Dear Dr. Silver:

I send you herewith a tentative draft of the agreement between the JDC and the UPA for the 1941 UJA as of Thursday, March 27th.

Two items are still outstanding for discussion:

A. The question of how the expenses incurred by the agencies before the UJA was reconstituted shall be made.

We have taken the position that the UPA as well as the other agencies launched independent campaigns in good faith, and the expenditures they incurred were expenditures that normally would have been undertaken by the UJA itself. Moreover, these expenditures accrued to the benefit of the united campaign. Accordingly, the UJA should reimburse the agencies for the expenses, whatever they are.

The JDC people have been taking the view that the UJA should not bear the expenses but that they should be pooled and each agency receive a portion in direct ratio to its share in the UJA. On this issue, as on all the other issues raised, Judge Rothenberg has really been splendid in his firmness and thoroughness.

B. Linder still insists that the National Refugee
Service shall have the right to have representatives present when
the Allotment Committee meets without, however, having the power
to vote. Judge Rothenberg has taken the position that the Allotment Committee consists of seven members, and that the presence
of any others can only serve to change the balance. If the NRS
later on wants to have a representative at a meeting of the Allotment Committee, this is a request it should submit in writing to
the Allotment Committee itself; but the right to have such representative present should not be included in the agreement.

The meeting on Thursday, March 27th, at from 2:00 to 4:00 P. M. was held at the JDC office, with Harold Linder and Joseph C. Hyman for the JDC, and Judge Rothenberg and myself for the UPA.

Linder is a very vigorous advocate. It wook a great deal of patience on the part of Judge Rothenberg as well as good humor to wear him down.

In the meantime the auditors of the three agencies have been asked to compile statements in detail of the expenses they incurred in the conduct of their campaigns, and Coons and myself are supposed to survey these auditors! lists before submission to Judge Rothenberg and Mr. Linder for final adjudication.

Mr. Linder said he would consult with Mr. Rosenwald about the representation of the NRS people in Allotment Committee meetings.

### AGREEMENT

Between

JOINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE AND UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL

Constituting the 1941

UNITED JEWISH APPEAL (Inc.) FOR REFUGEES, OVERSEAS NEEDS AND PALESTINE

- 1. The United Jewish Appeal (Inc.) for Refugees and Overseas Needs is a continuation of the 1939 and 1940 campaign structure through the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. by means of which the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, Inc. (J.D.C.) and the United Palestine Appeal, Inc. (U.P.A.) will, during the calendar year 1941, conduct, in the United States, a joint campaign for funds for their combined needs and those of the National Refugee Service, Inc. (N.R.S.) upon the following terms.
- 2. The quota of the 1941 United Jewish Appeal shall be fixed by the National Chairmen of the United Jewish Appeal.
- 3. All net funds received by the United Jewish Appeal and any of the organizations abovementioned, as a result of its 1941 campaign, are to be distributed as follows, after expenses of the National United Jewish Appeal have been deducted:
  - A. The first such funds up to \$8,800,000 are to be divided in the following proportions:

(a) The N.R.S. is to receive \$2,000,000 (b) The J.D.C. " " " 4.275.000

b) The J.D.C. " " " 4,275,000 c) The U.P.A. " " 2.525,000

The amount for the National Refugee Service is to include its participation without special or additional allotment from the New York City and metropolitan area campaign of the United Jewish Appeal.

\$8,800,000

B. All net sums collected, received or raised through the United Jewish
Appeal, and by or through any of the aforementioned organizations, over
and above the funds disposed of by the preceding subdivisions of this
paragraph shall be divided between the United Palestine Appeal, the Joint
Distribution Committee and the National Refugee Service at the sole and
exclusive discretion of an Allotment Committee. It is distinctly understood

and agreed that the allocation of funds provided for in subdivision "A" of this paragraph shall not in any manner be regarded as a precedent or guide by the Allotment Committee in dividing any funds subject to its disposal, it being the intent and purpose hereof that the Allotment Committee shall make such division upon the basis of its own independent study.

- Palestine Appeal in connection with the launching of their campaigns for 1941, prior to the reconstitution of the United Jewish Appeal, shall be charges upon the campaign expenses of the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. and these agencies shall be reimbursed by the 1941 United Jewish Appeal for such expenditures.
- 4. The aforesaid Allotment Committee shall be composed of an equal number of nominees of the Joint Distribution Committee and of the United Palestine Appeal. The Allotment Committee will also include three representatives of Welfare Fund communities, to be approved by the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal before said representatives shall become members of the Allotment Committee. In the event of a vacancy in the Allotment Committee for any reason whatsoever, the said vacancy shall be filled by a person designated in exactly the same manner as was the person whose place had become vacant. The Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal may respectively name alternates for their nominees to the Allotment Committee. The Allotment Committee shall act by a majority vote of the total number. As and when the Allotment Committee shall make grants as authorized over and above the amounts set forth in Paragraph 3A, the Treasurers of the United Jewish Appeal are authorized to make payments of such grants forthwith out of available funds.

- 5. Upon organization of the Allotment Committee, there shall be allocated to it from the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. an amount to be agreed upon between the parties to be used during 1941, in connection with budget studies, personnel and other overhead expenses, to the end that the said Allotment Committee shall have for consideration at its various meetings all material which may be pertinent to a thorough analysis of all matters before it. The Allotment Committee shall be named not later than April 15th and shall be requested to endeavor to make its first allotment by July 1st.
- 6. The traditional collections of the Jewish National Fund are not to be included in or to be considered a part of the United Jewish Appeal. However, a report of its net receipts shall be made available to the Allotment Committee. Any income received by the Jewish National Fund through allotments from Welfare Funds is to be considered income for the United Jewish Appeal.
- 7. Any funds paid or payable directly to the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal or the National Refugee Service as the respective beneficiaries of any Will, Estate, Testamentary Bequest or Provision and under any power of Appointment, shall be retained by the recipient thereof and not included in, or considered part of, the United Jewish Appeal.
- 8. The National Refugee Service shall have the right to receive and retain grants and contributions from Foundations whose charters, or established policy prior to the making of such grant specifically exclude gifts that are not to be used within the United States; and certification of such established policy by the duly authorized officers of such foundations shall be deemed conclusive. Such grants or contributions shall not be included in, or considered part of, the United Jewish Appeal. However, it is understood that this paragraph shall not be deemed to give the National Refugee Service the right to obtain grants or contributions from any Foundation or Agency which contributed funds to the

United Jewish Appeal on behalf of the National Refugee Service during the years 1939 and 1940. The National Refugee Service shall report to the Allotment Committee all funds received from whatever source with a description of the sources.

- 9. The United Jewish Appeal shall constitute the unified fund-raising instrument for the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service and none of the three last-mentioned organizations shall undertake separate campaigns in the United States during the year 1941, with the exceptions noted herein. If a supplementary appeal or campaign is to be initiated in the United States by any of the said three beneficiaries of the United Jewish Appeal, such a campaign or appeal must have the approval of the United Jewish Appeal and the proceeds must be reported and transmitted to it.
- 10. Except as otherwise specifically provided herein, the United Palestine Appeal, the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Refugee Service agree that all funds and assets of any nature whatsoever pledged to and/or collected or received by any of them directly during the year 1940, which would in the ordinary course be credited to the 1940 United States campaign of the recipient, and/or any and all funds and assets pledged to and/or received and collected by any of them directly as a result of any 1940 United States campaign activities, shall be assigned, transferred and/or paid over to the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. and shall be considered part of the receipts of the joint campaign and subject in their entirety to the provisions hereof.
- 11. The two technical managing heads of the United Jewish Appeal, representing the

  Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal respectively, shall

  have equal status in the direction of the activities of the United Jewish Appeal,

  Inc.
- 12. No agencies other than the United Palestine Appeal, the Joint Distribution Combe be mittee and the National Refugee Service are to/beneficiaries of distributions

made by the Distribution Committee; and no such other agencies shall be included in the United Jewish Appeal without the prior consent of the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal.

- 13. The United Jewish Appeal, Inc. undertakes to take immediate steps for such amendments of its By-Laws and Resolutions as may be necessary for the purposes of this agreement; it being understood that no changes in the manner in which the Membership, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. is selected, shall be made.
- Appeal and the joint campaign which is the subject thereof, shall be deemed to have commenced on January 1st, 1941 and shall expire on December 31st, 1941; it being understood, however, that all activities thereafter directed at concluding the 1941 campaign and the collection of all pledges and subscriptions made therein shall come within the purview hereof. Any proposal for an agreement for fund-raising in a 1942 campaign shall be considered not later than October 31st, 1941.
  - 15. All details for implementing and carrying out the foregoing agreement are in the charge of the National Chairmen of the United Jewish Appeal, or their respective nominees. Meetings in regard to such details will be held at regular intervals.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I am wondering whether it would be at all possible for you to accept an invitation from Rabbi Eugene Mannheimer of Des Moines, Iowa, to visit that community to open the campaign. A special problem has arisen there in relation to the big givers and it is felt that only someone like you could meet the situation.

Under ordinary circumstances, I would not call such a community to your attention, even though it does raise \$75,000, of which some \$45,000 went to the UJA last year. They can raise even more.

Des Moines needs an injection of some Palestine sentiment and it is for that reason that I undertake to submit Des Moines for your consideration. A certain amount of feeling generated by the dissolution of the United Jewish Appeal and by the referendum discussion must be liquidated. Going to Des Moines is not like addressing a mass meeting where the results are not visible. You meet directly with the big givers who contribute on the spot.

My dear Mr. Montor:

I hope that you have succeeded in getting the action of the B'nai B'rith Board with reference to the referendum into the public press. If you cannot get it into the JTA Bulletin, the New Palestine at least should carry it. You will recall that the JDC, the NRS and the ORT made a public statement in favor of the proposals. It is of utmost importance that other agencies besides the Zionists should come out against it. The canvassing of the Board of the Central Conference of American Rabbis should also receive publicity.

With reference to Des Moines: I am afraid that I will not be able to go there. I have already scheduled myself for Detroit on May 11; St. Louis, May 5; Hartford, April 23; and Brooklyn, April 24. We have a tremendous amount of work to do here in Cleveland to make a success of our campaign. Dear Dr. Silver:

As you will have seen, the story which you telephoned me about the Executive Board of the Central Conference was issued on the day the information was received.

Simon Shetzer was in touch with me by telephone Friday afternoon. He told me of his telephone conversation with Henry Monsky who did not wish to release the resolution which was couched in such a form that it might be interpreted as being intended exclusively for the Council of Federations.

Mr. Monsky will be in New York today or tomorrow and I shall communicate with him for the purpose of obtaining a release on the resolution. It will, of course, be issued promptly and circulated widely.

I spoke to the Council office to inquire whether the Council was planning to insist upon April 1st as the final date for voting in the referendum. I pointed out that Cincinnati was planning to vote on April 7th, and asked whether that vote would have validity. I was told that this was a matter that would have to be decided by the Board of Directors of the Council at its next meeting. In the meantime the communities will have to follow their own instincts. I believe I am correct, however, in undertaking to encourage those communities, which have not yet voted, to vote, assming that their views are opposed to the establishment of a national budgeting committee.

It will be of the utmost importance that every Zionist member of the Board of Directors of the Council attend the next meeting. I would like to suggest that when the date has been fixed you send a wire to all the Zionist members to have them meet with you in the city of the meeting for a prior caucus as to the procedures to be adopted at the Board of Directors session.

I send you herewith a detailed list of the communities entitled to vote, indicating which have approved and which have rejected the proposal. Our information in the first category may be incomplete. The figures indicate, also, which communities

have not yet acted, which have declined to act or have tabled.

I realize, of course, the tremendous pressure upon you in connection with the Cleveland campaign, and even though I regret, I can understand your inability to take on more engagements. However, every letter that comes into the United Jewish Appeal office places one name at the head of its requirements for speakers, and that is your own. When I see this universal and unexceptionable desire to have you in the community I wonder why so much to-do was made about the battle you conducted on behalf of the minority view of the referendum and in connection with the United Palestine Appeal campaign.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I was interested to read the minutes of a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Greater New York campaign of the United Jewish Appeal.

I was astounded to learn that the income accruing to the JDC for Moes Chitim, that is the "special matzoth fund" of the JDC, was regarded as belonging to it exclusively. Under the same circumstances, the UPA might initiate a campaign to raise funds for Haganah, or even for a matzoth fund for Palestine. It seems to me that this requires some special consideration.

The Night of Stars is conducted annually, presumably for the UPA and yet the income goes completely to the United Jewish Appeal.

If the JDC is permitted to establish this precedent, it will, to my mind, make meaningless the agreement for the division of all funds to the three agencies.

I am sending a copy of this to Judge Rothenberg who is handling the negotiations with the JDC on the agreement. I hope that you will communicate with him on the subject.

### EXTRACT FROM MINUTES

MARCH 14, 1941 MEETING - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE GREATER NEW YORK CAMPAIGN

UNITED JEWISH APPEAL FOR REFUGEES AND OVERSEAS NEEDS

(Minutes adopted at continued Executive Meeting Friday, March 21, 1941)

A general discussion was had in relation to the Special Fund for Passover necessities being conducted by the Council of Fraternal Orders and Landsmanschaften, Jewish newspapers, congregations and retail grocers association which fund is being raised for administration by the J.D.C. Mr. I. Edwin Goldwasser pointed out that these funds were in fact not a part of general contributions to the United New York Appeal but were extra budgetary earmarked funds to be administered by the J.D.C. for the purchase of Passover necessities.

Mr. Edward M.M. Warburg pointed out that as between the J.D.C. and the N.R.S. in the United New York Appeal, it was understood that these funds were not part of United New York Appeal contributions.

Mr. Samuel Blitz stated that in 1940 there had also been a Matzoth Campaign, conducted by United Jewish Appeal, which was part of the general funds. Mr. Henry C. Bernstein gave the complete history of the formation of this special Passover necessities campaign and pointed out the essential differences between the 1941 fund and the 1940 general campaign.

Upon motion of Mr. Abraham Liebovitz, it was unanimously resolved that all contributions and pledges to the special Matzoth Fund, to be administered by the J.D.C. were not part of general campaign funds but were to be treated as earmarked funds to be turned over to the J.D.C. to be administered by them for the purchase and distribution of Passover necessities.

I note that Mr. Bakstansky is on his way to America from London. This is in response to the invitation that was voted to be extended to him by the Executive Committee of the United Palestine Appeal.

I merely want to call attention to the fact that since the United Palestine Appeal is not having an independent campaign, Mr. Bakstansky's usefulness will be limited.

There will be the substantial expense of transportation by Clipper from London. No arrangements have yet been made with regard to maintenance in this country.

I merely make note of these as a preliminary explanation for any undue expenditures which the UPA may incur.

Administrative Committee of the UPA printed on the letterhead. I was unfavorably impressed with the unusually large number of members from in and about New York and the relatively small number from the rest of the country — something like 85-31. That is not a wholesome set-up. I am sorry that I did not have a chance to go over the list of the Committee carefully when it was presented by the K.K. and the K.H. There are some important communities that are not even represented by a single member on the Committee.

Gentlemen:

To provide you with financial data and authoritative facts on expenditures incurred by the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service, respectively, between January 1st, 1941 and March 14, 1941, inclusive, we submit herewith the following statements:

- 1. The accounts have been examined in detail by Mr. Abraham Keller, Accountant for the J.D.C. Campaign and the N.R.S. Sampaign, and by Mr. Bernard J. Reis, C.P.A. and Accountant for the U.P.A. Campaign.
- 2. Herewith is a total of J.D.C.-N.R.S. and U.P.A. expenditures from January 1st to March 14, 1941, inclusive, as incurred in the national campaigns:

J.D.C. - N.R.S. Campaign Expenditures \$127,836.03 U.P.A. Campaign Expenditures 82.840.37 or a total of \$210,676.40

- 3. In addition, we are advised that the U.P.A. advanced to its New York City Campaign the sum of \$50,250.80 and that the J.D.C. advanced to the Greater New York United Appeal of the J.D.C. and N.R.S. \$75,000, making a total of \$125,250.80.
- 4. Certain additional items may be of value to you in your consideration of these expenditures:
  - A. For the period from January 1 through March 14, 1940, the national campaign of the U.J.A. incurred expenditures amounting to \$85,000. For the period from January 1 through March 14, 1941, the U.J.A. as such did not conduct a campaign, but the separate agencies did, with the expenditures indicated above, totaling \$210,676.40.
  - B. Included in the \$210,676.40 expended by the J.D.C.-N.R.S. and the U.P.A. national campaigns from January 1 through March 14, 1941, are a number of capital assets and cash funds which will accrue to the benefit of the U.J.A., such as revolving funds, automobiles, furniture, and other property.
- 5. In submitting this statement, it is our belief that there may be small items not yet accounted for, which in the aggregate, together with certain adjustments that can amicably be made between the agencies, would make it expeditious that auditors have a reasonable amount at their disposal as a contingency allowance for all adjustments not thus far included in the calculations as stated, these adjustments to be approved by Messrs. Coons and Montor.

