October 1, 1940 Mr. Henry Montor United Palestine Appeal 41 East 42nd St. Mew York, N.Y. My dear Mr. Montor: The telegram which I received from Mr. Edward Warburg left me somewhat disturbed. I quoted in my telegram to him the statement which ou made in your letter that Rabbi Jonah Wise had been granted access to the list while the UPA was denied access to it. Mr. Tarburg's telegram frankly contradicts this. You will agree with me that it is of utmost importance that the statements which you make to me are Should be completely authenticat d because I have no opportunity to chack up on them, and if they are incorrect or only partially correct, I am likely to be embarrassed as I was in this case. Mr. Bernstein called me this morning, long distance, and asked me whether I had any objection to maving a sentence inserted in one of the paragraphs of our letter stating that one of the best ways to serve the interests of Palestine at this time is to contribute to the United Palestine Appeal through the United Jewish Appeal. Dear Mr. Alpert: The September 27th issue of The New Palestine was a serious disappointment to the United Palestine Appeal. Perhaps it had not been brought to your attention that the major factor in granting a subsidy of \$54,000 a year to the Zionist Organization of America from the income of the United Palestire Appeal was the utilization of space in The New Palestine to describe the activities and the needs of the United Palestine Appeal to the constituents reached by The New Palestine. To have found completely missing any reference whatsoever to the United Palestine Appeal, after many pages of material had been submitted to you, was, therefore, most unusual. It may be contended that there was not sufficient space within the paper for inclusion of material relating to the United Palestine Appeal. Nevertheless, on page fourteen, an item is published under the heading, "New Council to Aid Palestine Institutions". It should be of interest to you that the United Palestine Appeal has taken serious issue with the formation of this Council and has questioned the basis on which it has been organised. Thus, to give space to this Council in The New Palestine is inferentially to pass the approval of the Zionist Organization of America upon its existence. As Editor of The New Palestine, yours is the task to determine what shall be the contents of the paper. At the same time, it is the function of the United Palestine Appeal to determine how its funds should be most fruitfully disbursed to comserve its best interests. I must call the attention of our officers to the omission in The New Palestine of September 27th and hope that the cooperation which the United Palestine Appeal has every right to expect will be forthcoming in adequate measure. ### MEHORANDUM

TO: Mr. Henry Mcntor

This is to acknowledge your memorandum of September 23rd, together with a copy of the memorandum that Mr. Coons sent to Rabbi Jonah B. Wise and Mr. Joseph C. Hyman.

As I am not in the habit of sending copies of the exchange of our memoranda to Mr. Coons, Eabbi Wise or Mr. Hyman, let me point out the injustice of the statement made by Mr. Coons. There are several gross inaccuracies made in Mr. Coons' memorandum to you, copy of which is circulated to the leaders of the JDC. In the first place, Mr. Coons could not have read the mimeographed letter that has gone out to the JMF leaders in the Seaboard Region and state that we have sent Mr. Shafer for the purpose of organizing campaigns for the JNF. To be sure we made reference to what is happening in Fel-Aviv, but we are not suggesting in the slightest that there should be campaigns for the JNF for the purpose of meeting the situation in Palestine. In the second place, the communication makes it very clear that the purpose of Mr. Shafer's visit is to strengthen our JNF work in the region. One does not have to use the word "traditional" in every communication, but obviously the last four lines of the third paragraph in the letter, copy of which I am enclosing herewith, suggest that Mr. Shafer should help to strengthen our JNF committees. We have not suggested in the letter, nor have we in cur instructions to Mr. Shafer told anyone to conduct any campaigns. I am sorry to completely disagree with Mr. Coons.

This is another example of the gross misinformation. It indicates a lack of responsibility when the name of Dr. Goldstein is being used as having sent out an appeal for a Yeshivah in Palestine. Please tell Mr. Coons that I spoke to Dr. Goldstein and he states that he has never sent out such a letter. In all probability it is another Rabbi Goldstein referred to who is interested in Yeshivahs. If all the other information contained in the memorardum is just as correct, I think the matter can be dismissed very quickly excepting that Dr. Silver and the others concerned ought to know the kind of statements that are made about the JNF.

For the fiftieth time, I repeat that the Jewish Maticaal Fund does not engage in any competitive effort. If it is the purpose of Mr. Coons to make up a case, he is not successfully accomplishing it, because the evidence is quite the contrary.

I am sending a communication to Mr. Ellison, copy of which is enclosed herewith, in clarification of the whole matter.

Will you also tell Mr. Coons that Mr. Shafer is not in Maryland now and does not expect to be in Maryland for some time to come.

The letter referred to went out to all the JNF leaders in the area, but it does not mean that Mr. Shafer will immediately proceed to Maryland. Mr. Simon J. Levin informed us that the UJA is to have its campaign there. We have, therefore, advised Mr. Shafer not to go to Maryland at this time.

It is also desirable that you should communicate with Dr. Silver giving him the contents of this communication in the light of Mr. Coons' request and that Rabbi Silver should intercede.

Please assure Mr. Coons that since we have not contemplated to conduct any special effort in Maryland there is nothing to call off. We have asked Mr. Shafer before not to go to Maryland.

