Lurie Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, Inc. 165 West 46th Street New York, New York Dear Harry: In reading the attractively published March 5th issue of "Notes and News", I was struck by the circuitousness of the language used on Page Seven in reference to the Budget Research Committee. The clause marked (2) reads as follows: "The Budget Research Committee can undertake modifications or expansions of its program that may seem advisable but the Board of Directors of the Council will not initiate recommendations for a full national advisory budgeting service without submitting the question to the General Assembly for approval. The Budget Research Committee will probably adopt the procedure of action by a two-thirds majority in dealing with the specific question of extending service to include advisory budgeting." In reading very carefully the long exchange of correspondence between Mr. Jacob Blaustein and Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, it would seem to me that the action taken between them and by their respective constituents is summarized as follows: Any recommendation for an expansion of the Budget Research Committee's activities must be passed by a twothirds majority and then, after approval by the Board of Directors, submitted to the next General Assembly for its action. The language used on Page Seven of "Notes and News" is not, to my mind, clear. I would be grateful for this additional clarification. 



Dear Dr. Silver:

I am looking forward to your visit to New York next week so that I can have an adequate opportunity of discussing with you quite a number of items that have developed in your absence. In the meantime, I would like to list a few of the things about which you might let me know in writing in advance.

- A) As I wired to you, we are proposing to hold a meeting of the National Council for Palestine in New York on May 3rd. This will be in the form of an afternoon meeting and a dinner meeting in your honor. I do hope that the date will be acceptable. You will recall that prior to your departure for England we had thought that April 26th would be an appropriate date.
- B) The J.D.C. people have been pressing me for a meeting to name the Allotment Committee of the U.J.A. for 1942. Do you want me to arrange a meeting while you are here next week?
- c) A great many communities have been sending invitations to the U.J.A. for you to open their campaigns. I note that you will be in Detroit on April 15th. I told Mr. Rosenblocm that the date of either April 19th or 20th would be agreeable for the Big Gifts meeting in Pittsburgh to be followed by the public opening. Pittsburgh prefers the April 19th date.

Among the major communities which have asked for you, I want to direct special attention to two, i.e., Kansas City and Milwaukee. Both are anxious to get dates as early as possible so that they can begin their plans for Big Gifts meetings.

Mr. Blitz has asked me to convey to you invitations for three functions he regards of utmost importance for the campaign. One is to open the Bronx campaign on April 29th. The other date he would like is May 12th. Mr. David Bernstein, Chairman of the Amusement Division insists that he cannot have a Big Gifts function unless you are the speaker. That affair would be held at luncheon. In the evening the Queens Division will have its opening. Mr.

Blitz tells me that this Big Gifts meeting represents about \$150,000.00.

I do hope that you will be able to let me have dates convenient to your calendar or be able to accept the New York suggestions.

D) I am hoping to be able to meet with you next Tuesday morning to go over with you the agenda for the meeting of the Administrative Committee of the U.P.A. to be held on Tuesday, April 14th, at 4:30 P.M.




With further reference to our telephone conversation of today:

(1) I do hope that it will be possible for a meeting to be held on Tuesday, April 14th, of yourself, Rabbi Jonah Wise and Mr. Rosenwald. There are a number of situations on which the counsel of the Chairmen is most important, and in general I am sure the morale of the campaign will be strengthened by such a meeting.

I hope that instead of 11 A. M., which is bad for the other two, you might possibly arrange to be in New York in time for a 9:30 meeting. It happens that every Tuesday morning the Executive Committee of the New York U.J.A. meets at the Hotel Commodore for breakfast at about 8:30 A. M. That meeting would last until about 9:30 or 9:45 A. M. Perhaps you might even come in time to attend that breakfast and then after its conclusion you, Rabbi Wise, Mr. Rosenwald, Coons and I could get togsther on the spot to go over the agenda.

- (2) The Executive Committee of the U.J.A. was to have held a stated meeting on March 16th, but this had to be cancelled because of your absence in England. It is suggested that a good date for this postponed meeting could be April 28th or 29th, depending on your convenience. I do hope that you can let me know about both these matters by Thursday or Friday of this week so that notices can go out and the necessary arrangements made.
- (3) As I informed you over the phone, Kansas City advised us that its Welfare Fund has definitely decided to enter a War Chest which will take place in October. Normally, Kansas City has a quota of \$225,000. It is adding \$113,000 to make up for the difference in campaign time, so that the Jewish Welfare Fund will be in the campaign for \$337,000. It is probable that the total cuota will be \$3,000,000, since the Community Chest, the JSO and other bodies are also involved.



Upon an arrival here I have sought information on the progress of the United Jewish Appeal campaign in which I am naturally vitally interested. It has, therefore, been a distinct shock to note the contemplated action of the leadership of the Wiani Jowish community. It is tomehow incomed vable to note, after the bravery and the only courage of English Joury that the Jewish leaders of Missi have even entertained seriously the thought of reducing the allotment to the United Jewish Appeal. This is so foreign to the spirit in which the war should be fought that I am asking for your own impression of the possibilities of reconstderation. Surely the men who sake the decisions in the Mlami Jewish community connet stand by while such an injustice is ione to the besic wase in Jewish life. I find that there is contemplated among the Mismi leedership a reduction in the United Jewish Appeal allotment this year to \$40,000. This appears to me inconceivable in the light of the fact that we Jowe have a vital stake in the minning of the wer and must support our people with the maximum of our resources in 1942. The English community which I have just left is resolute in its determination to carry forward the war to final victory. A reduction in the level of giving to the United Jewish Appeal, the basic cause in Jewish life, is wholly out of keeping with that spirit. I am concerned with the fact that Mismi is one of the pivotal campaigns in the nation. Therefore other communities follow its exemple. We are in danger of living hundreds of thousands of dollars in other cities if the influence of the reduction in Mismi is allowed to seep into other campaigns. 

Subject FINANCIAL DATA OF JDC

Since the appearance of my memorandum of December 26th, 1941, the JEC has issued three additional documents on finance:

1) Statement of financial status as of December 31, 1941

2) Program and Budget for the first six months of 1942

3) Summary of cash payments made during the first ten weeks of 1942, i. e. as of March 15, 1942.

With regard to Number 1): It is noteworthy that despite an excess of expenditure over income in 1941 totaling \$143.815, the general fund deficit of January 1, 1941, \$415,088 in amount, emerged as a surplus, as of December 31, 1941, of \$93,332. This transformation was effected chiefly by the depletion of the working fund reserve of \$620,000 which had been "officially established curing years 1934-1938." It will, perhaps, be recalled that ever since 1934 (when I made my first visit to the States), memoranda from me have harped on the tactic of the JDC whereby a cash surplus is rendered a reserve fund for the sole purpose of exhibiting an annual deficit.

Of the total expenditure of \$5,694,100, the sum of \$446,000 (less than 8%) was expended for operating costs, which includes \$110,000 for information and community services. However, an additional sum must be added for administration — which expenses, apparently, are included in the over-all expenditure of \$5,248,100 for the JDC program of activities. According to Professor Ginsberg's Report, Page 23, administration expenses, as of September 30, 1941, amounted to \$509,000. (Incidentally, in the table on Page 23 of the Report, the figure for emigration and relief expenses is incorrectly listed as \$1,209,000 instead of \$1,010,000 — the error undoubtedly being typographical).