It is our understanding that the national agreement for 1941 will provide that all monies received by the J.D.C., U.P.A. and N.R.S. respectively, as contributions from January 1, 1941 through March 14, 1941, will be remitted to the treasury of the U.J.A. for 1941.

In the matter of leases and other contracts which might be subject to dispute, we respectfully submit that the Treasurers of the U.J.A. be authorized by your committee to make the necessary decisions and adjustments.

You are, of course, acquainted with the article in the present volume of the American Jewish Year Book, which lists, for the first time, the Jewish population of 4,600 cities and villages. This study, prepared by our director, will be periodically augmented and revised. You may also know of the United States government bulletin "Jewish Congregations," which was prepared by our Statistical Bureau. The bulletin reproduces our statistics of Jews for the principal communities of the country, and it gives a statement of the history of our people in this country, the teachings of Judaism, and our organization and work.

Your organization directly benefits from our work. You may know that about twenty years ago only about 1,500 cities and villages of our country were known to have Jewish populations. Ten years ago our Bureau published a list of 3,100 cities and villages having Jewish residents. The great increase was due partly to the continuous spread of Jews from the large to the small places, and partly to a more comprehensive census. Our latest list, mentioned above, gives 4,600 cities and villages. These lists are indispensable to your work and your nation-wide drives for funds. Many of the small communities, in the absence of these lists, would be totally unknown to you. In many other communities our enumerations serve as a basis for the organization and the work of local committees for fund-raising and other purposes. Your allocation of quotas for the Jewish communities is facilitated by these lists, if not based upon these. Indeed, our periodic enumerations of the Jews of our country and the trends that these show, influence the scope of the work of everyone of our national organizations.

Our Statistical Bureau is now engaged in preparing a complete directory of American rabbis, the first of its kind. This work, too, will no doubt, benefit your great organization.

The Statistical Bureau of the Synagogue Council of America is the major source of information concerning American Jews. As you

Mr. Isidore Coons, -2-Executive Vice-Chairman may know, our Bureau (formerly the Jewish Statistical Bureau) collects statistics of Jews for the United States Census Bureau and for our communities, maintains a Jewish information service for government offices and the general public, and works to assure Jews proper classification in United States census work. Our Bureau is the recognized authoritative source of essential information concerning Jews, by government and by private agencies. We feel that our work must be continued, partly because it is indispensable to the activities of our communities and our national organizations, like yours; partly because it is our duty to supply the United States Census Bureau with the statistics they demand of us, as an American religious body; and partly because our work tends to counteract the dangerous agitation to introduce a religious classification in government statistics. But in order to exist we must have the financial support of our major organizations. The American Jewish Committee has pledged \$3,500 to our budget this year, and we are now appealing to other organizations, especially those that are engaged in raising funds on a nation-wide scale. We, therefore, appeal to you for a onetime contribution of \$1,000 for the work of our Statistical Bureau, so that it may carry on its work of gathering statistics and data of Jews in 4,600 localities in our country. Dr. Linfield informed me of the conversation he had with you last week, and I was glad to learn that you were making good use of our Jewish population statistics. Name. The Statistical Bureau of the Synagogue Council of America, 1181 Broadway, New York, N.Y., was organized a quarter of a century ago. Officers and sponsors, on letterhead.

Object. The Statistical Bureau gathers basic data of Jews, with a view to meeting the needs of the Jewish community and those of government statistical offices, church bodies and other public bodies that mold public opinion. Specifically, its purpose is

- 1. To prepare statistics of Jews for the United States surveys of religious bodies.
- 2. To cooperate with church statistical offices to further American religious life.
- 3. To collect statistics of the number and the distribution of the Jews of America.
- 4. To maintain directories of Jewish organizations, rabbis, etc.
- 5. To oppose introduction of a religious classification in government statistics.
- 6. To maintain a Jewish information service.

The latter service is designed to supply government offices, American religious bodies, and libraries with data of Jews as a religious body.

Achievements. The services of the Statistical Bureau are unique. No other national organization has been engaged, or is now engaged in the activities of our Bureau, which are of great importance to the life of our American Jewish community.

- 1. The Bureau conducted three decennial censuses of the Jews of America, to determine the number of Jews in the states, cities, villages and rural districts.
- 2. The Bureau, through its director, acted as United States Special Agent to collect statistics of Jews for the United States Censuses of Religious Bodies.
- 3. The Bureau successfully opposed the dangerous proposal for the introduction of a religious classification in the United States population census.
- 4. The Bureau compiles and maintains up-to-date directories of Jewish organizations and rabbis.

<u>Publications.</u> The Statistical Bureau issued a considerable number of publications.

A few of the principal titles follow:

1. "Communal Organization of the Jews in the United States."

2. "State Population Census by Faiths- Meaning, Reliability and Value".

3. "Statistics of Jews and Jewish Organizations- Historical Review, 1850-1937".

4. "Jewish Congregations- Organization and Work."

The last publication was prepared by the Statistical Bureau but published by the <u>United</u>

<u>States Bureau of the Census.</u> The publication gives the history of our people in this

country, the teachings of Judaism, and our organization and work. It is a primary

research and information source for government officials and public bodies.

On Tuesday, April 8th, at 5:00 P.M. there was a further meeting of the committee negotiating the 1941 United Jewish Appeal agreement. There were present Judge Morris Rothenberg, Mr. Harold Linder, Mr. Joseph C. Hyman and I.

All items in the agreement have been disposed of, but two issues arose again and were not yet disposed of:

- Mr. Linder again presented the demand of William Rosenwald that a representative or representatives of the National Refugee Service be entitled to sit in without vote at meetings of the Allotment Committee.
- 2) Mr. Linder insisted that there be reimbursement to the U.P.A. and the J.D.C. of expenses already incurred between January 1st and March 15th proportionate to the total income which these agencies would finally receive from the 1941 U.J.A.

Attached herewith is a copy of the letter which Mr. Coons and I addressed to Messrs. Rothenberg and Linder to describe the expenditures already incurred by the agencies constituting the United Jewish Appeal.

You will note that the U.P.A. in its national office spent \$82,840.37, which is directly chargeable to campaign activity, and that in addition \$50,250.80 was advanced by the national U.P.A. to the New York City campaign, making a total of \$133,091.17.

Mr. Linder refused to listen to any argument that the U.P.A. as well as the J.D.C. and N.R.S. had incurred expenditures in good faith to pursue their individual campaigns, and that the U.J.A. must take up these obligations unless the agencies were to be penalized.

Mr. Linder ventured the observation, in fact the enthusiastic hope, that when the United Jewish Appeal of 1941 was concluded the most that the U.P.A. would receive would be 25% of the total. On that basis he calculated the reimbursement of expenditures as follows: total spent and advanced nationally and in New York - approximately \$335,000. The U.P.A. would be entitled to get 25% of that amount which would mean \$83,750. That means that the U.P.A. would stand to lose about \$50,000 on expenses actually incurred.

Again I must emphasize the vigorous character of Judge Rothenberg's advocacy of the U.P.A. position on both points referred to above. He simply refused to discuss the demand that the N.R.S. have representatives entitled to attend all meetings of the Allotment Committee, saying that that was the basis of the agreement and there was no point in further discussing it. He was equally adamant on the question of fairness in reimbursement for expenditures actually incurred.

At one point in the discussion Mr. Linder made one of his characteristically J.D.C. contemptuous remarks addressed to me. Judge Rothenberg flared up in an outburst of indignation that compelled Mr. Linder to apologize. Altogether, I cannot too highly praise the way in which Judge Rothenberg has handled this whole situation.

The J.D.C. people are to consider among themselves the two items still remaining open and to call Judge Rothenberg for another meeting. The J.D.C. is most anxious to have the agreement disposed of as soon as possible.

Again Mr. Hyman brought up the subject of Welfare Fund representatives on the Allotment Committee, saying that the J.D.C. would be very happy to have the members of 1940 continue into 1941. Judge Rothenberg indicated that this was still a matter for discussion since the problem had not been officially touched upon.

The J.D.C. seems to be of the opinion that the Allotment Committee can make its first decision by July 1st. From a practical point of view, I cannot see how that can possibly be done, since we will have no inkling by that time as to what we will have been allotted from the spring campaigns, much less from the fall of 1941.

I refer particularly to the assumption that the "refugee problem in the United States will have a call upon the first sums collected over and above the initial \$8,800,000", which is particularly important in relation to the sentence, "We must remember that any attempt to curtail these services might endanger the position of the American Jewish community itself."

In the discussion held on Tuesday by Judge Rothenberg, Harold Linder, Joseph Hyman and myself, there was an interesting revelation of what the Joint Distribution Committee expects as to the action of the Allotment Committee. Mr. Linder felt that the maximum that the United Palestine Appeal would get out of the total income of the United Jewish Appeal, including the prospective allotment from the Allotment Committee, would be 25%. It seemed a rather presumptuous statement to make, but apparently that is the line along which these people are thinking.

As you know, we have just completed a four months' intensive drive to collect some \$70,000 for the Appeal. Apparently the Jewish National Fund has an independent arrangement with the U. J. A. which enables the former to violate the latter and the spirit not only of our agreement with the b. P.A. but also of our agreement with the Jewish National Fund, itself. I do not intend to engage in any acrimonious correspondence with the Jewish National Fund. Unless that organization will assure us that it will not make independent solicitations in Louisville, our Committee will be obliged to ascertain the amounts so collected and, in our next campaign, make the necessary adjustments occasioned thereby. am sure that you will understand my position in this matter. When Schanfarber first consented to take the Conference Chairmanship, he impressed me with the fact that he did not want to devote too much time to it. However, when I called him on Tuesday to get his permission to use his signature on our invitation he asked me to put into writing all of the details connected with the conference, preparations, program, etc. I made out an outline of the Conference, listing the purposes, the correspondence to be used in preparing for the affair and the tentative program. As per our arrangement I visited his office the next morning. I was astounded at the interest he had begun to show in the conference. What I had mistaken for vanity at our first meeting turned out to be a supreme confidence in his own importance. He assured me that he had no intention of wasting his time on a program that did not promise to be a huge success. You already know of his activities in connection with the arrangements for the program.

I have found Schanfarber a most impressive personality. There is no question as to the value of his participation. Everyone with whom I have discussed the conference has taken the same attitude. As a matter of fact they have almost all used the same words. "You couldn't get a better man for the conference. You are assured of a successful conference." He is held in great esteem by all elements of the community. He also wields a great influence both in Columbus and throughout the state. He is a sort of liaison officer between all of the groups in the community. There is no pretense in his Palestine sympathy. It is unfortunate that he has not affirmed it openly before. The wealthy orthodox members of the community respect him highly and want to please him. Because he belongs to the so-called assimilationist group, they assumed that he was anti-Palestine or at the most indifferent, therefore, they in turn did not become too greatly interested in the Zionist ideal. I refer particularly to two orthodox "big-givers", the Yenkin family and the Goldberg family.

On the other hand he exerts a great deal of influence in the other groups. I think he would sincerely like to use his influence to win them over to his way of thinking. As a matter of fact during our conversation on Wednesday morning he volunteered the remark, "Columbus is a very poor community for U.P.A." and that the conference together with his participation, would go a long way towards changing that picture. It is quite possible that he typical of his class about whom there may have been a great deal of misunderstanding. I have found that those in the community who are furthest from him socially understand him less and deem him as assimilationist. whereas, those who are closer to him understand his attitude. He has one characteristic which I think is rare among lay fundraisers. Most lay leaders consider the organizations that do the fund-raising a necessary evil, and they have little patience with the differences that arise between these organizations. Schanfarber is one of the few I have met who associate the organization completely with its purpose.

On the whole I find that I am getting a great deal of personal satisfaction out of our association. He has been very gracious and has used his influence with some of the organizations to get them to cooperate with us.

Dr. Abramson is the embodiment of the American Jewish Congress, the Zionist organization and Hebraic culture of the community. He is in the medical profession and I'm afraid not too greatly respected by those in the community who reserve their esteem for success. He is well-read and intelligent and in spite of his lack of success is greatly respected by the middle and lower class in Columbus. During our conversation he suggested Alfred Benesch of Cleveland for the State Chairmanship of the U.P.A. Council. Do you know anything about Benesch?

From Rabbi Hirschsprung I learned about the orthodox part of the community.

Few of the affluent ones are enthusiastic Zionists. Hirschsprung is typical of the orthodox rabbinate. He is very uncertain of his position which at best is merely that of a ceremonial servant of his ruthless congregation.

He exerts little influence in his congregation. Although he is both a member of Mizrachi and the Zionist organizations, the extent of his activity consists of a perpetual race with the other orthodox rabbi for the petty stationery honors that come with organizations.

Mrs. William Schiff is at present the president of the Council of Jewish Women of Columbus. She is at the same time one of the outstanding members of the Columbus Hadassah chapter. She is a very charming and sensible woman with a thoroughly Jewish bakkground. She promises to be very helpful in enlisting the cooperation of the Council.

I had already contacted the president of the Hadassah, Mrs. Bernard Feitlinger, who had promised the assistance of that organization.

There is a strong Mizrachi group in the community of which a Mr. David Schwartz is president. He is a brother-in-law of the Zionist president. Everyone considers him a "very fine" man. I shall try to contact him when I return to Columbus.

I contacted both the president and the secretary of the Pioneer Women, Mrs. H. Friedland and Mrs. L. Marks. Neither of them seemed to understand our purpose but it's for Palestine and they are invited so they will do whatever they can. Incidentally, the other of odox rabbi seems to feel that Hirschsprung is outstripping him in honors so he's trying to organize another Mizrachi group. He is also a member of the Agudah. I'll tell you more about him when I meet him. His name is Greenwald.

I am enclosing herewith a letter which I received from Mr. Leo J. Rabinowitz and my answer to him. He mentions you in his letter. You might wish to answer him yourself. With reference to the Biennial Convention of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, I would suggest that you ask Rabbi Jonah Wise to get in touch with the officers of the Union. I cannot believe that Mr. Slobodin reflects anyone's views except his own in his attempt to judge what may or may not be said by the UJA with respect to Palestine. You may want to call Mr. Slobodin's attention to the fact that he is invading a field which is not properly his own. In the memorandum Mr. Slobodin has paragraphs as follows: "In several places, among them the third line from the bottom on page 18, and the thirteenth line from the top on page 19, the term 'Jewish homeland in Palestine' is used. It was agreed between us some time ago that this phraseology might be used in publicity material for the Yiddish and Anglo-Jewish press, but it was at the same time distinctly understood that decision was reserved as to its use in material for the general or secular press and that Mr. Warburg wished to be consulted about such use. So far as this office is aware, there has been no such consultation in this case although the Publicity Manual is intended for general and secular use." "Also in the same section, paragraph 6 is factually inaccurate. Palestine has not received the largest number of Jewish refugees unless immigration to Palestine since 1933 is counted as 'flight of refugees from Mazi oppression', which is not the case. The United States has received more refugee immigration." HM: RE

This will acknowledge your letter dated March 24, 1941, to which was attached the consolidated account of income and expenditure for the month of January, 1941. There are pertain observations which I wish to make that apply exally to the consolidated account for the period from October through December, 1940.

