
Dear Billie:





ALEXANDER LYONS, Pb. D. ISAAC LANDMAN The new Samuel Book, I heard yesterday, is to be published about the 20th of February. Liverights are guarding it very carefully, preceding publication, because they think it will be a sensational knockout. From what I know of it--being information relayed to me by one who has read the whole manuscript, it is a vicious, spleen-spilling performance in which Samuel gets even not only with you, but with Justice Brandeis, Henry Morgenthau, Felix M. Warburg, David A. Brown and some others. Louis Lipsky, Stephen S. Wise, Bernard Richards, and even Meyer Weisgall are pointed to as the real and leading Jews in the American scene.

I understand that the manuscript is being pruned a little. I know one crack at you definitely that has been cut out. You will have to wait, however, until we see each other personally before I tell it to you. I can write you one that he pulled about Justice Brandeis, but which I understand will also be plue-pencilled. He said: What Justice Brandeis needs is a good kick in De Haas. Why does Samuel hate De Haas? I am trying to gather up some of these things against the time when we will have to give the book a swift kick in the columns of The American Hebrew.

I am of the opinion that the book will not sell. What the publishers are counting on is that the rabbis will preach about it. If we could stop that the book would be an immediate flop. But, gal darn it, the rabbis seem to be so hungry for any kind of a topic that will bring in the congregation, that they will create a sale. Subconsciously that condition makes me feel worse than Samuel's writing of the volume and Liveright's publishing it.

Some time ago, it was called to my attention by a very good friend, that Maurice Samuels had written a book which was to be published by Liveright, in which I and a number of others were a subject of attack.

By special manoeuvering, I was able to get hold of a printer's copy which had to be returned within the hour, so that I had but little time to read the entire book, but of course read the article on myself. My friend also called attention to an article which he had written on you. What he says of me is offensive, and the chances are that I will deal with it at the proper time.

What he writes of you is not only offensive, but libelous. All through the hurried reading of this article on you, I was incensed at the manner in which you were being treated, which of course would be the same reaction of every person who knows you. Yet one does not relish the necessity of defense, even by one's friends or onsself.

The Liveright Company have been told that the book is libelous in parts, and that there is a possibility that they will be subjected to suits. My informant tells me that they have determined to publish the book, which they say has the possibilities of becoming a best seller and a big money-maker.

I am writing Liveright today (enclosed is copy of my letter), not so much for the purpose of stopping the publication of the book but to put myself on record. You, of course, will have to use your own judgmen; as to how th proceed in this matter. I understand the book is to be called "Jews on "pproval."

It is unfortunate that some of us have to go through an experience of this kind, and that we have to suffer at the hands of Jews, but I suppose it is part of the compensation for being in the public eye. With kindest perconal regards.

I was amazed when I received the information and I wrote to Samuel. This morning I received word from him in which he says that his analysis of the American Jewish leadership in his forthcoming book is made entirely without personal venom and malice.

This afternoon I received a letter from another one of my friends in New York who saw the printer's copy of the book, in which he writes: "What he writes of you is not only offensive, but libelous. All through the reading of this article on you, I was incensed at the manner in which you were being treated, which of course would be the same reaction of every person who knows you. The Liveright Company has been told that the book is libelous in parts and that there is a possibility that they will be subjected to suits. My dear Landmant-

I was in New York Wednesday and tried to reach you but without success.

I was glad to receive your letter of the 27th. One or two men in the Zionist office told me about samuel's forthcoming volume which he has been planning for some time in order to pay off old scores.

Samuel's friendship for Meyer Weisgal is of course, self-explanatory. When Weisgal was editor of the New Palestine, he paid out to Samuel large sums of money for articles which Samuel contributed. Samuel has also been a regular contributor of the Jewish Standard of Toronto which Weisgal founded and edits.

If you will recall the hearing which took place in 1928 before the Judges Commission which investigated the financial affairs of the Zionist Organization and which recommended that Lipsky should resign, you will understand why Samuel and Lipsky are so close. Lipsky unlawfully advanced money to Samuel out of Zionist funds.

For a full account of that miserable mess you may refer to the newspaper files of that period or may perhaps procure a stenographic copy of the hearing before the Committee of Judges.

The crack about me to which you refer I was told of. It was circulated in Chicago three years

My dear Rabbi Silver:

Although I am on terms of friendship with Maurice Samuel, my relations with him are not such as to give me the right to interfere with his plans. He is a writer ruled by temperament, which is both his virtue and his vice.

I have not read the proofs of his new book, nor have I seen the manuscript. I have been told - not by him - of some of the things he says there. I gather that it is to be a slashing exposure of persons and conditions in American Jewish life. The general thesis is unknown to me.

Denouncing and flaying are the stock and trade of many preachers as well as many writers. (as mitness the performances in new free 3 on friend Styren)

In conversation with friends, I expressed the opinion that these journalistic forays against personalities are not properly to be included in a book purporting to be an objective review of general conditions. Personally, I am not in sympathy with these sensational methods satirical side - cuts and squintings, that result in caricature; but the new generation seems to think such methods are admired by the public, and if you want to write a "best seller", you have to be impudent and unusual.

In Samuel's book, I am told, he writes about Stephen Wise, about Brandeis, about yourself and about reform Rabbis, in general. Some things he tells gently - and others with unusual savageness. As you know, Samuel is an eater of strong meat. I do not think there is anything libelous, nor is there anything pertaining to internal Zionist differences. This book is to reveal Maurice Samuel in the mood of "The first Gentile", reversing the attack and directing it against Jews.

Touth must have its fling. To interfore with it, is to raise the inforence that one is an old fogey. The best thing to do, in his case, is to let him have his say and then let the critics, in turn, flay him. Any attempt to curb his freedom would be a mistake. I have indirectly tried to create an impression upon Samuel of the bad reception that will be given to a book, which at this time, attempts to reveal inner differences or to undermine public confidence in leading Jewish personalities. But, as you have been informed, the book is already impress.

I am to have an opportunity to speak to Samuel within the next few days. I do not think that my talk with him will influence him in any way.

On Sunday I read the Samuel book, and he has deleted your name in one or two spots, but has made that part of the article read as though it applied to the rabbinate in general.

As I see the book, the whole thing has been written with the idea of attracting a great deal of fire from the groups and the individuals attacked. The main attacks are on the rabbinate, Reform Jewry, the Anglo-Jewish press, and a number of individuals, including Marshall, Brandeis, Morgenthau, Warburg, yourself, and myself.

He takes it for granted that the rabbinate will reply, and that you ir particular will give him a good trimming; that the Anglo-Jewish press will slap at him, and that some of the individuals, especially yours truly, will go after him. This, of course, would make the book a good seller.

I have come to the conclusion that the very best way to treat this thing is by a conspiracy of silence, and if he wants advertising, he should be compelled to pay for it. I have not answered your communication of the 17th, for I was waiting to see just what would develop. Evidently, there is to be a general campaign of publicity. Most of the New York papers have carried reviews of Samuel's book. The New York American, under Charles Hanson Towne, carries about a half-column of the most flattering nature; the Herald Tribune in its Sunday edition carries almost a two-column article by Johan J. Smertenko in which he spills himself in praise of Samuel and this book in particular.

We already have one article in the Jewish Exponent captioned, "Maurice Samuel Vents His Spleen", which is an attack on the book. This is an article almost a column in length, and I have on my desk this morning the Free Synagogue Weekly Bulletin, announcing that John Waterman Wise, Editor of Opinion, will speak on "Jews on Approval -- Maurice Samuel Disapproves". This is to take place on Sunday, March 6th. We will have a stenographer there to get a complete report of his address.

I take it for granted that Liveright, the publisher, and Samuel, the author, are moving heaven and earth to get as much favorable publicity as is possible. I further take it for granted that rabbis, and the other English and Anglo-Jewish press will preach and carry articles either favoring or against the book.

I have just had a talk with Mr. Rittenberg and Isaac Landman in connection with your suggestion that you have written an article that he will"treasure until the day of his death." I am of the opinion that if you have already read the book, and your article covers the book as a whole, that now is the time for us to give it full play in our publication.

I am wondering how much information you have with reference to the amounts of money paid him by the Zionist Organization curing the years in which he was traveling up and down the land and writing for New Palestine. If all that I hear is true, not only was he paid princely sums for his lectures and writings, but his traveling expenses would indicate that he was traveling like a prince.



A JEW ON APPRCVAL

A Review of Maurice Samuel's Latest Book

As I closed Maurice Samuel's new book, "Jews On Approval," I asked myself the question: Why did he do it? Even granting him sincerity of purpose, what good could he hope to accomplish by it?

It is perfectly true that his literary scalpel directs attention to many glaring abuses in American Jewish life. But the very Reform Rabbinate which he so intemperately excoriates has been saying the same things with equal force and with less personal villification for years. Certainly the dismal failures of rabbinical leadership, the repulsive smugness and self-sufficiency of wealthy lay leadership are not characteristic of Jews alone. They run straight across the American scene. Which, of course, does not condone them.

I could not but think of that other Jew, Ben Hecht, who titled his book "A Jew In Love," and thus inferentially held his people to public scorn. Samuel's title and treatment label him as a. "professional" Jew who, behind the front of his protestations of Jewish loyalty, has his oyes on royalties. Indeed he discloses this himself on page 521 One could accept his challenge to Jews to heed the spirit and injunctions of Jewish tradition if he himself were more observant of the admonition "Do not make the Torah a spade with which to dig." And one wonders even if there be any real Torah, any real knowledge or love of the Jewish tradition in him when one memembers the saying of Rabbi Elazar ben Azaryah, "Where there is no Torah there are no mainers, and without manners there is no Torah."

The personal abuse of certain abbis and laymen, the spleen and wenom which characterize Mr. Samuel's volume would be an interesting subject for the psychoanalyst. In his Semitic woodpile I look for some hidden Fmiasha. He rises to a shrill feminine petslance in "Jews On Approval" as he did in his "I The Jew." His words have here of that emotional circumcision to which all good writing should submit itself. One wonders if the author has not suffered intelectual castration.