The total limbilities as of December 31, 1941 are \$2,799,965; to meet this indebtedness there are resources of \$2,893,298. There seems to be no reason to question the resources; the limbilities, however, appear to be somewhat inflated. For example, an amount of \$250,000 is cited as payable to the Agro-Joint. Even if this is a losn which must be repaid, rather than the unpaid balance of an old commitment, it should properly have been included in the \$968,700 which represent the total commitments deferred to future years. It should be noted that the deferral of these commitments to the future is more or less offset by the exclusion from the item "resources" of assets held in the Joint Reconstruction Fund, the Palestine Economic Corporation and other corporations, since these assets are said to be "ef no present cash value to the J.D.C."

With regard to the bulk of liabilities, consisting of "everseas commitments for relief disbursed through clearance arrangements and for funds borrowed" and of "unpaid balances of commitments", amounting to \$2,245,315 (after the deduction

of \$1,142,519 paid to steamship lines pending overseas accounting): PasTexperience would indicate that a very substantial portion of these liabilities edits on paper only and that the JDC will never be called upon to meet them in full but will undoubtedly cancel in 1942 or in subsequent years all those which have become obsolete.

The main difficulty in analyzing the summary of cash payments made in the first ten weeks of 1942, totaling \$1,599,231, inheres in the fact that these payments are "on account of all programs 1942 and prior years" appropriations; there is nothing to indicate how much of an item belongs in the 1942 budget as distinct from appropriations of previous years. But the JDC is very meticulous in stating in the form of a special note that as of December 1941, an additional sum of \$83,421 had been expended on ascount of the 1942 budget.

Close to two-thirds of the total, i.e., \$1,067,634, was spent for emigration. This represents rather a huge sum when one considers the marked decline in emigration since America's entry into the war. It is somewhat clarified by the explanatory note that more than 96% of this amount represents advances to steamship lines and that the JDC estimates that "40% of such advances are usually charged against the J.D.C. budget and the balance represents relatives! deposits." Accepting this statement at face value and not going into the question of whether the charges against the JDC budget may not in future be considerably less than 40%, it is clear that of the total expenditure of \$1,599,231, at least \$617,196 is an advance which will in due course return to the JDC.

Assuming for the moment that only a minor portion of the expenditure incurred was on account of prior years appropriations and that the bulk of payments made was on account of the 1942 budget, a comparison between the budget for the first six months of 1942 and actual expenditures in the first two and one-half months of 1942 is rather interesting. Following are the figures?

(Note: The figures in the last column exclude the sum of \$617,196 mentioned previously since this represents an advance to be repaid from relatives' deposits. The last column includes, however, the \$83,421 paid in December 1941 on account of the 1942 budget.

Items II I and VI were not included in the budget; some money, however, has been spent for these purposes. \$25,000 of the total mantioned in Item VI represents a contribution to the Co-ordinating Foundation for Refugees.)

An itemized comparison of the six-months budget with actual expenditure in about half that time reveals, in most instances, an impressive discrepancy. Even if some hundreds of thousands of dellars are added to the total of \$1,065,452, which additional sum may have been expended without the knowledge of the JDC for continuation of emergency aid in occupied countries, the comparison still clearly indicates that this budget of \$5,074,410 for a six-months period is inflated and issued for propagands purposes only.

A special feature in the budget is Item K. "Central and South America", involving \$450,750. This sum is larger than the total appropriations for this purpose which were made in 1941 and constitutes about 82% of the total budgetary requirements estimated for refugee assistance in Latin America. It should be understood that in all these countries the JDC acts as an NRS, thereby relieving various Jewish communities of their responsibility to refugees to a large extent. Needless to say, this enhances the reputation of the JDC in these countries. It is questionable, however, as to whether it is actually necessary for American Jewry to grant these subventions to Latin American Jewish communities.

The facts are substantially as I explained them to you. To reiterate I will outline them again. 1. A United War Chest has been set up in Kansas City and the purwose of this organization will be to raise funds through the means of a joint campaign for all local, national and overmeas causes. (Besides the Jewish Velfare Federation, this includes or will include the Community Chest, the U. S. O., the China Relief, Russian Relief, British Relief, and in all probability the Red Cross, as well as all the other organizations seeking to have campaigns that may be approved by the War Chest Committee). 2. Immediately after the War Fund was created, the Jewish Welfare Federation was approached. I premume this was due to the imminence of our drive. 3. There was no question of course, about our joining forces. The only serious problem involved was the matter of our spring compaign. In view of the fact that the War Chest campaign is not to be held until October, would we be justified in conducting our drive now? A number of proposals were made: a. That we conduct our usual campaign and at the end of six months hand over our assets and liabilities to the War Fund. This plan was discarded by the War Fund Committee because of the many complications that would be involved in explaining this method to our subscribers.

Dear Mr. Bretton;

As Co-Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal we have given careful consideration to your letter of April 11th describing the circumstances under which the Jewish Welfare Federation of Greater Kansas City has affiliated itself with the newly organized United War Chest of your community.

It is recognized by the United Jewish Appeal that the Jewish community of Kansas City has the fullest autonomy in reaching decisions on its communal activities based on the experience and judgment of the local leadership in relation to problems with which they have the greatest local intimacy. It is, therefore, beyond the power of the United Jewish Appeal, on whose behalf the Jewish Welfare Federation has served as a trustee, to voice approval or disapproval of the decision reached by your officers.

The United Jewish Appeal is the fund-raising instrument acting for the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service. Its responsibilities have been heightened as a result of the war. The necessity for continuing assistance to the beneficiaries of these agencies has been recognized over a period of years and currently by the Jewish leadership of Kansas City.

The only standpoint from which we can concern ourselves with the form which fund-raising in Kansas City takes is the effect upon the argent necessity to raise maximum sums for the United Jewish Appeal beneficiaries. In that connection, there are certain observations which we should like to call to the attention of the officers of the Jewish Welfare Federation, many if not all of which they have undoubtedly already considered in their discussions with the officers of the United War Chast:

(1) In order to achieve its goal of \$25,000,000, the United Jewish Appeal has suggested to Kansas City a quota of \$135,000 for the year 1942. It is our belief that the needs of the Jews assisted by the United Jewish Appeal—needs which have been multiplied by wartims emergencies—and the size and resources of the Kansas City Jewish community, justify that quota. Since the Kansas City Federation is acting as the trustee for the United Jewish Appeal, it is our assumption that there has been presented to the officers of the United War Chest the full goal of the United Jewish Appeal for 1942, inasmuch as you state that "the integrity of the Jewish Welfare Federation as a budgeting and completely autonomous organization is in no way involved."

