



Israel Zangwill Memorial Fund.

A Committee, composed of the friends of the late Mr. Israel Zangwill, has been for some time considering the form and scope of a Memorial to this great Jewish literary man. They have decided after consultation with Mrs. Zangwill to raise, mainly in England and the U.S.A., a permanent fund of about \$50,000 to be known as the Israel Zangwill Memorial Fund. A nucleus of over \$5,500 has already been formed by a few of his most intimate friends. The object of the fund will be to assist by means of monetary grants Jewish scholars and writers everywhere, who may need and deserve such aid, and to that end there will be established a special Advisory Committee qualified to deal with this delicate and responsible task.

Israel Zangwill in his lifetime continually gave of the best of his time and his thought to assisting literary beginners; nor did he spare himself financially on their account. The fund would thus strive to continue his work and, at the same time, create a Memorial which would be in accord with the spirit which animated his relations with all creative workers. I trust, therefore, that I may rely upon your support.

My dear Rabbi Silver:

"We Have Met The Enemy And They Are Ours". That short, terse message of Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry, following defeat of the English flotilla on Lake Erie one hundred and fourteen years ago, relieved the tense strain which for several weeks had been resting heavily upon the inhabitants of the then sparsely settled Western Reserve.

Commodore Perry, a young man in his late twenties, was the admired and beloved hero of his time, hailed as the savior of his country. Some years after his victory there was erected in Cleveland Public Square, an appropriate monument to this brave young officer.

Perry's cry of victory has rung down through the years, and his glorious accomplishment has held a sacred place in the memory of succeeding generations. Cleveland's monument to his memory, however, has been shifted from place to place as years have gone by, until it now rests in a rather obscure spot in Gordon Park, slowly being forgotten by the present generation, subject to destructive acts of vandalism, and gradually disintegrating.

The monument, one of Cleveland's most valued historical objects, should be preserved.

In commemoration of Commodore Perry, his native state of Rhode Island is about to have cast bronze replicas of the figure and medallions of our own Perry monument, affording Cleveland an opportunity to secure duplicates at the same time at a comparatively small cost of \$10,000.00 of which some \$3,800.00 is already available.

It is my honor to advise that you have been named as one of a committee of one hundred, to formulate and execute plans for the raising of the necessary funds for the restoration and preservation of this most valued of Cleveland's historical objects.

The first meeting of this committee of one hundred will be held Friday, January 13th, in the Rose Room of the Hotel Cleveland, where luncheon will be served at 12:15 at a charge of \$1.00 per cover. 

My dear Mr. Murray:-

Under separate cover I am returning "The Foundations Of Jewish Ethics", which you requested me to read and to comment upon.

The work is very valuable and will undoubtedly fill a lacuna in Anglo-Jewish literature. We have all too few books in English on Jewish ethics. This book would be of particular value in a religious high school and in Jewish study circles.

The translation is well done. Here and there a Germanism creeps in, but that can be easily corrected. Perhaps the most serious drawback of the work is that in the selection of modern Jewish and Christian authorities the collection is almost entirely German. No more than two or three English or American scholars, Jewish or non-Jewish are quoted.

The work was of course written for and by Germans, but it seems to me that it would be much more acceptable to the English reading Jewish public if outstanding scholars of England and America were also quoted.

With the exception of Dr. Kohler, no Jewish American scholar or Rabbi is quoted, and none at all from England. Nor are the outstanding neo-Hebraic authors or those writing in French drawn upon by the authors.

I regard this as a serious deficiency in the book, which may well be corrected. But even if it is not, the book is, in my judgment worthy of publication and will have a considerable reading public.

At the January Board Meeting of the Cleveland Federation of Women's Clubs a resolution was proposed to the effect that the Federation go on record as endorsing the move to create a Department of Education whose Secretary would sit in the President's cabinet. The motion had previously been referred to the clubs and the apparent difference of opinion as expressed by the various delegates led to the conclusion that here was a controversial subject. The Advisory Board of The Salvation Army in Cleveland has recently been augmented by some thirteen new members through the personal efforts of Colonel Myron T. Herrick.


At this particular time it is advisable that the group select its chairman and hear of the Army's plans for the future.



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

My dear Rabbi:

I have just been advised by the organization of motion picture producers and distributors, of which Will H. Hays is President, that beginning today the film "The King of Kings" will be presented in amended form in all the prints now being shown to the public.

This is being done in conformity with an agreement reached at recent conferences between Mr. Hays and representatives of the Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai B'rith. At the same conferences the B'nai B'rith representatives urged that "The King of Kings" be not exhibited in any form in European countries with pronounced Anti-Semitic tendencies. The request was granted and the B'nai B'rith representatives were handed the following memorandum with authority to make the same public, which was forthwith done: 'Assurances have been given by the owners of 'The King of Kings', a motion picture based upon the life of Jesus, that it is not now being shown and it will not be shown in those European countries or communities where in the judgment of wise counsel it might likely be the cause of creating anti-Jewish feeling, nor where it is likely to be the cause of any disorder, owing to the subject matter of the picture.'

Agreement was reached as to the countries from which the picture is to be excluded. A result of the conferences farther reaching than the foregoing, important as they are, was the establishment of a relationship between the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America and the B'nai B'rith, by virtue of which the B'nai B'rith is invested with the privilege and responsibility, through counsel with and advice to the motion picture producers, of preventing just cause for Jewish complaint against future films.

