Mr. Henry Montor, Executive Vice-Chairman United Jewish Appeal 342 Madison Avenue New York City My dear Mr. Montor: Your letter of December 29th, in which you ask about the response we are meeting in our current Jewish Welfare Fund campaign, and ask me to delineate the problems that seem to arise and devices being used to meet such problems and situations, has been before me for several days. It would require a good deal of writing on my part to be completely explicit about the problems and situations that have already appeared in our campaign. However, very briefly, this is the general and specific situation as I, personally, see it: (1) There is no United Jewish Appeal so far as a national campaign is concerned. There is an announcement of an Appeal; there are speakers sent out; and there are some organizers sent into the small communities to put on campaigns. The general organization of a national campaign, which implies agreed upon and specific policies for the solicitation of funds; agreed upon and definitive national publicity programs: agreed upon and definitive policies with regard to solicitation of corporations; agreed upon and national attack upon giving by various classes of givers, etc. -- all of these are lacking. There is a great deal of difference between an appeal and a campaign, and the United Jewish Appeal has always remained an appeal. The principal reason for this is that it has not and under the circumstances under which it is organized and under which it raises funds, cannot receive the wholehearted cooperation of the communities. It is organized entirely apart from the communities. This is an immediate, substantial, and almost insuperable obstacle to the raising of large sums of money. (2) In our community, and from my discussion with people from other communities, both lay and professional people, the primary psychological problem which we face, of course, is the desire on the part of American Jews this year to do everything they can for the war effort of the United States, and their difficulty in rationalizing the work of the J.D.C., U.P.A. and N.R.S. as part of that war effort. This is in spite of all the statements and apparently cogent arguments projected by the National Chairmen at meetings held here, and by such statements as emanate from the U.J.A. office. (3) As for giving -- the upper brackets are giving less than they did last year. The middle and lower brackets will probably maintain their giving with some exceptions. We will, therefore, raise less in the large communities than we did last year -- possibly much less.

(4) The large national campaigns directly associated with the war effort of the country are going to cut deeply into not merely the funds but more particularly into the ranks of workers and leaders. Currently, we are, in a sense, in competition with the Red Cross campaign. Later in the Spring there is going to be a \$30,000,000 national campaign for U.S.O. That will have a similar effect upon the workers and leaders of the Spring campaigns.

It should have been and would be part of the national campaign organization to reach understandings with these other national campaigns in order to have a working relationship with regard to the formulation of public opinion and with regard to timing of campaigns. That would have been helpful but it probably is too late to do anything about it. At any rate, we are currently suffering and other communities will suffer later on from competition with these efforts. These efforts, taken together with the usual Spring and Fall campaigns of the local Community Chests are going to leave very little by way of time and energy on the part of Jewish leaders, as well as of the entire community for the Welfare Funds.

Beyond all of this lies the grave problem of finding adequate support for local Jewish work which, in the larger communities is of such a volume and extent that it may require much more energy and time and a proportionately larger amount of the available money than it has hitherto.

(5) As for devices to meet these situations, they are many and I am sure well-known to you and your associates who are in touch with the various communities. There is the general device of expanding the middle-class and lower bracket giving which we have been doing over a period of time and on an intensive basis this year. There is the device of making responsible for the work those in the upper brackets of giving. This is not, in our instance at any rate, as productive as it has been in the past. There is, finally, the necessary defice which we, to some extent, have been successful in obtaining through the national organizations, of having those high in the government service or responsible for the competitive war appeals, express themselves as finding it desirable and necessary that the United Jewish Appeals be supported as adequately as possible. This last will be the core of the situation that you will need to meet in the larger communities where all classes of givers face the necessity for participation in many local and national funds that have grown but of the war, in addition to the local and national funds that make the usual appeals.

A concrete suggestion that I would make to you and which could still be carried out, would be that the United Jewish Appeal bring together not more than fifty key people, lay and professional, for a full day's session in New York or in Chicago, or at some other point, for the purpose of integrating the campaign with the communities, and for the purpose of planning the campaign. Whereas our Chicago effort has been for the last several years the first effort in the country, I am inclined to believe definitely that this is the last year that we shall take upon ourselves this responsibility. If we are to have a national effort, it should be national and not dependent upon a local community for its impetus.

My dear Mr. Montors I am enclosing herewith a letter which I received from Mr. Samuel Goldsmith of Chicago, referring to a letter which I wrote him on January 2. I do not recall any letter of mine to him as of that date. Was a letter sent to him from headquarters over my signature? If so, I should like to see it. I read with interest Mr. Goldsmith's letter to you dated January 5. It gave me the chuckles. Here is a gentleman who refused to have anything to do with national headquarters of the UJA, but who is now trying to unburden the responsibilities of the Chicago campaign on to the shoulders of national headquarters. You will recall that he did not want Rabbi Jonah Wise and me to visit Chicago at the beginning of their campaign. We had to fight for the chance to talk to the members of his board about Chicago's inadequate giving in the past few years. Mr. Goldsmith more than anyone else is responsible for the steady deterioration in Chicago's giving. He has been producing alibis for his people right along. During our last visit, when we tried to challenge the members of his board to greater giving and to greater exertion, pointing to what other communities were doing. he told them that in relation to New York City, Chicago was doing very well indeed and that the percentage of the total campaign which was turned over to the UJA was no lower than in any other communities, dexterously avoiding the issue that the total amount raised was pitifully small. Dear Mr. Goldswith:

As the leaders of the Jewish community of Chicago gather to open the 1942 Jewish Welfare Fund campaign on Wednesday evening, January 7th. I take pleasure in extending my warmest greetings and best wishes for the success of the appeal. I trust that you will present to those who attend, this message regarding the immediate program and necessities of the United Palestine Appeal.

The effect of the war upon the program of the agencies in Palestine financed by the United Palestine Appeal has been to increase rather than to diminish their tasks.

First, American Jewry ought to realize as the basis for the extension of its moral and material support of Palestine that it is today a bulwark of the democratic cause in the Middle Mast. Some 15,000 Palestine Jews have enlisted in the British army and many of them are today distinguishing themselves by gallantry in the drive across North Africa by the allied troops. Tens of thousands of Palestine Jews constitute the skilled workmen who are helping to manufacture and to repair the war machine upon which the Middle Mast command must depend. Palestine Jewry is mobilizing its maximum agricultural and industrial resources to provide food on the one hand, and, on the other hand, to cut down the amount of shipping space that is so urgently necessary for other purposes. The degree of interest which the American Government has in this sector of the war is illustrated by the fact that a lease-lend administrator is stationed in Palestine.

Secondly, the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund, which derive their income from American Jewry through the United Palestine Appeal, are playing a powerful role in every avenue of the war effort. It is the Jewish Agency which has served as the recruiting instrument for the thousands of Jews with the British army. It is the Jewish Agency which is stimulating the expansion of old plants and the erection of new ones, as well as the provision of raw materials for the manufacture of war supplies. It is the Jewish Agency which is serving as the registration instrument for the formation of the Women's Auxiliary Territorial Service which was launched last week. It should be noted that Palestine is the

only sector of the British Empire with the exception of Canada, where women are being called into such war service. It is the highest tribute to be paid to the loyalty and skill of the Jewish women of Palestine. It is the Jewish Agency which is accelerating the production of food in the Jewish settlements throughout the country.

Thirdly, the following brief summary of the current responsibilities and prospects of the agencies supported by the United Palestine Appeal indicates their wide variety:

- (1) Immigration into Palestine continues from Syria, Turkey, Iran, Iraq. Yemen and Australia. The Jewish Agency has just applied for 6,000 additional immigration certificates because of the need of additional manbower for agricultural and industrial production.
- (2) The Jewish agency and the Jewish National Fund have planned a program for the establishment of eight to ten colonies in the year 1942. Of these, four have already been started, two of them in the southernmost section of Palestine, only a few days ago. The extension of colonization is vital for the production of food for the civilian and military population, for the absorption of the inmigrants who have come into the country and for the strengthening of the foundation of the Jewish homeland in relation to the absorptive capacity of the country.
- (3) The situation in the Middle East makes essential the continued maintenance of internal security measures against any eventuality. Everyone realizes that the Jews alone of all the peoples in the Middle East are unreservedly loyal to the democratic cause. It is because the Jewish Agency provided for the training of men during the past four years that it is now able to offer to the British Government a contingent of between 60,000 to 75,000 men for the formation of a Jewish army in Palestine.
- (4) The Jewish Agency, in its quasi-governmental role is playing a vital part in the stimulation of trade and industry and in the encouragement of artisans and small traders upon whom the wartime economy of Palestine depends in large part.
- (5) In order to provide for the thousands of young men and women who have been trained for agriculture and in order to consolidate the settlements that already exist, it is essential that at least some of the opportunities for land purchase now available should be utilized. The full size of the garrisons in Falestine is a military secret, but it is no secret that the various allies could use far greater amounts of all types of food products if the Jewish settlers could make them available.

To serve the war needs today and to strengthen the foundations of Jevish Palestine, it is vital to extend the areas of land in the possession of the Jevish Mational Fund.

These are the highlights of the program upon which the agencies financed by the United Palestine Appeal are now embarked. It is a budget involving the expenditure of \$8,037,527. In 1938, centinental Europe provided 21.4% of the budgets of the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund. That share has now been reduced almost to the vanishing point. The necessity of increasing America's participation is obvious.

There was a meeting today at the office of the Joint Distribution Committee to discuss the Matzoth Fund which the JDC administered early in 1941, when it was still conducting an independent campaign under the title of the United New York Appeal. Present at the meeting were Morris Troper, Joseph Hyman, Moses Leavitt for the JDC, Mr. Max Ogust, who is the Chairman of the Council of Jewish Organizations for the JDC, and Mr. Blitz, who accompanied me to provide certain facts in regard to the United Jewish Appeal.

