

Dear Mr. Torozyner:

At the King David Hotel in Jerusalem on January 9th, a meeting took place between Mr. Henry Montor, Vice-President of the American Financial Development Corporation for Israel, Mr. J. Serlin, Minister of Health, and Knesset Members Mr. H. Ariav and Mr. G. Flesch. Unfortunately, being unwell on that day, I was unable to attend.

However, I understand that the atmosphere was very cordial and the problems dealing with our assistance to and cooperation with the Independence Bond Drive in North America and other countries were discussed and clarified. Mr. Montor kindly asked to maintain close contact with us and his request was received in a favorable light. Likewise your relations with the Bond Drive were discussed and Mr. Montor expressed himself in favour of reaching an understanding with you.

A few days after his departure a meeting of the Executive was held and the talks with Mr. Montor reported. It was decided to accept his invitation that a member of the party, who would have powers to coordinate between us and the American Financial Development Corporation for Israel and yourselves, proceed to the U.S.A., and I take pleasure in informing you that the Executive has designated Mr. George Flesch, M.K., who enjoys our trust and support and who is on very cordial terms with Mr. Montor.

Mr. Flesch, who has been fully briefed, will be leaving for the U.S.A. shortly and will be glad to be of any service to you in reaching an understanding with the American Financial Development Corporation for Israel.



I am writing this day to thank Mr. Brasley for his very generous contribution. In this connection, I am somewhat disturbed by the fact that none of the funds which had been received by the 20A earmarked for Kfar Silver have as yet been forwarded to Israel. I understand that more than 830,000 has been received, and I know that you are earmarking these moneys, but earmarking is not enough. These funds are needed in Israel where they are engaged in building the school. I have received some disturbing letters from Israel. I realize that the ZOA finds itself in a tight financial situation, but assuredly these funds which are now badly needed in Igrael and which have been contributed by donors who have specifically earmarked them for Kfer Silver should not be used for any other purpose. The fact that an allocation has been made out of the General Zionist funds by the ZOA for this purpose in no way alters the situation. It was never intended that funds raised by the ZOA specifically for the Kfar Silver through the Zionist Fund or in other ways should be charged up against this allocation. It seems to me that whatever funds are received for the Kfar Silver should be forwarded as rapidly as possible to Israel. 

STATEMENT ON THE MASSACRE OF MARCH 17TH

The massacre at Scorpion Pass in the Negev, where eleven Israeli travelers were murdered by heavily-armed Arabs, must not be allowed to pass unnoticed by any segment of American public opinion. We must make clear the cause of such tragedies -- the persistent refusal of the Arab states to make peace with Israel and the failure of the major Powers, especially the United States, to Bring about a change in the Arab attitude.

A full statement on this subject was made by Rabbi Irving Miller, President of the Zionist Organization of America, on March 21, 1954 before the National Administrative Council of the Z.O.A. We are sending it to you for your guidance and urge you to call it to the attention of newspaper editors, columnists, radio and TV commentators, clergymen and other moulders of public opinion in your community. The text of the statement follows:

The most recent Arab outrage perpetrated against peaceful Israel citizens has brought the tensions in the Middle East almost to the breaking point. The massacre of March 17th, when eleven Israelis, including women and children, were machine-gunned in cold blood while traveling by bus in the Negev, is the latest in a series of murderous acts committed by Arab states against Israel. Full responsibility for this wanton killing must be borne by the government of Jordan, whose official denials are obviously designed to evade censure by the United Nations. Such denials are contemptible coming from a government which has ceaselessly and openly threatened war against Israel, and which has deliberately and maligiously fed the flames of hatred against Israel among its people. The heavily-armed Arabs who crossed from Jordan into Israel on their errand of murder were acting in the spirit of their government's official pronouncements.

This same government of Jordan has impudently rejected the long-standing request of the United Nations Secretary General that it meet with Israel in compliance with its obligations under the Armistice Agreements. A similar increase in hostility has characterized the behavior of the other Arab states towards Israel. Egypt maintains its blockade of the Suez Canal and the Gulf of Aqaba against Israel-bound shipping, in defiance of international law, of the Armistice Agreements, of a Security Council Resolution and of public opinion throughout the free world. Syria continues to bar the way to a peaceful settlement of the controversy over Jordan water development. Iraq repeatedly calls for Israel's destruction. The King of Saudi Arabia rants about sacrificing ten million Arabs in order to wipe out Israel.

Meanwhile, our State Department continues to woo these Arab states under the slogan of "impartiality", offering American arms to mations which publicly proclaim their aggressive designs against America's only true friend in that part of the world. If our State Department -more -

had hoped that its policy of coddling the arabs would result in the lessening of their intransigent attitude towards a peaceful settlement with Israel, recent events should have made it clear that the very opposite effect has been produced. The State Department's policy has only served to encourage the Arab politicians to believe that they can continue, and even intensify, their hostility against Israel with impunity.

We recall how hastily and energetically the State Department rushed forward to condemn Israel at the time of the tragic Kibya incident, which had been provoked by a long series of Jordanian attacks carried out against Israel's citizens without a word of reproof from our Government. The manner in which the Administration will act with respect to the massacre at Scorpion Pass will be carefully noted by Arabs and Israelis alike -- indeed, by public opinion everywhere -- and conclusions will be drawn by all concerned.

Finally, if we really wish to avoid the repetition of such tragedies and to save other innocent people, both Israelis and Arabs, from death and suffering, we must eradicate the cause of these incidents -- and do so without delay. There will be no end to this misery until there is peace, which Israel wants, but which the Arab states reject. The indefensible attitude of the Arab states is clearly the root of the problem, and the failure of the major Powers, especially the United States, to bring about a change in that attutude is equally responsible for the present situation. Our State Department would be playing a more constructive role if it were to concentrate on this fundamental problem. If the Arabs are told that they will no longer be appeased at Israel's expense -- and if they know that we mean it -- there will be peace. Our government should undertake to discharge this task for the sake of stability in an area which is vital to American interests and in defense of the democratic way of life.



Some weeks ago you asked me to make inquiries about the best procedure for sending funds to Kfar Silver. At that time I sent a memorandum to Emanuel Neumann, believing him to be in the best position to provide the information. Today I received word from Emanuel that he would see to it that the matter is properly handled after he receives details concerning the sum involved. I assume that you will wish to convey this information to him.

I have also received a reply on another matter of mutual interest which has been pending for some time. You will recall that I had discussed a Hebrew translation of "Vision and Victory" with an Israeli correspondent, Joseph Nedava, who was to interest an Israeli publisher in undertaking the publication of the book. Nedava has informed me that, despite his early optimism, the publisher concerned (Pali, I believe) has hesitated to proceed with the venture on a private enterprise (i.e. non-subsidized) basis. However, I still think that the idea is sound and intend to make further inquiries.

I imagine that you are just as disturbed as I am over the steady deterioration of the political situation. I am appalled by the blunders which have been committed by some of our friends in the Israel government -and the public relations set-up of the Zionist movement in this country is a very bad joke. The reorganization which finally took place after almost two years of discussion and negotiations has only served to complicate matters further, and the movement is today almost totally devoid of direction in political matters. I have been trying to do what little I can from here within the framework of the new set-up, but I am the first to admit that this is wholly inadequate. I shall not trouble you with the details in this letter, but am prepared to provide you with all of the particulars if you should request them.

I cannot tel! you how deeply embarrassed I am over the contents of your letter of May 4.

I hope you will permit me to write these lines to you confidentially and to give you an official reply after next Monday's Inner and Finance Committees meeting. Frankly, the question involved is not only the matter of the Estate of Issac Segel of Boston, but a far greater amount is involved.