I believe you will be interested in a brief recital of incidents in connection with "The King of Kings" culminating in the calling of the conferences hereinbefore referred to, and results that followed therefrom.

As soon as word was received by the Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai B'rith that Mr. Cecil B. DeMille was preparing the New Testament story for the film, the League through its representative at Los Angeles, tried to dissuade Mr. DeMille from proceed-

ing with his undertaking. The attempt was unsuccessful and the making of the picture proceeded. Our representative watched the picture as it was being made and offered suggestions and urged their adoption, with a view of placing the Jews' participation in the scenes of the picture in a light historically correct. In some respects his advice was accepted. In others it was not. The picture after being finished was exhibited first in the far West and later in the far East and other sections of the country. Except for some scattered criticism, it remained practically unnoticed by our coreligionists until it was produced in Cincinnati during November last. I saw the picture on its first presentation and believed it capable of doing great mischief to our people. I made known my views to the Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai B'rith, and at a meeting held in Chicago shortly thereafter, the subject received very full and careful attention.

"The King of Kings" is in a class by itself. Other film and stage presentations adversely affecting the Jew have either placed him in the category of criminals, or have made him a subject of ridicule. The removal of these objectionable characterizations obviously would evoke opposition from none except the exhibitors. No one else had an interest in the subject except the Jew. The Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai B'rith in the last fifteen years has successfully coped with all such villifications and has purged the stage of them. "The King of Kings", however, is a more or less accurate portrayal on the screen of the New Testament story. In that story every Christian has an interest - a very deep interest.

The Governing Board of the Anti-Defamation League considered very thoroughly whether the Jews could afford by coercing theatre managers and otherwise, to suppress the picture. The Board decided that they could not. As hereinbefore stated, the Board had attempted to dissuade the maker of the picture from going on with his project. That was entirely legitimate. Now, however, that the picture had been seen by hundreds of thousands, the suppression of it presented an entirely different situation. The Board decided to urge on the producers amendment thereto, and if possible the introduction of a foreword, for the purpose of removing the chief objections to the picture from a Jewish standpoint. The presentation of these suggestions to the producers was committed to me.


While I was considering ways and means of offering these suggestions, I received an invitation to confer with General Will H. Hays, head of the motion picture industry, on the very subject committed to me. I believe the complaint against the picture, registered by me as President of the B'nai B'rith, while it was being produced in Cincinnati was the immediate reason for calling the conference, which was followed by another, the results of which have been hereinbefore set forth.

I was accompanied in the second of these conferences by Rev. Dr. David Philipson, a fellow member of the Governing Board of the Anti-Defamation League, and dean of American Reform Rabbis. On our insistence announcement was made that the picture would not be produced in those portions of Europe in which it was likely to aggravate the situation of our coreligionists. At the first conference Mr. Hays and the producers of "The King of Kings" agreed that the picture would be amended. Dr. Philipson and I in the second conference, after seeing the picture in its entirety a number of times, and in parts several additional times, suggested in a memorandum, deletions, changes and a foreword, calculated in our opinion, to reduce to a minimum the objections to the picture. Our requests have been substantially agreed to and the picture has been amended accordingly.

It is thoroughly understood between the picture people and the B'nai B'rith that the request for amendments to the picture and compliance therewith, shall not be construed as an approval of the picture when amended, but shall be regarded only as an attempt on our part to remove its most objectionable features.

Approval of what has been done by the B'nai B'rith with reference to "The King of Kings" has come to me from every part of the country. Some have said that the work is epochal. Others have described it as historic. However, from here and there dissent has come with studied attempts to give publicity thereto. It is my deep conviction that further and continued publicity given this delicate subject is fraught with great danger to our people.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

We are extremely sorry that you were unable to be present at the meeting of the Advisory Board yesterday afternoon in the Mid-Day Club. A matter of vital importance to the work of the Army in Cleveland and to its plans for meeting the need for extended hospital and other operating facilities was presented.

The real purpose of the meeting was to acquaint you and other new members of the Advisory Board with the Action taken by the original members at their last meeting: Viz. - the approval of a capital account campaign for \$600,000 to provide funds for the acquisition of property for a new Home and Hospital for Unwed Mothers, additional facilities and some new construction in the Eight Corps of Cleveland, added equipment for the Army's Cleveland institution and other items for its splendid work here.

In order to have the full sanction of the members of the Board we urgently request that you have your secretary call Mr. Merriam at Superior 3778 sometime before 3 P.M. today and express your approval of the two resolutions below.

Before stating the resolutions we would like to explain the steps that have been taken so far.

1. The firm of Dougherty, Miskell, Merriam and Sutton has been retained to organize and manage the campaign and furnish publicity service.

2. On instructions from the Board this firm has secured headquarters for the campaign rent free and has drawn up a detailed campaign plan, schedule and budget to be presented to the campaign executive committee which will be formed at once.

3. Through Colonel Myron T. Herriek's office, John P. Dempsey, Chief Justice of the Municipal Court of Cleveland, has been invited to assume the duties of campaign chairman.

Judge Dempsey is prominent among service men, is thoroughly acquainted with the Salvation Army's work and has made a conditional acceptance to this invitation: i.e., that the Advisory Board sanction his appointment.

4. Other steps in the campaign organization are now ready to go ahead and headquarters will be established soon after February 1st. The work of compiling a list of 15,000 prospective contributors and the organizing of a volunteer working force will begin at that time.