The JDC people uniformly took the position that the money was contributed by the Landsmanschaften, and that it constituted a transmittal item. The JDC ignored the fact that all the publicity referred to the Moes Schitem Campaign, and that the literature was issued from the office of the JDC or the United New York Appeal, which included the JDC and the NRS.

No amount of reiteration of these facts had any effect. The JDC said that the money had been spent, and that they were not going to be penalized at this late date. The fact that we have been trying to call attention to this matter since March 21, 1941, and that this was the first meeting which had been arranged was ignored.

The meeting, after about an hour and a quarter ended with my statement that the United Palestine Appeal could not accept as valid and binding the decision of the JDC. Since the JDC takes this position, I would recommend that the United Palestine Appeal withhold from the United Jewish Appeal the proceeds of the Night of Stars which normally comes to the United Jewish Appeal.

I am in receipt of your letter of December 29. which was just forwarded to me in the Domican Republic requesting my permission to having my name presented as a member of the National Council for Palestine. I note that the meeting will be held January 17th and 18th in Cleveland and wish indeed that I might be able to attend. As you probably know I have been giving practically all of my time to the immigration problem which I feel will be one of the major post war problems facing the Jewish people. The feeling of most well informed men with whom I have discussed the question including Dr. Chaim Weitzmann, is that there will be at least three million Jews wishing to leave Europe when the war is over. All of us are thankful that Palestine presents a major focal point where these people might go and anything that I can do to contribute to the ability of Palestine to absorb large numbers will be gladly done.

I must say, however, that I recognize the impossibility of Palestine offering the complete solution and am therefore devoting my efforts in an attempt to find other lands to which these many millions might also go. It is indeed my hope that the time is not too far distant when all of us who are concerned with this problem might meet together and formulate a plan leading to an orderly presentation of the immigration problem which will confront us at the conclusion of the war.

At the meeting of the Executive Committee held in New York City prior to the National Conference, it was decided to name a committee which would go into the question of making up a list of nominees of members representing the United Palestine Appeal from the members and the Board of Directors of the New York United Jewish Appeal, as well as to help in the formulation of the by-laws of the New York United Jewish Appeal.

Mr. Lipsky, who was presiding as Chairman of the Executive Committee, named Rabbi Irving Miller as Chairman of a committee. No associates have been named with him. The question as to who is to represent the United Palestine Appeal among the members, as well as on the Board of Directors, is of great importance.

It would be very helpful if you could address yourself to Rabbi Miller, whose address is 701 Bolton Avenue, Far Rockaway, Long Island, New York, asking him to concern himself, as early as possible, with the getting up of a list of names. That list is then to be submitted to the Executive or Administrative Committee of the National United Palestine Appeal for action. Perhaps you might wish to name with Rabbi Miller as members of the committee, Dr. Israel Goldstein, Charles Ress, Sylvan Gotshal, David Wertheim, and myself.

If you send such a letter to Rabbi Miller I would appreciate receiving a copy.

Blitz has charge of a big slice of our common work, and there is war. I have my views as to the causes of it. But I deplore it nonetheless. I am sure Dr. Silver does, and others who observe the state of mind between you and your distinguished lieutenant.

In answer to your memorandum of January 28th, I have no knowledge as to whether or not the Ort has been taken into the New York UJA. Nr. Blits informed me some time ago during a casual meeting that pressure was being brought to bear upon Mr. Dubinsky to include the Ort into the UJA. Nr. Dubinsky was alleged to have said that if the Ort was not included he would withdraw all union support from the UJA.

On the subject of my relationship with Mr. Blits, this is of a purely personal and not of an official character. The officers of the Executive or Administrative Committees of the UPA have never seen fit to make it clear that as Mational Executive Director of the UPA I had absolute authority over Mr. Blits, as over any other employee of the UPA. On the contrary, when last year I asked for specific authority in the New York with a twery clear that I was asking for authority which I had no right to acquire and that "New York can take care of its own".

The whole relationship between New York City and the UPA has been an amount one. There is no formal or legal manner by which any relationship exists between myself and Mr. Blits who is an employee of and paid by the New York UJA and, as such, cannot be controlled by the New York UFA which does not exist.

If I were so minded, I assume that I, too, could feel that I am an employee of the Estional Ush by whom my salary is paid. If I were to restrict myself completely by the Estional USA I am sure that I could save myself a great deal of time and energy. It may, in fact, be significant to some of the officers of the UPA that a complete national organisation is in operation requiring as careful supervision and administration as in any other national deviate body.

Whatever services I give to the UPA I do because I happen to believe that it is one of the few effective instruments for creating and maintaining interest in Falestine. Unfortunately, New York is a lost province for the New York UPA. Ultimately, the way to solve it will be to say to Mr. Montor that he should exercise his authority as Mational Axecutive Director in New York of that someone should be put in his stead. —Perhaps that someone might be Mr. Blitz, who has proved his capacity to supervise the New York situation.

Mr. Blitz advised that the ORT has applied to the New York United Jewish Appeal. The request is for \$150,000. Under the vigorous leadership of Mr. William Salman, the Jewish community of Houston is preparing to mobilize its resources so that the task of aiding our people, wherever they may be reached, can be speeded.

Through the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service, which comprise the United Jewish Appeal, American Jewry is supplementing the effort of our own government to sustain the life and spirit of those people who were the first victims of Hitlerism and who stand out today as the symbols of the eventual destruction of the Axis powers.

Millions of Jews in Russia, France, Switzerland, Portugal, North Africa, South America and elsewhere depend upon us for the comradeship that will enable them to survive. Dear Dr. Silver:

I have just returned from a two weeks' visit throughout the country on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal. I went to such places as San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Beaumont, Galveston, Kansas City, Saint Louis, Des Moines. Everywhere I found a great readiness to continue giving and even to give more, but it all depends on leadership. Wherever there is aggressiveness and militancy, the Jews are prepared to follow that line, but wherever there is indecision among the leaders, there is even greater bewilderment among the communities as a whole. It is the old story of the value of leadership accentuated by the general confusion prevailing at this time.

The optimism which I had this year in contrast to previous years has been corroborated by my actual contacts in the communities. At the same time I recognize that the crazy system which is the U.J.A. cannot possibly take advantage of the moral impulses which exist in the Jewish communities of America. The U.J.A. has been reduced to the lowest common denominator in intelligence and emotional drive. The effect shows financially. Apparently when there is a wedding of a stone and a flower, even the flower turns to stone.

I should like to report to you at greater length on what the general attitude of the communities is, except that I believe that you are even now preparing to leave for the West Coast for your visit to San Francisco. In accordance with your previous conversation on this subject, I have not communicated with any of our friends in that city.

In this letter I want to touch briefly on several of the matters that have arisen during my absence from the city. These have, I believe, been taken care of promptly by Dr. Braunstein and by Miss Cohen.

On the subject of Mr. Rosenwald's contribution, I note that Mr. Rosenbloom has been in touch with you directly from Florida. I should imagine that it would be just as fair for you to take the entire bill of expenses which you incur for the U.P.A. in any one year and submit the bill to the U.J.A. for reimbursement. That is exactly what Mr. Rosenwald did. Of course, it loses its mercenary aspect when it is recalled that a check for the same amount or an even larger sum is immediately turned over to the New York City United Jewish Appeal as Mr. Rosenwald's contribution. In the first place, the expenses of the N.R.S. are less by this system. In the second place, I believe that there is some countervalue on income taxes. In the third place, the U.J.A. national expenses go up.

I am wondering whether your attitude toward the Santo Domingo project as described in your letter of February 6th can be most helpful to our common purposes at this time. Such a statement from you at this stage can only be interpreted as an endorsement. The Dominican Republic Association is engaged in a very effective drive throughout the country. It is a drive which has the moral support of the J.D.C. officers and personnel. In the case of the J.N.F., I am in receipt of daily memoranda from field men of the U.J.A., as well as from officials of the Welfare Funds who wonder why the J.N.F. should engage in campaigns aside from the share which the U.P.A. has in the U.J.A.

I realize that the parallel between the J.N.F. and the DORSA is not complete, because by law, DORSA is a completely separate corporation and its receipts do not accrue to the J.D.C., but it is equally clear that DORSA has not only the moral but the financial participation of the J.D.C. office. The DORSA project is even more important from the point of view of principle than from the \$200,000 or \$300,000 that will undoubtedly be deducted from the U.J.A. allotments to make up its quota.

The idea that five or six men can foist a project upon a community and ask that community to finance it after the sponsors have gotten tired of spending their own money, even though they have not gotten tired of the project itself, is one which you have very consistently attacked. Up to this time, and in my absence, the U.J.A. when it has been called upon to answer inquiries on the Sosua project, and these inquiries are multiplying, has used your statement; that is, that the U.J.A. has no connection with the project, that it is an independent enterprise, that the communities must use their own judgment as to whether and to what extent it is deserving of support, and that in any event inquiries should be referred to the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds.

The necessities arising out of our relationship to the U.J.A. may require a noncommittal answer of that type, but I am wondering for your sake whether you want to be the author of such recommendations.

On the subject of the U.J.A. national conference on which I had thought there was some agreement, there seems to have been a deadlock during my absence. I find that Rabbi Wise has some reservations on the

subject. He has indicated that he has been or will be in direct communication with you on it. I wonder whether you have any advice following your conversations or correspondence with Rabbi Wise. The unwillingness of the J.D.C. to engage in this project may be related to its persistent unwillingness to center attention on the U.J.A. as an entity of its own. It may also be due to the unwillingness of many J.D.C. officers to sponsor the assembling of more than five or six Jews at one time in any one place. Personally, I think it is a good idea, even though I recognize that it can easily be spoiled by the time the four hundred cooks who would be employed in dishing up the ingredients got through with their enterprise.

