Do you believe that we ought to ask Rabbi Solomon Bazell of Louisville to arwange a meeting for you privately so that our Louisville friends could be bucked up to make demands upon the Louisville Welfare Fund when allotments are considered?

My dear Mr. Montor:

It is perfectly all right to invite a representative of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds to attend the next meeting of our Administrative Committee.

I would suggest that you try to obtain, through the necessary channels, a warm endorsement of our cam sign from President Roosevelt. Perhaps Dr. Wise will contact Ben Cohen.

Are you trying to get someone to occupy my pulpit here on January 26?

I am happy to know that you have gotten Mr. Paul V. McNutt for our Washington Conference.

I would suggest that Dr. Leipziger's splendid letter accepting our invitation for the Central Conference of American Rabbis be published in the New Palestine.

You have probably received the communication from the Council of Jewish Welfare Funds sent out by Mr. Sidney Hollander to all the member agencies of the Council asking them to withhold making their budgets until action is taken by the Council at its meeting next month in Atlanta, and also suggesting that an effort will be made to set up a "fact-finding and budgeting body" which will "provide information and serve as a guide to their member agencies in making 1941 commitments". The Council, under Sidney Hollander's plan, hopes to make definite recommendations to the Welfare Funds "so that they can make their 1941 decisions on a basis of carefully determined needs, rather than as a result of competitive pressure." The Council will thus make an effort to dictate to American Jewish communities what they should give to Palestine. That is clearly the intent. This organization which was called into existence to be a fact-finding organization

Mr. Henry Montor -2-January 2, 1941 is swiftly passing over into a control and dictatorship organization. A small group of people will come to control the future of American Jewish life and of world Jewish movements through this device of recommending to Welfare Funds what they should give. This subject should be the mail? item on the agenda of the UPA meeting next Wednesday. In the meantime, a strongly worded protest should be sent to the Council by the UPA questioning its right to advise communities in America to withhold making their budgets until they have heard from the Council. This action of Mr. Hollander is both unauthorized and unprecedented. Have Mr. Lipsky draft such a statement. submit it to Wise and Goldstein and then get in touch with me. I have heard from Mr. Harris of Chicago. He read me a letter which he had addressed to Mr. Goldstein. I told him that national headequarters stand solidly behind him and his friends and that we will leave the negotiations entirely in their hands. We must have an epportunity in the next few days to present our case to the Board of the Chicago Jewish Welfare Fund and to have an understanding with them what the UPA is to expect out of the Chicago campaign; else quite definitely we will lawnch an independent campaign in Chicago. I am enclosing herewith also the long letter which I received this morning from Mr. Goldsmith. The gentleman has evidently rediscovered his capacity for writing which he seemed to have lost in his curt reply to our communication last week. I am sending you a copy of the letter which I wrote to him in reply. I understand that Mr. Harris has asked you to go to Chicago next Monday. I hope that you will be able to go there. If the indications are that the Chicago Welfare Fund means to play a dilatory game to postpone a decision until their campaign is over, we shall proceed immediately with the launching of an independent campaign. Dear Dr. Silver:

I spoke by telephone yesterday to Benjamin R Harris of Chicago who stated that on December 31st he had a call from Mr. James Becker, President of the Chicago Welfare Fund, who wanted to clarify a statement that he had made to the UPA Committee which had called upon him on Saturday to demand that the United Palestine Appeal be heard at a meeting of the Budget Committee or the Board. Mr. Becker wanted to make it clear that the January 7th meeting of the Board was not designed to hear a representative of the UPA, but merely to consider whether such hearings should be conducted.

Late on December 31st, Mr. Harris received a telephone call from Samuel Goldsmith who declared that he had been receiving numerous telephone calls from all over the city with respect to the inclusion of the UPA in the Chicago Welfare Fund. He charged that Mr. Harris and the UPA were sabotaging the Chicago Welfare Fund drive.

Campaign Committee he had already taken cards, had begun to solicit and had already made reports on pledges. However, the UPA was doing its utmost to make it clear that it wanted an immediate decision from Chicago as to the share which the UPA would have in the results. It was felt that in view of various circumstances there was cause for anxiety as to the allocation to the UPA if it waited for a decision until February 15th. It therefore wanted an assurance in this regard.