Under the terms of the plan which you iescribed in your letter of April 11th, the United Jewish Appeal would be justified in assuming that there has been transmitted to the United War Chest a budget of the Jewish Welfare Federation which would involve the sum of \$202,500 for the United Jewish Appeal. That is based on a budget for an 18-month period, since the campaign which you normally would have held in the Spring has been postposed to the Fall. The assumption that such a quota has been transmitted on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal is strengthened by the knowledge that the appeal and the emphasis of a

United War Chest will be linked to the responsibilities that fall upon Americans in connection with the war. The appeal to Kansas City generosity will be based on the realization that we, as Americans, have a responsibility to ease the plight of the victims of the war and to help meet some of the problems of the Axis victims, among whom the Jews occupy a foremost place.

We are also confident that it has been made clear to the officers of the United War Chest that the United Jevish Appeal is the largest single instrument of the Jews of America to fulfill our obligations to the victims of the war-a war which for the Jews had its beginnings with the accession to power of Hitler in 1933.

We should like to know more concretely the nature of the relationship of the Jewish Welfare Federation to the United War Chest. For example, how would the agencies be affected in the event that through some mischance the total goal of the United War Chest were not achieved? Is it the intention to provide preferences for any of the agencies or are they all to share proportionately in the results?

(2) There are many problems arising out of the affiliation of the Jewish Welfare Federation with the United War Chest. These have certainly had your closest scrutiny. Some of these problems have been discussed at length at various meetings, especially at the General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds in Chicago last Jenuary.

The question of comparable standards of giving; at sandards that now exist among Jews; the ultimate, if not the inhediate possibility of scrutiny of and veto power over budgetar; items of the Jewish Welfare Federation; inclusion of enterprises and activities which, though desirable and essential in a Jewish Welfare Federation, might give rise to discussions in some other medium of fund-raising; the maintenance of interest of leadership and membership in the agencies and beneficiaries of the Jewish Welfare Federation and scores of other issues arise out of the sandion that has been decided upon.

If these questions are raised merely for the sake of directing attention to them, it is not with any desire to infringe upon the responsibility of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Kansas City to make its own determination of the issues involved. But we do feel it sharing responsibility with you for the United Jewish Appeal that indication washed be given of the cautiousness with which these developments are being watched.

May we receive your assurance that the United Jewish Appeal may look forward to inclusion in the United War Chest for a sum commensurate with the appeal which our beneficiary agencies must exert in such a War Chest? May we also express the hope that the decision which you have reached will be vindicated with success.



A situation has arisen in terms of financial relationships affecting the United Jewish Appeal which I believe might most equitably be passed upon by the 1941 Allotment Committee of the United Jewish Appeal.

The facts in brief are as follows: Early in 1941 when independent campaigns had been launched by the three agencies which compose the United Jewish Appeal, the Joint Distribution Committee inaugurated a "Matzoth Fund", through which it received in cash and pledges in excess of \$100,000.

It has been the contention of the United Palestine Appeal that this sum should be turned over to the United Jewish Appeal in the same manner as all other income which came to the three agencies from January, 1941 through December 31, 1941.


The Joint Distribution Committee has disputed that position, and has declined to make that sum available to the common resources of the United Jewish Appeal, even though the New York United Jewish Appeal of 1941 has carried the amount obtained from the Matzoth Fund on its books as part of its proceeds in New York City, although the money itself went to the Joint Distribution Committee and was exclusively used by it.

The Joint Distribution Committee has asserted that the money represented a transmittal item and was not income for the campaign, although a public fund-raising effort for this purpose was conducted in the newspapers, through literature and other media.

Inasmuch as \$100,000 is a substantial item, I believe that the problem of its disposal might well be considered by a body like the 1941 Allotment Committee of the United Jewish Appeal.

You are aware, of course, that Night of Stars is held annually in New York to raise funds for the United Palestine Appeal. This is an

Page 2 April 17, 1942. Mr. Frederick F. Greenman institution which has been carried on for the past eight years for the United Palestine Appeal. Nevertheless during the life of the United Jewish Appeal the United Palestine Appeal has made the proceeds from Night of Stars available to the United Jewish Appeal, even though it was specifically a United Palestine Appeal fund-raising effort. The Income of the 1941 Night of Stars to the United Palestine Appeal might be placed in the same category as the Matzoth Fund of the Joint Distribution Committee. The United Palestine Appeal has never challenged the right of the United Jewish Appeal to the income from Night of Stars, and believes that if it is just that the proceeds of the Night of Stars should be made available to the United Jewish Appeal, the same procedure should apply to the special fund of the Joint Distribution Committee. May I ask that this matter be placed on the agenda of the allotment Committee for its next meeting, which I understand is to be called to consider the distribution of an additional sum of from \$500,000 to \$600,000 of the 1941 United Jewish Appeal. 

Dear Rabbi Silver:

We wish to place before you our request for an allotment to the Council for the year 1942. We appreciate the contributions we have received from your organization in previous years and trust that you will continue to make an allotment to the Council program this year.

The budget of the Council is secured from member agency communities on the basis of a uniform dues schedule. Our schedule is based on finds raised by federations and by other forms of central fund-raising. Earlier the year we addressed an appeal to the New York United Jewish Appeal. We have recently received a reply from Mr. Sylvan Gotshal, Executive Chairman, informing us that though New York City has organized a permanent United Jewish Appeal this year's campaign for the UJA is being conducted on the same basis as in previous years, and that the 1942 New York United Jewish Appeal does not have the suthority to make a direct contribution to any agency other than the three organizations included in the national UJA. For this reason we are again applying directly to the National Refugee Service, the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal.

In accordance with our schedule applicable to member communities we requested \$12,325 from the New York United Jewish Appeal. In 1941 we received from the three agencies of the UJA the amount of \$10,000 as follows: Joint Distribution Committee, \$5,000; United Palestine Appeal, \$2,500; and National Refugee Service, \$2,500. The requested amount of \$12,325 is essential to meet the 1942 budget of the Council which calls for an increased program of services. Included in the 1942 budget are additional research studies of the agencies engaged in overseas and refugee work. We plan this year to cooperate actively with the Inquiry to be established by the Allotment Committee of the 1942 UJA and to cover agencies not included in the UJA but whose work is directly related to the programs of the UJA agencies.

In order to secure the amount requested from the three agencies of the UJA each of the agencies should allot a proportionately larger grant to the Council. To meet the 1942 request on the basis of the 1941 grants will require \$6,162 from the JDC, \$3,081 from the UPA and \$3,081 from the MRS.

The Council is a service agency and its budget is properly an administrative charge on supporting organizations. The Council's functions in terms of organizing local communities to assume responsibility for local, national and overseas needs is recognized by all the important lewish communities throughout the country. One of our most important purposes is to develop effective support of national and overseas programs through organized local bodies. Until the New York UJA is established to assume a financial responsibility for our services contributions from the beneficiary agencies of the

New York UJA are indispensable to the maintenance of our budget.

We would appreciate your presenting this request to the appropriate administrative body of your organization and letting us know as soon as possible of your decision.