I am hoping that you may be in New York immediately after your visit to the Coast, so that you and Rabbi Wise and Mr. Rosenwald can get down to the heart of this and related problems.

I am meeting today with Mr. Blitz on the subject of the New York City Ort, and looking forward to having regular meetings with him at least once a week so that we can clear problems of relationship between the National and the New York scenes.

I have written to Mr. Rosenbloom, suggesting that he call an early meeting of the Budget Committee of the U.P.A. and the Finance Committee of the Z.O.A. Mr. Rosenbloom usually spends the complete month of February in Florida. Possibly he will want to call a meeting in Pittsburgh. In any event, I shall advise you as soon as I hear from him.

Dear Mr. Fisher:

We have had a number of inquiries concerning the Jewish National Fund collections outside of the United Jewish Appeal in 1941.

Would you please send us your <u>complete</u> certified financial audit for the year 1941 and such other information as would enable us to prepare a statement answering the questions which have been posed by welfare funds.

What seem to be the particular questions raised are:

- 1. What is the agreement with the UJA which permits of collections by the JNF outside the UJA appeal?
- 2. What traditional devices are used and how much was collected in 1941 through each of these devices?
- 3. Does the JNF solicit direct contributions for special projects? If so, how much was raised for such projects in 1941?
- 4. How much was received from each of the agencies which collect funds and transmit them through the American office of the JNF to the Keren Kayemeth? (Hadassah, Pioneer Women's Organization, Zionist Organization of America, etc.)
- 5. What receipts (by source) directly received by the JNF are transferred to the UPA for distribution as between its beneficiaries?
- 6. Do you have any record of costs involved in your various forms of collection by local groups where you receive a net amount, and can you classify your receipts on the basis of those that do and those that do not involve payment of fund-raising costs from your national office?
- 7. What in general is the form and scope of your fund-raising efforts classified by method and type of solicitation?

Perhaps there is other information you might suggest as a means of clearly interpreting the process of collections for JNF outside the UJA.

We will, of course, submit to you any statement prepared, before it is distributed. There is no doubt of the fact that welfare funds are anxious to understand and adequately interpret JNF collections to their contributors, and we hope to be able, with your assistance, to answer their questions.

As a result of the observations made by yourself and Dr. Wise I decided that it rested with me to come to some understanding with Mr. Blitz so that the work of the United Palestine Appeal could be improved. Accordingly I met with him and had a very pleasant and thoroughgoing discussion which I trust will be the basis for a coordinated relationship in the coming year. I am hoping that Mr. Blitz and I can meet at least once a week to go over common problems and I shall be able to report to you on matters of interest in relation to the New York campaign.

l. Mr. Blitz advises me that there has been little progress in connection with the Ort matter. A great deal of pressure is being applied by Mr. David Dubinsky and other Union leaders, and also by Mr. Alexander Kahn who is not only a member of the Board of the Joint Distribution Committee but also manager of the "Jewish Daily Forward" which is the keystone in the Ort structure. Mr. Blitz says that the demands of the Ort are so excessive that few people in the New York United Jewish Appeal are interested in yielding. He stated that Mr. Bregman and Mr. Rosenwald are both opposed to the inclusion of Ort. It is understood by all concerned that there will be no final decision until each of the agencies approves.

Mr. Blitz says, however, that it would be most undesirable if a situation were created whereby the UPA would be made to appear the one organization holding out against the inclusion of Ort. You will recall that such a situation existed three years ago, with very unhelpful results at that particular time. Mr. Blitz says that his strategy is to see to it that such offers might be made that the Ort, finding them unacceptable, would continue on its own.

2. We discussed the question of the members on the Board to represent the UPA on the New York UJA. You will recall that Rabbi Miller was appointed Chairman of a committee to consider membership of the Board after Members of the corporation had been selected. I wrote to you on February 5th giving you the names

of the suggested members as follows: Nathan Straus, Sylvan Gotshal, Charles Ress, Abraham L. Liebovitz, Jacob Sincoff, Rabbi Irving Miller, Judge Morris Rothenberg, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Dr. Israel Goldstein and Louis Lipsky.

Mr. Blitz informs me that there seems to be no hurry about the naming of Board members. Everyone concerned with the New York UJA seems to be especially preoccupied with campaign problems rather than with organizational problems. Apparently once the corporation had been created, all the talk of by-laws, etc., lost validity.

In the meantime the New York UJA is proceeding on the assumption that once a community has officers, it needs nothing else. That happens to be the position which you originally took yourself, but now that it is legalized by a charter it seems to be accepted by others too.

There is no indication at the present time how the New York campaign will be going, since it has not officially started, although in one or two isolated areas, where the amount of money is not large, solicitation has started.

Mr. Blitz informs me that Mr. Henry Ittleson was invited to become Honorary Chairman of the UJA in New York. He replied to Rabbi Jonah Wise by wire that his gift for 1942 would not be determined until later in the year but that in any event it would be substantially lower than in 1941. If under these circumstances the New York UJA wished to name him Honorary Chairman, he would be glad to serve. Naturally there could be no other alternative than to name Mr. Ittleson as Honorary Chairman. If there is any consolation it lies in the fact that Mr. Ittleson's reduced gift will not be announced until later on in the year. Unfortunately that is going to have a severe effect on some other communities, particularly St. Louis where they are jittery about their campaign, since Mr. Sydney Shoenberg measures his giving by Mr. Ittleson's. You will recall that last year Mr. Shoenberg reduced his gift from \$50,000 to \$30,000. I understand that the market value of Commercial Investment Trust, in which Messrs. Ittleson, Shoenberg and Mortimer May have a great part of their fortunes tied up, has shrunk by fifty percent in the last six months.

3. I discussed with Mr. Blitz the transfer of the proceeds of "Night of Stars" to the UPA. At the present time it is in the treasury of the Night of Stars. Is it desirable that this money be transferred to the UPA, and we notify the UJA that we have the money; a shall it continue to remain in the treasury of Night of Stars for further adjudication? What I have in mind is the refusal of the JDC to consider its income

of approximately \$100,000 of early 1941 in the Matzoth Fund as part of the income of the UJA of 1941. It was decided at a meeting of the Administrative Committee in 1941 that the money of the Night of Stars would be withheld until after the Matzoth Fund had been disposed of. However, it seems to me deplorable that money should be remaining in a bank of the Night of Stars where it cannot possibly do anybody any good. Naturally the Night of Stars is prepared to act upon our request in the matter. What do you think ought to be done?

The case of Mr. Meyer Goldberg is being pressed very seriously on the United Palestine Appeal.

The situation in brief is as follows:

Mr. Meyer Goldberg joined the staff of the Palestine fund-raising efforts in New York, variously known as the American Palestine Campaign, Keren Hayesod, United Palestine Appeal, in about 1925. He was the Director in the Bronx section of these New York campaigns until about 1937. At that time he was retired from service. It is my understanding that on several previous occasions an effort had been made by Mr. Blitz, Director of the New York campaign, to retire him on the ground that he was not doing the most effective work in that section. But in each instance Mr. Blitz was met with great resistence on the part of the Bronx leadership which felt that Mr. Goldberg was doing an excellent job.

At the time of Mr. Goldberg's retirement he was voted \$1,500 by the Keren Hayesod.

Mr. Meyer Goldberg is now reported to be veryill. The leaders of the Zionist District in the Bronx - and especially Mr. Max Schneider and Mr. Louis Altschul - feel that it is only fair that the UPA should make some financial provision for Mr. Goldberg who has no other resources. Mr. Schneider has intimated to Mr. Blitz that Mr. Goldberg has perhaps only six months to live, and that surely the UPA would not wish to deprive Mr. Goldberg of the comfort of some financial security in these last days. Mr. Schneider has suggested an amount of \$25 per week.

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver -2-February 26, 1942 In view of the fact that there is actually no New York fund-raising effort of the UPA, the problem comes squarely before the national UPA. Because Mr. Goldberg's position is reported to be so serious, I take the liberty of pressing for some action perhaps even before the meeting of the Administrative Committee which might be held on March 16th. Mr. Blitz has suggested the possibility of making available \$500 to Mr. Max Schneider for the latter to administer for Mr. Meyer Goldberg as he sees fit. Do you believe that this is possible? I have no knowledge of the long background involved in this case, but my own opinion would be that it would be much more economical and desirable for the UPA to err on the side

of generosity than of penuriousness in this particular case.

If you would make some suggestion, would you wish me to consider it promptly with Messrs. Lipsky and Goldstein to get their approval? Maturally it would also have to be submitted to Mr. Rosenbloom as Treasurer in accordance with the decision of the Budget Committee that no new financial engagements were to be undertaken by the UPA without prior approval by the Budget Committee.

In reading the attractively published March 5th issue of "Notes and News", I was struck by the circuitousness of the language used on Page Seven in reference to the Budget Research Committee.

The clause marked (2) reads as follows: "The Budget Research Committee can undertake modifications or expansions of its program that may seem advisable but the Board of Directors of the Council will not initiate recommendations for a full national advisory budgeting service without submitting the question to the General Assembly for approval. The Budget Research Committee will probably adopt the procedure of action by a two-thirds majority in dealing with the specific question of extending service to include advisory budgeting."

In reading very carefully the long exchange of correspondence between Mr. Jacob Blaustein and Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, it would seem to me that the action taken between them and by their respective constituents is summarized as follows:

Any recommendation for an expansion of the Budget Research Committee's activities must be passed by a twothirds majority and then, after approval by the Board of Directors, submitted to the next General Assembly for its action.

The language used on Page Seven of "Notes and News" is not, to my mind, clear. I would be grateful for this additional clarification.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I am looking forward to your visit to New York next week so that I can have an adequate opportunity of discussing with you quite a number of items that have developed in your absence. In the meantime, I would like to list a few of the things about which you might let me know in writing in advance.

