younker as the first three choices of the Council, because of their knowledge of budgeting and because of their constant availability.

He felt that the Council would very much like to urge the retention among those three at least of Younker and Blaustein, both of whom, he felt, could approach the subject without bias.

As you know, the Joint Distribution Committee has been quite unsympathetic to Younker for a number of years, although originally in the councils of the JDC; he had the unfortunate character of speaking up and expressing his opinion. My own belief is that the JDC will resist his inclusion as one of the three representatives of the Council.

Blaustein, as you know, is the Chairman of the Executive of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. His family is one of the major contributors to the Baltimore campaign. The only possible objection that there might be to Blaustein on the Committee is that Baltimore apparently does not plan to have a 1940 campaign. But perhaps Blaustein's presence on the Committee might be used as a lever to force a campaign through.

It seems that Shroder was told last year that the Joint Distribution Committee had proposed his name as the impartial Chairman of the Allocations Committee, but that the United Palestine Appeal representatives had turned him down. To my knowledge, this is the first time that Shroder's name was definitely raised in connection with last year's chairmanship of the Allocations Committee. Whoever was interested in telling him the story apparently obtained the effect desired. I asked Lurie for the names of the members of the original committee appointed by the Council in order to consider the question of the United Jewish Appeal for 1940. These included:-

Lurie thought that three members representing the Council, who would be acceptable to the Council, might be Younker, Blaustein and Joseph Goldstein of Rochester. The latter is chairman of the Budget Committee of the Rochester Welfare Fund, and is also President of the Rochester Zionist District. He also suggested the possibility of a man like Ben Selekman of Boston. He thought it might be advisable to have a professional worker in the group of three, inasmuch as his technical experience in budgeting might be valuable.

Lurie suggested that the best procedure would be for you, Rabbi Jonah Wise, Hollander and himself to meet in order to have a discussion, out of which the three names might emerge. He felt, too, that a knowledge of who the JDC and the UPA representatives were to be would also be helpful in determining who the other three ought to be.

(2) Mr. Lurie told me confidentially that the JDC was planning to have a different type of representative on the Distribution Committee this year, as contrasted with Lasker and Ittleson in 1939. It seems that the JDC has in mind Harold Linder and James Becker as its two representatives on the Distribution Committee. Lurie inquired who the UPA representatives were to be. I confessed that I had no knowledge, since this was a matter exclusively in the hands of the Executive Committee for its decision.

(3) In discussing the functions of the Distribution Committee, Mr. Lurie thought that it ought to create a research machinery separate from the Council of Federations. He believes that in the first year the research work cannot be very productive, but it will at least clear the path for future years. The principle that has been established, he thinks, is very sound. Because of this, and because of the unwillingness of the Council to become involved in what may eventuate as a controversy, the Council does not want to have this research job under its own immediate jurisdiction, although it looks for the opportunity of serving in a consultative capacity.

He believed that the research body to be set up by the Distribution Committee would have to be headed by a secretary. He indicated that the JDC had not only been looking around for such a secretary, but had actually had discussions. You will recall the episode centering around Samuel Goldsmith. It seems that the JDC also approached Dr. Maurice Hexter for the post, and that the latter turned it down. I expressed surprise to Lurie that the JDC, as only one of the bodies that had to determine the composition of the Distribution Committee, should place itself and individuals whom it approaches under such embarrassment. My own belief was that the UPA would not accept Dr. Hexter as secretary of a research body attached to the Distribution Committee. He then asked my opinion of Moses Leavitt, who, as you know, is Secretary of the Palestine Economic Corporation, who has been in Palestine on many occasions, and who is very active in Zionist work. Although I do not know Leavitt intimately, I feel that he would be the most competent and sympathetic person that has thus far been suggested for the post.

(4) I told Lurie that I had already set into motion certain steps to expedite the receipt of material by the Distribution Committee. It was my thought that in Jerusalem there ought to be a unified, certified audit on a monthly basis of the accounts of the Keren Hayesod, the Keren Kayemeth and the Jewish Agency. This is an entirely new procedure for Jerusalem, inasmuch as all three agencies are autonomous bodies which have always conducted independent financial activities, and which, moreover, did not have the practice of having monthly audited accounts.

Lurie said this would be helpful, but that auditing alone was not the sole criterion for evaluating activities. Thus it would be interesting to know, for both the Distribution Committee and the UPA, as well as for the National Refugee Service, exactly how many people were aided directly and indirectly by the activities initiated by these three bodies. In many instances, for example, what was regarded as relief activity actually involved little of actual expenditure on relief, while on the other hand an enterprise which might seem to have a limited effect on individuals actually created circles of help which had an ever-widening influence.

Lurie indicated that there were certain questions which the Council would formulate for submission to the Distribution Committee as guidance to its operations.

I continue to find Lurie not only intelligently interested in all our problems, but even sympathetic. I may, of course, be misjudging politeness for concern, but that Lurie has an intelligent conception of Jewish problems is quite obvious to me.

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

Dear

In a few weeks Jews will be celebrating the Passover holiday. This festival of the liberation of the Jewish people will mock hundreds of thousands of Jews who are being enslaved or destroyed. American Jewry will be the only group in a free, peaceful, democratic land able to understand and appreciate the symbolism of this Passover.

Is it not appropriate that we should utilize the channel of the United Jewish Appeal to express a measure of our gratitude that Providence has permitted us to be on the west instead of east of the Atlantic?

What needs to be emphasized at this time is that we have it within our power to liberate Jewish life. The greatest enterprise in that program is the maintenance and expansion of the Jewish homeland in Palestine, which is the lodestar of great masses of Jews begging for the chance to share with other Jews in the building of a secure, dignified life in the land of Israel.

The funds of the United Jewish Appeal maintain the agencies of the United Palestine Appeal, the central organ of American Jewry to further immigration, colonization, land purchase and general development in Palestine. The tasks in Palestine are increasingly urgent, as the Hitler madness grips new portions of the Continent.

Thousands of refugees, undernourished, ill after weeks and months of hazardous travel on the Mediterranean, have been made the responsibility of the Jewish Agency. Food, clothing, shelter, medical attention and ultimate integration into the economic life of the country require far larger resources than could have been realized only six months ago.