The two resolutions upon which your vote is sought today are:

- (a) That Judge John P. Dempsey be formally invited by this Board to act as chairman of the campaign committee which is to be formed and that he be asked to become a member of this Board.
- (b) That F. H. Hobson, one of the original members of the Board, be invited to act as treasurer of the campaign funds.

The demands upon your time and efforts will be slight, as Colonel Harrick pointed out to you, but your action on these two resolutions is sincerely solicited at this time.





Dear Rabbi Silver:

Many thoughtful Jews in America are ill at ease because of the inconsistencies in their Judaism and the lack of a clear program for their life as American Jews. They find none of the existing party platforms--Orthodox, Conservative, Reform--either spiritually or intellectually satisfying. Some are struggling as individuals to organize their thoughts and convictions, and are striving to make their daily practices as Jews conform to these convictions as best they can. This individualistic method, however, lacks the challenge, as well as the reassurance and social character of group thought and group decision. Many have felt the need for an authoritative modern program in Judaism. But we cannot wait for the meeting of authoritative synods, representing the whole Jewish people and vested with binding authority. Such synods may not meet in our lifetime.

We believe it important, therefore, for those who are dissatisfied with existing party platforms, to meet together periodically for earnest consideration of their problem as Jews, with a view to formulating Judaism in such terms and with such implications as will enable them to unify their lives fruitfully. This does not necessarily mean breaking with existing party organizations. It means, rather, proceeding in advance of present parties, so that, untrammelled by existing organization and vested interests, they may seek the truth in sincerity and in freedom of thought. The principles enunciated, and the decisions arrived at by such groups of truth seeking modern Jews, who will bring to their thinking their fund of Jewish knowledge and Jewish experience, may prove to be not only guiding factors in their own perplexities, but will also enable them to promulgate and spread these principles and decisions with much greater assurance and with more definite authority than if they were speaking as individuals merely.

We are asking a few of the leading personalities in the Middle West--in the rabbinate, in Jewish education, and in Jewish social service--to attend a preliminary conference for the above purpose. This Conference will be held in Chicago at the Jewish People's Institute, 3500 Douglas Boulevard, and will last for two entire days, February 21st and 22nd. We invite you to attend, and shall be happy to have you join us.

The Conference will deal with two major problems:

- (1) Our own era in Judaism--the character of modern Jewish life, and the bases for reconstructing our life as Jews in America.

- (2) The forms in which American Jewish life should express itself:
- (a) The observance of Jewish customs and folkways, and the spirit and principles which should underly their selection and modification;
 - (b) The elements in a community program involving local communal undertakings, and work on behalf of Palestine and of international Jewry;
 - (c) An evaluation as Jews of the various questions and problems confronting our life as American citizens.

Two days spent exclusively in the discussion of the above fundamental problems, by a small group of well informed, earnest Jews, should be of great benefit to us who will participate, and may prove of much significance in the further development of a unified satisfying program for modern American Israel.

It is now the only way how to secure my future and enable me to continue not only my journalistic work but my literary work *as well*.

If Rabbi Silver is not in a position to advance me \$500, then let him advance me \$250 and give the check to you. You will then send a check of \$500 to our treasurer, Carl Sherman, Esq., former Attorney General of New York, 50 Broad Street, New York.

Kindly notify me by wire of your decision. I can scarcely describe in words what this turning point in my life must mean for my future.

My dear Rabbi Silver:

I wish to express my sincere appreciation for your consent to act with Messrs. Nathan Loeser and Edward M. Baker and Rabbis Brickner, Goldman and Nowalk, all of whom have consented to cooperate in the effort to obtain a quota of \$3,000 per annum for each of 3 years from Cleveland to the fund being raised for the Jewish Daily Bulletin at the Hotel Statler on Thursday, March 8th. I have also secured the consent of Mrs. Henry Frankel to cooperate in making the luncheon a success.

I have placed all the subscribers to the Cleveland Community Chest who have given \$500 or more on our mailing list to receive sample copies of the Bulletin, thereby acquainting them with the nature of this publication and permitting them to gain a perception of its unique and peculiar nature, so that invitations sent to them would result favorably. I shall in the course of the next few days send a list of those individuals who are receiving the Bulletin as well as a list of our present subscribers in Cleveland.

I bespeak your indulgence for reading through this letter despite its length as I wish to embody in it the various angles which demonstrate the usefulness of our work to the Jewish community.

The Jewish press is unable to offer sufficient income to an enterprise conducted on the scope of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The ten Jewish dailies in existence in the United States and the Anglo-Jewish weeklies alone cannot be expected to carry the entire burden. In fact all the large news agencies like Reuters, Havas and Wolff are subsidized by their governments, as they find it impossible to derive sufficient income from the press of their respective countries, although they are much larger than the Jewish press. There is one exception - the news agencies in the United States, but there are more than 2,000 English dailies in the United States. Despite the limited commercial field at its disposal, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, in order to fulfill its function, must maintain offices and correspondents in a large number of cities because the Jewish community is scattered all over the world.