JEWISH NATIONAL FUND OF AMERICA 0 0 September 19, 1940 P In view of the present situation and the number of problems arising out of the war, you will, of course, be deeply interested in meeting Mr. Meyer Shafer, the official representative of the Jewish National Fund of America, who is being made available for the Seaboard Region just as he was last season. Mr. Shafer will endeavor to communicate with you, giving you as near as possible the time of his visit to your community. In the meantime, we are sending you this initial communication so that you may know that Mr. Shafer has been assigned to the Seaboard Region and will, in cooperation with Mr. Daniel Ellison, President of the Seaboard Region, and our other key workers, visit your community for the purpose of helping you strengthen the work of the Jewish Mational Fund. The recent outrages in Tel Aviv have, of course, aroused not only every Jew in this country but the non-Jewish community as well. It is our sacred duty to sustain and maintain our position in Palestine by vigorously supporting the program for the redemption of the soil. Whatis our program and what plans you should pursue in strengthening the Falestine Land Redemption program will be outlined by Mr. Shafer, who is himself a Palestinian and who is conversant with the various aspects of our work. Of utmost importance is to strengthen J. N. F. Committees in every city. We want to have a strong and effective organization which is needed so vitally in meeting the problem arising out of the War. The Lewish National Fund Administration expresses its deep sense of appreciation to you for your past cooperation and is confident that you will give Mr. Shafer the benefit of your fullest help on this forthcoming visit to your community. My dear Mr. Ellison: Mr. Mostor forwarded to us today a copy of a memorandum which Mr. Coons addressed to him, under date of September 23rd, copy of which communication has been sent to Rabbi Jonesh B. Wise and Mr. Joseph C. Hyman. I wrote to you not once but twice and so did I write to Simon J. Levin and to the chairman of the JNF for the Seaboard area. concerning the arrangements to send Mr. Meyer Shafer to the Se a board area. It was explicitly agreed that Mr. Shafer is to visit those communities where the UJA is not conducting any campaigns. A list of these communities have actually been furnished to us by Simon J. Levin. We have sent out a form letter to our key list in the Seaboari area, copy of which is enclosed herewith, in which we informed the key leaders that Mr. Shafer is to visit the communities in due course for the purpose of strengthening the JNF work. We are not conducting any campaigns. It is not our intention to send Mr. Shafer to Cumberland or to any other city where a UJA campaign is to be conducted. We are just as much interested as Mr. Coons is in the success of the UJA campaign. As beneficiaries of the campaign, it would be foolhardy for us to interfere in the slightest. On the contrary, it is our duty to help. I am sending you this communication in clarification of the situation, so that you can inform Mr. Montor, Mr. Cooms and everyone else concerned

Sept. 24, 1940 Mr. Daniel Ellison - 2 that we are working in the closest cooperation. The plans for sending field representatives are coordinated through the Seaboard area. For the present Mr. Shafer has been sent to Norfolk. Please be assured that we will not send Mr. Shafer to Maryland until we have a full consultation with you and Simon J. Levin. I assumed that after it was agreed that Mr. Shafer should go into the area and the list of communities sent to us where UJA campaigns were to be held, that no further consultation was needed on the matter. I am, therefore, very much surprised that you stated at the meeting referred to by Mr. Coons that you were very much upset about the letter which I sent out, copy of which I am enclosing for your information. I attach hereto for your consideration, at your convenience, (I realize that you have tasks of your own during this High Holiday period) a memorandum from the Accountant of the United Jewish Appeal. It deals with the financial relations between the Jewish National Fund and the United Jewish Appeal.

I should like your authorization to use my judgment in determining when income remitted to the JNF, through a Welfare Fund, specifically belongs to the United Jewish Appeal. I believe that we owe it to our good faith in respecting our agreement to see to it that every sum which is legitimately owed to the United Jewish Appeal by the Jewish National Fund should be taken on as a debit by the United Palestine Appeal.

I have indicated on the left-hand margin of the accompanying memorandum in parenthesis my observation by "yes" or "no" as to whether the United Palestine Appeal should take on this charge.

I should like to have your decision so that I may clear this matter off the books of the United Jewish Appeal as promptly as possible.

Subject: JNF Adjustments - 1939 and 1940

Mrs. Balter and I met with Mr. Fisher on September 25, and following are the results of our meeting:

| (Yes) | Asbury Park, N.J. | 1939 - \$ 200 | On June 17, 1940, F.R. Lipsky reported that the campaign expense figure of \$1,697.61 included \$200 remitted to the JNF for the Golden Book. Mr. Montor advised Mr. Herman on July 3, that he believed the JNF should transfer this manay to the DJA. |

(Yes) Asbury Park, N.J. 1940 - \$ 300 On June 17, 1940, F.R. Lipsky advised us that \$200 was again being deducted from the campaign for the Golden Book.

Regarding these two items, Nr. Fisher stated it is his understanding that funds contributed for Golden Book certificates are not to be transferred to the UJA, even if deducted from campaign proceeds.

1940 - \$ 175

Our records show that the JMF held a meeting in March, at which \$175 was raised. Mr.

Fisher stated that this sum represents payment on two Golden Book certificates.

(\$25 is still due the JMF for these certificates.) The UJA campaign is scheduled for November.

### Golden Book Items (Continued)

(Yes) Springfield, Ma. 1939 - \$ 100 On

On June 7, 1940 we were advised that \$100 had been allotted to the JNF from the Federation campaign. Mr. Fisher stated that the UJA will have to ask Springfield for the \$100 involved, as the community received a certificate for the \$100.

(Yes) Utica, N.T. 1939 - \$1,200

On June 12, 1940, we received a financial report of the Utica campaign which indicated that \$1,200 had been sent to the JNF. (This amount was deducted from the campaign proceeds for 12 Golden Book inscriptions). On June 26, Mr. Montor suggested that we arrange with the JNF for the transfer of the \$1,200 to the UJA.

Mr. Pisher stated that we will have to ask Troy for the \$1,200 in this case, as the JNF gave Utica 12 Golden Book certificates for the \$1,200 JNF received, and unless Utica wishes to return the certificates the JNF cannot transfer the \$1,200 to the UJA.

(Yes) Warren, Pa. 1939 - \$ 100

In June 1940, Mr. Fisher advised us that the JMF had received \$178.02 from Warren through traditional collections. Yesterday.
Mr. Fisher reported that the JMF had received \$100 for an inscription in the Golden Book. He stated that the UJA would have to request this amount from Warren.

In accordance with our records the Warren Federation allotted \$100 to JNF from its campaign proceeds, for a Golden Book inscription in honor of Dr. Michael V. Ball.

(No) Leavenworth, Hans. 1940 - \$ 100

In April 1940, F.R. Dunner reported that the Golden Book was included for \$100 in the campaign, Er. Fisher stated that the JEF has received only \$28.40 from Leavenworth for 1940. This amount represented traditional collections.

### Machlath Items

(Yes) Southern Illinois 1940 - \$1,000

On June 27, 1940, F.R. Davidson reported that the JNF had been allotted \$1,000 from the campaign proceeds.

Mr. Fisher stated that the contribution of \$1,000 represented funds to be used for the srection of a grove in honor of Mr. Glassman, deceased. Mr. Fisher stated that if the community advised the UJA that this \$1,000 was part of the campaign proceeds, he agrees that the \$1,000 should be transferred to the UJA. This matter is being checked further.

(Yes) Middletown, Conn. 1940 - \$ 300

Our records show that Machlath Conn. is one of several beneficiaries which are included for 5% of the campaign proceeds.