War has affected various branches of Palestine's economy, including primarily the citrus industry, building and various industries. Widespread unemployment has not yet been curbed. With private initiative unable or unwilling to function in this crisis, it is the national institutions like the Jewish Agency which must come to the rescue of a network of activities on which the lives of hundreds of thousands of Jews are based. The Jewish Agency has aided old enterprises and helped new ones in order to offset unemployment; it has assisted construction programs to absorb workers. Above all, it has expended large sums for fundamental relief and social welfare purposes.

The Jewish community of Palestine has done more than its share. It has imposed a voluntary emergency tax for the very same purposes embraced in the United Jewish Appeal. The poorest worker and middle class groups alike have taxed themselves for monthly contributions ranging from ten to twenty percent of their <u>entire income</u>. Here indeed is a model of sacrificial generosity for emulation!

Recent discussion of the unjust, unwise land legislation enacted for Palestine by Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald has obscured the fact that in the "free" zone alone, there is twice as much land still to be bought as the Jewish National Fund was able to acquire in thirty-eight years. American Jewry which is genuinely concerned with land for colonization purposes will take heed from recent experiences and mobilize all possible resources so that precious land may be quickly bought to settle the thousands of Jews who continue to enter Palestine month after month.

A few facts in review of Palestine's history in 1939 serve to remind us that Palestine is the great reservoir of Jewish strength and consolation, of Jewish manpower and self-affirmation. From a community of 55,000 souls during the last war, the Yishuv today exceeds 500,000. Land possessions of 420,000 dunams in 1914 compare with 1,533,000 dunams owned by Jews today. In 1914 there were 44 Jewish colonies, with 12,000 Jews earning a living on the soil, while today there are 254 settlements giving immediate livelihood to 130,000. In the last three years 55 new colonies were erected, six of them since the outbreak of war. Whatever the difficulties Palestine industry is experiencing in this transition period, it cannot be forgotten that Jewish production in 1914 was valued at less than 1500,000, while in 1939 Jewish industry produced over 10,000,000.

In Palestine there is being built a permanent, sound economy for the readjustment of the Jew physically and spiritually. If American Jewry has imagination and statesmanship as well as compassion and generosity, it will dedicate itself in 1940, through the United Jewish Appeal, to help save the flower of Jewish youth in Europe through settlement in Palestine.

The task of plucking the victims of Hitlerism from imminent destruction will require a new conception of individual responsibility for the salvage of Jews. It will demand from Jewish leadership in every community a fair interpretation of the relationship between the emergency, unpostponable tasks of relief and rescue and the less critical problems that face the American Jewish community.

I send you best wishes for a joyous Passover holiday, in the hope that through your active assistance thousands of Jews may be set on the path toward freedom in Palestine.

Dear Dr. Silver:

A very strange phenomenon has been occurring in New York City. A number of people who gave large sums in 1939 are asking, and apparently are being permitted, to count these gifts as covering 1939 and 1940. You may know of the case of the Guggenheim family which is supposed to have contributed \$250,000 in 1939. In the meantime, the New York campaign has been notified to regard the Guggenheim gift as a two-year contribution and \$125,000 is intended for 1940.

This means, in the first place, that we shall be getting less money than we had anticipated from the 1939 campaign and, secondly, that actually some of the big gifts announced will not be genuine big gifts.

Another person in this category is Robert Lehman who contributed \$20,000 for 1939 but who has now notified the New York campaign that that was intended for two years.

It seems to me that we ought to fight this phenomenon but I do not know how it can be properly done since a man is the master of his own gift. I do think, however, that the New York campaign ought not without a struggle give in to this "reversal" of gifts. You will recall that we had the same problem nationally in connection with the Hofheimer Foundation. In the end we may not come out any better but at least we have struggled hard to preserve the principle involved.

Summary* Report for the Year Ending August 31, 1939

The National Labor Committee for Jewish Workers in Palestine, which raises funds for the Histadrut Haordim, General Federation of Jawish Labor in Palestine, supports the program of the Histadrut for

- Training and preparing pioneers in countries of Eastern and Central Europe and the United States for the physical, cultural and social life in Falestine. The activities are carried on through Hechalutz, a youth pioneer movement.
- 2. Receiving the pioneers when they arrive in Palestine, and assisting them in securing employment, trade training and in phases of social and economic adjustment.
- 5. Contributing to "Mir", a colonization agency for developing industrial and agricultural cooperatives for transportation, communication, wholesale and retail buying, sale of farm products, agricultural undertakings, bankings, life insurance, housing, medical sid, education and other types of collective action.

While there is no fiscal relationship between the National Labor Committee and the United Palestine Appeal in America, the Histadrut in Palestine cooperates functionally and financially in phases of its program for immigrants and colonization with the Keren Hayesod (Palestine Foundation Fund, the Keren Kayemeth (Jewish National Fund), and the Jewish Agency for Palestine, which receive American support through the United Palestime Appeal, a constituent of the United Jewish Appeal. The program of training for emigration by Hechaluts in Sastern and Central Europe also receives support from America through the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

During the past fiscal year ending August 31, 1939, the receipts of the National Labor Committee of \$390,808 show an increase of 37 percent over the previous year.

Contribution income, received from individuals and organizations and flower day collections, was 34 percent higher in 1939 than in 1938.

Funds contributed by the Finneer Women's Organization and the Farband 'Women's Club, included as receipts by the National Labor Committee, for the Histadrut's program for working and immigrant women increased 37 percent in 1939 over 1938.

"Special Emergency Funds", supplied by the Trade Union Divisions, Fioneer Women's Organization, Farband Women's Club, Poale Zion-Zeire Zion and the League for Labor Palestine, increased in 1939 over funds received from the same sources in 1938 by 147 percent.

"More detailed report available on request.

Disburgements of \$386,263 during the past year left a balance of \$4,545.

Funds transmitted to the Histadrut for its regular budget and emergency purposes was 49 percent more in 1939 than in 1938, an increase of \$102,753.

Cost of fund raising of the National Labor Committee was 18 percent more in 1939 than in 1938. On the basis of \$288,934 collected in 1939 at an expense of \$70,675, the cost of fund raising was 24 percent.

The budget of \$1,000,000 for 1940 proposes an anticipated increased income for transmission to the Histadrut of 189 percent, and an increased cost of fund raising of 27 percent.

HISTADRUT HAOVDIN PALESTINE

History The Histadrut Haevdim was created by the Jewish Workers in Falestine in November 1920. Its dues-paying members consist of men and women workers. In addition, wives and children of workers are affiliated members.

The women workers are organized as the Council of Working Women (Nestert Hopealot).

