Mr. President:

All those concerned with the impact of the war upon civilian victime are grateful for the spirit of compassion which prompted you to recommend to Congress the appropriation of \$50,000,000 for assistance to refugees through the Red Gross and other agencies which you might designate.

The war has had tragic consequences for all who have come within its sphere. But its burden has been doubly heavy for the Jewish population in the areas affected. The racial philosophy of the Masi Government has placed special hardships upon Jews and made their adjustment to war conditions much more difficult than those facing the ordinary individual.

In the seven years in which Mitler has been engaged in the extirpation of Jewish life over a succession of European countries, the ancient Jewish homeland of Palestine has played an important role not alone in holding aloft a beacon of hope to the dispossessed and the disinherited, but in giving actual shelter to hundreds of thousands of men, women and children. Today the Jews of Falestine stand ready with their resources and their lives to aid the cause of the allies to which the overwhelming majority of Americans have given their moral approval because it is identified with the cause of the democracies.

Arrangements have been made and can be made for the transport of Jewish refugees to Falestine. It is estimated that in the first eight months of the war over 14,000 Jews who field from Europe were able to find shelter in Falestine. Thousands of others have legal permission to enter Falestine if funds can be made available to assist their transport to the place of safety which Falestine offers. There are thousands of Jews whose need to spitle in Falestine has become far more urgent as a result of the events in Western Europe in the part few days. To permit them to remain in the countries in which they are walting for transfer to Falestine is literally to doom them to the concentration camp or to death, for to the Jewish refugee is reserved a degree of hardship and suffering beyond those of the average refugee.

With these facts in mind, may I, on behalf of the United Palestine Appeal, respectfully submit to you the cause of these Jewish refugees who must be assisted in Europe while awaiting transfer to Palestine and to enable them to reach Palestine. It is my belief that these refugees come within the framework of the fund which you have asked the Congress of the United States to appropriate for your allocation.

My associates and I would be grateful for the opportunity of coming to Washington to discuss with the appropriate individual whom you will designate the details of this application and the actual extent of the financial requirements through which great numbers of men, women and children may be saved from the rawages of war.

The general object and purposes are primarily to collect, receive and maintain the fund or funds and apply twothirds of the net income thereof to the improvement of living conditions of unfortunate persons. It shall be within the purposes of said corporation to use any lawful means to that end which from time to time shall seem expedient to its members and trustees including the search or publication as well as establishment of benevolent activities and agencies.

The territory within which its operations shall be conducted shall be in the United States of America.

NEW YORK

An invitation was issued by wire by Dr. Stephen S. Wise to some 350 people, many of them active in Zionist affairs, and others regarded as non-Zionist. The meeting to which they are invited is to be held at the Biltmore Notel Thursday evening, July 11.

Mr. Louis Lipsky, Mr. Robert Szold, Dr. Stephen S. Wise undertook to speak to a number of leading individuals to obtain their attendance at the meeting, and their subscriptions.

CHICAGO

Dr. Solomon Goldman arranged a meeting on behalf of the loan 28. Chicago for Thursday evening, July 11. Invitations were is such to some 1,000 people.

BILLYAUKER

Dr. Solomon Goldman arranged for a lean meeting in Milwaukes on Friday noon, July 12. He is intending to fly from Chicago to address the meeting.

DEFRICIC

Dr. Goldman arranged with the cooperation of Simon Shetzer for a loan meeting in Detroit on Monday evening, July 15. Dr. Goldman will address the meeting.

A mosting has been arranged for Pitteburgh by Mr. Charles Rosenbloom, who has invited a group of leaders to his home for Tuesday evening, July 16. Dr. Nahum Goldmann has been requested as the speaker.

PETLADEL PELA

Judge Louis H. Levinthal, in cooperation with Robert H. Bernstein, is endeavoring to arrange a meeting in Philadelphin. The date will be either Monday or Tuesday. The delay is caused by the desire of the Philadelphia people to have a mon-Eicnist issue the invitation for the loan meeting. Mr. Robert Smold has been requested to address the meeting. Mr. Daniel Ellison, in cooperation with Mesers. Fish and Gellman, is arranging a meeting for the loan at the Hotel Stafford in Baltimore on June 18. Dr. Nahum Goldmann has been requested as the speaker.

OTHER CITIES.

> With the refugee problem on our very door-step, the program of the National Refugee Service, Inc., is of primary concern to all of us as American citizens. Unless both our allocation and cash problems can be worked out, further serious curtailment of our present activities is unavoidable,

> During the first six months of this year, the National Refugee Service has been attempting to stretch available resources so as to meet ever-increasing needs.

> Relief budgets, already low, were further reduced this month. Allowances for food and shelter are at a mere subsistence level. Yet the cumulative nature of our problem is such that, as every month passes, as every beat arrives, the number of refugees who may require assistance grows.

