We are getting ready to leave for the country July 1, and I am looking forward to the rest and quiet.

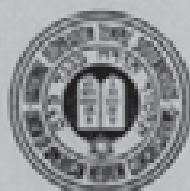

COMMITTEE RULES

As Outlined by the Plan and Scope Committee

GENERAL DIRECTIONS

The chairman of each committee should send items of interest for publication to publicity chairman no later than Monday of each week.

All reports must be submitted in writing at each board meeting.

All requests for printing must be made in writing.

All expenses should be charged to the chairman incurring the expenses and bill O. K'd and sent to the chairman of the finance committee.

Keep telephone numbers and addresses of the members of each committee. Each chairman should send three typewritten lists of her committee with telephone numbers and addresses to the chairman of printing by June 15.

Each chairman should notify vice-chairman when leaving the city and in case of absence from the board meeting the chairman should send a written report to the recording secretary if vice chairman is not a member of the board. All officers should notify recording secretary in case of absence from the city or board meeting.

Each chairman desiring publicity for the activities of her committee should communicate with the chairman of publicity.

Tellers should be instructed as soon as they are appointed.

No Board member shall be chairman of more than one committee, nor shall she be a member of more than two other regular standing committees (this will not include committees appointed to cooperate with other organizations.)

COMMITTEE ON CAMPAIGN DRIVES

To organize Committees for any drive in which the Sisterhood or congregation is active.

COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE FOR THE BLIND

To attend to the cutting for the Blind once a month.

To hold a sale for the Blind.

To provide entertainments for the Blind.

The Chairman should attend the monthly meeting of Social Service Committee at work shop of the Blind.

COMMITTEE ON SEWING

To take full charge of Monday sewing, including the distribution of the finished garments to the worthy poor.

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND BUDGET

The Finance Committee shall prepare a budget not later than June 1st, of each year to be submitted for action at the first Executive Board meeting after the annual. The Treasurer and Financial Secretary shall be appointed members of the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee shall meet monthly preceding the Board meeting. All requests for money shall come in writing and be sent to the Chairman of Finance who shall present them at the next Board meeting.

COMMITTEE ON PLAN AND SCOPE

To outline the work of the committees for the year.

To hold preliminary meetings with committee chairmen.

To obviate duplication of work.

To encourage cooperation between committees.

To hold no less than three meetings each year.

COMMITTEE ON TEMPLE ATTENDANCE

To devise methods for increasing Temple attendance.

To stimulate interest in Religion.

PARENT-TEACHERS COMMITTEE

REPRESENTATIVES ON RELIGIOUS SCHOOL BOARD

Two Sabbath School representatives to visit Class Rooms.

To offer suggestions for improvement to the Educational Director.

COMMITTEE ON ETHICS

To stimulate interest in Judaism.

To arrange time and place for Study Class.

COMMITTEE ON LIBRARY

To stimulate and supervise reading on the part of the children.

To keep records.

To purchase books and supervise cataloging of same, and to see that books are kept in condition.

COMMITTEE ON FALK MEMORIAL

To assist in the organization and supervision of classes in physical training and better movies.

COMMITTEE ON PRINTING AND YEAR BOOK

To attend to the copy and printing of all matter pertaining to Sisterhood activities, such as:

Post Cards.

Invitations.

Programs, etc.

To assemble the Year Book.

To cooperate with the Secretary of the Sisterhood.

To notify the Secretary at the TEMPLE in advance so that time can be arranged for Sisterhood work.

To have all printed matter delivered to Temple one week before meetings.

To have all requests for printed matter in the hands of the chairman two weeks before needed.

To buy stamps and send O. K'd bills for printing and stamps to chairman of finance.

To keep two copies of printed matter on file.

To order one hundred extra copies of Year Book to send to the chairmen of membership.

COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP

To see that all women affiliated with the Temple become members of the Sisterhood.

To ask the girls of each year's Confirmation Class to become members of the Sisterhood for the nominal fee of \$1.00 for five years.

To report at every board meeting.

To send the name of each new member to the Financial Secretary, to the Visiting Committee and to the Plan and Scope Committee.

To send members in good standing a Year Book.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLICITY

To write articles for the Temple Bulletin, Criterion and Daily papers.

To take notes at Board meetings.

To announce open meetings one week in advance.

To write detailed account of meetings to be published the following week.

COMMITTEE ON COOPERATION

To cooperate with the National Organization.

COMMITTEE ON SCHOLARSHIPS

To see that at least two \$350 scholarships are sent to the Hebrew Union College.