Of course, you will appreciate that my dutie; are confined to fund raising and that I can only use pressure but have no jurisdiction over the dispersion of the funds.

From what I understand, Rabbi Miller undertook to pay \$50,000 in the current year to our friends who are building Kfar Silver. I am happy to inform you that we have raised very close to that amount, specifically earmarked towards the agricultural school which is to bear your name. However, the problem is one of appropriating such amount to Kfar Silver.

As I understand, we have to date transferred IL10,000 to Israel, and we are now in the process of transferring a \$5,000 bond, which we received from Mr. Brasley of Pittsburgh. We are having some difficulty in this connection, since Dr. Wirklich, the chairman of the Board of Regents of Kfar Silver, feels that he will not be able to make use of this bond, although we have ascertained that the Government will cooperate fully with him on it. In any case, this \$5,000 is in the works, so to speak, which would bring the amount transferred to date to \$10,000.

As you can well imagine, I feel as strongly as you do that all monies specifically donated for this purpose be transferred immediately and, as I mentioned above, I shall do my utmost to see that on Monday positive action is taken.



Dear Dr. Silver:

A short time ago you called my attention to the forthcoming history of the Jews in America by Oscar Handlin, and suggested that someone should interest himself in the volume in order to ensure that the role of American Jewry in bringing about Israel's establishment was properly treated. The stimulation of books which serve the interests of the Movmement is one of the functions of the new department which Emenuel Neumann is heading in the Jewish Agency. I have therefore called his attention to this matter.

In this cornection --- a few days ago I came across the new American edition of Paul Goodman's History of the Jews, for which you wrote an excellent introduction, (The publishers had neglected to send me a copy of the volume after it came off the press.) You will recall that I was invited by the publishers to contribute a chapter on the role of American Jewry after you called their attention to the omission of this important part of the story from the new chapter; written by Israel Cohen. I was glad to note that the book jacket featured the section I contributed, but was somewhat piqued to find no acknowledgement of my authorship in Israel Cohen's preface, a courtesy which should have been routine. Of course, I was paid for my effort, but that should not have affected the normal acknowledgement.

It is, however, a small matter -- and I really should not trouble you about it, except that I recalled it in connection with your note about Handlin's for the oming history.

Dear Dr. Silver:

Arieh Gelblum telephoned me yesterday in order to transmit the contents of a United Press dispatch, datelined Washington, which has been published in the Israeli press.

The dispatch quotes governmental sources as saying that at the time of your recent visit to the White House you were informed that the White House has not transmitted to the State Department any criticism of the Byroade speech and that the White House does not intend to intervene in the matter. The dispatch states further that you visited the White House on another matter, but took occasion to bring up the question of the Byroade speech. The Assistant to the President informed you that the President does not wish to interfere and is leaving everything in the hands of the State Department.

Gelblum ventured a guess that the UP approached the White House on this matter after receiving word from its correspondent in Israel that one of Gelblum's dispatches from here had mentioned that you had visited the White House, where you discussed the question of Byroade's speech.

Since the UP is a world-wide service and is used also by some newspapers in the Arab world the effects of this story can be very damaging, especially the implication that the White House is not responsive to the influence of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver.

I have asked Gelblum to send you the Hebrew text.





Dear Mr. Secretary:

It is with satisfaction that we learned of your assurance, given to the Israeli ambassador, that the United States government values highly the friendship of the State of Israel. As Americans and Zionists, we firmly believe that this friendship is mutual because it is rooted deeply in the hearts of the peoples, and that it is in keeping with their best interests. At this time, when the United States is undertaking to stem the tide of world-wide Communist imperialism, it is reassuring to know that our government views Israel as a nation whose position is of importance in the alignment of forces defending the freedom and peace of the world.

However, we deem it our duty to convey to you the profound uneasiness engendered by the recent policy of the State Department towards the Arab States. Specifically, we refer to the supplying of arms to Iraq and the attempt to win the cooperation of the other Arab States with the objective of building a defense-line against Soviet aspirations in the Middle East. We must view such a policy as highly illusory and fraught with danger to the security of the United States and its democratic allies.

The record of the Arab states, in war and peace, indicates that they can hardly be considered of real military and political value. However we might wish it otherwise, they cannot be trusted as allies or friends in time of need. These States are not guided by the same democratic principles and way of life which we of the Western world cherish, and which are our main strength in the struggle against totalitarian Communism. The danger of a Communist thrust into the Middle East is so imminent that we cannot afford to waste our strength and resources on building defense positions in Arab quicksand.

May we remind you, Mr. Secretary, that during the last war with the Nazi enemy, the Arab states had their sympathies and hopes in Hitler's camp.

Iraq virtually stabbed Great Britain in the back in her most perilous hour, despite the fact that Great Britain had been her benefactor and ally, and it was Great Britain which fought the Ottoman Empire, freed Iraq and gave her independence.

When Mussolini's fascist hordes invaded Egypt, together with the Nazi Panzer divisions, the Egyptian government did not lift a finger to defend that country's independence and to join the Allies in the fight against the totalitarian enslaught. Instead, they conspired with the invaders and the British were compelled to use force to prevent betrayal.

The spokesman for Arab nationalism, the former Mufti of Jerusalem, although appeased and coddled by Great Britain, made his wartime headquarters in Berlin, from whence he sought to rally the Arab world to oppose the Allies and support Hitler. Today, the Mufti is again active in the Arab countries, unleashing his hatred against the Western world.

There is no firm and determined anti-Communist and pro-Allied attitude on the part of the quickly shifting Arab regimes. There is no crystallized public opinion, no democratic tradition, no realization of the impending danger, no feeling of solidarity with the West. To place reliance upon the Arab states is like leaning on a broken rod.

We realize the need for the United States to build up a dam against the wave of Communism. It would be, however, highly unreasonable to expect that the Arab states can be cemented into such a dam. The martial record of the Arab armies in recent years proves conclusively that their military value is of very slight consequence.

In their onslaught on the hastily improvised, poorly armed and untrained Israeli defense forces in 1948, the Arab aggressors -- superior in arms and training, and outnumbering them five to one -- displayed such weakness that there is every reason to believe that no amount of American weapons will be able to convert them, within the foreseeable future, into a military force of real value.

In the final analysis, the strength of an army lies not only in its equipment, but in the purposefulness and integrity of its leadership, and in the spirit, devotion and determination of each soldier to fight for his cause. The Arab military machinery obviously does not possess these qualities. Why, then, waste good American money and valuable military equipment on vain attempts to achieve an impossible goal?

You will remember that President Eisenhower, in his speech before the Committee for Economic Development, in Washington,

on May 20th, uttered a profound truth when he stated: "Now, everyone knows that no security force is any good at all unless it is one of fine morale, belief and conviction."

There can hardly be any coubt that for many years to come no Arab army, no matter how magnificently equipped, would be able to withstand, or even to delay, an attack by Communist troops. Any Arab state so attacked will be quickly overrun, and American equipment will inevitably fall into the hands of the enemy.

May we suggest, Mr. Secretary, that our State Department stop appeasing the unappeasable Arab politicians, whose power is extremely evanescent, anyway. We ask you to reconsider the entire American policy in the Middle East with a view to establishing a realistic defensible position there against Soviet encroachment.

In addition to considerations of spiritual kinship between the mightiest and smallest democracies of the free world, we beg you to take into account also the realistic value of Israel's industrial potential in peace and war.

