UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL

In the coming year there will be no United Jewish Appeal. No decision of like importance has been made by organized Zionism in America since the inception of the United Palestine Appeal itself. The implications and the overtones are many. In these crucial days supporters of Palestine will be called upon to indicate in terms of money and effort that they value Palestine as the Great Outpost of Jewish life. We will be asked to view Palestine not only as a place of refuge for our stricken brethren but as an instrument of Rebirth for them as well as for ourselves. We have been termed an emotional people. Yet our decisions in this case must be dictated by logic and by the ultimate values accruing to the Jewish people. We shall be asked to consider the contributions already made and the potentialities of modern Palestine in relation to bare philanthropies. Shall we pursue the path of statesmanship or will we be led by those who follow the outworn patterns of Jewish Escapism.

The National Administrative Committee of the Zionist Organization of America on January 5, endorsed the action of the United Palestine Appeal to make a separate campaign for \$12,000,000. America today is the chief support of the Yishuv in Palestine. Thousands of Jews are still coming into Palestine and regardless of present war conditions, these immigrants are welcomed with open arms. In Palestine much larger numbers are cared for and are being absorbed into a country which is at war and which is at the same time building up successfully a new economy and a new life.

This year the United Jewish Appeal paid to the U.P.A. the sum of \$2,900,000. From June own fund in Detroit it is estimated that \$83,000 will have been sent to Palestine. It will readily be seen that these figures are far short of the goal set by the United Palestine Appeal for the coming year. We shall therefore need the earnest help of all our friends in the days to come. It is hoped and prayed for on all sides that some way may be found to continue the United Jewish Campaign in Detroit. Increased aid to Palestine is essential, yet Zionists are the last ones to minimize the needs of other Jewish causes. If for ideological or other reasons we shall insist that Palestine be given priority, we must also share in the solution of other vital Jewish problems. The real answer is in greatly increased benefactions from those who are well able to shoulder the burden. It may be said without fear of contradiction that a very, very small percentage of well-to-do Jews have done their duty in the present crisis.

WAR

The Battle of Britain still holds the center of the stage. If England will hold out, is the anxious thought of everyone. American help must not be too late. While the scene of action has shifted to the Mediterranean, the great struggle over the English Channel is still the key to the whole future of civilization. And yet, the continued defeats of Italy have greatly altered the situation. A powerful yet, the continued defeats of Italy have greatly altered the situation. Now Italy would certainly swing every Mediterranean country into the Axis orbit. Now the Balkan countries have no fear of Italy, and for the time being, a stiffened attitude has resulted.

Over 6000 Jewish boys from Palestine are fighting in the British army and are giving a good account of themselves. These Jewish soldiers have been welcomed heartily into the armies in Libya and in Greece. This source of man power and the resources and skill of the Yishuv have been placed at the disposal of the English military authorities. The people of Palestine welcome the opportunity to share in this Pattle for Civilization. It is well to bear in mind that Palestine, situated as it is, between Egypt and Syria, is a strong outpost, and is doing a great deal more than its share in the present war.

Twenty-belong to thousand girls have received agricultural training in W.I.Z.O. in Tel Aviv during the past two decades. The domestic science school of W.I.Z.O. in Tel Aviv has become famous. Cooking and dressmaking classes are conducted in various towns and villages. One of W.I.Z.O. most important activities is the organization of kitchens in the Kvutzoth. In fact, the W.I.Z.O. conducts regular good housekeeping campaigns throughout Palestine. The yearly budget of W.I.Z.O. now reaches \$500,000.

It would be impossible in a few words to describe the work of the Histadruth and the significance of the great labor movement in Palestine. This great Organization of Labor is a significant example of Jewish creativeness, and its importance to all of Jewish life cannot be overestimated. As general Zionists we must reserve the privilege of criticising some of the policies and activities of the dominant party in Palestine. Yet every Zionist is in sympathy with the movement to rebuild our ancient Homeland on a basis of social justice, without sweatshops, and in a manner reminiscent of the aims of our great prophets

GENERAL CONDITIONS

The general position in Palestine is not deteriorating, in fact, it has improved recently. It is reported by the Jewish Agency that the surplus of the

Palestine Government at the end of September 1940, amounted to £4,059,530. In September alone there was a Government surplus of £388,000. There was a net profit on postal services of £201,144 in 1939.

The Palestine Government has announced that it will grant loans of ten to fifteen thousand pounds to the growing fishing industry. These loans are to be granted to both Jewish and Arab fisherman. An expert on fishing has been sent from Europe in order to help the growth of this important industry.

The budget for the city of Tel Aviv has been set at £531,000. This budget is only a little more than the total income of the city government.