- A) As I wired to you, we are proposing to hold a meeting of the National Council for Palestine in New York on May 3rd. This will be in the form of an afternoon meeting and a dinner meeting in your honor. I do hope that the date will be acceptable. You will recall that prior to your departure for England we had thought that April 26th would be an appropriate date.
- B) The J.D.C. people have been pressing me for a meeting to name the Allotment Committee of the U.J.A. for 1942. Do you want me to arrange a meeting while you are here next week?
- C) A great many communities have been sending invitations to the U.J.A. for you to open their campaigns. I note that you will be in Detroit on April 15th. I told Mr. Rosenbloom that the date of either April 19th or 20th would be agreeable for the Big Gifts meeting in Pittsburgh to be followed by the public opening. Pittsburgh prefers the April 19th date.

Among the major communities which have asked for you, I want to direct special attention to two, i.e., Kansas City and Milwaukee. Both are anxious to get dates as early as possible so that they can begin their plans for Big Gifts meetings.

Mr. Blitz has asked me to convey to you invitations for three functions he regards of utmost importance for the campaign. One is to open the Bronx campaign on April 29th. The other date he would like is May 12th. Mr. David Bernstein, Chairman of the Amusement Division insists that he cannot have a Big Gifts function unless you are the speaker. That affair would be held at luncheon. In the evening the Queens Division will have its opening. Mr.

Blitz tells me that this Big Gifts meeting represents about \$150,000.00.

I do hope that you will be able to let me have dates convenient to your calendar or be able to accept the New York suggestions.

D) I am hoping to be able to meet with you next Tuesday morning to go over with you the agenda for the meeting of the Administrative Committee of the U.P.A. to be held on Tuesday, April 14th, at 4:30 P.M.

With further reference to our telephone conversation of today:

(1) I do hope that it will be possible for a meeting to be held on Tuesday, April 14th, of yourself, Rabbi Jonah Wise and Mr. Rosenwald. There are a number of situations on which the counsel of the Chairmen is most important, and in general I am sure the morale of the campaign will be strengthened by such a meeting.

I hope that instead of 11 A. M., which is bad for the other two, you might possibly arrange to be in New York in time for a 9:30 meeting. It happens that every Tuesday morning the Executive Committee of the New York U.J.A. meets at the Hotel Commodore for breakfast at about 8:30 A. M. That meeting would last until about 9:30 or 9:45 A. M. Perhaps you might even come in time to attend that breakfast and then after its conclusion you, Rabbi Wise, Mr. Rosenwald, Coons and I could get together on the spot to go over the agenda.

- (2) The Executive Committee of the U.J.A. was to have held a stated meeting on March 16th, but this had to be cancelled because of your absence in England. It is suggested that a good date for this postponed meeting could be April 28th or 29th, depending on your convenience. I do hope that you can let me know about both these matters by Thursday or Friday of this week so that notices can go out and the necessary arrangements made.
- (3) As I informed you over the phone, Kansas City advised us that its Welfare Fund has definitely decided to enter a War Chest which will take place in October. Normally, Kansas City has a quota of \$225,000. It is adding \$112,000 to make up for the difference in campaign time, so that the Jewish Welfare Fund will be in the campaign for \$337,000. It is probable that the total quota will be \$3,000,000, since the Community Chest, the USO and other bodies are also involved.

Subject FINANCIAL DATA OF JDC

Since the appearance of my memorandum of December 26th, 1941, the JDC has issued three additional documents on finance:

1) Statement of financial status as of December 31, 1941

 Program and Budget for the first six months of 1942
 Summary of cash payments made during the first ten weeks of 1942, i. e. as of March 15, 1942.

With regard to Number 1): It is noteworthy that despite an excess of expenditure over income in 1941 totaling \$143,815, the general fund deficit of January 1, 1941, \$415,088 in amount, emerged as a surplus, as of December 31, 1941, of \$93,332. This transformation was effected chiefly by the depletion of the working fund reserve of \$620,000 which had been "officially established during years 1934-1938." It will, perhaps, be recalled that ever since 1934 (when I made my first visit to the States), memoranda from me have harped on the tactic of the JDC whereby a cash surplus is rendered a reserve fund for the sole purpose of exhibiting an annual deficit.

Of the total expenditure of \$5,694,100, the sum of \$446,000 (less than 8%) was expended for operating costs, which includes \$110,000 for information and community services. However, an additional sum must be added for administration - which expenses, apparently, are included in the over-all expenditure of \$5,248,100 for the JDC program of activities. According to Professor Ginzberg's Report, Page 23, administration expenses, as of September 30, 1941, amounted to \$509,000. (Incidentally, in the table on Page 23 of the Report, the figure for emigration and relief expenses is incorrectly listed as \$1,209,000 instead of \$1,010,000 -- the error undoubtedly being typographical).

The total liabilities as of December 31, 1941 are \$2,799,965; to meet this indebtedness there are resources of \$2,893,298. There seems to be no reason to question the resources; the liabilities, however, appear to be somewhat inflated. For example, an amount of \$250,000 is cited as payable to the Agro-Joint. Even if this is a loan which must be repaid, rather than the unpaid balance of an old commitment, it should properly have been included in the \$968,700 which represent the total commitments deferred to future years. It should be noted that the deferral of these commitments to the future is more or less offset by the exclusion from the item "resources" of assets held in the Joint Reconstruction Fund, the Palestine Economic Corporation and other corporations, since these assets are said to be "of no present cash value to the J.D.C."

With regard to the bulk of liabilities, consisting of "overseas commitments for relief disbursed through clearance arrangements and for funds borrowed" and of "unpaid balances of commitments", amounting to \$2,245,315 (after the deduction

of \$1,142,519 paid to steamship lines pending overseas accounting): PasTexperience would indicate that a very substantial portion of these liabilities exists on paper only and that the JDC will never be called upon to meet them in full but will undoubtedly cancel in 1942 or in subsequent years all those which have become obsolete.

The main difficulty in analyzing the summary of cash payments made in the first ten weeks of 1942, totaling \$1,599,231, inheres in the fact that these payments are "on account of all programs 1942 and prior years' appropriations": there is nothing to indicate how much of an item belongs in the 1942 budget as distinct from appropriations of previous years. But the JDC is very meticulous in stating in the form of a special note that as of December 1941, an additional sum of \$83,421 had been expended on account of the 1942 budget.

Close to two-thirds of the total, i.e., \$1,067.634, was spent for emigration. This represents rather a huge sum when one considers the marked decline in emigration since America's entry into the war. It is somewhat clarified by the explanatory note that more than 96% of this amount represents advances to steamship lines and that the JDC estimates that "40% of such advances are usually charged against the J.D.C. budget and the balance represents relatives' deposits." Accepting this statement at face value and not going into the question of whether the charges against the JDC budget may not in future be considerably less than 40%, it is clear that of the total expenditure of \$1,599,231, at least \$617,196 is an advance which will in due course return to the JDC.

Assuming for the moment that only a minor portion of the expenditure incurred was on account of prior years appropriations and that the bulk of payments made was on account of the 1942 budget, a comparison between the budget for the first six months of 1942 and actual expenditures in the first two and one-half months of 1942 is rather interesting. Following are the figures?

(Note: The figures in the last column exclude the sum of \$617,196 mentioned previously since this represents an advance to be repaid from relatives' deposits. The last column includes, however, the \$83,421 paid in December 1941 on account of the 1942 budget.

Items II F and VI were not included in the budget; some money, however, has been spent for these purposes. \$25,000 of the total mentioned in Item VI represents a contribution to the Co-ordinating Foundation for Refugees.)

An itemized comparison of the six-months budget with actual expenditure in about half that time reveals, in most instances, an impressive discrepancy. Even if some hundreds of thousands of dollars are added to the total of \$1,065,452, which additional sum may have been expended without the knowledge of the JDC for continuation of emergency aid in occupied countries, the comparison still clearly indicates that this budget of \$5,074,410 for a six-months period is inflated and issued for propaganda purposes only.

A special feature in the budget is Item K, "Central and South America", involving \$450,750. This sum is larger than the total appropriations for this purpose which were made in 1941 and constitutes about 82% of the total budgetary requirements estimated for refugee assistance in Latin America. It should be understood that in all these countries the JDC acts as an NRS, thereby relieving various Jewish communities of their responsibility to refugees to a large extent. Needless to say, this enhances the reputation of the JDC in these countries. It is questionable, however, as to whether it is actually necessary for American Jewry to grant these subventions to Latin American Jewish communities.

Dear Henry:

This is to confirm our telephone conversation concerning the affiliation of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Greater Kansas City with the newly organized United War Chest.

The facts are substantially as I explained them to you. To reiterate I will outline them again.

- 1. A United War Chest has been set up in Kansas City and the purpose of this organization will be to raise funds through the means of a joint campaign for all local, national and overseas causes. (Besides the Jewish Welfare Federation, this includes or will include the Community Chest, the U. S. O., the China Relief, Russian Relief, British Relief, and in all probability the Red Cross, as well as all the other organizations seeking to have campaigns that may be approved by the War Chest Committee).
- 2. Immediately after the War Fund was created, the Jewish Welfare Federation was approached. I presume this was due to the imminence of our drive.
- 3. There was no question of course, about our joining forces.
 The only serious problem involved was the matter of our spring campaign. In view of the fact that the War Chest campaign is not to be held until October, would we be justified in conducting our drive now?

A number of proposals were made:

a. That we conduct our usual campaign and at the end of six months hand over our assets and liabilities to the War Fund. This plan was discarded by the War Fund Committee because of the many complications that would be involved in explaining this method to our subscribers.

