My dear Mr. Bernstein:-

For the sake of accuracy in writing your editorial note, I wish to put down in writing what actually transpired in re my article.

Some four months ago the Editor, Mr. M. Hurwitz requested me to write an article in response to the articles of Kallen, Cohen and others which had appeared in The Menorah Journal. I accepted with hesitation. I wrote the article and sent it to Mr. Hurwitz. He wrote that he was glad to get it and that he would publish it. In the February-March issue the article was announced. A little over two months ago I received the galley proofs which I corrected and sent back. A few weeks ago, at a public meeting of the National Convention of the Jewish Social Workers in Cleveland, Mr. Hurwitz made public announcement of the forthcoming publication of this article as an indication of the comprehensive scope of the Journal. This morning on learning that my article did not appear in the July issue, I called

upon Mr. Hurwitz in person. After much hemming and hawing being apparently in great confusion, he told me that the article could not be published. Evidently this courageous magazine which is so brave and beligerant when it comes to attacking people is too thin skinned and cowardly to stand a rebuttal. *have*

I think that more is involved and the mere refusal to publish my article. The Menorah Journal claims to be a public institution and solicits funds from the Jewish Community at large, but in policy it is extremely partisan and inimical to the best interests of American Israel.

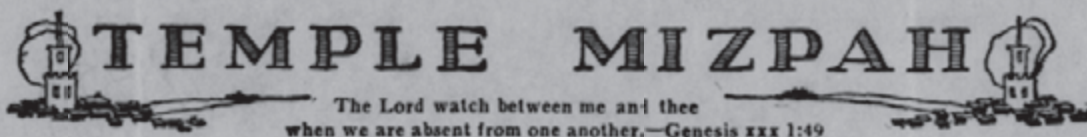

My dear Colleague:

I was especially interested in your communication appearing in the issue of the 15th inst. of the Jewish Bulletin in which you expose the queer antics of the Menorah Journal. When the scurrilous article of Kallen appeared, I wrote Mr. Hurwitz to the effect that the matter had been discussed at the meeting of the Chicago Rabbinical Association and that I had hastily promised to answer that article. The Editor assured me that his own exposition would leave no room for objections even from Rabbis.

When his article appeared, I took the pains to point out to him how he was misled in several of his statements and that Kallen's abuse cannot be justified on the ground of objective criticism. To champion "Jewish Ideals" and at the same time to pervert justice is a curious league with corruption. It is heresy against the spirit to which the Menorah is pledged. Hurwitz answered that the Rabbis will have their spokesman in a forthcoming issue in the person of Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver. I replied that in such a case, my own reply was superfluous. I have ample confidence in Rabbi Silver's ability to present our viewpoint.

Imagine my surprise when I read the excerpt of the Tribune with the note that the Menorah would not publish your ~~latest~~ article? A pity that such small souls are permitted to edit periodicals that are read seriously in academic circles. Isn't it high time for the Rabbinate to assert itself in a ^{publication} ~~periodical~~ worthy of Judaism? I have no Journalistic talent nor ambition. As a servant in the Synagogue I ^{simply} feel that Judaism is not properly represented in the printed word.





Dear Abba:

Just a hurried line to thank you for your kindness in sending me a copy of your pamphlet, "Why do the Heathen Rage?" I can assure you that I have read it with much interest and pleasure. You certainly did a neat job and, reading between the lines, I have the feeling that the reason why the paper was not published in the Menorah Journal is because you stepped on Hurwitz' toes too hard and apparently, Hurwitz has sensitive toes. I believe that, at the time you were invited to write the paper, Hurwitz had not yet emitted "Watchman, What of the Day?" and, in consequence, he never anticipated that you might pay your respects to him also. For this reason probably, he contemplated nothing else than publishing your paper, until suddenly, and to his dismay, he found that he, too, was one of the "raging heathen". This is, of course, only a surmise on my part, but it would not surprise me if it were correct. 
Gentlemen:

Silver in reply to these attacks, which you refused to publish, but which I did read at length last summer in the "Jewish Tribune".

In that periodical, I also read the correspondence between Rabbi Silver and Mr. Hurwitz, editor of the "Menorah Journal", preceding the publication of his article in the "Jewish Tribune". I am in entire sympathy with his views expressed concerning the nature and character of these articles which appeared in your Journal, and I think they would have been more appropriately placed in the columns of some avowedly anti-semitic publication. 