The situation of the Jewish Daily Bulletin is similar. When we found that we could not derive sufficient income from the press, we established the

Jewish Daily Bulletin, in the belief that the number of individual subscribers obtained from this publication would supplement the income of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. Up to the present however, the number of subscribers to the Jewish Daily Bulletin has not even made this enterprise self-supporting. This is due to the following reasons: The fund we were able to raise for the Jewish Daily Bulletin hardly sufficed to take care of the current deficit incidental to its publication, and did not provide the means for an aggressive circulation campaign which would have increased the number of subscribers to a point where the enterprise would have become self-supporting. In fact, the necessity of raising funds split our energies to the extent where we were unable to apply ourselves with the energy necessary to a circulation campaign. Another reason is that the Jewish Daily Bulletin, like the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, is trying to fulfill its task with a realization of its communal obligations, and endeavors to maintain its high level of objectivity, impartiality and freedom from sensationalism.

While we realize that a paper which devotes itself to the recording of news objectively, like the New York Times, has one-third the circulation of a newspaper like The News, we have never been lured to adopting the tactics of the latter, as we have from the outset conducted our work with the aim of establishing an institution which would be of permanent value to the Jewish community. We sincerely believe that the Jews need a system informing one part of the community of the activities of the other part, constituting a force against anti-Jewish prejudices by presenting Jewish news in the right proportion, promoting a better understanding of Jewish affairs among Jews and non-Jews and exercising a protective influence for the Jewish communities in Eastern Europe. We have in our files many letters and telegrams from ambassadors in Washington who, upon the publication of our cables in the Jewish and general press, have cabled their governments calling attention to the unfavorable impression the news had created and urging their governments to take immediate steps.

Led also by the motive of making the Agency and the Bulletin the best source of contemporary Jewish history - the Jewish Daily Bulletin is today used all over the country by Jewish schools for the study of Jewish current events and has been recommended for this purpose by the Commission on Religious Education of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and by the Bureau of Jewish Education - we have also compiled the first Index of Jewish news, classifying and registering more than 10,000 items and making recent Jewish data available at a moment's glance.

American Jewry is hardly aware of the situation which faces European Jewry. The anti-Semites in Poland and other European countries have learned a lesson. They do not - or only very rarely - permit anti-Jewish excesses, because they have found such actions could be very harmful to the prestige of their country. But the quiet measures which are now being applied against the Jews are much more dangerous. These measures are the economic boycott of Jews, and the propaganda for again placing the Jews under special legislation. These new measures are responsible for more harm than any riots in the past have caused.

We are no longer, as in the Middle Ages, accused of violating the Holy Sacrament or using Christian blood for ritual purposes. It is the influence and economic position the Jews have acquired since their emancipation that are the points of attack. Economic envy is the prime cause of modern anti-Semitism, and to abolish Jewish emancipation is the chief aim of the anti-Semites. That

the Jews want to dominate the world, that they are in possession of immense fortunes, these contentions constitute the main accusations of the anti-Semites. Jewish emancipation, only 50 or 60 years old, has not yet penetrated the subconsciousness of the non-Jewish masses.

The numerus clausus is the first law which has been passed against us, but it is bound not to be the last one. Legislation against Jews has been proposed not only in Poland, Roumania and Hungary, but even in the German Reichstag and in every Diet in Germany. The anti-Semites have not yet been strong enough to have these legislations passed, but they continue their persistent agitation and are succeeding more and more in impressing public opinion. A serious feature of the situation is the fact that the intellectuals, who decades ago fought for our emancipation, are today our most bitter enemies. The universities today constitute the strongest bulwarks of anti-Semitism. The anti-Semitic students of today are bound to be the lawyers, judges and law-makers of tomorrow. Even today the schools and courts are poisoned by anti-Semitic spirit.

We are living in a time when legislating ignorance even in the twentieth century in the United States has proven to be possible, as laws adopted in some states against the teaching of evolution have shown.

American Jews are spending millions of dollars to ameliorate the economic conditions in Eastern Europe, but political and economic conditions affecting the Jewish situation are so closely interwoven that they cannot be separated. In fact, if anti-Semitism could be reduced to a degree where it would cease to be dangerous, the Jews of Eastern Europe would not require any relief. Wherever the Jew does not suffer from anti-Semitic measures, he requires no relief from abroad.

I do not overlook the fact that anti-Semitism cannot be made to disappear entirely. There are certain reasons which are outside of our control. If the general economic conditions in a country are difficult, anti-Semitism increases, and vice-versa. But anti-Semitic agitation can, by deliberate counteraction, be reduced to such a degree that it would cease to threaten the Jewish community, and unless measures are taken for an energetic fight against anti-Semitism, the status of the Jews in America is also bound to be affected. If the Jews in Europe lose their emancipation, it is bound to exercise an unfavorable influence on the position of the American Jews.

I am bringing all this to your attention to show you of what tremendous value an agency like the J.T.A. can be and how many times it could multiply its usefulness if it had the means to conduct its work still more effectively.

If in a superhuman effort extending over many years we have tried earnestly to build a system whose prime aim it is to be of service to the Jewish community, it could only convince us that to devote one's entire energy to a communally minded work is a useless and thankless task, if this agency should disappear because of lack of financial support. It is an unfortunate fact in Jewish life that those who take the initiative in a meritorious cause often exhaust their best efforts and abilities in a struggle of years, either despairing in the end, or receiving recognition only when their activity has ceased to exist.