In view of the fact that Dr. Weizmann will not travel, as all are agreed he should not, it seemed a fine opportunity to have his voice heard by the entire country, without fatiguing him unduly, if he would accept this invitation to speak on behalf of the whole U.J.A. Since Dr. Weizmann would naturally speak for the UPA and since he is sympathetic with the JDC, he could perform a genuine service.

I have, therefore, taken the liberty, and I trust you will not mind too greatly, to extend an invitation to Dr. Weizmann on your behalf. Dr. Weizmann has accepted the invitation and will speak on the NBC hook-up on Phursday, May 14th, from 6:30 to 6:45 P.M.



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

Dear Dr. Silver:

Would you wish to have a meeting of either the Administrative or Executive Committee called for the time when you will be in New York the week of May 10th? You will be busy, of course, on May 11th, and you have a luncheon and dinner meeting on May 12th. Dear Mr. Bronston:

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal held in New York on April 29th consideration was given to the allotment by the Greater Miami Jewish Federation of \$40,000 to the United Jewish Appeal for 1942. We are, of course, appreciative of the desire of the Jewish community of Miami to share fully in the responsibilities of the agencies comprising the United Jewish Appeal.

However, we were compelled to take note of the fact that of approximately \$121,000 raised, only \$40,000 was allotted to the United Jewish Appeal. The grant represents a decrease of \$8,000 as compared with 1941, although there was no comparable decrease in the total income of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation to warrant a severe reduction of this nature.

Each community must consider for itself the total Jewish responsibilities which it must carry. On the other hand, there rests upon the officers of the United Jewish Appeal trusteeship for the vital activities of the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the Mational Refugee Service. It is our conviction, as indeed it must be yours, that the paramount consideration facing American Jews today in terms of the survival of the Jewish people is to make available the largest possible sums to the work furthered by the United Jewish Appeal.

Under these circumstances, therefore, the action of the Greater Mismi Jewish Federation in allotting so disproportionate an amount to the United Jewish Appeal out of its total resources and sharply reducing the sum made available the previous year is a source of disappointment.

In endeavoring to realize its goal, the United Jewish Appeal must submit to each community a recommendation for its share of the responsibility in the hope that sufficient funds will be raised locally to make possible the achievement of that recommendation. The attainment of the goal is dependent upon many

factors, not the least of which is the fulfillment by each sommunity, to the extent that it finds possible, of its particular share of the whole program. For Miami to fail to meet its responsibility is not only to deprive the United Jewish Appeal of the funds, which its beneficiaries so urgently require, but to reduce the standard for other communities of comparable size.

We are hopeful, therefore that the subject of the allocation to the United Jewish Appeal will be reconsidered.



Professor Eli Ginzberg informed me today that Mr. Frederick Greenman was planning to call a meeting of the Allotment Committee to dispose of the remaining 1941 United Jewish Appeal Funds on Monday, May 25, or a day in that vicinity.

We are preparing data on the present needs of the Palestine funds in order to strengthen the application for a very large part of the remaining funds, which will total from \$500,000 to \$600,000.

I cannot too strongly urge my conviction that at the present time the United Palestine Appeal has a far greater claim to the remaining funds than the Joint Distribution Committee or the National Refugee Service.

You will recall that the Joint Distribution Committee has been allotted \$5,550,000, from the 1941 funds, the United Palestine Appeal \$3,325,000, and the National Refugee Service \$2,725,000. (The latter sum includes \$50,000 additional to which the National Eefugee Service was not entitled, but which was granted it as a means of coming to a quick agreement on the 1942 United Jewish Appeal).

In the latter connection, I am sure you have noticed that no more immigration is permitted into Cuba. Moreover, the regulations for those already in Cuba have been greatly eased to facilitate their stay and work in the country.

For letters such as we propose be sent to Mismi over the signature of our three National Chairmen, Rabbi Jonah B. Wise does not believe in the efficacy of the three-signature arrangement. He does, however, definitely believe that each of our Chairman should write an individual letter.

I sent, as you know, to Rabbi Wise your excellent draft and he wrote to Mr. Bronston over his personal signature and on his personal stationery, the attached. He urges that Dr. Silver and Mr. Rosenwald, respectively, each write also and as promptly as possible.

Bronston, President The Greater Miami Jewish Federation 1002 Congress Building Miani, Florida Dear Mr. Bronston: At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal held in New York on April 29th consideration was given to the allotment by the Greater Miami Jewish Federation of \$40,000 to the United Jewish Appeal for 1942. We are, of course, appreciative of the desire of the Jewish community of Miami to share fully in the responsibilities of the agencies comprising the United Jewish Appeal. However, we were compelled to take note of the fact that of approximately \$121,000 raised only \$40,000 was allotted to the United Jewish Appeal. The grant represents a decrease of \$8,000 as compared with 1941, although therewas no comparative decrease in the total income of the Greater Mlami Jewish Pederation to warrant a severe reduction of this nature. Each community must consider for itself the total Jewish responsibilities which it must carry. On the owner hand, there rests upon the officers of the United Jewish Appeal trusteeship for the vital activities of the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service. It is our conviction, as indeed it must be yours, that the paramount consideration facing American Jevs today in terms of the survival of the Jewish people is to make available the largest possible sums to the work furthered by the United Jewish Appeal. Under these circumstances, therefore, the action of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation, in alloting so disproportionate an amount to the United Jewish Appeal out of its total resources and sharply reducing the sum made available the previous year is a source of disappointment. In endeavoring to realize its national goal, the United Jewish Appeal must submit to each community a recommendation for its share of the responsibility in the hope that sufficient funds will be raised locally to make possible the achievement of that recommendation. The attainment of the goal is dependent upon many factors, not the least of which is the fulfillment by each community to the extent that it finds possible of its particular share of the whole program. For Miami to fail to meet its responsibility is not only to deprive the United Jewish Appeal of the funds, which its beneficiaries so urgently require, but to reduce the standard for other communities of comparable size. We are hopeful, therefore, that the subject of the allocation to the United Jewish Appeal will be reconsidered. Very cordially yours.

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

In accordance with your telegram, I advised Mr. Coons that the meeting to discuss Dr. Weizmann's broadcast could not be attended by Mr. Steinglass or myself, since it had not been convened at the request of all the National Chairmen. I also advised him to inform Mr. Rosenwald and Rabbi Wise of your view in this matter. It seems that on receipt of this note, Mr. Coons called these gentlemen, and the meeting was cancelled.

Last Friday I had spoken to Judge Rothenberg about the situation, and had suggested that he might attend. He came to the UJA office this morning, and since the meeting was cancelled he spoke to Mr. Coons of the situation. He remarked that if there were any protests to be made on Dr. Weizmann's speech on the ground that he had not dealt adequately with other subjects than Pelestine — which he did not think was the case —, then the United Palestine Appeal had overlooked hundreds of opportunities for calling attention to the oversights of the JDC and MRS people in referring — or rather, not referring — to Palestine.

Judge Rothenberg told Coons that if the publicity of the UJA needed discussion, there was no reason why the three National Chairmen could not get together to exchange views. It seems that a memorandum will be drawn up by Mr. Rosenwald detailing his observations, to be circulated between the Chairmen. Judge Rothenberg told Coons that he was nomplussed that any issue could have been raised.