> Relief may be denied to a great many of those in need. These would then be obliged to seek help from public relief agancies. But refugees on public relief are liable to deportation, with its attendant adverse publicity.

> Our retraining program has been drastically retarded. Efforts to aid in the economic rehabilitation of refugees have been seriously curtailed. Programs of Americanization and social and cultural adjustment have not been given the emphasis due them.

The most rigid economies have been instituted; there is little still to be saved. There is no longer any choice but to admit, at this crucial juncture, that, unless our immediate financial needs are acted upon without delay, it will be virtually impossible for us to meet even the bare minimum requirements of our day-to-day undertaking.

At the time that Greater Germany and Poland were the sole sources of refugee immigration, the United Jewish Appeal allocated \$3,500,000 to us and gave us the right to apply for an additional \$500,000. Today France, Holland, Belgium, Rumania, Norway and Luxemborg are new sources of refugee immigration.

We have gone from crisis to crisis, so far as our finances are concerned, and today we are faced with such drastic curtailment Distribution Committee

of our activities that the very objectives of the agency are threatened. Only through an immediate allocation of the greater part of the \$500,000 we are asking, and recognition of our need for priority in receiving each, can new crises be averted.

While the assistance thus requested may seem to be comparatively small in dollars, should it be delayed the consequences loom large. All that we have worked for is threatened because our inability to carry out our minimum program will, of necessity, jeopardise our chances of achieving the ends for which this agency was created. Delay may be serious, not only to the refugees whom we serve, but to the American public which supports us and, conceivably, to the future of the United Jewish Appeal campaign as well as to its beneficiary agencies.

Under separate cover we shall send you a cash statement and certain accompanying data about our present situation. We are anxious to appear before your Committee and its professional representative. We urgently ask that you set an early date for an examination of our material in the hope that action may be taken, even on a preliminary or integin basis. The courtesy of a prempt response, with your guidance in the matter, will be deeply appreciated.

Dear Dr. Silver:

On Thursday, July 11th, Mr. Lamport met with six representatives of the Hofheimer Foundation in the office of Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, who was also present. From Mr. Lamport's description of the two-hour meeting, it was a hectic session.

But apparently there was no intention whatever of discussing the 1939 pledge of the Hofheimer Foundation to the New York United Jewish Appeal which I had understood was the essential purpose of the meeting. Instead, the session seems to have been arranged to persuade the United Palestine Appeal to sign a document which would assure the Hofheimer Foundation that it would give \$40,000 to the National Refugee Service without its being claimed by the United Jewish Appeal or by any of its beneficiary agencies, including the United Palestine Appeal.

The representatives of the Hofheimer Foundation took the position that 1939 was a closed book.

Attached hereto is a copy of a letter which Mr. Rosenwali addressed to Mr. Arthur M. Lamport who had perhaps indicated that the United Palestine Appeal might sign such a letter as Mr. Rosenwald seems to have drafted.

I told Mr. Lemport that no one but you would have the right to sign such a letter, if you chose to sign it.

My reading of the letter would indicate that the Distribution Committee of the United Jewish Appeal would not have the right to take the 1940 gift of \$40,000 from the Hofheimer Foundation in consideration in determining what the National Refugee Service should receive. Dr. William Haber has already indicated to me that the National Refugee Service is planning to make application to the Distribution Committee of the United Jewish Appeal for a grant in excess of \$3,500,000.

In view of my interpretation of the effect of a letter to the Hofheimer Foundation, Mr. Lamport suggested the addition of a paragraph as follows:

"It is, however, expected that when the committee on allocations for the 1940 United Jewish Appeal will convene, the National Refugee Service, Inc. will disclose the above amount, as well as all other amounts received by it to the committee, in order to enable the committee to reach a fair and equitable decision."

Will you let me know, at your earliest convenience, your decision on the following matters:

- a) Whether you wish a letter to be sent to the Hofheimer Foundation;
- b) Whether you wish to sign such a letter;
- c) Whether you think that the letter drafted by Mr. Rosenvald is satisfactory;
- c) Whether you have any suggestions as to what further action should be taken in connection with the 1939 Hofheimer Foundation pledge of \$40,000 to the New York City United Jewish Appeal which the Hofheimer Foundation has now officially repudiated in effect.

I have my own views on the attitude of the Hofheimer Foundation and the National Refugee Service in its inexorable demand for funds, but perhaps in view of the vigor of those views I ought not to express them and await your own decision and comments in the matter.