- (1) I assume that you have seen the questions on accounting and the directions as to accounting and reporting procedure that were transmitted through Dr. Be mard Joseph, both as to the form of reporting and the substance. May I suggest that in addition to the consolidated accounts that are now being forwarded that there be monthly balance sheets as well as summaries, that is, indicating the cash on hand or deficit on Jamuary 1, 1941, the expenditures in Jamuary, the income in that month, and the cash and/or deficit or accumulated deficit on Jahuary 31, 1941. If this cannot be done on a consolidated basis, at least it might be tried for each individual institution.
- broken down into more specific figures, that is, how much was received on account of 1940, 1939, and how much on account of previous years. This may and perhaps will be difficult for your accountants, in view of the likelihood that the various countries, including the United States, do not provide you with sufficient material for such specifications but I would suggest that you instruct all agencies which raise money for Palestine to indicate on which account remittances are being forwarded—shether on account of 1939, 1940, 1941 or for previous campaigns.

The Allotment Committee of the United Jewish Appeal is supposed to base its decision on the distribution of funds on the amounts available to each of the constituent agencies of the United Jewish Appeal in the current calendar year. Therefore, it should not take into consideration the funds being spent in Palestine from income of previous years. It does not do so in connection with the accounts of the Joint Distribution Committee. The Jewish Agency should therefore instruct the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth in the United States and else-

This can then be reflected in your breakdown of "Contributions" in the monthly statement and other reports. We do not claim credit for the Central Bureau in our applications to the Allotment Committee of the United Jewish Appeal, you will note, except to the extent to which the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth may participate with funds to the Central Bureau. It is necessary that we know how much was received from Hadassah or my other source, but it is not our intention to take credit for these sums with the Allotment Committee. We should know, however, what the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth did contribute to the Central Bureau through their funds, in order that we may claim full credit therefor with the Allotment Committee. Under the category "Service charges", there appears a credit to the Palestine Foundation Fund, "dividends and interest, LP162.815." From whom were these dividends received? Does the interest represent a loan by the Palestine Foundation Fund to an individual? If so, what was the amount of the loan? What is the term of the loan? Under "grants and participations", the sum of LF120.604 is given to the Immigration Department. Since this appears under the heading of "Income", the item is very misleading, inasmuch as this would seem to be an item of dis-

bursement. Would you please explain this discrepancy more fully?

- "Participation from private land purchasers"-LP6, 574. What does this item mean? Does the sum represent contributions, loans, or gifts?
- "Leasehold rent, LP764.078". Does this figure mean that the Jewish National Fund received this amount on the rental for all its holdings, or only a part thereof? If it is for the whole, why is the sum so small? This item should be clarified.
- The sum of LP8,040 is given for "reslization of investment". Since (8) this is a comparatively large sum it is essential that we know more about the nature of the investment on which this amount was realized. May this be considered in the nature of regular income? Was it derived from the sale of land, securities? Was the investment in Palestine, or abroad?
- Please furnish us with a description of the loans made by the Jewish National Fund as evidenced by the item LP53,974.538. We should know where the money was borrowed-whether from a bank or banks, individuals, or sellers of land. What is the interest rate? What is the term? What is the total of Sewish National Fund Loans? When do they mature respectively? Are there annual interest and/or amortization charges?
- "Special earmarked funds". In the January account there is the receipt from South Africa of LP1,000 for Wizo. How does this item effect the Keren Hayesod budget? Is it earmarked merely for transfer to Wize, or was it for some other specific purpose?
- "Immigration and Training". What is the average cost of transportation per capital? What is the average loan to an immigrant? Are these loans retrievable? How are they registered as assets by the Jewish Agency? What is the average cost of medical treatment, sick insurance? How many people are covered thereby?

April 25, 1941. Mr. Joseph Bahral Page 3 "Tents-LP321." How many tents were purchased for this sum? Where have they been placed? For whose use are they intended? LP115 is given as the cost of training abroad. Where is the training given, that is, in what countries? I assume that the training is for agricultural work, but inasmuch as this item is not clarified, it would not be possible to state that this is so, until word is received from you confirming this, or explaining the exact nature of the training. "Administration expenses-Palestine offices abroad". Where are these offices located? Are these really "administration" expenses in terms of overhead, or does the item comprise actual "service" in terms of social service workers as important to immigration as transportation itself? Is it not inaccurate, therefore, to refer to these as "administration" costs? The sum of LP1,003 is given as having been paid for refugees' fares. (15) How many refugees were thus taken care of? Whence did they come? Does the Jewish Agency include in its reports such amounts as the United Palestine Appeal spent (\$35,000) thus far, on account of transportation? The Jewish Agency received the reports of the United Palestine Appeal and those of the Keren Hayesod, as well.

The Jewish Agency should claim credit for such items, and incorporate them in its books, in order that we may ask for and obtain credit therefor through the Allotment Committee, and also in order to show accurately totality of Palestine expenditures

The Jewish National Fund expended LP30,847.806 for land purchase. How (16) many dunams were purchased for this sum? How many dunams of old land, and how many of new land did this amount pay for? What is the average cost of a dunam of land in 1941? What is the maximum cost for a dunam of land? What is the minimum cost? Where is the land which was purchased for this sum located? How much land has been purchased by the Jewish National Fund since October 1, 1940?

Please segregate the item, "loans to settlements, investments-LP1,590. What was the purpose of the loans? What was the nature of the investments? What is a plantation? How many people are given work through afforestation? How many trees have been planted by the Jewish National Fund since the afforestation projects were planned? How many trees have been planted since October 1, 1940?

- "-- to settlers of villages, etc." What was the purpose of this assistance by the Jewish Agency? How many individuals have been affected by such aid?
- The agricultural experiment station shows a cost of LP2,609.284. How (18) many individuals are employed by the station? What is the nature of their services?
- The item entitled "administration and general expenses" of the coloniza-(19) tion department and the technical department should, it seems to me, be broken down, in order that we may know more specifically the nature of this charge of LP1,270. How many people are involved in each department? What is the nature of the work they perform? What is a general expense? What is the administration involved?
- Please explain what the item, "relief works through Bitzur-LP568.573" mesns. Does it indicate a loss on guarantees? Over how long a period, if this is the explanation? What were the total guarantees? What was the nature of the "relief works" stimulated? How many people were assisted directly and/or indirectly?

How did the Jewish Agency expend these funds? How many "labor exchanges" are there? Where are they located? How many people were affected? How many were trained for vocations? What trades were taught? In what institutions were the training courses given? Are the trainees then placed in industry by the Jewish Agency, or is there a tie-up between the labor exchanges and vocational training centres? It seems to me that the category "Urban Settlement, Trade, Industry and Investments" is much too broad in scope, and it would be more intelligible to the average layman if it were broken down. Why, for example, should not "urban settlement" appear as a sub-head under "Labor and Housing", or under "agricultural settlement", and which could then include certain other items now classified as "labor and housing"? Could not an item such as "loans to rural laborers for auxiliary farms" be, at times under the category of "urban settlement"? Please explain the nature of the item "on account participation in loans for industrial recovery-(LP4,000)". Does this indicate a loss taken on guarantees? What were the loans for? What was the total sum involved? Who benefitted therefrom? How many individuals were affected? How much of the LP4,000 is recoverable? Why was the payment of LP1.177 to A.P.B. in 5700 on account of a guarantee made? Is this a total loss? What was the full guarantee? For what purpose was it made? To whom was it given, and how was it secured, either collaterally, or otherwise? Please enlarge upon the item of "technical instruction, information, etc." To whom was the instruction given? In what subjects? What kind of information was given, and to whom? What was the research, topically, and for whom was it done? To whom were grants given, and why? Please indicate whether the administration expenses incurred were in the nature of office or field administration. Please let us know to how many artisans were small loans given, the average loan per capita, and whether or not they are repaid in due course. What percentage of the loans made are not repaid? Does the item of LP700 for investments in Marine Trust indicate the purchase of more shares? What is the amount of the Jewish Agency's investment therein

At this time? What is the total investment of Marine Trust? What additional commitments to Marine Trust does the Jewish Agency still carry? Over how long a period is the commitment spread? What purpose is served by the investment in Tel Aviv Development Company? What is this company? What is the total investment by the Jewish Agency? How much has been invested by others? What commitments does the Jewish Agency have to the Tel Aviv Development Company, and for how long a period do they extend? How many persons benefit from the activities of this company?

(34) To how many unemployed was relief given in the periods covered by the consolidated accounts? What is the amount of relief per capital per week? Why are there committees outside Vaad Leumi for relief of Polish, Roumanian, etc. refugees? What is the total spent for relief in a month, or in any other fiscal period? How much thereof is spent by Vaad Leumi? How much is expended for relief by the Government? What is the differentiation between "relief to unemployed", "relief", and "relief works through Bitzur Company"?

(35) You state that LP809 was spent on account of the participation in the education budget of Vaad Leumi. What is the total Vaad Leumi budget for Education? Who provides the balance? What is the Jewish Agency's total commitment in this respect? How much has been spent since October 1, 1940? How many people have been affected thereby—pupils, teachers, institutions, etc..?

(36) It would be extremely helpful if it were possible to break down the items under National Organization and Security, such as "land, "Arab affairs". "President's expenses" and "emergency preparations". What is the nature of the payment on account of guarantee granted to A.P.B. in 5700 of LP200, which appears in the category of "Political Department"? Why do not all the guarantees so paid appear in one heading? What wasthe total amount of the guarantee, and for what purpose was it given? What is the amount of the obligation still outstanding? For how long a period is it to run?

(37) Please brak down the category entitled "Administration and General Expenses". How does the item "administration of Jewish Agency" differ from the item listed previously as "administration expenses? The same question is put with respect to the other funds.

(36) Under debt repayments it is necessary to know what loans were covered by the payments of principal and of interest. What is the total amount of each loan, to whom is it payable, what is the date of maturity, and what security, if any, was given in each instance?

In connection with the loans of the Jewish National Fund, it is necessary that we know, in addition to the above, to what extent are the payments made directly for the purpose of land purchase on previous commitments, and to what extent it involves the meeting of bank obligations. To what extent are items for "debt repayment" offsets to "land purchase"?

With reference to the headings used in the accounts: Why is transportation to places of work placed under the category of immigration and training, as well as under labor and housing? The same query is raised in connection with medical treatment. Since refugee assistance and relief are two new important items in the budget should not the new headings be created under which all such expenditures could be credited.

#### MEMORANDUM

To: Mr. Henry Montor

From: Mr. Louis Lipsky

In connection with the letter written by Dr. Silver, dated April 17th, dealing with the problem of the National Refugee Service:-

I think this question is important enough to warrant a discussion at a meeting either of the Executive or of the Administrative Committee. Should we decide to raise the issue, the problem that will face us will be where and through whom? Whenever such questions are raised, there are no entries in the controversial field, and the burden of carrying the discussion is left to two or three people who are never given support by others, and who have to carry the responsibility and the odium that comes from stirring up discussions that are usually regarded as trouble-making. What Dr. Silver says in his letter is absolutely true, but will that truth be supported by the ZOA, the Hadassah or even by leading officials of the UPA?

The whole position needs to be rediscussed at a meeting, and I urge that either a special meeting be called for this purpose, or that it be placed on the agenda of the meeting on Thursday.

#### Digest - St. Louis, Mo.

(Jewish Population - 51,000)

1941 - The UJA has made formal application for an allotment of \$500,000 from the Jewish Welfare Fund campaign of St. Louis. The 1941 campaign is scheduled to open officially on May 5th for a goal of \$526,043 of which \$300,000 has been allocated the UJA.

This year's goal is \$33,000 less than the 1940 budget and approximately the same as the actual amount raised last year. The UJA allocation this year represents a decrease of \$21,000 as compared with 1940. According to Charles M. Rice, Chairman of the Budget Committee, this action was prompted by the need to keep the 1941 budget in line with the actual total raised in 1940. If the campaign goal is not reached, all non-local agencies are to receive a proportionate cut. Mr. Rice also intimated that the decision to decrease the UJA's allotment this year was made on the theory that St. Louis has been contributing too much in proportion to amounts contributed by comparable cities.

In a letter dated April 29th, Mr. Coons took exception to Mr. Rice's comment that St. Louis was contributing too much, pointing out that Cincinnati with a Jewish population of 21,800, as against St. Louis' population of 51,000, contributed \$190,000, and that San Francisco with a Jewish population of only 41,000 contributed \$350,000 in 1939 and 1940. He also pointed out that the UJA was reconstituted because American Jewish communities are eager to preserve unity. If the reconstitution means only a decrease in the scale of giving from communities, he emphasized, then the reunited campaign would not have served its purpose.

Dr. Weizmann attended a big gifts dinner here on April 20th; no appeal for funds was made. Mr. Montor will meet with leaders on May 7th; he addressed the Budget Committee in February.

Dear Mr. Montor:

When I wrote Mr. Kaufman it was exactly Mr. Getzoff's visit that I had in mind. The crux of your letter of the 17th lies perhaps in these words, "Repairing the ravages of our neglect in the past."

It is my point that the most criminal neglect in the past has been the neglect of those who are Zionists, in the attempt to corral those who take peculiar pride in holding themselves aloof.

It is my specific point that Mr. Getzoff's undertaking, as far as Fortk Worth is concerned, is an attempt to cast reflection upon the Zionist Organization. I and those of us who have led the District will admit to no such reflection, except insofar as there is an inherent deficiency in American Zionism which is inherent as well in the U.P.A.

As I told Mr. Getzoff, in Texas Zionists and U.P.A. are synonymous. The attempt made by your organization to supersede the existing Zionist activity will only bring an unfavorable reaction. You seem to have lost sight of the fact that the main weakness in Jewish life in the past decade has been just that attempt of one group always to run away from and supersede and cast reflection upon the group to which it previously belonged so that disloyalty has become the badge. That disloyalty is exactly what I have been combatting for twenty years and I shall not cease to combat it now. That has been the core of your activity and that of your representatives, ill disguised thought it has attempted to be.

Dear Mr. Brachman:

I am in receipt of copy of your letter of April 25th written Mr. Montor. From this copy it appears you have had some priour correspondence with Mr. Kaufmann, President of the Zionist Organization and Mr. Montor, Executive Director of the UPA. Not being familiar with the correspondence nor the conversation you have had with Mr. Getzoff, makes it rather difficult for me to make an intelligent expression.

Since you have been kind enough to send me copy of your letter, I am taking the liberty of expressing my personal and sincere opinion.

Frankly, I have expected some backfiring from the "Old Guard Zionists" if and when an Eastern representative, designated to work with the Southwestern Council, should happen to be misunderstood. However, I am rather surprised it would come from you because I was confident you fully understood the aims and purpose of the creation of the United Palestine Council.

I know of no one in the Southwest, connected with the United Palestine Council, who had any thought or aim to work against the Zionist organization or any other pro Palestine organization. In accordance with my understanding, the creation of a Council would definitely help the Zionist movement in every respect. It would facilitate the coordination of all organizations in their efforts toward greater accomplishments.

Such organization, naturally, would count in great numbers and would be in a better position to overcome a great many obstacles which are constantly placed in the path of Zionist progress.

You will have to recognize the fact that due to current happenings in the world, the Zionist problem is by far greater than ever in the history of Jewish life. Therefore, I feel it is the duty of every self-respecting Jew to interest himself in the great needs of Palestine rather than allow, as in the past, a handful of people to struggle with a problem which belongs to ALL Jews.

When I refer to a "handful" of people I definitely mean the old guard Zionist organization; to this I might add their name should be mentioned with reverence rather than criticism because if it had not been for those who struggled with this problem, we would not have had anything to talk about. However unfair it was in the past for the rank and file Jewry to remain on the sidelines, we must recognize the fact that evidently it was the "Act of God" which permitted the handful of foresighted Jews to have ample time to plan and carry on their struggle.

American Jewry must recognize the fact that whatever help Palestine enjoyed from other sources, has definitely stopped and it is the solemn duty of American Jewry to act quickly with a strong determination that Palestine is the only hope for world Jewry and to obtain the proper and needed support, it is very imperative that a strong Council representing all pro Palestine individuals and organizations be organized with the sole intention of strengthening all work, rather than hampering anyone.

I am confident I am voicing the sincere opinion of the National leadership, as well as all the leadership in the Southwest, that there has never been any thought in any one's mind to in any way interfere with the work and progress of the Zionist movement. I may personally assure you I would have nothing to do with any movement whatsoever if it had such motives.

I trust this will clear up the misunderstanding which evidently came about through some error and when you fully familiarize yourself with the work of the United Palestine Council, you will be one of our leaders and strong supporters.