I am informed by the United Jewish Appeal accounting department that with the payment of only \$350,000 more (which should be accomplished within the next ten days or two weeks) the U.J.A. will have paid out in full to its three beneficiary agencies the total sum of \$11,600,000, representing the amounts originally agreed upon and the additional sums voted by the Allotment Committee last October.

We may therefore be faced with the situation that money will be coming to the U.J.A. on account of 1941 and there will be no basis for distribution to the agencies. I therefore hope that it will be possible for you to accelerate an early meeting of the Allotment Committee of the U.J.A. for 1941, since a sum of between \$500,000 and \$600,000 is to be decided upon for distribution from among the 1941 proceeds to come.

For your confidential information I am sending you herewith copies of an exchange of correspondence between Lazure Goodman, Chairman of the 1942 Welfare Fund drive in Indianapolis, and Mr. Coons.

HM: EH Encl. I would like to get your opinion upon what rights the Jewish National Fund has to conduct a Golden Book campaign such as they are now conducting in Ingianapolis, in view of the fact that the Jewish National Fund is a participant in the U.J.A.

Understand, I have no opinion on this matter but I am seeking one because the matter is under discussion here. The campaign is described in the Jewish Post of May 15th which I am enclosing.

As we understand it, the Jewish National Fund is a participant in the United Palestine Appeal, but it still has rights to carry on collections in its traditional manner for such things as the collections from the boxes and also the Golden Book activities.

However, the question that has been raised here is one of degree, and that is whether or not in making a special drive here for 40 Golden Book pages, which means \$4,000, it is exceeding either the spirit or letter of the agreement that the Jewish National Fund has with United Jewish Appeal.

I talked to Merdel Fisher a couple of days ago when he happened to be in town about the matter and he says the Jewish National Fund is well within its rights in seeking this \$4,000 here as he says the Jewish National Fund has a specific right to continue its Golden Book activities. I told him that people here were questioning his interpretation of the agreement which exists and in the interests of protecting the Jewish National Fund itself, I fel; the matter ought to be cleared up.

You see, an unfortunate thing has occurred, in that this Golden Book campaign was started about the same time as the Welfare Fund campaign and when I heard that solicitation was being made, although just quietly and from a few people, I requested that they defer any action until after the Welfare campaign was over with. This they agreed to do, although during the Welfare campaign I personally ran into four important subscribers who gave as the reason why they were not giving more to the Welfare Fund the fact they were going to have to give to the Golden Book campaign so that, in effect, their campaign was going on during our Velfare campaign even though active steps were not being taken by them at the time.

Mendel Fisher said that under no circumstances should they have conflicted with the Welfare Campaign here, that he was agreed on that point, but there is a difference of pinion on the other point of just what are the Jewish Mational Fund's rights under its agreement.

\$1,000 but he said he had to give money to other things and among them he mentioned

his subscription from \$250 to \$300 and just at the time I was to tell him I thought influenced by this key man.

To sum up, what I am after is really what is the spirit and letter of the agreement because I know this matter is going to be discussed at the next Jewish Welfare Board meeting as not only is that point involved, but also the point is involved as to whether or not any beneficiary of the Welfare Fund has a right to have a secondary campaign locally without permission of the Welfare Fund.

For example, last year the Joint Defense Appeal was permitted to have an additional campaign with the express permission of the Welfare Fund, but on strict limitations that it was to call on a certain number of people, which it did. This special campaign that the Jewish National Fund is having is similar in scope except it is conducted without the permission of the local Fund.

Of course, the Jewish National Fund may take the attitude that it is only going to its Zionist members and that any organization has a right to go to its members for anything i: wishes, but when you stop to consider that nearly everybody in Indianapolis is a Zionist member, it sort of reminds you of the story of the fellow who asked his girl whether or not she had been true to him while he was gone and she said - "Well, I have to confess I went out with one other party while you were gone", and when he asked who the other party was, she said - "The Navy".

Dear Mr. Rosenbloom:

My reply to your letter of May 15th must at this point necessarily be personal and not official. Your letter will be read to the next meeting of the Board of Directors of the Jewish Welfare Fund of Chicago if you desire that that be done. Personally, however, I wish to say that I think it would be an altogether improper request for you to make.

We took the trouble of having a special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Jewish Welfare Fund convene to listen to Rabbi Jonah Wise present the reaction of the officials of the United Jewish Appeal, or at least of the National Chairmen of the United Jewish Appeal. Such a meeting was held and Rabbi Wise, ably and fully, presented the situation from the standpoint of the United Jewish Appeal. All the arguments with respect to the possible effects on the contributions of other communities that may grow out of Chicago's action were mentioned by Rabbi Wise. Rabbi Wise, in his presentation, was firm, direct, and yet made the presentation in such fashion that it could be received with good humor.

The last paragraph of your letter seems to indicate that you know something of the facts, namely, that out of \$1,250,000 that could be allotted, the United Jewish Appeal was given \$800,000. Last year, out of \$1,515,000 that could be allotted, the United Jewish Appeal was given \$900,000. The United Jewish Appeal, therefore, this year received a larger proportion of the funds available than it did last year.

In order to make that action possible this year, we have deliberately reduced the amount to local institutions, an amount which helped them in the maintenance of their work and in the amortization of loans made for building purposes -- we made a reduction to such institutions from \$300000 to \$150,000. This considerably upsets the plan which our community had agreed upon for the amortization of such loans for building purposes.

What seems to me, however, to be the fundamental difficulty is the difficulty of understanding what local communities are doing in maising funds through their Welfare Funds. They are definitely not acting as agents for national organizations. We are not the agents of the United Jewish Appeal. We are the agents of our local community. Some of us have endeavored over the last several years to make the community of Chicago, as undoubtedly you have your own community in Pittaburgh, realize that it has certain obligations not to institutions or organizations, but to Jewish needs. The National organizations, whether for fund raising purposes or for the conduct of actual work, are merely agencies through which our local communities act.

It is quite possible that in due course we shall find some of these

agencies ineffective and, in point of fact, useless. There is a growing, and quite rationally a growing question as to the continuing usefulness of the United Jewish Appeal itself and the desirability of spending approximately a half million dollars a year to conduct it when in most of the major communities - accounting for almost 90% of the funds - the United Jewish Appeal is, in the main, only of very modest assistance, and in many cases, accounting for perhaps 70% of the funds where it is of no practical assistance.

I know that the officers of the United Jewish Appeal feel differently about the matter, but I think you should weigh in the scales what the local communities think about the matter too. I know that to a large extent I am carrying coals to New Castle, since your own service in your own local community is so widely known and so deeply appreciated.

It is true that at the meeting with Rabbi Wise, some individual Directors did say that if it were possible to increase the allocation to the United Jewish Appeal, they hoped it would be done. Whether it will be possible or not, I am in no position to say. I myself have grave doubts that it will or can be done. At any rate, there will be no substantial review of the situation until approximately October 1st.