"Jews On Approval" will not ald to the author's reputation for scholarship or sincerity, originality or humanity. The question raised by the volume, at least to this reviewer, is not whether Jews are on approval, but whether a certain Jew-Mr. Samuel himseif-is not on approval!

I take it for granted that you have read the review of this book in Opinion, which probably appeared in the issue of February 29th. James Waterman Wise, by the way, preached as I told you on this book, and I am enclosing copy of the stenographic notes of this part of his sermon.

I am still giving some thought as to how I will handle this situation. While you in spots have ridiculed him, yet on the whole you have handed him many serious body blows. If I deal with it at all, it will be altogether through ridicule. You might be interested in knowing that I have discussed this book with Arthur Hays Sulzberger of the Times. Up to the present, the Times has not reviewed the book, and I am of the opinion that if they do, it will not be at all complimentary. Should I decide to handle this situation, I will send you an advance copy of my article.

With reference to the reprints, we are ready to do one of two things: first, to send you sufficient reprints to cover your entire congregation, or, if you will let us have the names of the members of your congregation and their addresses, we will mail them from here each a marked copy of this issue of our rublication, and will return the membership list to you without further use.

Just let me know which of the two will be more satisfactory to you, and we will comply with your request in the matter. The chances are that Samuel, through some of his stool-pigeons, will want to answer this article. It will be O.K. with me, and you can rest assured that you will get all the space you want.

Address by JAMES WATERHAN WISE, at the Free Synagogue, March 6, 1982

"JEWS ON APPROVAL" by Maurice Samuel

I consider JEMS ON APPROVAL to be the most significant book on the Jewish question in America that has yet appeared. It is the most serious study, the most careful analysis, and offers the clearest program that American Jewry can follow. It is an analysis of American Jewish life which for fearless, critical, unafraid program of Jewish life which for fearless, critical, by direct and clear statement -- is instructive and creative.

I think that not a little of the **singt** significance of JENE ON APPROVAL comes from the fact that it is written by a man whose approach to Jewish life is conditioned and directed by three qualities --- knowledge of that of which he speaks, the ability to think concerning the subject, and finally <u>love</u> for the Jewish scene, and Jewish life, and for the people with show he is associated.

We have many Jews who write on Jewish themes. Nost of them write in the fields of pure scholarship. Host of them speak from the sanctum of the philompher and from the study of the scholar. We have other men who think on Jewish problems, but have not the background or knowledge, nor the leadership. There are those who speak freely on Jewish hews, and who know something, but think that they know more.

Samuel has all of the three necessary muniities -- he knows, thinks, loves. I say this, and I speak of the significance of JEME ON APPROVAL despite what I consider to be the wulgar publicity which has attended its publication. I believe that a great wrong has been done to bhe book by the attempt to make it appear like a Winchellization of American life. Maurice Samuel, it is true, has indulged in personal criticisms, in individual strictures, which I think have neither added to the book's value nor increased its importance.

It is necessary to point out that these are not of the essence of the book, nor are those attacking passages which will delight the scandal-mongers is the Jewish world. They are there for their own sake. Haurice Samuel has chosen to hold up certain figures and to pour out upon them the very full vials of his contempt in order drive home his point. He has used, for the most part, figures when he has named to illustrate points which he makes. He has utilized them in order to clarify situations.

...

I disagree personally with a great number of the maintainer critical judgments on simulational violations which he makes. Some of them I deeply regret. There is, for example, in the pages of JERS CN APPROVAL an estimate of Justice Brandeis, woefully inadequate, wholly unappreciative of certain considerations of spiritual leadenship, certain facts, certain records concerning what Brandeis has brought into Jewish life by the very magic and the mystery -almost the sublimity 99 of his personality. There are strictures made against Er. David 4. Brown which I, for example, might consider rank flattery concerning his. There are other things with which I do not agree. I object to the fact that I, myself, have not

even been mentioned in the book. Although, reading what has happened to the Jewish figures who were mentioned, I sometimes, as I think of it, feel that perhaps I was more fortunate than neglected. These are details, and trifles, and asides in a serieus, earnest attempt to pierce behind the seesing, to the reality, to the essence of the problem.

I feel that it would be an unfortunate loss, I feel that Anglo-Jewish life would be poorer, if this book of Maurice Samuel's were to be dealt with merely as a collection of unpleasant epigrams. Much of the reaction which there will be found against the book will be either an unconscious or a conscious gesture of defense and selfdefense on the part of those whom Maurice Samuel rightly indicts wen who have largely betrayed and falsified and lowered the standards of Jewish life.

.....

This book must be regarded as what it is - namely, an earnest, incisive analysis of our Jewish problems. I have said that the book is in danger of being regarded as a personal distribe. It is in danger of something else, and something even more important and more serious - namely, the criticism that whether \neq right or wrong, whether true or false, Haurice Samuel had no right to publish such a book. This book shows Judaism in a bad light, it holds Jews up to ridicule. These strictures take honored names and honored institutions and ruthlessly expose what is bad in them. I do not refer here to any outer censorship. No one has said this book cannot be sold. No

question, not of outer but of inner censorship which is here the question. "Granted it is true," I have heard and read in a number of periodicals and a number of sources of Jewish information, "granted it is true, he has no right to say it publicly. He has no right to wash the dirty linen of the Jews in public."

This book of Manrice Samuel's raises the question as to freedom, not of speech, but of thought. Has any man the right to speak critically, in unafraid and untrasmelled style, concerning the faults and the errors of his people, when that people is — as is the Jewish people — forever before public consideration, always, so to speak, in the public eye? Is it not the part of a self-imposed duty to remain silent, or at least so to hide and so to camouflage one's criticizes that there will be no impression on the outsider?

This issue is raised by JENE ON APPROVAL. It must be raised, and will continue to be raised, though unfortunately it is not raised often enough, until we Jews determine, once and for all, whether or not the world is to consider us as some sort of a race of goldfishes in an aquarium, to be viewed and studied. We are to live our own lives, without reference to, unafraid of, and determined by, the fear of what will be said do us, but rather in relation to what may be said by us concerning ourselves.

A people which dare not face its own faults, an individual who will not and max cannot look upon his own shortcomings, is intellectually and maximiz spiritually dead. Nothing could be more morbid. Nothing could be more psychomethic - I should say, psychomethetic -- as the state of mind of one who has permitted what the world has done to him to main his

whole sense of values, so that he will hear nothing but adulation, and whoever dares to speak to him in fashion unafraid and with voice outspoken, is looked upon as traitor to his people and to their cause. This is spiritual death. Jews, who are accused — and rightly so — of sensitivity, when it is urged that there is to wight to write this book, and that there is no excuse to publish it, then sensitivity is not only a hyper-sensitivity, but hyper-mentionement there sensitivity has degenerated into a lack of true sensitiveness. Then it is impossible to listen to truths regarding oneself, then hypersensitivity has degenerated into an attitude of self-contempt.

The answer to whether or not it should have been written, is not only "Permit such criticisms, such analyzes as is here contained, but from those who are capable of it, we <u>domand</u> it as the first sign of respect; we insist upon it in order that we may know what those who think, think concerning us." Jewish life still has enough strength and dignity to be able to bear the truth.

If I were to sum up the essence of the protest which Samuel makes against the condition of Jewish life in America today, I should say that it is a protest against those qualities which show in the course of the last century has changed Jewish life from one of the most vital, most highly developed, most definitely and clearly wrought intellectual and spiritual and social entities into a colorless, wapid, meaningless imitation of the social and cultural world around it. Jess, who were once differentiated by something within, who is for centuries were considered different

from the rest of the world, by wirtue of the fact that their lives and minds were unique and different, this people of all people is today just as set apart, just as marked off from the rest of the world as it ever was. Jews must accept the fact of their Jewishness, whether they like it of not. There is no corresponding inner value in Jewish life. In other words, we Jews are today different, but we have lost distinction. We have become an a mane without a thing. The mane of the Jew remains, but the life of the Jew has perished.

Samuel takes this thesis - the thesis that Jewish life has become poorer and sheaper because of the absence of maximizer inner contents. He touches, for example, upon the institution of charity, upon the converted values of Jewish life Sanuel takes, for example, Jewish leadership, and finds that the leadership of Jewish life in America, both within and without the ministry, may be very well intentioned. He insults them by using the phrase that they are "well-meaning." They have a general love of our people and its problems, and they are attempting to approach whatever questions arise, but he points out that there is nothing in them that can connect our problems with the problems of the history of our people. They care about the Jews, but they will not take the trouble to know about the Jews. He advises them to take teachers into their honce, to lear, to study, to know, rather than to see how they can imitate leadership of other groups in American life. They cannot solve the problem by being successful in their pargicular field, and then devoting one or two hours daily, or weekly, to the problems of their people. He counsels that they make it a part of the burden of their lives to study and learn. And what he my says of the leadership of Jewish life is at least

as true of the masses.

....

....

I wish I had time to read to you this morning what Samuel says about the rabbinate — how the function of the rabbi has been vulgarized and cheapened until today he is supposed to be everyting from a social secretary to a radio announcer. He is supposed to follow every latest crase in all the various departments of insanity in which America/ indulges. He must participate in every activity which takes him away furnishes from the business of his calling. I believe that Naurice Samuel, who will be accused of overstatement in his strictures on some of the rabbis and on the rabbinate, as a whole may be defended by saying that he has understated this problem.

I know that this book will be attacked by those who will say that he does not understand the problems; he has not faced the practical difficulties of the situation.

Sanuel has rendered a great service. It will be understood that it is not a wild gesture of rage on his part, but the man has seen something evil and he has spoken out egainst it with prophetic passion which might bring to it such men of intellectual integrity as that which Sanuel displays.