It may interest you to know that I requested of the Hofheimer Foundation a copy of the charter under which they operate in order to determine whether that charter denies them the right to make contributions to the United Jewish Appeal, as has been insisted. But Mr. Henry Siegbert, Secretary of the Hofheimer Foundation, has declined under all circumstances to permit us to examine the charter under which the Foundation operates. Mr. Rosenwald offered to provide a certified copy of a paragraph of the charter which would bear out his contention that the Eofheimer Foundation has not the power to make grants to such bodies as the United Jewish Appeal.

Telephone calls were made throughout the day today by various individuals connected with National Refugee Service. One of these was made by Mr. Ittleson this afternoon to Dr. Stephen S. Wise. Dr. Wise called me to ask what the situation was. I told him of my conversation with you this morning, and read to him the memorandum which I had sent to Mr. Rosenwali. Dr. Wise then sent the following letter to Mr. Ittlesont"In the light of Dr. Silver's communication with William Rosenwald this morning I naturally find it impossible to take up the matter with him again. Morecever, as members of the Distribution Committee for the United Palestine Appeal, we must alike keep our minds open with respect to decisions involving allocations."

Mr. Ittleson said to Dr. Wise that he contributed \$150,000 to the United Jewish Appeal: it was inclients such as this involving the Hofheimer Foundation which made him doubtful of the wisdom of unified campaigns.

I spoke to Nr. Rosenwald by telephone this morning. He feit that we had missed the essential point that was being made by the National Refugee Service. The Hofheimer Foundation Trustees adopted a resolution which specifically asks that the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee provide written assurances that any grant from the Hofheimer Foundation to the National Refugee Service will not be raised as an offset against the allocation from the United Jewish Appeal. It is therefore not the National Refugee Service but the Hofheimer Foundation which has made the demand, Mr. Rosenwald states.

He declared to me however that he could understand the attitude of the Hofheimer Foundation in demanding this assurance, since under the reading of the 1940 agreement constituting the United Jewish Appeal, the Hofheimer Foundation might place in jeopardy its contribution of \$40,000 for 1940.

Dear Mr. Ittleson:

Mr. Goldwasser has asked no to review for you the facts involved in the controversy over the Hofheimer Foundation gift of \$40,000 to the United Jevish Appeal in 1939.

COPY

The charter of the Hofheimer Foundation provides that the Foundation's activities shall be confined to the United States. As you of course know, such a provision is a limitation upon the power of the Foundation and any transgression thereof would constitute nothing less than a breach of trust. Consequently, the Foundation has always meticulously complied with this limitation. The trustees are, and so far as I know always have been, keenly alive to it. Again and again, when applications have been made, the activity of the applicant has been scrutinized to ascertain whether or not it in any way collides with this provision of our charter. More than once, causes have been presented with which the members of the Beard are intensely sympathetic but which have been turned down because, and only because, they involve activities outside the United States. It is here pertinent to call attention to the fact that when in 1938 the Foundation made a gift of \$20,000 to the National Goordinating Committee via the Joint Distribution Committee, the appropriation was carefully circumscribed so that all of it would go to the domestic activities of the National Coordinating Committee and that no offeet should indirectly draw any part of the gift into foreign channels.

Against this background, the events involved in the present controversy will loom up boldly. At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Hofheimer Foundation on April 12, 1939, the matter of a gift to the United Jevish Appeal was brought up for discussion. Immediately one of the firectors stated, and I now quote from the minutes: "We should be slow about giving to the U.J.A. directly but if we do give directly, we should earmark our contribution 'For Somestic use only." Another director suggested that we find out exactly what the agreement of the division of the funds is to be between the three organizations, before we make any commitments. Still another director proposed that, ifmx we can, we enable the U.J.A. to include the amount of cur gift for campaign purposes. At the conclusion of this discussion a resolution was unanimously adopted that a committee be appointed "to work out a method that will assure any contribution of ours, to be a contribution Net for the work of the Mational Coordinating Committee, and not subject to offert from allocation from the General Fund, thatas grant and that in the event that such a plan can be evelved, that a grant of \$40,000 be authorized for the work of the National Coordinating Committee." I invite your attention to the significant fact that this resolution was passed before the occurrence of any of the events set forth in Mr. Montor's letter to you of July 17.

