Dear Dr. Silver:

I took up with the Feakins Bureau the question of Sir Norman Angell's fee for Cleveland. Mr. Feakins states that the fee of \$200 includes expenses, and that there are no visits scheduled outside of New York during that period so that he would have to go directly from New York to Cleveland and return.

Mr. Feakins reports that Sir Morman has been rather ill lately and that he has been taking on too many engagements.

I expressed surprise to Mr. Feakins at having asked Cleveland for a fee of \$200 in view of the fact that Sir Norman himself had promised that engagements made by the United Palestine Appeal would be only \$100 plus expenses. Apparently the Jeakins Agency is raneging on this promise. Mr. Feakins told me this morning that Sir Norman's health was such that he would not mini the cancellation of the Cleveland maeting. What is your thought in the matter?

I am sorry if anything I have said has caused you inconvenience in this matter.

RESOLUTIONS

UNITED JEWISH APPEAL

Adopted at East Central States Regional Conference, November 16, 17, 1940 at Indianapolis

- WHEEEAS this conference has already gone on record urging the continuation of the Uniged Jewish Appeal to combine the fund raising and budgeting for Jewish overseas activity, and
- WHEREAS the overseas agencies have demonstrated their capacity to render continued service despite the present unsettled war conditions, and
- WHEREAS we are convinced that the fullest possible coordination of overseas agencies in the raising and allocation of funds will result in a maximum support and an intelligent and equitable expenditure of these funds, and
- WHEREAS there should be a continuing joint evaluation of overseas activities as a basis for further fund raising requirements, and
- wHEREAS the critical problems in Europe, Palestine, and throughout the world which now must be met largely by American Jewry urgently call for the extension of such coordination at the present time, therefore
- HE IT RESOLVED that this conference urges the continuation of the United Jewish Appeal for 1941 and would look with disfavor upon any effort to dissolve the United Jewish Appeal, and
- BE IT FURTHER FESOLVED that this conference urges the extension of the United Jewish Appeal to include the HIAS, ORT and such other agencies meeting overseas and Palestime needs as can be included on an equitable basis.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I should like to suggest a tentative outline of the program for Washington as the basis for discussion in the coming weeks:

I. <u>ONEC SHABAT</u>, Saturday afternoon, January 25, 3:00 P.H. This idea was inaugurated last year. It proved most successful. We invited a selected list of some 300 key leaders and campaign executives for the purpose of discussing the type of details that normally are not reviewed in the conference sessions. Last year we had such people as Arthur Lourie answering questions on political developments, Georg Landauer on economic and social conditions in Palestine, and Golomb who dealt with security questions. I presided. I believe that you were there for a brief period toward the end.

II. SATURDAY EVENING, January 25.

A question that must be decided is whether an announcement of the 1941 campaign should be made at the opening session on Saturday night or on Sunday. My own view is that the whole spirit of the conference would be transformed and dominated by the enthusiasm evoked by reference to the type of 1941 campaign.

We will be confronted I suppose by the usual demand that we have greetings. I still regard this as a waste of time and an imposition on the time of these people who come from great distances to a national conference for Palestine for them to hear salutations.

My own suggestion is that in addition to yourself as National Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, the other speakers include Dr. Israel Goldstein, reviewing the Jewish National Fund, and Louis Lipsky, reviewing the Kerem Hayesod. I suppose this is by now traditional. To give the people more than three speakers is to kill the evening.

Shall we go through with the previous year's device in having a different presiding officer at each mession? I would urge it. For the Saturday evening session I would suggest Judge Louis Levinthal of Philadelphia.

In addition to these three speakers there should be a brief

financial report by Charles Rosenbloom, Treasurer of the United Palestine Appeal, which will give us an opportunity to introduce him to the constituency.

III. SUNDAY MORNING, January 26.

Since there will be no plemary session because of the absence of adequate meeting space for a large assembly, the morning session will be taken up by committee meetings. The committees would be Resolutions, Quota, Campaign Program. Those people who are not on these committees should be given an opportunity to attend a seminar or seminars at which they should have the opportunity of asking questions. People like Kurt Blumenfeld, Martin Rosenblueth and one other might be assigned a specific meeting room to which some forty or fifty people might be invited.

IV. THE LUNCHEON SESSION might be presided over by Judge I. M. Golden of San Francisco, whose participation I think so important as representing the Far West, that we should undertake to pay his expenses here and back. We do as much for speakers going from New York to San Francisco. Judge Colden is, as you know, second in command to Mr. Henry Monsky in the B'nai B'rith.

The speakers at the luncheon would include the non-Jewish speaker, whom I hope to have found at least by that time, and someone like Nahum Goldmann, who really does a magnificent job every time he speaks.

V. THE AFTERNOON SESSION might be presided over by Edmund I. Kaufmann who, in addition to the fact that he is President of the Z.O.A., represents the large Jewish community of Washington and should be a very helpful factor in the campaign.

In the event that the United Palestine Appeal is conducting an independent campaign, I believe that the afternoon session should be devoted exclusively to our business and not to outside speakers. By that time we shall know what our program is to be. We could then invite some six or seven leaders from key cities who will be able to give their view as to what the United Palestine Appeal may expect from their own communities in 1941. The purpose of this session should be to instill in the minds of the delegates an appreciation of the increased needs of Palestine and the responsibility that the communities owe to the United Palestine Appeal in the new form of sampaigning that it has undertaken.

I believe that we might have Dr. Stephen S. Wise deliver the closing address of that session in order to send the delegates away from that particular meeting with high enthusiasm.

VI. For the <u>BANQUET SESSION</u> the presiding officer might be Judge Morris Rothenberg, or Dr. Solomon Goldman, or Rabbi

Philip Bernstein of Rochester.

Rabbi Irving Miller tells me that he has written you cfficially to ask that one of the sessions of the conference be devoted to the twentieth anniversary of the Keren Hayesod. The general theme of twenty years of development in Palestine might appropriately cover the banquet session on Sunday evening. What do you think?

What do you think of the advisability of offering to pay the expenses to the conference of regional chairmen for the United Palestine Appeal? These include Rabbi Philip Bernstein for the state of New York, Dr. Joseph Bank for Arizona, Charles Brown for Southern California and Sol Abrams for Rhode Island. Some of these will, of course, pay their own expenses, but I wanted permission that in the event that one or more of them could not pay the expenses I might undertake to do so for them. This will enhance the representative character of our meeting.

I feel so strong on the subject in relation to the impact upon communities for our 1941 campaign that I would be prepared to suggest that in certain selected instances we'd offer to pay the expenses of one key man from some of the major Welfare Funds so that by attendance at the conference, the spirit may be communicated to the respective communities.