We are fully cognizant of the fact that we have taken a serious step, and that a grave responsibility now devolves not only upon the community as a whole but also upon our Jewish Community, in so far as "giving" is concerned. The Federation will lend all of its facilities to the War Chest in its fund raising effort. We expect to carry on an extensive educational campaign among our subscribers so that they will fully understand that the creation of the War Fund relieves them of no responsibility, and that they will be asked to give their full Federation subscription to the War Fund in addition to the subscription that they would be asked to give for all other causes included in this one over all campaign.

As I told you over the phone, it will be very helpful for our educational campaign if you were to send us a telegram telling us that you approve of the step we have taken.

I want to assure you, as I will assure all of the beneficiary agencies of our Federation that we are zealous for their interests and will constantly be on guard that these are in no way compromised.

Dear Mr. Bretton:

As Co-Chairmen of the United Jewish Appeal we have given careful consideration to your letter of April 11th describing the circumstances under which the Jewish Welfare Federation of Greater Kansas City has affiliated itself with the newly organized United War Chest of your community.

It is recognized by the United Jewish Appeal that the Jewish community of Kansas City has the fullest autonomy in reaching decisions on its communal activities based on the experience and judgment of the local leadership in relation to problems with which they have the greatest local intimacy. It is, therefore, beyond the power of the United Jewish Appeal, on whose behalf the Jewish Welfare Federation has served as a trustee, to voice approval or disapproval of the decision reached by your officers.

The United Jewish Appeal is the fund-raising instrument acting for the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service. Its responsibilities have been heightened as a result of the war. The necessity for continuing assistance to the beneficiaries of these agencies has been recognized over a period of years and currently by the Jewish leadership of Kansas City.

The only standpoint from which we can concern ourselves with the form which fund-raising in Kansas City takes is the effect upon the urgent necessity to raise maximum sums for the United Jewish Appeal beneficiaries. In that connection, there are certain observations which we should like to call to the attention of the officers of the Jewish Welfare Federation, many if not all of which they have undoubtedly already considered in their discussions with the officers of the United War Chest:

(1) In order to achieve its goal of \$25,000,000, the United Jewish Appeal has suggested to Kansas City a quota of \$135,000 for the year 1942. It is our belief that the needs of the Jews assisted by the United Jewish Appeal—needs which have been multiplied by wartime emergencies—and the size and resources of the Kansas City Jewish community, justify that quota. Since the Kansas City Federation is acting as the trustee for the United Jewish Appeal, it is our assumption that there has been presented to the officers of the United War Chest the full goal of the United Jewish Appeal for 1942, inasmuch as you state that "the integrity of the Jewish Welfare Federation as a budgeting and completely autonomous organization is in no way involved."

Under the terms of the plan which you described in your letter of April 11th, the United Jewish Appeal would be justified in assuming that there has been transmitted to the United War Chest a budget of the Jewish Welfare Federation which would involve the sum of \$202,500 for the United Jewish Appeal. That is based on a budget for an 18-month period, since the campaign which you normally would have held in the Spring has been postponed to the Fall. The assumption that such a quota has been transmitted on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal is strengthened by the knowledge that the appeal and the emphasis of a

United War Chest will be linked to the responsibilities that fall upon Americans in connection with the war. The appeal to Kansas City generosity will be based on the realization that we, as Americans, have a responsibility to ease the plight of the victims of the war and to help meet some of the problems of the Axis victims, among whom the Jews occupy a foremost place.

We are also confident that it has been made clear to the officers of the United War Chest that the United Jewish Appeal is the largest single instrument of the Jews of America to fulfill our obligations to the victims of the war-a war which for the Jews had its beginnings with the accession to power of Hitler in 1933.

We should like to know more concretely the nature of the relationship of the Jewish Welfare Federation to the United War Chest. For example, how would the agencies be affected in the event that through some mischance the total goal of the United War Chest were not achieved? Is it the intention to provide preferences for any of the agencies or are they all to share proportionately in the results?

(2) There are many problems arising out of the affiliation of the Jewish Welfare Federation with the United War Chest. These have certainly had your closest scrutiny. Some of these problems have been discussed at length at various meetings, especially at the General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds in Chicago last January.

The question of comparable standards of giving; of maintaining the standards that now exist among Jews; the ultimate, if not the immediate possibility of scrutiny of and veto power over budgetary items of the Jewish Welfare Federation; inclusion of enterprises and activities which, though desirable and essential in a Jewish Welfare Federation, might give rise to discussions in some other medium of fund-raising; the maintenance of interest of leadership and membership in the agencies and beneficiaries of the Jewish Welfare Federation and scores of other issues arise out of the action that has been decided upon.

If these questions are raised merely for the sake of directing attention to them, it is not with any desire to infringe upon the responsibility of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Kansas City to make its own determination of the issues involved. But we do feel in sharing responsibility with you for the United Jewish Appeal that indication should be given of the cautiousness with which these developments are being watched.

May we receive your assurance that the United Jewish Appeal may look forward to inclusion in the United War Chest for a sum commensurate with the appeal which our beneficiary agencies must exert in such a War Chest? May we also express the hope that the decision which you have reached will be vindicated with success.

A situation has arisen in terms of financial relationships affecting the United Jewish Appeal which I believe might most equitably be passed upon by the 1941 Allotment Committee of the United Jewish Appeal.

The facts in brief are as follows: Early in 1941 when independent campaigns had been launched by the three agencies which compose the United Jewish Appeal, the Joint Distribution Committee inaugurated a "Matzoth Fund", through which it received in cash and pledges in excess of \$100,000.

It has been the contention of the United Palestine Appeal that this sum should be turned over to the United Jewish Appeal in the same manner as all other income which came to the three agencies from January, 1941 through December 31, 1941.

The Joint Distribution Committee has disputed that position, and has declined to make that sum available to the common resources of the United Jewish Appeal, even though the New York United Jewish Appeal of 1941 has carried the amount obtained from the Matzoth Fund on its books as part of its proceeds in New York City, although the money itself went to the Joint Distribution Committee and was exclusively used by it.

The Joint Distribution Committee has asserted that the money represented a transmittal item and was not income for the campaign, although a public fund-raising effort for this purpose was conducted in the newspapers, through literature and other media.

Inasmuch as \$100,000 is a substantial item, I believe that the problem of its disposal might well be considered by a body like the 1941 Allotment Committee of the United Jewish Appeal.

You are aware, of course, that Night of Stars is held annually in New York to raise funds for the United Palestine Appeal. This is an

Nevertheless during the life of the United Jewish Appeal the United Palestine Appeal has made the proceeds from Night of Stars available to the United Jewish Appeal, even though it was specifically a United Palestine Appeal fund-raising effort. The income of the 1941 Night of Stars to the United Palestine Appeal might be placed in the same category as the Matzoth Fund of the Joint Distribution Committee. The United Palestine Appeal has never challenged the right of the United Jewish Appeal to the income from Night of Stars, and believes that if it is just that the proceeds of the Night of Stars should be made available to the United Jewish Appeal, the same procedure should apply to the special fund of the Joint Distribution Committee. May I ask that this matter be placed on the agenda of the Allotment Committee for its next meeting, which I understand is to be called to consider the distribution of an additional sum of from \$500,000 to \$600,000 of the 1941 United Jewish Appeal. We wish to place before you our request for an allotment to the Council for the year 1942. We appreciate the contributions we have received from your organization in previous years and trust that you will continue to make an allotment to the Council program this year.

The budget of the Council is secured from member agency communities on the basis of a uniform dues schedule. Our schedule is based on funds raised by federations and by other forms of central fund-raising. Earlier in the year we addressed an appeal to the New York United Jewish Appeal. We have recently received a reply from Mr. Sylvan Gotshal, Executive Chairman, informing us that though New York City has organized a permanent United Jewish Appeal this year's campaign for the UJA is being conducted on the same basis as in previous years, and that the 1942 New York United Jewish Appeal does not have the authority to make a direct contribution to any agency other than the three organizations included in the national UJA. For this reason we are again applying directly to the National Refugee Service, the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal.

In accordance with our schedule applicable to member communities we requested \$12,325 from the New York United Jewish Appeal. In 1941 we received from the three agencies of the UJA the amount of \$10,000 as follows: Joint Distribution Committee, \$5,000; United Palestine Appeal, \$2,500; and National Refugee Service, \$2,500. The requested amount of \$12,325 is essential to meet the 1942 budget of the Council which calls for an increased program of services. Included in the 1942 budget are additional research studies of the agencies engaged in overseas and refugee work. We plan this year to cooperate actively with the Inquiry to be established by the Allotment Committee of the 1942 UJA and to cover agencies not included in the UJA but whose work is directly related to the programs of the UJA agencies.

In order to secure the amount requested from the three agencies of the UJA each of the agencies should allot a proportionately larger grant to the Council. To meet the 1942 request on the basis of the 1941 grants will require \$6,162 from the JDC, \$3,081 from the UPA and \$3,081 from the NRS.

The Council is a service agency and its budget is properly an administrative charge on supporting organizations. The Council's functions in terms of organizing local communities to assume responsibility for local, national and overseas needs is recognized by all the important Jewish communities throughout the country. One of our most important purposes is to develop effective support of national and overseas programs through organized local bodies. Until the New York UJA is established to assume a financial responsibility for our services contributions from the Deneficiary agencies of the

We would appreciate your presenting this request to the appropriate administrative body of your organization and letting us know as soon as possible of your decision.







Dear Mr. Bronston:

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal held in New York on April 29th consideration was given to the allotment by the Greater Miami Jewish Federation of \$40,000 to the United Jewish Appeal for 1942. We are, of course, appreciative of the desire of the Jewish community of Miami to share fully in the responsibilities of the agencies comprising the United Jewish Appeal.