On May 21, 1939, the president of the Foundation wrote Mrs. David M. Levy that at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Foundation held on April 12, 1939, a grant of \$40,000 was made to the National Geordinating Committee for the Committee on Scholars and Medical Scientists. At or about the same time, Mr. Goldwasser advised Mrs. Levy that the reason the Foundation wanted to have the appropriation go directly to the two committees was that its money would not be used in any part for work overseas, as that would be contrary to the conditions under which its gifts are made. The intervention

of a period of six weeks between the authorization of the conditional grant by the Board and the letter of notification to Mrs. Levy itself testifies to the fast that during this period efforts were being made to work out a plan whereby the gift could be effectuated in a way compatible with the provisions of our charter. After that time, as well, efforts were made almost continuously to remove the impediment from the path of our gift. Meanwhile, on October 13, 1939, the Foundation mailed a check to the National Coordinating Committee in the amount of \$25,000 on account of our grant. But hope that the complications could be cleared up soon vanished and the check had to be recalled. The Board subsequently confirmed the recall of the check and also approved a letter from Mr. Goldwasser to Mr. Lamport in which Mr. Goldwasser stated that because of certain demands made by Mr. Montor and his refusal to agree to the terms under which the grant had necessarily to be made under the permissive provisions for grants by the Hofheimer Foundation, the Board of Trustees restinded the appropriation and requested the return of the check on account. Mr. Goldwasser concluded his letter saying, "I stated to you and to others no less than a dozen times after Hr. Montor made his demands, that the inevitable result would be the less of this money for 1939. This is exactly what has occurred."

All efforts remained unsuccessful while the need of the Mational Hefugee Service (successor to the Mational Goordinating Committee) for funds became ever more acute. At our board meeting of January 11, 1940, the matter of our \$40,000 grant was again brought up for discussion, as it had been at virtually every preceding meeting of the Board since the date of the original grant. The Board's attention was called to the fact that the each condition of the Mational Refugee Service was desperate. The members of the Board felt that the situation was indicrous, for here was a contributor eager to give away \$40,000 and a recipient unable to take it although it was in dire need of it. In order to demonstrate their whole-hearted desire to cooperate, the directors voted to make a lean of \$50,000 to the Mational Refugee Service with the understanding that if the conditions of our gift were met \$40,000 of the lean shall become an outright grant. At the same time the directors adopted the following resolutions

> *RESOLVED, that \$40,000 be given to the National Refugee Service for displaced foreign scholars and displaced foreign medical scientists, provided we receive written assurances from the United Palestime Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee that this amount will not be used as an offset against any amount allocated to the National Refugee Service in any United appeal."

Time continued to wun and still the plan and simple conditions of our grant were not met, and because they were not met the lean was repaid in full. I am informed, however, that the Mational Refugee Service has received from the 1939 campaign \$40,000 less than the obligatory amount awarded it, for the sole reason that Mr. Lamport claims that M.R.S. has or should receive \$40,000 from the Hoffheimer Foundation.

On July 11, 1940, a meeting was held in the study of Dr. Jonsh Wise at which were present, in addition to Dr. Wise, Mesers. William Resenwald, Arthur Lampert, Henry Siegbert, Fred Stein, and I. Mr. Lamport began the discussion with the assertion that the Hofheimer Foundation had made a pledge of \$40,000 to the 1929 campaign, that this pledge and originally been made without any conditions, and that subsequently the Foundation attempted to attach conditions. I think it is expressing it mildly to say that Henry Siegbert, Fred Stein and I were dismayed by Mr. Lamport's statement. We thought the conference was for the purpose of obtaining the assurance, required by cur resolution, which would have made it possible for us to complete the gift or that we would be told why

such assurance was not forthcoming. Instead of this we were subjected to the charge of repudiating a solemn obligation. We attempted to explain to Mr. Lamport, as I have tried to explain above, why our gift was max and necessarily had to be subject to the conditions which were attached to it and that those conditions had always been a part of the grant. Mr. Lamport, however, refused to accept our explanation and insisted that we had made an unrestricted pledge and that we were now seeking to repudiate it. Mr. Lamport thundered that he would never directly or by implication concede that we had not made and repudiated a pledge of \$40,000 for 1939. On the other hand, Hr. Lamport conceded that a 1940 gift could be made to the Mational Refugee Sertice without offset and that he would be glad to give written assurance to that effect. It was agreed that Mr. Rosenwald would write to Mr. Lamport asking for such written assurance regarding a \$40,000 gift for 1940 and that Mr. Lamport would write a letter giving assurance against offset. When Mr. Lamport's attention was called to the fact that Dr. Silver had declined to give such written assurance on the ground that the agreement spoke for itself, Mr. Lamport qualified his promise by saying he would want to take the matter up with Dr. Silver first. Mr. Lamport emphasized, bovever, that under no circumstances would be write a letter containing even the slightest inference that the Hofheimer Foundation had not made a giftef \$40,000 for 1939 or that it had ever been relieved of the obligation incurred in the making of that pledge. I called Mr. Lamport's attention to the inconsistency between that statement and his promise to write a letter about 1940. I pointed out that the agreement for the 1940 campaign, which permits contributions by foundations to the Estional Refugee Service without offset, is followed by a proviso that there shall be no such right where the Foundation "contributed funds to the N.R.S. or U.J.A. on behalf of N.R.S. during this year 1939." If Mr. Lampart were to write a letter to the effect that a 1940 contribution could be made without offmet, he would thus be impliedly admitting that the Foundation made no contribution for 1939, assuming of course that a contribution and a pledge are the same thing, which Mr. Lamport did assume. Mr. Lamport gave no satisfactory answer to this dilouns and the meeting ended with Mr. Lamport again asserting that he would write the letter about assurance against offset for 1940 but would never in any way expressly or impliedly concede that we had not made an unrestricted pledge in 1939.

