Statement by President Edmund I. Kaufmann



EDMUND I. KAUFMANN

Shortly before *The New Palestine* went to press, Edmund I. Kaufmann, president of the Zionist Organization of America, issued the following statement to the Zionists of the country:

"After my recent and protracted illness, my doctors ordered me not to continue the strain of office of President of the Zionist Organization of America. Although the instructions of the physicians were clear and imperative, I refused to consider them as final until I had carefully gone over the entire situation and consulted many associates, friends and advisers as to the future.

"With singular unanimity eyes turned to a personality among the leaders and active workers who would

command the respect and active support of all American Zionists—Judge Louis E. Levinthal of Philadelphia. He is known as an eminent jurist, and a devoted Zionist. As Chairman of the Administrative Council of the Zionist Organization of America for the past two years, Judge Levinthal has earned the affection and admiration of all. I have every hope that the forthcoming Convention of the Zionist Organization of America at Cincinnati, beginning Saturday, will prevail upon him to serve. With such

a leader as President of the Zionist Organization of America, the organization can go forward to greater achievements, in a spirit of unity, and of deep devotion to the cause of Zion.

"I shall leave the active office with a profound sense of appreciation of the honors conferred upon me. I shall participate in the work of the organization during the coming year in whatever capacity the convention may see fit to designate. I also want to say that I feel enriched by the many personal friendships which I have made in the past year and which I hope will be permanent."

Dear Dr. Silver:

Dr. Voss and I received on last Monday your telegram in which you speak of having been "deeply distressed" by our public statement concerning the telegram sent to President Truman, but the pressure of four or five addresses and radio talks a day has left no time until now for reply. We regret, of course, any embarrassment to which you may have been subjected, but we do not share your fears.

You know, without our telling you, that the last thing we would wish to do is to hinder the realization of our common objectives. We acted on our best judgment at a time when consultations were impossible. Our telegram to the President and our release of it to the press were not a "precipitate action", but the results of a considered attempt to meet a specific situation without delay.

We were not naive enough to overlook the political implications of the President's statement. Our Committee's policy, reaffirmed anew at our last executive meeting a fortnight ago, is not to take sides politically, but to press for whatever advantage may come from either side. A statement like President Truman's, which evoked such bitter attacks in the Arab world and in Britain, deserved, it seemed to us, at least a word of commendation from a bi-partisan committee, not the condemnation which cold silence would imply.

Though not action, this seems to us an historic statement wherein Truman reiterates previous convictions, demands for the first time a Jewish state, promises to make available American aid in the development of Palestine (quite obviously a bid for Arab support), and couples with it a prime tenet of those who support the American Christian Palestine Committee, namely, a promise that the gates of the United States of America will also be open, not only for stateless Jews but for other displaced persons.

We know that Truman's statement refelcts the attitude and opinions of our constituency. We feel that the telegram was in accord with the viewpoints of the American Christian Palestine Committee members, a number of whom, like Lindeman, Niebuhr and Atkinson, have made strong representations against a one-sided approach which omits mention of the world-wide problem of displaced persons, of the need for offering the Arabs a <u>quid pro quo</u>, and of the necessity of America to accept more immigration as a parallel to its constant insistence on opening Palestine.

We know that the American Zionist Emergency Council insists on action, and so do we. We agree that action is lacking, and that of statements we have had a surfeit. You will note that we said in our telegram to the President "Newspaper headlines report that British resent your request. America resents Britain's conscienceless policy of delays. We urge your continued insistence that Great Britain carry out immediately the recommendations of the Anglo-America Inquiry Report and fulfill its legal obligations under mandate. We know you will stand firm and reiterate your demand." What further could we have said constructively? To have remained silent was, in our estimation, unwise and ungrateful.

As for the possible "harmful effect" of our telegram, we do not believe that anyone will change his vote by virtue of another statement, by Truman or by us. There are other reasons that might influence one, but those who consider the Zionist issue to be of predominant importance will not be swayed by any promises on the part of the President or the Democratic Party.

The odds on Dewey's election are reported to be four to one. The defeat of the Democratic Party in New York seems almost assured. But we feel we dare not lose sight of the fact that the Democratic Party and President Truman will be in the saddle for at least two more years. Therefore, it is our contention that a word of appreciation from a bi-partisan committee may be helpful in post election contacts.

This incident raises anew the question of closer consultation on policies and procedures. We hope that this may now become possible.