Dear Dr. Silver:

A situation of acute importance to the fund-raising capacity of the United Palestine Appeal has arisen out of the activities of the League for Religious Labor in Palestine.

I send you herewith a copy of a report that has been prepared by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds. It shows (a) that this organization, which is obviously Migrachi inspired, is appealing to welfare funds throughout the country for the very activities which the Migrachi has assured the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth it is using its own funds for, in addition to the fact that the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund distribute their resources among all groups in Falestine including the Migrachi groups; (b) that the officers of the League for Religious Labor in Falestine are all officers of the Migrachi Organization of America.

Either the Mizrachi Palestine Fund should cease being a beneficiary of the United Palestine Appeal or it should remain within the framework of the agreement between the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth by which it received \$125,000 a year.

(Information obtained from interview with Mr. Jacob Greenberg, Executive Director, and published material)

History The League for Religious Labor in Palestine was established in New and York during February 1940. The purpose of the organization is to <u>Purpose</u> raise funds in America for the support of the Religious Labor Movement in Palestine.

Money is forwarded to a committee consisting of a representative of the Migrachi, the Hapoel Hamigrachi and non-partisan groups for distribution to aid established institutions, organizations and activities such as the Hapoel Hamigrachi, Immigration Bureaus, Central and Local Employment Bureaus, Agricultural Colonies, Loan and Credit Societies, Cooperative Enterprises, Workers! Sections concerned with Housing, Mish'On which gives regular relief to unemployed and sick members, religious and cultural activities; youth activities and sport and defense activities.

Finances Funds are raised through membership dues of \$2 as the minimum and contributions from individuals and organizations. Welfare Funds have been appealed to for support.

A detailed statement of Income and Expense is not available at this time. Such a statement will be submitted to the Council in January.

 - Mr. Henry Montor, Executive Director of the United Palestine Appeal, writes on November 20, that:

"One of the clauses of the agreement constituting the United Palestine Appeal, from which the Migrachi Palestine Fand receives its income, very clearly states that no officer or member of the Migrachi Organization of America shall participate in or approve of any other campaign of a general character except through the United Palestine Appeal. Since the night following election I have cancelled all speaking engagements and have tried to take on nothing more for the early months of next year. The pressure of the work within the Department has been such that I could not attend to it and at the same time give the time that is neceseary for the preparation of speeches. As you know, new problems have been added to old ones, and new complications arise in discharging old duties. My dear Mr. Montor:

I have written the letter which you sent me addressed to Mr. Leon Gellman.

With reference to your letter concerning the Washington Conference:

1) I believe that the Oneg Shabat should again be held.

2) The Saturday evening program should be as last year, devoted to the three addresses - mine, Lipsky's and Goldstein's. Mr. Resembloom should be asked to present a brisf financial report. A layman should preside at this meeting. Judge Louis Levinthal is a good choice, but I am wondering if we could get someone who is less promimently identified with the Zionist official families.

3) Sunday morning should be devoted to committee meetings. As many of the delegates as possible should be put on these committees. The more the better. I am not impressed with the idea of arranging an additional seminar for Sunday morning.

4) The Luncheon session: - I should like to preside at this session as in previous as way. There should be shall one speaker at this session a prominent nor-Feelin guest. Name Gordmann has addressed many regional UPA meetings this year and should be asked to speak briefly either at the afternoon session or at the banquet in the evening. I do not approve of paying any delegate's expenses to the Conference much as I would like to have Judge Colden of San Francisco at the Conference. I think it would be unfair to the UPA to establish such a precedent, and unfair to the other delegates who spend their own money to come to the Conference.

The Afternoon session should be presided over by Mr. Kaufmann, President of the ZOA. If there is an independent campaign, then the afternoon should be devoted, as you indicate, to a discussion of the Mr. Montor

independent campaign. Instructions to communities, statements of leaders of four or five of the principal communities, and an address by Dr. Stephen S. Wise to inspire the delegates for effort in behalf of the independent drive.

If there is a united drive, then the afternoon session may be devoted to an address on the twentieth anniversary of the Keren Hayesod by Mr. Lipsky (in that case Mr. Lipsky would not speak on Saturday evening), or two briefer addresses on this subject by Lipsky and Nahum Goldmann or Rabbi Miller. I do not believe that the evening banquet should take on the character of the twentieth anniversary of the K.H. The K.H. has already held its celebration in New York City.

6) If Dr. Wise does not deliver the principle address at the Afternoon session, I would suggest that he be the toastmaster at the Evening banquet. Otherwise I would suggest Judge Morris Rothenberg.

I may have other suggestions to make as we go along. Please have a tentative program ready by the time the Administrative Committee meets next week.

I am hoping that you will be able to get the British Ambassador for Sunday night, or some other national or international figure.

I understand that you have arranged to have Jan Pierce sing in the evening.

May I unge that you communicate by telegraph or telephone with Rabbi Jonah 3. Wise to call a meeting promptly of the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal.

This is essential for the following purposes:

(a) To wind up the affairs of the United Jewish Appeal for 1940, and

(b) To set up the unchinery for the collection of 1939 and 1940 outstanding pledges.

You will have noted that there is still owing to the U.P.A. for the year 1939 the sum of §112,000. The U.P.A. is still to receive from the 194C income of the U.J.A. approximately \$1,300,000. In other words, very substantial amounts are involved.

To insure that the interests of both the U.F.A. and the J.D.C. are adequately represented, an authoritative committee will have to be set up to supervise the liquidation of the U.J.A. affairs.

Insofar as the office detail is concerned, I would propose that it be agreed that I be designated for the U.P.A. and perhaps Isidor Coons will be named by the J.D.C. to set up the internal personnel which will have the right to carry on with this work regardless of the form which the 1941 campaign takes.

Will you let me know, at your earliest convenience, what action you have taken in this matter and what date you have suggested to Rabbi Jonah B. Wise for such a meeting so that proper letters of notice may go forward.

What form is it to take - that is, is the National Befugee Service to obtain its full amount up to \$5,500,000 before the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestime Appeal are to receive any part of the additional funds? As of December 10th, the National Refugee Service had received \$940,000 from New York on account of its \$1,000,000 and \$1,650,000 en account of the \$2,500,000 from the United Jewish Appeal.

2) In what form is the report of the Allotment Committee to be issued? Is the report made by Elisha Briedman to be circulated to the entire country, and, if so, to whom and through what channels? Do I understand correctly that no report and no announcement is to be issued to the country until after the representatives of the United Palestine Appeal on the Allotment Committee shall have given final approval in writing?

3) Were any commitments made with respect to the continuation of an Inquiry Committee without regard to the nature of the 1941 campaigns?