Dear Mr. Morris: This will acknowledge your letter of April 10th together with copies of correspondence exchanged between yourself and Mr. Hendel Pisher, Executive Director of the Jewish National Fund. The traditional collections of the Jevish Mational Fund, which have been in progress for some thirty-eight years, have played an important role in linking the masses of Jews with the rebuilding of the Jewish National Home in Palestine. That factor was recognized when the United Jevish Appeal was constituted in 1939. Thus the Jevish National Fund was permitted to engage in the small traditional collections which provide a link between the very small givers and the ideal of the rebuilt Homeland. It has been our experience that traditional collections involving the blue and white boxes, the stamps sold in the synagogues during Jowish holidays and similar devices involving small sums of money have not adversely affected our Welfare Fund structures. They have obtained supplementary income from people to whom, unfortunately, ve in our great Welfare Fund mechanisms have not yet been able to penetrate. Knowing that you have always had the greatest sympathy with the Palestine rebuilding program as well as with efforts to advance it. I am sure you will recognize the special situation affecting the Jewish National Fund which the officers of the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal took into consideration when they formed the United Jewish Appeal. with kind regards, I am Very cordially yours. Shreveport's Jewish community is facing a problem: the successful organization of a federation, which seems now definitely to have been organized over the opposition of some individuals who gave way when they saw that community sentiment definitely was for the idea of a federation. Under the sponsorship of E. Bernard Weiss, Abe Freyer, Louis Sugar and Rabbi David Lefkowitz, the federation idea was proposed some months ago, and was successfully achieved only this past week when the full board was elected.

The history of federation in Shreveport is very spotted. Some eight years ago, E. Bernard Weiss proposed a federation and then Abe Freyer prepared a constitution for that body. The federation idea was opposed by Sidney Herold and some other people (notably Nathan Murov), who then felt that the sole idea behind the federation was to reduce the amount of money being raised in Shreveport for philanthropic purposes. These two men were agin this year the spearheads of opposition to the federation idea for the same reasons they opposed its formation in 1933. But the predominent sentiment in the community was for federating the drive, and Herold and Murov accordingly accepted the majority's wish on the condition that if the federation result in a reduction of money raised for all purposes, its continuation the following year would be subject to reconsideration. Apparently this was agreed upon by all interested parties.

The ideas underlying the formation of the federation are two-fold. One, to reduce the number of times individuals are called upon to give for various causes, and two, from a feeling of shame which many of the community leaders felt when they were visited by long-bearded, gabardine-gowned meshulachim. They hope that both "evils" will be eliminated with the federation.

As proposed in its constitution, the federation board is to consist of the president and rabbi of each of the congregations, the president or elected delegate from each of the Jewish organizations in Shreveport and six community members at large, to be elected by ballot by the community. These in turn would elect an additional six members representative of the community, whose leadership and financial status

make them desirable federation board members. After the period of one year this board would no longer be elected as prescribed for in its original constitution, but thereafter the board would become self-perpetuating in that it alone would have the choice of individuals to sit in its meetings. The board as constituted at present is as follows:

Board and federation officers were supposed to have been elected the night of May 13. But with Messrs. Herold, Klein, Weiss and Freyer out of town, it was decided to postpone the election of officers until the following week or ten days. Rabbi David Lefkowitz promised to communicate with me and let me have the completed official roster of the newly-formed Shreveport Federation of Jewish Charities. As yet no Budget Committee or Allocations Committee has been formulated, but from discussion with several people there seems to be the rather universal feeling that at least three of its members will be Sidney Herold, E. Bernard Weiss and Aaron Freedman. Freedman is reputedly a strong pro-Palestinian sympathizer. (I was unable to arrange an appointment with him because of the pressure of his business at the time I visited in Shreveport.)

The Federation will undertake its campaign in the fall of this year. They are contemplating setting a goal between forty and fifty thousand dollars. The Jewish community of Shreveport has about 450 families (roughly, 1500 population). About 300 families belong to the reform congregation B'nai Zion and 150 adhere to the orthodox (Congregation Agudath Achim). Besides being the larger congregation, the temple is the more influential, because of the people who are its members and leaders, and also by virtue of its being the older congregation in the community. For a long

time, Shreveport's Jewish community was divided along these lines, and only recently has there been any attempt made to effect a reconciliation of the "contending" camps. The rabbi antone board member of the orthodox congregation are members of the temple board, while the rabbi and one board member of the reform congregation sit on the schul board. Recently, the orthodox and reform groups have been exchanging places of worship on occasion, with the entire community either attending services in the reform congregation or the schul. This has come about because of the work of Sidney Herold, Rabbi Brener and Rabbi Lefkowitz, who were interested in unifying the Jewish element of Shreveport's population, and also because they desired to utilize services for the cultural advancement in Jewish matters on the part of the whole community. When such joint services take place, one of the members of the community is in advance urged to prepare a discussion on some phase of Jewish life affecting the Jewish community of Shreveport, following which there is debate, questions and answers, and discussion on the problem being considered. Whether it is because of the novelty or because the nature of the program is satisfying to the Jews of Shreveport, attendance at the schul and temple have risen to a point where 200 or 300 people at a time come to services. There is increasing harmony between the orthodox and reform elements of the community, and this is evidenced in the association of Jews in Jewish organizations. Hadassah, for example, has 136 members, is very active, and draws its maximum membership from the temple group. The Zionist District has about 110 members, and its membership is composed almost equally of reform and orthodox elements. B'nai B'rith's membership approximates 200, and its composition is similar to that of the Zionist District and Hadassah. By far, the biggest cry of the people in Shreveport, is that from the point of view of the Jewish community, it is overorganized to a point where they feel that any additional type of organization might be a burden. There is already evidenced a falling off of attendance at Jewish organization functions. For this reason, the various people to whom I spoke, felt that the Council might be an added burden on an already overly organized community. It is surprising the terrific amount of patient explanation that has to go into discussing the Council with the leaders of the various communities, because they find it hard to conceive of an organization without membership, or which is not going to carry on directly any fund-raising work. The criterion of activity in these groups is expressed in two ways. One, how many members did you get? and two, how much money did you raise? The Zionist Organization suffers from the same philosophy, and for reason is largely a \$5.00 membership association. For the past few years, it has been rather dormant, and under the aegis of its newlyelected President, Ed Klein, continues in its happy, oblivious way. From time to time, an occasional Zionist speaker will visit Shreveport, at which time there may be a stir of Zionist activity, for the duration of his visit. Hadassah is much more strongly organized, carried on a much more effective job, but the good ladies are happily ignorant of Palestine, save in the narrow, specialized way that Hadassah carries on its work.

Apart from the objection that the Council might be a duplicating organization, there was universal agreement that the services which the Council would provide were welcome, and Shreveport would avail itself of them. Rabbi David Lefkowitz was especially anxious that we supply him with literature, and keep in close touch with him about the possibility of speakers in the fall, when the community will again get under way. He was agreeable (as were Herold and Murov) that the Council would supply the speaker for the opening federation drive, and was most anxious to secure people to address the joint synagogue and temple services.

I was disappointed in Klein's being out of town, because I wanted to discuss with him the status of each individual who had been selected for the board of the new federation with regard to their Zionist leanings. I felt that because Shreveport was now proceeding with its organization, it was an opportune time to get a maximum number of Zionists on the board, in order that pro-Palestinian agencies would receive maximum consideration from the funds raised here. In Klein's absence, I discussed the problem with Walter Wolens and Joe Murov (son of Nathan Murov), both expresidents of the Zionist Organization, and asked that they bring this important matter before the next meeting of the Zionist District for consideration. I urged the meeting of the Zionist group while I was still in town, so that I might be able to discuss the situation with them, but neither Wolens nor Murov felt that any such meeting could be convened until Klein returned to Shreveport. He would not be back until the following week, which made it a physical impossibility for me to be in town then. I intend to telephone Klein from Houston, and discuss with him the advisability of my meeting with the Zionist Organization to discuss the Shreveport Federation, and to determine ways and means of how the Zionists can most effectively aid Palestinian causes through their relations with the federation.

One of the cardinal aims I had in coming to Shreveport, was to discuss with Sidney Herold his assuming the chairmanship for the entire State of Louisiana. This he refused to do. He states that he would be most effective in North Louisiana where he knows the people, but once you get below Alexandria, his name is meaningless. He feels that someone from New Orleans, either Ike Heller or Monty Lemann should be asked to assume co-chairmanship together with him for the State of Louisiana. Shreveport considers itself part of Texas and not part of Louisiana; and that Louisiana doesn't begin until you get below Alexandria. Herold also informed me that Ike Heller is very ill, and Monty Lemann will, together with Herold, be on a case in which they are both interested, in Cincinnati, during all of next week. For this reason, he thinks it might be wise to wait a while before making any contacts in New Orleans; especially since these men, and perhaps David Fichman, are about the only sources of contact of any value for the Council, in New Orleans. Herold, who is traveling together with Lemann, stated that he would discuss the Council with him, and arrange an appointment for me to see Lemann when he returns to New Orleans.

Herold is one of the most interesting and remarkable people it has ever been my pleasure to meet. He is thoroughly pro-U.P.A., ardently Zionist, and will probably be our most effective force in this whole district. He is particularly anxious at this time that the Council carry on its work, in view of the critical situation which exists in Palestine, with the threat of the German invasion, in order to mobilize the opinion of Southwest Jewry behind Palestine. He is rather condemnatory of disinterest manifested by Jews through these parts, and feels that no matter what may happen later on, it will not be the Jews who will lead other Jews to favorable regard to Palestine; but if Palestine puts up a good fight, as good as the Finns and Greeks, or even better, (in that he hoped that it might successfully resist any axis aggression) the favorable opinion which the American public would have about the Jews in Palestine, would make the Jews themselves feel maybe a little proud of owing up to the fact that they in some way might be related to the same Jews who are carrying on a heroic struggle in the Near East. Herold particularly welcomed the appearance in several days running of some A.P. articles and other dispatches in the local Shreveport paper, which discussed the significance of Palestine in relation to the British war position in the Near East. He felt that the continuance of such articles would help awaken American Jews to the importance of defending Palestine, not only morally, but financially; and too, he restated his belief that because Palestine now stood in danger, it was time to redouble

our efforts in its defense, and to interpret Palestine to American Jews in its proper relationship to the total world Jewish scene, in order to effect a total American Jewish effort on behalf of Palestine. Being with Herold was a real inspiration to me, after meeting with so many of our so-called Zionists and pro-Palestinian leaders in the Southwest who were always ready and eager to throw off their feeling for Palestine to advance their social positions and secure for themselves the gracious regard of their anti-Palestinian neighbors.

Together with Herold, I went over the complete list of Louisiana key people, and he selected therefrom those names of people with whom he was acquainted, and who he felt would be effective in furthering the work of the Southwest Council. In Shreveport alone, Herold mentioned some 18 people, a number of whom I feel, if actively supporting the Council, would mean that the U.P.A. could count Shreveport in its pocket. Their names are: Max M. Levy, Rabbi David Lefkowitz, Rabbi Brener, Rabbi Brill, Nathan Kronenberg, Henry Kirsch, Elias Golddtein, Abe Freyer, Aaron Freedman, Isaac Abramson, Walter Wolens, E. Bernard Weiss, Louis L. Sugar, Morris Shuster, Elias Renov, Nathan Murov and Joe M. Murov.

#### Notes on above and other Shreveport individuals:

Max M. Levy is the owner of one of the largest clothing stores in Shreveport, who weldom takes an active part in Jewish communal work. He is past 70 years of age, and by wirtue of the length of his residence in Shreveport, as well as his financial standing, is very highly regarded. Max Levy considers himself a Zionist though making the definition of Zionist for himself.

Rabbi David Lefkowitz. Lefkowitz was brought into Shreveport as an assistant to Rabbi Brill, who is very ill. Lefkowitz has been in this community ever since the high holidays of this past year, and has made himself considerably active in all of its communal undertakings. He was one of the movers behind the federation spirit, and is extremely ambitious for the future position of Shreveport's Jewish community in the Southwest. He is a young, energetic, dynamic fellow, who gives promise of being that type of rabbi who will be a leader instead of a subservient follower. Lefkowitz professes interest in Palestine, and while not a member of the Zionist Organization, he has recently applied for membership. His attitude on Palestine is expressed best in his own words. not conceive of Palestine as a homeland for the Jews of the world. For me, it is essentially a haven of refuge for Jews from distressed communities overseas, and should ever the Jews of America be in the same position as those overseas, then for the Jews of America. But as a safeguard - as a possible buffer to reduce the sharpness of blows which the Jewish communities all over the world might suffer, we need Palestine; and to prepare and strengthen Palestine to become the motherland for its distressed children is the foremost work of all Jews." (In concrete terms, this might mean about 30% for the U.P.A.) Lefkowitz expresses a desire to assist the Council in whatever way he can. I wonder to what extent this might not mean a reflection of his own ambition. He was especially impressed when I mentioned the names of the leaders of the Council, and the communities from which they came. He asked that I supply him with whatever literature I could send, so that he might be able to place this in the hands of the members of his temple, accepted my suggestion that the Council might supply the speaker for the opening federation function and for such other functions as might be necessary, and was more than anxious that occasional speakers be supplied for meetings of the two congregations when they hold joint services.

Nathan Kronenberg. Herold suggested that I see Kronenberg, in order to meet one of the most interesting Jewish characters in Shreveport. A good section of Shreveport's Jewish population can't make up their minds about Kronenberg. He is a gambler, playing the horses, and makes his whole living by games of chance. His particular value is in fund-raising activities. He is very generous, if he is approached when he is "in the chips" and will also extend himself to contact other Jews, not hesitating to tell them how much they should give. Many people stand in awe of him because they associate gambling with racketeering; but Herold assures me that Kronenberg's gambling is of the scientific and not racketeering variety. A very interesting character indeed!

Henry Kirsch. Kirsch is one of the younger members of Shreveport's Jewish community, who is an insurance agent. His particular value is that he is both a Zionist and a good worker. He is always active on behalf of Jewish community functions, and for this reason, has a say, and gets a hearing in Jewish community circles.

Elias Goldstein, brother-in-law to Sidney Herold. Goldstein is described as a Bourbon, reactionary but respected member of Shreveport's Jewish community. Goldstein is a lawyer. His interests in Palestine are all anti- but, if Palestine's danger is increased, Herold expresses the opinion that Goldstein would lose a lot of his disinterest. Goldstein, too, is very much respected among the non-Jewish community. He was formerly President of the Shreveport Community Chest, and has been selected for numerous local official posts.

Abe Freyer. Not particularly well liked by Sidney Herold, but a highly regarded member of Shreveport's community by the other Jews. To Herold, Freyer verges on being a shyster. Among other people, this feeling is ascribed to Herold, because of the competitive relationship in which he and Freyer stand. Freyer is now one of the vice-presidents of the Supreme Lodge of B'nai B'rith. He wrote the Constitution of the Jewish Federation, and was one of the active spiritual fathers. Sidney Herold, notwithstanding, Abe Freyer is a man whose influence on our side would be very valuable in Shreveport. From what I understand, he is not a Zionist, and is not inclined to Zionism, but could be influenced on a minimum program of pro-Palestinian activity. I don't know what this would result in to us in dollars and cents.

Isaac Abramson, a young lawyer, who is doing exceptionally well. Abramson is vice-president of the Zionist District of Shreveport, and his future as a communal leader seems to be assured. He is a young man, and is worthy of our cultivation for what benefits we might derive from it in future days.

<u>Aaron Freedman</u>, past treasurer of the United Jewish Appeal drive in Shreveport, and a member of the Zionist Organization. I was unable to secure much information concerning Freedman, and was unfortunate in not being able to establish telephonic contact with him in order to be able to speak with him.

Rabbi Abram Brill. For a long time the foremost religious leader of Shreveport, but who now is suffering from a serious heart ailment and paralysis. Most people feel that his days are number, and that even if he were to recover, he would be unable to carry on any active life as heretofore.

Rabbi Leo Brener, rabbi of the orthodox congregation. Brener is very young-looking, but is probably close to 40. Brener has permitted the initiative of Jewish communal life to pass out of his hands altogether, and into those of Rabbi David Lefkowitz. There isn't even a toss-up between the two young rabbis. Lefkowitz, if he continues in the Shreveport pulpit, will sooner than later be the dominating religious leader and communal influence of the two.