Mr. Goldsmith, in his talk with Benjamin Harris, was particularly peeved that the UPA office in New York had withheld making available Sir Norman Angell for three proposed addresses in Chicago on behalf of the Chicago Welfare Fund campaign. This of course was due to the fact that the UPA could not make available a long series of speakers when the possibility existed that it would have to conduct an independent campaign in Chicago. Mr. Harris told me Mr. Becker would be in receipt

-2-Dr. Abba Hillel Silver January 2, 1941 of a selegram signed by at least thirty-two Chicago community representatives containing an immediate decision as to the allocation to the WA. Chicago has a quota of \$2,000,000, of which \$300,000 is set aside for local refugees, \$300,000 toward the building fund for a home, \$150,000 toward the deficit of the Chicago charities. In other words, a total of a maximum of \$1,250,000 would be available for everything else. Apparently Chicago is thinking in terms of some \$450,000 for the NES and toward the South American program of the JDC. \$300,000 would be available for the JDC, UPA, HIAS, ORT, etc., etc. If, therefore, \$2,000,000 is raised in Chicago, the UPA might get \$150,000 considering the frame of mind of the Chicago leadership and if \$2,000,000 was not raised, then, of course, the UPA's share would be reduced. I made it clear to Mr. Harris that whatever might be the deficiencies in the Chicago community, there was some basis for hoping that Chicago in an independent UPA campaign might raise at least \$150,000. But the danger of accepting on February 15th a ratio of something like 75-25 would hurt the UPA to the extent of hundreds of thousends of dollars throughout the country. Mr. Harris and also Dr. Solomon Goldman, with whom I have discussed this subject in New York City, suggested that I go to Chicago for January 6th and 7th to meet with the Chicago people to assist them in their final decision. Continual flow of refugees and emergency character of Palestine situation represent needs which make it imperative for United Palestine Appeal to know what moneys it is in a position to raise. We emphatically submit that it is unfair to withhold from the U.P.A. information as to its share, when five other beneficiaries of the 1941 Welfare Fund Campaign have already been definitely apprised of their allotments. Moreover, the U.P.A. is seriously handicapped in going out to the country with the indecision and uncertainty of the first of the 1941 community campaigns silent on Palestine's share in the funds demanded of the community. As representatives of a strong sentiment current in Chicago, the undersigned urge that the Board of the J.W. F. of Chicago at its January 7 meeting hear the case of the U.P.A. regarding the needs of Palestine and act on same an that Chicago Jewry may know how its funds will be distributed.

January 2, 1940 Mr. Henry Montor 41 East 42nd Street New York City Dear Mr. Montor: I am in receipt of the statement made by Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, regarding the independent campaign which the U.P.A. is to launch for 1941. I am fully in accord with the action taken by Rabbi Silver and his committee. For a long time I felt that the cause of Palestine is suffering because of this joint drive. The ideal of Zionism could not be stressed where relief had to be the main argument. I am quite confident that we shall be able to accomplish much more independently. However, there is something baffling in our own community problem. When the United Jewish Fund of Birmingham was organized, I met with a number of Jewish leaders of the "opposition", and discussed the parity of the U.P.A. and J.D.C. We arrived at the satisfactory conclusion that each of these agencies is to receive a like amount. However, since then, Joint drives have been held and the members of our community are well acquainted with the small allotment made for the U.P.A. It would therefore take quite a bit of persuasion on my part, to reconcile those leaders generally favorable to J.D.C. to allow an even allocation. May I ask you to write me whether my demand that the J.D.C. and U.P.A. be given equal amounts, is reasonable. I should be grateful to you if you were to send me a list of communities, large and small, that are doing the same. This would somewhat bolster my stand. I know that Birmingham is a community with many ardent Zionists who will support me, and I feel confident that we shall be successful in getting for the U.P.A. exactly the same amount that the J.D.C. would get. Our campaign begins Jan. 13th. Mr. Marvin Lowenthal is to be our speaker. Our quota is \$55,000. We were contemplating giving the U.J.A. \$30,000. At the present I can promise you that \$15,000 will go to the U.F.A. Dear Dr. Silver:

There were two meetings in Chicago today:

1. A luncheon attended by some sixty people. Among these were Dr. Solomon Goldman, Benjamin R. Harris, Chairman Midwest Region of the United Palestine Appeal, Dr. Albert K. Epstein, Rabbi Morton Berman, Chairman Jewish Mational Fund Council of Chicago, A. H. Rosenberg, Chairman Zionist Organization of Chicago, Rabbi Jacob J. Weinstein, Judge Harry M. Fisher, Mrs. Rebecca Soboroff, President Chicago Hadassah, Mrs. Harry Berkman, Chairman Midwest Region Hadassah, Dr. Herman Pomrenze of the Poale Zion, Rabbi Saul Silber of the Hebrew Theological College and Mrs. Miriam Gingold, Presiden Pioneer Women.