However, we were compelled to take note of the fact that of approximately \$121,000 raised, only \$40,000 was allotted to the United Jewish Appeal. The grant represents a decrease of \$8,000 as compared with 1941, although there was no comparable decrease in the total income of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation to warrant a severe reduction of this nature.

Each community must consider for itself the total Jewish responsibilities which it must carry. On the other hand, there rests upon the officers of the United Jewish Appeal trusteeship for the vital activities of the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service. It is our conviction, as indeed it must be yours, that the paramount consideration facing American Jews today in terms of the survival of the Jewish people is to make available the largest possible sums to the work furthered by the United Jewish Appeal.

Under these circumstances, therefore, the action of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation in allotting so disproportionate an amount to the United Jewish Appeal out of its total resources and sharply reducing the sum made available the previous year is a source of disappointment.

In endeavoring to realize its goal, the United Jewish Appeal must submit to each community a recommendation for its share of the responsibility in the hope that sufficient funds will be raised locally to make possible the achievement of that recommendation. The attainment of the goal is dependent upon many

factors, not the least of which is the fulfillment by each community, to the extent that it finds possible, of its particular share of the whole program. For Miami to fail to meet its responsibility is not only to deprive the United Jewish Appeal of the funds, which its beneficiaries so urgently require, but to reduce the standard for other communities of comparable size.

We are hopeful, therefore that the subject of the allocation to the United Jewish Appeal will be reconsidered.

Professor Eli Ginzberg informed me today that Mr. Frederick Greenman was planning to call a meeting of the Allotment Committee to dispose of the remaining 1941 United Jewish Appeal Funds on Monday, May 25, or a day in that vicinity.

We are preparing data on the present needs of the Palestine funds in order to strengthen the application for a very large part of the remaining funds, which will total from \$500,000 to \$600,000.

I cannot too strongly urge my conviction that at the present time the United Palestine Appeal has a far greater claim to the remaining funds than the Joint Distribution Committee or the National Refugee Service.

You will recall that the Joint Distribution Committee has been allotted \$5,550,000, from the 1941 funds, the United Palestine Appeal \$3,325,000, and the National Refugee Service \$2,725,000. (The latter sum includes \$50,000 additional to which the National Refugee Service was not entitled, but which was granted it as a means of coming to a quick agreement on the 1942 United Jewish Appeal).

In the latter connection, I am sure you have noticed that no more immigration is permitted into Cuba. Moreover, the regulations for those already in Cuba have been greatly eased to facilitate their stay and work in the country.

For letters such as we propose be sent to Miami over the signature of our three National Chairmen, Rabbi Jonah B. Wise does not believe in the efficacy of the three-signature arrangement. He does, however, definitely believe that each of our Chairmen should write an individual letter.

I sent, as you know, to Rabbi Wise your excellent draft and he wrote to Mr. Bronston over his personal signature and on his personal stationery, the attached. He urges that Dr. Silver and Mr. Rosenwald, respectively, each write also and as promptly as possible.

Dear Friend Bronston:

At a meeting of the United Jewish Appeal Executive Committee, attended (in addition to the three chairmen, Messrs. Abba Hillel Silver, William Rosenwald and myself) by almost the full Committee, the desperate situation confronting the miserably beaten and horribly mangled remnants of Jews who have been holding out in our various Corregidors and Singapores, in occupied France, in Lisbon, in Poland and the Palestine bastion, etc. was gone over. It was frightfully apparent that, unless the American Jewish committees came to their assistance immediately, thousands and thousands must be condemned to death by us. I cannot go into details with you, but "too little and too late" is our problem. I am giving you the unanimous conviction of our National Committee, to which I am sure you and your community always have given your affirmative vote.

I hesitated to advise the Committee that Miami, having raised approximately \$121,000, was voting less than one third of that amount to the United Jewish Appeal for the whole work of rescue and resettlement throughout the world for 1942. I did it with the greatest diffidence because I did not wish to represent the community of Miami or the generous givers of the community as having first contributed to this cause and then withheld the contribution from it.

The Officers of the United Jewish Appeal are your trustees. They cannot, just to preserve their own personal peace, permit the United Jewish Appeal to fall beneath a certain minimum of financial support. Your community would resent the United Jewish Appeal condemning to starvation, condemning to remaining in Europe for lack of transportation, condemning to remain outside Palestine for lack of funds to guarantee their acceptance in the land of Israel. I therefore feel that there is nothing that can be said vigorous enough to ask a reconsideration of this action or to demand an adjustment if the action has not yet been taken.

"Thou shalt not put a stumbling block before the blind", says the Book of Leviticus, Chapter 19.

None of us can see either the misery that exists or the marvelous results of our help. Therefore the United Jewish Appeal Executive Committee is all the more responsible for most vigorously championing the cause of the unseen, the unknown and the unprotected of our people.

Dear Mr. Bronston:

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal held in New York on April 29th consideration was given to the allotment by the Greater Miami Jewish Federation of \$40,000 to the United Jewish Appeal for 1942. We are, of course, appreciative of the desire of the Jewish community of Miami to share fully in the responsibilities of the agencies comprising the United Jewish Appeal.

However, we were compelled to take note of the fact that of approximately \$121,000 raised only \$40,000 was allotted to the United Jewish Appeal. The grant represents a decrease of \$8,000 as compared with 1941, although there was no comparative decrease in the total income of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation to warrant a severe reduction of this nature.

Each community must consider for itself the total Jewish responsibilities which it must carry. On the other hand, there rests upon the officers of the United Jewish Appeal trusteeship for the vital activities of the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service. It is our conviction, as indeed it must be yours, that the paramount consideration facing American Jews today in terms of the survival of the Jewish people is to make available the largest possible sums to the work furthered by the United Jewish Appeal.

Under these circumstances, therefore, the action of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation, in alloting so disproportionate an amount to the United Jewish Appeal out of its total resources and sharply reducing the sum made available the previous year is a source of disappointment.

In endeavoring to realize its national goal, the United Jewish Appeal must submit to each community a recommendation for its share of the responsibility in the hope that sufficient funds will be raised locally to make possible the achievement of that recommendation. The attainment of the goal is dependent upon many factors, not the least of which is the fulfillment by each community to the extent that it finds possible of its particular share of the whole program. For Miami to fail to meet its responsibility is not only to deprive the United Jewish Appeal of the funds, which its beneficiaries so urgently require, but to reduce the standard for other communities of comparable size.

We are hopeful, therefore, that the subject of the allocation to the United Jewish Appeal will be reconsidered.

In accordance with your telegram, I advised Mr. Coons that the meeting to discuse Dr. Weizmann's broadcast could not be attended by Mr. Steinglass or myself, since it had not been convened at the request of all the National Chairmen. I also advised him to inform Mr. Rosenwald and Rabbi Wise of your view in this matter. It seems that on receipt of this note, Mr. Coons called these gentlemen, and the meeting was cancelled.

Last Friday I had spoken to Judge Rothenberg about the situation, and had suggested that he might attend. He came to the UJA office this morning, and since the meeting was cancelled he spoke to Mr. Coons of the situation. He remarked that if there were any protests to be made on Dr. Weizmann's speech on the ground that he had not dealt adequately with other subjects than Palestine which he did not think was the case --, then the United Palestine Appeal had overlooked hundreds of opportunities for calling attention to the oversights of the JDC and NRS people in referring -- or rather, not referring -- to Palestine.

Judge Rothenberg told Coons that if the publicity of the UJA needed discussion, there was no reason why the three National Chairmen could not get together to exchange views. It seems that a memorandum will be drawn up by Mr. Rosenwald detailing his observations, to be circulated between the Chairmen. Judge Rothenberg told Coons that he was nonplussed that any issue could have been raised.

Agency deficit, despite our restriction of activity within limits of the curtailed provisional budget approved by the Actions Committee. Hence it is vitally urgent that we achieve our originally estimated budget of \$1,180,000 (KH and JA - et), especially in view of the possibilities and needs of the war effort.

You will be encouraged to learn that cash on 1942 campaigns has been coming in encouragingly thus far. This is especially true of New York City.

Subject: Jewish National Fund Golden Book Campaign

Dear Isidor:

I would like to get your opinion upon what rights the Jewish National Fund has to conduct a Golden Book campaign such as they are now conducting in Indianapolis, in view of the fact that the Jewish National Fund is a participant in the U.J.A.

Understand, I have no opinion on this matter but I am seeking one because the matter is under discussion here. The campaign is described in the Jewish Post of May 15th which I am enclosing.

As we understand it, the Jewish National Fund is a participant in the United Palestine Appeal, but it still has rights to carry on collections in its traditional manner for such things as the collections from the boxes and also the Golden Book activities.

However, the question that has been raised here is one of degree, and that is whether or not in making a special drive here for 40 Golden Book pages, which means \$4,000, it is exceeding either the spirit or letter of the agreement that the Jewish National Fund has with United Jewish Appeal.

I talked to Mendel Fisher a couple of days ago when he happened to be in town about the matter and he says the Jewish National Fund is well within its rights in seeking this \$4,000 here as he says the Jewish National Fund has a specific right to continue its Golden Book activities. I told him that people here were questioning his interpretation of the agreement which exists and in the interests of protecting the Jewish National Fund itself, I felt the matter ought to be cleared up.

You see, an unfortunate thing has occurred, in that this Golden Book campaign was started about the same time as the Welfare Fund campaign and when I heard that solicitation was being made, although just quietly and from a few people, I requested that they defer any action until after the Welfare campaign was over with. This they agreed to do, although during the Welfare campaign I personally ran into four important subscribers who gave as the reason why they were not giving more to the Welfare Fund the fact they were going to have to give to the Golden Book campaign so that, in effect, their campaign was going on during our Welfare campaign even though active steps were not being taken by them at the time.