The reason I ask these various questions is because I wish guidance on checking on these details. Mereover, I am never certain that Mr. Elisha Friedman's interpretations of any event or decision coincides with realities.

I have just been informed that the Allotment Committee has made its decisions. It will take a few days before the formal statement is in our hands.

In the meantime, however, I have been informed that a procedure has been established to take effect immediately whereby cash preference payments are indicated for National Refugee Service within certain limits as to amount. You will, therefore, take all checks that have previously been signed and undated based upon the old allocation and give them to the accountants to be sealed by them andkept in a separate place, not to be used except with the permission of the accountants.

New checks will have to be prepared, based upon the following formula. You will use the same unit of \$102,500. A check will be made out for \$51,250 to National Refugee Service. The check for J.D.C. will be \$34,716.75 and the check for U.P.A. \$16,533.25. This will preserve the percentages at 67-74/100% for J.D.C. and 32-26/100% for U.P.A.

This takes effect as of December 9, 1940 and will continue until further notice.

Please send a copy of this letter to Mr. Rosenbloom immediately. I am certain that he will concur in this arrangement.

Dear Dr. Silver:

A New York United Palestine Appeal does not exist at the present time. It is, therefore, necessary to inform oven potentially UPA-minded people of the United Palestine Appeal's position with regard to a New York campaign, whether that campaign is to take the form of an independent United Palestine Appeal office or a joint drive in New York with distribution of funds being made by that drive.

Accordingly I earnestly suggest that a meeting be held next Wednesday night in New York City to which will be invited a selected group of leaders in some of the major trades in which campaigns are held. At the present time they probably are tentative in spirit, and if the Joint Distribution Committee tells them its story without preparation on our part, they may yield to 90-10 or any other figure equally fantastic.

The success of that Wednesday night meeting (December 18th) will be dependent in large measure upon your presence and participation and on the proper build-up for the meeting.

My suggestion would be for you to send a telegram from Cleveland to the thirty or forty people involved, asking them to mget with you in your room in the Commodore Hotel next Wednesday night. At that time we can tall them the tackground of everything that has happened and also form a nucleus for a New York United Palestine Appeal organization.

Unfortustely Blitz is out of the city at the present time on a vacation so that his contact with these people is absent. However, I called together the directors on the New York United Jewish Appeal staff, who were formerly with the United Palestine Appeal, and got a concensus of opinion from them as to the men who would be best qualifies to attend such a meeting. Their attitude was not cooperative. In the first place, they have been cowed by the New York United Jewish Appeal system; and, in the second place, they seem to feel that in the absence of Blitz it was an invasion on my part to enter the New York field. However, we did get together a list which seems satisfactory. I am sending this list to you so that when we discuss

EXERGENCY CAMPAIGN FOR PALESTINE INSTITUTIONS

In response to a desperate call for help from the hundred and thirty religious educational and charity institutions of Palestine, which are independent of Zionist Funds, a conference of prominant rabbis and laymen in America, called by the Federated Council of Falestine Institutions, decided unanimously to launch immediately an emergency campaign for funds to forestall the catastrophe that threatens these institutions.

National organizations, as the Union of Orthodex Rabbis of the U.S.A. and Canada, Mizrachi, Agudath Israel. Federation of Palestine Jews, as well as numerous congregations in New York City, were represented at the conference which convened at the Breadway Central Hotel, New York City, on December 3rd, under the chairmanship of Hirsch Manischewitz.

Rabbi Aaron Teitelbaum, Chairman of the Federated Council of Palestine Institutions, with offices at 38 Park Rov, N.Y.C., described the plight of the independent religious institutions in Palestine which, as a result of the war, have been deprived of most of their sources of income. He read the cable from Chief Rabbi Dr. Isaac Herzog of Palestine, pleading with American Jevs for immediate aid to save these institutions which are a social need for the Jewish community of Palestine.

The Rabbis Israel Rosenberg and 21. Silver, of the Praesidium of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, N. Kirshblum, J. N. Charlop and others who delivered addresses asked and prayed that American Jewry rise to the great privilege of saving and maintaining these cultural and welfare institutions in the Holy Land.

A resolution, read by Habbi Jos. Gabriel of the Federation of Palestine Jevs, and unanimously adopted, pointed out that even here in the United States the income of the institutions has been drastically decreased in recent years, since the various communal Velfare Funds do not permit local collections for the institutions, while failing to allocate in the way of substitution adequate amounts as merited by such a bulk of institutions with a combined annual expenditure of \$1,285,000. The resolution them calls upon the Federated Council to launch a country-wide emergency campaign for the rescue of the institutions of the religious element in Palestine. Many present at the conference volunteered to render wholehearted support in gelleboration with the Federated Council of Palestine Institutions.

History and Purpose The Poslei Agudat Israel novement began in 1955 in Tel-Aviv and Petah Tiqvah, spreading to Jerussiem, Haifa and the colonies with the increased immegration into Palestine of members of the Agudat movement.

The sins of the organisation include: the organization of the religious morkers with a view to creating a social order based on religion and Torah; economic assistance and social belief to members through labour and immigration bureaux; settlement projects, tree loan funds, evening courses in Torah, religious education of the children of the members, etc.

Management The organization is administered by a central board in Tel-Awiv, and consisting of 55 members, elected at a national assembly held <u>Competence</u> every two years, The central board elects from among its members an executive committee of 15, and an inner administrative committee

of 5.' It further appoints national bureaus for immigration, labor, agriculture and supervision. The three sembers of the administration are salaried, receiving a combined salary of LP. 60, a month, and three office employees receive a combined salary of LP. 22,500 a month.

Membership: There are 5,026 organized members, (comprising, with their families, a total of 10,278 persons), as compared with 1,090 members in 1935 and 2,180 in 1957. Moreover, 920 momen workers are organized into separate groups in Tel-Aviv, Jerusalem, Haifa, Petah Tiqvah and Benei Herzq, bringing the total number of members to 5,946, of which 80 percent are unskilled labourers. Membership dues were paid by 5,178 persons last year.

There are 25 branches of the organization in Palestine. Two-thirds of the members are from cities, one-third residing in colonies and agricultural settlements.

Activities 1. Labours The majority of the members of the organization is employed in the citmus industry and in the building trade through the employment bureaux of the local branches. With the halp of the central board in Tel-Aviv, the organization secured 10,000 working days for its members in Government work totalling LP.5,200, as well as some work for the army, such as road construction, barracks, etc. The organization has not been able to penetrate the labor market in manufacturing and industry, where the "Histadrut", the General Federation of Labourers, holds sway, nor in projects demanding work on the Sabbath. The organization is represented in the joint labor exchanges set up by the Jewish Agency to regulate the appointment of labour among the various party labor organizations in proportion to the size of their membership.