At the close of a long discussion in which many participated, there seemed to be a conviction, that a strong word should be said, at the meeting which Mr. Albert K. Epstein had arranged on his own initiative with Messrs. Becker and Goldsmith. The feeling of the group seemed to be expressed in the following resolution which was read and adopted:

Resolved that this meeting of friends of Palestine, authorize the delegation which is to represent it at the meeting with Messrs. Becker and Goldsmith, to be held this afternoon at the Standard Club, to issue the ultimation, that the Chicago W.P.A. committee be given an answer no later than Tuesday, January 14th, as to the amount of the allocation which it is to receive out of the Chicago Jewish Welfare Campaign for 1944. Failing to receive such definite assurance from Messrs. Becker and Goldsmith the U.P.A. delegation is authorized to state that the Chicago U.P.A. committee will, in cooperation with the national officers of the U.P.A., initiate an independent campaign for funds in the city of Chicago for the year 1944, and will take such other steps as in its opinion may appear necessary or desirable.

I had insisted that if anybody was going to meet with Goldsmith and Becker, that it should be a body representative of various groups.

2. The above meeting was held at 2:15 p.m. at the Standard 6lub. There was a series of interchanges, during which it became increasingly evident, that the Zionists were fearful of an independent campaign. At last Dr. Goldman said that if a prompt decision were not made, the U.P.A. would be compelled to have an independent campaign.

The whole tendency of Becker and Goldsmith was to temporize. At one point I indicated that the national U.P.A. required an immediate decision, and that if Chicago was planning to to delay a decision until the Atlanta meeting, it was inviting the opposition of the U.P.A. as expressed in the U.P.A. Administrative Committee's resolution.

The plea of Becker and Goldsmith was that they must have time to give decent consideration to all the agencies. N.R.S. is being heard Saturday, January 11th, Troper for the J.D.G. could not come before late next week.

The question finally resolved itself into when the Welfare Fund felt it could announce a decision, Goldsmith finally said that January 20th would be a reasonable date, but emphasized that he was speaking for himself alone. Mr. Becker demurred at the date, but finally seemed to accept it, but again emphasized that he could not speak for the Board as a whole.

I believe that virtually all of those present accepted with a sigh of relief the idea that the battle was to be postponed until January 20th. The attitude of the people was reflected in the failure to read the resolution which had been adopted at the luncheon meeting.

I believe that virtually all of those present accepted with a sigh of relief the idea that the battle was to be postponed until January 20th. The attitude of the people was reflected in the failure to read the resolution which had been adopted at the luncheon meeting.

At the close, when Mr. Becker was reminded that the January 20th date was underscored, he could offer no definite commitment except for his personal view. In rejoinder I said that the national U.P.A. must accordingly reserve its decision as to what it would do further.

At one point in the discussion Mr. Goldsmith said that in the meantime he would want to be able to say to the community, if confronted with complaints, that the U.P.A. was incorporated in the Welfare Fuhd, and that the only matter to be decided was that of allocation, which would be done by January 20th.

Viewing the Chicago situation realistically, I can only say that the views of Judge Fisher, as expressed at the Tuesday morning meeting at which you were present, typing the real attitude of the general Zionist leadership. I believe my return to Chicago was resented, my presence at the meeting with Becker and Goldsmith was forced upon the group, since it was felt that I was much too impatient in general. Epstein as distinct from Harris, created the mood that the national administration was forcing the Chicago people into an undesirable position. This view was inferential in my presence at least.

I give you this realistic statement so that you may judge the picture for yourself, and so that I may have a basis for disucssing it with you temorrow by phone when I arrive in N.Y. tomorrow morning.

We agreed: 1) That no arrangement for the distribution of funds be made in any trade without final consultation with us; that at no time shall we agree to less than a 40-60 arrangement (inclusive of the NRS); that a workable formula would be 20 (NRS) 40 (JDC) 40 (UPA). 2) Mr. Reis is to work out a budget for the New York City Campaign and then present it to us for final approval. 3) That a major effort in the City of New York should be concentrated upon a list of prospective special givers - four to five hundred of them who shall be approached by our people individually and solicited. These people shall be seen outside of the trades. This list should be carefully drawn up as well as the list of thirty to thirty-five of our best people who will undertake to see them. You and Mr. Blitz should together work up these two lists. I shall do all I can to urge our leaders to take cards and approach these individuals. 4) I have wired Mr. Warburg asking the JDC to let us have the use of the New York City UJA headquarters inasmuch as consented to turn over the national UJA headquarters in the JDC. I have not yet had any response. west I am convinced that the salvation of our campign lies in the City of New York, and no stone should be left unturned to score there. Dear Dr. Silver:

I spent a considerable period today with Harry L. Lurie of the Council of Federations.