Mr. Fisher stated that the JNF has received 5300 from Middletown for 1940, but it was his understanding that this represented traditional collections. When it was pointed out to Mr. Fisher that according to our information this \$300 was part of the campaign proceeds, he stated he would look into the matter.

(Yes) New Haven, Coan. 1940 - \$1,333,34

On July 5, 1940, Mr. Becker (Exec.Dir. of the Welfare Fund), asked Mr. Montor whether the \$1,333.34 allocated to the JNF for Nachlath Conn, should go directly to the JNF or be added to the UJA allotment of \$46,000. In his letter of July 9, Mr. Montor replied that it was for the community to decide whether the amount should be added to the UJA allotment or whether it was the desire of the community to consider that the amount represented a "commitment undertaken by the JNF on behalf of a specific community or group of communities for a specific project and, therefore, outside the normal program of the UJA. Only July 15, Mr. Becker advised Mr. Montor that the UJA allotment was \$46,000.

Mr. Fisher stated that the JWF received \$533.34 to date from this community. Even though the funds alletted to the Nachlath project were part of the campaign proceeds, it is Mr. Pisher's understanding that such funds are not to be transferred to the UJA.

### Machlath Items (Continued)

(Yes) \*Corpus Christi, Texas 1939 - \$ 500 This information was taken from the Council of Federation Bulletin, which we received January 9, 1940.

Mr. Fisher stated that only \$320 had been received to date, but that this represents a contribution to the Nachlath fund,

(Yes) \*Corsicana, Texas 1939 - \$ 40 According to the list of allocations forwarded to us on May 18, the JNF was allotted \$40 from the campaign.

Mr. Fisher stated that the funds received in this case, \$40. represented a contribution to Nachlath, Texas.

(Yes) \*Port Arthur, Texas 1939 - \$ 100 On March 10, 1939, Mr. Braunstein reported that the JNF was included in the Sudget for \$100.

Mr. Fisher stated that \$100 represents a contribution to Machlath Texas.

\*Mr. Fisher states that these amounts represent payments on projects started about five years ago and that in accordance with the terms of the agreement, the JMF was given permission to accept funds in these cases.

When Mr. Fisher's attention was called to the fact that \$1,200 allotted by Beaumont for Machlath Texas was credited to the UJA allotment with the approval of Mr. Montor, Mr. Fisher stated that in Beaumont no commitment had been made for a specified amount for the Texas Machlath project and that is why the JMF consented to the UJA's retaining the \$1,200.

(No) Fort Worth, Texa:

1940 - \$ 525 In a list of allotments received from
Mr. Weisman on September 10, 1940, there
was included \$525 for the tree fund. Upon
inquiry the JNF sent us a copy of a letter
from Mr. Brachman advising that the \$525
is an extra contribution from Fort Worth
pre-dating the Federation campaign.

### Nachlath Items (Continued)

(No) Troy, N.Y. 1940 - \$2,500

On May 11, 1940, Mr. Geodman advised Mr. Montor that of the \$13,500 allotted to the UJA "\$2,500 was passed to go to the Jewish National Fund for trees in Palestine".

On May 14, 1940, Mr. Montor wrote Mr. Goodman that "The United Jewish Appeal is assuming until further notice that the \$13,500 that was allotted from Troy is an allocation directly, specifically and exclusively to the UJA in which the Jewish National Fund is a constituent". On May 15, Mr. Goodman stated that the \$3,500 was to come out of the total allotment of \$13,500. "as the check was given to the Hebrew Charities by Miss Kirchner, (now deceased).

On May 17, 1940, Mr. Magida advised that the \$2,500 allotted to the JNF was a bequest or gift from two elderly sisters.

On May 20, Mr. Fischer wrote Mr. Montor that Miss Kirchner's contribution was considered as a bequest. Mr. Cooms questioned the JNF considering as a bequest a contribution from a living person.

Hr. Fisher stated that Troy. N. Y. has contributed only \$192.25 for 1940, representing traditional collections. Mr. Fisher advised that if the \$2,500 is received by the JNF, the matter will be discussed further.

### Traditional Items

(No) Cape Girardeau, Mc. 1940 - \$ 4.50

Although our F. R. advised us that \$150 was raised by the JMF when their F.R. wisited the community in May, Mr. Fisher stated that only \$4.50 was received from this community representing traditional collections. The UJA campaign was held in March, \$1,154 having been contributed to date.

(No) Lexington, Mo. 1939 - \$ 50

On December 11, 1939, Mr. H. Swarts advised us that he had contributed \$50 to the JNF. Mr. Fisher advises that JNF received \$74 from this community for 1939 appraisanting traditional collections.

The UJA received no funds from Lexington for 1939. We have six names on our mailing list for this community. Our records show that Lexington was included in the Kaneas City 1940 campaign.

### Traditional Items (Continued)

(No) Golumbus, Nebraska 1939 - \$ 64

On March 28, 1940, F.R. Dunner reported having been advised by several Columbus leaders that \$64 had been contributed to the JMF in February 1939, - one month in advance of the UJA 1939 campaign. The UJA received \$484 from Columbus in 1929.

Mr. Fisher stated that the \$64 received from this community in 1939 represented traditional collections.

(Yes) New Kensington, Pa. 1939 - \$ 100

On June 1, 1940, we received the auditors' confirmation, returned by officers of the campaign, which indicated that \$100 had been remitted to the JEF.

Mr. Fisher stated that the \$100 received by the JMF for 1939 represented traditional collections, and not a contribution for the Golden Book as previously reported. If he finds that the \$100 was part of the Federation allotment, as we have been advised, the \$100 will be returned to the UJA.

### Miscellansous Itans

(No) Leonineter-Fitchburg. Hase. 1939-\$300

On March 10, 1940, Mr. LeRoy reported having seen a list of 1939 allotments which included \$500 sent to the JMF because they had eliminated all traditional collections.

Mr. Fisher stated that the JNF had received \$300 "in lieu of traditional collections".

(No) Leominster-Fitchburg, Nass, 1940-\$1,000

On April 17, 1940, F.R. LeRoy reported that he had been told by Harry Levine that the JNF had asked for a special amount for a special purpose. Hr. Levine refused to specify the amount requested.

On May 8, 1940, F.R. LeRoy reported that despite his protests the community leaders intended giving JNF \$1,000 in 1940. Mr. Fisher further stated that when leaders informed Mr. Fisher of their desire to give the JNF \$1000, he advised them that the JNF was unable to accept this contribution.