COMMITTEE ON UNIONGRAMS

To devise ways and means of selling Uniongrams, the money to be applied to the scholarship fund.

During the first week in January of each year, the Executive Secretary shall inform each Sisterhood of the Uniongram profits standing to its credit on the books, and request a statement as to its disposal according to the provisions of the Constitution.

The Treasurer should buy Uniongrams and should request an accurate accounting of Uniongrams and money received.

COMMITTEE ON FLOWER FUND

To devise ways and means of acquainting the members of the congregation of the existence of this fund.
To acknowledge all donations to this fund and send money monthly to the Treasurer.

COMMITTEE ON PROPAGANDA

To bring new activities into Federation of Temple Sisterhoods.

COMMITTEE ON PITTSBURGH JEWISH WOMEN'S RELIGIOUS SCHOOLS—(A joint committee in cooperation with the Council of Jewish Women)

To establish religious schools in Pittsburgh and outlying districts.
To visit schools already in existence.

COMMITTEE ON PULPIT DECORATIONS

To order flowers or plants for the Pulpit for the Sabbaths and Holy days.
To send flowers that decorate pulpit to the sick.

COMMITTEE ON VISITING

To visit strangers and all new members.
To cooperate with hospitality committee in greeting and in introducing the strangers at open meetings.

AUTOMOBILE COMMITTEE

To furnish Automobiles for the various Sisterhood activities.

CHOIR COMMITTEE

To cooperate with the Rabbi and with the music committee of the Temple.
To assist in stimulating congregational singing.

TEMPLE INTERIOR COMMITTEE

To cooperate with the Executive Secretary in supervising the cleanliness and other requirements of the Temple, and in purchasing supplies for the Sisterhood.

CHILD STUDY CLASS

A Class for the Study of all the problems of youth from infancy through adolescence. This is carried on through the medium of lectures by Psychologists, Physicians, Alienists, Educators, Psychoanalysts and Eugenists. Discussion to follow each meeting by the entire class which is open to the public. The Executive Committee of the class to be composed of Sisterhood members.

SOLDIERS RECREATION

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

SOCIAL COMMITTEE

To greet all members at open meetings of Sisterhood and Congregation.
To arrange all Congregational and Sisterhood affairs such as: Confirmation Reception, Teacher-Parent meetings, Student Dance, Picnic, etc.
To procure prizes for dances.
To attend every social function.
To take charge of candy and candles for Chanukah.
To rent halls.
To get permits for clubs.
To arrange for Religious School Picnics in April of each year.
To order refreshments.

My dear Rabbi Silver:

I am enclosing a copy of a letter which Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner is sending to about sixty of the leading members of his congregation, as well as a letter that Mr. Edward M. Baker has written.

I would be extremely grateful if you would consent to write a letter to a group of your congregation urging their participation in the quota that we are attempting to raise.

As in the case of Rabbi Brickner, we are meeting the expenses of typing the letters, stamps, etc. In each of these letters there is to be enclosed copies of the letters of Messrs. Louis Marshall, Felix M. Warburg and Adolph S. Ochs as well as a subscription blank. I would send the sets of enclosures upon hearing the number of letters that you would be willing to send out.

We are now confronted with one of the most serious crises in our history. The summer is approaching and our financial commitments are such, they are causing us grave concern. This is the period of the year which normally finds our income at its lowest ebb. We had hoped to be able to complete our campaign in the early part of the year. I have many other cities to visit and it is impossible for me to spend a great deal of time in Cleveland. My dear Rabbi Silver:-

There is a legal publication called Case and Comment, published by the Lawyers Co-Operative Publishing Company of Rochester, N. Y. In its April, May, 1928 number, which I have just received, there is an excerpt from an address by one Robert R. Friend, Esq. before the Kentucky State Bar Association.

When I read it, it sounded so much like your interpretation of America, that I compared it with your definition and it sounds to me like a plagiarism.

I am hereby giving you that part of the excerpt, which reads so much like your definition of America.

"Truly it was the divine plan to reserve this continent for a purpose from the darkness and oppression of the old world to transplant men's highest aspirations to the new; that the principles of real freedom and the truths of real religion might come to full fruition in a virgin soil.