Walter Wolens, cousin to Louis and Joe Wolens, of Corsicana, and son-in-law of Nathan Murov. Wolens is an ex-president of Shreveport Zionist District, and because of his father-in-law's more than active interest in Palestine, continues his work on behalf of the Yishuv. Wolens is considered a good speaker, and a young man who should be motivated to greater activity in the communal life of Shreveport than he has heretofore assumed. He is very superior to young Joe Murov, and will probably take the place of Nathan Murov in the Jewish communal picture.

E. Bernard Weiss, president of the reform congregation, and one of the most active workers behind the present federation movement. It was Weiss who, eight years ago, attempted to organize a federation in Shreveport, but who failed because of Herold's opposition to it. Weiss is about 50 years of age, and his leadership in Shreveport is bound to grow, if the federation becomes a success. It is known as his baby. Sidney Herold recently refused to accept the chairmanship of the federation, though I urged him to reconsider. He has suggested E. Bernard Weiss for the job, and the chances are that if Herold does not take the chairmanship, Weiss will.

Louis L. Sugar, president of the orthodox congregation, and past president of the United Jewish Appeal drive in Shreveport. Sugar is also one of the most active in the founding of the Shreveport Federation. He is a young man grown tired. He feels that once the federation is definitely organized, his work in the community will be finished, and he will devote himself to a minimum of activity. He claims that the pressure of his business will prevent his active participation and welcomes the federation, I think, because it means that he will have to do less work.

Nathan Murov is one of the oldest Zionists in America. He was extremely active on behalf of the World Zionist Organization when Herzl was its president, and used to attend the conventions of that group until a little after the post-war years. At that time his health gave out, and he has had to take things easy. More recently, he has developed coronary disorders, and on the advice of his physician has withdrawn altogether from his business, to which he attends for about one or two hours every two weeks. He guards his health very closely, and rests as much as possible. Murov will not be able to serve us in any way.

Joe M. Muroy. This boy is not to be confused with Joe Murov (the son of Nate Murov). There are about four Murov families in Shreveport. Joe M. was secretary of last year's U.J.A. He is a young man only about 28, extremely energetic and a most effective federation worker. Almost single-handedly, he collected the outstanding pledges which Shreveport made to the United Jewish Appeal to where, to date, only about \$150 remains to be brought in. He is very much liked by all the Jewish community in Shreveport, and his election to the board of the federation is a reward for his excellent services up till now. Together with the other young men mentioned above, our attention should be directed to Joe M. Murov for cultivation as a U.P.A. man.

Mrs. Sam Rubenstein, President of Hadassah. This is a surprise. The Rubenstein family is one of the richest in Shreveport, owing the largest department store in town. Both Sam and Sol Rubenstein are anti-Zionist, or at least harbor no feelings of sympathy for Palestine. Mrs. Rubenstein's presidency of Hadassah has revolutionized the complexion of Hadassah's membership, resulting in the wives of the richest and foremost individuals in the community becoming members of that organization. Mrs. Rubenstein can be utilized for meetings of an intimate nature to which she could invite the outstanding Shreveport leaders to meet with well-known pro-Palestinian visitors to Shreveport.

The fact that Palestine may soon be invaded is established by all reports. But until that event occurs American Jewry, reflecting the policy pursued by the American Government, must give all assistance to that community which, in an area of indecision and of betrayal, has stood firmly and unequivocally with Great Britain.

Even in this uncertain hour, when the Yishuv awaits all eventualities with courage and confidence in its ultimate future, the mistakes of Great Britain cannot be overlooked. Its policy in Palestine stemmed from the stupidity of appeasement, whose bitter fruits the British themselves are now tasting throughout the Middle East. That policy was responsible for the MacDonald White Paper. It is responsible for the failure to enroll the tens of thousands of young Jews who have begged for arms to fight for their land and their people. The American Government is reported to be rushing reinforcements of material to the Suez area. Whether those reinforcements will be distributed adequately to serve for Palestine's defense, the coming days will tell. There is much for which Great Britain must atone to the Jewish people. Not the least was its rejection of the handclasp of loyalty and support which has been extended by the Jews of Palestine since the beginning of hostilities in Europe.

Inner security has been the keynote of Jewish revival in Palestine.

Certain of their right to live, the Chalutzim have had the normal complement of dignity, self-respect and courage. It is with these qualities that they have withstood the dislocations and hardships of pseudo-war. It is with these virtues that they await the resolution of the present uncertainty.

Is it too much to hope that the Jews of America, 6,000 miles away from the scene of action, will match in their own way the inner confidence and the outer heroism of the Yishuv? Once again it is time to remind the Jews of America that the rebuilding of the Jewish National Home involves more than the finding of refuge for a single Jew or for groups of individual Jews. The historic purpose of the Zionist movement is to create a free homeland where the nucleus of a national life, with all its ramifications, may be established. This fundamental program has not varied through the years. But there was always a tendency to allow emphasis on the philanthropic aspects of the movement to overshadow its basic purposes. In a time of crisis, such submersion of the genuine values would result in moral and intellectual confusion.

The work in Palestine goes on; it will continue until irresistible physical force halts or impedes its progress. Until that time it is our moral responsibility to sustain the physical and moral resources of that Jewish community, which is the pride of world Jewry; for the brave men and women of Palestine, of all Jews in the world, have the privilege of fighting against Hitlerism and at the same time of defending their Homeland.

The war will end, and peace must bring easement to the plight of the Jewish people. It will have to include the provision of the resettlement of millions of Jews who will be unable to remain in the countries of their origin. Whatever be the emergencies of war, so long as freedom survives, so long as justice and humanity survive in this world, Palestine will continue to be, as it has been for thousands of years, the center of the Jewish hope for the redemption and rehabilitation of the Jewish people.

Is this to anticipate criticism of its failure to give any of its support to Herzog? I notice that the Hadassah has made a contribution of \$10,000 to Herzog's fund. Why isn't the UPA getting any credit for what it has done? I think we are a bit slow on the trigger when it comes to capitalizing on favorable publicity for the UPA. We are going to pay the money anyhow and we might have used the departure of Herzog to win the good will of the orthodox forces

I notice that the Hadassah has made a contribution of \$10,000 to Herzog's fund. Why isn't the UPA getting any credit for what it has done? I think we are a bit slow on the trigger when it comes to capitalizing on favorable publicity for the UPA. We are going to pay the money anyhow and we might have used the departure of Herzog to win the good will of the orthodox forces in the country by synchronizing his departure with our cause. I do not know why the action of the UPA should have been stalled by anything that Kaplan is doing in Palestine. Ours was to be a campaign expense. It was voted by the Administrative Committee and three people were to decide the amount. That should have been done and that should still be done. Decisions of the Administrative Committee should not be circumvented.

I trust that the decision of the Administrative Committee not to sign the agreement of the JDC before the item under question is disposed of will be strictly adhered to.

Dear Dr. Silver:

This refers to your letter of May 22nd regarding Rabbi Herzog.

No publicity was given to the action of the Executive Committee of the UPA in voting to "guarantee" \$25,000 for the year to Chief Rabbi Herzog through payments to be made by the Jewish Agency in Jerusalem, because of my telephone conversation with you. You indicated that you wished this matter to be handled otherwise than had been determined upon by the Executive Committee.

It had been overlooked that at a meeting on April 24th of the Administrative Committee of the UPA, "the Chairman designated Dr. Silver, Mr. Lipsky, Mr. Rosenbloom and Judge Rothenberg to act as a committee to formulate the manner in which the UPA wished to be helpful to Chief Rabbi Herzog". Under the circumstances, therefore, the action could not be published because it had not yet been taken.

The minutes of the Executive Committee have not yet been issued and are largely being held up on account of this same item. The minutes state that the Executive Committee, having heard a statement by Chief Rabbi Herzog of special requirements in Palestine, and having heard from the Jewish Agency in Jerusalem that it has been called upon by Chief Rabbi Herzog to make grants for the same purposes, voted to cable the Jewish Agency Executive in Jerusalem to pay out to Chief Rabbi Herzog 500 pounds a month, or \$25,000 a year. In view of the fact that the Jewish Agency had paid out 1,000 pounds already and was "considering" further payments, the Jewish Agency was to be advised by the UPA that the full amount for the year was being "guaranteed" by the UPA and that such payments were to be made by the Jewish Agency.

# United Palestine appeal

A final meeting was held on Friday afternoon at the office of the United Jewish Appeal, to dispose of the matter of reimbursement to the agencies of expenses incurred prior to the reconstitution of the United Jewish Appeal.

In addition to Mr. Greenman, there were Dr. Solomon Lowenstein and Mr. Joseph C. Hyman for the Joint Distribution Committee, and Judge Rothenberg and myself for the UPA, as well as accountants for both organizations, including Mr. Bernard J. Reis for the UPA.

All outstanding items were disposed of, so that now the agreement may be signed. The UPA will receive the entire sum that it had originally requested of the United Jewish Appeal.

The agreement is now being prepared and should be in your hands for signature by Tuesday or Wednesday at the latest, but there is nothing further now to hold up the signing of the agreement. It was a very wearying process but certainly worthwhile in terms of the financial returns to the UPA.

#### PART II

#### Page 2

"The Joint Distribution Committee today, as in the past, is paying for transportation to Palestine of refugees from Hungary, Rumania, Yugoslavia and Central European countries."

Indeed, there was a time when the Hicem paid the fares (out of the monies put at its disposal by the JDC, the ICA and the British Consul) of all holders of immigration certificates for Palestine who couldn't afford the expense. But since the outbreak of the war, though the JDC still contributes to a certain extent for Palestine immigration costs, it has become much more conservative in its giving. For the most part, the JDC insisted on the participation of the Zionist funds (UPA, Hadassah, Jewish Agency, Jerusalem), and in some cases they left it entirely to these funds to provide the money required.

"It is of interest to note that during 1940 alone the J.D.C. spent \$636,000, or 10% of its total expenditures in that year, for preparation and transportation of emigrants to Palestine."

In a separate memorandum I have dealt with this method of publishing statements without attempting in any way to show how the figures are arrived at. Should the question of the participation of the JDC in the expenses for transportation to Palestine be discussed at any time in the Allotment Committee, the first thing to be done is to ask them to submit a detailed and itemized account of their figures.

#### Page 3

"Achedule 1 is a recapitulation, showing that over 9,000 people can be emigrated during the first six months of 1941 provided \$2,875,000 can be made available by the J.D.C. This is exclusive of emigration from Greater Germany with funds made available through emigration clearance arrangements."

The proposed emigration scheme is: 3500 from France; 3000 from Lithuania; 1250 from Holland, Belgium and Luxembourg; 500 from Yugoslavia; 1000 from other countries (including Switzerland, Portugal, Italy, Rumania, etc.)

It is rather doubtful that it will be possible to emigrate 1250 people from Hobland, Belgium and Luxembourg during the first half of 1941.

So far there is no working clearence arrangement for financing their emigration. Incidentally, why is the emigration cost per person \$400 from Luxembourg, but only \$300 from Holland and Belgium?

Under changed conditions, it is open to doubt that 500 refugees will be emigrated from Yugoslavia and an unspecified number from Rumania. The question is whether the German authorities will permit emigration from these countries now under Nazi control, and also whether it would be possible for the JDC to set up clearance arrangements with these countries. It is difficult to understand why the emigration cost per person is \$100 from Yugoslavia and \$300 from Rumania.

#### Pages 4 and 5 - Schedule 2

#### POLAND

The amount expected from the JDC for the first six months of 1941 is \$3,200,000, equal to 32,000,000 zlotys. This is in addition to the amount to be contributed by Polish Jewry itself. There is no indication of what local collections will amount to. It is, however, interesting to note that the financial assistance rendered by the JDC during the whole year of 1940 amounted to \$640,000, which is exactly 1/5 of the amount budgeted for a six-months! period in 1941. In a previous memorandum I explained why it would not be possible for the JDC to dispose of \$3,200,000 through emigration clearance arrangements.

#### Page 5 - Schedule 3 and 4

#### GERMANY and AUSTRIA

The amounts required are:

Berlin: \$895,000 for six months in 1941, as against \$462,000

expended during nine months in 1940.

Vienna: \$706,000 for six months in 1941, as against \$303,000

expended during nine months in 1940.

Of the 2,820 persons whose emigration from Germany is to be financed with the help of the \$895,000, 420 are supposed to go to Palestine. There are grave doubts as to the possibility of organizing any emigration from Germany to Palestine during the first half of 1941 owing to the changed situation in the Balkans and Middle East.

### Page 6 - Schedules 5 and 6

#### BOHEMIA-MORAVIA and SLOVAKIA

A total of \$652,000 is expected from the JDC for the first six months of 1941 to be

paid through emigration clearance as against \$231,000 expended during the first nine months of 1940. But it is not clear, either from the schedules or from the text as to how many people it is proposed to emigrate from these countries through this financial assistance.

#### Pages 6 - 14

#### FRANCE, HUNGARY, RUMANIA & OTHER COUNTRIES

It is probably not worthwhile to enalyze in detail those sections dealing with relief programs for the rest of Europe. Since the date of publication (January 31, 1941) the many changes in the European political scene which have taken place and which are momently occurring, will doubtless compel the JDC to revise its relief program accordingly.

But it is interesting to compare the amounts requested in the "Program" for a six-months' period with the amounts actually spent in 1940 during a period of nine months—to give several examples:

#### Pages 14 -16

#### BATIN AMERICA

\$327,060 is expected from the JDC for expenditures on behalf of refugees in Central and South America to assist the local committees in providing food, clothing, shelter, medical care, educational training, etc. The reason given is that "Local refugee aid committees in Latin America have had but a short experience in the financing and conduct of relief aid work. The complementary financial support which the J.D.C. offers is therefore of primary importance." I do not know exactly what "complementary" means. But the fact is that according to Schedule 20, the estimated local collections amount to \$48,870, while the contribution of the JDC is budgeted at \$327,060.

#### Pages 17 and 18

#### CULTURAL-RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS

The JDC is most eager to state that "more than 50% of the Cultural Committee's appropriations during 1940 were allocated to Palestine institutions."—sixty yeshivoth, school organizations and cultural-religious groups were subventioned "which received no assistance from any of the Zionist funds." This may be quite true. But the point is that the total amount spent for religious-cultural activities is only 1.2% of the total expenditures of the JDC. During the first nine months of 1940 cultural-religious outlay aggregated \$65,366 out of a total expenditure of \$5,216,500. This sum, \$65,366, includes their regular contribution to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, which is certainly subsidized by Zi6nist funds.

Therefore, at best, their contribution to the sixty yeshivoth, etc. can have amounted to \$25,000 to \$30,000.

#### PART III

#### THE POST-WAR PERIOD

In setting forth Jewish needs in 1941 and in submitting its "Program and Budget" for the first six months of this year, the JDC also gives consideration to the post-war situation. They admit that there will be a "wast post-war migration problem", in which Central and South America will play a decisive role. There is the United States, of course, but it "can admit only up to the quota maximum", while in Latin America, "The need for new blood, for farm and factory and professional workers, for entrepreneurs, for alert and capable immigrants of all types is recognized, and their immigration on a large scale is desired. During the period 1933 through 1940, but largely during the past three years, nearly 110,000 Jewish refugees have found a new home in these countries. If they successfully adapt themselves to their new environment it is reasonable to expect that untold thousands of Jews will be admitted during the coming years."

At the moment the outlook is not very hopeful, but this is due only to the regrettable fact that "Because of insufficient funds, the J. D. C. had to curtail its operations in Central and South America in 1940. This resulted in more than suffering and hardship on the part of the destitute and needy among the newcomers. It threatened directly and indirectly, the security of all the Jews. The good reputation which they were building and in which they were beginning to be held by the governments of those countries was undermined. Nazi propagandists, sensitive to weaknesses, did not fail to take advantage of the situation."

After the war, in addition to the United States which will admit refugees "up to the quota maximum" and to Latin America which will accept "untold thousands of Jews", Europe remains, where "many" Jews will be able to build their lives anew. "Great Britain, aided materially and morally by the United States, is waging a battle not only for self-preservation but for the preservation of the sanctities of civilization. The J.D.C. is waging a campaign to keep alive many of the people who will resume a constructive role in the Europe Britain is struggling to free."