Admini-The Conference of the General Federation of Jewish Labor is the highest stration legislative body of the General Federation of Jewish Labor. The ballots are secret and proportional and all members of the General Federation have the right to vote. The delegates to the Conference choose from among their members a Council, which is convened between Conferences when necessity demands. The Council, in turn, elects from among its members the Executive Counciltee, which is the highest body of the Federation.

Function

The program of the Histadrut for trade union activities includes

- 1. The securing of recognition of trade unions by the government, public institutions and private employers.
- 2. Establishment of fair and equitable relations between employers and workers.
- 3. Stabilization of labor conditions through the promotion of social legislation.

The practical benefits to the members are:

- 1. Labor Exchanges for securing employment.
- 2. Participation in Workers' Sick Fund (Kupat Holim).
- 3. Accident and unemployment insurance.

Funds for these activities are secured from membership dues, income from financial and economic undertakings, and payment of rent. (See Table I, following.)

The portion of the program of the Histadrut, supported mainly by American funds, provides for:

- 1. Agricultural labor colonization.
- 2. Immigration and employment
- 3. Labor homes, school buildings, Women's and Youth Centers.
- 4. Gultural and educational activities.
- 5. Day homes for children, health facilities, for participation in unsuployment, and other social service activities.
- 6. Defense and security
- 7. Sport training

8. Issuance of literature and bulletins giving information on conditions in Palestine and Histadrut activities.

Other organizations participate in financing the program supported by the Histadrut, including the Jewish Agency for Palestine, Jewish National Fund and the Falestine Foundation Fund, all receiving American support from the United Falestine Appeal. The Joint Distribution Committee contributes to Hechaluts for its training program of the Finneers, prospective immigrants to Falestine.

Finances Receipts and Disbursements, 1938, Organizational Purposes

History The Mational Labor Committee for Jewish Workers in Falestine was organized in 1922 by the United Mebrew Trades in New York City to raise funds for the Histadrut Maovdin" (General Federation of Jewish Labor in Falestine) for its program concerned with the creation of a labor commonwealth in Palestine.

Admini- The Mational Labor Committee is governed by a Council of 250 members. <u>stration</u> which meets quarterly, receives reports and determines policies; and an Administrative Committee of 25, made up of New York representatives, which acts as the executive committee of the organization.

Hembers of the Council of Administrative Committee are selected at the annual convention attended by representatives of affiliated groups (trade unions, fraternal and civic organizations).

Function

Funds raised by the Mational Labor Committee are used by the Histadrut for:

- 1. Training the Pioneer (Hechalutz) in Suropean countries and America, and proparing him for physical, economic and cultural life in Palestine.
- 2. Receiving and guiding the immigrant when he arrives in Palestine, providing his with suployment on farms and in industry, housing facilities and general aid for his physical and cultural welfare.
- 3. Invoctments in labor settlements, housing projects, port enterprises, road building and many cooperative undertakings.
- 4. Providing medical care for the immigrants in its hospitals, dispensaries and convalescent homes.
- 5. Cultural needs of adults, youth and children, through vocational schools, libraries, evening courses and elementary schools.
- 6. Providing physical training through sport organizations.

7. Attempting to cooperate with the Arab working masses.

Income Total income for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1939 was \$390,808. Seventy-five percent of the income was from contributions (of which \$52,488, or 18 percent, was from federations and welfare funds.)(The balance was from individuals, groups and labor organizations in unorganized communities.) One percent of the income (\$5,636) was a balance from the provious year. Collections by other organizations, transmitted through the Mational Labor Committee to the Histadrut, amounted to \$94,303, the remaining 24 percent of the income. (Money collected by other organizations included from the Pioneer Women's Organization and the Farband Women's Club \$61,113 for the regular budget of the Women's Council of the Histadrut, which carries a program for immigrant girls and women workers. The additional \$33,190 was contributed for #special emergency funds" by the Trade Union Division, Pioneer Women's Granizations, Poale Zion-Zeire Zion, Farband Women's Club, and the League for Labor Palestine, all organizations concerned with the program of the Histadrut.)

Disburse- Expenditures of \$286,263 left a balance of \$4,545 at the end of the year. ments Eighty-one percent of the money spent was transmitted to the Histadrut for its regular budget and for special purposes. Eighteen percent was for fund raising, while repayment of loans and equipment accounted for one percent.

There were increases from direct contributions from year to year to the National Labor Committee of \$30,288, or 16 percent, in 1938, and of \$73,922, or 34 percent, in 1939.

Money transmitted to Palestine for the regular budget of the Histadrut was \$47,819, or 31 percent, more in 1938 than in 1937, and \$91,849, or 45 percent more in 1939 than in 1938.

Budget The National Labor Conmittee adopted a minimum budget of \$1,000,000 for 1940. 1940 The budget estimate includes expenditures for fund raising of \$90,000, an increase over actual expenditures of 1939 of \$19,325, or 27 percent; and an increase for the Histadrut of \$595,761, or 189 percent. On the basis that 75 percent of the income in 1939 came from contributions, this budget presumes an income of \$446,821 from contributions in 1940, an increase of 52 percent over the contributions received in 1939

Comments 1. The National Labor Committee does not finance the program of the Histadrut for its trade union activities and its membership benefits. (See report, Histadrut.)

> 2. For training of pioneers in European and American countries and for emigration to Palestine, funds are also received from the Jewish Agency (which receives American support through the United Palestine Appeal) and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

3. There is no fiscal relationship between the National Labor Committee and the United Palestine Appeal. The Histadrut in Palestine cooperates both financially and functionally in phases of its colonization program with the Keren Hayesed (Palestine Foundation Fund) and the Keren Kayemeth (Jewish National Fund) and the Jewish Agency for Palestine. All three of these agencies receive support from American through the United Palestine Appeal.

My dear Rabbi Goldman:

I know that you will not object to constructive criticism, and therefore I do not hesitate to address this letter to you for I know it will be understood.

The present wave of sympathetic contributions which is engendered by the plight of the refugee can very well become a source of severe difficulty. You and I know that there are certain irresponsible organizations or persons in our community life today who are inclined to utilize this appeal in an untoward manner. This is an evil that we try to control, but when a responsible and honored organization addresses an appeal of that character in the midst of the preparations for a gigantic money-raising effort in which it indirectly participates, then the harm that is done is beyond calculation.