Since 1936, 90,000 Jews have found a haven in the Jewish National Home. Approximately 10,000 of these have reached the country in 1940. Since 1934, 6000 boys and girls have been brought into Eretz Israel by the Youth Aliyah. Of these 2500 are now self-supporting.

At the present time over 25,000 people are living in the Kvutsoth and Kibbutzim.

During the coming year the Jewish Agency will spend almost £90,000 on the construction of new buildings to house refugees. At the present time thousands of these people are living in tents.

A great fashion show was recently opened in Tel Aviv. Representatives from leading firms were present from Egypt, Syria and Irak. Palestine is rapidly becoming the style center of the whole Near East.

CULTURAL LIFE IN PALESTINE

The people of Palestine like the Jews of America continue their normal way of living. In Jerusalem a new moving picture house is being constructed at a cost of £20,000. The Palestine Symphony Orchestra recently gave a first performance of Ernest Bloch's "Avodath Hakodesh." This is the musical composition which the Conference of American Rabbis commissioned the composer to write. The city of Tel Aviv awarded the annual Bialik Prize to the writers of Hebrew poetry and literature. This year the prize was presented to Saul Tschernichowsky, the foremost living Hebrew poet. He is one of the governors of the Hebrew University. Mr. Tschernichowsky has translated some of the world's greatest literature into Hebrew including some of our own American classics, such as, Longfellow's Evangeline and Hiawatha.

Due to the beneficence of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Palestine now boasts of a fine Archaeological Museum. Recently a new wing was opened to house some of the recently discovered Palestinian iron objects, some actual specimens of copper ore from King Solomon's copper mine, a stone crib from Solomon's stables in Megiddo, and the famous so-called Lachish Letters.

ARAB - JEWISH COOPERATION

The movement toward Arab-Jewish cooperation continues. Recently a third conference was held between Arabs and Jews in connection with the citrus industry. The planters have elected a delegation to represent them before the Government. At the meetings of these delegates the greatest cordiality exists. Speeches are delivered both in Hebrew and Arabic, depending upon the nationality of the speakers. In each case the addresses are immediately translated into the other language. Following the example set by the Jewish growers, the Arabs are now beginning to establish cooperative societies. Resolutions were passed by the Arab growers calling for the establishment in Arabian villages of cooperative societies modeled on those in the Jewish colonies.

KEREN HAYESOD IN ENGLAND

Despite the ordeal through which the English people are passing, the Zionists of England have launched a Keren Hayesod campaign. Messages of encouragement on the opening of the campaign have come from leading Palestine Jews. The launching of a Keren Hayesod campaign under present conditions has been heralded as an act of faith and confidence in the Jewish National Home and in the ultimate victory of democracy.

LOCAL NEWS

On Tuesday evening February 18, there will be a meeting of the Zionist Organization at Congregation Shaarey Zedek. A discussion on the need of revitalizing Zionist work in this community is the planned program for the evening. A paper will be read by Philmore Leemon, one of the younger members of the Organization, which will be provocative and will surely encourage wide discussion. Mr. Philip Slomovitz and Mrs. Max Frank will comment on the paper. On Tuesday evening March 18,

Rabbi Israel Efros will address a meeting of the Zionist Organization. His subject will deal with the 800th anniversary of the death of Yehudah Halevi. Further details will be announced in a later Bulletin.

CONCLUSION

Each day the tragedy of Jewish life deepens. Since the issuance of the last Bulletin Rumanian Jewry has suffered new brutalities and indignities. There remain two great free Jewish communities, America and Palestine. The fight against Hitler is as much a struggle for the future welfare of American Jewry as it is for the Yishuv. Great responsibilities rest upon us here. We must give generously of our substance and we must think right on the Jewish problem lest we all be destroyed. In Poland, the Nazi overlords have decreed an arm-band to be worn by all Jews. They would thus put a badge of shame upon our people. But they failed miserably -- our people in Poland have been put to the test and not found wanting.

But in another sense a new Padge of Shame may be awaiting us. If our fellow-Jews here in America do not respond adequately in this crisis, despite repeated warnings and pleadings -- then a real Badge of Shame, affixed unto ourselves, by ourselves, will be our lot. Palestine has shown the way out. Will our people by ourselves, will be our lot. Palestine has shown the way out. Will our people respond with pennies, will they continue to put their trust in disproven and out-moded ideas, will they follow a bankrupt leadership based upon Jewish negation?-- or will they begin the trek toward physical and spiritual rehabilitation? If not, then Fitler will most surely have succeeded in stigmatizing our race.

European Jewry is going through its ordeal with chins up. In the Yishuv Jews only ask to do their share in this war. Here in America Jews are asked only for money. Let any Jew who says, "what's the use" understand how he degrades himself and his people. America must be the arsenal for democracy pleads President Roosevelt. Will American Jewry likewise be an arsenal of Jewish Hope and Assistance?