It is regrettable that the National Refugee Service should be deprived of a substantial sum of money which it so desperately needs. No amount of ingenuity can divert any part of this proposed gift into the channels of the Jgint Distribution Committee or the United Palestine Appeal, for the Hofheimer Foundation cannot contribute to those entities directly or indirectly. It must be evident to anyone who will take the trouble to analyse the facts that it is either \$40,000 to the National Refugee Service exclusively, or nothing. It seems incredible to me that in this grim hour anyone could obstruct our contribution Em to this urgent cause.

I hope I have succeeded in clarifying the situation. If you desire any further information or explemation, please do not besitate to call upon me. I, and I am sure all the other directors of the Foundation, fervently hope that a way can be found to add \$40,000 of usefulness to the National Refugee Service and that the obstacles thrown in the way of this gift may be eliminated. I think you know that the directors of the Foundation, weary of the long and unsuccessful effort to obtain compliance with our conditions and unwilling to sterilize so large a sum, with the result of denying it to other urgent causes, have placed a deedline of August lat on this gift. If the conditions are not met by that date, the directors of the Hoffneimer Noundation will be compelled to look elsewhere for the use of this part of their funds.

Dear Dr. Silver:

Mr. Henry Ittleson telephoned to me today in reference to the matter of the Hofheimer Foundation.

He felt that the explanation given by Mr. Sher of the Hofheimer Foundation with respect to the 1939 gift should end all doubte that no gift to the National Refugee Service had been made in 1939.

Mr. Ittleson stated that a fundamental point was involved in the discussions with the Hofheimer Foundation:---"How could any organization undertake to dictate to a contributor through which channel he wished to make a gift?" Nevertheless that was the decision being taken by the United Palestine Appeal. He felt that the only recourse left to a donor under such pressure would be not to give at all.

"It might be true that organizations between themselves had a right to enter into an agreement as to the manner in which they would distribute their funds, but they could not compel a contributor to give in a direction to which he was opposed."

Mr. Ittleson believed that the officers of the United Palestine Appeal failed to see that principle. He felt that the consequences of the decision with respect to the Hofheimer Foundation gift would have a definite bearing on the future. He for one had contributed \$150,000 in 1940 despite certain hesitancies and certain compromises that he had to make but he felt that he was an exception to this rule. "Not all centributors, who were opposed to certain activities or ideas, could be expected to be equally lenient."

He assumed that this subject would be discussed by the officers of the United Palestine Appeal and he requested that his viewpoint be made known, since he doubted that it had been adequately understood.

"Surely no organization was prepared to see the National Refugee Service suffer solely because a donor had certain restrictions."

> Since you have raised some questions concering the division of responsibility between the National Refugee Service and other organizations, I am pleased to send you this letter confirming and clarifying our several conversations regarding the relationship between the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society and the National Refugee Service, Inc. You know, of course, that the National Refugee Service is a national organization and is engaged in a great number of services to refugees. Among these are: resettlement, employment, vocational retraining, temporary relief and case work service, self support and loans, social and cultural adjustment, and similar activities. This letter, therefore, is written in order to clarify the division of responsibility between the Migration Lepartment of the National Refugee Service — one of our several activities — and the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society.

As to the matters that have been under advisement between us, the following is my understanding:

1. Appeals:- The National Refugee Service will rely on the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society to handle cases of individual aliens who are excluded at the ports of entry into the United States, which need to be appealed to the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization of the United States Department of Justice. It is understood, however, that in special cases, and without violating the spirit of the section, the National Refugee Service will make its own appeal after conference with the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society.

2. Pier and Dock Service:- The National Refugee Service will refer requests for pier and dock work to the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society and the National Council of Jewish Women, in accordance with the previous understanding which has been in effect for some time between these two organisations. 3. Preparation of Affidavits of Support and Other Related Documents:- The National Refugee Service will advise applicants requesting this service that there are several organisations in the city equipped to render this service, namely, the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society, and the National Council of Jewish Women, among others.

4. Resettlemen:- All matters pertaining to resettlement shall be considered the responsibility of the National Refugee Service.

5. Clearance:- It is understood that insofar as is practicable, the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society will clear cases with the Central Index of the National Refugee Service.

Should any new matters arise requiring clarification, you may rest assured that I shall welcome further discussion.