Finally, what was not mentioned either by Rabbi Wise or by your good self, is this simple fact: Chicago undertook its campaign at a time when most communities viewed the possibility of such campaign with great misgivings. In fact, some communities had decided not to have a campaign at all. The example of Chicago in undertaking the campaign and in raising, all things considered, a reasonably large sum for the limited number of institutions included in the campaign, was heartening to these other communities, and really began the national effort. I should think you would want to encourage us and on the whole work with us, and believe that we are trying to do the best that we can, not for the United Jewish Appeal as such, but for those causes and those works that are assisted through the constituent agencies of the United Jewish Appeal.

Dear Mr. Coldanith: On behalf of the National Chairmen of the United Jevish Appeal I acknowledge your letter of May 12th and also that of May 8th. In the former were anclosed two checks, one of \$174,350 and the other of \$75,000, applying to the 1942 allotment to the U.J.A. from the Jewish Welfare Fund of Chicago. Our official receipt is hereto attached. With this remittance the U.S.A. has received a total of \$500,025 as having been received from the Jerich Welfare Fund of Chicago. You and your associates in the devich Welfare Bund must, of course, be some of the deep disappointment in the U.J.A. at the very substantial reduction of the allotment as compared with 1941. As Treasurer of the U.J.A., I connot help remembering that in 1939 the U.J.A. received \$1,400,000 from Chicago, that in 1940 this amount was reduced to \$1,000,000, in 1941 the sus was further gut to \$900,000. When other communities throughout the nation are trying their utmost to maintain, and while others are increasing, their alietments to the U.J.A., it is of course a special source of regret that the elletment should be \$800,000, a decrease of \$100,000 as compared with the previous year. The disappointment of the U.J.A. was of course conveyed to you at the personal meeting which our colleague, Habbi Jonah B. Vise, had with you in Chicago. We are glad to have the further assurance through him that every effort will be made, insofar as the resources of the community will permit, to increase the "tentetive allogation". I have no doubt that you and your colleagues in the Welfare Fund would be deeply gratified if the income to the Fund would permit you to maintain the \$900,000 allocation. I on aware of the difficulties which Chicago encountered this year and appreciate the effort that was made by the Jewish Velfare Fund to maintain, as far as possible, the share of the U.J.A. in the total receipts. Subject: Jewish National Fund Golden Book Campaign

Dear Isidor:

I would like to get your opinion upon what rights the Jewish National Fund has to conduct a Golden Book campaign such as they are now conducting in Indianapolis, in view of the fact that the Jewish National Fund is a participant in the U.J.A.

Understand, I have no opinion on this matter but I am seeking one because the matter is under discussion here. The campaign is described in the Jewish Post of May 15th which I am enclosing.

As we understand it, the Jewish National Fund is a participant in the United Palestine Appeal, but it still has rights to carry on collections in its traditional manner for such things as the collections from the boxes and also the Golden Book activities.

However, the question that has been raised here is one of degree, and that is whether or not in making a special drive here for 40 Golden Book pages, which means \$4,000, it is exceeding either the spirit or letter of the agreement that the Jewish National Fund has with United Jewish Appeal.

I talked to Mendel Fisher a couple of days ago when he happened to be in town about the matter and he says the Jewish National Fund is well within its rights in seeking this \$4,000 here as he says the Jewish National Fund has a specific right to continue its Golden Book activities. I took him that people here were questioning his interpretation of the agreement which exists and in the interests of protecting the Jewish National Fund itself, I felt the matter out to be cleared up.

You see, an unfortunate thing has occurred, in that this Golden Book campaign was started about the same time as the Welfare Fund campaign and when I heard that solicitation was being made, although just quietly and from a few people, I requested that they defer any action until after the Welfare campaign was over with. This they agreed to do, although during the Welfare campaign I personally ran into four important subscribers who gave as the reason why they were not giving more to the Welfare Fund the fact they were going to have to give to the Golden Book campaign so that, in effect, their campaign was going on during our Velfare campaign even though active steps were not being taken by them at the time.

Mendel Fisher said that under no circumstances should they have conflicted with the Welfare Campaign here, that he was agreed on that point, but there is a difference of opinion on the other point of just what are the Jevish National Fund's rights under its agreement.

He brought up the fact that this is the 40th anniversary of the Jewish National Fund and that is why they are going out for these Golden Book pages more actively, and I said I questioned whether or not the fact that it was their 40th anniversary gave them the right to make any more active requests for Golden Book subscriptions than was normal.

I also told him of one case I knew of where a man in the Welfare Fund gave \$500 but I said he should have given \$1,000 and I told the man he should have given \$1,000 but he said he had to give money to other things and among them he mentioned the Jewish National Fund. He did not say he was giving the other \$500 to the Jewish National Fund, and my own opinion is he gave \$200 to it. When I told this to Mendel Fisher, he said - Well, if a fellow is liberally inclined and would want to sign up for two Golden Book pages instead of one, I suppose that is all right."

Again I pointed out the question of degree. I also pointed out to him amother man working in the Campaign who was one of the key givers in the \$250 class that should have given \$500. I did work on the man very hard and he finally increased his subscription from \$250 to \$300 and just at the time I was to tell him I thought he should do better, he said he was also giving \$100 to the Jewish National Fund. I am certain that that \$400 instead of \$300 from this man, if given to the Welfare Fund, would have had an important effect upon a number of other givers who are influenced by this key man.

To sum up, what I am after is really what is the spirit and letter of the agreement because I know this matter is going to be discussed at the next Jewish Welfare Board meeting as not only is that point involved, but also the point is involved as to wighther are next any beneficiary of the Welfare Fund has a right to have a secondary campaign locally without permission of the Welfare Fund.

For example, last year the Joint Defense Appeal was permitted to have an additional campaign with the express permission of the Velfare Fund, but on strict limitations that it was to call on a certain number of people, which it did. This special campaign that the Jewish National Fund is having is similar in scope except it is conducted without the permission of the local Fund.

Of course, the Jewish National Fund may take the attitude that it is only going to its Zionist members and that any organization has a right to go to its members for anything it wishes, but when you step to consider that nearly everybody in Indianapolis is a Zionist member, it sort of reminds you of the stery of the fellow who asked his girl whether or not she had been true to him while he was gone and she said - "Well, I have to confess I went out with one other party while you were gone", and when he asked who the other party was, she said - "The Navy".

Dear Lagure:

Your inquiry as to the right of the Jewish National Fund to secure independent monies through the Golden Book in Indianapolis raises a most and difficult question. Now in our fourth year, we have more than a little difficulty in establishing a precise interpretation with Mendel Fisher as to what the Jewish National Fund should do and that which they should not do in relation to the United Jewish Appeal. Only last week we had a conference with him in this office to urge that the Jewish National Fund cease causing confusion and conflict in some communities where their activities are in direct competition with the United Palestine Appeal interests in the United Jewish Appeal.

The Jewish National Fund, as you may know, receives fifty per cent of the revenue accruing to the United Palestine Appeal through the United Jewish Appeal. This, of course, represents the major contribution of the American Jewish community to the Jewish National Fund at this time.