I have reference to the recent communication addressed to "Fellow Zionists" for voluntary contributions because of the sad plight of thousands of our co-religionists. You and I cannot disagree on the proposition that the American Jewish community has not yet begun to give, but apparently we are in disagreement as to the best method to bring about maximum results. For example, we in Omaha are in the midst of our preparations for a united campaign. It goes without saying that the United Jewish Appeal is a principal beneficiary. When Zionists receive the type of communication which the organization recently addressed to them, it very definitely interferes with the conduct of a united campaign. Asde from that, there are those of us who feel that it violates the spirit of the United Jewish Appeal. It may even give us cause to wonder if some of the leadership of the Joint Distribution Committee were not correct in their hesitation about the continuance of the United Jewish Appeal. In the last few days our office has received several telephone calls from workers and contributors. Their attitude is one of amazement as well as disgust.

I feel it is my duty to write this letter as much as I do not like it. I cannot help but feel that the continuation of such tactics will be harmful to the rebuilding of the National Jewish Homeland. The relatively few dollars that such an appeal can produce will hardly overbalance the reaction on many communities.

Frankly, I would appreciate receiving some word from you explaining the happening. As matters stand now, we have no intelligent way of answering the inquiries of our past and potential contributors.

I recognize that you are very occupied in your duties and ordinarily I would not be inclined to disturb you, but I do feel that the matter is of sufficient moment to justify your usual careful attention.

As one who is familiar with the work of the three ergenisations, you are naturally smare of the extraordinary presents on each. For the New York City campaign, on the representations of one group, to make preferential payments, is to undermine the very basis of the United Jewish Appeal. You and the other officers would open yourselves to a series and system of pressures that would be intelerable in the light of the heavy obligations you have already second for fund-raising.

May I make this formal request, that if any action along these lines is contemplated, there be a prior discussion of the problem?

My dear Mr. Montor:

I have just returned from my trip to New Orleans and Dallas. Both communities arranged very fine public meetings and I enjoyed my visit to them greatly. They are very well organized for the campaign and there is a marked enthusiasm. Both communities feel they will do substantially better than last year. I also spoke with a representative from Houston who happened to be in Dallas, suggesting a considerably higher quota for that community.

More than one individual in New Orleans and Dallas spoke to me about the poor showing of New York City in '39. I have had similar complaints from other communities. They do not know why the rest of the country should be asked for even more money than it raised last year, when it met its full requirement, while New York failed in '39, and gives every indication of doing even less this year. I spoke, this morning, to Rabbi Jonah Wise and Mr. Blitz about the situation in New York. I believe that the New York community ought to be made aware that it is facing a crisis in its giving, and that Draconian measures must be resorted to to make New York Jewry - the classes and the masses alike aware of the situation. National Headquarters of the UJA would do a better job if it devoted less time and thought to the communities outside of New York and devoted itself almost exclusively to the problem in New York City.

It would be advisable to have the lay-leadership of cities like St. Louis, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Cincinnati, etc. bear down upon New York and call for a show-down with the lay-leaders of that city. Mr. Loeb, of Chicago, had to do it years ago to shock New York Jews out of their damnable complacency and conceit, and I am persuaded that it needs to be done again. Perhaps an open letter signed by the leaders of a dozen welfare fund communities throughout the United States addressed to the Jewish community of New York City confronting it with its clear but unmet responsibility might help.

I am at a loss also to understand some of the organizational methods of Mr. Blitz. For weeks now, he has bothered me about giving Mr. Montor

him a date for Brooklyn. The date was set. I cleared my calendar for it. It was only yesterday that Mr. Blitz discovered that some other affair will be held in Brooklyn that evening, and that the meeting has to be postponed. This is also inept and amateurish.

When you return to New York, I would suggest that you and Mr. Coons spend the rest of your time on the New York situation. As things stand now, New York City will probably raise less than \$5,000,000 this year.

Dear Montor,

I received your note of the 27th ult., containing the memorandum of the Financial and Budgetary Situation during 1939 of the Joint Distribution Committee. What an interesting memorandum! I am sure our friend Dr. Landauer studied it with enthusiasm and gave you and other friends some hints how to read it. I will go into it, if I can, for my own enlightenment, will show it also to Dr. Resemblueth who till not derive less pleasure than I did from seeing this document. For the time being and before having studied the document properly, I want only to dott down some notes which are, of course, subject to correction.

The first page opens with the picture of \$10,527,094.- as the amount of approved appropriations for the programme of activities in 1939. This corresponds to what we used to call the Congress budget, but the sudgetary deficit of the Joint, stated to be during 1939 \$2,177,094 is apparently not the same as our deficits which are not budgetary deficits but real ones. If we would have to show for certain purposes large budgetary deficits, we should not find it difficult, because we could easily start from those budgetary estimates which are brought from our various departments and committees into the finance and budget commission and result in a budget, which subsequently is cut down to the bare minimum. Our mistake so far an policy vis a vis the Joint is concerned, is that we publish this minimum budget as our starting point, whilst the appropriations of the Joint contain figures which are not cut down to the bone as ours.

One of the most starting disclosures of the memorandum is contained on page 2 in the third paragraph, indicating that the Joint has not paid to the Coordinating Foundation for Refugees \$800,000 as received from the 1939 collections of the United Jewish Appeal through the decision of the Allocations Committee, but only \$160,000; the balance of \$640,000 to be paid to the Coordinating Foundation over a period of years at the rate of \$40,000 annually (exhibit %**). That means that the Joint claimed these \$800,000 which otherwise may have been distributed between Joint and United Palestine Appeal, for an earmarked purpose, but has not to pay them immediately, but can make use of the balance for its purpose; in other words, interposing the Coordinating Foundation, the Joint has received a load from the United Jewish Appead 1939, and I should not be surprised if this loan is one which is not burdened with a difficult debt service. Part of this amount would have relieved the U. P. A., i.e. Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth from the necessity to borrow money under Severe conditions for pressing expenditure.

At the bottom of page 2 and on top of page 3 of the memorandum you find that the Warsaw office of the Joint has borrowed \$638,000 from whatever source was available. You will note further on, on page 6 under paragraph 4 that the Joint borrowed from affiliated organizations overseas \$343,300, and under 111 A 1 that the Joint has an obligation of \$200,000 to meet advances secured in Poland from private sources and groups which are liable to call for reimbursement at any time.