One can, of course, question their analysis of the post-war period and ask whether it is based on wishful thinking or upon reality. The significant point is that in outlining to the American Jewish and non-Jewish public the prospects for the future fate of European Jewry, the role which Palestine may play is not mentioned with so much as one word.

You will have seen the Tuesday, May 27th issue of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency Bulletin which finally contains a summary of the statement issued by the Committee on the Referendum with respect to the balloting of the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds. But it also contains a reply by Mr. Sidney Hollander, President of the Council.

Following your telephone call to me on Monday morning, I communicated with Mr. Boris Smolar, Editor of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, and inquired why, although the item had been sent to him by the Committee on the Referendum last Thursday, it had not yet appeared on Monday. He replied that the Bulletin had been crowded for space and that it would appear tomorrow, that is, Tuesday.

It is now apparent why the J.T.A. waited until Tuesday in order to publish the item released by the Committee on the Referendum. It was solely to give the Council of Federations time to attach its reply on the same date. If this is called straightforward journalism rather than partisan Jewish communal politics, I have yet to learn what standard journalism is.

It has been clear from the very beginning that when there was a dispute between the forces represented by the wealthy backers of the J.T.A. and by those who might oppose them on any issue whatsoever, that the latter would always be given the worst end of the deal.

I know that you have been very patient with the J.T.A. for a long time and have been a member of its board, but it is very clear that unless one can buy his way into the affections of the J.T.A., one cannot expect a decent deal.

- 2 -May 27, 1941 Dr. Abba Hillel Silver Under the circumstances it becomes more than ever obvious that in the clash of opinion in the Jewish community, there must be a channel and will be a channel for those who wish to have an opinion expressed but know that it will always be suppressed if it depends on the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. Mr. Hollander's statement is revelatory of the entire attitude of the Council of Federations. He says, in effect, (a) it is not important who won the referendum as long as the Council announced that the Council had won; and (b) that even if the Council had not won, it was immaterial what Mr. Shetzer, the Committee on the Referendum or anybody else said about it. It is clear that in this entire issue there must be a definition of policy and adherence to that policy, once formulated. It is obvious that this will involve constant debate until a conclusion is reached. I am wondering how many Zionist leaders are prepared for the irritations and the consequences of a policy of this type that will require concentration and patience. I do not know how many of the men in New York are aware of the implications of what the Council has done. Dear Leon:

Once again the Council of Jovish Federations and Welfare Funds has confused public opinion by the type of release it issued to describe the nature of the voting that look place during the recent referendum and the proposals which were adopted presumably in consequence thereof.

I assume that you have seen the statement issued by the Committee on the Referendum for Budgeting of which Simon Shetser is Chairman, taking direct issue with the Council of Federations on both the manner in which the votes were counted and on the proposals themselves. I am attaching a copy for your information in the event that it has not renched you previously. In addition there was the article which I wrote for the "Congress Weekly" in its issue of May 23rd. Please let me know if you have not yet seen it so that I may rush you a copy. The manner in which the votes were tabulated was analyzed.

I should like to sall these points to your attention;

miscounted the votes and did not give adequate consideration to the number agencies which voted to reject the proposal for the establishment of a national budgeting advisory committee. Thus, when the Council announcement stated that there were 54 communities accepting the proposal, and 53 rejecting, they were not stating the facts even as the Council knew them to be true, for in the Bulletin issued by the Council on May 26th to its member agencies there is a listing of the communities which accepted and rejected and of those "in which no action was taken or no information received prior to May 18, 1941."

In the latter list asterisks appear mexito Long Beach, Galifornia; Hingara Falls, New York; Pintiac, Michigan; Seranton, Pennsylvania; Selma, Alabama; Sheboygan, Michigan and Waterbury, Connecticut - a total of seven cities. The asterisk is explained as follows by the Council: "Information subsequently received on action of agency on referendum." What is meant by this phrase is this; on Saturday, May 17th, when the Board of Directors of the Council of Federations met, the executive staff of the Council

gave an inadequate report. The Committee on the Referendum gave more comprehensive information and inquired why the votes of these seven cities had not been counted. The Council declared that it had not received any ballots from them. The Committee on the Referendum communicated immediately with each of these cities andSan Sunday morning, May 18th, the Board of Directors of the Council had before it telegrams from the seven cities stating that they had voted to reject the proposal and that they demanded that their votes be counted as such in the tabulation. Even though the Board of Directors was engaged in a two-day session and even though each of the seven telegrams was read to the members of the Board, the Board decided that it could not count these messages because the ballots had not been in "on May 17th." Legally and morally, therefore, 54 communities accepted the proposal, and 60 rejected it. It may be and is argued that the 54 communities, since they constituted "member agencies" of the Council, were entitled to express an opinion on the referendum. I should like to point out, however, that at the meeting of the Council in Atlanta in February much was made of the fact that the Council did not know which agencies were entitled to vote and which did not have the right to vote. The committee that was to be named would go into such questions. The committee made no such study of any such question. That is why the New York Federation of Philanthropic Societies, which has no relation whatsoever to fund-raising for national and overseas purposes in New York City, was permitted to vote. That is why such bodies as the Altoona Federation, the Atlanta Federation, the Baltimore Associated Jewish Charities, the Bridgeport Children's Society, the Buffalo Jewish Federation, the Chicago Jewish Charities, the Kansas City United Jewish Charities, the Los Angeles Federation, the New Orleans Jevish Charitable Federation, the St. Louis Jewish Federation, the San Francisco Federation of Jewish Charities, the Seattle Jewish Welfere Society and similar bedies were permitted to vote in support of the majority proposal.

It is of interest to note that the 53 communities which the Council of Pederations recorded as having opposed the proposal were all entitled morally to vote on the issue, because in each instance the agency was actually involved in raising funds for national and overseas purposes, whereas at least half of the 54 cities voting to support the majority proposal have nothing whatever to do with national and overseas fund-raising.

The question that must be asked is this: Can people who will so tamper with a vote be trusted? I am tired of using pleasant words to describe unpleasant actions. There are some who say that it is unfair and malicious to ascribe sinister purposes to officers of the Council of Federations merely because they are in favor of a national budgeting advisory service. I have understood and still understand the sincerity of those who genuinely believe that national budgeting is the key to many of our communal problems. But how can one refrain from suspecting the motives of people when they will engage in a fraud as barefaced as that which has just been perpetrated by the Council in counting the ballots used in the referendum.

(b) At Atlanta it was assumed that a fair-minded committee representing various points of view would be selected by the Council

The members of the committee who were appointed and who approved the proposal were: Jacob Blaustein, Chairman, Solomon Lowenstein, William Rosenweld, William J. Shroder, Edward M. M. Marburg, Ira M. Younker and Sidney Hollander, all of whom without exception are associated with the name group which, as is obvious, is not the United Palestine Appeal group. Bo representation was given to a body like the Committee on the Referendum for Budgeting with which were associated all the communities which rejected the proposal. No attempt was made to include on the committee of the Committee to Studyy Mational Budgeting Proposals, which had been previously adopted by the Council and out of which arose the minority report. They knew, for example, the position of Dr. Silver on this whole matter. Dr. Silver was present at Atlanta. He is the Chairman of a Welfare Mund. But even he was not included on this to study the referendum and to make recommendations on the basis of it.

. Section (3)A. of the "Program for 1941" reads as

follows:

"The National Advisory Budget Committee should address itself in 1941 to an examination and analysis of the organizations engaged in overseas. Palestine or refugee service, that function in the same or related fields of service or that supplement or relate to the work of the UJA organizations; but this limitation shall not prevent the National Advisory Budget Committee from considering

and reporting on the UJA agencies should necessity arise. The Council advisory budget service for 1941 shall work collatorally with, and supplement, the work of the Allotment Committee and the Inquiry of the UJA, and will at all times hold itself in readiness to ecoperate with them."

I draw your attention to this fact: that when the proposals were originally presented at Atlanta it was stated that if and when the United Jewish Appeal would be reconstituted, the National Advisory Budgeting Committee would have no relation to the United Jewish Appeal. But what has been done now is to say that even though the United Jewish Appeal has been reconstituted this National Budgeting Committee will insert itself into the situation, and in the event that there is some unentiefsectory decision by the Allotment Committee of the United Jewish Appeal, it will have the right - self-assumed - to take any action that it chooses. What other purpose has this provision than to frustrate the autonomous action of the UJA Allotment Committee in which the United Palestine Appeal is majorized already.

- 2. The Council of Federations apparently feels that it can soothe the opponents of its program by saying that it is merely "for 1941." Thus it hopes that no one will object to the institution of a basic system which can be carried on and expanded in 1942 and thereafter. It is obviously easier to expand a system than to institute a new one. It is on that basis that once again the "public relations counsellors" of the Counnil of Federations have advised a streamlined psychology in mollifying opposition.
- 3. In Section (4) of its report entitled "Program Beyond 1941" appears the following paragraph:

The National Advisory Budget Committee shall undertake to study all developments and progress made during 1941 and make recommendations to the Board of Directors of the Council on the program of service to be undertaken in 1942. It shall advise the Board on the values of its 1941 services, utilisation by member agencies and other pertinent facts. It shall recommend to the Board the fields of work and organisations to be studied in 1942 and such extension of its functions in evaluations and budget recommendations to communities as may seem desirable."

In other words, the Council is already planning evaluations for 1942, when the majority of the Jewish communities in America have clearly indicated that they want no such service from the Council.

I fear that the soft-spoken, self-righteous words of the officers of the Council, and the natural reluctance of most Jewish leaders to engage in controversy may permit one of the most serious effenses against Jewish public opinion in America in the development of a standardized system of controlling and muzzling Jewish organizations.

If the officers of the Council wanted to allay suspicion in that direction they have done nothing in the past four menths to indicate their

good faith. On the contrary, they have given additional foundation to the belief of many of us that theirs is a deliberate, systematic program for controlling Javish life so that it shall not "get out of hand."

I have written to you at this length in the hope that you may be able to attend the meeting of the Mast Central States Region of the Council of Federations at Columbus on June 14th and 15th, and there express your opinion in your characteristic fachion. It is an issue of transcendant importance, because if Welfare Funds and the consolidation of Welfare Funds are eventually to monopolize all of Jewish activities, the instrument will have been forged to channel Jewish public opinion in only one direction.

My thought is that a resolution sught to be introduced at the meeting of the East Central States Region taking exception to the manner in which the referendum balloting was conducted and calling upon the Council, in view of the nature of the results and in view of the contents of the proposals adopted by the Board of Directors of the Council, to halt its program and to take into consultation representatives of communities which rejected the proposal so that there may truly be a consensus of opinion as to what is desired in the field of fact-finding.

On Thursday, May 29th, Mr. Joseph C. Hyman, Mr. Harry Lurie and I met at Hyman's office for the purpose of discussing informally Council representatives with regard to the Allotment Committee in the 1941 United Jewish Appeal. It was understood that no commitments were made by anyone and that the conversation was purely exploratory in character.

I was asked by both Mr. Hyman and Mr. Lurie whether the U.P.A. had indicated whether it wished the continuation on the Allotment Committee for 1941 of the four men who had served as the Welfare Fund representatives on the 1940 U.J.A. Allotment Committee, that is, Harris Perlstein, David Watchmaker, Henry Wineman and Fred Butzel (Wineman and Butzel had interchanged).

My reply was that the U.P.A. had not had an opportunity to discuss the Allotment Committee and therefore I could not say whether these four men were or were not desired to serve again.

During the discussion, Mr. Lurie suggested various other names which the Council might be prepared to offer on a panel, although he indicated that the Council would prefer to have the 1940 members continue to serve. Mr. Perlstein has said that he would not serve again, but Mr. Lurie believed that he might be persuaded to do so. Mr. Watchmaker had also indicated his unreadiness to serve again, but Messrs. Wineman and Butzel were prepared to serve. The other names that the Council might submit for consideration by the U.P.A. and J.D.C. include:

The names which seem to strike a chord of response were those of Frederick Greenman, the lawyer who had served in the reconstitution of the U.J.A. and in the matter of the reimbursements of expenses from the 1941 U.J.A., Mr. Arthur Meyer, Chairman of the New York State Mediation Board, with whom I am not familiar, Mr. Leon Sunstein, Chairman of the Philadelphia Allied Jewish Appeal for the last two years, Mr. George Z. Medalie, who is now President of the New York Federation and a long-time Zionist as well as former U. S. Attorney for the Southern District of New York, and Amos Deinard, with whom you are undoubtedly familiar.

My own feeling is that we should accelorate the nomination of members of the Allotment Committee so that no opportunity may be given to the Council to insert itself into the situation. This is especially necessary in view of the fact that the J.D.C. and the Council will probably say that they were very much in favor of having the old members of the Allotment Committee remain, whereas the U.P.A. had not expressed an opinion.

During the conversation Mr. Lurie said that the Council of Federations had drawn up a list of some fifteen people as a panel from among whom they were planning to invite membership on the National Budgetting Advisory Committee. In discussing the possible members of the Allotment Committee, Mr. Hyman felt that Joseph Goldstein could not properly be considered a neutral because he had strongly represented the so-called Zionist position at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Council in New York on May 17th. As it happens, Mr. Goldstein had endorsed the budgetting proposals as submitted at the May 17th meeting, although he had very vigorously tried to indicate the unfairness of the procedure that was being followed. Dear Mr. Hollander:

I have just received a copy of your letter dated May 20, 1941, addressed to Rabbi James G. Heller, of Cincinnati. I am amazed to find that you state I "agreed that the action of the Board was eminently fair and reasonable to all concerned". On the contrary, I think I made it very clear that I personally felt that the result of the referendum was obviously a repudiation by American Jewry of the proposal - sometimes called the "Hollander" Proposal, and at other times the "Blaustein" Proposal, - originally made by the Council, that the Council should abandon that proposal in its entirety, and I predicted that the charge would be made that the Board of the Council of Faderations would be charged with having "rigged" the referendum election in order to justify the action it had determined to take.

After the Board refused to adopt the numerous amendments proposed by those who were definitely opposed to Mr. Blaustein's report - particularly after the impassioned appeal of Mr. Schanfarber for communal harmony in American Jewry, an appeal which was immediately followed by the comments of Mr. Younker, who in his candor betrayed the bitter anti-Zionism which motivated his support of the proposal, I felt so keenly about the entire matter that I refused to attend the sessions of the Board called for the following day. I had endured all the heartaches I could stand.

You may also recall the "gentlemanly" manner in which Mr. Shroder suggested that I might leave the meeting when I expressed the opinion, at the very beginning of the session, that it was grossly improper for the Board of the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds to meet on the morning of the Sabbath. Let me assure you that in the many years of my association with national and local Jewish agencies, I have never head of a business meeting called by any such organization on the Sabbath. It did not contribute to my peace of mind to find that my protest was not supported by a single individual at the meeting, but on the contrary was apparently looked upon as the querulous complaint of a fanatic. When Mr. Shroder called me out of order and stated that the question of meetings on the Sabbath would be considered as one of the last items of the agenda the following day, he added insult to injury.

In view of the fact that my unequivocal opposition to the action of the Board could not be misconstrued by you as approval of its fairness and reasonableness. I have come to the conclusion that I owe it to myself, as well as to the U.P.A. to notify Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver that I shall no longer serve as the representative of the U.P.A. on the Board of the Council. Perhaps my successor will meet with better success in making himself understood.

Dear Dr. Silver:

It has been evident for a long time that there is a cleavage in outlook on Jewish problems between several groups in America. That has been made manifest in various ways during the past year. You were the center of several of the most important of these manifestations of differences of view.

It is clear that if these differences are to find an outlet in public expression the channels do not exist at the present time.

At one time there were two agencies catering to the English-Jewish press of the country. These were the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and the Seven Arts Feature Syndicate. Whatever might have been the merits of either, the very existence of two competing agencies was beneficial, for in one avenue or another there was an opportunity for reaching opinion in the many communities which have English-Jewish weeklies.

But for some years now this condition has no longer existed. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency is owned, lock, stock and barrel, by the people who believe that the utterance of a point of view which differs from their own constitutes treason. The Seven Arts Feature Syndicate is owned by the American Jewish Committee, which is identical, for all purposes, with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. Thus, today any point of view that might be described as interested in Palestine or in Jewish nationalism or in freedom of expression on any topic cannot, except under the most adverse circumstances, find any channel through the existing two syndicates supplying the English-Jewish press of the country. I know from personal experience that articles as well as news are submitted to a censorship before they are released.