Israel, with its young, valiant army, its fervent devotion to the ideals of democracy and freedom, should be integrated, not merely with words, but with deeds, into the ranks of the allies to defend the Middle East against a potential Soviet attack.

An Israeli military force of 10 to 12 divisions, if properly outfitted with the most recent developments in the military field, can be America's most effective first line of defense in that region.

It is to America's best advantage to take into account the industrial and technological potential of the State of Israel. In World War II, the then embryonic industry of that country played a decisive role in the defense of the Eastern Mediterranean, and the continuing growth of Israeli industry is a factor which cannot be overlooked.

In the ideological struggle between the free and the enslaved world, the voice of Zion, in the land of the Bible, the cradle of religion, which gave the democratic world the human values by which we are inspired and live, will add strength to the democratic camp in its fight for the dignity of man, for justice and liberty.

ARE WE REALLY IMPARTIAL?

The 1300-page transcript of the hearings before the House
Committee on Foreign Affairs on the 1954 Mutual Security Act
deals with many controversial aspects of the American aid program to the Near East and also with some of the political issues
which affect the relations between Israel and the Arab states,
and our own policy in that area.

After reading the transcript, we believe it desirable and
necessary to submit some comments, in the hope that we may be
helpful in clarifying some of the issues that were raised.

We wish to make clear that we were impressed by the objec-

tive evidence submitted by officials of both the Department of State and the Foreign Operations Administration on the justification for the continuation of economic assistance to the Near East. On the other hand, we are deeply disturbed by the political testimony submitted by some of the officials of the Department of State, for in our judgment they reveal that the implementation of

American policy in the Hear East is not faithful to our professed impartiality.

Economic Aid to Israel

Both Assistant Secretary of State Henry A. Byroade and Mr. Norman S. Paul of the Foreign Operations Administration reported to the Committee on the effective use that Israel has made of the assistance which our government has rendered to that country in the past.

"The funds in Israel have been used well," Mr. Byroade said (p. 205), while Mr. Paul recorded all those factors in Israel's economy which have brought about a substantial improvement and which promise that Israel is on the way to economic independence (p. 210).

It is our hope that economic aid to Israel will be continued on the level of the last year and will not be reduced, for it would be unfortunate if the progress that has been made would now be arrested by an untimely and premature reduction in our assistance.

We would refer to two issues raised in the hearings:

- 1. The allocation of funds in the area.
- 2. Israel's agricultural development.

- 2 -The Fallacy of Mechanical Comparison The claim is sometimes made that we have been unfair to the Arab states because we have given more aid to Israel than we have allotted to them. This criticism is buttressed by mathematical calculations showing that the per capita figure for Israel is fargreater than that for the Arab countries. Both Mr. Arthur Z. Gardiner (Politico-Economic Adviser, Bureau of Near Eastern, South Asian and African Affairs, Department of State) and Mr. Paul have dealt effectively with this question, for Mr. Gardiner has reported to the Committee of the "demonstrated need" and the "demonstrated ability" to make use of aid in Israel (p. 653) and how it has been difficult to get engineering projects started in the Arab countries, some of which have not needed our assistance. Thus, Mr. Gardiner points out, "there is no such case of need to feed Syria" and "Iraq clearly doesn't need the money." For a concise statement on this issue, one should turn to the letter written by Mr. Paul to Congressman Javits, which may be found on page 1188 of the record and which reads, in part, as follows: "2. Levels of aid are not determined by population numbers. "3. In view of the many considerations entering into the granting of economic assistance, it is misleading, if not impossible, to compare the needs of Israel on the one hand and the Arab states on the other in terms of total magnitude or per capita benefits. The nature and source of these needs differ from each other and change with time. Quite different economies are invalved, as you point out, and many other factors -- the existence of an emergency, the need for support to assure national survival, the availability of suitable and adequately engineered projects, absorptive capacity and willingness to comply with United States legislative conditions -- may have a bearing not revealed through such comparisons. It is only fair to add, however, that the substantial oil royalties available to some Arab states do not lessen the needs of others and that the demands of large-scale refugee resettlement may yet be an important factor in the Arab states as well as Israel. "4. Individual Arabs in prominent positions have advocated that the United States government aid to Israel and the Arab states 'be equated at zero', and the Arab League is on record as denouncing aid to Israel. In part, because of Arab preoccupation with the Palestine problem, there was a period in which there was relatively little Arab interest in aid for themselves, despite a serious accentuation of economic imbalances attended by social unrest. In recent years, however, there has been a growing appreciation of the need to meet some basic economic problems. As a result there is a great deal of present interest in an economic aid program, and negotiations with several of the Arab states are now in progress."

Israel's Agricultural Development

A recurring theme in the hearings is the belief of some members that Israel has failed to turn its new immigrants into farmers and that accordingly its agricultural development has been unsatisfactory.

Every fair-minded person will recognize the difficulties of transforming middle-class townsfolk -- refugees from concentration camps and ghettos who have never touched the soil--into productive farmers, especially when starved and eroded lands must be reclaimed from centuries of neglect and desolation. Horeover, it should be borne in mind that Arab border raids are not innocent perambulations. They are designed to terrorize Israel's bonder settlements and force Israel's new farmers to retreat from remote areas to the cities. Yet, despite these great handicaps, Israel has made remarkable agricultural progress. Thus, ir. Cardiner, replying to this criticism, points out that between 1948 and 1952, the urban population in Israel doubled, while the rural population tripled, showing that an increasing proportion of the Jewish population in Israel is going to the land. The rural population was 330,000 as of December 31, 1952 (p. 602) and ir. Gardiner points out that the Israel farmers are up against the difficulty that the "countryside is less safe" than the cities.

The most striking facts may be found in the statistics submitted by Mr. Paul (pp. 1189-91). Between 1948 and 1953, the cultivated area in Israel expanded from 412,000 acres to one million; the irrigated area from 72,000 to 160,000. The value of agricultural products, exclusive of citrus, doubled. Vegetable production almost tripled. The number of cases of citrus fruit exported rose from 3,864,000 in 1949 to 7,965,000 in 1954, as of May. These gains could not have been accomplished if it had not been for the fact that Israel was devoting a great deal of its concern and attention to the recruitment and training of farmers from its urban population and to the development of its agricultural economy. The Israelis have been forced to live on the most austere diet since the state was established and they regard agricultural self-sufficiency as their major need and undertaking.

The Political Testimony

In any discussion of the continuing Arab-Israel conflict, it is difficult to distinguish between propaganda and fact. Yet, everyone who has followed history since 1948 knows that the Arab states went to war against the 1947 United Nations decision in an effort to prevent Israel's establishment and that, having failed and now hoping to recoup their defeat, they have since blockaded and boycotted Israel's economy, rejecting all proposals to enterinto any direct negotiations.

But the testimony submitted by Mr. Gardiner would seem to shift responsibility for the lack of peace from the Arab states to Israel. Throughout his testimony, he calls upon Israel to make concessions to the Arab states in advance of any peace negotiations. He makes no such demands upon the Arab states, who are therefore permitted to infer that, until Israel makes such concessions, they are not obliged in any way to deal with Israel.

This is most regrettable, for it appears to us that we have now abandoned any pretense of avowed impartiality. The Arab states are fortified in their refusal to answer the summons of the United Nations to sit down to discuss peace with Israel, as Jordan has recently refused to do, and they are encouraged to exact larger and larger concessions from Israel and from our own country as the price for the abandonment of their hostility.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has condemned the Soviet Union for its "attempts to create pre-conditions" to a conference "which will gain for it many of the results which it would hope to get cut of the conference." It would seem that the Communist policy which ir. Dulles has so roundly condemned is quite similar to the Arab policy which hr. Cardiner seemed so determined to defend.

