We had a very important meeting of the Governing Body. especially in so far as Palestine was concerned. Dr. Dienemann done has so excellent service through his visit to Palastine, and he recommended that definite subventions should be given in response to their request, to Rebbi Wilhelm, working on educational lines in Jerusalom, and to Rabbi Elk, who is insugurating congregational activity in Maifa. Another small subvention, Dr. Dienemenn thought, should be given for work in the district round Jerusales, and also for the colony of Kajakt-Bialik. Horeover, Dr. Dienemenn leid great stress on the need for a rabbi to minister on Progressive lines in Tel Aviv. and The possibility of ding doing all this work and propaganda depends a great deal on our goor power to raise the necessary funds, which for the moment we etimate to be about £2,000. An English member of the Governing Body offered £250 immediately on the understanding that another £500 would be collected. Other small sums h ve been offered, but we are only at the beginning of our collectin, and I wasasked to forward you our resolution and at the same time to ask you how far, as a member of the Advisory Palestine Committee. can co-operate. We believe that the appeal should get a very wide respnse. I should be very glad to hear from you on the subject.

Resolution passed by the Governing Body dealing with Palestine

That the following letter be sent to Rabbi Elk:-"The World Union is ready to help in the upbuilding of the religious life in Palestine, and is prepared to give £150 for one year to your organisation on the understanding that it will work for a development of Judaism in Palestine in the spirit of the Preamble to the Constitution of the World Union. In accordance with the principles of the World Union, we leave your organisation independent to do this work in relation to the conditions of Jewish life in Palestine. We hope that when your organisation is strong enough it will become affiliated to the World Union."

That a similar letter be written to Dr. Wilhelm offering £100 for work in Jerusalem and £20 for the surrounding districts and colonies. RabbiDr. Elk

Dear colleague,

Through our colleague Dr. Dienemann I have learned that you are in the Palestine **G**ommitee of the World Union for Progressive Judaism. Dr. Dienemann, as you are already aware, visited Palestine in the interests of the World Union in order to study the possibulities there of a religious revival in its progressive sense. At the meeting of the World Union in London in July 1936 he gave a comprehensive report of the findings, particularly of the work of the Union " Baith Ysrael" in Haifa of which I am the rabbi and which I together with a group of interested people founded a year ago. His report was enthousiastically received also by the Americans there. It was to be translated into English and dissemminated widely in America, I do not know if you have read this report, but I conceive it as my duty to inform you of our work, of the accomplishments it has achieved and of the objectives we have set ourselves, as it is pur believe, that what we are doing here, has significants not only whithin the confines of Palestine, but for the further development of Progressive Judaism in the world.

The aim of our Union is to create a synthesis between traditional Judaism and the dynamics of the life, which is developing in Palestine. We stand on the platform of Jewish Nationalism and see a religious truth and a religious task in the return of our people to Palestine and in the rehabilitation of theland. Inasmuch as we are rooted simoultaneously in the life of Palestine and in its religious traditions (in an undogmatic sense) we beleive that we have something essential to give to the many who are looking for a means of religious expression. Through these means we will help in time to create an atmosphere, in which religious life can develop organically, giving direction and example for both, for people in Palestine and in the Galuth as well. Our work, is being built according to a specific plan. We have turned to no one for help. Only the Jewish Agenca helped us whith a small financial grant). To the larger Jewish public we wanted to come only when we were beyond the merely theoratical and had some accomplishments already to our credit. This has been achieved. Religious services have been established, which draw large attendences on Sabbaths and holidays, the youth has been drawn to us and with satisfaction we are able to say, that both, the youths and children, attend

the services in large numbers. In this last winter we began our adult education work. In a comparitively short time we have been successful in becoming a factor in the spiritual life of Haifa. In consequence of the report from Dr. Dienemann the World Union has granted us a financial subvention through which our further work will be made easier.

We know that the success of this work depends on ourselves, but on the same time we are convinced of the fact that cultural religious work of the kind, we wish to do, is only possible when the religiously interested Jews of the whole world will cooperate with us. Only then will it be possible to create here a centre of progressive Judaism. Numbers of the leading german rabbis, Seligmann, Baeck, Dienemann, Elbogen and athers, are following our work with interest and stand to our side, ready to help in the upbuilding of our institutions. Above all, Dienemann, who has seen our work, is helping us in our development through the organisation of a "Miphal Baith Yisrael". To-day we turn to the rabbis of America, to the Zionists and Non-Zionists, that they too should be helpful in this work, which in our minds is the weightiest that can confront a religious Jew: the revival of our religion in Palestine and its relation in the rebuilding of the land.

Inasmuch as the task of establishing our religious services has been accompliplished, we are taking the nextstep after the holidays and are opening a house of study as also a construction of a reading-room and a library. The reading-room should become a cultural and social centre for the youths here. This will be tight t ogether with the organisation of a Toynbee-hall. For your assistants in equiping the reading-room and in the building-up of the library, which should contain books of the religious, philosophic and social character, we would bee deeply grateful. We would welcome also receiving the essential Jewish newspapers and periodicals in English and in Hebrew, which are published in America as also of the publication of the Jewish schools and conferences. We want to open the reading-room immediately after the holidays with a working library, but realize, that the completion of the library will naturally take longtime.If you would be interested in our work, we should be glad to write more on detail of our ideas for the development and the content of the library

The importance of making a first contact is uppermost in our minds now. It would give us joy, if our work would find the same response in America that it has already found in England and in Germany.

At the meeting of the Authority Committee held on Friday, July 2nd, in connection with the Conference, it was decided to ask the Governing Body to dissolve the present Committee and in its stead to invite representatives of progressive religious thought who should consult together. and from time to time produce papers or books for the guidance of progressive thinking people. These expositions should be in no way dogmatic, or such as could possibly be taken to formulate a creed. since such attempts would be wholly contrary to the principles of the World Union.

It was feutl that if these people were representatives who could command respect their influence would be of very great value.

It was recommended that there should be three representatives of religious thought from America, Germany and England. I have to ask you if you will be one of the American representatives. You will find the complete list of those invited on the enclosed sheet of paper.