It is somewhat difficult to adjust these three figures without further explanation but anyhow 16 seems clear that the Warsaw office borrowed money from private people who will receive payment in dollar from the Joint. These private people will be fortunate enough if they have escaped from Poland to have effected in this way a private transfer. It is a pity that the Joint had always refused to come to an agreement with the Keren Hayesod in Poland, as the K.H. and the Keren Kayemeth have, of course, lost enormous sums in Poland, because they were unable to transfer their collections. insisted that they must send dollars to Warsaw and not use the funds of the Keren Eayesod and that the Joint isself cannot take part in negotiations with the Polish Government about clearing arrangements which would secure the transfer of the Palestine Funds. And in the end it seems that again not public funds benefited from the clearing and transfer effected through the Warsaw Joint, but private people. These private people are of course more fortunate.

On Page 3 under B 1 I note the amount of \$2,235,000 for clearance arrangements. It is a pity that no more details are given for this amount. You know from my previous correspondence how much I am interested just in these figures.

On Page 4 (7) you note the figure of \$160,000 described as first instalment of Subscription to Coordinating Foundation for Refugees and headed "Special Wartime Grant". Was it a grant of the Joint or of the United Jewish Appeal?

The figure of \$12,500 for the Hebrew University Jerusalem, \$16,667 for the ITA, \$50,000 for research surveys of settlement projects, \$100,000 for functional service, education and campaign stimulation and \$383, 927 for administration charges (without any details!) are quite interesting.

But more interesting is under C the figure of \$517,880 as surplus, accumulated over a period of years, representing excess of income over expenditure from 1933 to 1938. How often has this figure been challenged or dug out? It is in fact a hidden reserve. The United Palestine Appeal or the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth were never in the fortunate position to accumulate such hidden reserves, burdened as we are by deficits and commitments and obligations, arising not from responsibilities in the future but from services rendered in the past.

On the same page (5) too, you find a small working fund of \$620,000 which has also been accumulated over a period of years, a second reserve, showing that the Joint was able in fact to accumulate a reserve of \$1,137,880, proving in fact that the Joint is a better business organization than we are, as we have never been able to put even the smallest amount on reserve for emergencies.

On Fage 7 we find under 111 A b that the amount of \$100,000 will have to be paid to the Coordinating Foundation during the early months of 1940 for the 1939 appropriation. I do not understand it. Means that, that even of the \$160,000 which, as said above were "granted" to the Coordinating Foundation, only \$60,000 were paid and \$100,000 left for 1940?

That 111 A 3 manual enumerates as one of the pressing needs of the Joint, "to reinstate the working fund of \$620,000" is not surprising. Perhaps the U.P.A. would not declare the necessity also to instate such a working fund for Palestine purposes?

Quite unexplained remains the figure of \$126,941 under 111 A 4 to meet other requirements on account of 1939 programme. What may these other requirements be?

Dear Dr. Silver:

I have your letter of April 5th describing the meetings you had in New Orleans and Dallas. Your experience bears out the gratifying response that has been evident in the greater number of communities. I am glad that your letter invites certain comments on campaign problems.

First, as to myself and my visits to a number of the major communities this year, particularly in the West. I have gone there for the UJA campaign, of course. But I had another objective also. I was to establish contact on a friendly basis with the leaders in these communities. I wanted to see what the sentiment was and might be toward the United Palestine Appeal. I found a number of things: first, that if we had to depend on organized Zionist districts, we would be totally lost virtually everywhere; secondly, that the leaders of these communities are not at all hostile to Palestine and are prepared to give generous support - if only we could eliminate some of the Zionist leadership whose calibre is confused with the importance of Palestine. If I say so myself, I think I have created a number of important friendships which will be valuable to the UPA for the future. As Executive Director of the UPA (if that job is to continue for any length of time, an uncertain quantity in a movement as volatile as the Zionist) my usefulness to the organization has been greatly enhanced during this year's activities. I have made many personal friends and registered certain impressions. Campaigning and allocations are very largely built on social pressure and personal relationships as well as merit of causes.

Now, as to the New York campaign. Blitz is the director of it. I personally believe he has the most fantastic conception of his relationship to the United Palestine Appeal. For all practical purposes he has none whatever. He does not at any time act in the UJA as if he were linked in the slightest to the UPA. When questions arise involving UPA prestige, interests, etc., all he does is refer his Co-Director, Mr. Bernstein, to me - since I(in contradistinction to Blitz) am supposed to understand and interpret UPA policy.

I think I can be helpful in the New York campaign. I certainly want to be. It's preferable to traveling long distances for usually idle meetings. But all I can do is tell Warburg I want to help; and tell Blitz the same. I can't hang on their doorsteps all day long.

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Executive Director Henry Montor In San Francisco I addressed the 25 most influential men in the community - and they seemed to find it helpful to the campaign. In Los Angeles, I addressed the three biggest big gift luncheon meetings they have had, and it seemed to be satisfactory. Money was raised at all these luncheons. I cite this merely to indicate that helpfulness to a campaign is not beyond my scope. But as long as Blitz and Warburg act with the same secretiveness for which Willen was blamed last year, there is nothing that anybody can do. Perhaps Blitz resents me and my possible interference with him. I wouldn't care much about his feelings in the matter. But there are certain organizational forms. In the same way as Goldhamer would resist and resent my coming to Cleveland without being invited. Blitz has the legal right not to invite my help in the campaign. It's all very silly and technical, I know. But I am not standing on my pride. I merely want to be given directions.

New York is bad and will continue to be bad while it is under the domination of Federation leadership. Direct or indirect that leadership is functioning. It consists of not doing too much to make the community aware of the campaign.

I do hope that when you get here on April 17th I shall have a full opportunity to discuss this problem with you. I might add that Coons is in the same position with respect to the New York campaign as I am.

MEMORANDUM

I believe that it will be of interest to you to see the attached copy of a letter that has been issued by the National Refugee Service in regard to the German-Jewish Children's Aid, Inc.

Apparently the NRS considers the German-Jewish Children's Aid, Inc. as part of its functions, but separates it for 1940 because it does not believe that adequate funds for the purpose will be forthcoming.

The German Jewish Children's Aid, Inc. has, for a number of years, brought into this country (under the immigration quota) in monthly groups, children from Germany, and now has a large number of applications from Austria, Bohemia and Moravia. The total number of children who have already come to the United States through the German Jewish Children's Aid, is 464. On account of the situation abroad, there is today a resumption - on a larger scale than heretofore - of the immigration of these children. Reports reaching us from Germany and Central Europe indicate that Jewish parents who were most reluctant to let their children leave them, are today anxious to send even children of tender years to us. The problem, therefore, becomes more significant today than before.