I cannot this morning deal, as I would like to deal, with the other side of the picture. I cannot today cite for you at least the basis, d the elements within the creative program which Haurice Samuel lays down in this book. It is not a book primarily of criticism, or even of analysis; it attempts to erect the structure of Jewish life which will have beauty and dignity and strength. He says that there must be no muffled Judaism in the United States.

....

Sanuel adds another thought - no cheap, or easy Judaism. No Judaism which will be merely a repetition of the words, "How proud I am to be a Jew", but Jewish life which will have content.

Dear Abba:

Well, I got a great kick out of your article in the last issue of The American Hebrew. Harry Glucksman met me on Saturday and told me that the whole town is talking about it. Harry also said that one thing will stick to our friend Samuel, and that is the title of our first editorial--"The Reptilian Hiss."

Our Encyclopedia Conference here is meeting almost daily, pushing hard with the letter "A". I wish you would take up my letter of March 7th and proceed with a little action.

Last summer when you were in New Hampshire, we sent you the article ANTI-MESSIAH. You wisely returned it because you did not have access to your own library. I am sending you this article again for your scrutiny.

My dear Dr. Silver:

You have by now received a letter from Mrs. Leeds, writing to you in behalf of the programme committee of the Friends General Conference. Mrs. Leeds has appealed to me to add to her word by my own humble request, bespeaking your acceptance. I am enclosing her letter, which will convey to you the strong and sincere desire to have you.

I am not foolish encugh to believe that my word will add to your own decision one wit. Novertheless, as each year goes by, we find the relationship in Philadelphia with the Friends more perfect and close, and if there is any religious body for which I have a sincere admiration, it is these Quakers, who are thoroughly consistent, and exemplary people. We work together beautifully, and I am more gratified in saying that the Good Will expression is even more on their part than it is on ours. The date alone perplexes me, as it happens to be in mid summer, and I, naturally, do new know your plans. But, if you will not mind the chutspa of my writing, I am going to be bold enough to ask you to consider it seriously, and, if at all possible, to accept. It is a large Conference, and composed of very fine people, far above the orbinary of church gatherings, I assure you. This, too, is presumption, because I know that you understand what they mean.

You will no doubt pardon me, writing to you along these lines, but, after I tell you that I have read Maurice Samuel's book, you will forgive all inflections which appear to be presumptuous. Apparently, Mrs. Leeds has not read this book, or you would not be selected. Dr. Fineshriber and I were talking it over the other day, and he said it is purely a pathological case of a man whose eruption broke out in print, rather than in boils. I happen to have read, last night, your article in the American Hebrew, answering this book. After I tell you I am sorry you stopped at all to notice it, I want hastily to add that your reply was very much like a sickle, that cut down everything in your path, and showed the bare field to be nothing but a marky swamp, such as you pointed out. It was a convincing and strong reply. IS IT CONSISTENT?

OME one asks us whether those who are > non-Zionists in Pittsburgh should, in order to be consistent (?) refuse to honor visiting Zionist dignitaries, who may have achieved great distinction in many phases of Jewish life. It may be interesting to our correspondent to know that we put exactly that question to none other than Dr. Weizmann. He answered that one who did not approve of Zionism was assuming a proper attitude in not desiring to serve, even on a reception committee, to a lew who came obviously on a Zionist mission. However, we, though not professing Zionism, have never felt that we compromised our conscience by taking advantage of an opportunity of meeting and eating with outstanding figures in Jewry who paid us visits in the interest of the Zionist cause. It is quite true that Pittsburgh is one of the very few Jewish communities where Reform Jews remain almost completely aloof from Zionist gatherings, formal or informal, and from Zionist leaders, local, national or international. In other words, there see ns to prevail in such centers as New York, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Cleveland, Boston, Detroit and many others, a much more sympathetic attitude on the part of the so-called "Temple" Jews toward Palestine restcration than in Pittsburgh. Here, about the only phase of Palestinian enterprise that meets with some support from non-Zionists is the Hadassah movement. This is obviously such a humanitarian work that even the hardest boiled antis' subordinate their prejudices or their convictions in the interest of health-welfare for the Jews and Arabs of Palestine.

It is quite natural that the pew should take its cue from the malpit. Of course, this is not always the case, but in the main one finds that the pulpit does most of the THINKING for the pew. We find in some cities that the rabbis of Reform congregations are sympathetic to the Zionist cause. and as a result a great many members of their congregations, while perhaps not Zionists in the full meaning of the term, show a willingness to cooperate in some phases of Palestinian work. We have believed that there were some points of contact between Zionist and non-Zionist and that the latter could view quite sympathetically the effort to make Palestine hab-table for those Jews who desired to live there. It seems to us there can be no valid objection to any Jews cooperating to the extent of trying to make Palestine a decent and a sale place for his brethren to live in. Perhaps some of us are too stiff-necked in our relations with our Zionist brethren.

HYMAN ROGAL

Who is Hyman Rogal) The man who has so completely consecrated himself to the task of trying to help the "Y" balance its budget through an intensive campaign of "reclaiming" memberships, that he won the unstinted praise and esteem of his fellows. And how do they want to honor him? By giving him a dinner? Presenting him with a medal) Handing him an engrossed resolution? No, none of these empty gestures, but by GET-TING ENOUGH OF THE FORMER MEMBERS TO REINSTATE THEIR MEMBERSHIPS in the "Y" to enable that organization to function without financial headaches. In other words, the slogan seems to be "Do it for Hyman Rogall"

RABBI SILVER REPLIES

E are in receipt of a marked copy of the "American Hebrew and Jewish Tribune" of New York, referring to a reply by Rabbi Abba Silver of Cleveland to an attack made upon him by Maurice Samuel in his book, "Jews on Approval." We are sorry that Dr. Silver dignified Samuel's statements by answering them. Rabbi Abba H. Silver is too well known to world Jewry. and he enjoys a reputation that no amount of mud slinging, even from such a distinguished source as Maurice Samuel, can have the slightest possible effect. Dr. Silver is a scholar of the first order, and a pulpiteer second to none in the whole world of Jewry. It is really an insult to the intelligence of any thinking Jew for us to elaborate upon the splendid qualities of Dr. Silver. We know from experience how difficult it is to remain silent under a public attack, yet we have found it to be an advantage to pursue that course. For example, it serves no good purpose and merely advertises Samuel's book when Dr. Silver makes a statement such as this:

"Mr. Samuel does not like my oratory. He does not like my scholarship. He does not like my book. He does not like my Zionism. He does not even like my salary. Had he expressed an additional dislike for my pompadour and my reck-ties the catalogue would have been complete. n fact from reading this book I received a distinc: impression that Mr. Samuel does not like me

The sad tale must now be told, gentle reader. When Mr. Samuel was an employee of the Zionist Organization of America. drawing a salary of \$7,500 a year (plus railroad and traveling expenses, plus extra compensation for every article contributed to 'The New Palestine'], for making speeches and otherwise sacrificing h.mself for the cause, I suggested that his salary should be reduced, inasmuch as the Organization was operating at a tremendous deficit. This Mr. Samuel has never forgiven me. It has been 'burning him up.' For some years now he has been going the rounds of towns and kibbitzamies like a poor mongrel sniffing for scraps of scandal, malicious wisecracks and derisive words, waiting for a day of reckoning. His baffled wrath has now found vent in a pasquinade, written with the ceft skill of a longshoreman and with the breeding of a-Samuel.

"Any man who, like myself, has been in active public life for more than a decade a.sd a half will accumulate enough enemies to last h.m a life-time. I have my share of them. But Mr. Samuel has been among my most persistent and virulent enemies, goaded on by a hate—ind a jealousy—quite pathological. Whenever I have a contreversy with a man in public life, M. Samuel promptly injects himself into the scene, an uninvited combatant. Wherever there is a sircle where his particular brand of anti-Silverians would be wrlcome, he is on hand with his little bucket"

Now we have no quarrel with Dr. Silver with writing the foregoing, except that we think it was quite unnecessary. But we regret tha: in his desire to hit Samuel as hard as he could he brought Dr. Wise's name in in this tashion:

"One cannot really quarrel with Mr. Samuel's tastes in oratory. 'Chacan a son gout.' He does not like my style of speaking? Niche! He thinks that I am the nearest rival to Dr. Stephen Wise, 'who at his best, leaves Sil-er,-nowhere,' Well, that should be very comforting to Dr. Wise and should make Mr. Samuel's job as contributing editor to the magazine edited by Dr. Wise's sor more secure and more remunerative. But for the sake of 'histor ical accuracy --- as my sld, beloved professor, Dr. Gotthard Deutsch, used to say-and for the enlightenment of generations yet unborn, I must record the sad fact that I have never studied elocution. I regret that I didn't. Perhaps it is not too late. Perhaps Mr. Samuel would undertake to teach me . . . " We are not so much interested in what Mr. Samuel has to say about Dr. Silver's oratory, but we do know that Dr. Stephen Wise believes that as an orator Dr. Silver sas no peer, and he has so expressed himself to us That's why we felt a bit uncomfortable when we read that "dig" about the magazine edited by Dr. Wise's son. All this sort of thing makes a holiday for the "kibitzer," who delights to see ill-feeling expressed in print. In the meantime, Dr. Silver need not corcern himself about such criticism as Samuel's. He can easily afford to brush it aside.

"Why doesn't Mr. Samuel like me» That is an interesting question. There are other subbis in the country whose oratory is quite as bad as mine, whose scholarship is quite as 'thin,' whose books are quite as 'unintelligible' (though not quite as extensively read), whose salaries are quite as large and whose prosperity is quite as 'thicr.' Why did Mr. Samuel single me out for this Tastar 'mi sheberach' of his?

