

In response to the call issued to American Jewry to enlist its interest in the campaign about to be conducted by the Jewish Theological Seminary of America for an endowment fund of one million dollars, a large number of letters has been received from all parts of the country giving gratifying assurance of support. So many of our correspondents have suggested the holding of a conference to take counsel regarding the coming campaign, that it has been concluded that a conference should be convened for that purpose, and I now have the honor to invite you to attend it.

The conference is to take place in New York City on Sunday morning, October 7th, 1923, at 10 o'clock at the Hotel Astor. There will be a morning session, a luncheon, an afternoon session, and an evening dinner.

The main purpose of the convocation is to emphasize the supreme need for adequate support of the Seminary and its Teachers Institute, to consider the even greater need of American Israel for competent rabbis and teachers in order to perpetuate our faith and to rear generations of God-fearing Jews, and to discuss openly and frankly the manner in which the campaign is to be conducted; to the end that a feeling may be aroused in all parts of the land that the great problem of Jewish education must be at once seriously taken up and speedily and wisely solved.

During the latter part of the afternoon session the meeting will be thrown open for discussion, enabling all who attend to participate and to give us the benefit of their advice.

I earnestly urge you to be present, even at a slight sacrifice, although I am sure that you will regard it rather as a duty to take part in this important movement. Those of us who have been close to the work of the Seminary and appreciate its requirements, realize the desirability of securing your help and cooperation.

A number of days ago I had the pleasure of inviting you to participate in a national conference to be held in New York City on October 7th to consider the great need of American Israel for competent rabbis and teachers.

Undoubtedly it is due only to the pressure of other matters that you have delayed acknowledging this invitation and signifying your intention to be present. As was pointed out, this convocation is to be of such moment that every communally minded Jew should regard it as his duty to take part in it.

Your cooperation is desirable and necessary and I should be glad to have your assurance that it will be given.

Dear Mr. Hosenwald:

Because I know how deeply you are interested in the effort to advance the interests of Jewish education in America, I am taking the time before I sail for Europe, to tell you the story of the new and great page in American history which was written on Sunday October 7th when there gathered at the Hotel Astor from every section of this country over seven hundred of the leading rabbis teachers and laymen in Israel to attend the conference which was called by Louis Marshall in the interests of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and the general welfare of Judaism in this country.

I say a new page in the bistory of American Israel because never before has a conference been called in this country for so lofty a purpose.

Those of us who were directly concerned with arranging the Conference were confident that it would be well attended, but we were most gratifyingly surprised to find that our call had been responded to by such a large number, many of whom had travelled hundreds of miles in order to be present and to attest their interest and determination that the Conference should succeed. From ten o'clock in the morning until way after midnight on Monday, when Dr. Adler was finally able to say good-night, at the end of the banquet, there was the most intense interest, the most ardent devotion to the cause. The gathering was an inspiration of the most exalted character and out of it, in the opinion of all who were present, must come a glorious achievement for the sake of American Israel.

I want in this letter to give you a brief picture of the Conference. We began as Jewish gatherings should begin, with a prayer delivered by the elequent Dr. Herman Abramowitz, who has so distinguished himself among our fellows in Canada; and then Louis Marshall, that greatest of all Jews in America and perhaps in the entire world, took the floor. Mr. Marshall struck the high note of the Conference when he declared that no matter how attacked, Israel cannot be destroyed, but nevertheless too many Jews are indifferent to spiritual things. The time, in his opinion, had come when the Page 2.

Jews of America must turn their attention and energies to the task of keeping alive on the altars of Israel, the light of our faith. Through the centuries, education, - Jewish education, has been our shield and our protection against our enemies, our knowledge of the things for which we stand, of the things for which so many of us have proudly died. In these free times, when the danger of deterioration is greatest, we must again arm ourselves with knowledge, and the Jewish Theological Sominary of America is the source from which this knowledge comes. Therefore this campaign: because witheut the million dollars the Seminary is asking for, it cannot begin to do the great things it ought to do.

He then called upon Rabbi Max Drob, that splendid young man in Israel, who, in the comparatively few years of his mature activity, has done so nobly in the service of his people, to take the chair, as chairman of the campaign. It was thrilling, the way the assemblage of leafers and scholars, men and women, old and young, rose to great this new leader who has arisen in our midst. It was even more thrilling to hear, in the words with which he assumed the responsibilities which have been thrown upon him, the echoes of that same spirit which actuated our ancient Maccabees. He unfurled the banner of the Torah and summoned American Israel to march under its folds. He recited the achievements of the Seminary. He told how it had trained one hundred and fifty four distinguished rabbis and two hundred and seven splendid teachers. He told of its remarkable faculty, composed of the greatest living Jowish scholars; he told of the great library, which makes the Sominary the Jewish cultural conter of the world. Then he drew a picture of how this great institution, the equal of any of our ancient academies, had been permitted to languish and suffer for want of support.