May we not claim that in addition to our daily function of enlightening Jewish and non-Jewish public opinion on Jewish questions, exercising a protective

influence in behalf of the threatened Jewish communities and stimulating an interest in Jewish causes, the full value of our enterprise would become most apparent when, at a critical moment, Jewish leaders would find how important it is to be able to address themselves to the Jews of practically all over the world within a few hours, and to carry their message to the most distant Jewish communities, in the farthest corners of the world, through the channels of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. For not only do we maintain a large news service from every part of the world to the United States, but also vice-versa. Through the Jewish Telegraphic Agency the Jewish community in Europe learns of those splendid organized efforts of American Jewry, of our Federations, of the great achievements of Jewish men and women in American life and of the powerful movement for better understanding and good will. Such messages of tolerance do not fail to make a profound impression on the European countries, plagued by anti-Semitism.

The reason we are now making a strenuous effort to raise a fund of \$50,000 for each of three years is that we want to at last be able to devote our energies for a considerable length of time to developing our circulation. Until now we have been compelled to devote most of our time to selling shares, raising loans, getting endorsements on loans; and being continually pressed for money, we have not been able to apply ourselves to the developing of our enterprise to the extent we should have. Besides, our continually harrassing people for funds deprived us of the opportunity of obtaining from them that help for increasing our circulation which I know they would have gladly extended to us. I am convinced that if we can give our entire time and energy for a period of three years to increasing our circulation, we will become not only self-sustaining but even profitable. But let us suppose for a moment that our enterprise would be in need of financial assistance for a long time; are not the efficiency and scope of our work such that rather than have it discontinued, it should be financially assisted?

Recently I had a lengthy conversation with Mr. Adolph S. Ochs. I told him frankly of the circumstances under which we have been and still are working, and what measure of success we have reached. I even told him that we have become almost pessimistic. I was delightfully surprised when Mr. Ochs told me that the circulation we have so far obtained was remarkable and much larger than he thought we would have succeeded in obtaining. He declared that a publication under his own management, "The Annual", has not half the circulation that ours has, and he stated ~~that~~ emphatically that should we continue in our efforts our enterprise would become worthwhile even from a financial viewpoint.

The task which the Jewish community in this country is facing is, above all, to extend the circle of that group of American Jews which has the Jewish institutions and Jewish interests at heart. How this can be accomplished is the prime concern of all the leaders of all the various groups. Upon the solution of this question the future of many an aspect of Jewish life in this country depends. There is no doubt you will agree with me that a most effective medium in this direction can be a service like that furnished by the Jewish Daily Bulletin. It is a difficult and tedious task; it is real pioneer work, which must be carried on for at least a certain number of years, before such a class of readers can be created and moulded into a permanent unit. This or that Jewish cause, this or that Jewish institution or appeal, finds it much easier to present its case to a man who has been daily prepared by a supply of vital and concise information, than to approach a man who has been totally estranged or perhaps only loosely connected in his mental attitude with Jewish affairs. Any efforts to obtain circulation in a community spread over a continent are naturally bound to be accompanied by considerable expense, and it is only when we are in a position to organize an aggressive

circulation campaign that our difficulties will cease.

I have no doubt that if the community had established an enterprise like ours, with offices in every part of the world, with the Jewish Daily Bulletin, the publication of the Index, etc., it would have cost the community many times the amount we are in need of. With a comparatively insignificant sum we have established a world-wide system, combining effectiveness and responsibility - a system which more than one business man has told us he considered miraculous, in view of the limited financial resources under which we labored.

While there are in New York at least twenty different agencies like the Polish, Armenian, Russian, Ukrainian, etc., ours is the only one which has succeeded in obtaining an agreement with the Associated Press through which our news is submitted to the entire American general press. This is in itself perhaps the best testimony of the degree of efficiency which our enterprise has acquired.

I sincerely hope that I have been able to convey to you how earnest is our ambition to establish an institution, rather than merely a newspaper or agency, and that no marked financial success of our enterprise could give us the satisfaction we would have, and have had until now, in the knowledge that the communal value of our enterprise is beyond a doubt. This has been attested to in the most emphatic language in a recent letter from Mr. Louis Marshall, of which I am enclosing a copy. As I have mentioned before, our going to members of the Jewish community for financial assistance has not always been a course without danger. It is obvious that an institution like ours, because it is not a charitable organization can, despite its usefulness and importance, appeal only to the few who are interested in every Jewish cause and have an eye for the importance of a system which is today the most important instrumentality in shaping Jewish as well as general public opinion in the interest of the Jewish cause. This, despite all its financial difficulties.

Let me point out to you here a case of another phase of the communal value of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency:

About a year ago we received a telegram at 6 o'clock in the evening from the headquarters of the B'nai B'rith in Cincinnati, stating that a certain Yankelovitch had been sentenced to death by a military court in Poland. His uncle in Denver, a member of the B'nai B'rith, asked to make inquiries. We wired to our London office immediately and our London office wired to our Warsaw office and at 5 o'clock the next morning we received an answer, so that when the representative of the B'nai B'rith arrived at our office he found a reply waiting. We had also wired to the Polish Legation in Washington and our offices in Paris and London inquired of the Polish ministers in those cities. The mere fact that the Polish Government learned that there was an agency in the United States interested in the case led to a new trial on technical grounds. Yankelovitch, who had been sentenced to death because he was accused of being a Bolshevik by another soldier who harbored a grudge against him, was freed. Here was a case where no other body could have intervened. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency, which in no way represents the Jewish community or any communal institution, could exercise a much larger freedom of action and can in many such cases be useful.