My dear Mr. Kesner:

Thank you so much for your thoughtfulness in sending me a copy of your recent issue of the "California Jewish Herald". I enjoyed reading it, especially the report of the address of Mr. Bartley Crum and your own editorial. Mr. Crum has been a brave and loyal champion of our cause, and he has been tremendously helpful in every way that he could.

You know, of course, that the British Government has rejected the request of the Jewish Agency that its proposal for a viable Jewish State in an adequate part of Palestine, i.e. partition, should be considered as a basis for discussion. That chapter is, for the moment, closed. The United States Government has also not accepted partition as its own solution. President Truman stated that it was his belief "that a solution along these lines, i.e. partition, would commend the support of public opinion in the United States" but as far as he and the Government were concerned, he stated "I cannot believe that the gap between the proposals (that of the Agency and the Grady-Morrison Plan) which have been put forward is too great to be bridged by men of reason and good will. To such a solution our Government could give its support". In other words, President Truman favors a compromise between the Agency plan and the Cantonization plan, i.e. a still further whitting down.

It should be borne in mind that questioning the wisdom of the action taken by the Executive of the Jewish Agency on partition, and the manner in which it was carried out, is in no way an attack on the Jewish Agency. No one questions its authority, but the parent body of the Jewish Agency, the Actions Committee, and more especially the supreme authority, the World Zionist Congress, have not yet spoken on the subject. As of the moment, the only program which is binding upon the Zionists of the world is the so-called Biltmore program, which is the classic Zionist program and which was reaffirmed as recently as a year ago this August at the first Post-War World Zionist Congress in London.

"It is the sense of this Convention that a special JNF week be set aside to focus the attention of the American Zionists on this effort."

My dear Friend: I had intended to be with you at the luncheon Monday noon, and had looked forward to the opportunity to meet with our Zionist leaders in the community and talk over with them the needs of the Zionist Organization of America, and more especially its Expansion Fund. Unfortunately, I must leave Sunday evening for New York to meet Mr. Shertok, the political secretary of the Jewish Agency, who is arriving from London for a brief stay. He telephoned me from London requesting that I meet him on Monday for an important consultation. I will also have to forego a meeting of the Board of The Temple, scheduled for Monday evening, which I hoped to attend. I am sure that you will understand. This year will be the decisive year in Zionist history. We must mobilize our forces and our propaganda to their maximum. Everything which has gone before has been by way of a preparation for the fundamental decisions which are to be made in the near future. The Zionist Organization of America is the most effective propaganda and education agency of our movement in the world. It is one of the most decisive political factors in the picture -- the one that the British Government is most concerned about, for it represents and makes vocal the sentiment and opinion of American Jewry. The Zionist Organization of America must be enabled to carry on its work on all fronts without the embarrassment of lack of funds. It is clear to every Zionist that the income from dues of the ZOA is far from adequate to meet even a "down to the bone" budget. It is only the Expansion Fund, which supplements the income for dues, which makes it possible for the ZOA to carry on an effective program throughout the United States, both among our own people and our non-Jewish fellow citizens. Our publications, our youth work, the newly-organized Chaluzuith work, our lecture bureau, our support of the work of General Zionism throughout the world, and the substantial subsidies which we make to Hebrew cultural activities in this country depend, in the main, upon our income from the Expansion Fund. The ZOA must raise this year \$1,000,000.00 through this fund. Cleveland, I am sure, will wish to do its share. We have three important Zionist groups in this city and a large Zionist membership. Our contribution to this fund last year was inadequate. I hope that we shall reach and exceed our quota this year. I appeal for fullest cooperation.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I hope that in the midst of the great and historic work you are doing for our Cause you will not be annoyed with my correspondence, but I am taking my appointment as National JNF Chairman for the ZOA seriously. I fervently believe that no greater support can be given you in your political work than a strong and determined effort on the part of American Zionists for "Geulath Haaretz".

I would, therefore, like your opinion on the enclosed outline of a plan to implement our Convention Resolution for the redemption of a tract of 50,000 dunams of land by the ZOA. You will note that our efforts are planned along the traditional fund-raising lines.

In addition to the enclosed outline, I would like to make the following suggestions which, with your approval, I would like to present to the next meeting of our Executive Committee.