Mr. Fisher states that to date only \$151.40 representing traditional collections, has been received from these communities.

### Miscellaneous Items (Continued)

(Yes, Fort Wayne, Ind. 1940 - \$ 500 if received)

In a list of allotments issued by the Fort Wayne Fund, the JNF was included for \$500. Mr. Fisher stated that the JNF has received no funds from Fort Wayne to date. (In 1939 the JNF received \$500 from Fort Wayne, and has transferred this amount to the UJA.)

(Yes)Alexandria, Va. 1940 - \$ 103

On May 26, 1940, Mr. Irving Diener reported that \$100 of the amount raised in Alexandria had been turned over to the JNF.

On June 18, 1940, in reply to an inquiry from Mr. Montor, Mr. Fisher stated that the community had contributed \$115, of which \$7 was for collections, \$5 for stamps and \$105 received in April. He stated, "whether this amount was received from the local campaign in lieu of the traditional collections or whether it was an outright allocation can be adjusted between us."

At our meeting yesterday Mr. Fisher again promised to look into the matter.

(Yes) Wynne, Ark.

On May 11, 1940, F. R. Weisman reported having been advised by Mr. Bornstein of Wynne that due to the insistance of a group of local Zioniste, he had sent \$50 to the JNP three or four weeks ago, the \$50 being part of the campaign proceeds.

In reply to a letter from Mr. Montor, Mr. Fisher stated that Forrest City & Wynne have given the JNF \$50 from year to year representing miscellaneous collections.

At our meeting yesterday, Mr. Fisher stated that this contribution represented a voluntary gift.

On August 28,1940 Louis Feingeld, Sec'y., Treas. of the Jewish Community Council, advised us that \$25 had been sent to the JNF, and that this amount was to be applied against the UJA 1939 allotment.

Mr. Fisher stated it was his understanding that this \$25 represented an individual contribution, and even though Winston-Salem conduct: a Federation campaign, it is Mr. Fisher's understanding that the JMF is permitted to accept personal contributions in such cases. Mr. Fisher stated that we will have to ask Winston-Salem for the \$25.

(Yes) Winston-Salem, N.C. 1939 - \$ 25

### Miscellaneous Items (Continued)

(Yes) Providence, R. I. 1939 - \$3,000

On June 3, 1940, F.R. Douglas sent us a list of allotments which included \$2,000 for the JNF emergency campaign.

Mr. Fisher stated that after the Providence campaign was completed, the JNF solicitors canvassed people from whom the campaign committee had been unable to obtain funds, and that \$2,000 was raised in this way. He felt that we should communicate with the leaders and if it is their desire to include the \$2,000 in the UJA allotment, the JNF will transfer the funds to the UJA. (Providence still owes the UJA a balance of \$9,938,91 on the 1939 campaign).

(No) Marshalltown, Iowa, 1940 - \$ 300

Our F.R. advised that \$300 was raised in January at a meeting arranged by the JNF. Mr. Fisher confirms this information. The UJA campaign was not held until June 1940, and the UJA pledge totals \$982.50.

(Yes, Breckton, Mass. 1940 - if received)

MR H advised that \$500 had been assigned to Breckton as its share of a \$250,000 emergency fund for the JNF.

Mr. Fisher has no information regarding this community.

Green Bay, Wisc. 1940 -

On September 11, 1940, Mr. Schlessinger reported that he had been advised by Mr. Zucker, Chairman for the Green Bay campaign, that the JMF representative had requested \$1,200 from Green Bay. On September 16, Mr. Montor requested Mr. Pisher to furnish him with information regarding this community.

Rock Island, Ill. 1940 -

We are in receipt of information from Mr, Schlessinger that the JNF is trying to arrange for an appeal on Nom Kippur. (The campaign in which the UJA will be included is scheduled for about October 25.) Mr. Schlessinger further advises of plans by the JNF for a state-wide campaign in Illincis.

Mr. Fisher will check this matter.

### Miscellaneous Items (Continued)

(No) Fond du Lac, Wise, 1940 -

On August 31, 1940, we received a letter from Harry G. Cramer in which he stated that funds had been alloted to the JNF. (F.R. Schlessinger has been asked to check this matter).

Mr. Fisher has no information regarding this community.

Breckenridge, Texas 1940 -(Yes, if received) On September 13, 1940, Mr. Weisman advised us that Charles Bender would not associate himself with the campaign unless we agreed to allow part of the funds to be allocated to the JMF. Therefore, it was agreed that a token centribution would go to the JMF out of the funds raised. Mr. Weisman advised that the actual amount to go to the JMF will not be decided upon until the drive is completed and nothing will be allocated to the JMF if Bender repeats his 1939 performance and fails to contribute to the local campaign.

Mr. Fisher has no information regarding this community.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I should like your decision in the following matter involving our relation to Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Atlantic City holds its campaigns in November of each year to apply to the following calendar year. Thus, a campaign to be held in November 1940 would involve funds to be allocated for the calendar year 1941.

I am urging a decision, at least insofar as the United Palestine Appeal is concerned, that we disassociate ourselves from the Atlantic City Welfare Fund. The following are the reasons:

Atlantic City has a Jewish population of 10,000. Throughout the history of its Welfare Fund it has consistently used the foreign appeal, including Palestine, in order to raise funds overwhelmingly for its Jewish Community Center. I regard the satisfaction of local needs as important. At the same time I regard it as unfair and immoral that under the cloak of an overseas appeal a community should maintain its local institutions.

The record of contributions to the United Palestine Appeal from Atlantic City is as follows:

| In 1936 | \$1,000 |

| in 1938 | 4,000   |

In 1939 with the formation of the United Jewish Appeal, it was hoped that the Atlantic City Welfare Fund would repair its ways, but for the year 1939 the United Jewish Appeal, which included the United Palestine Appeal, the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Refugee Service received \$19,112.69 as an allotment. Toward that allotment there has been paid in cash the sum of \$18,082.24.

For 1940 the U.J.A. was alletted \$17,000 (minimum) out of a total raised of \$50,240, but the U.J.A. has received in cash, approximately one year after the campaign was held, \$2,000 on account of that allotment.