The national agreement between the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Listribution Committee for 1942 provides:

The traditional collections of the Jevish National Bund are not to be included or to be considered a part of the United Jew sh Appeal. However, a report of its net receipts shall be made available to the Allotment Committee. Any income received by the Jewish National Fund through allotment from Welfare Funds is to be considered income for the United Jewish Appeal."

The Jewish National Fund considers the Golden Book as an activity of its "traditional collections."

Obviously, it is shortsighted for the Jewish National Fund to stimulate independent "traditional collection" activity in advance of, during, or in my opinion, immediately after a Welfare Fund campaign. There is not, however, much that we can do about it from the United Jewish Appeal national headquarters, but it seems to me that a community of the size of Indianapolis can, if it wishes, control the situation quite definitely.

As I said, this is the fourth year of our United Jewish Appeal and the problems resulting in conflict with the Jewish National Fund have not been satisfactorily adjusted. I, personally, doubt whether they will ever be. I wish I could be more helpful.

#### Dear Isidoret

I have your letter of May 20th, regarding the Jewish Rational Fund Golden Book situation, and frankly, the reply is unsatisfactory, in that it leaves the problem up in the air.

It seems to me that a question as simple as I have asked, which is whether or not the activities of the local organization here raising funds for the Jewish National Fund is within the rights of the agreement with the United Jewish Appeal, is deserving of a clear cut answer of "mes" or no.

I know the question involves one of degree, but certainly there is someone, or some committee, that has the authority to pass on this question answered satisfactorily in that manner.

Undoubtedly, there is a committee that gave the Jewish National Fund the authority to continue its traditional fund raising activities, and I think that sommittee should interpret whether or not the type of activities that are being followed out in Indianapolis now are in keeping with either the spirit or letter of the agreement covering traditional fund raising activities.

In other words, what is meant by "traditional fund raising activities" insofar as getting contributions for the Golden Book! Has it been the custom of the Jewish Mational Fund to go out on a campaign such as they have here in Indianapolis to solicit, as they have from perhaps one hundred people, contributions for the Golden Book at \$100.00 a page — (I understand that they have over fifty contributors at \$100.00 each actually accomplished)? If it has not been the mustom for them to do this, then in what respect would this be considered a traditional fund raising activity?

I do not know how much money is raised annually for the Golden Book, although I do understand that the traditional fund raising activities in 1941 for the Jewish National Fund were around \$500,000.00. How much of that \$500,000.00 same from the Golden Book, and how much would be raised nationally for the Golden Book this year if their scale of money raising for that purpose were on the basis of \$5,000.00 from Indianapolis this year, and how would that compare with previous years?

It would seem to me that on this scale of fund raising for the Golden Book, together with the normal other traditional fund raising activities of the Jewish Hational Fund, that far more money would be raised nationally than was contemplated at the time that the Jewish Hational Fund received its authority from the United Jewish Appeal to continue with its traditional fund raising activities. If that is so, it would appear that the Jewish Hational Fund with its Golden Book campaign is violating both the spirit and letter of the agreement with the United Palestine Appeal and the United Jewish Appeal.

There is considerable local dissatisfaction in Indianapolis over this situation, not only from the fact that the activity was undertaken almost coincident with the local Welfare Campaign, but more important, that it is a violation of at least the spirit of the agreement that the Jewish Mational Fund has with the United Palestine Appeal and the United Jewish Appeal. It has caused other organizations in Indianapolis, who have felt that they are not getting enough of the Welfare Campaign, to want to conduct an auxiliary campaign for themselves also, and this only leads in the end to the destruction of the Welfare Fund, which in turn would eventually react to the amount of money that would be given to the United Jewish appeal and the United Palestine Appeal.

I personally am on the spot in this situation on account of having been campaign manager of the Jewish Welfare Fund and also because of my sympathetic interest in the work of the Jewish Mational Fund. If I could get a clear cut ruling on this matter to the effect that the Jewish Mational Fund is not violating either the spirit or letter of their agreement, then I want to contribute a page to the Golden Book myself, and even encourage others to do it if they ask my opinion about it.

On the other hand, if there is doubt cast on this matter through no clear cut interpretation being given by the responsible authorities, who should make a clear cut answer of "yes" or "no" — then should I contribute to the Golden Book under those conditions, I would be severely criticised by a large number of people in Indianapolis, who would feel that I was lending my support to an unauthorized movement.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. Henry Montor at the United Palestine office, 41 M. 42nd Street, in the hope that he will give me a definite answer, or that at least he will refer the question to the committee that can give an authoritative answer on this question.

Certainly some committee ought to give the answer of "yes" or "no" as to whether or not the operation in Indianapolis is in keeping with the national agreement, and I would like to have that answer without any buck-passing.

I await your reply, and will also thank you to get in touch with Mr. Henry Montor. with whom I am not personally acquainted, to urge that he give me a prompt answer as well.

The suggestion of Mr. Goldwasser, the man who frothed at the mouth when he heard that I would be within five miles of him because I happen to be a paid employee, that Mr. Leavitt should now be a member of the Allotment Committee of the U.J.A. on the same basis as Pr. Silver and yourself would, under ordinary circumstances, be assusing except that in this instance it is insulting. Presumably, if you were to object it would show your Zionist discourtesy. The only suggestion that I can offer is this; that if Mr. Leavitt is invited to be present at the meetings, a cimilar invitation should be addressed to myself since Mr. Goldwasser places the invitation to Mr. Leavitt on the ground that "Leavitt be permitted to supply information wherever I find myself at a loss." Obviously I am glad to note that Mr. Goldwasser has let down his caste bars and now recognizes Mr. Leavitt as a human being, which indeed he is. But when the "four freedoms" come to the U.J.A. they should be made available to all agencies of the U.J.A. and not merely to the ruling imperial class. Perhaps my observations seem too facetious but I imagine that the kernel of what I have to say is not concealed. In all earnestness, I think it would be wrong for the U.P.A. or anyone else to take the position that because a person is a "professional" he must be debarred from citizenship or from the fulfillment of communal responsibilities. But since the J.D.C. has now come to recognise the dignity of men even though employed. I believe it should apply in all instances. My dear Mr. Montors I am enclosing herewith the supplementary data which Dr. Ginzburg sent out to the members of the Allotment Committee. It will undoubtedly serve as the basis for the allotment. It is a rather amazing document. The JDC is represented as showing excess liabilities of resources of \$569,142, the NRS is shown to have a deficit of \$159,600 while the UPA shows a deficit of only \$59,275. There is a strange jumbling of figures in all three reports. In the NRS report there is smuggled in a "working reserve" of \$300,000, an item which was never heretofore considered by any Allotment Committee; also \$795,000 of loans are included among the expenditures, and no repayments are included as an offset. Ginzburg makes no mention at all of the huge debt which the Jewish agency is trying to pay off. Every provision is made for the JDC and the NRS to meet their total former commitments, but little for the Jewish Agency. It is of interest to note that no mention is made of the \$50,000 which was given by the Allotment Committee to the NRS, armarked for Cuban immigration, which didn't materialize, and which by the terms of the 1942 agreement with us, the NRS was permitted to keep and to use for whatever purposes it desired. I would suggest that our auditors make a careful and imediate survey of the enclosed date and write out their comments upon it. They should be brief and exact! Rosenbloom and I should have it by Monday, and copies of it should be available for distribution among the Allotment Committee members at the meeting on Tuesday. It is strange to note how Cinzburg, who began as a severe, revolutionary critic of the NRS, has steadily tapered off into an advocate of the NRS to the point of adopting their entire line ... Friedman, at least, was consistent ...