I have felt for years that this constituted a situation which was most deplorable. It was evident from the experience of the Palcor News Agency that competition is healthy for difference of opinion. Because Palcor existed during the past seven years the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was much more sympathetic in its treatment of its Palestine news than it would have been otherwise. There was always an agency to check on the accuracy of its Palestine stories and an agency that stimulated it to competitive effort which meant more, and sometimes better, news on Palestine.

It is with these facts in mind and fully impressed with the need of having an instrumentality for the expression of differences of opinion on any subject in American Jewish life that I am joining with several others in the creation of a new syndicate for the English-Jewish press. It will provide the English-Jewish papers of the country with all the material they could possibly use, including news, feature articles, columns, and other material of interest. Its capacity to run will, of course, be determined by the meager resources it can obtain. It is not a venture designed to extort funds from backers who may be encouraged to support an institution because of the personal interest they have in seeing that a specific point of view will prevail. In other words, the syndicate will not in any way compete in the fund-raising aspects with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

It might have been thought for a time, as I know you did, that it would be possible to exercise a mollifying influence over the Jewish Telegraphic Agency by sharing in some of the costs of that agency. But it has long been evident that no group of people having ideas rather than funds at its disposal would be able to compete in the money market with the present backers of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, which, although a completely private institution, masquerades as an organ for public service.

This syndicate should have the moral backing of a number of leaders of Jewish public opinion in America. It would be equipped with a staff small enough not to involve too great costs but adequate enough to deal efficiently and productively with the journalistic functions involved. It is not intended that any persons except members of the staff shall be publicly identified with the enterprise except for an editorial board which is now being composed.

I should appreciate it greatly in a personal way if you would find it possible to join that editorial board. To my mind the formation of this syndicate is one of the important steps that must now be taken to wrest control of the channels of public opinion from those who have for so long dominated it and who are now using those channels for purposes with which I know you do not have any sympathy.

Dear Mr. Levinthal:

I'm sorry the COUNCIL meeting caused you so much "heartache". Sorry - and surprised:

As long as you've been in Jewish work, you should be used to being on the losing side now and then. Certainly I am! Almost always I'm in the minority, but it doesn't disturb me in the least. It's part of the "democratic process" that we all brag about but don't like to accept.

Reviewing your comments, I can't agree that the COUNCIL should have postponed action on expanding its present budget advisory services. For years, many
of our members have been urging us to go beyond our present program. As you know,
the referendum clearly pointed up the demand for more intensive "fact finding";
but many went beyond that, and favored evaluations of agencies by representatives
of the Welfare Funds that provide their support.

The COUNCIL depended on this referendum to indicate how extensive such a demand was, and I think the returns showed that clearly. Laying aside for the moment any question as to who was "majority" and who was "minority", the large number voting for the full proposed Program, plus those opposing the complete program but favoring expansion of present services, seemed unquestionably to call for some action.

I know the COUNCIL Board tried conscientiously to decide on a course that would do justice to all points of view. Apparently its decision didn't please you; I'm not sure it pleased me, either. I think we might have gone farther.

Actually the course we adopted is being even more severely criticized by cities wanting the full services than by those wanting no change. That was to be expected! However from the long point of view, I suppose our decision to expand present services only moderately and await results before doing more, was sound. If the results are good, we can go further. The future itself will determine next steps.

It might be well to remind you of two factors relating to this whole subject. First, that the COUNCIL, unlike the J.D.C., the U.P.A., and so many other agencies, has no program of its own. It exists only to provide such services as its members request. And by that I don't mean only services that all its members request; whenever there are a sufficient number asking some special sort of assistance, the COUNCIL has always tried to provide it. That's its job! Second, - any community not wishing to use the proposed budget-advisory service (or any other service the COUNCIL provides) can simply reject it. Whatever material the COUNCIL works up can be "waste-basketed" if it isn't helpful. We have never attempted to dominate any of our members. We try to serve, - not direct, - Jewish communities.

As to Cincinnati: Undoubtedly there is a difference between Rabbi Heller's views and those of Shroder. The offical report to the COUNCIL was as Shroder related it at the meeting. One of the Cincinnati agencies was opposed to the plan covered by the referendum; the other was in favor of it; they therefore agreed jointly not to

vote on it. - and they never did. Having so agreed, they passed a resolution indicating what they thought might be a proper substitute course for the COUNCIL. Our committee had that resolution in mind when it decided to limit so greatly the plan this year.

Finally as to the matter of a Saturday meeting. I think it's unfortunate that you didn't stay to hear the discussion on that point. In deference to your views and those of Rabbi Silver, the Board determined to try a new plan of beginning meetings on Saturday nights and running thru all of Sunday. In all likelihood, this will carry the meetings to midnight or later Saturdays, and may require abbreviating the Sunday agenda, with a view to permitting those members coming from a distance to get home in time. However, we're going to try it. I must admit that I agreed with Shroder in postponing discussion on this issue until its proper place in the agenda. You shouldn't have considered such a decision a slight to you; it was not so intended. The Board only meets twice a year, and we always have a heavy schedule; so if we did'nt follow such a procedure, we'd never get thru.

If you feel that service on the COUNCIL will cause you too many heartaches, you're quite right to withdraw. If you stay, you're almost certain to have your views overruled at times, and if you can't stand that there's no other course for you to take. The other Board members all take it for granted.

The most useful purpose of the COUNCIL is the opportunity it provides for men of divergent views and hoyalties to meet on common ground and discuss Jewish affairs with good will and in mututal respect. Out of such varying opinions there usually emerge decisions that approximate wisdom, - or so I like to think!

If you do decide to stay on, - and I hope you will, - don't get your feelings hurt and stay away every time you are out-voted. The COUNCIL would never get
anywhere if its members followed that course.

I have had an opportunity to look over the UPA proposed budget, June 1 to December 31, 1941. I note that we will be spending in 1941 \$90,000 more than in 1940. I have studied the reconciliation of 1940 and 1941 expenses contained in the proposed budget. I realize, of course, that we planned to carry on an independent campaign in 1941 and that this involved us in the early months in considerably larger expenses. But now that we are not conducting an independent campaign, I am wondering whether our expenses for the remaining six months ought not to be drastically cut. How can we justify to ourselves spending twice as much this year as last year when our income for 1941 will certainly not be greater than it was in 1940? I would suggest that you talk this matter over with Mr. Rosenbloom and with the Finance Committee.

### COOPERATION BETWEEN LOCAL AND NATIONAL AGENCIES

DISCUSSION OF A PAPER BY WILLIAM SHRODER Presented at National Conference of Jewish Social Welfare Atlantic City, June 7, 1941

# Henry Montor Executive Director United Palestine Appeal

Mr. Shroder has exposed the Jewish communal anatomy for our exploration. But in doing so he has drawn attention to the fact that it is all one body—and not a series of unrelated organs. In other words, as Mr. Hyman has so eloquently said, there is no antithesis between national agencies and local communities. In essence, a national agency is merely an extension of one of the interests of the local community.

May I suggest that there are three pillars on which the most effective cooperative relationship between national agency and local community may rest.

The first is democratic organization of the community.

The second is a recognition of the integral relationship between the local community and the national agency.

The third is the cultivation of the special interests and ideals of the community for the greatest vitality of the Welfare Fund.

I.

One of the most heartening developments of recent years has been the gradual emergence of local communities from the feudal philosophy that those who had most thought best; and that their views must be the criterion of community action. That approach has been proving inadequate; because wealth often has a tendency to shift; because developments in recent years have tended to make democracy in Jewish life no less desirable than in the larger social and economic world; because it is the mass of Jews who must determine the ultimate destiny of the Jewish people.

Communities have been finding that democratic organization is not only morally stimulating but economically profitable. One needs only to examine the phenomenal successes registered in a great many communities in the last few years to see the relationship between more funds and greater responsibility vested in the community as a whole. In the early days Welfare Funds had the attractiveness of novelty. But time and a succession of grave emergencies have worn off the novelty. Now the Welfare Funds must prove that they are sufficiently flexible and sufficiently representative of the total community interest to continue to have the generosity and sympathy of the whole community.

II.

Fortunately there are not too many Welfare Funds which have kept the position that they have made national agencies unnecessary. What is sometimes overlooked by some Welfare Funds is that they are not the competitors of but trustees for the national organizations on whose behalf they raise funds.

It has seemed to me that, in recent years, an artificial jealousy has been cultivated between national organizations and local communities, as though their interests were disparate and not identical. A new parochialism threatens Jewish life, with its emphasis on the fetish of the "local community", as though some alien octopus were trying to stranglo the freedom and existence of the local community. What created these national organizations except the nation-wide interest in the same problem and the desire to solve it through unified action?

Take, as an example, the cause of Palestine. In every land, under every form of government—including Germany and Russia today—the Zionist movement has sought expression. It has been as much a part of the national existence of the great mass of the Jewish people as its historical memory and its religious tradition. The Zionist movement has survived both inadequate understanding and hostile environment. The national will to survival has taken a variety of practical forms in terms of organization. In the United States there is a series of such national agencies devoted to the fulfillment of the ideal inherent in

Zionism. Among these is a body like the United Palestine Appeal through which the Jews of America, in their local communities, have sought to indicate their interest in and provide support to the rebuilding of the Jewish homeland. These organizations are not seeking to impose unwanted doctrines on local communities but are the instrument which these local communities have deliberately chosen as a means of translating moral support into concrete terms.

Sometimes the problem can be oversimplified. Mr. Shroder has observed that "every national agency has local partisans. These are utilized as pressure groups threatening community harmony, the very foundation of effective community organization."

The word "partisan" has overtones of criticism. It would be more complete to say that "every national agency has local <u>representatives</u>". Frequently, these representatives constitute the bulk of the whole community in terms of their interest in the particular cause.

What is a pressure group? It may be a <u>single man</u>, exercising his power by virtue of his wisdom, his influence or his means. On the other hand, <u>pressure</u> group may be merely a smear word to describe the advocates of an idea seeking wider support and implementation.

It would seem to me that the Messianic goal of the local community is not the attainment merely of "harmony", but the satisfaction of the interests of the members of the community, whether those interests be local, national or overseas. Few will contend that the obese somnolence that comes from ideological lethargy is the Paradise to which local communities are seeking admission.

There is a challenge to the Welfare Fund and to similar community organizations to recognize that cooperation with national organizations represents cooperation within the community itself.

#### III.

To what extent must there be a willingness to include in Welfare Funds the purposes of agencies as well as agencies themselves? The great majority of Jews

are catholic in their sympathies. They want to help every cause that seems helpful to Jews. But there has been a tendency in some Welfare Funds to make their appeal mechanical. They have gone on the premise that stressing of the ideological foundations of a cause might adversely affect some of their contributors. They have chosen to gloss over basic purposes in a keen desire to raise a maximum of money. The motives are laudable. But are the effects those aimed at? Do not the Welfare Funds simultaneously have the responsibility of teaching their contributors the values implicit in the agencies they support? If it be said that the national organizations alone have the function of dealing with ideologies, what contribution is the local community making to the development of a sound understanding of Jewish problems?

For how long can Jews be expected to contribute solely out of fear or out of sheer generosity? Is it not the obligation of sound planning to educate the community to an awareness of Jewish life in all its implications?

Mr. Shroder has hinted that there are divisive ideas which must be resolved in local communities. "Nor can we", he says, "close our eyes to the effect of the clash between the aims of the Zionists, inextricably tied up with the support of Polestine as more than a place of refuge, and the position of those who look for the satisfaction of their every hope in their home-land in America". I am sure that Mr. Shroder, a purist in style, must recognize the non-sequitur in that sontence. The Institute for Propaganda Analysis has words for such phrases. One can believe that Palestine must become a center for Jewish life in terms other than mere refugee settlement and yet be fully content with conditions of life in America. Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, Zionist leader, in a new book, "The World Crisis and Jewish Survival" writes: "The upbuilding of a Jewish national home in Palestine is one great, urgent and historically inescapable task of Jewry. The upbuilding of Jewish religious life in America and elsewhere throughout the world, inclusive of Palestine is another. One is no substitute for the other. One is not opposed to the other".

A time for choice is invinent for American Jews. They must be prepared to think in behalf of world Jewry or retreat in saughess to their own shells. It is hard to conceive of realistic observers who envisage the evaporation of all Jewish problems with the defeat of Hitler. Millions of Jews will need to have their problems solved—as Jews. We can doon them to the sterile, haunted, minority existence which they have known in Europe for centuries or we can help them readjust themselves to a new world. The Zionist idea is basically the contention that Jews have a right to live—even as Jews. Millions of Jews subscribe to that idea. If a Welfare Fund is more than a mechanical contrivance for people known as Jews to display their humaneness does it not have an obligation to help its members understand that basic problem? Is an American Jew, in Mr. Shroder's definition, merely a Jew concerned with his fate in America — or may he also concern himself with the fate of Jews everywhere? If the former is the answer, how futile and unpatriotic is the dream of President Roosevelt for establishment of the four freedoms throughout the world!

The future of the Welfare Funds is with the mass of Jews and not with a few isolated individuals. The war taxation program, coupled with the far greater needs that will demand more universal financial participation, will see to that. Is it not, then, the part of wisdom to link the Welfare Funds to the values and the ideals which, because of their historical continuity and their capacity to arouse Jewry emotionally and intellectually, will always be the blood stream racing to the Jewish heart?

The Welfare Funds of America, which have become increasingly the channels of local communal action, must determine whether they will utilize to the fullest the moral force and the Jewish creative power inherent in national organizations or whether they will minimize the ideas symbolized by them in an effort to create a souless Golen—presumably bigger than all the national organizations but having the intrinsic emotional and intellectual stimulus of none of them.

One thing is clear in Jewish history. Those who have ideas on the Jewish future outlive those who have no ideas but exist for the moment and for themselves. To the extent that national agencies are the levers for such ideas, the Welfare Fund can assure its strength and perpetuation by harnessing them to its own purposes.

May I take the liberty, therefore, of suggesting that it would be worthwhile for you to telephone him from Cleveland to indicate your position and to express the hope that he will not accept if called upon.

I must confess that I was quite alarmed when I saw the comparison between expenditures of 1940 and those of 1941. The first thing I did was to dismiss a \$35.00 per week man in the Publicity Department and told Dr. Martin Rosenbluth that he would have to find some other organization to bear half the cost of \$85.00 per week which he is now receiving. You will recall that you suggested that he be placed on our payroll. There is a possibility of firing an additional stemographer, but I am sure you will agree that it is a ludicrous way of economizing when tens of thousands of dollars are involved.

I had also told Abraham Revusky, our statistician who is doing a remarkable piece of work for \$30.00 a week, that he would have to go at the end of June.

And while I am telling all these people that they will have to go or that their meager salaries will have to be reduced, I think of the way in which the United Palestine Appeal is squandering its money in the direction of subsidies to organizations which serve us little.

I am attaching a copy of a letter which I sent to Mr. Charles J. Rosenbloom, together with a copy of the budget.

APPROVED AIRCRAFT - THE TERM "APPROVED AIRCRAFT WHEREVER EMPLOYED IN THIS POLICY SHALL BE HELD TO MEAN ANY AIRCRAFT OPERATED ON A PEGULAR PASSENGER SCHEDULE BY: (A) A DOMESTIC AIRLINE, INCLUDING INTER-ISLAND AIRWAYS, LTD., OF HAWAII, HOLDING A CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY ISSUED BY THE PROPER AUTHORITY OF THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT; (B) PAN AMERICAN AIRWAYS SYSTEM, BUT ONLY IN AND BETWEEN THE AMERICAS, AND BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND BERMUDA; (C) TRANS-CANADA AIR LINES; (D) CANADIAN COLONIAL AIRWAYS, LIMITED; (E) PRAIRIE AIRWAYS, LIMITED; (F) AEROVIAS NACIO NALES DE COLOMBIA; (G) ERITISH OVERSEAS AIRWAYS CORPORATION, BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND BERMUDA; (H) KONINKLIJKE LUCHTVAART MAATSCHAPPIJ (KLM OR ROYAL DUTCH AIRLINES) BUT ONLY IN ITS CARIBBEAN AND SOUTH AMERICAN SERVICES.