What do we ask from the Arabs?

It is instructive to record Mr. Gardiner's answers to the questions put to him by Congressman Jacob K. Javits of New York. Mr. Javits asked Mr. Gardiner, "What is it we expect of the Arab states?. . .what do we represent to them that we want them to do?" Mr. Gardiner replied:

"We would like to see the Arab states develop their economies. We would like to see them better off materially. We would like to see them grow more food in their own countries. We would like to see them continue to develop their

mineral resources, and particularly their oil, in an orderly and effective way.

"We still place high value on the importance of that resource to the free world in general. We would like to see them develop more stable governments. We would like to have them able to develop the police, the gendarmerie and the military forces which would increase their resistance to subversion. We would like, in due course--and it will take many years--to develop genuine defensive strength in that region so it does not remain a power vacuum." (p. 628)

All this, of course, is most commendable, but in this preliminary reply to Mr. Javits' question, Mr. Gardiner does not disclose that we are asking the Arab states to revise their anti-Israel policy in any way.

Continuing his questioning, ir. Javits elicited from Mr. Gardiner that we have been making some representations to the Arab countries on refugee resettlement and that we have deplored border incidents. But if our Department of State is asking the Arab countries to comply with United Mations decisions and to call off their illegal boycotts and blockades and to sit down and talk peace with Israel, Mr. Gardiner is keeping that a secret.

What do we ask from Israel?

On the other hand, when Mr. Javits asked Mr. Gardiner, "What have we represented to Israel that we want of Mer?" Mr. Gardiner replied:

"We would like to see Israel develop and maintain the rescurces of its country. We would like to see Israel take steps to compensate the Arab refugees. We would like to see Israel take steps to unfreeze still further the frozen bank accounts of the Arabs. We would like to see Israel reach terms with the United Nations regarding the division of the waters of the Jordan River so that it will be possible to erect in the Jordan Valley structures for a dependable supply of water which will increase the agricultural potential of the Jordan Valley.

"We would like to see Israel consider still further possibilities of repatriation of the Arab refugees, realizing full well that repatriation can only be a partial solution of the Arab refugee problem.

"We would like to see Israel take steps to reassure the Arabs that they have no further intentions to expand the State of Israel." (p. 632).

The remarkable contrast between these two statements is a revealing indictment of current policy. It shows that Mr. Gardiner associates himself with Arab demands upon Israel and that he has become an apologist for the Arab refusal to make peace. There is no longer any doubt as to why Arab belligerence against Israel has mounted during the last year and why peace is further off than ever before.

The Niyth of Israel's Expansion

Mr. Gardiner takes seriously alleged Arab fears that Israel must inevitably expand because of its immigration policy. Here there is a startling difference of opinion between him and his superior, Mr. Myroade. In his May 1 speech, Mr. Byroade dwelt upon Arab fears of Israel expansion, but he was fair enough to refer to this as "a specter which does not seem to be based upon reality." (p. 475).

But Mr. Gardin er insists that the Arabs do have cause for alarm. He said:

"I think that if you listen to certain influential Israeli leaders, you have every cause for alarm. When they talk about the possible increase in the population to 4 million people, particularly. . . as of the next two or three years."

Mr. Gardiner knows, as Mr. Byroade himself testified, that immigration to Israel has fallen off almost completely and is virtually balanced by emigration.

Mr. Paul submitted official statistics showing immigration figures into Israel: In 1948 - 102,000; 1949 - 240,000; 1950 - 170,000; 1951 - 174,000; 1952 - 23,000; 1953 - 10,000 (p. 606). Thus, it will be seen that immigration into Israel began to fall after 1951, following the mass expulsion of the 120,000 Jews of Iraq. It has since gone down because sources of immigration have dried up. And Mr. Byroade said:

"Immigration is stopped to the point where the numbers outgoing exceeded the incoming in the last three to four months." (p. 482)

Under the circumstances, it is difficult to understand why any official of the Department of State should accept Arab propaganca on this issue without challenge. It is not new propaganda. It is a myth that goes back many years. As far back as 1930, when the Jewish population of all Palestine was only 160,000, a British Commission reported that there wasn't room for any more settlers. Yet, today, there are 1,669,000 Jews and Arabs in Israel (which is smaller than Palestine) and the country is still far from crowded. In 1929, the population density for Palestine was 96 people per square mile. Today, the population density in Israel is 211, but that is not a high figure by any means. It is much higher in many other countries. It is 739 in Belgium, 679 in the Netherlands, 537 in the United Kingdom, 306 in Switzerland, 267 in Denmark, all countries which, despite their large populations, have a higher per capita income than Israel. Even Lebanon, Israel's northern neighbor, has a population density of 330. If population density were the criterion, then Israel would have more to fear from Lebanon than Lebenon from Israel.

If our State Department were really persuaded that Israel had no more room for more people, then it should, once and for all, stop asking Israel to accept the return of some of the Arab refugees. In truth, Arab propaganda on this issue goes down in clashing contradiction. On the one hand, the Arabs insist that Israel is overcrowded and must reduce its immigration lest it be compelled to burst its frontiers and seize their territory. On the other hand, pro-Arab spokesmen in our country call upon Israel to increase its population by accepting the return of Arab refugees and, simultaneously, to make the country even more crowded by ceding some territory to its neighbors as a concession to win peace.

What can Israel do to reassure its Arab neighbors that it will not expand? The more crucial question is what the Arabs should do to reassure Israel that they will not attack. The truth is that Israel has repeatedly offered to enter into a peace treaty with the Arab states, based on existing frontiers. It is the Arabs—not the Israelis—who want to change the frontier, for the Arabs are always demanding that Israel surrender territory in advance of any negotiations.

Finally, it is a fact that the Great Powers have guaranteed the frontiers. If America's guarantee is not enough to assure the Arabs, then what effective guarantees can Israel give? - 8 -

The Substance of the Issue

But we cannot close the discussion of the issue of Jewish immigration into Israel without putting upon the record our distress and our dismay that one of the most dramatic and humanitarian undertakings in history has been smudged and smeared by an unwholesome and discreditable acquiescence in tawdry propaganda.

The State of Israel was not created as an end in itself. It was established so that there might be some place in the world where the door would be open, and where Jews would be welcome, where Jews might enter as of right, and not on sufferance. The international community, the United Mations, recognized the need for the fulfillment of this age-long aspiration after the holocaust of World War II, in which six million Jews were murdered. There was an urgent need to provide sanctuary for the survivors, who had no place to go, after their liberation from the concentration camps. (There is utterly no foundation for the suggestion that the Zionists, because of their preoccupation with Israel as a national homeland in some way defeated plans to settle Jews elsewhere. All Jewish organizations, Zionist and non-Zionist, joined in advocating legislation to liberalize our own immigration laws, so that Jewish refugees might come into this country).

Jews everywhere in the world are proud of the restoration of the Jewish people to its ancient homeland. And American Jews are doubly proud because of our own great country's contribution. There could be no more sordid anti-climax to this great historic redemption than to suggest that the Jewish state should now post a sign in the harbor of Haifa: "No more Jews may enter here." Only one completely insensitive to the long history of twenty centuries of dispersion and wandering could entertain a proposal twisting the Jewish state into a sardonic caricature.