More Than A Humanist -- A Pioneer

MOULDERING black eyes lit up by a mystic flame; jet-colored hair falling on his shoulders in broad curls; delicately chiseled features as if cut out of ine old ivory; a majestic bearing accompanied by calm, aristocratic gestures; a deep basso voice that vibrates softly in echo to a ceaseless spiritual activity-there you have the Reuben Brainin of forty years ago as he emerged from the Russian ghetto and startied the Jewish world by breaking with the old traditions in writing Hebrew literature in the modern European manner. Up to that time Hebrew literature was written, to be sure, but it was not intended to say anything. Brainin as one of the leaders of a new school blew the breath of life into it. For the first time the Jews of Eastern Europe were hearing metaphysical problems discussed in Hebrew. Brainin launched into dissertations on the judicial and social questions of the day in a language that was considered here too sacred as a vehicle for profane matters, there philologically unsuitable for adaptation to modern life. Hebrew was, as Renan had said, never to be a language for every-day use, but the sole instrument of expression for the fantastic visions of the ancient Prophets. Up to the time of Brainin's advent, the Hebrew language as well as spiritual life in the Jewish world moved wholly in the ether. It is his achievement and the achievement of the men of the new school of Hebrew literature, of which Nahum Sokolow is the only other survivor to-day, that he brought Hebrew out of the ether back down to earth.

The revival of the Hebrew language was an act of revolutionary import. When Reuben Brainin and a handfal of friends boldly swung the still feeble bark of the sacred tongue upon the stream of modern life, the Jews were at first bewildered by the spectacle. They blinked at the amazing innovation. Fierce opposition leveloped. The religionists screamed sacrilege in hysterical alarm. The assimilationists sneered in cynical alocfness, dubbing Reuben Brainin Seen Through Gentile Eyes

REUBEN BRAININ'S SEVENTIETH ANNIVERSARY will be celebrated in April second at a public testimonial reception in New York. The writer of this tribute is the noted foreign correspondent who just concluded a five weeks' visit to this country. Van Paassen's views and analyses are interesting. They express the opiniom of an unprejudiced and objective observer of contemporary Jewish life. —THE ELITOR.

Brainin's venture the brainstorm of a fool. Yet he has lived to see the day when modern Hebrew became the official language of Palestine. He has lived to see Nietzsche and Goethe, Einstein and Freud, Barbusse and Trotsky, Unamuno and Brandes translated into Hebrew and scores of periodicals and publications, some of them of the most intricate technical nature, appear in the Hebrew language. He could say in truth that when he was young the Hebrew language appeared like an old man whose days were spent, who was resting by the wayside, and now that he himself has come to the eventide of life, the Hebrew language has renewed its youth like an eagle which is testing the strength of its wings on a sundrenched morning in May and filling its lungs with the pure air of a new life.

Some may think that Reuben Brainin is to-day a lonely figure. For the last couple of years he has remained almost silent. Yet his silence has spoken loudly and clearly to thousands, nay, hundreds of thousands of young Jews who are groping towards a solution of the Jewish problem. These followers of Brainin are quietly mobilizing, struggling to free themselves of the narrow concepts of a petty nationalism-or, rather, chauvinism-into which some leaders, young and old, are trying to force them. Just as Romain Rolland, the great solitary conscience of Europe, is to the ethical intellectual the light-house whose mere


existence now shows the path, so Reuben Brainin has emerged stronger and a sublime personality from the intolerant barking under which small politicians have tried to bury him. To me, contemplating the Jewish scene from a distance, Reuben Brainin is a lonely figure. Mountain peaks are solitary landmarks in any landscapes. Few people can stand the pure, rarified air on s high altitude.

In the eventide of life Reuben Brainin remembers the struggles he has witnessed. He has seen ideas succeed ideas most directly opposed to them-reaction follow action: democracy autocracy: socialism individualism. To Reuben Brainin belongs the honer of having understood each generation and of having retained a bitter admiration for the undying faith of humanity even when each generation consumed in its own heat, believing it alone had reached the zenith, huricd its predecessors down, took unto itself all the glory, only to be smitten again by those who came pressing on behind.

It is an outrageous calumny to say of Renben Brainin that he has deserted the cause of the Jewish people as expressed in Zionism by recognizing



the value of the Russian experiment. He remains a nationalist Jew. But to him nationalism means: first the people, and then the land, and not reversely. This view permits, at least, of tranquil discussion, and only those who are blinded by Europe's hereditary malady of chauvinism, men who do not respond to the ideals of to-morrow but whose entire orientation is directed toward the past, will persist in condemning Reuben Brainin's stand. At a moment in He when most men petrify and become dead-set in their notions, Brainin retained that

Hitlerism Stalks Germany

The Nazi Menace, With Its Anti-Jewish Propaganda, Jeopardizes Peace of the World-Nefarious Jew-Baiting Posters Revealed in Illustrations

The Hitler bogey continues to stalk Germany. The Teutonic madman with the Chaplinesque moustache, has thrived on the empty stomachs of his -lebt-ridden compatriots. He has outgrown his role as the buffoon of the European political stage and is momentarily expected to make a triumphal march to power at the head of his swelling hosts. Hackenkreuzler from Quixote has attracted millions of zealous followers in his crusade against the alleged enemies of German race purity, the source of all earthly trouble, "the plastic demos of the decline of mankind"—the Jew. The account of Germany's liberation must be written in the blood of its Jews. This, Adolph has decreed as the sine gua non of Hitlerism.

With his emergence from political inconsequence to a position of affluence as the leader of the second most powerful party in the Fatherland, Hitler's importance as a factor in Germany's future must not be underestimated. The probability of a Nazi coup within the near future, with Herr Hitler riding imperiously in the saddle, is admitted by "Nordicus" in "Hitlerism, the Iron Fist of Germany" (Mohawk Press), a careful study of the National Socialist party's program. Pointing out that the 1931 Reichstag elections show an increase of 45 per cent over the elections of only one year previous, the author concludes: "Indications point to the fact that the tlatant little Austrian is due soon for a chance at power. The Hitler movement is growing into a landslide, rising more quickly perhaps than German Minister of Interior Informed by Jewish Leaders of Hitlerite Menace

OFFICIAL representatives of the Jewish community of Berlin called, this week, on Herr Groener, Minister of Tyterior, to protest against Hitlerise agitation against the Jews of Germany. After describing a number of cases of these Nazi practices, they said that tolerance by the government of unrestrained agitation against a religious minority might seriously jeopardize order within the country and impair German prestige abroad.

General Groener outlined his policy and, when leaving the conference, the members of the Jewish committee expressed their conviction that the government condemned Nazi attacks on Jews and was determined to protect the constitutional rights of all German citizens, regardless of religion, by all constitutional means.

any other political party in the history of Germany. This mixture of magnetic personality, promises of a glorious future, unstinted glorification of the German race, and convincing political gains have quickened the German pulse. Nazi visions of a pure race have stiffened the backbone of a people whose pride suffered a dizzy fall after 1918. The attitude seems to be: 'What's the use?'"

The imminence of Hitler's rise to power, hangs like the sword of Damocles over the heads of Germany's Jews. Faced with a threat more serious than any either they or their forebears had experienced, the Jews of the Reich have naturally become panicy. Whatever the uncertainty in its political program,

Hitlerism leaves no room for doubt as far as its attitude toward the Jews is concerned. The Jews must cease to be a factor in German life. Whether by death or expulsion, they must be eliminated. Thousands of Jewish families, many of whom had become thoroughly acclimatized to the land of their residence, have already begun to emigrate to neighboring countries. Others are preparing to take up the staff and follow their brothers God knows where. The large mass of Jews, impelled by the serious menace to their existence, have for the first time organized into a single united front.

Divergent groups have forgotten their differences in the gravity of the situation confronting them. A protectorate of all the Prussian Jewish communities was formed with the participation of the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, the Zionist Organization, the B'nai Brith, the Women's Union and the various Jewish Relief organizations. A committee representing these organizations will be entrusted with the planning of ways and means of combating the economic boycott initiated by the Hitlerites and of securing the continued existence of the German Jewish community. A Reich's committee of 13 has also been formed to collaborate with the Central Union, for the protection of Jews. The formation of these committees is regarded as an indication of the fact that Jews no longer doubt the probability of a Hitler regime.

They are aware that the advent of Hitlerism will be the signal for the release of the pent-up hatred that surges in every loyal Nazi

breast. The return of Germany to imperial eminence is conditioned upon the rapidity with which the Jews are dispatched. This is the key to the solution of Germany's problems, the red herring by means of which millions of desperate, unreasoning Prussians were rallied round the suvastika. Imbued with the fanaticism of people fighting for dear life, for God, and for country they will fall upon the Jew at the first

taste of power.

Already, in anticipation of their ascension, they have precipitated numerous attacks upon Jews and have launched an economic boycott that has made itself felt in all parts of the country. Department stores and other commercial establishments conducted by Jews have been exposed to the vandalism of frenzied Berlin mobs. Jewish university students have been assaulted, driven from classes and in some cases critically injured. The inability of university officials and the police to check periodic anti-Semitic outbursts have resulted in the closing of Berlin University, twice in less than two weeks. The University was closed last week for an indefinite period following a renewed attack (Continued on page 356)

Jewish Novels—Jewish Press—Jewish Things—Jews!

A Sick Room Causerie From the Pen of a Keen-Eyed and Outspoken Observer

By A. H. FROMENSON

Six months on my back have given me ample opportunity to read—if nothing else. And what I have read—thanks to my own library and thanks to ny many friends who have sought by bringing me books to cheer the bleak monotony of my compulsory idleness. Scores of books, including novels by Jews about Jews.

Almost I wish that my friends had forgotten my interest in Jewish things and refrained from supplying me with most of the recent novels by Jews about Jews. On my shelves are an abundance of books about Jews written by Jews, many made available by the Jewish Publication Society (inventor of the "book-ofthe-month" idea) during the period when Henrietta Szold was its scenetary. But not one-not a single one-of the new novels about Jews by Jews that I have read during my illness has been given place on my book shelves. They have gone into the incinerator.

tor. What strange creatures those Jews are who What strange creatures those Jews are who do not exist except in the prurient minds of those sailors' lights-of-love who procreated them. And that is why they are all abortions ---why none of them come to life like Zangwill's "Reb Shmuel" for example, or even his Melchiezedek Pinchus, and each remains a flat, black silhouette. They are bogeymen who might have been invented by Hitler's pressbureau. That such books are written at all by Jews about Jews is the Jews' own fault. The Jews have only themse ves to blame if their own sons and daughters hold them up to the world's scorn as lewd, lascivious vulgarians. They have only themselves to blame if in their wrath and despair so many of their children have discarded the Fifth Commandment and now malign and slander their very parents to an extent that tew anti-Semites would dare.