### COPY OF MASTER POLICY ISSUED TO EMPLOYER

## UNITED STATES FIDELITY AND GUARANTY COMPANY

IN CONSIDERATION of the payment of the premium and of the declarations set forth in the attached Aviation Group Accident Form, which is made a part hereof and is hereinafter referred to as the "Accident Form," the UNITED STATES FIDELITY AND GUARANTY COMPANY (hereinafter called the "Company") does subject to the provisions, limitations, conditions and all other terms of this Policy, hereby agree:

Immediately upon receipt of due proof that any employee of the employer to whom this Policy is issued has suffered one of the losses listed in the Table of Indemnities on this page, and that such loss resulted from bodily injuries suffered while such employee is insured hereunder through an aviation accident (as defined in Part I of the Accident Form) directly and independently of all other causes and that such loss occurred within ninety (90) days from the date of the accident,

The Company will pay to such insured employee, if living; or if dead, to the beneficiary designated in his application for insurance under this Policy, the indemnity listed in the aforesaid Table of Indemnities subject, however, to the maximum amount, as provided in Part V of the Accident Form.

"Loss" shall mean, with regard to hands or feet, dismemberment by severance at or above the wrist or ankle joint. Loss of eye shall mean entire and irrecoverable loss of sight.

Not more than the full principal sum will be paid on account of injuries sustained by any one individual.

### GENERAL CONDITIONS

### 1. NOTICE OF ACCIDENT AND PROOF OF CLAIM.

In the event of death or injury sustained by an employee as the result of an aviation accident, written notice thereof shall be given to the Home Office of the Company or to the United States Aviation Underwriters, Inc. (hereinafter called the Aviation Managers) as soon as practicable after the occurrence of such accident. Such notice shall contain particulars sufficient to identify the employer and the dead or injured employee and also reasonably obtainable information respecting the time, place and circumstances of the accident, and the name and address of any available witnesses. No claim shall be valid unless proof of loss shall be submitted to the Company at its frome Office or to the Aviation Managers within three months after the date of the loss for which claim is made.

### 2. EXAMINATION.

The Company shall have the right and opportunity to examine the person of the injured employee when and so often as it may reasonably require during the pendency of a claim, and also the right and opportunity to make an autopsy in case of death where it is not forbidden by law.

### 3. LEGAL PROCEEDINGS.

No suit or action on this Policy for the recovery of any claim shall be sustainable in any court of law or equity unless commenced within twelve months after the date of the loss for which claim is made; provided that where such limitation of time is prohibited by the laws governing the question of such limitation, then and in that event no suit or action under this Policy shall be sustainable unless commenced within the shortest limitation permitted by such laws.

### 4. CHANGE OF BENEFICIARY.

Any insured employee may by written request designate a new beneficiary as often as desired; such designation to become effective only upon receipt of same by the Aviation Managers.

### 5. DATA REQUIRED.

The employer shall furnish the Aviation Managers on behalf of the Company with written notice on the Aviation Managers' form of all employees who make written application for insurance hereunder, and of the termination of employment of any and all insured employees.

### CHANGES.

The terms of this Policy shall not be waived or changed except by endorsement issued to form a part hereof, signed by the Aviation Managers; nor shall notice to any agent, or knowledge possessed by any agent or by any other person be held to effect a waiver or change in any part of this Policy.

### 7. CANCELATION.

This Policy may be canceled by the Company by written notice mailed to the employer at the address disclosed in this Policy stating when, not less than 15 days thereafter, such cancelation shall be effective, and upon demand the Company shall refund the excess of premium paid by the insured above the pro rata premium for the expired term. The mailing of notice as aforesaid shall be sufficient proof of notice and the insurance under this Policy as aforesaid shall end on the effective date and hour of cancelation stated in the notice. Delivery of such written notice shall be equivalent to mailing. Cancelation shall be without prejudice to any claim originating prior to the effective date and hour of cancelation as stated in the notice.

I do hope that we shall be able to persuade our friends that considering "the nervous strain on our people" which applies to Europe and to Palestine alike, they will not be burdened with meaningless analyses of figures which have no validity in the final determination of decisions in any event.

I received your letters of May 14th and 15th. I appreciate very much the fact that you appreciate the difficulties we are encountering here when trying to obtain statistical material from the various Jewish Communities. The situation in Europe has indeed become so bad and the nervous strain on our people is such that we cannot expect from them to deal in the ordinary business—way with financial matters, correspondence, statistics, etc. — apart from the political difficulties!

I am enclosing copy of a letter which I have written to Mr. Troper. I thought it might be of interest for you to know that I am in constant touch with him regard to a number of questions in connection with the relief-activities of the Joint and the transfer-arrangements for our Funds resulting from them.

Dear Mr. Troper,

I cabled you on May 24th, that I am awaiting your reply with regard to the contents of the various letters which I have written you on May 6th. I hope to receive your reply in the course of the next days.

- 2.) You are aware that I have placed 90.000 Lit. at the disposal of the Relief-Committee and I hope you will let me have the countervalue of \$ 3.000.-within the next future.
- 3.) I am awaiting your reply to my letter of May 6th, regarding the payment of \$1.000.- to Mr. Alberto Lavi in Buenos-Aires.
- 4.) I wrote you about Daleon and Sacerdoti in reply to your question. I received your cable of May 23rd, containing a new proposal of Mr. Daleon and I have written about it to our friend V. I did not think it advisable to send him a cable.

5.) Before leaving, V. stated that he was awaiting your reply with regard to the following matters:

a) Final confirmation that the 20.000.- \$ have been paid to the three addresses indicated (see my letter of May 6th; I am also awaiting an explanation why these payments should have been made through the Zionist Organization, which as far as I can see has nothing to do with it).

b) Additional budget for Rodi and Ljubana.

c) Granting of normal budget for June.

d) Reply to his demand to grant an additional budget in respect of the month of January, for which he has received no budget. V.'s suggestion is to use for this purpose Lit. 300.000.— already placed at his disposal by certain people (rate 30). If you agree, the countervalue is payable to five people of which I have the addresses.

Mr. V. would appreciate very much if you would let me have your reply to the points raised sub a) to d).

6.) With regard to the May-budget for Katzki: Up to the present, 600.000. have been raised, while 2 1 or 3 millions have not yet been found by our representative. Meanwhile, a new proposal has been made to us, coming from the same representative, who is well-known to Mr. Katzki. This suggestion is that we should take over 9 or 9 Mill, from a certain person, which we could place at your disposal for the budgets May-June-July. But before doing

so, we must have your assurance that you are prepared to take the money at the same conditions as in previous cases (90 to the Dollar) and apart from that, we cannot enter into the obligations necessitated by these transactions before having received from you the still outstanding amounts up to the month of April. When Dr. Weiss left, he informed me that the following payments had not yet been settled:

Balance for December \$ 1.875.Budget February | 33.987.| March | 28.571.-| \$ 64.433.--

Mr. Schwartz has promised Dr. Weiss to settle these payments immediately after his arrival in New-York. I don't know if this has been done.

To this amount is to be added the countervalue of the budget for Arpil - \$ 33.985.-. This amount was payable at the end of May.

Then, there is also to be added the amount of about \$ 34.000.- for the May-budget, the countervalue of which we are just trying to find.

This being the position, I don't think that we can enter into any new obligations with regard to the months of June and July and, therefore, we cannot accept the offer made to us in respect of the 9 or 9 1/2 Mill. mentioned above.

I have explained the position to you in my yesterday's cable, of which I am attaching a copy.

- 7.) Timisoara: I have informed our people there that they should discuss with Mr. Jacobson the placing at his disposal of a sum up to 1 1/2 Mill. Leis against which you will pay us \$ 2.000. . Is that correct?
- 8.) Slovakia: I have asked Dr. Neumann if he can pay now 100.000 Ks. for relief-purposes, against which you will pay us \$ 1.185.- (old arrangement between Dr. Weiss and Mr. Schwartz). Do you agree ?
- 9.) Hungary: I understand that you are interested in receiving an amount of 200.000.— Pengoes from our Funds (rate Pg. 10.- \$ 1.-). The money is not yet at hand but if the moment comes, our people in Budapest will make a new application to the National bank.

10.) Holland: You have discussed this question with Dr. Weiss and Mrs. Van Thijn. Please confirm to me by letter that you will refund us the amounts our Funds are placing at the disposal of the Central-Organization for Training of Jewish Youth in Holland. According to inquiries I have made, the figures are as follows: The annual budget of the Central Organization is Fl. 280.000.—. About 65% are used for agricultural and other training in connection with Zionist Youth-Organizations preparing their pupils for emigration to Palestine, while 35% are used for other forms of Hachaharah. I suppose Mrs. Van Thijn will have confirmed to you these figures.

Now, of the total of Fl. 280.000.-, our Funds, which are now combined in the so-called "Stichting tot Financiering van Vakopleiding on Beroepsvorming van jonge Joden in Nederland" are contributing between 100 and 120.000.- Florins. Therefore, it would be only just and right that the Joint refunds to us the countervalue of this amount. Dr. Weiss has discussed with you and Mr. Schwartz this question and I understand from him that you agreed in principle. Therefore, please let me have your definite reply. Have you already discussed with Dr. Weiss the question of the rate of exchange? I am willing to consider any reasonable offer you may make and I hope we shall come to a quick arrangement.

I hope that this letter will reach you in time and that you will reply to all the questions raised therein. With kindest regards, I am, dear Mr. Troper, very truly yours.

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the UPA on June 6th, there was some discussion as to the advisability of considering Mr. George Z. Medalie for one of the three representatives of Welfare Fund communities on the 1941 Allotment Committee of the UJA.

In this connection, I am sending you herewith a news item appearing in the National Refugee Service Community Bulletin of June, 1941.

"When NRS was taken into the joint drive of the UJA there was recognized in it something of such far reaching importance that we are justified in seeing what its consequences and considerations must be," said George Z. Medalie, formerly United States Attorney for Southern District of New York and President of the Federation of the Jewish Philanthropic Societies, addressing a special evening session of the Annual Meeting of the National Refugee Service on May 24.

"The two million first allotment will be spent before half the year is over. And it is spent in a faith, a faith that the Jews of this country will not desert a Jewish and humanitarian cause. So the great problem is 'What shall we do for the rest of the year?'"

Mr. Medalie continued with a discussion of the importance of the work of NRS. He declared that the challenge of the "natural-born haters" that the refugees would take bread out of the mouths of Americans had been met. Through NRS men and women were rehabilitated, readjusted, resettled, and given a new chance.

"You will find a solution," Mr. Medalie said in closing, "because our people have never shirked a problem put to them in any day of crisis. That crisis is certainly here. What others may be ahead of us we do not know, but with confidence we accept the difficulties presented to us."

I am protesting having Scranton listed among communities who have not taken action, as I personally addressed a letter March 21, 1941 which reads as follows: "At a meeting of the United Jewish Campaign of Scranton, held March 20, at 8 p.m. at the Y. M. H. A., the Executive Committee unanimously rejected the proposal to establish an advisory committee for budgeting." Action of this kind do not place very much confidence in the Council of Jewish Federations. Being that the vote was so close, and having counted Scranton out and probably some other communities, we hesitate very much as to whether the tellers were acting strictly impartial. Mr. Louis Lipsky, Dr. Stephen Wise and Dr. Israel Goldstein have approved completely of the draft of the proposed letter to the President of the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds. Judge Rothenberg, however, proposes certain changes. The letter has been retyped to incorporate the suggested changes that Judge Rothenberg has made.

In the retyped letter you will note the words that are underlined. Such underlined words indicate that they are additions suggested by Judge Rothenberg. Several words and phrases have been removed in the process. May I look forward to the receipt of a copy of the letter as it is finally sent off to Mr. Hollander?

May I say that everyone felt that the letter was most effective. I also spoke to Mrs. Judith Epstein who acts for Hadassah in such matters. She thought that the summation of the case was impressive. She wondered, however, whether the U.P.A. could take the position that it would not cooperate with the Council of Federations in view of the fact that so much of the money raised by the U.P.A. comes from Welfare Funds. The Hadassah has not yet formally taken any action, but proposes to consider the problem at a meeting next Wednesday. The letter will, however, probably make a difference in the action that Hadassah was contemplating. The Hadassah had thought that perhaps it might suggest a number of Zionists or of its own members to serve on a National Advisory Budgeting Committee in the hope that through such membership, it could have an influence on the decisions of the Committee.



Gentlemen:

We are in receipt of your report on the Referendum on the budgeting question. We note that due to the amount of opposition developed among the member agencies, that you have decided for the year 1941 to limit this to an extension of your Fact Finding Service. In going over the recapitulation of the voting, we are not truly satisfied that this budgeting proposal was passed. Please understand, however, that none of the members of our Federation were present and are not personally acquainted with what transpired at the meeting on May 18th, but the tremendous amount of unrecorded votes, whether for one reason or another, leads us to believe that there is a definite majority sentiment against the proposal.

As expressed in our vote and in our previous letters to you, we do not intend that any agency or council to which we may or may not belong shall determine to whom and in what amounts our funds shall be distributed. It is through the efforts of the members of our Federation that the money which we send to beneficiaries is raised and the members who are responsible for the raising of this money feel that the right is theirs to distribute the money to such beneficiaries and in such amounts as they think proper. We do not feel that this right shall in any manner be infringed upon by anyone, and any attempt to do so would result in serious situation in our Federation.

We hope that in accordance with what was shown on your recorded vote and with the large amount of unregistered sentiment against this propose, that your Council will see fit to confine its activities to fact gathering and reporting, and stop there.

My dear Mr. Gotshal:

I have your letter of June 13th, but regret that I cannot attend the luncheon on Monday as I have to be in Atlantif City at the Convention of the I.O.B.A. for JNF business.

At the meeting which was held last week, it was impossible for me in the presence of the JDC, NRS group to explain my misgivings regarding the proposal of Dr. Jonah Wise. In view of the fact that I cannot attend the luncheon, may I take this means of briefly stating my point of view, in which incidentally Mr. Montor joins completely. I have not had the opportunity to discuss/with Dr. Silver beyond the mere statement of my position at a recent meeting of the UPA Executive.

I can see where, from the standpoint of the man who makes a contribution to the campaign or who works for it, the proposal of Dr. Jonah Wise would seem highly desirable. There is another point of view, however, namely that of the UPA. It is the latter which I believe it to be our duty to consider first.

Our recent experiences in connection with the reconstitution of the UJA should teach us the value of having for the UPA strong constituent groups in various parts of the country to defend the UPA interests. Unfortunately, the JDC will not give recognition to our demands merely on the basis of their merits. They are apparently much more impressed by our strength both in fund-raising and in the stimulation of public opinion. Perhaps the second impresses them even more than the first. Were it not for this factor, I doubt if the JDC would have swallowed its pride and retreated in our favor from its original formula in connection with the recent reconstitution of the UJA.

I believe it is fair to say that the strongest weapon we had in the controversy, and the strongest we may expect to have in the future, is right here in New York. This is the place where the main portion of their leadership resides, and this is the place where a large portion of the UPA leadership resides. It is in New York, therefore, that they can be moved to feel the greatest amount of irritation. Our ability to threaten a separate campaign in New York for the UPA is therefore an advantage which should not be forfeited.

Up to the present time, New York has been the one open territory for an independent campaign because of the fact that almost everywhere else there have already developed community chests, welfare funds and permanent machinery for united campaigns.

Were we to give up this advantage which we now possess here in New York, we should be forfeiting a very substantial weapon.

The creation of a permanent machinery in New York will seriously impair our ability to use the New York situation as a means of pressure to accomplish a satisfactory arrangement nationally between the JDC and the UPA.

I have no confidence in the suggestion that an Allotment Committee of impartial people can be set up. Such an Allotment Committee is bound to lead toward a JDC-NRS combination.

Even if it is to be assumed that a permanent machinery would save \$100,000 or \$150,000 for expenses in New York, the UPA share of that saving would be somewhere between

\$30,000 and \$50,000. The question for us from the UPA standpoint is whether it is worth risking that amount of money in order to maintain for strategic purposes the best asset we have in our bargaining with the JDC. My own opinion is inclined to the negative. Needless to say, however, if Dr. Silver and my other colleagues feel differently, I shall gladly defer to that point of view.

Would you be good enough to read my letter at the luncheon meeting.