2. <u>Immigration and Agricultural Settlement</u>: Special immigration bureaux in Haifa and Tel-Aviv cars for immigrants belonging to the Agudat Israel movement, providing such newcomers with food, clothing, and if possible, work. As for cooperative agricultural settlements, the organizations maintains two: one, the Kibbuts of the Agudist Youth in Kfar Saba, on 22 dunams of land, and the other, Kibbuts Chefetz Chaim, in Gedera on 50 dunams. These two cooperatives have about 500 members, most of whom are from Germany and have received agricultural training. About LP. 2,000 have been invested in these two settlements.

With the help of the German Department of the Jewish Agency, 22 refugee children from Germany were settled in Kfar Saba, where they are trained in agriculture and religious studies. Mineteen other children have been placed in private homes by the organization. The possibilities of settling the Agudist youth in kibbutzim are limited, owing to religious reasons.

5. Social Welfare: "Saad", the unemployment fund of the organizations, supplies unemployed members with essential food-stuffs at half price or even free. It assists such members in payments of rent, children's schooling, sick benefits, maternity cases, etc. The various branches of "Saad" spent LP.2578 last year on 5,798 persons. These funds were derived from members' fees and from contributions in Palestine, but primarily from a drive held in America last year. In recent months, the organization has been receiving relief funds allocated by the Vaad Leumi from the Emergency Tax Drive.

4. <u>Medical Relief</u>: The attempts to establish special Sick Funds (Kupat Cholim) of the organization failed, owing to lack of funds. The organization was therefore obliged to make an agreement with the Kupat Cholim of the "Histadrut", the General Foderation of Labourers in Palestine, whereby members of the Poalei Agudat Israel are admitted to the Sick Fund of the Histadrut, paying only Kupat Cholim premiums. The organization spent LP.700 last year on such of its members as could not meet their obligations to the Kupat Cholim of the Histadrut".

5. <u>Free Losn Funds</u>: Six free loan funds have been established, granting small, interest-free loans to members. Very limited capital, however, has been placed at the disposal of these funds, which last year received only LP.150. - from the central board in Tel-Aviv.

6. <u>Mutual Lean and Saving Fund</u>: This fund, founded in 1936, is the central financial organ of the organization, and is composed of 175 members. During the two years of its existence, loans were granted and notes discounted in a total amount of LP.5000, of which LP.3475 has been repaid. The Loan Fund is administered by a board of five elected at the annual meetings of the members. The director and the secretary are salaried. The accounts are examined by a supervisory committee of three, also elected at the annual meetings, and by a certified accountant.

7. <u>Culture</u>: Every local branch of the organization has its club-rooms, where meetings, prayers, lecturers, evening courses, etc. are held. Last year the organization established a cultural centre, headed by Rabbi M. Karlitz, a member of the delegation sent to America. This centre also acts as arbiter in conflicts between members and between the various groups of the organization, this arbitration activity costing LP.571 last year.

The official organ of the Poslei Agudat Israel is a weekly, "Heatid", mainteining a good standard of journalism.

Financial Status and Connections <u>Abroad</u> Poalei Agadat Israel maintains close connections with the institutions of the Agadat Israel in Palestine and abroad. Until last year, the organization received regular subsidies from the "Keren Hayishuv" of Agadat Israel. With the discontinuation of this grant, the organization, forced to appeal for support to America, sent a delegation to

the United States, which, aided by Rabbi Silver of Cincinnati, succeeded in raising \$7,345. A fund-raising office has been opened in New York City, at 255 W.98th Street, and a permanent committee established, headed by Rabbi Silver.

Mr. A. L. Gellman, President of the Mizrachi Organization in America, submitted to me copy of a letter he received from you in connection with "The League for Religious Labor in Palestine" and its requests to the local charity chest; and public funds. And since, according to your letter, the officers of the League are members of the Mizrachi Organization and the Palestine Fund of the Mitrachi there is therefore, according to your words, a breach of the contract which the Mizrachi has with the U.P.A.

In this connection let me remark: a) the League for Religious Labor in Palestine is non-partisan and has no connection, from an organizational, political, and financial standpoint, with the Mizrachi Organization. The League is neither responsible to the Mizrachi nor subservient to the Mizrachi, nor has the Mizrachi anything to say in the matter of policy.

b) As a non-partisan body which is independent in every respect, the members of the League are drawn from every category, religious, reform, socialist, radical, Zionist, non-Zionist, and also Mizrachists - in other words, all those who in their hearts love and are devoted to the ideals and purposes of the League for Religious Labor in Palestine and who would like to see the realisation of their aim - "Torah and Labor" - in the individual and communal life and also the national rebirth of Palestine. The Mizrachi people within the League are there as individuals and not as representatives of the Mizrachi, and the officers of the League are officers only of this body and not of the Mizrachi or of any other political organization, and whoever may make a statement to the effect that this is not so, is deliberately, or unintentionally, mistakan and misleading.

c) Therefore, the contract with the Mizrachi does not obligate the League in any way. I do not see any <u>moral or legal basis</u> for denying the League the right to carry on any fund raising activities among American Jews, as has the Histairuth Ha-Ovdim through "Gewerkshaften" the right to collect funds from the different classes of American Jews, from religious and non-religious equally. Shall not the League for Eeligious Labor have the right to collect even one cent!

Let there therefore not be any discrimination between the workers in America and in the Homeland in every sense of the word, in the right to employment, the division of work and providing of means for work.

I hope that I have been clear and comprehensive and if further explanations are necessary, I am ready to supply same either in writing or in person, at the time desired.

Dear Dr. Silver:

On Wednesday, December 18th, there was a meeting with the inquiry staff at the United Jewish Appeal office. Present for the U.P.A. were Mr. Lipsky, Mr. Rosenbloom and myself. In addition to Mr. Elisha Friedman the members of the inquiry staff present were Messre. Grubel, Kalafa, Backman and Phiebig.

The meeting lasted from 3:30 to 5:30 P. M. Mr. Friedman, in his usual dictatorial fashion, took the position that he would determine what would go into the report. He said that if he were to listen to what the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the Mational Befugee Service wanted included it would mean that he was no longer director of the inquiry.

I took issue with this point of view stating that the U.P.A. and the J.D.C. had created the Allotment Committee and therefore were masters of the Allotment Committee, especially since no issue was being taken with the decisions of the Allotment Committee; and that Mr. Friedman had no status whatsoever since he was only a creature of the Allotment Committee.