Mendel Fisher said that under no circumstances should they have conflicted with the Welfare Campaign here, that he was agreed on that point, but there is a difference of opinion on the other point of just what are the Jewish National Fund's rights under its agreement. He brought up the fact that this is the 40th anniversary of the Jewish National Fund and that is why they are going out for these Golden Book pages more actively, and I said I questioned whether or not the fact that it was their 40th anniversary gave them the right to make any more active requests for Golden Book subscriptions than was normal.

I also told him of one case I knew of where a man in the Welfare Fund gave \$500 but I said he should have given \$1,000 and I told the man he should have given \$1,000 but he said he had to give money to other things and among them he mentioned the Jewish National Fund. He did not say he was giving the other \$500 to the Jewish National Fund, and my own opinion is he gave \$200 to it. When I told this to Mendel Fisher, he said - "Well, if a fellow is liberally inclined and would want to sign up for two Golden Book pages instead of one, I suppose that is all right."

Again I pointed out the question of degree. I also pointed out to him another man working in the campaign who was one of the key givers in the \$250 class that should have given \$500. I did work on the man very hard and he finally increased his subscription from \$250 to \$300 and just at the time I was to tell him I thought he should do better, he said he was also giving \$100 to the Jewish National Fund. I am certain that that \$400 instead of \$300 from this man, if given to the Welfare Fund, would have nad an important effect upon a number of other givers who are influenced by this key man.

To sum up, what I am after is really what is the spirit and letter of the agreement because I know this matter is going to be discussed at the next Jewish Welfare Board meeting as not only is that point involved, but also the point is involved as to whether or not any beneficiary of the Welfare Fund has a right to have a secondary campaign locally without permission of the Welfare Fund.

For example, last year the Joint Defense Appeal was permitted to have an additional campaign with the express permission of the Welfare Fund, but on strict limitations that it was to call on a certain number of people, which it did. This special campaign that the Jewish National Fund is having is similar in scope except it is conducted without the permission of the local Fund.

Of course, the Jewish National Fund may take the attitude that it is only going to its Zionist members and that any organization has a right to go to its members for anything it wishes, but when you stop to consider that nearly everybody in Indianapolis is a Zionist member, it sort of reminds you of the story of the fellow who asked his girl whether or not she had been true to him while he was gone and she said - "Well, I have to confess I went out with one other party while you were gone", and when he asked who the other party was, she said - "The Navy".

Dear Mr. Rosenbloom:

My reply to your letter of May 15th must at this point necessarily be personal and not official. Your letter will be read to the next meeting of the Board of Directors of the Jewish Welfare Fund of Chicago if you desire that that be done. Personally, however, I wish to say that I think it would be an altogether improper request for you to make.

We took the trouble of having a special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Jewish Welfare Fund convene to listen to Rabbi Jonah Wise present the reaction of the officials of the United Jewish Appeal, or at least of the National Chairmen of the United Jewish Appeal. Such a meeting was held and Rabbi Wise, ably and fully, presented the situation from the standpoint of the United Jewish Appeal. All the arguments with respect to the possible effects on the contributions of other communities that may grow out of Chicago's action were mentioned by Rabbi Wise. Rabbi Wise, in his presentation, was firm, direct, and yet made the presentation in such fashion that it could be received with good humor.

The last paragraph of your letter seems to indicate that you know something of the facts, namely, that cut of \$1,250,000 that could be allotted, the United Jewish Appeal was given \$800,000. Last year, out of \$1,515,000 that could be allotted, the United Jewish Appeal was given \$900,000. The United Jewish Appeal, therefore, this year received a larger proportion of the funds available than it did last year.

In order to make that action possible this year, we have deliberately reduced the amount to local institutions, an amount which helped them in the maintenance of their work and in the amortization of loans made for building purposes -- we made a reduction to such institutions from \$300000 to \$150,000. This considerably upsets the plan which our community had agreed upon for the amortization of such loans for building purposes.

What seems to me, however, to be the fundamental difficulty is the difficulty of understanding what local communities are doing in raising funds through their Welfare Funds. They are definitely not acting as agents for national organizations. We are not the agents of the United Jewish Appeal. We are the agents of our local community. Some of us have endeavored over the last several years to make the community of Chicago, as undoubtedly you have your own community in Pittsburgh, realize that it has certain obligations not to institutions or organizations, but to Jewish needs. The National organizations, whether for fund raising purposes or for the conduct of actual work, are merely agencies through which our local communities act.

It is quite possible that in due course we shall find some of these

agencies ineffective and, in point of fact, useless. There is a growing, and quite rationally a growing question as to the continuing usefulness of the United Jewish Appeal itself and the desirability of spending approximately a half million dollars a year to conduct it when in most of the major communities - accounting for almost 90% of the funds - the United Jewish Appeal is, in the main, only of very modest assistance, and in many cases, accounting for perhaps 70% of the funds where it is of no practical assistance.

I know that the officers of the United Jewish Appeal feel differently about the matter, but I think you should weigh in the scales what the local communities think about the matter too. I know that to a large extent I am carrying coals to New Castle, since your own service in your own local community is so widely known and so deeply appreciated.

It is true that at the meeting with Rabbi Wise, some individual Directors did say that if it were possible to increase the allocation to the United Jewish Appeal, they hoped it would be done. Whether it will be possible or not, I am in no position to say. I myself have grave doubts that it will or can be done. At any rate, there will be no substantial review of the situation until approximately October 1st.

Finally, what was not mentioned either by Rabbi Wise or by your good self, is this simple fact: Chicago undertook its campaign at a time when most communities viewed the possibility of such campaign with great misgivings. In fact, some communities had decided not to have a campaign at all. The example of Chicago in undertaking the campaign and in raising, all things considered, a reasonably large sum for the limited number of institutions included in the campaign, was heartening to these other communities, and really began the national effort. I should think you would want to encourage us and on the whole work with us, and believe that we are trying to do the best that we can, not for the United Jewish Appeal as such, but for those causes and those works that are assisted through the constituent agencies of the United Jewish Appeal.

On behalf of the Mational Chairmen of the United Jevish Appeal I acknowledge your letter of May 12th and also that of May 8th. Dear Lazure:

Your inquiry as to the right of the Jewish National Fund to secure independent monies through the Golden Book in Indianapolis raises a most and difficult question. Now in our fourth year, we have more than a little difficulty in establishing a precise interpretation with Mendel Fisher as to what the Jewish National Fund should do and that which they should not do in relation to the United Jewish Appeal. Only last week we had a conference with him in this office to urge that the Jewish National Fund cease causing confusion and conflict in some communities where their activities are in direct competition with the United Palestine Appeal interests in the United Jewish Appeal.

The Jewish National Fund, as you may know, receives fifty per cent of the revenue accruing to the United Palestine Appeal through the United Jewish Appeal. This, of course, represents the major contribution of the American Jewish community to the Jewish National Fund at this time.

The national agreement between the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee for 1942 provides:

The traditional collections of the Jewish National Fund are not to be included or to be considered a part of the United Jewish Appeal. However, a report of its net receipts shall be made available to the Allotment Committee. Any income received by the Jewish National Fund through allotment from Welfare Funds is to be considered income for the United Jewish Appeal."

The Jewish National Fund considers the Golden Book as an activity of its "traditional collections."

Obviously, it is shortsighted for the Jewish National Fund to stimulate independent "traditional collection" activity in advance of, during, or in my opinion, immediately after a Welfare Fund campaign. There is not, however, much that we can do about it from the United Jewish Appeal national headquarters, but it seems to me that a community of the size of Indianapolis can, if it wishes, control the situation quite definitely.

As I said, this is the fourth year of our United Jewish Appeal and the problems resulting in conflict with the Jewish National Fund have not been satisfactorily adjusted. I, personally, doubt whether they will ever be. I wish I could be more helpful.

Dear Isidoret

I have your letter of May 20th, regarding the Jewish Rational Fund Golden Book situation, and frankly, the reply is unsatisfactory, in that it leaves the problem up in the air.

It seems to me that a question as simple as I have asked, which is whether or not the activities of the local organization here raising funds for the Jevish National Fund is within the rights of the agreement with the United Jewish Appeal, is deserving of a clear cut answer of "mes" or "no".

I know the question involves one of degree, but certainly there is someone, or some committee, that has the authority to pass on this question answered satisfactorily in that manner.

Undoubtedly, there is a committee that gave the Jevish Matienal Fund the authority to continue its traditional fund raising activities, and I think that committee should interpret whether or not the type of activities that are being followed out in Indianapolis now are in been with either the spirit or letter of the agreement covering traditional fund raising activities.

In other words, what is meant by "traditional fund raising activities" insofar as getting contributions for the Golden Book! Has it been the custom of the Jevish Mational Fund to go out on a campaign such as they have here in Indianapolis to solicit, as they have from perhaps one hundred people, contributions for the Golden Book at \$100.00 a page —
(I understand that they have over fifty contributors at the custom for them to do this, then in what respect would this be considered a traditional fund raising activity!

I do not know how much money is raised annually for the Golden Book, although I do understand that the traditional fund raising activities in 1941 for the Jevish Mational Fund were around \$500,000.00. How much of that \$500,000.00 came from the Golden Book, and how much would be raised nationally for the Golden Book this year if their scale of money raising for that purpose were on the basis of \$5,000.00 from Indianapolis this year, and how would that compare with previous years?

It would seem to me that on this scale of fund raising for the Golden Book, together with the normal other traditional fund raising activities of the Jewish Mational Jund, that far more money would be raised nationally than was contemplated at the time that the Jewish Mational Jund received its authority from the United Jewish Appeal to continue with its traditional fund raising activities. If that is so, it would appear that the Jewish Mational Jund with its Golden Book campaign is violating both the spirit and letter of the agreement with the United Falestine Appeal and the United Jewish Appeal.