Mr. Montor -2-June 4, 1942 I am also enclosing herewith a letter of Mr. Baerwald. Evidently they do not wish to adopt the proposal which I made for an agreement upon a ratio for the 1942 allocations. They want to go through with enother Allotment Committee. That would be entirely satisfactory. They would like to retain when Mr. Greenman as chairman of the Allotment Committee for 1942 but they would like to substitute for the three other members of the Committee. I am inclined to think that that would be a mistake -to retain one and to dismiss the others. However, we shall discuss that when we meet next Tuesday. 



Dear Dr. Silver:

I had lunch today with Professor Eli Ginzberg, to whom I expressed "shock" at the contents of his summary statement to the Allotment Committee. He said that he did not understand my "shock" in view of the fact that what I read into the statistics was not what he had intended at all.

In brief, this is his view of the situation of the three agencies in the U.J.A., a view which he is prepared to present to the Allotment Committee as an introductory statement if he is called upon:

- 1. The J.D.C. has approximately \$1,200,000 of padding in its requests, consisting of (a) \$620,000 as a working fund reintroduced into its figures after the J.D.C. had itself discarded that item in its own fiscal report for the period ending December 31, 1941; (b) approximately \$325,000 of "slow" old accounts or commitments which had already been rejected by the Allotment Committee of the U.J.A. at its meeting in October as being no valid basis on which to distribute funds; and (c) approximately \$325,000 inserted for suddenly discovered reserves, which were of the same rature as the preceding "slow" accounts. Thus, as Professor Ginzberg put it, the J.D.C. had approximately \$1,200,000 deadwood. On that basis, therefore, the J.D.C. ends the year with a surplus of about \$500,000.
- 2. Professor Ginzberg was completely unable to understand my "sense of disappointment" on the reading of his section on the N.R.S. I had pointed to his remark that the N.R.S. position was "deteriorating". He said that it was true, but in this sense: The N.R.S. ended the year 1940 with a surplus of about \$370,000, but it had ended the year 1941 with a surplus of only \$214,000.
- 3. He admitted that he had not adequately read or understood the J.P.A. figures, even remarking that he did not have the balance sheet of the Jewish Agency, for example, as of October 1, 1940. It is apparent that the great fault of the U.P.A. has been the excess of material that it has given. In any case, Professor Ginzberg returned to the office with me and was given a copy of the particular balance sheet he wanted and he admitted that he had this previously in his

possession.

In any event, the U.P.A. position is approximately as follows:

(a) the deficit of the Jewish Agency for Palestine of \$600,000, and (b), which is much more important in his opinion, the constant necessity on the part of the Jewish National Fund to borrow. As he sees it, the U.P.A. should say to the Allotment Committee that year after year the J.N.F. is compelled to borrow a million dollars or more. This should be taken into account by the Allotment Committee because both the N.R.S. and the J.D.C. are completely out of their bank indebtedness. The J.N.F., on the other hand, is burdened down by the costs of indebtedness and its inability to take itself out of that indebtedness because of inadequate support.

The above picture, then, is completely different from that which I derived from Professor Ginzberg's report. I cannot reconcile his lengthy and sympathetic statement to me as described above with the contents of his document intended for the Allotment Committee.

The important thing will be to get Mr. Greenman or the Allotment Committee to ask Professor Ginzberg to make the kind of introductory statement which he said to me he was prepared to do if called upon.

Incidentally, Professor Ginzberg remarked that you are very familiar with both the J.D.C. and N.R.S. figures and would certainly not be taken in by the figures submitted by the J.D.C. to present the best case it could under the circumstances.

There are several other points which he made during his discussion with me:

- (a) Mr. Greenman has directed him to ignore the "calendar" statistics of the U.P.A. on the ground that the U.P.A. went before the Allotment Committee at its last session with "fiscal year statistics". That loes not happen to be the fact. The U.P.A., as your own records will recall, has taken the position that although the agencies which it finances have a fiscal year ending at approximately October 1st, the U.P.A. itself was presenting data on the calendar basis of January through December. There is no reason why the statistics of the J.D.C., the N.R.S. and the U.P.A. should not be treated on the same basis, particularly since the U.P.A. does have all the material necessary on the basis of the calendar year.
- (b) Professor Finzberg did admit that the figures of the J.D.C. and the U.P.A. are not comparable, inasmuch as the U.P.A. figures are on a cash basis and the J.D.C. continues to speak of "appropriations".
- (c) There is one point that Professor Gintberg seems never to have realized until now in regard to the statistics of the four agencies included in the consolilated report of the U.P.A., and that is that each of the agencies is an autonomous, separate organization, with its wwn income and expenditures. Thus, if the Jawish Agency has a deficit of \$700,000, that deficit cannot be made up by taking over a possible surplus of \$500,000 in the J.M.F. The way in which the U.P.A. picture is presented in the "Supplementary Statistics" sent to you under separate cover in the green covered sheet is the proper presentation of these agencies' income and expenditure. It happens that the Jewish

Agency has a very heavy deficit; the J.N.F. had, at a certain period, some \$600,000 in the bank, but this money was in escrow to be paid out as deeds then under negotiation were completed. This money was actually paid out in January, February and March, as is indicated in the U.P.A. report, so that the J.N.F. ends the year with a deficit of some \$60,000.

I shall cut this note short because I have been sending you so much material that it may lead to confusion.

But I fid think it was important to emphasize the conversation with Professor Ginzberg, since if what he said to me will be repeated to the members of the Allotment Committee in the very same way it would seem that the U.P.A. is entitled to all the money available, although this conclusion he did not himself state although emphasizing that the J.D.C. has padded its figures with \$1,200,000 and the N.R.S. has ended the year with a surplus of \$214,000.

It is not my purpose, obviously. to suggest what Rabbi Wise should or should not say with regard to the UJA. The only reason that I refer to it is that a question was raised with regard to what Dr. Chaim Weismann said about the agencies of the UJA in a recent broadcast. I could not help noting in this letter that the overwhelming preportion of space was given to two of the agencies of the UJA rather than proportionate space to all three. As National Chairman, Rabbi Wise will, I am sure, exercise his full prerogatives in writing such letters as he feels he can sign. But since he is a National Chairman of the UJL, my reference to this might seem more appropriate than references that have been made in connection with the other matter. It happens that of the gentlemen who were addressed Mr. Leonard Frisch, Dr. Moses Barron, Rabbi Albert Gordon and Mr. Harold J. Goldenberg are very devoted Zionists, who would probably have been very much interested in greater information on Palestine as well as on all the other agencies. HM: EH