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver - 2 -October 1, 1940 My observations and conclusions on Atlantic City are not based on a temporary, one year incident, but on at least five years of careful study of its practises and the good faith of its leadership. If we enter the Atlantic City Welfare Fund we shall not receive any better treatment than we did before. But beyond all this we are losing the good will of many of our best friends and contributors in Atlantic City who realize that when they give money to the Atlantic City Welfare Fund a minimum of 75% goes to the Jewish Community Center and not to the overseas causes in which they are so greatly interested, particularly with respect to Palestine. We do not know what the situation will be in 1941 as regards a United Jewish Appeal. I have been urging within the U.J.A. that all of us should withdraw simultaneously for our own interests. This position has not been shared by Mr. Coons. I believe that the Zionists of Atlantic City are in a position to conduct a campaign that would give us many times more than we are receiving at the present time in cash. The decision to be made is important not only because of its effect in Atlantic City but because it may make other Welfare Funds similarly realize that there is a point beyond which a local community cannot use overseas appeals to carry on its local activities. 

From this report which I assume is accurate and sincere, it appears that the UJA cannot anticipate any concessions, whether justifiable or not, in a direct way from Mr. Mendel M. Fisher, the Executive Director of the JMF.

I take it, from Mr. Fisher's memo to you of September 24, that he does not desire to do business with Mr. Meller anyhow. I had assumed that Mr. Meller undertook last year and this year to clear these matters with Mr. Fisher at your request. I see no reason why Mr. Meller or any other representative of this office should be embarrassed.

Having noted further Mr. Fisher's additional memo to you of September 24 in which, among other things, he finds fault with my having sent sopies of my report on Baltimore and the State of Maryland JNF conflict to Rabbi Jonah B. Wise and Mr. Joseph Hyman, and in view of Mr. Fisher's discrediting in large measure my sem report as he does the reports of all our field representatives on this subject, I am now of the definite opinion that this matter must be considered by the officers of the UJA and, if Mr. Fisher wishes, the officers of the JNF other than the Executive Vice-Chairmon of the UJA and Mr. Fisher himself as Executive Director of the JNF.

This whole problem, as I see it, falls into precisely the same category as the clearance of the disputed items in the emergency appeal of the JDC in 1938. The officers of the JDC including myself did not believe that the proceeds from this emergency appeal should be divided on the percentage basis provided by the national agreement for that year. Babbi Silver and you believed that these menies should be divided and Rabbi Silver very properly, in my opinion, made an issue of this matter, with the result that it was agreed the UPA was entitled to its percentage in conformity with the national agreement, despite the fact that the JDC undertook the emergency appeal to neet specific needs resulting from the Polish border incidents and the Berlin riots.

In my relationship to the UJA and under the terms of the national agreement for 1940 I, as representing the JDC, have been called upon to accept as final Mr. Fisher's statement regarding the reasons why the JBF is entitled to these menies, a substantial pertion of which are separately allotted through welfare Funds to the JMF which is of course a partner of the UPA and, therefore, a beneficiary of the UJA. I am no longer willing to accept Mr. Fisher's statement along these lines as final or to accept his interpretation in every instance that the money belongs to one type of traditional collection or another, It is not clear to me that welfare Funds are expected to provide the traditional collections of the community in addition to their contributions to the UPA through the UJA. In my opinion, if it is their desire to have the JMF receive additional funds, it must be through the UPA which by national agreement receives its total share of the funds.

Mr. Henry Montor -2-October 1, 1940 I am, therefore, promptly and definitely asking Rabbi Wise to discuss this matter in a direct way with Rabbi Silver, with the hope that he and Rabbi Silver will decide to have a meeting in which the officers of the JNF are also to participate, in order that the issues may be completely clarified and decisions made as to policy which shall cover these monies now being chanmelled through the JMF from the Welfare Funds and other campaigns without the UJA receiving any type of reimbursement. IC/LO

October 4, 1940 Mr. Henry Montor United Palestine Appeal 41 Bast 42nd St. New York, N.Y. My dear Mr. Montors Wednesday afternoon, Mr. Swift called me from Washington for Mr. Davis who was engaged at the State Department. He conveyed to me what you had previously conveyed to me over the telephone. It was clear to me that the proposal which he made to you and to me represented their final decision, and I therefore did not press any other arrangement. I did, however, suggest that ih making public the Red Cross contribution, they state that they are in close touch with the situation and are planning to make a careful survey of the war relief needs of Blestine. Mr. Swift agreed to that. I would suggest that you cable Mr. Eliezer Kaplan to get in touch with the Secretary of the Palestine Governm nt whom Mr. Wadsworth quoted as his authority. It is very important that the Palestine Government be sympathetic to the proposal of Red Cross aid to Palestine, else the American Red Cross will wash its hands of the entire matter. It is amazing to me that while Red Cross supplies are being sent to England, which is financially far more able to take care of its casualties, that the Mandatory Government would be averse to such aid to Palestine. Mr. Kaplan may wish to go over the head of the Secretary to his superior officers. With reference to a grant of \$2,000 from the UPA to assist a group of Zionists to come to the United States - Dr. Goldmann called me and I explained to him that the request should really not be addressed to the UPA, that the funds of the Emergency Committee which had been voted for this project were also UPA funds, and that the UPA cannot establish the precedent of financing individuals to come to the United States. He told me that that would be the last group of prominent Zionists for whom such a request would be made. I told him that if Lipsky and Wise agreed to that proposal, I would raise no objection. Our Memorandum to the Allotment Committee should be submitted through you on behalf of the UPA. It is a good idea to publish a thousand copies of it for distribution, but as to then

October 4, 1940 -2-Mr. Montor they should be distributed, consultation should be had with Mr. Friedman. If the memoranda of the JDC and the NRS have been sent broadcast, then, of course, we should do likewise immediately; but if they have not, they our action might be subject to some criticism. With reference to the request of Mr. Abe Goldberg and his desire to serve the UPA - we can discuss this matter when we see each other next Monday. There is also the question of Mr. Nathan Kaplan which I would like to discuss with you. I am enclosing herewith a letter from Dr. Israel Goldstein in response to my inquiry about the expenditures of the JNF; also another letter from Dr. Goldstein with reference to the situation in the Seaborrd area. I met with Dr. Goldman today at his study. I suggested to him that he call together a small group to plan the conference to be held the latter part of November. He added that I may use his name freely and confer with him as frequently as I wish. He is very skeptical of the possibility of enlisting the support of non-Zienists and said that he did not believe there was a single non-Zienist of any importance at the Washington conference, and that there would not be any present at the wid-west conference. He suggested also that the heads of the various Zionis: groups and 1 or 2 from the A.J.C. plan the conference.