There is considerable local dissatisfaction in Indianapolis over this situation, not only from the fact that the activity was undertaken almost coincident with the local Welfare Campaign, but more important, that it is a violation of at least the spirit of the agreement that the Jevish Mational Fund has with the United Falestine Appeal and the United Jevish Appeal. It has caused other organizations in Indianapolis, who have felt that they are not getting enough of the Welfare Campaign, to want to conduct an auxiliary campaign for themselves also, and this only leads in the end to the destruction of the Welfare Fund, which in turn would eventually react to the amount of money that would be given to the United Jevish Appeal and the United Palestine Appeal.

I personally am on the spot in this situation on account of having been campaign manager of the Jewish Welfare Fund and also because of my sympathetic interest in the work of the Jewish Mational Fund. If I could get a clear cut ruling on this matter to the effect that the Jewish Mational Fund is not violating either the spirit or letter of their agreement, then I want to contribute a page to the Golden Book myself, and even encourage others to do it if they ask my opinion about it.

On the other hand, if there is doubt cast on this matter through no clear cut interpretation being given by the responsible authorities, who should make a clear cut answer of "yes" or "no" — then should I contribute to the Golden Book under those conditions, I would be severely criticised by a large number of people in Indianapolis, who would feel that I was lending y support to an unauthorized more

I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. Henry Montor at the United Palestine office, 41 %. 42nd Street, in the hope that he will give me a definite answer, or that at least he will refer the question to the committee that can give an authoritative answer on this question.

Gertainly some committee ought to give the answer of "yes" or "no" as to whether or not the operation in indianapolis is in keeping with the national agreement, and I would like to have that answer without any buck-passing.

I await your reply, and will also thank you to get in touch with Mr. Henry Montor. with whom I am not personally sequainted, to urge that he give me a prompt answer as well.

Presumably, if you were to object it would show your Zionist discourtesy. The only suggestion that I can offer is this; that if Mr. Leavitt is invited to be present at the meetings, a similar invitation should be addressed to myself since Mr. Goldwasser places the invitation to Mr. Leavitt on the ground that "Leavitt be permitted to supply information wherever I find myself at a loss." Obviously I am glad to note that Mr. Goldwasser has let down his caste bars and now recognizes Mr. Leavitt as a human being, which indeed he is. But when the "four freedoms" come to the U.J.A. they should be made available to all agencies of the U.J.A. and not merely to the ruling imperial class. Perhaps my observations seem too facetious but I imagine that the kernel of what I have to say is not concealed. In all earnestness, I think it would be wrong for the U.P.A. or anyone else to take the position that because a person is a "professional" he must be debarred from citizenship or from the fulfillment of communal responsibilities. My dear Mr. Montors I am enclosing herewith the supplementary data which Dr. Ginzburg sent out to the members of the Allotment Committee. It will undoubtedly serve as the basis for the allotment. It is a rather amazing document. The JDC is represented as showing excess liabilities of resources of \$569,142, the NRS is shown to have a deficit of \$159,600 while the UPA shows a deficit of only \$59,275. There is a strange jumbling of figures in all three reports. In the NRS report there is smuggled in a "working reserve" of \$300,000, an item which was never heretofore considered by any Allotment Committee; also \$795,000 of loans are included among the expenditures, and no repayments are included as an offset. Ginzburg makes no mention at all of the huge debt which the Jewish Agency is trying to pay off. Every provision is made for the JDC and the NRS to meet their total former commitments, but little for the Jewish Agency. It is of interest to note that no mention is made of the \$50,000 which was given by the Allotment Committee to the NRS, parmarked for Cuban immigration, which didn't materialize, and which by the terms of the 1942 agreement with us, the NRS was permitted to keep and to use for whatever purposes it desired. I would suggest that our auditors make a careful and immediate survey of the enclosed data and write out their comments upon it. They should be brief and exact! Rosenbloom and I should have it by Monday, and copies of it should be available for distribution among the Allotment Committee members at the meeting on Tuesday. It is strange to note how Ginzburg, who began as a severe, revolutionary critic of the NRS, has steadily tapered off into an advocate of the NRS to the point of adopting their entire line... Friedman, at least, was consistent ...

Mr. Montor -2-June 4, 1942 I am also enclosing herewith a letter of Mr. Baerwald. Evidently they do not wish to adopt the proposal which I made for an agreement upon a ratio for the 1942 allocations. They want to go through with another Allotment Committee. That would be entirely satisfactory. They would like to retain also Mr. Greenman as chairman of the Allotment Committee for 1942 but the would like to substitute for the three other members of the Committee. I am inclined to think that that would be a mistake to retain one and to dismiss the others. However, we shall discuss that when we meet next Tuesday. Dear Dr. Silver:

I had lunch today with Professor Eli Ginzberg, to whom I expressed "shock" at the contents of his summary statement to the Allotment Committee. He said that he did not understand my "shock" in view of the fact that what I read into the statistics was not what he had intended at all.

In brief, this is his view of the situation of the three agencies in the U.J.A., a view which he is prepared to present to the Allotment Committee as an introductory statement if he is called upon:

- 1. The J.D.C. has approximately \$1,200,000 of padding in its requests, consisting of (a) \$620,000 as a working fund reintroduced into its figures after the J.D.C. had itself discarded that item in its own fiscal report for the period ending December 31, 1941; (b) approximately \$325,000 of "slow" old accounts or commitments which had already been rejected by the Allotment Committee of the U.J.A. at its meeting in October as being no valid basis on which to distribute funds; and (c) approximately \$325,000 inserted for suddenly discovered reserves, which were of the same nature as the preceding "slow" accounts. Thus, as Professor Ginzberg put it, the J.D.C. had approximately \$1,200,000 deadwood. On that basis, therefore, the J.D.C. ends the year with a surplus of about \$500,000.
- 2. Professor Ginzberg was completely unable to understand my "sense of disappointment" on the reading of his section on the N.R.S. I had pointed to his remark that the N.R.S. position was "deteriorating". He said that it was true, but in this sense: The N.R.S. ended the year 1940 with a surplus of about \$370,000, but it had ended the year 1941 with a surplus of only \$214,000.
- 3. He admitted that he had not adequately read or understood the U.P.A. figures, even remarking that he did not have the balance sheet of the Jewish Agency, for example, as of October 1, 1940. It is apparent that the great fault of the U.P.A. has been the excess of material that it has given. In any case, Professor Ginzberg returned to the office with me and was given a copy of the particular balance sheet he wanted and he admitted that he had this previously in his

"We in the United States must help strengthen Palestine"

possession.

In any event, the U.P.A. position is approximately as follows:

(a) the deficit of the Jewish Agency for Palestine of \$600,000, and (b), which is much more important in his opinion, the constant necessity on the part of the Jewish National Fund to borrow. As he sees it, the U.P.A. should say to the Allotment Committee that year after year the J.N.F. is compelled to borrow a million dollars or more. This should be taken into account by the Allotment Committee because both the N.R.S. and the J.D.C. are completely out of their bank indebtedness. The J.N.F., on the other hand, is burdened down by the costs of indebtedness and its inability to take itself out of that indebtedness because of inadequate support.

The above picture, then, is completely different from that which I derived from Professor Ginzberg's report. I cannot reconcile his lengthy and sympathetic statement to me as described above with the contents of his document intended for the Allotment Committee.

The important thing will be to get Mr. Greenman or the Allotment Committee to ask Professor Ginzberg to make the kind of introductory statement which he said to me he was prepared to do if called upon.

Incidentally, Professor Ginzberg remarked that you are very familiar with both the J.D.C. and N.R.S. figures and would certainly not be taken in by the figures submitted by the J.D.C. to present the best case it could under the circumstances.

There are several other points which he made during his discussion with me:

- (a) Mr. Greenman has directed him to ignore the "calendar" statistics of the U.P.A. on the ground that the U.P.A. went before the Allotment Committee at its last session with "fiscal year statistics". That does not happen to be the fact. The U.P.A., as your own records will recall, has taken the position that although the agencies which it finances have a fiscal year ending at approximately October 1st, the U.P.A. itself was presenting data on the calendar basis of January through December. There is no reason why the statistics of the J.D.C., the N.R.S. and the U.P.A. should not be treated on the same basis, particularly since the U.P.A. does have all the material necessary on the basis of the calendar year.
- (b) Professor Ginzberg did admit that the figures of the J.D.C. and the U.P.A. are not comparable, inasmuch as the U.P.A. figures are on a cash basis and the J.D.C. continues to speak of "appropriations".
- (c) There is one point that Professor Ginzberg seems never to have realized until now in regard to the statistics of the four agencies included in the consolidated report of the U.P.A., and that is that each of the agencies is an autonomous, separate organization, with its own income and expenditures. Thus, if the Jewish Agency has a deficit of \$700,000, that deficit cannot be made up by taking over a possible surplus of \$500,000 in the J.N.F. The way in which the U.P.A. picture is presented in the "Supplementary Statistics" sent to you under separate cover in the green covered sheet is the proper presentation of these agencies' income and expenditure. It happens that the Jewish

Agency has a very heavy deficit; the J.N.F. had, at a certain period, some \$600,000 in the bank, but this money was in escrow to be paid out as deeds then under negotiation were completed. This money was actually paid out in January, February and March, as is indicated in the U.P.A. report, so that the J.N.F. ends the year with a deficit of some \$60,000.

I shall cut this note short because I have been sending you so much material that it may lead to confusion.

But I did think it was important to emphasize the conversation with Professor Ginzberg, since if what he said to me will be repeated to the members of the Allotment Committee in the very same way it would seem that the U.P.A. is entitled to all the money available, although this conclusion he did not himself state although emphasizing that the J.D.C. has padded its figures with \$1,200,000 and the N.R.S. has ended the year with a surplus of \$214,000.

It is not my purpose, obviously, to suggest what Rabbi Wise should or should not say with regard to the UJA.