Then came Rabbi Louis Epstein, President of the Rabbinical Assembly, to pledge the devoted service of every one of the graduates of the Seminary to this work; and he was followed by Dr. Israel Goldstein, President of the Young Peoples' League of the United Synagogue, who, in behalf of the young people demanded that his organization be commanded to go forth and raise fifty thousand dollars toward the million dollars which the Seminary must have if it is to live.

Think of it - the young people, the boys and girls who know what the Seminary and the United Synagogue are doing, they want the right to raise among themselves the sum of \$50,000! What should we elders say, if cur children speak that way?

Here we interrupted the speaking and called upon Cantor Josef Resemblatt to recite the "El Mole Rachmim," as a taken of the love in which the Jews of America hold the memory of that Prince in Israel, Jacob H. Schiff, who, during his lifetime did so much for his people and who loved the Jewish Theological Seminary more than any other institution in this country because he saw in it the only hope for holding fast to the faith the tens and tens of thousands of Jews, who, without its help and without its guidance, night wander after strange gods; and in memory of Dr. Solemon Schechter, whose presidency of that institution was like a crown set upon its head; and in memory too of that other great leader who has gone from our midst, Judge Mayer Sulzberger, revered by Jews and by all America as an upright judge, as a scholar, as a lover of his people and of all humanity; and in memory,

too, of Dr. Israel Friedlander, the first American Jewish martyr, who, leaving his career, leaving his family, went across the seas to bring help to our stricken brethren in the war zone and there laid down his life; and also, of Phineas Kotkoff, brilliant student, rising leader, who was cut off before his time. The tears that were shed during this solemn service were tears of consecration.

We got back to business as soon as we could shake off the spell and called on Mr. Sol M. Stroock, distinguished lawyer and trustee of the Seminary, who is to head the New York Campaign, to deliver his message. Straight from the shoulder he spoke when he said that there can be no distinctions, no orthodox, no reform, no conservative, when Israel is at stake, because the heritage of Israel is common to all of us and the duty to preserve this learning is a duty that falls upon all of us.

Mrs. Alexander Kohut was then unexpectedly called upon. This wonderful woman had come in quietly, but she was distinguished in that assemblage of distinguished people, and the words she spoke, in telling her experiences with the sad lack of Jewish knowledge in this country, were moving.

Equally moving were the words of Mrs. Charles I. Hoffman, President of the Women's League of the United Synagcgue: "We all respond to the call to save a human life," she declared and then she asked: "Shall we fail to inspire that life with a noble purpose? Shall we restore the sufferer to health, shall we clothe the poor, and feed the hungry, and then let them starve and die for lack of spiritual sustemance? Is it right that we surround our own chidren with all the comforts of life, provide them with all forms of education and opportunity and pleasure, - but omit that greatest guide and joy which comes with faith in God and trust in His great goodness?" She pledged the women of her organization to strive as only Jewish women can strive, for a great and noble Jewish cause.

That ended the morning session. Ostensibly, the delegates sat down to lunch. In reality, they sat down to discus: the great problem that had been presented to them. Lunch over, we got bac: to business quickly.

Dr. Elias L. Solomon told us about the work of the United Synagogue, what it has done in the past, what it is doing now and what it can do if this campaign should prove a success.

Dr. Cyrus Adler, who has given so many years of his life to the advancement of Jewish learning in this country, and who is the Acting President of the Jewish Theological Seminary, told us in his ewn way, of the hopes and aspirations of the founders of the institution and of those who have carried the work forward.

Then came the outstanding feature of this great Conference: the address delivered by Louis Marshall. If I have given you the impression that the air of the Conference hall was vibrant with the electricity of Jewish exaltation, then let me tell you that it became surcharged with the electricity of Jewish devotion as Mr. Louis Marshall poured out his elequence in a manner which reminded all who beard him of those prophets of an older time who called upon their people to yield allegiance to the God of Israel and to serve Him!

It is useless for me to attempt to describe that eloquence, but it is enough to say that never was Mr. Marshall so surgassingly great as he was on this occasion. But let me quote from what he said after he had recounted again the great achievements of the Seminary. "The seminary is as broad as the universe, it is as comprehensive as Judaism. We are concerned with young Israel, with the youth of the present generation, with the children that will come after them. Our interest is in the young American boy and girl. We must remember that they are the product of American soil, that they are permeated with the ideals of America, they love this, their country. Nothing should wean them from that love. They would love Judaism too if they knew for what Judaism stands, but they must be taught! Unless we are willing to keep our children and our grandchildren out of the synagogue and out of the religious schools, we must educate rabbis and teachers, trained in the English language, familiar with the learning of higher educational institutions, colleges and universities, and who, at the same time, are proficient in Hebrew, understand the spirit of Judaism, know all that pertains to it and can make enthusiastic the American boy or girl when he informs them that they are members of the greatest, the oldest, the noblest aristocracy that the world has ever known!