As a result of this development, conferences have taken place between the National Refugee Service, Inc. and the National Council of Jewish Women in order to provide effective methods of meeting this situation. The Council was requested two years ago, by the then National Coordinating Committee, to concern itself with the finding of funds adequate to provide for the needs of these children in this country, and to furnish the essential services for the national offices of the German Jewish Children's Aid, Inc. The Council has, therefore, in the last few years, succeeded in raising through its local sections and by cooperation with the welfare funds (where these undertook responsibility for maintenance) the requisite amounts, both for the care of children in the communities in which they are placed, and, also, for the office and general administrative services of the German Jewish Children's Aid in New York.

Through these discussions, there has been every desire to take into account conditions in the respective communities, with a view to avoiding in every degree, any elements of friction with local welfare funds or campaigns.

Late in 1939, the National Refugee Service, Inc. desirous, in the general interest of the whole American Jewish community, to effect a closer centralization of this work within the whole general structure of the emergency refugree program, studied the problem with a view to effectuating two steps:

- 1) To supervise the general administration of the national office of the German Jewish Children's Aid, Inc.
- 2) To finance the general operating charges of the German Jewish Children's Aid, Inc.

C O P Y The first step has proceeded quite successfully, and there is, today, a very close community of interest and collaboration between the office of the German-Jewish Children's Aid, Inc. and the National Refugee Service, Inc., the latter body exercising a general supervisory relationship.

As to the financing of the German-Jewish Children's Aid program during the year 1940, it was intended, if the income and resources of the National Refugee Service, Inc. this year warranted such a step, for the National Refugee Service, Inc. to include financial provision for the German-Jewish Children's Aid program. An analysis of the current financial situation of National Refugee Service, Inc., however, the rising costs due to the cumulative nature of the work of National Refugee Service, Inc., in so many other essential fields - relief, resettlement, employment, migration, etc. - makes clear that the National Refugee Service cannot (in the immediate future) assume the financial responsibility for German-Jewish Children's Aid, Inc. during 1940. In these circumstances, National Refugee Service, Inc. again looks to the National Council of Jewish Women, which has generously agreed to finance this program, to continue to secure the funds requisite for the national office administrative and service charges of the German-Jewish Children's Aid, Inc., in addition to the commitments which local sections have made to take care of children in local communities for the balance of this year.

It is understood that the local sections of the National Council of Jewish Women, in seeking these funds, shall in all instances bear in mind the viewpoint and practice in the respective communities, and shall adapt their procedure to the requirements of the local welfare funds and campaigns this year.

National Refugee Service, Inc. contemplates, should its income and resources prove adequate in 1941, to include the entire program of the German-Jewish Children's Aid, Inc. so far as national office administration, services, supervision and finances are concerned.

At 10:30 o'clock this morning there was a meeting at the office of Dr. Solomon Lowenstein at the New York Federation building, to discuss the three representatives who are to represent Welfare Fund communities on the Distribution Committee of the United Jewish Appeal.

Present were Sidney Hollander and Harry L. Lurie for the Council of Federations; Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, Paul Baerwald, Dr. Joseph Schwartz, and Joseph C. Hyman for the Joint Distribution Committee; Louis Lipsky and myself for the United Palestine Appeal.

I. WELFARE FUND REPRESENTATIVES ON DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE

The names were read of the twenty people whom the Council had suggested in connection with the three posts on the Distribution Committee. As each name was read either the JDC or the UPA representatives, or the Council representatives, made observations as to their availability or usefulness on the Distribution Committee.

The three names which the Council preferred comprised Jacob Blaustein of Baltimore, William Shroder of Cincinnati, and Ira Younker of New York.

On Blaustein there seemed to be no special objection.

On Shroder I submitted that he might not be acceptable to the UPA. Lowenstein assumed that this was because of the attitude that Shroder had taken toward the visit to the United States of Dr. Chaim Weizmann. Hollander and Lurie urged Lipsky and myself to reconsider the question of Shroder, first, because of his general objectivity in discussing problems of Jewish life, secondly, because of the prestige which he would bring to the Distribution Committee and, thirdly, because of his knowledge of budgeting processes. Mr. Lipsky indicated that the name would be considered by the UPA.

Weinman

The JDC took the position that Ira Younker was not acceptable to it.

Irvin Bettman was not acceptable to the JDC; Lessing Rosenwald and Morris Wolf were not acceptable to the UPA. Frank Weil and Fred Greenman of New York City were suggested by Dr. Lowenstein but it seemed to be felt that they were not sufficiently informed of Jewish organizational life. Elias Mayer and Richard Frank of Chicago were turned down by the UPA.

After these various names had been weeded out, the following six were considered for acceptance, the decision as to the three best names to be left to the JDC and UPA:

- X1. William Shroder, Cincinnati
 2. Judge Jacob J. Kaplan, Boston
 3. Robert Koshland, San Francisco =
 4. Jacob Blaustein, Baltimore
 X5. Edwin J. Schanfarber, Columbus
 - 6. Judge Philip Forman, Trenton

After the JDC and UPA will have made their decision as to the three individuals whom they like best, the Council, through Sidney Hollander, will undertake to ask each of the men whether he has the time or the inclination to serve on the Distribution Committee. If any one of the first three is not available, then the Council will ask one of the next three in the order indicated until the three posts are filled.

You will recall that at the last meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Palestine Appeal on April 17th, it was voted that you, Dr. Wise, and Louis Lipsky were to constitute a committee of three to select the Welfare Fund representatives on the Distribution Committee. Inasmuch as it is not likely that a meeting of the three can be arranged conveniently, will you be good enough to indicate by wire or letter whether you approve or disapprove any or all of the names that have been suggested, or whether you approve of the list of six in the order indicated.

1. My own previous opinion of Shroder has been that normally he has an objective, impartial mind. It is true, of course, that his associations throughout his lifetime have not been with the Palestine group. It is also true that he did not believe that Dr. Weizmann's visit to the United States at this time would be helpful. Whether it is advisable to give him the benefit of the doubt is for a concensus of opinion to determine. Undoubtedly he has more information on Jewish conditions generally than most of the others and might, from that point of view, be acceptable.

2. JudgeKaplan is a name approved by both the JDC and UPA. You will recall him for his participation in a series of UPA conferences and for his sponsorship of the New England UPA conference on April 14th. He would seem to me to be a very excellent choice from the point of the UPA.