It seems to me that this is perfect evidence, piled on to all the other evidence that has been accumulating, that the United Palestine Appeal has no representative--lay or professional--in the New York campaign.

No one can predict what will happen in 1941. But 1940 has provided ample experience to show that any concession which eliminates vigorous representatives of U.P.A. interests in New York makes UPA but a three-letter word on a letter-head. Neither in the decisions which have guided the New York campaign, nor in the promotion issued by the campaign, nor in the use of personnel, has the UPA in any way had a genuine part in the New York United Jewish Appeal in 1940.

I call this to your attention because in the very near future action ought to be taken to prevent a repetition of 1940.

Since the Hebrew Sheltering and Inmigrant Aid Society is engaged in a program of immigration here and abroad, and its work is so closely identified with that of the National Refugee Service and the Joint Distribution Committee, and, to all intents and purposes, an integral part of the total program of immigration, refugee, and relief. Therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society be included in the United Jewish Appeal, the amount to be determined by negotiations between the United Jewish Appeal and the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigration Aid Society on the basis of budgetary needs and funds available.

The Jewish Welfare Fund of Indianapolis finds it impossible to make an intelligent appropriation to the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society apart from the above mentioned organizations; and since it is the sentiment of many of the leaders in the community that the United Jewish Appeal be granted maximum support, it is only possible to secure a proper allocation to the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society through the United Jewish Appeal.

Executive Director Henry Montor This is in acknowledgment of your letter of July 23rd.

My experience in Los Angeles has been rather hectic. Quite a few meetings were arranged to try to revive some of the solicitation in the men's and women's groups. In addition, I was asked to see a few of the bigger prospective givers privately. The only substantial result that may be achieved is to strengthen my hold on some of the members of the Allocations Committee, that they may be more kindly inclined toward the United Jewish Appeal.

I met with the Allocations Committee in the hope that everybody will be made to share proportionately in the losses sustained here--due largely to the motion picture industry, which is \$175,000 behind last year. I shall shortly send you a list showing the income of some of these people in 1938, their pledges in 1939, and in 1940. The cuts were uniformly steep. It is true, of course, that there is panic in Hollywood, with 40% of the market cut off by war, with many employees being dismissed, and salaries being sharply cut. I understand that Warner Bros. ever released Faul Muni because they thought his salary demands excessive.

At one of the meetings here, I met Mr. and Mrs. Sam Goldhamer. A postmar on holiday! He was spending one of his vacation evenings to listen to the story of the United Jewish Appeal.

The Union committee at the United Jewish Appeal has not been appointed, for regsons I have indicated in another memo_

I have become impatient with Rabbi J. H. Wise's request (specifically made to me to do nothing on the subject) to halt procedure on the New York campaign study, and am writing, as per copy attached.

There is a representative of the United Palestine Appeal on the subcommittee to select a research director. He is Judge Morris Rothenberg. Dr. Solomon Lowenstein represents the Joint Listribution Committee, and Mr. David Watchmaker of Boston the three Welfare Fund representatives.

You have undoubtedly learned from Judge Rothenberg the status of the appointment of a Research Director for the United Jewish Appeal.

As you have learned by this time, Emanuel Neumann was selected to handle the loan from the New York end. This represents a voluntary service on his part. My own participation in the activity is terminated. I cannot embarrass my relations with the UPA and the UJA excessively. It is necessary, of course, that the loan program should be stopped by September 1st at the latest. To drag it out would make the whole loan idea absurd, since the idea is to get adequate time for use of the money. Moreoever, we are getting closer to the period when decisions will have to be considered withirespect to 1941 campaigns. It will not be healthy to let an impression gather that Palestine has already had its campaign --through this loan.

When I had left New York, Mr. Kaufmann had not yet done anything about the loan. Perhaps the situation has changed since. But he said he did not feel it right for him to ask his friends for subscriptions to this loan as his first act as Zionist President. More important things were coming on later, and he did not want to use up his friends immediately for what was, in the long run, a trivial thing. The loan discussion which he initiated at Manufacturers Trust Co. did not eventuate into action. After a week's delay, the bank said it could take no chances with \$500,000, in view of the international situation.

During my visit to Los Angeles, I attended a luncheon given for William Shroder, who is on vacation here. He made a splendid address, analyzing the problems of Jewish communities. He was sharply critical of the laziness and encrustations of Federation boards, of the ineptness with which the refugee problem is being handled.

But what interested me most was his statement, the theme of his talk, that in the near future a battle was going to be projected in American Jewry. A number of very influential people, hostile to Falestine, had suddenly decided they were going to attack Falestine and all its works. They felt that they had been quiescent too long, that their participation in activities with Zionists had come to be regarded as approval of Zioniem; that, therefore, they must once and for all denounce the Falestine work as evil and have nothing to do with those who sponsored it.