"I venture to say that if there were in every community in this land conservative symagogues, with men at their head of the high type that is at this conference today, many of the young people and middle-aged people who have become country club fanatics, automobile maniacs and consumers of paint and powder and kalsomine and enamel, would come back to the synagogue and be interested in something which would enable them to feel the exaltation of serious thought and thrill that comes to one from learning, knowing and understanding the wisdom of Israel. We must train ourselves to understand the true content and inner meaning of Judaism. We must seek to preserve the thought of our prophets, our seers and our sages."

How the audience rose and cheered! And no wonder. Then they let me talk. I had not much to say because after all the big word had been spoken, but I was able to find out how deeply the Conference had been moved by Mr. Marshall's speech because when I asked the nearly one thousand men and women who were present to pledge their effort to this campaign, they rose to their feet in a mighty pledge of themselves to make this campaign a success.

We closed the afternoon session with an address by that great Yiddish orator, the Rew. H. Masliansky, who pleaded with the Conference to make it possible to wim the English speaking American born boy and girl who has been driven out of the synagogue, back under its roof.

I wish that I were an artist; I wish I could find somewhere the means to convey to you the beauty of the spectacle presented by the banquet in the evening. I am not speaking of clothes and jewels, these things don't count. I am speaking of that greater beauty, the radiance of knowledge of Jewish things and devotion to the Jewish cause, that was visible in every one of the faces that were turned toward the speakers' table in the Grand Ballwoom of the Hotel Astor. No one will forget the distinguished spectacle of that speakers' table. There was Mr. Marshall, Rabbi Drob, Judge Lehman, Sol. Stroock. There were those great scholars, the faculty of the Jewish Theological Seminary, Professor Louis Ginzberg, Professor Israel Davidson, Professor Alexander Marx, Professor Mordecai M. Kaplan, Professor Joseph Hoschander, Professor Moses Hyamson, and Dr. Cyrus Adler, the toast master; there was Sol Rosenbloom, Henry A. Diz, S. C. Lamport, Colorel Guinzberg and there were those leading reform rabbis, Rev. Dr. Samuel Schulman, and Rev. Dr. Nathan Krass. And scattered through the banquet hall, in addition to all the leading laymen, other reform rabbis, like the Rev. Dr. Joseph Silverman, Rev. Dr. Maurice H. Harris, Rev Dr. Rudolph Grossman, Rev. Dr. Isaac Landman, Rev. Dr. Marius Hanson of Albany, and Rev. Dr. Samuel Sale of St. Louis.

I am mentioning these names because I want to show that this was no one sided affair. All shades of Israel were represented and two of the chief speakers at the banquet were Dr. Samuel Schulman and Dr. Nathan Krass, who displayed the same ardor for the Seminary as if they had been graduates of the Seminary and representatives of its teachings.

The speeches at this banquet were unusual. Rabbi Schulman raised on high again the banner of Jewry and he swept aside all of the petty distinctions that have been dividing Jew from Jew in this country. "All Israel is one and there is nothing that can divide us," he declared. "We must march together unto the mountain of the Law and we must strive together to place this great institution, the Jewish Theological Seminary, beyond financial need." And these words were re-schoed by men like S. C. Lamport, Judge Irving Lehman, Mrs. Samuel Spiegel and Rabbi Nathan Krass.

No money was asked at this banquet, yet the proceedings were interrupted before the acholarly talk made by Sol Rosenbloom in order to give Rabbi Drob an opportunity to announce that Mr. Edward Chase of Manchester, N. H., Mr. and Mrs. M. Lurie had each given ten thousand dollars to the Seminary Fund and that Louis Marshall, who for so many years has been covering its deficits, had given twenty-five thousand dollars.

Sol Rosenbloom finished his talk by announcing his gift of twentyfive thousand dollars and then Congregation B'nai Jeshuran, the oldest in New York, which is to celebrate its one hundredth anniversary next year, speaking through its rabbi, Israel Goldstein, and through its Board of Trustees, announced that it would give fifty thousand dollars.

I am sure that if we had permitted soli; itation of funds that the whole million would have been subscribed then and there. But we did not want this money to come from a few people. We want this money to come from the Jews of this country.

In conclusion I want to say this: If there were any doubts in the minds of those men who have had the interest of the Seminary at heart during all these years as to the outcome of the campaign, these doubts have been wemoved by the spirit and the responsiveness of those who were fortunate to attend the conference.

I feel sure that the million is going to be raised, yes that it is going to be over-subscribed and knowing you as I do, I am conficent that you are going to do your part to bring about this wonderful result for the Seminary and for America.

The enclosed letter was written to Julius Rosenwald by David A. Brown, just before he sailed for Europe on October 9th. It is the story of the great Conference on behalf of the Jewish Theological Seminary, which was held at the Hotel Astor on October 7th.