(a) On the subject of the program of the annual meeting of the Council of Federations at Atlanta, Lurie said that there was a desire to avoid emphasis on any of the agencies in the formal sessions. There will be a dinner on Sunday evening, February 2nd, at which some neutral innocuous person will discuss the overseas problem. Possibly, Vera Micheles Dean of the Foreign Policy Association. The agencies will have their opportunity to present their case at their individual sessions on Monday, February 3rd. As you know, the UPA will have a session between 11:15 and 12:45 on Monday morning, February 3rd. Our speaker to present the factual story, will be Bernard Joseph, Legal Adviser of the Jewish Agency, who arrived in San Francisco today by plane.

(b) I discussed at length the relationship between the UPA and the Council and the intentions of the Council at Atlanta.

Lurie's point of view has changed considerably. You will recall that in the past few months he spoke on several occasions to you and to me about the desirability of having separate appeals in 1941, so that during one year the agencies may have an opportunity to test their mutual strength and then perhaps these constant revolutions will be terminated. He minimized the dangers and frictions that might arise from separate appeals.

But that is not his point of view today. Fe feels that the proposal of Hollander will go through at Atlanta and must go through, and that it is the desire of the "Member agencies."

The proposal is to be along the following lines:

In closing, he said that after eight years the Council now had to determine whether it had emerged from its infancy and could exercise adult functions or whether it must always remain an attenuated social research bureau.

I must confess that I was shocked by Lurie's new point of view, for I had always respected, as I still respect, his impartiality. And yet it is clear that his mind has been "reached". Perhaps I am inclined to be unfair to him and perhaps the waves of protest from the communities are as substantial as he says they are. But it is, nevertheless, clear that if we propose to halt Sidney Hollander's program, we must mobilize our maximum forces.

In the first place, I think it not only desirable but vital that you attend the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Council at Atlanta on Friday morning, January 31st. The proposal will first be presented there. If it is adopted, it will go forward to the General Assembly of the Council. If, therefore, this program is to be nipped in the bud, the first place to do it is at the Board of Directors' meeting. I think that your participation in the meeting will have overwhelming importance.

If the Board of Directors acts negatively on the proposal, then there will ultimately still be some who will offer the proposal from the Assembly. The presence of our spokesmen will therefore still be necessary.

In the meantime, I have spoken to and written to a great many of our friends throughout the country, urging them to attend the Atlanta meeting and saying that from many points of view if they had to make a choice between attendance at Washington and Atlanta, they should go to Atlanta.

Attached hereto is a copy of a letter dated January 3rd, 1941 which Mr. Edward A. Norman sent to Albert K. Epstein of Chicago and to scores of other men throughout the country.

I draw your attention to the status of the socalled American Palestine Fund with its personnel of officers. It is interesting to note that some of the foremost anti-Zionists are included among the Board of Directors and among the Board of Trustees people who have wished to have nothing to do with the UPA or with Palestine as a whole are nevertheless included. I refer to such names as Lewis L. Strauss, Harold K. Guinzburg and Mrs. Adele Rosenwald Levy, the sister of Lessing Rosenwald.

American Palestine Fund is as innocent as it sounds. On the contrary, I believe it requires early action, perhaps even legal intervention, to prevent the American Palestine Fund from becoming a body which by its misleading title alone, can serve as a competitor to the UPA. I believe that that was the reason for the creation of the American Palestine Fund.

Dear Dr. Epstein:

As a member of the Board of Directors of the American Society for the Advancement of the Hebrew Institute of Technology in Haifa, Palestine, your letter of December 23 to Mr. Lazarus White, President of the Society has been shown to me. Your remarks about the multiplicity of fund-raising funds in America on behalf of Palestinian institutions are particularly interesting to me, because, with the help of others, I have undertaken to attempt to correct the situation somewhat along the lines suggested by you in your letter to Mr. White. As a matter of fact for some time it has been my intention to ask you and your partner Dr. Harris to join us in this effort.