T HEY-the Jews themselves-are to blame if what is written by Jewish so-called novelists is of a character to justify the Hitlerite project of sterilization. It is their shame that books about Jews of the kind that crowd my bookshelves, those generous founts of inspiration and pride that more than a quarter-century ago taught me Jewis's self-reverence, should today go unread by Jews. It is their shame that there has not been a Jewish "best seller" since "Children of the Ghetto," though any number of splendid novels and plays about Jews have been written by gifted Jews during the intervening years. And by non-Jews, also. (Palliere's "Unknown Sanctuary," Londres' "The Jew Goes Home," and Lewis Wallis' "By the Water of Babylon" are financial failures.) Practically every worth while literary effort by Jews about Jews during the past decade -has been a financial failure. And that applies as well to the stage and the screen. Jews won't read about themselves. Jews won't go to see a worthwhile play about Jews. I think it is truer about Jews than about most other people that they do not encourage their own writers and artists. That has become axiomatic in publishing circles. Pretty soon the fact that a proffered manuscript is by a Jew about Jews will close the doors of all the publishing houses to it. Unless it is anti-Semitic, or reeking with sex. Then it may have a chance-that is, the literary prostitute who authors it may make some money-have his cakes and ale, successfuly barter his heritage.

No, the Jews will not read anything worth while about themselves any more-so far have they sunk in the morass of materialism (that same materialism which in this hour of greatest Jewish need has caused them to abandon their synagogues and their community centers and even the ideal of the Land of Israel Rebuilt). And that explains why firstclass Jewish writing talent has-with one or two notable exceptions-entirely abandoned the Jewish milieu, and left it to the prostitutes who substitute smut for the spiritual beauty of the Sabbath candles. Even the struggles of the Palestine Chalutzim have been reduced to a study in disenchantment, and the men who have given of themselves endlessly to efforts to saving their people from disease, from economic decadence and death have been lampooned as egregious, vulgar braggarts and unrestrained lechers. Smut, chutzpah and lampoonery-the tearing down of Jewish character, Jewish ideals and Jewish aspirations,the derision of Jewish service, the attribution of ulterior motives by those who would serve lewish causes-these are their stock-in-trade.

But, even these extremes have not helped. The comfort is that all of these books have

utterly failed financially, and if there are any more being written (there are rumors abroad of a new "eastigatory" book by an allegedly "nationalist" Jew whose lecture tour has been a "flop"), they too, will fail. That thought would be a comfort if only the worthwhile things that are being written by Jews about Jews would be read by Jews.

Jews would be read by Jews. But they won't be. One gets the decided impression that Israel is abandoning its tents. In this country, at any rate. Otherwise, would it be possible for the American Jewish press to have to struggle so bitterly for its ever precarious existence? This is true of the Yiddish dailies as well as the Anglo-Jewish weeklies and the Hebrew language publications.

T HE old Tageblatt and the Yiddish Gasetten are hardly memories any longer. The Jewish Tribune, just absorbed by THE AMERICAN HEBREW, that symbolized a fine type of filial devotion, has been allowed to suspend publication. Yet there are enough Jews in this country who, if they really cared about developing a Jewish culture, not merely talked about it, who if they really wanted to encourage Jewish talent, could give such patronage to Jewish periodicals, whether English or Yidcish or Hebrew, as to have caused the flowering in this country of a Jewish press and Jewish literature which would have been a source of high pride and inspiration-would have been a source of strength to us in this hour of direst Jewish need when the whole world seems bent on our destruction. But writers must live, and that they shall be enabled to live, publishers must be prosperous. But if the publishers of Jewish periodicals or books by Jews about Jews are to prosper, Jews must read worthwhile things about themselves, subscribe for Jewish periodicals and advertise in them, and buy the books in large quantities.

Many other thoughts press for utte ancethoughts on Jewish subjects I have pendered during the long period of my compulsory inactivity. But the little treasure of energy that, during these dreary months, I have again accumulated must still be sedulously guarded against dissipation.

And so-hopeful, at last, of renewed health, and hopeful, too, that the opportunity and strength will be granted me soon to discuss these subjects, I obey the mandate of my wifenurse that I put aside pencil and paper at this point.

I. too, regret that I was not in the office when you were here. I have an unusually busy day of it, trying to cover my several offices and keep in touch with those many activities with which I am associated. I try to give the publication the very early part of the morning and the last part of the afternoon. In between, I try to make a living.

Touching on the post-script of your letter, this is what happened: At a press meeting to honor Sokolow, a few of the Jewish writers tried to get me to commit myself on the Samuel book and on Samuel himself. Not for publication, I told them a few things, and one of them asked me, if an answer were made to your article, would we publish it? I told them we would be gled to publish any article by a responsible person, even though that person might be a friend of Samuel.

Up to the present, all we have had is a threat that an article was to be sent in by Brainin, of the Seven Arts Feature Syndicate, which has not made its appearance up to the present moment. The chances are, we will not publish it when it does come in. Brainin, as I understand it, has been carrying on publicity through the Jewish press for Samuel, and I wouldn't trust that fellow any further than I can throw the Empire State Building.

I read the interesting letters which you have received, and it is very evident that your friends were very happy at the manner in which you dressed this gentleman down. I haven't wun across him yet, but there is a fair chance of my doing so at a dinner next Sunday night given by the Jewish Writers' Club, to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of Jewish literary effort in this country. I am looking forward to this meeting. Just how I will handle the situation will depend on the circumstances.

TERMINERS PROVIDENCE

What a tragedy, if true. Especially in the light of a more realistic editorial which appeared in the following issue of the selfsame publication wherein we read these somewhat contradictory statements which come from one most closely and intimately conversant with the activities of the Zionist Movement in Canada: "The silence of Zionist activities in Toronto is almost deafening." And Toronto, we must remember, is perhaps the most Zionistic center upon this entire continent. The editorial continues: "Winter is over. Spring is on our door step; summer is not far off, and Toronto's 1932 Zionist second so far as we know is still blank." (italics, ours.)

If this be the "only really vital and dynamic force in Canadian Jewish life" - oh, Apathy, where is thy sting? Evidently there is something wrong somewhere with this picture.

WHO IS THE GOOD JEW?

For centuries now, our thinkers, among the great and the humble, have striven for a comprehensive and satisfactory definition of a good Jew. Who really is "ein guter Jud"? Is he one whose piety is most rigid; who is most punctillious about every jot and title of the Torah? Or is he one who even though abandoning all the ritualistic and ceremonial requirements of the Law, none the less "loves his neighbor as himself" and "does not unto others as he would not have them do unto him"? Must be belong to a Synagogue? Is it imperative that he be a Zionist? Shall he be zealously Orthodox or mildly Conservative? Dare he be Reform? Is a thorough knowledge of his native Hebrew tongue, the "Loshon Kodesh" essential or would a deep appreciation of, and a profound sensitivity to, the achievements of his people and the ideals of his faith suffice? Must he be a "Talmud Hocham" or is it enough that he is a loyal even though an unto to red, son of Israel? Is he the prophet or the priest? Must he share in his people's mission or believe that sheer existence is sufficient raison d'etre? Shall he follow Jabotinsky or Sokolow; Rabbi Cooke or Rabbi Wise? Who is the good Jew?

Among the multitudinous opinions upon this frequently and feverishly debated question, the recent contribution of that saintly, scholarly, and truly liberal (in the very finest and deepest connotation of that term) professor of Jewish Social Studies at the Hebrew Union College, Dr. Abraham Cronbach is worthy indeed of serious consideration. In his Founder's Day adcress delivered in Cincinnati a week or so ago he said: "We speak of 'a good Jew'. Customarily we mean by a good Jew, a Jew not only of moral probity but also of loyalty to the old traditions. 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

I do not know whether you are especially interested in the following, but I thought I would send it to you anyhow. Lou Wolsey, in the course of a letter on another subject, writes these two sentences:

"I read Silver's article in The American Hebrew with a great deal of interest. It has caused a sensation everywhere. I wish I could get the courage to say a word about his reference to Samuel's salary."



Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, The Temple, Cleveland, Ohio. embarrassment, and as sensitivity because he is not allowed to be like the other boys.

If the Jewish student had a greater knowledge of the history and traditions and high principles of his religion, he would have a background which would make him impervious to petty slights and insults, and not being apologetic but rightfully proud, he would therefore not fall into the expression of the aforementioned "defense mechanism" which often makes his objectionable. I find it hard to believe and refuse to concede that such an unfortunate and unremediable situation as is pictured, exists in our schools. Now much wiser would the Jew be if he followed a few simple pringiples of conduct and thought, which, mingled with natural anassuming pride born of a knowledge of his group, would bring him a step nearer to the obliteration of present conflicts! Let him see to it that it is not he who is socially antipathetic; let him go forth among his classicates without being hypersensitive,-without flinging his religious aif erences at others as well as without attempting to hide them. I am confident that on the whole he will be accepted in the same manner that he comes, if he comes as an individual willing to be judged on his personal merits.

Each group must see in the steps taken by the other group encouragement for its own co-operation. Neither will be self-starting but if the minority group will live up to its obligations to itself and the undergraduate group of which it is a part, and if the majority is turn retains an open mind, no graduate will have occasion to condemn our colleges as "sources of liberal erudition" rather than of "liberal education."

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTEN-DENT OF THE JEWISH FREE EMPLOYMENT BUREAU

The year 1931, with the number of unemployed at its peak, was naturally a difficult period for the workers of the Jewish Free Employment Bureau.