To this Mr. Friedman took violent exception and the two hours passed with interminable thunder and lightning.

We went over the report page by page using as the basis for our comments Mr. Lipsky's corrections, of which a copy had been sent to you. Mr. Friedman took the position that he could only listen to the suggested corrections and then in his own wisdom decide whether they should be accepted or not. Afterwards a total report would be submitted to the editorial committee consisting of Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, Mr. Louis Lipsky and Friedman.

Whenever a fundamental issue arose such as the question of comment on the land-buying issue Mr. Friedman seemed to feel that the question could be decided exclusively by referring it to Mr. Perlstein.

The first issue that I raised had to do with the apparent decision by Mr. Friedman either with or without the consent of the Allotment Committee to circulate the final copy of the report of the inquiry to the Allotment Committee to all Welfare Funds throughout the country. Does this coincide with your impression? Dr. Abba Hillel Silver - 2 - December 19, 1940

We are having another meeting on Friday, December 20th at 3:30 P. M. at which Messrs. Lipsky and Rosenbloom will again be present with me. I must say that Mr. Rosenbloom is proving a splendid person who knows our affairs and speaks up with courage.

Is there anything you want to say with respect to this report which should guide us in our conversation with Mr. Friedman, who seems to think he is doing us a courtasy by permitting us to make any observations at all?

> We have given close consideration to the memorandum which you submitted to me on December 11th to which was attached a suggested "standard form" to describe certain budgetary commitment and cash positions of the United Palestine Appeal. The form in which the questionnaire is submitted required additional material from Palestine for which we shall send promptly, after there shall have been some clarification of several points in the questionnaire which are not fully indicative of the nature of the information you require.

In considering the statistics at the disposal of the United Palestine Appeal, it should be noted that the United Palestine Appeal submitted a variety of data in 1939 to the Allocations Committee of the United Jewish Appeal which functioned in that year. This data, bearing on the operations of the agencies financed with United Palestine Appeal funds, seemed to provide all the information that was required, since at no subsequent period was any indication giver to the United Palestine Appeal that a different form of information was desired or that supplementary material was necessary.

Since the United Palestine Appeal, having submitted this material a year ago, received no counter-suggestions, it assumed naturally that the form of the 1939 material was equally satisfactory for 1940.

In addition to the material placed at the disposal of the 1940 Allotnent Committee of the United Jewish Appeal, you were given copies of the data submitted to the 1939 Allocations Committee. It was not until October, 1940 before I had the opportunity of meeting with the Inquiry Committee of the 1940 Allotment Committee to discuss various passes of the material submitted by the United Palestine Appeal. As a result of our discussion, certain suggestions were made as to enlargement of the material available. Mr. Elisha M. Friedman

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Recognizing the value to the United Palestine Appeal and to the Allotness Committee of additional information, I took into account then the disrupted communications as a result of the war and sent to Palestine a series of lengthy cables which resulted in equally lengthy responses, which, I am sure, all of us feel were materially helpful in broadening our picture of the needs and activities in Palestine. But, as your own records will indicate, there was at no time a request from the Inquiry Committee to the United Palestine Appeal for material beyond that freely and gladly supplied by the United Palestine Appeal. On several occasions when I suggested that the Inquiry Committee phrase cablegrams which I would be glad to forward to Palestine to obtain additional information. I was told that such cables would not be necessary since the type of information involved would have to come out of a series of written material that could not possibly be compressed into a cable.

At various times you indicated your understanding of the special problem arising out of the inability to maintain frequent and swift contact with Palestine through the mails. Several cablegrams we received indicated that a great batch of material had been forwarded by airmail. But as of this writing we have not yet received it. Whether this was delayed in transit or whether even possibly the material may have been on one of the innumerable boats that are being sunk during this war, it is difficult to say.

But considering the fact that the discussion of the current form of United Palestine Appeal material did not begin until October, I am sure that you will agree that the additional material that was obtained, despite the handicaps and hazards of war, has been most valuable.

One of the difficulties arising out of the speed with which the Inquiry Committee had to work was the information given to me that the first meeting of the Allotment Committee would be held on November 18th, with the result that it was felt that some of the additional information that could be obtained in Palestine might well be left to future research. That is why, when at several points I suggested that I would cable for material, I was told that there was no time.

At you will recall, the reports of the accountants did not come to us until November, so that no time was left for forwarding this material to Palestine in order to receive supplementary information in time for the Allotnen: Committee meeting which was subsequently postponed, but not for any extended period.

Several factors ought to be borne in mind, as undoubtedly they are, with respect to the material placed at your disposal by the United Palestine Appeal:

At you know, the budgets of the Jewish Agency for Palestine (Palestine Foundation Fund) and the Jewish National Fund are made up usually in Jerusalem at the direction of the World Zionist Congress and the Jewish Agency for Palestine. These budgets are not evolwed by the United Palestine

Dear Dr. Silver:

On Friday I had a long conversation with Dr. Solomon Goldman of Chicago, whom I acquainted with the latest details of our situation. He in turn described to me the status of the Chicago Jewish Welfare Fund.

On the basis of our conversation of Friday, and on the basis of the conversation with Dr. Goldman, a letter has been sent to Mr. James H. Becker, President of the Jewish Welfare Fund, as per the enclosed copy. Perhaps I should have sent it to you first for your approval, corrections, or deletions, but I took the liberty of sending it directly because of the need for speed, and because the Chicago campaign may get so far under way that it would not be possible for us to achieve our objectives.

This letter would also be used as the basis for application to other communities which are launching campaigns between now and February.

Copies of the letter to Mr. Becker are also being sent to Mr. Harris Perlstein, Mr. Samuel Goldsmith, Mr. Benjamin Harris, Col. Albert H. Rosenberg, Rabbi Morton Berman, A. K. Epstein, all of whom are persons upon whom we shall have to count, whatever the nature of our position in Chicago.

December 19 marked the opening of the big gifts section of the Jewish Welfare Fund. The official quota is \$2,000,000. It was stated that \$1,200,000 would remain in Chicago and in the Americas, and that \$800,000 would be available for overseas purposes.

Joseph C. Hyman was the speaker of the occasion. Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, as you know, was also there.

It is clear that we shall have a battle on our hands in Chicago. If these facts are correct, it means that Chicago will keep the lign's share in this new formula, which is evidently designed to provide funds to meet the deficit of the Chicago Welfare Dr. Abba Hillel Silver

Federation, to provide for the local relief problem in Chicago, to give funds to the National Refugee Service, and to make available to the Joint Distribution Committee a certain portion of the funds for its programs in "the Americas". If we start with the figure of \$800,000 as being available for the JDC and the UPA programs "overseas" we obviously start at a disadvantage.