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Arms for Iraq

We have, on previous occasions, registered our misgivings about the Administration's proposal to make arms available to Iraq, a country which has never signed an armistice agreement with Israel, which forced virtually all of its Jewish population to flee in 1951, and which mobilizes anti-Israel sentiment in the Arab League. We find it difficult to accept the enthusiasm of Mr. Byroade and Mr. Gardiner for their plan to place arms at the disposal of the Iraqi government. We question Mr. Gardiner's belief that the furnishing of arms to Iraq "can turn out to be a stabilizing force in the area." Me fear that, once again, as in Syria and in Egypt,

the Department of State is reposing its confidence in regimes which cannot have stability because they are undemocratic and do not derive their strength and support from the consent of those they govern.

It remains our conviction that the arms that we send to Iraq are more likely to be used against Israel, or for the purposes of internal repression, than for the defense of the region against international communism. We do not believe that we will win the friendship of the people of Iraq if our weapons are used in the streets of Baghdad against them.

Finally, we detect a curious contradiction in the testimony submitted by Mr. Byroade. In justifying our assistance to Iraq, he has stated:

"There is a new spirit in Iraq. For the first time, you have the government of that country going around making open and effective anti-Communist speeches." (p. 485)

A few seconds later, Congressman Vorys called ir. Byroade's attention to the recent Iraqi "speech from the throne" which emphasized Iraq's anti-Israel policy. He asked whether this was typical of the public viewpoint of the Iraqi government. Hr. Byroade replied:

"It is typical of some of the speeches that are made for domestic political purposes."

We are not inclined to dismiss the anti-Israel speeches so lightly for these issue from the highest Iraqi officials -- from the throne itself. If ir. Byroade discounts these as speeches "intended for demestic political purposes," how can he be so sure that the open and effective "anti-Communist speeches" to which he previously referred here are not being made for external political purposes?

What device does Mr. Byroade use to determine when an Iraqi political speech is to be regarded as legitimate and taken seriously?

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Conclusion

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In conclusion, we believe that Arab-Israel peace can be attained if our government makes it clear to the Arabs as well as to the Israelis that we want peace. Representatives of Israel and the Arab states must sit down in direct negotiations looking towards a reconciliation of all outstanding problems. They must

be urged to take this course as the one means of securing cooperation for development and defense so essential if the threat of international Communism is to be met in the Hear East. We do not believe that there is any ready-made peace plan that can be imposed upon the parties, and negotiations must be freely carried out without external coercion or pressure. We shall not gain peace in the Wear East if we are defeatist or if we gloss over the failure of the Arab states to respond to their international obligations. It is not impartiality to bring pressure against one side and to pamper and coddle the other.

We reaffirm our conviction that America can continue to contribute effectively to peace and defense in the Near East by our great economic assistance programs. We believe that the Congress of the United States must be commended for its support of these programs in the past and trust that this support will be continued.

The Zionist Swan Song

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver's speech at the 57th annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America (ZOA) last week was not only the highlight of the meeting, but also its raison d'etre. Practically the entire interest of the convention seemed to revolve around that address and the meeting was clearly called to provide a platform for it.

The speech was a crucial one and will doubtless go down as the swan song of the Zionist movement in America. That movement has been hard pressed and on the defensive ever since the emergence of the State of Leacl. During the last year its position had become desperate. It was attacked on all sides, by enemies and friends, in Israel and outside it, from within and from without. Nationalists like Ben Gurion attacked American Zionists for not being nationalistic enough on the ground that they are not leaving their American homes and settling in Israel. Anti-nationalists attacked them as too nationalistic on the ground that they still cling theoretically to Kibbiata Golanos. Liberal Zionists, like Rabbi Mordecai M. Kaplan, Rabbi Eisenstein and Maurice Samuel, counselled a modified "New Zionism".

Worse then this ideological offensive, however, was the new critical attitude to Zionism on the part of the State Department and other branches of the government. It was in order to meet this attack from all sides, to retrieve the rapidly losing position, to stem the tide of criticism, that Rabbi Silver was called in to save the ZOA, which he led in is days of power and success, from complete disintegration.

Rabbi Silver responded to the call, despite the fact that the rank and file of the ZOA east him and his group aside to follow Ben Gurion as soon as the State was established and Silver's usefulness seemed to be over. His peech can be described as the last plea of a good defense attorney before the verdiet is brought in by the jury, or as the last attempt of a general to rally his retreating army to make a final stand and even to launch a counter-offensive. It was a speech derivered by a master orator who has clearly not lost the power of swaving and earrying his audiences. It called forth a momentary echo of past glory and enthusiasm. But it failed definitely in its chief purpose. It made no dent in the great encircling movement of the attacking forces. It did not stop the retreat of his own army. It did not even permanently raise its morale by providing it with a plausible justification for continuing the lost fight. The best and the worst that can be said about the speecl is that it was a swan song, an attempt to recapture a melody of better days, and to build upon it as if it were a solid fourniation.

A Revival of Militancy

Rabbi Silver seemed aware of this fact. H: reminisced nostalgically about his appearance and a speech he delivered on the same platform eleven years ago when he carried the Zionist movement in a militant decision to adopt a resolution calling for

the immediate establishment of a Jewish Commonwealth. He callec for a revival of that spirit and for a repetition of performanees of those days. He dismissed the internal liberal critics of Zionism by saying "There are people who are calling for a new Zionism, for new definitions and new philosophies. Unfortunately, I have none to offer to you. What we need is not a new philosophy, but a renewed dedication to the great cause to which we, by our efforts in the past, have contributed so much, but which is not yet fully consummated." His was an appeal for a return to the past, to the era of militant American Zionism, when American Zionists spearheaded and sponsored the terrorist movement which fanned the embers of early nationalism into the flames of Israeli chauvinism of today. It was evident that Silver and the bulk of American Zionists still live in the memory of those 'glorious' days of their greatest success and that they are blind to the fact that a new world has arisen during the last decade, and that they cannot repeat successfully past performances. This was exactly what Silver tried to do.

It was a speech just as uncharitable in spir't and as militant in words as any of eleven years ago. He attacked the State Department with the same bitterness and in the same intemperate language as Zionists attacked the British Foreign Office a decade ago. He charged that Messrs, Byroade and Gardiner did not speak for their Department and did not reflect the thoughts and feelings of President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles on the Middle East. He implied that the State Department spokesmen were not motivated by the interests of the United States in their Middle East policy, but by personal bias against Israel which, he broadly hinted, was of an anti-semitic character — an insinuation openly used by Zionists against the late Ernest Bevin and still widely used today against any non-Jew opposed to the excesses of Zionism.

Worse still, he revived with a new vigor the contemptible technique of American Zionists of smearing every anti-Zionist Jew as a "traitor" and "informer"—a technique which more than anything else has negraded the organized American Jewish community during the last quarter of a century to the spiritual level of totalitarian nationalistic extremists who, like McCarthy, equate their party with the entire nation and make disagreement with them equivalent to treason. Like most Zionist rabbis, he forgot that he was not only a political Zionist, but also a spiritual leader of Jews and appealed to hidden fears and passions of his listeners to arouse their hatred and contemps for fellow Jews who do not share his particular brand of militant Zionism. In short, he made an open bid to arouse hates and hysteria of eleven years ago as a means of renewing and transferring the fight of Zionism against Great Britain to American soil.

History Cannot Be Repeated

What has not been realized by Rabbi Silver and American Zionists now in their desperate effort to save their movement is: (1) that history cannot be repeated by merely repeating external tactics of procedure and propaganda (2) that the political situation in the United States now is not the same as in England a decade ago; that the United States at the height of its world leadership is not likely to yield to organized Zionist pressure as did England; (3) that Israel of today no longer has the same humanitarian and emotional appeal to the non-Jewish and Jewish world that the Jewish National Home had before it became a state and when millions of Jews were still in danger of Nazi extermination; (4) that the bulk of American Jews (and even of American Zionists) will not place the interests of Israel above those of the United States when a choice between the two will have to be made.

