
Dear Rabbi Silver:

I am terribly sorry that there wasn't greater opportunity for me to spend more time with you and Virginia during my recent visit to Cleveland. I do hope it won't be necessary for us to travel 2500 miles to spend some time together and that, on your contemplated visit to New York in February, we shall have an evening or two together.

There are a great number of Zionist groups in this area. The idea has developed of forming a Council in which they shall each be represented in order more efficiently and more intelligently to coordinate Zionist activity. I am lending support to the movement and except to devote some considerable time to the experiment. The Council plans to hold a mass meeting in Newark some time during the middle of March. The meeting should be attended by approximately 2,500 to 3,000 people. It should be addressed by you. I certainly know what the demands are upon your time. I know, too, that you have been here several times in the last number of years. On those occasions, however, in speaking for United Jewish Appeal, you had to make a "parve" speech, so far as Zionism was concerned. The time is now ripe and this is the occasion for an out and out job. Can you, and will you, come? Needless to say, the day and hour will be arranged to suit your convenience.

My dear Joel:

Thank you so much for your letter of January 27th. I wish that I could write that I can come to your meeting in Newark sometime during the middle of March as I should like very much to speak on Zionism in your community. But I do not know what my schedule for March will be and I do not like to commit myself to an engagement which I might have to cancel at the last moment. It may be that I may go to the Pacific Coast in March or April for the work of the United Jewish Appeal. Miami and the communities down south have been pressing me to come down to visit them. I will not know definitely what my plans will be before February 10th when I will be in New York for a few meetings including those of the United Palestine Appeal and the United Jewish Appeal. I shall then be able to answer you definitely.

My Twenty-fifth Anniversary celebration has left me fairly dazed and bewildered with all of the remembrance and all the tokens of friendship which have come from friends near and far.




Thanks a million for your wire of yesterday in which you advised that you would be present on Monday evening, March 15th, at the meeting sponsored by the Zionist Council for this area.

The publicity man would like to have from you something which he can have available for publication in the newspapers on the morning of March 16th, and I shall be indebted if you will send such material along.

When do you expect to get into town, and will Virginia be with you? Terry and I would like to make plans accordingly.

Dear Dr. Silver:

Thanks very much for your letter of March 8th.

While the protest aspect of the meeting has received some publicity, the fact that the meeting is run under the auspices of the Zionist Council of Essex County, and is being sponsored by me (who have been talking Zionism constantly to numerous groups during the past several months) has not been overlooked. Particularly publicized --- as though that needed publicity! --- has been your affiliation with Zionism and U.P.A. I don't know how anyone can claim to have been misled who reads the title of your address. I feel, therefore, quite satisfied that those who come to the meeting would expect to participate not only in a protest meeting but also, and more importantly, in a Zionist meeting.

We have hired the Mosque, one of Newark's largest meeting places, which seats approximately 3,500 people. Indications are that there will be a tremendous overflow crowd. You see, most of the people in and about Essex County, as distinguished from the potential large givers to the United Jewish Appeal campaign, have not had an opportunity to hear you during the many years last past.

I suggested to the Zionist Council that they ask the Rabbis of Essex County to join in the call for this meeting. Thirty-three rabbis in Essex County, which includes Newark and its suburbs, signed a proclamation, a copy of which I enclose. The only one requested to sign who refused to sign because of the reference to Zionism is your friend, but no longer mine, David Wice. The only rabbi in the community who was not asked to sign is Foster. I am enclosing, too, a list of the names of the rabbis who did sign. Rabbi Prinz drafted the proclamation and, incidentally, he has been very effective in building up the Zionist atmosphere in the community.

DRAFT OF PROCLAMATION OF UNDERSIGNED RABBIS OF ESSEX COUNTY

The appalling news that has reached this country spells doom for the six millions of our Jewish brethren who live in Nazi-dominated countries. Reliable reports which were transmitted through our State Department have informed the world that two million Jewish men, women and children have already been mercilessly murdered. It has become incumbent upon the nations of the world that everything be done in order to rescue those few who can be saved from certain death. The undersigned Rabbis of Essex County deem it their solemn duty as religious leaders of their people to add their voice of sorrow and protest against the abominable horrors that have been committed.

We appeal to the conscience of every American who sympathizes with the tragedy that has befallen our people, and we urge our own Jewish people enjoying the benefits of our great democracy, to join in a united effort not only to alleviate the horrors to which our brethren in Europe are being so cruelly subjected, but in seeking a permanent solution to the problem of those Jews. We affirm our belief that the persecuted and homeless Jew must find a new home in Palestine rebuilt where he can live the life of human dignity and creativity even as we under freedom and liberty do live here. We are convinced that the Zionist movement can serve as the best and most efficient instrument in achieving this goal, and we urge our people to join the ranks of this movement. Our hearts go out in sincere prayers for a world built upon justice and liberty for all in which all the nations of the world, and among them the ancient people of Israel, may live in happiness and peace.

Toward this end we urge our fellow Jews voice their sympathy and solidarity at the mass demonstration to be held at the Mosque Theatre, Newark, on Monday night, March 15th.