Dr. Goldman felt that you are the only one who ought to come to Chicago to meet with the Board of the Welfare Fund. He is a member of the Board. He believes that if anyone can have influence with the group it is you alone, and therefore has asked me to urge you, on his behalf, to attend a meeting when it is arranged by the Welfare Fund Board.

Prompt action is essential, because if out of \$800,000 Chicago thinks that it can give \$200,000, for example to the United Palestine Appeal, I would recommend immediate removal of the United Palestine Appeal forces from the Chicago Welfare Fund, to conduct an independent campaign on the same basis as we may have to in New York City.

I should like to have your observations on this in planning our strategy.

We have in Dr. Goldman in Chicago an outstanding force who could mobilize all the pro-Palestine sentiment in the city. I am sending him a copy of the letter, which has been addressed as a formal application to the Chicago Jewish Welfare Fund for inclusion to the extent of at least \$500,000.

The best procedure will undoubtedly be for Dr. Goldman, perhaps together with Benjamin Harris who is now Chairman of the Mid-West Region of the United Palestine Appeal, to call together a meeting of some ten or twelve representative persons in Chicago to plan the next step.

In the meantime, I assume we shall have to wait a number of days to receive the acknowledgment of Mr. Becker.

My dear Mr. Becker:

I herewith submit to you the formal application of the 1941 United Palestine Appeal for inclusion in the fund-raising effort of the 1941 Jewish Welfare Fund of Chicago.

To meet the requirements of Palestine involving the maintenance, security and extension of the present structure, and to stimulate the absorptive capacity of the country for additional immigration, the United Palestine Appeal asks that out of the funds raised for 1941 by the Jewish Welfare Fund of Chicago a sum of not less than \$500,000 be made available to the United Palesting Appeal.

In order that the facts to sustain this application may be presented directly to the officers entrusted with this responsibility, I request that the United Falestine Appeal be given the opportunity of meeting with the members of the Board of Directors of the Jewish Velfare Fund at the earliest opportunity, some time within the ment two weeks.

The Jawish Agency for Palestine and the Jewish National Fund, the two constituent arganizations of the United Palestine Appeal, which also includes the Misrachi Palestine Fund, have adopted a budget of \$13,640,000 for the period that coincides with our campaign effort. Because of the collapse of Jewish communities in Europe, which previewaly made substantial contributions to the Palestine upbuilding program, because of the effect of war on other countries, such as England, South Africa, Ganada, etc., and because of the new emergency and war-time needs and opportunities that exist in Palestine, the leaders of the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund believe that it is only fair that American Jewry assume at least eighty per cent. of the responsibility for the conduct of their programs.

This challenge to our statesmanship and our generesity the United Palestine Appeal is prepared to accept with the understanding and sympathetic cooperation of the Jewish Welfare Fund of Chicago and its constituency. Formal documents giving in detail the nature of these budgets will be submitted to you and to your fellow officers of the Jewish Welfare Fund through the personal meeting which I trust can be arranged soon, and through the submission of statistical material.

In brief, however, these are the essential elements of the program which requires our energetic and effective collaboration:

In the field of immigration, Palestine continues to be an outstanding factor in the absorption of refugees. On Friday the announcement was issued by the Palestine Government that the validity of certificates for five thousand refugees who are now in various European ports has been extended until March 30, 1941. This is in addition to the new immigration schedule that is to be announced by the Government for the period ending April 1, 1941.

The continued entry of non-certificated immigrants into Palestine today assumes wider proportions than ever before, as is attested by the entry in the one month of November of over three thousand non-certificated refugees. The fact that Palestine absorbed 24,000 refugees in the first year of the war must also be taken into consideration in determining the enlarged financial responsibility of the Jewish Agency.

The continued influx of a large immigration, combined with the impact of war upon the economy of Palestine, has brought new burdens to the Jewish Agency budget in the form of provision for relief. In the past several months the Jewish Agency has made available increased sums of money through the Vaad Leumi so that some 75,000 people a month could obtain relief assistance.

This is in addition to the obligation which the Jewish Agency assumes when noncertificated refugees are released into its custody by the Government. Thus, in the case of the 1700 hapless refugees, whose fate became known to the world through the explosion of the Fatria, the Jewish Agency was given the responsibility to see to it that these men, women and children did not become public charges, and moreover that they were fed, sheltered, clothed and restored to the health which they had lost in the months of vandering on the seas.

The war has dislocated a great part of the economic and industrial life of the country. To prevent demoralization, to cut down on the relief load, the Jewish Agency as the representative of the Jewish people has undertaken to stimulate conmerce and industry so that men could be employed in jobs and that the security of the country could simultaneously be strengthened through the continued functioning of the economic machinery and through the extension of various public works, particularly those to enlarge and to link the Jewish settlements.

The continuation of the colonization program is one of the most important duties facing the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund in 1941.

The 257 Jawish settlements which dot Palestine must be protected and their areas and activity extanded; equipment, livestock, agricultural instruction and assistance must be given, particularly to some hundred dolonies established in the past decade, sixty of them in the last four years.

In the year 1940 the Jewish Agency and the Jatish National Fund were responsible for the establishment of eight new colonies. The program now under way provides for the erection of fiftuen additional settlements in 1941. This colonization program is essential for these reasons, in brieft To widen the frontiers of Jewish colonization in the Jewish Homeland, to provide the soil upon which the Yishuv's capacity for self-sufficiency in agricultural production may be enhanced, to erect settlements for the purpose of increasing the strategic security of colonies already established, and to give a foot-hold on the land to an increasing number of refugees who have come to Palestine to rebuild their economic life through integration on the soil of Palestine.

The program of land acquisition that has been carried on by the Jewish people since 1903 through the Jewish National Fund must be continued. The land previously contracted for must be redeemed, and new areas available for acquisition must be obtained so that the refugees who enter Palestine may have land muon which to settle and land from which to obtain the food for their support.

Grave new burdens have fallen upon the Jevish community of Palestine. It has not these burdens with patience, faith and self-sacrifice, providing increasing sums of money for emergency, security and war-time needs. However, certain programs which the Jevish community in Palestine was able until the war to carry on by itself in whole or in part must, if this magnificent structure is to be preserved and widened, be assumed by American Jewry.

Thus, the Jewish Agency must enlarge its contribution for the maintenance of the educational system of Palestine, which embraces some sixty thousand children. This is but one illustration of the wide variety of cultural and economic, as well as agricultural activities which the United Palestine Appeal is sponsoring.