He, Shroder, though not a Zionist and not interested in a political State--though very sympathetic to the general upbuilding of Falestine--had a warning to sound: that is, that each community should prepare itself to resist this call to break up the community: regardless of the influence, wealth and prestige of the individuals who call for such disharmony. The most important need of American Jews at this time, he said, is unity in action. Nothing is sufficiently important to destroy that prime necessity. He spoke with a great deal of feeling -- the group at the luncheon was quite representative. Apparently, Shroder is anticipating what has been privately discussed for a long time now. Shroder's remarkswere especially interesting for me -- in view of our previous attitude to him on the Allocations Committee question.

In the meantime, the Willard Hotel has been reserved for January 25-26. In checking the correspondence with the Mayflower, it is quite evident that they have no desire to book the Conference even for February.

I am returning to New York on Thursday, will spend two days in the city to clean up UJA and UPA matters, and then want to take a vacation. Looking at the records, I find that I visited more cities and talked to more meetings this year than anybody connected with the UJA. It's time for me to retire to silence for a while.

Executive Director Henry Montor Dear Dr. Silver:

Before going away on my vacation, I would like to present to you for your consideration a suggestion which. Ithink, will be helpful to the daily functioning of the United Palestine Appeal, and would also be helpful to me, in removing from me the full responsibility for decisions that must constantly be made with respect to the daily and practical activities of the United Palestine Appeal.

During the coming months decisions on policy and concrete details will have to be made constantly. They will apply to a variety of problems, such as contact with the Research Director of the United Jewish Appeal, relations with the New York United Jewish Appeal, development of a United Palestine Appeal program in New York City, relationships between the United Palestine Appeal and the Emergency Committee, etc., etc.

It occurs to me that it would be very desirable if an Office Committee could be created which would be expected to meet in the United Palestine Appeal office every day, if necessary, but certainly frequently during the week. I thought that Mr. Lipsky as Chairman of the Emergency Committee might very appropriately be Chairman of this Office Committee, which might consist of three or four other people. These might include Charles Ress for the Keren Hayesod and Dr. Israel Goldstein for the Eeren Kayemeth. In this way there would be an avoidance of difficulties that might arise when questions involving the consent of the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth are concerned. There might also be someone like Amthur M. Lamport, as Treasurer of the United Palestine Appeal.

It would be understood, of course, that all decisions of policy would be made as heretofore, that is, under your direction, but what I am worried about are not the major decisions of pelicy, for which there are appropriate channels, but the smaller problems which have bearing on policy, and which ordinarily have to be decided by myself alone. I think it would be much healthier for all concerned if these decisions were not made by myself alone.

Please let me know at your convenience what you think of

this idea as a means of simplifying and facilitating the daily operations of the United Palestine Appeal.

The existence of such a committee would provide the lay contact which for routine purposes with such bodies as the New York United Jewish Appeal, the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Refugee Service, we do not have at present, and with whom we need constantly to be in contact, for such a variety of reasons as exchange of currency in European countries, consultation on campaign procedure, excess distribution of funds, etc.

I have seen your memorandum of August 23rd containing a second draft of the outline you are preparing in summary of your examination on behalf of the Distribution Committee of the United Jewish Appeal.

In general, I should like to express appreciation for the thoroughness with which you are preparing to study the problem. I am looking forward to the opportunity of close contact with you for the submission of material and to cooperate with you in every way possible.

There are certain observations of a basic nature that I should like to make at this time on a tentative basis;

On Page 3, Clause 2, Section A, there is the phrase "recurring charity". In subsequent sections of your memorandum you have indicated that there is a basic distinction between the program projected for Palestine and that which may be attempted elsewhere either on a smellorative or reconstructive basis. No program affecting Palestine can be judged on a plane whose foundation is solely charity. Knowing as I do your thorough familiarity with the Zionist movement, I am sure that I need not elaborate on this point.

Your, yourself, have called attention to the significance of the Falesine enterprise and its incommensurateness with other programs in Jewish life in pointing out on Page 4, Clause 3, Section B, that distribution must also take into account the "philosophy of Jewish life".

On Page 6, Clause F. Section 2, you ask the question whether amounts raised outside the United States shall affect allotment ratios within the United Jewish Appeal. If you are studying the amounts raised for assistance purposes not only in the United States but also abroad. I am sure that you will also make a study of the amounts which the countries to which assistance has been given have themselves raised for their local programs. I refer, for example, to such countries as Germany, Rumania, Hungary, Switzerland, Belgium, Holland, Foland, etc. It would be interesting to determine the ratios of outside and local self-assistance.