This report will make n→ attempt to go into details of the varied types of people applying. In greater numbers than ever, we had the pathetic tales of the man, head of a fam ly, who had been idle for months after working in one position for many years, the many middle-aged women, who had never worked before, pleasing for any work to help feed their family, the boy or girl, begging for something to do to bring some return into the home, and many, many others.

The Bureau registered 8,697 men, women, boys and girls; and 4,110 placements were made, an increase of 42.5 per cent over 1930.

Fifty-six per cent were American born and 44 per cent from 47 foreign countries. ative. In cases where the applicant was placed on a temporary position and did not return to the Bureau, the time employed, unless the requisition stated otherwise, was regarded as one day's work. In temporary positions where we learned that the applicant worked one or two days a week for a long period, or where the position became a steady one, the information was included in the report.

Some of the applicants were placed more than once, making in all 3,272 placements. This number put in 9,895 weeks of work, and their total earnings were \$148,775.06. Of these wage earners 691 were assisted by the Jewish Social Service Bureau during 1931 or at some previous time.

Their earnings were \$50,877.43

Of the applicants referred to us by the Jewish Home Finding Society, 52 earned \$3,789.67.

The average weekly earning was \$15.04. This average is based upon juven les, some at \$6.00 per week, up to older men, some of whom carned as much as \$66.00 per week.

A Disapproval of "Jews On Approval" Maurice Samuel (Liveright, Publisher) Ey EDWARD H. LEVI

Socrates once made a remark which might be applied to Maurice Samuel and his "Jews on Approval." Socrates said, "Wind puffs up empty bladdens; opinions, fools." The best that can be said for this book is that its author is proud of his opinions. The fact that his views are mostly unfounded, undigested, and poorly stated, does not phase him. It is questionable whether a good workman or an artist would have conceived such windy opinions, but if he had, he would have relegated them to the waste paper basket, and not to the publisher. One wonders that the publisher allowed himself to be a substitute for a waste paper basket.

Indeed, "Jews on Approval" would not be worthy of any reviewer's attention, for a book so inadequate becomes its own conmentary, were it not for two reasons. The first reason is that due to conditions of social unrest, people who have never learned how to think, may be overwhelmed, for a time, by mere bombast. To some, there is a certain attractiveness n bad manners and impudence. There is a tendency to award the mantle of bravery to persons who engage in specious expose. Actually, Maurice Samuel would have been more brave if he had forced himself to reconsider his views. The least we can ask of a man who attempts to criticize is that he have the intellectual honesty to rid his book of false arguments and all sorts of contradictions.

The second reason for reviewing this book is that, unfortunately for the truth, some of Maurice Samuel's contentions are true. It is said a man is known by the company he keeps, and it would be too bad, if applying this saying to ideas, people would disregard certain of the evils mentioned by Samuel merely because they are part of an undigested regurgitation. Moreover, an attack which has most of its validity in indicating conditions of intellectual dishonesty is naturally brought into disrepute when it is stated and argued in an intellectually dishonest fashion, and seems to have as its basis a personal animus, which only a strange conceit on the part of the author made him think would be interesting to others.

The first requisite for an attack on American Jewry is an understancing of American Jewry. The most constant principle by which Mr. Samuel judges men in this illogical book, is their position in Zionism. Like other ignorant people, Mr. Samuel seems to believe, almost invariably, that persons who disagree with him are dishonest. At any rate, Zionism is not American Jewry. Mr. Samuel's attack is entirely superficial, since it is not based on an understanding of American conditions on even of a knowledge of the leaders of Jewry, although it would have been better if he had neglected leaders altogether and concerned Eimself with situations.

His attack on the Rabbinate is mostly fatuous. At one time he states that a rabbi should be a scholar or an intellectual leader; at another time he praises Wise for his leadership, and says that the thing which "has harmed him most, is the fact that he is a rabbi," In making what could have been a good point concerning the difference between priest and rabbi, he indulges in the irrelevant and false belief that an ancestry of an institution is its present condition. The fact that the priest is the lineal descendant of the medicine man, does not condemn him any more than it condemns the modern doctor who has the same ancestry. Moreover, although one should praise rabbis who are not priests, (and Samuel should have known that there are such" one cannot condemn them for being what the community has made them. The community should have been Samue's target. Samuel's statement that rabbis are jingoists during wa time and pacifists during peace, sounds strange when one recalls certain outstanding examples of those who were not afraid to be pacifists during the World War, and had the author been more gracious or better informed, he would have acknowledged the bravery of those who, unlike himself, spoke when it was really dangerous to do so.

Of the total registration 52 per cent were skilled in 193 different trades, and 48 per cent had no regular occupation.

Seven hundred and four were handicapped and in this group 276 placements were made,

Two thousand one handred and seventy-one were referred by the affiliated organizations of the Jewish Charities and 1,281 placements were made.

The carnings and time imployed of 3,272 placements were assertained directly from the employer or from the client, where he had returned to the Bureau after being placed. In the other placements the information was either not available or not accurate enough to be included in the report. The following figures are conservdebted to the Executive Director of the Jewish Charities, Mr. Samuel A. Goldsmith.

I want to express my appreciation to mg associates in the Bureau who made the placements possible.

I should like to thank the 856 firms for their splendid cooperation.

The Board of Directors has at all times been a valuable help to the Bureau. Their support and advice during this most difficult year was encouraging and inspiring. To them my heartfelt thanks.

This report will make no predictions for the future. The Bureau will continue to do its best to procure employment for the applicants. Respectfully submitted,

THE REFORM ADVOCATE

There is no point in continuing the list of errors committed in this book. The discussion of American Jewish weeklies is mostly empty since it shows no appreciation of the condition under which these weeklies operate, and if these weeklies have been guilty of empty articles, it is because they have published material similar to "Jews on Approval." If American Jewry is at fault in its desire to hear "acuous speeches based on pseudo knowledge, it has been trained so by persons like Mr. Samuel, who has been on the lecture platform for some time. The chief pseudo subject discussed by the American rabbinate seems to be psychology, and although the evil is there. Mr. Samuel indulges in some pseudo-psychology himself when he speaks about his mystic psychological tie to Palestine. He is not religious, and does not believe that God appointed Palestine as the country for the Jews. There is no good psychology which states that one of the homelands of one's ancestors has a hold on the descendant, and if this were psychology, Mr. Samuel might as well substitute Egypt for Palestine.

A book could have been written indicating how Modern Judaism has failed to provide adequately for the lower classes, indicating also. the conditions which the American Rabbi must meet, and pointing out that one of the chief weaknesses of American Judaism is that it has too many men in its midst like Maurice Samuel, who indulge in glib bombast, are afraid or incapable of intellectual rigor, and as literary artists are mere publicists.

ST. LOUIS DEDICATES NEW TEMPLE HOUSE

The formal dedication of Temple Israel House, a \$225,000 building with accommodations for the Religious School, Brotherhood and Sisterhood and other activities of the Temple, took place on Friday evening, April 15, with appropriate services.

The new building faces Washington Blvd. along a front of 90 feet and extends north to the rear property line to a depth of 170 feet. It is entirely separate from the Temple, except for a connecting corridor and stair at the rear of the building. It is three stories in height and fireproof.

Rabbi Fredinand M. Issermar, Temple Israel's spiritual leader, has contributed in large measure to initiating the Actual construction of the new Temple Israel House; and wth the building committee, the president of the Congregation and the architect is responsible for the inclusion of every facility in the new building for the Congregation's numerous activities.

The Rabbi succeeded in Temple Israel's pulpit, the late Dr. Leon Harrison, who passed away September L 1928. He first occupied the pulpit of Temple Israel Friday evening September 27, being inducted by Dr. Stephen S. Wise of New York and Dr. Harry Ettelson of Memphis, Tean.



Sunday is Mothers' Day. It is intended to be an occasion for the expression of tribute to all the mothers in the nation, and well do they merit this consideration. And especially may we extend the heartfelt sentiment of love and honor to them in these turbulent times. For economic crises may come and go; wars fought and finished; plagues, disasters and all the troubles that try men's souls, but the countless cares and worries of motherhood go on in good times and bad, without end . Well may we give a thought to the problems of the mother in these days of distress-the mothers in millions of homes who must bear the added burdens of unemployment of husbands and sons. It is in days like these that the value of the mother's work secomes clearer to us, for not only must she perform all her household duties to care for the family with little or no money, but she must also keep the spark of hope alive for better days in the home. It is the mother of the home that must possess the most courage in facing the overwhelming problems of depression. It is she who makes the greatest sacrifices, and who complains the least in suffering the privations of lower standards of living. No soldier in war time was ever more hencic. Mothers' Day should be an occasion not only for sending of gifts to our own blessed loved one, but also for the strengthening of our resolution to make this sick old world a much better place for all mothers to live in and to carry on their work of love and of life.

come calloused to these stories of woe and suffering. But we cannot escape the facts. We cannot refuse to listen to their telling. The Jews in Poland, Roumania, Lithuania, and even in Germany, are infinitely worse off today than they were at any time during or after the World War. Millions of them, actually millions, are existing on a scale not nuch higher than stray animals. The middle classes have been virtually wiped out. On top of the depression itself, the anti-Semitic economic persecution has made it impossible for the Jewish tradesman to engage in any business, and even the Jewish artisan is denied whatever opportunities there might be for labor. The governments in these countries are unable to give them relief. They are all in a state of bankruptcy. Abcut the only thing left for the Jews is starvation. Many have sought to escape this form of slow death by self-destruction. Thousands have already died from lack of food.