The facts of Palestine's development are in themselves a source of pride and encouragement to all Jewry. We must remember that because of the generosity and the vision of the Jewish people in previous years, there exists in Palestine the largest free Jewish community in the world next to that of the United States. Preservation of the Jewish people and of Jewish values is bound up with the growth of the Jewish Homeland in Palestine.

Today the Jews of Palestine are playing a significant role in the struggle whose outcome will determine the fate, not alone of one country, but of our presentday civilization. Over six thousand Palestine Jews are in the British Army. Palestine Jews are now serving in the battles in Egypt and Greece. In the coming months additional thousands of Palestine Jews will be recruited in the regular forces and in the Volunteer Fauce which has just been initiated this week.

The Jews of America have the opportunity and the responsibility of making clear to this great Jewish community in Palestime that we share with them the spirit of faith in the ultimate triumph of the cause for which they are fighting and that we shall do everything in our power to maintain their morale, not alone with moral, but with an increased material support.

For these reasons, I have every confidence that you and your associates in the Jewish Welfare Funi of Chicago will give the mest sympathetic consideration to the request of the United Palestine Appeal for a minimum allotment of \$500,000 Mr. James H. Becker



The letter speaks of a regular Bulletin shich is to be sent to the member agencies by the Council about the 1941 campaigns of the UJA agencies. I believe that it is important that that Bulletin be neither hysterical nor provocative, nor should it express a broken-hearted attitude toward the collapse of the UJA. It would serve the purposes of American Jewry better if the Bulletin were in the nature of quieting resentments and allaying fears concerning the disruption of unity. Mr. Lurie's statement at the meeting called by the Council to meet with representatives of the JDC and the UPA was the right a proach to the whole subject.

It would be helpful if you would have a talk with Mr. Lurie in the very near future about the whole matter; not merely about the Bulletin, but the attitude of the Council to the separate campaigns. It is proposed that the agenda of the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal on Monday afternoon, December 30, contain the following items:

(1) a report on the status of the 1940 United Jewish Appeal;

(2) decisions on maintenance of the United Jewish Appeal structure.

(a) liquidation of the United Jewish Appeal,
(b) collection of 1939 and 1940 pledges;

(3) receipt of the report from the Allotment Committee of 1940.

With respect to the liquidation of the property of the United Jewish Appeal, this is what is involved:

The United Jewish Appeal, aside from the property brought to it by the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal, which reverts to those organizations, has acquired automobiles for its field representatives, typewriters, desks, supplies and equipment. The question is how this material should be divided.

It is my position that the United Jewish Appeal is a corporation consisting of the JDC and UPA with equal powers and that this material should be divided equally between the two partners. It is my suspicion that someone would like to introduce the idea that the NRS has some claim on the property of the UJA. This I dissent from on the grounds (a) that the NRS is not a part of the UJA corporation, but is really one of its beneficiaries as is the Ort in New York City, for example, and (b) that the Allotment Committee made clear the relationship of the NRS to the UJA, when it decided to award no further funds of any kind to the NRS. But the first statement with regard to the legal basis of the UJA seems to me to be the determining factor.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

I welcome this opportunity to write to you and to advise you that the United Palestine Appeal will conduct its 1941 campaign for funds through an independent approach to the Jewish communities of America. We hope thereby to obtain the far larger sums which are required by the Jewish Agency for Palestine to carry on its work during this war period, to maintain and protect what has already been built in Palestine through the years and to care for the thousands of refugees who are still streaming into the country.

In sending you this private note, I am eager that you should be in possession of the facts and of the circumstances under which the United Palestine Appeal took the decision and also to solicit your personal cooperation in looking after the interests of the United Palestine Appeal in your community when quotas and allotments to agencies come up for discussion in your Welfare Pund.

The facts are briefly as follows:

1. The 1940-1941 budgets of the Jewish Agency and of the Jewish National Fund, which receive their income from the Jews of America exclusively through the United Palestine Appeal, total \$13,640,000. The collapse of Jewish communities in Europe, which formerly were an important source of income, has compelled the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund to urge upon the Jewish communities of America to assume responsibility for practically the entire budget. Within the present framework of the United Jewish Appeal, it is quite impossible to approximate even a reasonable fraction of this budget.

2. The United Palestine Appeal took its decision to withiraw from the United Jewish Appeal after the most serious consideration of all the factors involved. We recognized the value of the United Jewish Appeal as an instrument to stimulate the raising of funds in this country, but we were compelled to take note of the fact that the proportion of increase which Palestine might have expected as a result of the increased giving in 1939 and 1940 was not reflected in the actual income of the United Palestine Appeal. Thus, in 1938 when the Jews of America raised approximately \$6,500,000 for overseas and refugee purposes, the United Palestine Appeal obtained \$2,500,000. In 1939, though the United Jewish Appeal raised over \$16,000,000, the United Palestine Appeal received only \$4,000,000. This year, out of a total anticipated gross income of \$14,000,000, the United Palestine Appeal will receive only \$2,900,000. It is evident that Palestine in spite of its gravely mounting needs is not receiving the proportionate benefits which it had a right to expect from these united campaigns.

3. Months of negotiations preceded the decision to dissolve the United Jewish Appeal. We offered one proposal after another to the Joint Distribution Committee in an earnest effort to continue the united campaign. But it was with real regret that we found that every proposal was rejected. The Joint Distribution Committee agreed to a continuation of a United Jewish Appeal only upon its terms: (a) that the ratios of 1940 be continued unchanged in 1941, and (b) that the amounts which were originally allotted in 1940 (\$5,250,000 to the JDC; \$3,500,000 to the NRS; and \$2,500,000 to the UPA) should be reduced to a six months period, which would mean \$1,250,000 to the United Palestine Appeal, the balance to be turned over to an Allotment Committee for later allocation. We could not, of course, imperil the work of the Jewish Agency and of the Jewish National Fund in Palestine by accepting such a proposal.

I do not wish to elaborate here upon this point, since I am attaching for your confidential study a copy of a letter which I addressed, on November 28, to the Chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee. It will give you in far greater detail the complete story of the negotiations and the reasons for the position which we took. To the very last, the position of the Joint Distribution Committee has remained unchanged except that it indicated that it might consent to allocate a somewhat larger amount for the first period than it originally suggested, provided the ratios remained the same.

4. Your representatives, during the period of negotiations, laid particular stress on the fact that relatively too much money out of the United Jewish Appeal was being allocated to the National Refugee Service, which will end the year 1940 with an allotment surplus of at least \$370,000. It has been authoritatively estimated that over and above the \$3,500,000 which was made available to the National Refugee Service by the United Jewish Appeal in 1940, the local Jewish communities in the United States have set aside additional sums up to nearly \$2,000,000 for the local care of their refugees. Thus the Jews of America are spending this year on some fifteen to twenty thousand refugees in the United States who are in need of relief services, five to six million dollars, a sum nearly equal to that which American Jewry is spending for the total relief of millions of Jews in Europe, and a sum greater than that spent by American Jews for the relief of tens of thousands of Jewish refugees in Palestine, not to speak of the vast program in Palestine of immigration, colonization, land acquisition, education and industrial development.