I am convinced that we could be many times more valuable to the Jewish community if we could work without the limitations which financial difficulties impose upon us. Do you not think that the record we can point to is sufficiently convincing to imbue those who would give us support with the feeling that it is deserved?

If earnestness of purpose and sincerity of ambition have any convincing power at all, I sincerely trust that you will make a real effort to help our program by realizing the quota of the city of Cleveland.







I am very sorry that I missed you the night you spoke in Buffalo last week. I had hoped to get down, but I too was engaged in speaking before some church organization. This business of speaking before "goyim" certainly saps the life out of us Jews. I heard you, however, over the radio and was thrilled by the masterful manner with which you treated your subject.

I am writing to inquire about your Jewish Educational Association. We are planning to organize an association of this kind in Buffalo and I want to model it, if possible, on the organization that you established in Cleveland. Will you be kind enough to send me all of the necessary information because I want to get things underway as early as possible? There is a dire need for such an organization in Buffalo, and I have the promised co-operation of every significant group.

You will be interested to learn that I was on the program to speak before the Conference of International Relations the night after you. It was the intention of the Committee for me to present some concrete problems arising out of the relations between nations and carrying the theoretical principles that you enunciated the night before into practice. I applied these, for example, to Mexico and protested against any kind of armed intervention. The Catholic that spoke on the program with you was highly incensed on what he called "the attack on Catholics and defense of the brute and murderer Calles of Mexico". I have been fittingly placed in "cherem" by the forces of the Pope.



My dear Rabbi Silver:

I am preparing to be in Cleveland on Thursday, March 8th, in connection with the campaign for the Cleveland quota to the Jewish Daily Bulletin fund. I have heard from Mrs. Frankel who speaks of a luncheon for two hundred people. I wonder whether that in itself is an advisable thing. The effort to obtain the attendance of two hundred people is enormous.

Perhaps if one hundred letters were sent to a selected group of people, we could obtain the attendance of from thirty-five to seventy-five individuals and that from this small group subscriptions for the quota from Cleveland might be obtained.

The example of the venerable Ben Selling of Portland, Oregon, who besides subscribing \$500 per annum for each of three years toward the Portland quota, walked into the offices of one-half dozen of his friends and obtained from practically less than ten individuals the sum of \$1,000 per annum making up the Portland quota, is worthy of note.

I believe that a similar achievement could be obtained in Cleveland and once we had the initial luncheon at which a small group would attend it is very possible that we might secure the subscriptions in the amounts varying from one to five hundred dollars, realizing the whole or a substantial part of our quota. There are so few individuals to whom one can appeal for a work such as this which, because of its nature, appeals only to the intelligent, far visioned and far-seeing, who appreciate the need for an international news system to the Jewish community, informing one part of the community of the events affecting the others, with impartiality, objectivity and responsibility.



On January first I took over the editorship of "The American Israelite".

You know, from your own experience, that the added burden will be considerable. I regret that I am not in a position to give it the undivided attention which its history and its possibilities warrant. However I shall use what strength I have in carrying on the paper in whatever manner will seem to me most useful to American Israel.

I have always thought "The Israelite" should be a means of intercongregational contact and a vehicle for the wider expression of rabbinic opinions and ideas. I shall work toward that end. If we rabbis have a vehicle for free, full and authoritative publication of our views I feel a powerful ally will have been secured. 

My dear Dr. Silver:

I wish to acknowledge your telegram.

On the occasion on which I came in contact with Mrs. Frankel at the Statler Hotel, she agreed to take care of details for a luncheon, such as sending out invitations, etc., and she left me uninformed, until the day before the luncheon, that nothing had been done in the way of making arrangements or sending out invitations.

I cannot help contrasting this attitude with the reception of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency - Jewish Daily Bulletin cause in Cincinnati. I am enclosing a copy of a letter from Mr. Oscar Berman. Notwithstanding his own pessimism with regard to the complete success of a luncheon, he nevertheless joined with a group of our friends in Cincinnati and has given me a definite date at the Cincinnati Club in order to enable me to meet a few individuals. Even though I do not obtain the full amount on that occasion, meeting them and discussing the problem will in itself be a great help and lead to the ultimate completion of the Cincinnati quota.

I am writing to Mrs. Frankel asking her whether she would not reconsider and get in touch with Mr. Baker and you in order to secure your cooperation in sending out invitations and make another date as close after March 14th, as possible. Even though a luncheon in Cleveland results in nothing better than securing the attendance of a dozen individuals such a group would, through council and advice, provide the basis on which the comparatively small sum of \$3,000 per annum could be raised.

This enterprise cannot offer the appreciation of sensationalism to its friends for their interest. It is dependent upon the good will of its friends who appreciate the dignity and

impartiality of a unique news service whose sole aim is to render service to the Jewish community and to give one part reliable information concerning all other parts.


I hope that Mrs. Frankel communicates with you and agrees to undertake the effort but in the event that she does not, I wonder whether you would not communicate with Mr. Baker and arrange for a small luncheon gathering which would not require more than fifty or sixty invitations being sent out. I appreciate the fact that you carry many communal burdens, and it is only because you do that we have any hope to believe that you will add our cause to the many other burdens and not let its appeal go unheeded.

We had a most encouraging experience quite recently. I heard from Mr. Milton S. Binswanger of Memphis, Tennessee, whom we had written asking that he attempt to secure the quota from Memphis to the fund being raised for the Jewish Daily Bulletin. Without my presence he wrote and spoke to a number of his friends and I was delighted to find in the mail, signed pledges for each of three years and checks aggregating the Memphis quota.