3. Robert Koshland is a member of probably the most outstanding family on the West Coast. A man of 42, he is sufficiently well-to-do to be able to devote time to any project with which he affiliates himself. He has, of course, been associated with the JDC point of view, but in view of the failure over a number of years of the Zionist movement to attract many of the leading and wealthier members of the community, that observation might be made of most of the candidates for posts on the Distribution Committee. I have had occasion to be with Koshland frequently and feel that he might be inclined to be fair. You might be interested to know that his mother was to have been, and perhaps will be, the host to Dr. Weizmann when the latter goes to the **Pacific Coast**.

4. Jacob Blaustein has been active in the Jewish community of Baltimore, has been one of the largest contributors and is probably one of the wealthiest men on the East Coast. He is Chairman of the Executive Committee of the JTA. I think that he would try to be impartial.

5. Edwin Schanfarber has been the head of campaigns in Columbus for the past ten or fifteen years. He is actively associated with the Bnai Brith. He has a penetrating mind which can be fair when it wishes.

6. Judge Philip Forman is on the Federal Bench at Trenton, N.J. He has a fine orthodox Jewish upbringing. At the present time, he is an Honorary Vice-Chairman of both the UPA and JDC. JDC leaders have endeavored to cultivate him. I have a feeling that his judicial temperment is his prized possession.

II. RESEARCH DIRECTOR OF DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE

Mr. Hollander then stated that it would be advisable to begin thinking of a person who would act as the director or researcher of the Distribution Committee. The qualifications suggested included a knowledge of economy, some understanding of Jewish problems, an affable personality and a fairness of approach. It was generally agreed that Moses P. Levitt, formerly of the Palestine Economic Corporation, had these qualifications. However, he is no longer available inasmuch as he has already replaced Dr. Joseph Schwartz as Executive Secretary of the JDC, who is going to Europe as assistant to Morris Troper for the duration of the war.

In order to test the reaction of the others present, I submitted the name of Emanuel Neumann but Mr. Hyman felt that although Mr. Neumann had a brilliant mind he might be considered too biased.

Other names mentioned included Louis Bean of the Agriculture Department, Paul Gourrich, Marcus Nadler and David Popper, now associated with the Foreign Policy Association. There seemed to be ho particular conviction as to the merits of any of these except that Mr. Baerwald seemed to feel that Marcus Nadler might be the best man. I suggested Harry Lurie, but the latter said this was impossible.

It was then agreed that Harry Lurie, Joseph Hyman and myself would constitute a committee of three to weed out names and submit recommendations for the director of the Distribution Committee.

I would, therefore, appreciate your observations on:

A. Your choice with respect to the first three of the six names suggested for the Welfare Fund representatives on the Distribution Committee, and B. Any nominations that you would like to make for the post of Research Director of the Distribution Committee.



Dr. A. H. Silver Campaign Opening- 5/2

Digest - Indianapolis, Indiana

The 1940 campaign of the Jewish Welfare Fund of Indianapolis will be officially launched on May 2nd at a community and workers rally. Solicitation of funds will begin the following day and continue through the 10th.

The United Jewish Appeal has made formal application for an allotment of \$125,000 in the budget of the Welfare Fund.

No formal goal has been adopted as yet. After his conference with leaders in March, Mr. Coons reported that Louis J. Borinstein, who has again accepted the campaign chairmanship, believes that if the big givers contribute one-third more, individually, than they did last year, and the rank and file contributors one-half more, this year, then the Welfare Fund will be able to provide the UJA with a possible 15% increase over '39.

For the first time, the local Jewish Center has been included in the Fund's budget for about \$13,000. This year, also, because of the larger number of refugees being serviced in Indianapolis, the budget will have to provide \$15,000 for this work, which represents a substantial increase over '39. Leaders doubt whether these new sums can be raised over and above the \$125,000 of last year, but they are agreed that the UJA should not receive less than \$90,000 (last year \$80,000) - Mr.Coons' feeling is that \$95,000 should be satisfactory. He points out that a difficult factor is that one or two big givers, who are willing to contribute generously, are withholding because others do not support their standard. For instance, G. A. Efroymson gave \$12,000 last year, but if he could get some more people to join him in his own feeling as to the responsibility of the wealthier people, it is possible he would give up to \$25,000. (Louis Wolf also contributed \$12,000 last year).

Field representative Klatch reported recently that several large gifts already obtained indiciate an approximate 35% increase over last year. Among these are the following:

The outlook for a successful campaign is good, Mr.Klatch states, but he doubts whether the UJA'siallotment will be substantially increased because of the large increase for local refugee work and the substantial amount for the Jewish Center.

Joseph C. Hyman addressed a big gifts meeting on April 16th; he too advised that increases averaged about 35%.



There was a meeting on Wednesday afternoon, April 24, to discuss the appointment of the Research Director of the Distribution Committee of the United Jewish Appeal. The meeting was held in the office of Joseph C. Hyman of the Joint Distribution Committee. Mr. Hyman, Harry L. Lurie of the Council of Federations, and I constituted a committee of three which is supposed to be canvassing names. Also present were Moses Leavitt and Joseph J. Schwartz. Leavitt is the new secretary of the Joint Distribution Committee, vice Schwartz, who is going to Europe next week.

I had previously told Harry Lurie by 'phone, and confirmed with Hyman the rejection of William Shroder for one of the three positions on the Distribution Committee to represent welfare funds. Mr. Hyman informed me that Judge Kaplan of Boston, and Edwin Schanfarber of Columbus had been ruled out by the Joint Distribution Committee.

It was then decided that Mr. Hyman and I should keep in touch with each other to suggest names that the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal would offer to each other for consideration.

The following is a list of names of those considered for the post of Director of Research, or for assistant, in the event that one of the executive directors of the Welfare Funds might be selected to supervise the work, having at his disposal a well-known and competent economist:

Dear Dr. Silver:

Do you not think that it is time for a meeting of the Executive Committee of the UJA at which there could be a thorough-going discussion of some of the major problems that have arisen for the UJA up to this time? If it would be possible for you to stay over on May 9th, perhaps that might be a convenient day for you for such a meeting.

I believe that it is particularly important that there be a clarification of the status and the progress of the UJA before the arrival in this country of Dr. Chaim Weizmann. It is imperative, it seems to me, that a record be made of the fact that whatever reverses the UJA has suffered will have been inflicted long before Dr. Weizmann came to America, so that his being here and the purpose of his being here may not be used as a pretext to explain the results of the 1940 United Jewish Appeal campaign.