- 1. That you or someone you may designate should communicate with Dr. Granovsky, through the JNF Office here, with the view of drawing up an agreement in regard to the redemption of the 50,000 dunams. This tract of land should bear a name associated with the ZOA. We, in this country, should have the right to designate individuals (General Zionists) who will be given preference for settlement on that land, provided, of course, they meet the requirements of Hachshara, etc. We shall also be given the opportunity of creating on that tract a settlement conforming to the principles of General Zionism.
- 2. That there immediately be set up by the JNF a special or earmarked account bearing the name "ZOA Account For The JNF". Into this account shall be deposited all monies remitted for this purpose.
- 3. The Districts and Regions of the country should be disciplined into reporting accurately and receiving credit for contributions they or their members make locally. For many years General Zionists, and I include myself

RESOLUTION

In order to launch a project to make this Resolution a reality, the Districts and the Regions of the country must be immediately galvanized into action. We must within the two year period ending with our Convention in 1948 provide the funds that will create on the soil of Palestine a Settlement bearing our name, and made possible by our own work and sacrifice.

In this connection, the following observations should be made:

I. The idea of commemorating the Zionist Jubilee Year by redeeming a tract of 50,000 dunams of land is an excellent one and is likely to capture the imagination of all Zionists.

The observance of the Zionist Jubilee Year by increasing the land holdings of the Keren Kayemeth is a particularly happy one, in view of the fact that the principle of the inalienability of land, which is the cornerstone of the Keren Kayemeth structure, has its root in the Mosaic Law of Jubilee (Leviticus 25,24) and is the source of the Zionist Call "Grant Ye Redemption To The Land".

II. If this Resolution is to be translated into reality, it will be far from sufficient to merely arrange for paper credits for the various Zionist Districts in the work of the JNF. Although this is important, it will be necessary to actually activize the Districts for the specific purpose of the Jubilee program and to see to it that they raise or surpass the quotas that will be assigned to them.

III. This can be accomplished without conflict with any other fundraising effort. Within the framework of the Traditional Keren Kayemeth program, the

Jubilee effort of the ZOA for the JNF can be successfully implemented if its full
significance is widely understood and the activitated groups are provided with
appealing and effective techniques which, when placed in the hands of devoted Zionists,
will mobilize sentiment and secure popular support for the program.

To this end, we would like to suggest the following:

4. The methods of Fund-Raising should be the Traditional Means. Particularly important would be the following:

a. We should invite all Zionist Groups and Districts to secure Golden Book inscriptions in honor of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, on the occasion of the Jubilee Year. Each inscription will thus become instrumental in the redemption of an additional two dunams of land within the Jubilee Tract.

b. A special Jubilee Dunam Certificate should be prepared, in acknowledgment of dunam land contributions.

c. We issue to the various Districts and affiliated groups Jubilee Forest Booklets containing receipts in acknowledgment of their gifts from \$1.00 to \$10.00. Each of these booklets shall have certificates amounting to \$50.00. The seller of a booklet will be entitled to wear the Jubilee Pin and will receive a Jubilee Dunam Land Certificate.

If this program is approved, we will proceed with the drawing of a leaflet or brochure on the Jubilee Tract Project and proceed with the actual work of fund-raising.

ADDRESS MADE BY MR. PAUL KAMINSKY, PRESIDENT OF THE M.Z.F. ON JANUARY 27, AT THE WALDORF ASTORIA

Senator Brewster, Attorney General Goldstein, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen:

On behalf of the officers and directors of the M.Z.F., and in my own behalf, I welcome you here tonight. Your presence is a source of inspiration to the leaders of our movement both to our people in Palestine and in concentration camps. Not only are you giving moral support but your financial aid will help us to carry on the work that is so dear to our hearts. Those funds are being used primarily to help arouse and crystalize public opinion of both Jew and Christian alike, to the need for opening the gates of Palestine and for creating a Jewish state, which is so important at this juncture.

Your help may mean the difference between Jews in concentration camps and Jews in the land of Palestine.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

My letterhead introduces me and indicates my references.

I have recently received an irrevocable, uncancellable formal order from Mr. Erich Ney, of Tel Aviv, Palestine, (P. C. Box number, 1698), for some 54,200,000 pounds of black steel, welded and galvanized welded steel pipe.

Same is to be used to install an irrigation project in the southern part of the country. They, the contracting firms, have a time limit against them, and they wish to obtain immediate delivery of the materials above listed.

This material is scarce. In fact, it is so scarce that the Office of International Trade has but lately established new and much more stringent regulations concerning the export of this commodity, (steel and iron) out of the United States.

However: since this project is of the type that will bring revenue to the farmers of that country and also eliminate the food gifts now being sent there by this country and others, it would seem not unreasonable to presume that the project will receive the blessing of the licensing committee when my application for a Consolidated Export License comes before them.