Above all, Rabbi Silver and the ZOA failed to realize the all important fact that the time when Zionism could be of political help to Israel has passed. Unlike a decade ago, Zionism is no longer a help, but a political millstone on the neck of Israel, and the sooner Zionists outside Israel stop "helping" the new State with anything but economic aid and relief, the healthier it will be for all. For Israel, if it is to have peace, must become another State in the Middle East, while Zionism cannot exist without dreams of a World Jewry with world frontiers and world power. The sooner this dangerous ideological dream is separated from the political reality of Israel, the better for all.

NEWS IN REVIEW

Churchill for "Arab Rights and Legitimate Zionist Aspirations". Winston Churchill, in his press interview in Washington stated that he was a Zionist from the days of the Baifour Declaration. Peace between Arabs and Israelis, he said, was possible. Old Palestine 2,000 years ago supported more people than there are now in the area. "We not only can greatly increase the population of the area, but we can bring harmony there which will be a security and not an element of anxiety in the Middle East. Let us be tolerant and let us be friendly, and let us surpport Arab rights and help the legitimate Zionist aspirations."

While antisemitism in its old-fashioned forms of open hate-propaganda and rowdyism is definitely on the decline in the United States now, nevertheless it is assuming new forms which are more serious than is generally recognized. This is the sum total of a number of reports submitted to the annual conference of the National Community Relations Advisory Council (NCRAC) in Atlantic City. Specifically, the reports claimed that there is still much discrimination against Jews in employment in large industrial, commercial and banking enterprises. This discrimination is not being felt at present because employment is high among Jews. But it may become a danger in the future when unemployment will rise. "In 1944, the principal concern of Jewish community relations agencies was antisemitism in its most direct expression-Nazi inspired literature, the canard of the domestic antisemitism that Jews had finagled the United States into the war, physical assaults on Jews, desceration of synagogues and the like," stated Isaiah Mindoff, General Secretary of NC-RAC and he recommended that Jewish community relations bodies should deal with "the underlying causes rather than with the surface manifestations." Jewish agencies must be "advocates of great positive purposes rather than being mere watchmen of our own rights." (The NCRAC is the coordinating body, representing the American Jewish Congress, the Jewish Labor Committee, the Jewish War Veterans, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, and a number of local Jewish communities which generally lean more toward na ionalistic concepts. It does not include the larger and older American Jewish Committee and the Anti-Defamation League which broke away from NCRAC two years ago.

Conditions on the Israeli-Jordan frontier have deteriorated following a new incident at the border settlement of Meyoot Betar at which three Israelis were killed. The United Nations Armistice Commission, from which Israel withdrew several menths ago, found that the Israelis were killed when they crossed into Jordan territory. This has further increased the tersion and is largely responsible for the rejection of an American-British-French proposal for strengthening the UN truce machinery with a view to lessening tension. Among the proposals was one that Israel should return to the Truce Commission because its absence from the Commission makes thorough investigations harder, if not impossible. Israel however, holds out against returning to the Commission and demands the replacement of General Vagn Bennike, the present chairman of the Commission whom it accuses of anti-Israeli bias. This the Western Powers refuse to do.

d bill was introduced in the Israels Knesset to limit foreign language newspapers in the country and place them in a second-class category as compared with the dominant Hebrew language newspapers. Among the foreign languages is included also Yiddish. The bill has called forth considerable criticism, both in Israel and among pro-Zionists in this country. The opposition to the bill is based on two points; First, why discriminate against foreign language in general? Is not such discrimination an undemocratic act against which Jews in particular have always protested in all countries of their abode as a minority? Secondly, and more important, why should Yiddish be included among the foreign languages to be discriminated against in a so-called Jewish State?

It was this second point that aroused the protest of even Zionists and pro-Zionists in Israel and in this country. The American Yieldish Writers Union, the Jewish Labor Committee, the Congress for Yieldish Culture and the Yieldish Pen Club have reservant official statement protesting against the absurdity of classifying Yieldish, which is the language of the bulk of the Jewish people as a foreign language in Israel. On the other hand, Ducar, the official organ of the government Mapai Party (Socialist), in an editorial of June 3rd, states the official Israeli position toward Yieldish as follows:

It will be impossible to crystallize a new Israeli society; it will be impossible to overcome the diaspora mentality and habits of dependence and slavery, if Hebrew is not to be the only language in the home and in the State, in the workshop, business and every-day life. The schools and the Army are already helping considerably to solve this problem. But they alone will not be able to accomplish this task in our generation. It requires comprehensive social activities and it requires a State law.

The first eye-citness report by an American necespaperman on Birohidjan was published last week in the New York Times by Mr. Harrison E. Salisbury, its Moscow correspondent. Birohidjan now has a population of 200,000 including an estimated 100,000 Jews. But there is nothing to show, except for a few signs in Yiddish and in Russian and a Yiddish Communist newspaper entitled Birohidzaner Shtern with a circulation of 1,000 copies, that the place is an Autonom-us Jewish Province and the Soviet equivalent of Zionism that it was supposed to have been when it was started twenty years ago. An article on the history, background and failure of this Soviet "Zionist" project will appear in the next issue of the Jewish Newsletter.

Seventy-two American Jews have answered Israel's call for the Ingathering of the Exiles and will leave the United States to settle permanently in Israel this summer. Thirty have already left on the S. S. Jerusalem last week. They included businessmen, professionals, students, teachers and members of Zionist Youth Alyah groups.

More on the "Dangerous Master Plan"

A reader and friend of the sewish Newsletter who is also a leader of a well-known American Jewish organization and was present at the famous meeting at which Dr. Goldmann's plan for unifying and coordinating the activities of all American Jewish organizations in behalf of Israel was discussed and accepted, has criticized rather sharply our report of the meeting ("A Dangerous Master Plan", JN, June 7). Our friend, who prefers to remain anonymous, claims that aeither the facts about the proposed new body nor the Diarist's interpretation of them are correct. He writes:

Your article. "A Dangerous Master Plan" is totally inaccurate. First of all, this is not a new central and over-all Jewish body. It is merely a form and a procedure. There are no commitments to votes and there is no staff or financial provision. This is merely an opportunity for heads of organizations to consider the impact of Israel on American Jewry. This is not limited to political matters at all. If it were what you call it, I would not have associated myself with it. You are so wrong as to mislead not only your own thinking, but that of the reasiers who will be exposed to this completely inaccurate report.

Diarist writes in response: I have before me two reports of the meeting by two of the highest official sources of Zionist propaganda which fully confirm the facts and interpretation of our report. One is by Mr. Boris Smolar, editor of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, official mouthpiece of the Jewish Agency, the highest body in the World Zionist movement. In a lengthy article, entitled "Plan to Create a Council of Jewish Leaders in America," in the Jewish Daily Forward of May 23, Smolar describes Dr. Goldmann's plan as the "creation of a Council of Jewish leaders of all trends". Smolar continues:

The creation of such a Council is particularly important nobecause the time is approaching when the State Department will attempt more than once to exert pressure on Israel and when American Jewry will have to express more than one dissatisfaction with the actions of the State Department.