I shall be at the Hotel Sinton in Cincinnati on Wednesday, March 14th and I wonder whether you would mind dropping me a line at that place, concerning your reactions to my letter.

Minutes of a Joint meeting of the Recreation
Conference, the Alliance Board, and the Alliance
Staff, held on Tuesday, March 27, 1928, at luncheon
at the Hotel Statler.

In the absence of Rabbi Solomon Goldman, Mr Wm C Treuhart presided. The following were present: representing the Alliance Board, Louis Bing, Jr., M Ratzesky, Mrs Louis Wolin; representing the Alliance Staff, Miss Ida Schott, Miss Lillian Strauss, Miss Laidman, Miss J Desenberg, Miss M Eichenbaum, Mrs Schultz, Miss Brown, Miss Galvin, Miss Printz, and Mr Albert Brown; members of the Recreation Conference, J Bassichis, Mrs A I Fischer, Mrs Julius Fryer, Marc J Grossman, Mrs Sieg Herzog, Miss Violet Kittner, Leonard Levy, Charles Nemser, Mrs E I Oberbrunner, Mrs Simon Peiser, A F Sachs, Miss Ruth Schwarzenberg, and Dr J Slawson. There were also present, Mrs Charles Nemser, and Miss Betty Miller.

The Chairman stated that the meeting was called for two purposes.
(a) to summarize the progress that has thus far been made by the Recreation Conference with an outline for a future program, and
(b) to bid Mr Nemser, who has acted as Secretary of the Conference since its inception, a farewell.

Mr Nemser submitted a statement, the outline of which follows:

1. Beginnings

- A. Preliminary meetings for consideration of organization held from September 10, 1925 thru October 22, 1925.
At latter date the plan was finally drafted for submission to the conference.
- B. Conference was called December 17, 1925, for adoption of Constitution. Purpose to consider study and recommend thru joint planning the possibilities of the development of the recreational and character building resources of the Jewish community of Cleveland.
- C. Why joint planning?
 - a. Recreation as a social force, a matter of general community concern. Isolated attempts at it are fractional, uneconomical, unstatesmanlike, and contrary to spirit of cooperation which dominates these times.
Recreation requires joint planning if the largest number of people is to be reached and opportunities provided for the normal wholesome exercise of the people's desire for amusement, recreation and relaxation.
Recreation releases and enriches personality - elevates community moral tone - preserves Jewish group ideals.
The effect of a Recreation Conference would be to make recreation the common mind content of the whole community - would make for a community vision of recreation.
 - b. Definition of Recreation - is the program of liberating personality through happy, useful, employment of leisure time. Aims at making life normal, adequate and balanced in an age of speed, nerves and tension - it adds a song to life and makes it flexible, resilient, buoyant and resourceful. It aims at preservation of health, develops character, educates personality and develops Jewish loyalties. The recreation movement is in line with the shifting of emphasis from charity and correction for the few underprivileged to adequacy and prevention for the whole community.

c. Notable benefits of play - protection of child life from the perils of the street, good physique, resistance to disease, reduction of child crime and delinquency thru wholesome occupation and building of character through education, through play. All the faculties of the body, mind and soul are brought into action. The same notable benefits obtain for adults.

1. The necessity for the Jewish Conference - is implied in the necessity for community planning to make this force effective for the largest number - to diffuse it for the well being of everyone.

2. History

A. (First Meeting) Constitution and plan of organization approved December 17th, 1925.

The functions of the Conference.

- a. To plan to best meet needs of Jewish community in the various Jewish localities.
- b. To plan for correlation of activity - avoid duplication or unnecessary organization of work in the various localities.
- c. To determine the untouched fields.
- d. To cooperate with non-Jewish agencies that might affect our recreational welfare.
- e. To so organize self that entire community felt itself represented.

Membership on basis of agencies.

Officers - Chairman member of Functional Relations Committee; Vice-Chairman and secretary elected.

Committees - Professional Cooperation - studies - membership - Jewish Education - Publicity.

Second Meeting: March 4, 1926.

Third Meeting: June 4, 1926.

- a. Martha House sale recommended by conference after Jewish Welfare Board was called in.
- b. Studies and Surveys.
 1. Mt Pleasant appropriation of \$40,000 by C.E.A. and plan for neighborhood participation in capital drive, maintenance and government approved.

c. Professional Cooperation - city wide oratorical - series of debates.

d. Jewish Education - neighborhood holiday celebrations.

Extension work at Camp Wise and Alliance.

Fourth Meeting: October 18, 1926.

- a. Slawson reported on distribution of Jewish population of Cleveland.
- b. Studies and Surveys committee instructed to make extensive study of whole recreational situation including Temple Centers.

Fifth Meeting: February 8th, 1927.

- a. Slawson's comprehensive survey of Recreation Resources pointed out a very apparent recreation underservice.
- b. Conference recommended that Board of Jewish Education include courses in Jewish elements for recreation workers.
- c. Discussion pointed to conclusion that recreation should receive a proportionate share of community's energies and funds in order that a well rounded general community program be effected.

Sixth Meeting: October 6th, 1927.

- a. Slawson's survey analyzed in detail.
- b. Grossman reported for a sub-committee on utilization of Temple Centers.
- c. Studies and Survey report drafted at Excelsior Club on June 29, 1927, read.