Could American Jewry even consider for a moment any other decision than that taken by the national council of the Joint Distribution Committee? How could we justify a refusal to do something for these wretched people of ours? We are hard hit ourselves. We are undergoing in economic transformation ourseives. American Jewry is beginning to feel the pinch of poverty. All too true. But bad off as we are and worse off as we might become, we shall never be anywhere near the plight of our unfortunate brethren in Eastern Europe. There is then no reason why American Jewry cannot do something to help their fellow Jews in the countries of utter hopelessness. We cannot send the same millions of money that we so liberally contributed in past years. Eighty-one millions of dollars we sent to help them since the war, an average of more than five millions a year. We can't do that this year, but we can do something. We can at least raise enough in America to maintain the efficient J. D. C. organization in Eastern Europe that has done miraculous work with the meager funds at its disposal. We can't abandon our brethren entirely. We cannot deny the one bowl of soup a day fed to thousands of starving children ir Poland and Roumania. They may die anyhow, poor, miserable creatures, but so long as they can keep alive we must do all we possibly can to help them fight on, for there is just a little hope that perhaps in six months or a year conditions in Europe may change a trifle for the better, and perhaps within that time our own depression might be slowed up and better times come for us. We can't stop being human as long as there is a dollar left to us. We must continue to help our fellow Jews who cannot help themselves. We cannot stop being Jews.

The Joint Distribution Committee will soon appeal to every community in America to help raise sufficient funds to continue its work. When that appeal comes to our community, we must respond to the best of our ability, however modest the amount we may be able to raise. We cannot say no.







Vast Water Resources in Black Hills Region

One of the most productive waterbearing formations of the northern interior of the United States is what is known as the Dakota standstone, which crops out about the flanks of the Black hills in southwestern South Dakota. The formation extends eastward and northeastward to the berders of Iowa and Minnesota.

As the andstone slopes away from the Black hills, the water percolates northeastward and castward through the porous rock and undernenth a dense covering of thick clay shale.

RABBI SILVER ANSWERS A ZIONIST CARPET-BAGGER Why Maurice Samuel Disapproves

I

I have finally read Mr. Maurice Samuel's new book "Jews on Approval." For weeks now there have been alluring and mysterious whisperings in the Anglo-Jewish press about this book and the awful drubbing which it was going to administer to some American Jewish celebrities and to me. Some choice bits of smart characterization were exhibited in advance by the little Winchells of the Jewish weeklies, in order to make your mouth water.... One press agent pictured me in the process of reading this book and writhing in mortal agony. One New York Jewish cleric actually beheld 'Jewish flesh bleed and Jewish nerves quiver."

Well, I have read the book; and frankly I am a little disappointed. I had been led to expect great and scandalous and Gargantuan things. I found only old-time "kibbitzing" and nosethumbing.

It would be unfair both to the book and to its gallant author to suggest that I was not irritated by it. I was; and in so far as that was its object, the book is a success. Even a cootie can make a man uncomfortable. But then a cootie always remains a cootie...

Mr. Samuel does not like my oratory. He does not like my scholarship. He does not like my book. He does not like my Zioniism. He does not even like my salary. Had he expressed an additional dislike for my pompadour and my neck-ties the catalogue would have been complete. In fact from reading this book I received a distinct impression that Mr. Samuel does not like me...

Why doesn't Mr. Samuel like me? That is an interesting question. There are other Rabbis in the country whose oratory is quite as bad as mine, whose scholarship is quite as "thin," whose books are quite as "unintelligible" (though not quite as extensively read,) whose salaries are quite as large and whose prosperity is quite as "thick." Why did Mr. Samuel single me out for this Tartar "mi she-berach" of his?

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The sad tale must now be told, gentle reader. When Mr. samuel was an employee of the Zionist Organization of America, drawing a salary of \$7500 a year, (plus railroad and traveling expenses, plus extra compensation for every article contributed to The New Palestine)⁶ for making speeches and otherwise sacrificing himself for the cause, I suggested that his salary should be reduced, in as much as the Organization was operating at a tremendous deficit. This Mr. Samuel has never forgiven me. It has been "burning him up." For some years now he has been going the rounds of towns and "kibbitzarnies" like a poor mongrel sniffing for scraps of scandal, malicious wisecracks and derisive words, waiting for a day of reckoning. His baffled wrath has now found vent in a pasquinade, written with the deft skill of a longshoreman and with the breeding of a - Semuel.

Any man who, like myself, has been in active public life for more than a decade and a half will accumulate enough enemies to

last him a life-time. I have my share of them. But Mr. Samuel has been among my most persistent and virulent enemies, goaded on by a hate - and a jealousy - quite pathological. Whenever I have a controversy with a man in public life, Mr. Samuel promptly injects himself into the scene, an uninvited combatant. Wherever there is a circle where his particular brand of anti-Silveriana would be welcome he is on hand with his little bucket....

Ex uno disce omnes. From a knowledge of what prompted Mr. Samuel to pay his compliments to me I infer that a similar spite must have been responsible for his altogether vile attack upon Mr. David Brown.

It is not my purpose to champion Mr. Brown. He needs no defenders or apologists. I have not always agreed with him. Frequently we had sharp differences of opinion both as regards policies and methods. Each man has his temperamental peculiarities, but each man is entitled to be judged not on the basis of the incidentals which are on the periphery of his character, but on the basis of his essential worth and achievements.

That Mr. Brown gave year's of his life and vast energy and devotion to the cause of alleviating the misery of millions of our people in the desperate years of the war and those following the war, no one will deay, and no one, unless he is poisoned by malice, will attempt to depreciate and belittle that monumental service. Mr. Brown's part in the heroic labor of love and mercy

of American Jewry will be remembered long after the vituperations of a scribbling dilettante will have been forgotten.

Mr. Samuel does not like my oratory. In as much as he has proclaimed me the symbol of the "Americanizing" Rabbinate, which he so heartily detests. I must assume that I am also "the trained product of the elocution schools." The graceful gestures of mine reflect the many hours spent before a mirror. This last image excites Mr. Samuel to such an orginistic degree that he becomes psychically transported, and with rare clairvoyance actually beholds me pantomiming before a mirror? A charming bit of playful fantasy, even if not quite original...

One cannot really quarrel with Mr. Samuel's taste in oratory. "Chacun à son goût." He does not like my style of speaking? <u>Niche</u>! He thinks that I am the nearest rival to Dr. Stephen Wise, "who at his best, leaves Silver, - nowhere." Well, that should be very comforting to Dr. Wise and should make Mr. Samuel's job as contributing editor to Dr. Wise's son's paper more secure and more remunerative. But for the sake of "historical accuracy" as my old, beloved professor, Dr. Gotthard Deuisch, used to say, and for the enlightenment of generations yet unborn, I must record the sad fact that I have never studied elocution. I regret that I didn't. Perhaps it is not too late. Perhaps Mr. Samuel would undertake to teach me...

The charming myth of the mirror, must, I regret to say,

also go the way of all myths. I seldom use a mirror except in shaving. It is too disillusioning. I would not advise Mr. Samuel to use it - ever. In his case it would be fairly devastating.

The great orators of the past have been known to use strange devices to perfect their art. Demosthenes put pebbles in his mouth to improve his speech. Mr. Samuel might take some pebbles out of his mouth to improve his. This would help his lecture business considerably...

Mr. Samuel does not like my salary. In discussing at great length my salary and that of other Rabbis Mr. Samuel displays an hitherto unsuspected gift of mathematical wizzardry. He can figure out to a nicety what my annual income for perquisites and lectures is, thereby putting my own accountancy to shame. His mathematical genius goes still further. He can tell you to the penny exactly what my <u>wackly</u> income is. This is amazing versatility!

I really sympathize with Mr. Samuel. Why should so much money go to a man like Rabbi Silver when Mr. Samuel is so much more deserving and would be so glad to get it and has been trying so awfully hard and in so many ways, to get it. Surely there is no justice in the world!

But sympathizing as I do with a man who suffers so much from the world's cruel maladjustments, I should nevertheless like to ask Mr. Samuel one question: What exactly is the relation between

one's salary and one's sincerity? At what salary level does sincerity begin or end? Is a man who prays to God at \$600. a week, (using Mr. Samuel's brilliant phrase) more sincere or less sincere than a man who brays for Zion at \$150 per week plus?...

Mr. Samuel does not like my scholarship. It is too "thin" for him. But how does Mr. Semuel know? What does an Am Ha-aretz know about scholarship? How can a man for whom Rabbinic literature is a closed book, whose knowledge of Medieval Jewish sources is nil, and whose abysmal ignorance of Biblical science is illustrated by a sentence such as the following: "From the God of the Pentateuch (allowing for interpolations as in Deuteronomy) to the God of the Issiahs we have almost the entire range of spiritual development in man." ("I, The Jew"p.216) how can such a man presume to pass judgment on Jewish scholarship? "Ne supra crepidam sutor judicaret," which being interpreted for Mr. Samuel's benefit means: "cobblar stick to your last." A gentleman whose sole talent lies in appropriating key-ideas of other men and jazzing them up or in writing those things which spiteful urchins write on back fences with chalk, (Dr. Wise who is grateful for having been "let down easy" this time, calls that sort of writing "unpurchasable and unterrified truth-speaking, "... ya. ya... quite as unpurchasable and unterrified as Arthur Strawn's "Prophet a! la mode" ...), such a gentleman, ought really not to dabble in matters as scholarship.

Mr. Samuel does not like my Zionism. "It is thoughtfully modulated and held in admirable restraint." Here again I should like to ask a question of Mr. Samuel. When may a Zionist be said to hold his

Zionism in admirable restraint? When he restrains himself from "borrowing" thousands of dollars from the Zionist Organization without authorization?... Would you say that a man who has been graciously but firmly advised by a committee of impartial judges, that for the best interests of the Movement he should not continue in any Zionist office or on any Zionist committee - would you say that that man's Zionism needs some admirable restraint?...

Ten years before Mr. Samuel graced these shores to become the professional carpet-bagger of the Zionist Movement, I had organized the first junior Zionist society in America. Since that time, and for twenty-eight years, I have been actively identified with the Movement. Mr. Samuel, who has had to conjure his Zionism out of a cosmic mystery, and with hair-raising intellectual acrobatics has had to walk the tightrope of racial chauvenism, and who seldom spoke or wrote for Zionism without a cash down payment, now presumes to teach me my Zionist catechism.