Several years ago some of us here in New York who were confronted with the many Palestinian appeals came together and found that we all had the same attitude as you have. We felt that the situation not only was a nuisance to us and ineffective as regards the institutions in Palestine, but actually constituted a disprace. After many discussions and after communicating with several of the leading institutions in Palestine, we eventually came to the conclusion that the thing to do was to set up in this country a single committee which would attempt to raise funds throughout the United States which would be allocated to the deserving institutions in Palestine in accordance with their merits and needs, as determined by the committee after careful, objective investigation conducted in Palestine for it by its own representatives.

A little over a year ago we finelly organized ourselves into such a committee, and have been planning our first public campaign since then. Because of current conditions it is not possible for us to maintain our own representative in Palestine but fortunately we are in a position to know a good deal about the verious activities that we are contemplating supporting and therefore the the time being will have to base our judgment on the information that we have here.

I can tell you gite frankly that we would like to have the Hebrew University come within the scope of our work, but while we have been encouraged to go ahead by officers of the University, it has not been possible at this stage for the University to place its needs in our hands, as it has built up a certain money-raising ability in this country, and until we are a going concern we do not feel that we can afford to guarantee it what it properly can expect to collect by its own efforts. It is our hope that in due time we will be sufficiently strong so that we can take in the Hebrew University without either unduly burdening ourselves or their taking any particular risk.

Our Committee does not feel that it can raise funds for other than the annual maintenance needs of institutions in Palestine and therefore it will not allocate money for capital puposes such as buildings or endowments. In cases where institutions receiving annual grants from our Committee need to raise money in this country for capital purposes we expect to give them permission to do so if we are satisfied in regard to their needs, provided they address themselves only to individuals and not to Jewish Welfare Funds in various cities.

With regard to the question of preventing independent appeals in this country we feel that once our Committee is receiving proper support from the major Welfare Funds throughout the country it will be practically impossible for any institution in Palestine to raise money

independently inasmuch as the Welfare funds will feel that their grants to us should include such institutions if they are deserving of support and we feel that we will be able to count on the Welfare Funds referring any such independent appeals to us. In due course of time this should lead to a cessation of independent money-raising efforts from Palestine in this country.

In your letter you spoke of having a single committee to raise money for the various technological activities in Palestine. We are including a number of these in our program and it is our hope to be able in the near future to include them all. or the specific institutions that we now are contemplating naming in our appeal we should raise about \$105,000, but we are planning to run a campaign for \$150,000, of which we would use about \$37,500 for allocation to institutions in Palestine other than those we would name, and \$7500 set aside for the expenses of our Committee in 1942. The expenses for 1941 have already been provided for by private subscription.

The Committee is called the American Palestipe Fund, Inc. I enclose her with a list of its Board of Directors and merican Advisory Board. We have in due time also to set up a Palestinian Board with which our representatives in Palestine would consult. You will note that our list is not yet very large as we are still in the process of obtaining suitable individuals throughout the country for our Boards. We are particularly in need of well known Zionists, such as yourself and Dr. Herris. Our committee has not political program or ideology and is intended solely to assist the various independent constructive activities in Palestine in order to elevate the standard of life in Palestine and to enable the country to absorb more people.

We would be happy if you and Dr. Harris would consent to join our Board of Directors and I would appreciate it if you would allow Dr. Harris to read this letter. Since it happens that our annual meeting is to be held on January II, it would be possible to have you and Dr. Harris duly elected members of the Board if we were to have your consent prior to that date.

Dear Mr. Montors

I have your letter of November 6th, as I told you in Milwaukee. I will consult some of my associates before giving you my definite answer. I have discussed this question with several leading men of this community, particularly the President of the Zionist Organization, who is also a member of the Budget Committee of the Jewish Welfare Fund and Secretary of the Jewish Federation. All seem to think that the present is not the opportune time to launch a separate campaign, even though that campaign be a separate one to appear only before Budget Committees for separate allocation for United Palestine Appeal.

If the war were over tomorrow, we should certainly launch a separate effort, but under present conditions, where the outcome of the war is so doubtful, and the position of Palestine so difficult to explain to the masses of people, from whom we must seek funds, and to Budget Committees, before whom we must first appear, it is my belief that, as stated above, plans for separate appears should be deferred.

We are unanimous in agreement that the National Refugee Service should not receive a larger allocation than that accorded the United Palestine Appeal. This view is based upon many reasons, chief of which is that Palestine's constructive place in world Jewry must not be made to suffer because of the necessity for pure relief in this country.

We feel that the dignity of the U.P.A. must be upheld in conferences with the representatives of the J.D.G., and that our representatives should take a firm stand with reference to the allocations for Palestine. I trust that this will give you, as bri-fly as possible, the position of our leaders as closely as I can gather it from the above mentioned conference.