Annales Kaz is not available. She is married and has a fourmonth old baby. She has recommended a Miss Levine formerly with the Chicago Jawish Charitics and Bral Brith, and I have agreed to interview her along with several others.

I visited Col. A. H. Rosenberg and A. K. Epstein. Rosenberg was none to friendly and seemed to think there was no need of a mid-west office. To claims you treated Greenspun very shabtily and that "one cannot run a field staff from a swivel chair in New York." I tell you this because I think you want to have the brickbats as well as the compliments, and because I feel that a proper understanding of the job requires a knowledge of what people are thinking and saying.

A. K. Epstein was very disturbed at the "tremendous overlapping and duplication." He said that the Chicago Zionist District is planning a Chanukah Ball and conference to raise \$20,000 for Zionist propaganda. Then, too, there are conferences for J.N.F. and Hadassah all relating to Palestine. Further, in the early part of November, there is to be a dinner to raise runds for the Polytechnic Institute of Haifa, with Prof. Samuels of the Institute and either Prof. Einstein or Prof. Compton as speakers. Such non-Zionists as L. D. Block, Freund (of the American Asbestos Co.) and

Pearlstein (Chairman of the 1940 Welfare Fund Campaign), are sponsoring the dinner. He recommends therefore that a U.P.A. conference at this time be abandoned, and, furthermore, that something be done to coordinate the work of all these groups.

I visited George Greenspun. He fulfilled your prophesy that he would rake you over the coals!

Executive Director Henry Montor I am reporting for the record on a discussion that was held on Wednesday, October 9, in the office of the United Jewish Appeal. Rabbi Jonah Wise had arranged for a meeting with the members of the staff of the United Jewish Appeal to discuss the relationship between the staff and the United Jewish Appeal. Rabbi Wise asked me to join him at the meeting. Some twenty members of the staff were present.

Knowing how sincerely and earnestly Rabbi Wise had tried to persuade the Joint Distribution Committee to enter into a contract with the Union, I felt I owed it to him as well as to the United Jewish Appeal itself to urge against any precipitate action by the staff. A circular had been issued by the staff, charging Rabbi Wise with breaking his word on two occasions, in that he is alleged to have said at meetings held with the staff that a contract would definitely be signed. Rabbi Wise denies making such a promise.

Pointing out that the United Palestine Appeal had a contract with the Union and was satisfied with its operation, I remarked that action by the staff which would take the form of a strike or any other activity projecting the United Jewish Appeal into the limelight would penalize the United Palestine Appeal as one of the partners in the United Jewish Appeal, even though it had a Union contract. Moreover, the United Jewish Appeal was not an independent, autonomous organization, but one in which the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal had equal authority and control, and that unless both approved an action, it could not be taken.

Indicating that the staff agreed that the hours of work and the wages paid were satisfactory, I asked whether it wasn't true that the only objective the Union had was recognition of the Union. That could be obtained without the signing of a contract, in the form of a letter which you and Rabbi Wise would send to the Union.

After long discussion, in which the Union representatives expressed resentment against a delay of more than twelve months in negotiations, in which they had been continuously told that action was imminent, the proposal was offered by Mr. Hawley, President of the Union, that it would be acceptable not to have a contract, but to have you and Rabbi Wise address a letter to the Union, containing these points:

Dr. Atba Hillel Silver Page 2 October 10, 1940. (a) that the United Jewish Appeal recognize the Union as the bargaining agency for its members on the staff, and (b) that an arbitration committee would be set up in which differences could be adjusted. It was also to be agreed to post personnel practices obtaining in the United Jewish Appeal. It seemed to me that this request was eminently fair, but Rabbi Wise did not believe that the Joint Distribution Committee would permit him to sign a letter of that kind. At his request, I conferred by telephone with Mr. Leavitt, Secretary of the Joint Distribution Committee, and urged his help in getting the Joint Distribution Committee's consent to the signing by Rabbi Wise of the letter, to avoid unpleasantness for the United Jewish Appeal itself, and for all its officers, particularly when the demands of the Union were justified. Mr. Leavitt did not believe that the Joint Distribution Committee people would be prepared to accept such a letter, a draft of which I sent over to him. This morning I spoke to you by 'phone, and as a result of that conversation called Rabbi Wise to confirm what you had said, to the effect that he was writing a letter giving recognition to the Union as the bargaining agency for its members on the staff, and that differences which arise should be referred to Messrs. Coons and Montor, and if no agreement could be reached with the latter, the question should be submitted to a committee consisting of yourself, Rabbi Wise and Alex Rothenberg. I told Rabbi Wise that you did not feel that this was satisfactory, nor did I, and urged an arbitration committee in its full meaning be set up. Eabbi Wise was obviously wearied from the lengthy negotiations in which he had been involved, and apparently had had impressed upon him by the Joint Distribution Committee the necessity of doing nothing which would conflict with the labor practices approved by the principal officers of the Joint Distribution Committee. He suggested that he be permitted to write the letter as it had originally been planned, and that negotiations be conducted with Mr. Hawley for purposes of revision, if necessary I must say for myself that I regard the whole controversy as quite absurd. It is merely another reflection of the economic and scciological antiquarian practices of a group of men who profess to be philanthropists. I shall keep you informed of further developments. On the one hand, I should like to play fair with Rabbi Wise, who has been most mincere in this matter. On the other hand, I realize that the Union's demands are quite justified insofar as some written instrument is concerned. Emanuel Neumann discussed with me yesterday the status of Nathan D. Kaplan, formerly of Palestine, who is at the moment in Chicago.

Mr. Neumann suggested that the United Palestine Appeal use Mr. Kaplan for a trial period of eight weeks, sending him around to some of the smaller communities particularly. He said that he would be prepared to raise a fund to supplement whatever amount the United Palestine Appeal could advance for such a trial purpose.

Mr. Neumann thought that a salary of some \$50 or \$60 a week might be satisfactory for Mr. Kaplan. In addition, of course, there are the travelling expenses which, on a continuous tour, range between \$100 and \$150 a week.

I do not wish to make any decision in the matter. I explained to Mr. Neumannthe difficulties that surround the sending of speakers into communities when it is not campaign time. Mr. Kaplan might be satisfactory for an educational program of the Zionist Organization of America which has contacts with communities on an all year round basis -- or is supposed to have --. whereas the relationship of the United Palestine Appeal to communities is that of a fund-raising organization.