Mr. Samuel does not like my social and economic views. He charges me with being "safe." "No money-lender or employee of labor was ever stung into a moment of self-searching by a rude hint that the Jewish mission of social justice has some sort of personal application." I am sending a copy of this to the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, The Associated Industries of Cleveland and the Merchants' Association of Ohio. It will give them the laugh of their lives. I am also reprinting that atatement in my Temple Bulletin to give my own people a hearty laugh.

I shall send a copy of it to the Cleveland Bystander which during the recent Hotel employees strike viciously denounced me: "for the prejudice and intolerance which he (Dr. Silver) displayed in so completely and passionately condemning one side (the hotel owners) and so entirely and unquestioningly espousing the other (the hotel employees.") Also one to "Church Management," of Cleveland, which recently carried the following: "While Christian ministers are debating among themselves whether or not it is good strategy to speak out in labor disputes, Babbi Silver speaks and the city listens."

Mr. Samuel does not like my book "Religion in a Changing World." There are others who didn't like it, particularly those vainglorious racialists who, like Wr. Samuel, believe that "God is a Jew" and that "the religious feeling of all people who are not Jews is trivial," or those who belong to that anomalous breed of Jewish agnostics who choose to champion vicarious orthodoxy, or those Jewish atheists who find no ideologic discrepency whatsoever in officiating as Rabbis in Conservative congregations.

I suspect that Mr. Samuel is especially wrought up about my latest book because it proved so successful. My other books didn't bother him at all. Of course he found certain portions of my book "unintelligible." A befuddled mentality which could produce such appalling Serbonian bogs of intellectual confusion, like "You Gentiles" and "I, the Jew" would guite naturally find "Religion in a Changing World"

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too lucid for comprehension. Even a friendly reviewer of "You Gentiles," in the "New Palestine," could go no further in his praise of that book than to say: "The proportion of such rash and baseless pronouncements is too great for one book,"... and a reviewer of "I. The Jew" in the "New York Herald-Tribune" thus summarized both "r. Samuel's scholarship and his style: "The fluency of his writing when he is merely rhapsodizing, as opposed to his platitudes, his redundancies, his helpless apologetics and his all too spacious coherence when he is arguing, is sufficient to declare him a protestant against rationalism even if he did not explicitely proclaim his aversion to it..."

I have one final question to ask of Ar. Samuel. That "lady in Jerusalem who nearly flung herself on my bosom with the words. 'You great, big, beautiful Habbi'" was she a blond?... And what do you mean by "nearly?..." I recall many pleasant experiences in Jerusalem but this one unfortunately and quite regretfully escapes me. Such a charming accolade I should remember, especially when others for whem it was not intended, are able to remember it. Haurice, was she a blond?... And are you sure that it happened in the holy city of Jerusalem? Perhaps beside the Tailing Wall? Perhaps in the moonlight?... I am really very much intrigued - and so is Mrs. Silver....

III

I have not had one hour's conversation with Mr. Samuel in fifteen years. He does not know me. He only hates me. Perhaps as

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a contrast to his imaginary portrayal of me I should offer the following from a colleague who worked with me in Cleveland for eight years in almost daily contact and in closest cooperation: "In the eight years that I have been in the city of Cleveland I have often thought that there is no more stimulating, no more inspiring source than the personality of Abba Hillel Silver... He is today not only the successor to the Jewish Scholar of old, he is also the preacher and prophet of old... In Rabbi Silver we find harmoniously blended these two functions, the preacher, the one who kindles the light, the scholar who spends long hours in the study... I know a few men in the country who have kept their pulpits on the level of which Paobi Silver has kept his. What a temptation it must be to a man with his power, to a man with his magnetism, - to staop to meet the demand of the populace... He has maintained the dignity of the pulpit."

The above words were spoken at my tenth anniversary celebration in Cleveland by one whom Mr. Samuel believes to be "a scholar and a thinker," - Rabbi Solomon Goldman - who was once a Rabbi in Cleveland and who is now, unfortunately, taking stock of everyone - but himself - in Chicago.

IV

And now a word, to my colleagues of the "Americanizing Rabbinate" whose symbol I am supposed to represent. If it is true

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that "my example has done more to mould the aspirations and ideals of young rabbis than any other single influence of this decade." (an exaggeration - albeit flattering) I am really quite happy. For I like my young colleagues and, in many ways, am very proud of them. I have seen them at work in their communities faithfully and capably carrying on the fine traditions of their calling. They are serving the cause of Judaism in the pulpits, in their religious schools and in Jewish commanal life. Many of them are responsible for whatever active Jewish life and for whatever liberal thought there are in their communities. New schools, synagogues and community centers have sprung up throughout the country as a result of their initiative and labors. Quietly and without heroics they are going about improving their schools, their teaching staffs and their surricula. Some of them excel in preaching, others in pastoral work, others again in communal work and still others in teaching. Every Jewish cause of merit, cultural or philanthropic, whether local, national or international, receives their cooperation. The "New Palestine" writes editorially in its issue of January 23d, 1925: "Go through the cities of the land today and you will find, wherever a united Jewish community has been extablished, that the reform congregations and their rabbis are cooperating in work for Palestine, and often in regular Zionist work. It is needless to cite examples. Look at Cleveland, San Francisco, Minneapolis, Chicago, Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York."

The National Chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee

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declared recently: "One outstanding and encouraging fact which I experiences during the past year was the quality of leadership and the willingness to cooperate of our American Jewish ministry."

If Mr. Samuel's dolorous katsenjanmer over the fate of American Israel is ridiculously unreal and unwarranted, it is due in no small measure to the devoted labors of these men. I trust that they will not be "bluffed out" of the legitimate pride and satisfaction which their ministry brings them by the envenomed and joalous criticians of the journalistic free lancers reaming the American Jewish scene today. These pseudo-intellectuals whose secondmate talents have failed to impress the non-Jewish world, have Aattempted to rise to leadership in American Jewish life through bluster and "chutzpa", and they have failed. Defeat and impotence have made them jealous and vindictive.

They brag about Jewish culture and know least about it. All of Mr. Samuel's apostrophies to Jewish learning and scholarship are but a camouflage for a profound and appalling Am Ha-arazuth.

The "Menorab Journal" crew which an vociferously clamered for Jewish culture was itself completely and totally innocent of it. It remained for the Chancellor of Menorah, himself, to remind his managing editor, Elliot E. Cohen, that he, Cohen, knew neither Hebrew nor Yiddish, and that he was as much at home in Jewish literature as a fish in the Jobi desert. And the Chancellor, himself, let it be remembered,

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is not always sure whether Jewish culture is milchig or fleischig or Bolshevik... This bluff and intellectual charlatanry, this ignorance which breeds impudence, which I exposed in my two articles "Why Do The Heathen Rage" have now been confirmed by the Memorah boys themselves who, having fallen out, are for the first time telling the truth about each other.

I should advise my young colleagues to remember that these men, - Hurwitz, Elliot Cohen, Herbert Solow, Felix Morrow, Maurice Samuel, Johan Smertenko and their like - are disgruntled and embittered Jewish culture fakers. They roar and vocabularize and say nothing. Isaiah knew their <u>schmertz</u>: "We have been with child, we have been in pain; we have, as it were, brought forth - wind."

My young colleagues will also not be impressed with the ill-mannered criticisms which from time to time are launched at them by some of their own colleagues, who seem to have appointed themselves, through an ordination of spontaneous combustion, to the office of conscience-keepers and scolds of the Rabbinical profession.

Recently a Rabbi from the Windy City raked his colleagues over the coals for being "soft," and for being incapable of suffering deprivations and bearing hardships. The sole martyrdom to which this gentleman has been subjected during his years of ministry has been the cruel necessity of consuming three square meals a day.

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My young colleagues will not be impressed by this humbug or over-awed by it. They will quietly and patiently carry on. They - and not the culture quacks like Hurwitz, the journalistic lame; ducks like Smertenko or the knights of swashbuckling generalities about race, culture and nationalism, like Samuel, are the true builiers of American Jewish life.

A CONFIRMATION PROJECT

"A project that will undoubtedly prove to be an inspiration to Confirmation Classes throughout the country has been undertaken by the 1932 class of Temple Beth El. In its establishment of a Fund for Religious Education through the cooperation of the parents and the children of the class, a large number of the confirmants have decided to eliminate the usual reception in connection with Confirmation and to use the money that will thus be saved for the creation of a fund, through which children less fortunate than themselves may receive a religious education.

"For many years the confirmants of Temple Beth El have contributed to what is known as the 'Confirmation Fund' which is used to clothe such members of the class as could not properly be taken care of by their parents. WHY SHABUOTH?

"On the sixth of Sivan, seven weeks after the first day of Passover, comes the holiday of Shabuoth. Shabucth fails this year on the tenth day of Jun>. Shabuoth means a week of weeks or seven times seven days. That is why the holiday is known as the Feast of Weeks. Shabuoth is the second of the Three Pilgrimage Festivals. On Shabuoth it was customary for the head of every Jewish household to journey to Jersalem and sring to the Temple the first fruits of his trees as well as his offerings of wheat and barley. Shabuoth, however, is more important for historical and religious reasous. After Israel left Egypt they journe ed immediately to Mt. Sinai to enter into a covenant with God who had redeemed them from slavery. Jewish tradition teaches us that it was on Shabuoth that the Torah and the Ten Commandments were given to Israel. Israel pledged itself to preserve these fundamental principles of religion, to observe them and to teach them to the rest of the world. "We will do as we have heard" That is why it has become customary to hold Confirmation on Shabuoth, when boys and girls formally become members of the household of Israel and pledge their loyalty to its religion. Because it comes at the time of the first harvest and because it was the time when Israel was selected to receive the Torah, Shabuoth is a day of great rejoicing, a day to be joyfully and gratefully observed."