5. It is of utmost importance that we make clear just what is involved in this independent appeal of the United Palestine Appeal in order to allay any fear of disrupting unity in American Jewish life. The question of unity is not at all involved. In the last two decades we had several united drives with the Joint Distribution Committee, to be followed by independent drives. Whenever a united drive suggested itself as mutually beneficial it has been held. Otherwise there ensued independent drives.

The United Palestine Appeal is not conducting an "independent" campaign except in the sense that it is making an independent approach to the budget or allocations committee in every city in the country where Welfare Funds exist. The United Palestine Appeal will continue in 1941, as it has in the past, to cooperate wholeheartedly and loyally with every Welfare Fund community in the United States, giving to each Welfare Fund the maximum of cooperation and service so that the campaign in the community may reach maximum success for all agencies embraced within it. The speakers, the literature, the motion pictures and all the other facilities at the disposal of the United Palestine Appeal will continue to be channelled through the established Welfare Fund campaign agency in each community. The only difference between the 1940 and the 1941 campaigns will be that instead of having a handful of men in New York City, whose viewpoints are molded by set and unyielding preconceptions, determine what amount of money Palestine shall receive, this decision will now lie in the hands of men and women in each community in the United States. Each Welfare Fund receives, prior to its campaign, many applications for inclusion of beneficiaries. In 1939 and 1940 each Welfare Fund received one application from the United Jewish Appeal, covering the needs of the United Palestine Appeal, the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Refugee Service. In 1941 a separate application will be made by the United Palestine Appeal, direct to the Welfare Funds.

In writing this letter, I am animated by the thought that when our application comes before the Budget Committee or Board of your Welfare Fund, you will act as our spokesman to see that the United Palestine Appeal receives maximum consideration.

The United Falestine Appeal campaign in 1941 will be a constructive and positive campaign. It will concern itself with the deeds and the needs of Falestine. We have no quarrel with any other agency working in the field of Jewish needs. In asking for a ratio of fifty-fifty between the JDC and the UPA in 1941, there is no disparagement intended of the work of the JDC. However, the Jewish world in 1941 is not what it was in 1939 and 1940. The expenditure of public funds must be adjusted accordingly, and should be channelled in those directions where they can be most fruitful and constructive.

Having reached the decision to launch an independent campaign for Palestine, and to make a direct appeal to the Jewish public opinion in the United States, we Zionists and friends of Palestine must be prepared to dedicate ourselves during the coming year to an expenditure of energy and a generosity of time and substance such as we have never done before. Not only will the fate of the Yishuv be involved, but the prestige of our entire movement. An unsatisfactory response to our appeal, caused by our negligence, will be interpreted by the foes of the Jewish Homeland as a repudiation of Zionism and a vindication of their anti-Zionist position.

The year 1941 will not permit of routine methods, of easy-going activity, and of uninspired planning. We shall need the vision, the resourcefulness and the faithfulness of all the devoted friends of Palestine. I shall be strengthened by the knowledge that you are with us in this great cause.

It will be necessary for our friends in each community to meet during the next few weeks so as to plan a course of action in relation to their local community drive. We should also welcome an opportunity to explain our position to them.

I would appreciate hearing from you when such a meeting could most profitably be held in your community.

I appreciate your invitation to serve as Honorary Vice-Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal for 1941. I shall be gery happy to serve.

Dr. Silver has consented to address our Special Gifts Dinner in connection with our current annual Campaign, on January 14. I am highly gratified at this acceptance because our community needs a great deal of stimulation if we are to reach the increased quota which we have set. I think I know you well enough to write you frankly.

This is essentially a J. D. C. community. Only a very small proportion of our large givers are affiliated with the Zionist movement, and it would be quite impossible to obtain a large amount of money from them for the U. P. A., unless such contributions were tied in with the National Refugee Service and the J. D. C.

At the time I talked with Rabbi Silver, I was not aware of the decision not to continue the U. J. A. I assumed that he would divids his talk equally between the three agencies. Dr. Silver said nothing about the new arrangement. Gur community is determined to make a just and fair distribution, without regard to the decisions reached in New York, and, as Chairman of the Conference of Jewish Organizations here, I am familiar and deeply sympathetic with the aims and purposes of the U. P. A. However, I am realistic enough to know that a much larger amount can ultimately be secured by the U. P. A., if Dr. Silver devotes a larger part of his discourse to the needs and causes of the other two agencies.

I am not sufficiently intimate with Dr. Silver to write him on this subject and I realize that the matter must be approached with some delicacy. However, I think you are familiar enough with my interest in your organization to assist me, by stressing to Dr. Silver the entirely realistic aspects of the situation, and to feel confident that, ultimately, your organization will share in the results obtained. Dear Colleague:

I have your appealing letter of December 9 inviting the Central Conference of American Rabbis to express its willingness to associate itself with the purpose of the National Conference for Palestine, first through the adoption of an official expression of encouragement and identification, secondly through the designation of five representatives of cur Rabbinical Conference who might be observers of what promises to be a great conference, and whose presence might enhance the representative character of your Washington Meeting.

I can, of course, not write officially for the Conference as such, but I can, without disassociating myself from the office of President, express my own interpretation of the Conference's attitude toward the project about which you write.

We in America are speaking emphatically about the need of total defense, and I can conceive of no one thinking clearly and deeply about that, who does not base his thought upon our duty to bring succor, short of war, to the British in their magnificently heroic stand for Democracy and for the Democracies. To this end there is no doubt in my mind that Palestine, over which Great Britain holds the Mandate, must make itself strong not only in material defenses but in that spiritual and moral quality which makes for the heroism which will be needed for ultimate victory against the forces of tyranny and darkness. That the Jew in Palestine finds himself in a strategic position which challenges his noblest powers is clear as day. That the Jews of America must give him the encouragement of material aid and sympathetic cooperation flows naturally from that convictioh.

I shall be happy, therefore, to help in the way you ask to make the Washington Conference one which will carry to the people of Palestine the message of hope which American sympathy and cooperation will give. I shall be glad to appoint five members of the Conference who. I hope, will serve and become the symbol of our cooperation. As soon as I obtain their consent to act in this capacity, I will send you their names.

Trusting this is a satisfactory answer to your appeal. I remain, with warm, fraternal greetings.