An editorial in Der Yiddisher Kempfer of June 4 greets the new body as "an Important Beginning" which will lead to a complete unification of American and would Jews in behalf of Israel. The editorial admits that Zionists had a much wider plan for the new organization to include all activities in behalf of Israel. But they found that the non-Zionists are not yet read; for such a plan. They, therefore, agreed to the formation of this body which will for the time being be limited in scope to political activities.

We are certain that when he representatives of the larger Jewish organizations will get used to working together in this field, they will cease to fear a wider coordination. They will quickly reach a real Jewish American council in questions pertaining to the State of Israel. And when that second step is achieved, we will come with our further plans in which, in our opinion, lies the possibility of minimizing, if not abolishing entirely, the chaos which dominates American Jewry in the field of organized representation.

How is one to account for these obvious centradictions in the facts and interpretation of an event as it is presented in the official Zionist press and to non-Zionist leaders? The only way to reconcile the differences is to remember that Zionists, like most other ideologists, have no scrup-es about the use of double talk. They speak one language when they address a meeting of non-Zionist leaders whom they want to win over for a strategic plan and they speak another language when they address their own followers. True leadership in our days consists in being able to hear the still voice of truth through the din, clatter and confusion of propaganda double talk.—Ed.

Ben Gurion Is Prophet of Youth in Israel

The speech delivered by Ben Gurion in Sheich Munis near Tel Aviv, at the special rally of Israeli high school youths on June 10, has definitely destroyed the legend that Ben Gurion retized from political life. It has clearly confirmed the theory that from Sde Boker, Ben Gurion wishes to play the role of a prophetic leader of youth. He believes that from Israeli youth will arise a new generation, free from the psychology of the galuth, which will effect the unification of the new Israeli nation.

Cynicism in Place of Zionism

In his speech, Ben Gurion stressed three historic aims of Israeli you h: (1) moral purity; (2) settlement on the frontiers of Israel, and (3) the integration of the new immigrants. With these three aims are bound up all the hopes of the leaders of Israel. In the Babel of tribes which is Israel, the school youth of Israel is the only unifying force whose language and culture is Hebrew. And it is this youth that can lead to the unification and the blending of all Jews in Israel into one nation. It is the youth which also has to bear the burden of national defense which, under present Israeli conditions, makes Israel a land consisting entirely of frontiers. Youth must also create a new spirit free from the old diaspora mentality.

Unfortunately, it is several years already that the leaders of Israel have been witnessing a moral degeneration of Israeli youth. It is no secret and the entire Israeli press has written about it many times. Israeli youth is not what it was expected to be. It does not have the idealism which it had curing the years of the Israeli-Arab war. Youth does not join the Zionist youth organization. It is geterally not interested in politics and in state problems. "Zionism has become a mockery among Israeli youth." You streek Zionism' is equivalent new to saying 'you talk non-curo."

Israel is flooded with pornographic and semi-pornographic books and journals which are being read mostly by youth. The young people do not attend the various cultural institutions, but they fill the cinemas, cases and various places of entertainment. The attempts to bring together young people of the different immigrant groups have so far failed. There is still a sharp distinction between he so-called white and dark youths. There is no response to the constant appeals to youth to settle on the land or to settle in the Negev. Of course, the economic conditions are probably mostly responsible for that. In former years the Halutziet youth acted differently and made great sacrifices in clearing up the swamps and building the kibbutzim. It is this moral disintegration that is causing alarm to the leaders of Israel.

Will the Speeches Help?

It is too early to attempt an analysis of the tragic problem of youth in Israel and to predict what will happen. But it is worth mentioning that the older Zionist generation is not without responsibility for the present mood of the youth. That generation brought up youth in a spirit alien to the Jewish people of the entire world. It awakened in youth great aspirations in connection with the emergence of the State of Israel. All these aspirations have collapsed when youth saw that the State of Israel is a small state dependent mostly on relief from abroad and subject to constant danger from its neighbors. Ben Gurion spoke about doing away with poor and rich. But who can take seriously such advice at a time when in the leadership itself the distinction between rich and poor is growing daily? Israeli youth is disappointed in Zionist idealism and it is doubtful whether Ben Gurion will succeed in awakening it.

American Jews and Israel: Discussion Israel as a Moral Center By Lessing J. Rosenwald

In your point IV — Israel as a spiritual, moral, cultural center (Jewish Newsletter, June 21) I have this feeling:

Israel may, in time, be just that. If so, Israel can only become such through demonstrated merit. No fiat or law or propaganda can make her such, now or in the future, unless she can prove to the world that the world should emulate her for these qualities. If Israel does merit it, the world will roluntarily accept such leadership; it cannot be compelled to do so. If Israel does not merit it, no amount of persuasion can force the world to believe or accept such a hollow formula. If Israel is sincere in her desire to be such a center, her course is obvious—she must so conduct herself as to bring about such an exalted position. If Israel is not constituted to permit such self-introspection, she cannot attain the status which she is now demanding "on faith," and without the substance to promote it.

American Jews at a Turning Point By Lester L. Stern

Permit me the privilege of a few lines in your publication and to thank you for the excellent editorial "The Turning Point" in your May 10, 1954, issue. American Jews may well hope that the turning point, which I believe you have accurately indicated is at hand, means a turning point in their attitude as well as in the foreign policy of the United States.

It has been apparent for a long time that American Jews have failed to realize the difference between Zionism as an idea and Zionism as the agency of a state which is not alone foreign to American Jews but which considers itself to occupy a Messiania role for the purpose of "saving" all Jews from all dangers at all times and in all places. That this is no fanciful evaluation of the Israeli-Zionist position has been made abundantly clear in the official and unofficial attacks made by both Zionists and Israelis on the two recent speeches of Assistant Secretary of State Henry A. Byroade.

When everything is said and done, all that Mr. Byroade attempted to do was to define a relationship between American Jews and the State of Israel which, in the American pattern, is the normal relationship of any American citizen to any foreign state. In this effort, Mr. Byronie has been severely attacked by both Israelis and American Zionists and, except for the American Council for Judaism, there has been no indication from any organization of American Jews that they resent these Zionist-Israeli attacks which, in effect, say that Mr. Byroade is Assistant Secretary of State for all America as except those of Jewish faith; and that where Americans of Jewish faith are concerned and where the State of Israel is involved, the relationship is one of special and intimate character over which the Assistant Secretary for all of the American people has no competence of jurisdiction. It seems to me there can be no other fundamental evaluation of these Zionist-Israeli efforts to repudiate and to discredit Mr. Byroade.

Secondly, I should like to say in this letter, that a change of attitude on the part of American Jews reflecting the turning point which you indicate has come, would be recognized when the old "hush-hush" attitudes are clearly discarded by the so-called "non-Zionist" organizations. There is no longer any sense or logic in the so-called "defense agencies" attempting to smear public discussion of all aspects of the relationship of American Jews to Israel by saying that such discussion, in public, is "washing dirty linen". In this day and age when American foreign policy is one of the most widely discussed and closely scrutinized phenomena

of our world, Jewish organizations that are at all abreast of recent developments must now recognize that this question, which they have for so long attempted to hide like a skeleton in the closet, is now firmly and irrevocably in the public domain.

The Government of the United States has given its answer. The Zionists have given theirs. The Government of Israel has given theirs. The non-Zionists, as usual, have remained silent hoping that some as yet uncharted wind will blow the problem away. And the American Council for Judaism, as you correctly point out in your editorial, has given its answer consistent with its whole history. American Jews cannot say that they have been deprived of the opportunity to make their choice in freedom and in full view of all of the facts. The only ching which is now to be determined is whether or not—and to what extent—they will exercise the prerogative of their freedom.