1. Congregational center and community center shall be permitted a coordinate development without the one crowding out the other - approved.
2. Looking toward a Bureau of Recreation - considered a point well taken but postponed until a future favorable time.
3. Alliance to rent quarters in 105th Street - extension work there and in all other neighborhoods needing its service, utilizing whatever facilities were available; Federation called upon to make available sufficient funds to carry on this extension work through guidance of Recreation Conference and in cooperation with existing agencies - approved.

Six Conference meetings were held and approximately twenty committee sessions. The effect of all this, built up a recreational consciousness. Plenty of battles, but opinions compromised or better still, integrated into new ideas.

3. Accomplishments of Conference.

- a. Recreation defined in terms of community.
- b. Spirit of cooperation and joint concern developed.
- c. Needs defined.
- d. Studies for factual bases made.
- e. Parallel development of congregation and community center approved.
- f. 105th Street approved.
- g. Mt Pleasant approved.
- h. Martha House disapproved.
- i. Studious, critical attitude introduced into thinking.

4. Future.

- a. Conference to continue its work vigorous and unabated. The key to community vision of the whole problem.
- b. Encourage Alliance in its varied program. 105th Street, extension work in St Clair - Cedar 77th - West Side. The problem of the unserved - half the population unserved.
Temples have 140 rooms; Alliance 25.
Temples spend \$350,000; Alliance \$43,000.
Cleveland last in amount spent per 1000 population and in persons reached per thousand population.
- c. Utilize the Temple Centers facilities.
 1. Work out arrangement with Jewish Center.
 2. Conferences with Temple Boards as to availability and study time - space budgets and finances involved.
- d. Promotion of camp program for whole community.
- e. An ultimate central Jewish community center and neighborhood branches.
- f. Bureau of Recreation - a good thing, but possible only if Federation makes enough funds available (perhaps thru double barreled Federation idea).
- g. Necessity for Federation to be more aggressive - should not be so repressive but constructive by developmental and anticipatory of future needs.
e.g. Federation of Jewish organizations represents about 25,000 of the so-called commonality. They ought to be brought into representation into Federation.
Federation should not only plan for the future but get the funds; otherwise a protest organization will do so.

Summary: The future is hopeful - development will be gradual but basic.

The Chairman, on behalf of those present, thanked Mr Memser for the work he had done in the recreational field.

Dr Slawson presented comparative figures pertaining to the recreational situation in Cleveland. By means of charts, he showed that among six large Jewish communities studied, Cleveland rates lowest in the amount spent for recreation per thousand Jewish population. In these estimates the amounts spent by congregations and temple centers were not included. Another chart indicated that the number reached per thousand Jewish population recreationally was less for Cleveland than for the other large cities. When the temple and Jewish Center figures were included the situation was not quite so bad.

Dr Slawson also pointed out that altho the demand for recreation is increasing the service is decreasing due to the fact that the tremendous reduction in the 55th Street District was not, up to the present, balanced by the increase in the Mt Pleasant District.

With reference to the contribution of Mr Memser to our recreational work in Cleveland, Dr Slawson indicated that in his opinion Mr Memser made four distinct contributions.

1. Stressed the conception of expansion.
2. Emphasized the need for a positive approach to recreation.
3. Crystallized the community center concept.
4. Expended efforts in the direction of the injection of the Jewish educational approach into the recreational activities.

Mrs Herzog, as President of the Jewish Welfare Federation, was asked to speak and stated that two aspects of recreation have to be reconciled, the one pertaining to an ideal situation and the other pertaining to the present financial situation. She indicated however, that the need for increasing recreational service to the Jewish community was very definitely established and hoped that the funds would be made available for the carrying out of the plans which have been so carefully drawn up. Mrs Herzog believed there are tremendous possibilities for development.

On behalf of Rabbi Goldman, who was ill and could not attend the meeting, Dr Slawson expressed the regrets of Rabbi Goldman at not being able to attend the meeting and conveyed Rabbi Goldman's regrets at Mr Memser's leaving and his gratitude to Mr Tremhaft for assuming the Chairmanship of the Recreation Conference.

An expression of thanks for Rabbi Goldman's service to the Recreation Conference, of which he has Chairman since its inception, was voted.

Your well-known interest in social work prompts me to write you in reference to the coming annual Conference to be held in Cincinnati between May 9th and 13th, which promises to be a notable event in the history of Jewish philanthropy. You will be interested in the following excerpt from a letter I recently sent to the professional workers throughout the country:

"I have for some time keenly felt the absence of lay people at our Conferences. It is obvious that the character of our professional service, in the final analysis, depends upon the social-mindedness of the lay people on our Boards and Committees. Our annual Conferences can serve as a powerful influence in developing such quality. This conviction was one of the chief elements in the decision of the Executive Committee to hold our coming Conference at so convenient a place as Cincinnati. The program was formulated with the leit-motif 'The Next Decade of Jewish Social Work' in the belief that it would prove especially attractive to the lay people."

I think you will agree with me that the lay leaders in our communal activities, equally with the professional workers, benefit by the stimulus of Conference contact with others in the same field throughout the country. Such stimulus will react beneficially upon the particular activities in which the volunteers are engaged.

Incidentally may I say, that the fine old Jewish community of Cincinnati is planning a very hospitable reception to the visitors.