But: licenses are handled slowly; unless some powerful factor enters into the picture and insists that early action be taken. Any one with a grain of common sense can see that the project is worthy, but governmental Red Tape is something we always have with us, unless, as stated before, we are able to obtain a favorable recommendation from important organizations, such as your Temple Sinai, and others.

I was advised by Rabbi William M. Stern, of this city, to write to you, and state the situation.

Briefly, in summary form, the problem is this: we can supply the various sizes of pipe in both new and used condition, properly processed to assemble at once upon arrival at Falestine; our suppliers will hold this material a reasonable length of time, (90 days) - then they will sell it to a market which is elsmoring for the material at this moment. But, we need a Consolidate d wxport License, for which I am applying on the proper form, (IT 419) this date. We need the sanction of an interested Jewish Organization of National Scope and Influence, whose efforts should be directed toward inducing the Office of International Trade, Commodities Branch, Department of Commerce, (Secretary of Commerce), to apply immediate action on the application, lest we find ourselves unable to induce our suppliers to reserve the materials.

RABBI A. H. SILVER: June 2. 1947: page 3. Further: the prices are very likely to advance as steel becomes more scarce. This material has to be collected from small steel yards all over the United States, then brought to a concentration point and stored, after being properly threaded, re-dipped, etc. The quantity is so immense that the steel will have to be forwarded in partial shipments, as we are able to locate it, in quantities of a few thousand pounds or more per shipment. We plan on a steady flow of material to our consignee so that he may keep his crews steadily employed. Mr. Erich Ney mentioned, in his first letter to us, that he would welcome our sending an inquiry to Mr. Ellis Gimbel, of the Gimbel Stores, Philadelphia. Mr. Gimbel answered our letter and stated that Mr. Ney is a distant relative but that he was not at this time fully informed about the project. Later, Mr. Gimbel cabled to Mr. Ney, and so now he, too, is informed of the purpose for which the pipes are intended. This seems to cover the subject to the extent of our ability at this end, at this time. We are forwarding our license application this date, under our Reference Number C L 3, to the O. I. T. Hoping you will see fit to sanction our effort to supply our Palestine Principal with this material, and that you will use your best efforts to assist the Department of Commerce in understanding the purpose for which it is intended, We are, as a firm, and individually, most respectfully yours, Harry Mouard Liscombe Peter Spinolli H. A number of us deeply concerned with the Direction of the Zionist Movement, in Palestine and in America would like you to join with us in presenting a program for the consideration of the Zionist Convention. We believe it essential that there be a reaffirmation of certain basic principles and that policies rather than candidates for office should be the major concern of the convention.

With the specific language subject to editing, we submit these major points:

FIRST-- While abhorring the policies of the mandatory government for Palestine, whose lawlessness breeds further disrespect for law and order, we unreservedly condemn the violence of those small groups in Palestine, which represent neither the Yishuv nor the traditional ethics of Zionism. We believe it imperative that the Zionist Organization of America ally itself unequivocally with the Yishuv on this issue, so that the terrorists may know themselves to be completely isolated from-

The two great Jewish bodies in Palestine and the United States, at the same time, we affirm our support of Haganah as Palestine Jewry's constituted instrument of resistance to the White Paper.

SECOND: We regard the aims and achievements of the Labor movement in Palestine as the framework of a Jewish society which will make for justice and freedom in Palestine and reflect credit and dignity upon Jews throughout the world. We disavow any program which, by direction or indirection, undermines the strength of the labor movement.

We re-emphasize that the Zionist program aims at establishing in Palestine a self-sustaining, physically and spiritually creative Jewish community.

THIRD: We repudiate as unworthy of American Zionism any attempt to make use of funds raised in the United States for Palestine as a Lever for imposing policies upon the Yishuv, it needs to be stressed that the Jewish communities of America, without regard to ideological preferences, are engaged in a great, sacrificial undertaking to provide.

Fifth: We urge American Zionists represented on the Jewish agency and on World Zionist Bodies to abandon Doctrinaire adherence to program for the immediate future of Palestine that are not attainable. We believe it urgent that as quickly as possible Palestine be enabled to absorb unrestricted Jewish immigration, without which the Jewish National Home is meaningless. We endorse the acceptance of any program for the future of Palestine which will permit unrestricted Jewish immigration and full authority for the autonomous development of an adequate Jewish Palestine.

Please wire me if you and or other delegates from your District are willing to sign such a program and to have your name used to bring about its adoption at the Zionist Convention.