Bankruptey of Political Zionism

It was fascinating to learn from the Jewish Newsletter that Rabbi Eisenstein now proclaims the Ingathering of the Exiles, i.e., the heart and core of Zionism, to be a "limited doctrine." Without disrespect to the High Priests of Reconstructionism, may one ask whether there is such a thing as a limited doctrine? Is it not a conviction that has lost its persuasiveness, or a dogma deprived of its authority? For all practical purposes, it would seem to mean a doctrine for others, or, in the rabbi's own words, "Israel for the persecuted Jews of all lands and for those who wish to fulfill themselves as Jews by fiving in Israel".

As one night expect from the crudite and high-minded founders of Reconstructionism, their integrity does not allow them to deny the logic of the obvious facts. Zionism is not, was not, and never will be mything more than just this doctrine limited to these two groups of dews. This is how it started: Palestine as a haven for the physically or spiritually homeless. Nobody has ever been against it. No State of Israel was needed to make room for the victims of persecution; self-realization as a Jew was accomplished easier under the British Mandate than by becoming an Israeli citizen.

What Rabbi Eisenstein said means, in effect, that political Zionism is bankrupt, and that, though the State of Israel was established under its flag, it never did or will mean anything more than the much-maligned refugeeism plus a trickle of tribal sectarianism. Yours was a temperate and overly modest report on a magnificent vindication of the Jewish Newsletter and what it stands for, forceasting the time when Zionists of all shades of opinion will have to reconstruct themselves to facts, not theories (since such are the facts of their own lives) and admit, without delicate intellectual embroidery, that they have been horribly mistaken; that for the American Jews, Israel means schizophrenia instead of the hoped-for survival of Judaism, and that, incidentally, the U.S.A. is the only country where in ordained "rabbi in Israel" can still find receptive audiences for limited doctrines. For myself, I'd rather be without any doctrine.



Following our meeting in Cleveland, which was of great help to me in formulating my plans for the new Department of Public Information, I went on to Toledo where the work for the coming year was surveyed in detail by Leon Feuer and myself. Immediately upon my return to New York I raised the question of Kfar Silver with those who are most directly concerned with the project. As for the \$1,000 contribution in Sol Cohen's name - the enclosed copy of a memorandum to me from Hannah Stein is self-explanatory.

I am hopeful therefore that the entire question is being disposed of im a proper manner and that you will be in a position to include AZF functions on your calendar of activities without being inhibited by the Organization's past performance on Kfar Silver.

Meanwhile, Baltimore is pressing us for a definite answer from you on the dinner that they are planning for December 8th. Their anxiety is understandable since they report that the Histadruth campaign will be running in competition with us and that the Histadruth people are spreading the word that the guest

I believe Harold Manson mentioned to you in Cleveland, that I will be leaving this coming Sunday, August 29th, for South America, to attend the Latin-American Conference of General Zionists in Santaigo, Chile, on September 1-5, as official ZOA representative. Mr. Chaim Ariav will attend the conference in behalf of the Israel General Zionist Party.

After the Conference I plan to visit Buenos Aires, Argentina; Montevideo, Uruguay; and Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo, Brazil. If everything goes well, I expect to be back in New York on September 17th.

You no doubt recall our previous correspondence in connection with inwitations sent to you from Argentina and other Latin-American countries to visit them. You indicated that you could not make it this year, but that the possibility exists that you may be able to go to South America to open the United Israel Appeal campaigns in Argentina, and perhaps a few other countries in the spring of 1955 (beginning of winter in that part of the world).

Needless to say, it would be wonderful, if you could permit me to inform our friends in South America, that you would accept their invitation to visit Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Uruguay and Peru, or one or two of the above mentioned countries this coming spring. Your presence would, of course, add prestige and strength to the General Zionist organizations on the eve of the Zionist Congress.

I know how crowded you are for time, but I would like to ask you to prepare a message of greetings to the conference. If I receive it in New York by Friday, I will still be able to prepare a Yiddish translation.

 From the Convention Issue of the "American Zionist News Reporter" and from other ZOA press releases you may have learned about the establishment of the new Department for ZOA Activities in Israel. The Department, which



Dr. Abba Hillel Silver -2-August 24, 1954 was established by the new administration right after the Convention, is under my direction and it will centralize all present and future ZOA projects and activities in Israel, including Kfar Silver and the ZOA House. It will also serve as the only channel of communications and liaison between the ZOA and Kfar Silver in Israel and the ZOA in New York. This step has been long overdue and I hope it will introduce coordination and order in a previously rather chaotic situation. At the same time, Mr. May appointed a Committee for ZOA Activities in Israel with Dr. Harris Levine as Chairman, and Messrs. Moses Torczyner and Meyer Pesin as Vice-Chairmen. The Kfar Silver Committee, with Mr. Meyer Pesin as Chairman and the Kfar Silver Department with Hannah Stein, was, of course, abolished and included in this new Department. In accordance with the terms of reference for the new Department and Committee the AZF will continue its fund raising efforts for the overall ZOA Program both here and in Israel as in the past. This new Department and Committee will concentrate exclusively on individual large donations. legacies and bequests for the ZOA House, Kfar Silver and any activities the ZOA may undertake in Israel in the future, both from ZOA members, as well as non-Zionists. Of course, this limited fund raising effort of our Department will be closely coordinated and cleared with the AZF. FOR MAY'S ELECTION

New York, N. Y .: - The candidacy of Mortimer May of Nashville, Temn. for the presidency of the Zionist Organization of America was announced today following a meeting of sixty leaders of the organization, who gathered here to exchange views on the forthcoming 57th Annual National Convention and the future program of the ZOA. Mr. May's candidacy was unanimously endorsed by the meeting, in which ZOA Regional and District leaders participated.

In making this announcement, the ZOA leaders, headed by Dr. Emanuel Neumann, member of the Jewish Agency Executive, also stated that a national Committee for the Election of Mortimer May is in formation. Other leaders who joined in endorsing Mr. May include: Abraham Goodman, Chairman of the ZOA Inner Committee; Rabbi I. Usher Kirshblum, National Membership Chairman; Dr. Harris J. Levine, President of the Jewish National Fund; Jacques Torczyner, Vice-President: Herman L. Weisman, National Chairman of the ZOA Economic Committee, and others among whom are many national officers, Regional Presidents and leaders of ZOA key districts from areas throughout the country.

These men led the campaign which, two years ago, culminated in the election of the present ZOA administration.

"Surely, Mcrtimer May is eminently qualified to stand at the helm of the ZOA,"
they stated. "Fis attainments in the leadership of our organization, where he now
serves as Chairman of the National Administrative Council, his contributions to
American Jewish life and to civic affairs, his intellect and his personality have
already won him a place of honor in American Jewry. We are confident that the
membership of the ZOA will heartily approve his candidacy."

Mr. May formerly served as Chairman of the National Executive Committee of the ZOA and as its Vice-President. He is also a member of the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization.

Mr. May is a graduate of Columbia University and holder of the Phi Beta Kappa key and is recognized as both a scholar and one possessed of keen and peretrating political acumen. He has attended many World Zionist Congresses as a ZOA delegate and participated in the formulation of Zionist policy. He has been a close associate and supporter of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver and Dr. Emanuel Neumann.

Mr. May is Vice-President of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds and is an executive board member of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. He serves on the following boards: American Association for Jewish Education, United Israel Appeal, American Fund for Israel Institutions and on the Board of Governors of the American Financial and Development Corporation for Israel.

In recent years, Mr. May has visited Israel several times and he is intimately acquainted with its development and problems.

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