It is rather remarkable that New York and Chicago, which have more than their justifiable share of anti-Zionists, should be the ones to give the largest headache to the UJA, even though so substantial a part of the money goes to the JDC.

If you think the May 9th date, or some other more convenient date, should be used for a meeting of the Executive Committee of the UJA, will you notify me accordingly so that I may make arrangements with the other agencies.

> You will be interested in a copy of a letter received from Dr. Mordecai Ezekiel suggesting candidates for the study project. Each of the three candidates mentioned has unusual standing and ability in economic research work. I returned to Dr. Ezekiel the full information that he sent me on Dr. Alexander Gutfeld, since apparently this man is not yet in the U.S. His record and his references were excellent and he may be a suitable person as an assistant in the project, should he come to this country. You may know Dr. Gutfeld because of his recent connection with the Hilfsverein der Juden in Deutschland, for whom he engaged in research work of a similar character to what we have in mind.

I am also writing to Dr. David Weintraub who has had considemable experience in research on relief projects for the FERA. After some inquiry, I have the following people to suggest for the job you mention:

1. Dr. Lewis Lorwin, The Marlyn Apartments, Washington, D. C.

Dr. Lorwin is an economist of many years standing at Brookings Institution, and was for several years American representative with the International Labor Office. He has recently returned to this country, and at the moment is making a short-time study of the American Council of Education. "Who's Who" has a full statement of his experience and writings.

2. Maurice Leven, Brookings Institutions.

Dr. Leven has done statistical work for many years and was at one time associated with the National Bureau of Economic Research in their work. He would prefer to find work here in Washington, but was interested to hear of this job and asked me to mention his name as one of those who might be a possible candidate. The people at the National Bureau of Economic Research can tell you of his work, or if you wish, I can send you a statement of his training and experience.

3. Dr. Aeron Direktor, Brookings Institution.

Dr. Direktor is a younger man, having taught statistics some years ago at Wisconsin, I believe, and having been on the staff of the University of Chicago. More recently he has done research work for Brookings and the Republican National Committee. I can obtain a statement of his training and experience for you if you wish.

4. Dr. Joseph M. Gillman, Railroad Retirement Board, Wash. D.C.

I believe you know Dr. Gillman and have some idea of his training and experience. He now has a permanent job in the government service and would be rather reluctant to leave it for merely a one-year assignment.

One other person who might be a good possibility is Dr. Alexander Gutfeld, whom I last heard of in Berlin a year and a half ago. Enclosed I am sending a statement of his training and experience. I do not know whether he has yet been able to leave Germany, but it would appear that the work he has done and his previous training would fit him for the job you have in mind. You will note his physical handicap, but apparently he is able to carry on his work quite effectively. If you are not interested in him, please return this statement to me. It may be that I would hear of something else for which he might be suited.

I believe that Dr. Lorwin would be very much interested in the work and would be in position to begin on relatively short notice. Dr. Direktor and Dr. Leven are somewhat less free, and apparently Dr. Gillman would be lease inclined to consider the job.

Dear Mr. Lamport:

This morning I received a copy of a letter dated April 25th from Mr. Leidesdorf and addressed to the United Jewish Appeal. I assume that the quotation of the letter from Mr. Blitz and the arrangement as indicated in the letter are both accurate. It would, therefore, seem to me that we should issue instructions that the amount from the 1939 Campaign proceeds should be considered in any allocations and that this arrangement should be instituted immediately.

As you undoubtedly recall, I have registered my formal dissent from the interpretation which Mr. Montor has placed on the terms of the decision for the 1939 allocation, which interpretation resulted in the 2/3-1/3 formula. I have tried to check up my own interpretation with the intent of the allocators with whom I have been able to discuss the matter and I find that my interpretation is in line with their own intent.

I, therefore, suggest that we jointly address a letter, either to the Allocations Committee as a whole or to Mr. Kirstein as chairman, and ask him to reconvene the group in order that there may be a further clarification. Will you join with me in this request?

I should like to take the matter up promptly because I understand that Mr. Ittleson is back in the city and Mr. Lasker, I was told yesterday, either is in the city at this time or will be here shortly.

In enswer to the two points raised in your letter of April 26th;

(1) By understanding is that Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver and Probi Jonah B. Wise have had placed before them the disposition of the item involving the income to the United Palestine Appeal from Fight of Stars, Inc. In accordance with the agreement constituting the United Jewish Appeal, final decision with respect to this item will be made by the two maticnal chairmen of the United Jewish Appeal. Under the circumstances, therefore, we can only await their action in this matter and the communication of their decision to us as Treasurers.

May I point out that several conversations we had dome months ago definitely established the nature of the decisions of the Allocations Committee with respect to the distribution of funds and that this agreement between us was reflected in the final equalization of payments on the basis of the two-thirds one-third decision of the Allocations Committee.

(2) It seems to me that the decision of the Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal requires no interpretation for its terms are clear. It was not my understanding that the action of the Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal for 1939 was tentative. I do not see, therefore, what purpose can be served by a further meeting of the Allocations Committee which disposed with definitiveness of all eventualities.

My dear Mr. Montor:

I agree with you that a meeting of the Ex-cutive of the UJA should be hold on May 9, and I would agree to stay over for that day provided that I were assured that the actual leaders of the UJA and not the office people would attend this meeting. If Mr. Baerwald is prepared to bring in the leaders of the JDC to this meeting, the meeting will be worthwhile. Otherwise I would rather not waste another day in New York because, as you undoubtedly know, next week is the week of our Cleveland Campaign and I am greatly needed here.

I don't think that you need be worried about the effects of the possible result of the campaign on Dr. Weizmann's visit. He cannot be held responsible either for the failure or the success of the campaigns.

I sent you a copy of the letter which I addressed to Governor Lehman. I think it would be well to circulate that letter among four or five of the important people in New York.

I have not heard from Jonah Wise with reference either to the Night of Stars or to the situation in Chicago.

I believe that the President of the ZOA, who lives in Chicago, ought to be apprised of the miserable collapse of the Campaign in Chicago and consulted as to what ought to be done about it. It would not be amiss, in my judgment, to have the situation aired in public in Chicago. Theseity also should be reminded that it welshed on a whole year's campaign two years ago. This is also a good opportunity to crack the crass impertinence of Mr. Goldsmith who seems to monopolize the whole situation in Chicago. He is another Henry Montor
