

Dear Friends:

Last week the Young Judaea groups of the Northwest Region held their second week-end Seminary. I had the pleasure to be invited for two of the discussions in order that I might summarize the presented papers and the discussion following these papers. I am very happy to state that the presentations as well as the following discussions were on a very high level. I believe that the second Week-end Institute held in Seattle was a full success for the groups represented and the organizations sponsoring the Institute.

However I am somewhat alarned by the radical political attitude taken by some of the young people who have definite influences on their respective groups. I observed definite leanings towards Revisionism, and while I believe that I was able to clear up some of these problems during the discussion, I am not so sure that attempts to influence the young people in the Revisionist ideology will not be repeated by the two young centlemen I had especially in mind. This may become embarrassing to the sponsoring organizations, ZOA and Hadassah, especially after the local Young Judaea leaders have planned to form a Political Actions Committee of the Zionist Youth Council and to go out into the community here and within the region to present political action as they understand it. I would like to know the position you would suggest for the sponsoring organizations to take in this matter. Should we permit an independent Political Actions Committee of the Youth Organizations, or should we demand presentation on such a committee. Since the first meeting of said committee is scheduled for January 14 I shall appreciate your immediate advice.

My dear Friend:

In the December issue of The New Judea, in the first editorial, you quote the resolution which was passed by the Senate of the United States on Palestine. There is one unfortunate error in the text of the resolution which you quote. The resolution as adopted reads "That there shall be full opportunity for colonization and development so that they may freely proceed with the upbuilding of Palestine as the Jewish National Home". Your version reads "a Jewish National Home".

This phrase is, perhaps, the most significant in the resolution, and the use of the definite article in the resolution is not accidental. I believe that the same mistake was made by the Jewish Chronicle of London in quoting the text of the resolution.