On Page 7, Clause M, referring to "past quotas", you speak of a miscellany of reports dated Hovember 12, 1938, November 15, 1939, February 8, 1940. I would appreciate clarification as to what reports are referred to.

On Page E, you indicate the desirability of taking a poll of community sentiment with regard to allocations. I assume that you have been considering how such a proposal squares with the fundamental purpose of the Distribution

Committee to study facts and needs objectively.

On Page 11, Clause 8, Section A, you mention the desirability of ascertaining what other organizations in related fields have been raising for assistance abmoad. May I suggest that it would form an interesting section of your report to determine what sums are remitted by Jews in America for assistance to relatives and friends abroad. It might be noteworthy to determine the relationship between private and public support.

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In Section A, you have indicated a number of organizations. I assume that these are merely illustrative in character and that you are planning to make studies of as many other organizations as possible, such as the Santo Domingo Settlement Association, the Joint Reconstruction Foundation, the Refugee Economic Corporation and the many organizations associated with or deriving their support from the National Refugee Service.

Dear Friend:

The New Year finds the world in a grave hour of crisis. Every nation is shedding its blood in defense of its life. Every nation striving to survive must be prepared to make sacrifices. The measure of effort that must be exerted to live freely was summed up by Winston Churchill in calling upon the English people for "blood, sweat and tears."

The year that is now ending for the Jewish people has added incalculably to already intolerable burdens. But the cause of the Jewish people is not lost. It is not lost because it is the cause with which all free men are bound up. It is the cause whose triumph is the only beacon which is giving strength, courage and faith to all that is civilization.

In one part of the world it is given to Jews as a people to demonstrate pre-eminently their capacity for courage and perseverance. In Palestine, a strategic war center, some five hundred thousand Jews are standing fast against mounting dangers. They are preserving the historic gains and achievements of the Jewish National Home. In the world struggle against Hitlerism, whose chief bulwark today is the British Empire, Palestine occupies an important position. All who look to England as the front line for the defense of our own America must recognize that in g strange pattern of events it is the Jews of Palestine who kax have been called upon to play an important role in those events whose outcome is of such moment to the United States.

From the very first day of the outbreak of war, the Yishuv insisted upon its right, as a community, to bear arms. It was only several months ago that a limited acceptance of that right was forthcoming. Immediately, the Jews of Palestine filled all the places that were open for volunteer service in the various units of the British Army of the Middle East. That quick response again emphasizes the stature of the Yishuv.

The token of the calibre of Palestine Jewry is to be found in the record of the past year. It was a year of severe testing, linked to events in the Mediterranean, the collapse of France, the interruption of normal markets, the slamp in employment, the adjustment to new industrial needs, and facilities. There was hardship and suffering. But the Yishuv remained unshaken. It gave to the Diaspora an example of character. While the marmi normal adaptations to new circumstances proceeded, there was a continuation of the building program of the Jewish National Home. Immigration, at a lower rate than in some other years, but nevertheless substantial, went on. Frequent dispatches told of the establishment of new colonies, the extension of colonisation frontiers. The onerous tasks of integrating certificated and non-certificated immigrants into the country went on. New enterprises were launched.

We in America owe much to and can receive much from Palestine Jewry. We should pledge ourselves in this New Year season to enlarge our support of embattled Palestine Jewry that is fighting for rights to which our own destiny is linked. If our faith will match that of the Yishuv, we will not be discouraged by the difficulties and hazards which seem disproportionately magnified at a distance of six thousand miles.

Already the Yishuv has served to stimulate and inspire world Jewry. Rooted in the soil of our ancient homeland, it has shown its ability to build under all circumstances -and to fight with dignity and skill. Confronted by a steady succession of new problems, it has adjusted itself to them like finesteel. To Jews the world over -- and to us in the United States -- the Yishuv has sounded this tocsin: Build soundly where you are and be prepared with sacrifices to resist encroachments upon your fundamental rights as men.

That is the message of encouragement and of strength that comes to us in this New Year season from the Jews of Palestine.

For your information, I should like to indicate that I am negotiating with Jacob Rich to act as field representative for the United Palestine Appeal, with headquarters in Chicago.

Mr. Rich is at the present time, and has been for some years, Executive Director of the Newark Jewish Welfare Fund. He is retiring from that position in perfectly amicable circumstances, but he is dissatisfied with his own progress. He has been confronted with a peculiar situation of leadership which has not permitted him to bring in any new blood and to develop his own ideas on how a campaign should be run.

Pricr to his association with the Newark campaign, Mr. Rich was for some time a member of the staff of the New York United Palestine Appeal. He is a man of good appearance and good background, and should be able to serve the interests of the United Palestine Appeal well.

The reason that I am sending you this note is to inquire whether you have had any personal experience with Mr. Rich that might be helpful in forming a judgment on him.