We have in the city a number of people who are prepared to visit communities on a free basis. I refer, for example, to Kurt Blumenfeld who has made a very fine impression in a number of communities he has visited on our behalf. There is also Mrs. Archibald Silverman who is most anxious to speak for us.

Under these circumstances the question arises as to whether the United Palestine Appeal is incurring an advisable expense in this matter.

This will acknowledge the receipt of your letter of October 15th addressed to Rabbi Jonah B. Wise and myself as National Co-Chairmen of the United Jewish Appeal.

You request that consideration be given to priority for the National Refugee Service in the distribution of cash received by the 1940 United Jewish Appeal campaign.

May I point out that the United Palestine Appeal is faced with unprecedented emergency situations as is reflected in the memorandum recently submitted to the Allotment Committee of the United Jewish Appeal. Therefore, I can well understand the stringent financial position that may face both the National Refugee Service and the Joint Distribution Committee.

However, we are confronted with a practical problem of available cash. As of October 15, 1940, the United Palestine Appeal had received \$1,400,000 from the 1940 campaign of the United Jewish Appeal against \$2,500,000 allotted to it from the first income from the 1940 campaign. At about this time of the year in 1939, the United Palestine Appeal had already received from the 1939 United Jewish Appeal the full \$2,500,000. You can appreciate, therefore, the serious financial plight in which the United Palestine Appeal finds itself when it is \$1,100,000 behind its income as compared with 1939. Simultaneously, the needs have been intensified beyond description.

As you are probably aware, the income to the 1940 United Jewish Appeal is considerably less than was reported for the same period in 1939. This is also reflected in the cash receipts to date.

Under the circumstances, therefore, I do not see what purpose would be served by consideration by the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal of priority in cash distribution to the National Refugee Service when the cash that is

-2-Mr. William Rosenwald October 16, 1940 being made available is so limited that even the first amounts voted to the three agencies in the United Jewish Appeal have not yet been paid out and will probably not be paid out before 1941. I know that you will understand that my position is not based on lack of appreciation of the needs of the National Refugee Service but on a realistic appraisal of the cash resources of the United Jewish Appeal. An advantage which the National Refugee Service has had this year was the receipt of an additional \$850,000 from the New York City campaign of the United Jewish Appeal, bringing its total receipts, as of October 15th, from the 1940 campaign to \$2,250,000. not including the additional \$90,000 pledged to you by Foundations. My dear Mr. Montor:

From the enclosed you will note that Dr. Elisha M. Friedman intends to attend a meeting of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds "to get at first hand, individual viewpoints of Board members on various questions of policy with which he is concerned in the Inquiry". What does that mean? And has he have requested by the Allocations Committee to do that? Is the Board of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds to aivise Dr. Friedman on questions of policy? You might consult Dr. Lowenstein about this matter.

I note that in the Supplementary Memorandum which the JDC submitted to the Allocations Committee, they included under Emigration items for emigration to Palestine which it has definitely rejected. I notice, too, on page four, under the heading, Palestine, that Dr. Magnes has made a direct appeal to the JDC requesting the sum of \$300,000 for child feeding, and that Hadassah is prepared to meet part of this request. Why should Dr. Magnes make direct appeals to the JDC when there is, in the United States, the UPA, the official agency for the raising of funds. Should not all such requests emanating from Palestine, especially one which has contact with a group such as Hadassah, be channeled through the one agency? This matter should come up at the next meeting of the Zionist Emergency Committee. I believe that Dr. Magnes' independent interventionist activities - like that of Mr. Hoover in the United States - should be definitely curbed.

Please write to Mr. William Rosenwald in answer to his letter of October 15 that the question of priority of payment in the National Refugee Service is not a subject for a decision on the part of the Executive Committee of the SJA, but one of basic contractual agreement between the JDC and the UPA. The UPA will not consent to any priority payment. The reasons for it I have clearly indicated to Mr. Rosenwald in my letter to him on September 4. That closes the matter. Gentlemen:

In connection with our September 30, 1940, audit of the books and records of the 1940 United Jewish Appeal, we scrutinized a letter dated October 9, 1940, from William Bosenwald, President of Mational Refugee Service, Inc., addressed to Drs. Jonah B. Wise and Abba Hillel Silver, Chairmen, and Messrs. I. Edwin Goldwasser and Arthur M. Lamport, Treasurers, of the 1940 United Jewish Appeal.

The letter, written pursuant to Paragraph 8 of the agreement constituting the 1940 United Jewish Appeal, refers to grants and contributions received and retained by the National Refugee Service, Inc., during the period from January 1, to August 31, 1940, and states that "these grants and contributions are reported as funds received by the National Refugee Service, Inc., which shall not be included in, or considered part of, the United Jewish Appeal." Included therein was an item of \$35,000.00 received on March 22, 1940, from The Baron de Hirsch Fund.

Paragraph 8 of the agreement provides:

"The N. R. S. shall have the right to receive grants and contributions from Foundations whose charters or established policy specifically exclude gifts that are not to be used within the United States. Such grants or contributions shall not be included in, or considered part of, the United Jewish Appeal. However, it is understood that this paragraph shall not be deemed to give the N. R. S. the right to obtain grants or contributions from any Foundation or Agency which contributed funds to the N. R. S. or to the United Jewish Appeal on behalf of the N. R. S. during the year 1939. - - - "

(Underscoring curs.)

According to records examined in connection with our saidt of the 1939 United Jewish Appeal, the Baron de Hirsch Fund made a \$25,000.00 payment during the year 1939, which amount was considered as an allocation by United Jewish Appeal to N. R. S.

In view of the underscored portions of Paragraph 8, as set forth above, may we suggest that you discuss this matter with your Chairmen and Treasurers in order to ascertain whether they concur in Mr. Rosenwald's opinion that the \$25,000.00, to which the Matter refers, is not part of the United Jewish Appeal. Thereafter, will you advise us as to their conclusion, so that our report may properly reflect the item.

The letter from Mr. Rosenwald also refers to the receipt by M. M. S. of \$6,250.00 on August 5, 1940 from the New York Foundation, Inc., and of \$40,000.00 on August 29, 1940, from the Nathan Hofheimer Foundation, Inc. The first part of Paragraph 8 of the agreement set forth hereinabove, refers to "contributions from Foundations whose charters or established policy specifically exclude gifts that are not bo be used within the United States." Since we do not know whether the

charters or policies of these two Foundations specifically exclude gifts for use outside the United States, we also suggest that your officers review these items with the National Refugee Service, Inc., and inform us with respect thereto.

On Friday, October 25th, I spent from three o'clock in the afternoon to eleven in the evening at a meeting of the members of the committee appointed by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds to study a "National Budgeting Program."

Mr. Jacob Blaustein presided. The others who attended included George Levison of San Francisco, Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, Samuel Goldsmith of Chicago, Joseph C. Hyman, Sidney Hollander of Baltimore, Harry L. Lurie, Richard Frank of Chicago, Ira Younker of New York, Stanley Myers of Miami, Samuel Goldhamer of Cleveland, William Shroder of Cincinnati and George Rabinoff, Assistant Executive Director of the Council.

Most of the hours of the lengthy sessions were devoted to a definition of "National Budgeting." Toward the end of the evening several resolutions were adopted as recommendations to the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Council which was to be held on the following day.

The principal resolution defined:

- (a) The acceptance in principle of a program of national budgeting
- (b) The effectuation of the program to await a careful consideration of the results achieved by the Inquiry Committee established by the Allotment Committee of the United Jewish Appeal and
- (c) A preamble stating that in a consideration of American Jewish needs, home needs would take precedence.

Mine was the only dissenting woice on these resolutions.

Harry Lurie was endeavoring to apply a brake to the speed with which some of the members present were moving in the direction of national budgeting. As a matter of fact, wide differences of opinion existed as to what "national budgeting"

The point of view that I presented was that the Council's ability to provide accurate information on institutions applying for funds should be strengthened, and until that was done "national budgeting" meant nothing.

It was decided that the present committee, previously appointed by the Council, should remain in existence, and that the Board of Directors should not be asked to create a new committee to go forward with the planning for national budgeting.

I think that my participation in the meeting was helpful, at least to myself.

The nature of the discussion clarified one thing: there are quite a few Jews in the leadership in American Jewry who are raising a definite barrier between their responsibilities as "American" Jews and their responsibilities as Jews concerned also with the Jewish people as a whole, even outside of America.

Dear Mr. Montor:

In response to the request which you made some time ago, we are sending you herewith a table summarizing the experience of the top fifty Jewish communities in financing their local refugee program. Information is included on 1939 expenditures and 1940 budgets. You will note that in a few instances, the information is incomplete.

The summary table shows an increase of 73.0% in the funds budgeted for 1940, over the money expended for local refugee work in 1939.

It is, of course, not permissible to infer from this that community contributions to the United Jewish Appeal in 1940 have suffered as a result of the increase in allocations for local refugee work. Important factors to be considered in this connection are: the total amount raised by communities in 1940 as compared to 1939, increases or decreases in the allocations made by communities to other agencies, particularly local, which have no relation to the refugee program, etc.

The increase may be explained in several ways. Some of the communities, particularly those with a small Jewish population and with limited experience in budgeting, did not allocate sufficient funds for refugee work in 1939, necessitating a considerable increase in 1940. This is shown clearly in the case of communities with a Jewish population of less than 10,000. A smaller increase is reported for the larger communities with more adequate professional resources.

ther factors are: the increase in the number of refugess residing in the community; the change in the composition of the refugee group arriving here during the latter half of 1959 and the first months of 1940; the development of local projects; such as, retraining, loan funds, etc. requiring financing.

We are now working on a more comprehensive statement on the financing of the local refugee program. We shall be very glad to make the results available to you when they are meady.

I send you herewith comparative data showing the income of the United Palestine Appeal in some fifty leading communities of the United States. The figures indicate the amount which the United Palestine Appeal received from the community in 1938, its share in the United Jewish Appeal allotment for 1939, and its share in the United Jewish Appeal allotment for 1940.

My summary indicates the following: With the exception of New York City, the United Palestine Appeal received from the attached list of communities approximately, \$1,153,426. — in 1940, and 1,066,093 in 1938, which means that approximately 87,333 represents the difference between what these communities gave to the United Palestine Appeal in 1940 and in 1938, when, in general the Jewish community of America raised between 2 and 25 times in 1940 what it did in 1938.

The history of recent years in American Jewish communal life has shown an unmistakable trend toward democratization. The formation of Community Councils has in itself typified the determination of American Jewry to permit every section of the community to share in the establishment of policies which affect the basic values of Jewish life.

Today the autonomy of the local community is being challenged by a seemingly innocuous proposal now being submitted for your approval by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds. That proposal would establish a so-called Advisory Budgeting Committee which would obviously not be exclusively advisory in its operations, since its recommendations, clothed with the prestige of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds and fortified by an imposing list of names, would implicitly convey a strong coercive element. This Budgeting Committee would be the entering wedge for a standardization of Jewish values and a regimentation of Jewish communal practices imposed by a group of men whose outlook is colored primarily by the interests of philanthropy.

If the right to the diversity of opinion among American Jewry is to be preserved, it is essential that communities through representative bodies, such as your own, place themselves on record now in opposition to the majority proposal of the Council through public meetings, through community-wide conferences, and through such other means as will show the considered judgment of the constituencies.

My associates and I on the Committee on the Referendum for Budgeting are convinced that the Jewish men and women of your city who share in the composition and in the actions of your Community Council, are unalterably opposed to any proposition which would infringe upon their basic right to determine how their funds shall be distributed. This is the principle which underlies the position of our committee, and one which reflects the attitude of Jews who wish to enrich and not to abandon the traditions and the aspirations of American Jewry.

The Committee on the Referendum for Budgeting is eager that there be a maximum of public discussion of the issue that has been raised by a proposal to establish a National Advisory Budgeting Committee. This proposal is now the subject of a referendum among the member agencies of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds.

I am taking the liberty of sending you herewith a copy of the minority report which represents the conviction of the members of our committee.

We feel that the issue is so important for the present and the future of Jewish community life in America that it ought to have the benefit of the fullest possible discussion in your news and editorial columns. I hope that you agree with this and will do all in your power to draw the attention of your community to the significance of the current referendum.

It is needless for me to point out that the members of our committee feel that there should be an extension of fact-finding on all agencies in American Jewish life. Nevertheless, we are convinced that the determination of what causes shall be included in our Welfare Funds and the proportion of assistance they shall receive are decisions that should be left within the hands of each individual community on the basis of its own ideologic aspirations and interpretation of Jewish values.