For this God built a continent and filled it with treasure. He pillowed it on the shouldering mountains, and carpeted it with rolling prairies, clothed it with forest and filled them with song, traced with His hand the course of its rivers and blessed it all with the smile of His love. Then He called to the nations of the earth and they came, the strongest and best, each bringing his gift and his hope. He inspired them with the love of liberty and brotherliness to all mankind, bade them build their homes and altars and to employ their time in useful toil; He transferred the seat of power to the new world; dedicated their government to the principle that "governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed"; He blessed it with a purpose sublime and called it "America". "

My dear Rabbi Silver:

The presidential campaign of 1928 presents moral issues for the ministers and religious leaders of the country in a more clear cut form than ever before. And by moral issues I mean those vital questions that have to do with the welfare and protection of the great body of workers both on farms and in industry, and the definite coping with the menace of militarism, imperialism and war.

Bishop Paul Jones of the Fellowship of Reconciliation and I have taken the liberty to try to organize a committee of ministers who will endorse the campaign of Norman Thomas and James H. Maurer, the platform of whose party I enclose. We think that there is a possibility at the present time for this party to become the logical rallying point for the progressive forces of our country, similar to the Labor Party in Great Britain, which is an intellectual and moral force in politics, in addition to being a radical workers movement.



THE LITTLE THEATRE GUILD

The Little Theatre, E. 9th at Chester, announces the formation of the Little Theatre Guild, to promote the movement for better plays and to make such plays available to the Cleveland public at popular prices.

While not corresponding in all respects to any other organization of the kind in America, the Little Theatre Guild will be similar in plan and purpose to the Theatre Guild of New York City, Eva Le Callienne's Civic Repertory Theatre of New York City, the Boston Repertory Theatre, and the Civic Theatre directed by Jessie Borstelle in Detroit.

Membership will be open to all lovers of the better things in the field of the theatre. The aim is to make this a popular enterprise in the broadest sense, and with this in mind, the price of membership has been fixed at One Dollar for a season of twelve weeks. The season of 1928-29 at the Little Theatre will be divided into periods of twelve weeks each. The first of these periods is to begin Sunday, September 2nd, and extend to Saturday, November 24th. Members are now being enrolled for this initial period.

A membership card in the Little Theatre Guild will entitle the holder to certain definite advantages. Among these will be a reduction in the price of all tickets purchased for personal use: \$1.50 orchestra seats will be obtainable at \$1.25; \$1.00 seats at 75 cents. Another advantage will be the right to buy tickets to performances in advance of the date set for sale to the general public. A third advantage will be admission free to a number of special literary, dramatic and social programs to be arranged at the Little Theatre exclusively for members in the course of the season.

The regular prices of tickets at the Little Theatre performance will continue as heretofore: Evenings, 50 cents to \$1.50; matinees, 50 cents to \$1.00.

The plan is to organize a first-rate company of New York professionals, and add from time to time visiting stars. A New York art and technical director is to be engaged, a man who understands modern methods of play interpretation.

The dramas to be presented will be selected mainly from the following list:

"The Devil's Disciple" by Bernard Shaw
"Iris" by Arthur Wing Pinero
"What Every Woman Knows" by Sir J.M. Barrie
"Diff'rent" by Eugene O'Neill
"Juno and the Paycock" by Sean O'Casey
"The Life of Man" by Andreyev
"Simon Called Peter" by Jules Eckert Goodman
"All God's Chillun Got Wings" by Eugene O'Neill
"Hedda Gabler" by Henryk Ibsen

Besides the above types of plays, an occasional eccentric or experimental production will be put on. A season of four to six weeks of Shakespearean plays is also planned.

The Little Theatre has given some indication during the past ten months of the sort of theatre entertainment that it believes in. Within the span of the season just closed, it has offered to the public:

1. A fourteen weeks' season of art movies, including such epoch-making pictures as "Potemkin," "The Last Laugh," with Emil Jannings; "Salome" and "A Doll's House," with Alla Nazimova; "Secrets of the Soul" and "Shattered" with Werner Krauss, and "The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari."
2. Fritz Leiber, an exceptionally capable actor, for many years leading men with the late Robert Mantell, in an eight weeks' season of Shakespearean plays including "Hamlet," "Othello," "The Merchant of Venice," "Taming of the Shrew," "Julius Caesar," "Macbeth" and "Romeo and Juliet," constituting the longest season of Shakespeare ever played in Cleveland.
3. The eminent Polish-American star, Bertha Kalich, in Sudermann's "Magda" and Gordin's "Kreutzer Sonata."
4. Patrick Kearney's dramatization of Sinclair Lewis' novel, "Elmer Gantry," played at the Little Theatre for the first time on any stage, and soon to be opened under the Wm. A. Brady management at the Playhouse in New York City.
5. Edouard Bourdet's "The Captive," which enjoyed at the Little Theatre one of the longest runs in the history of Cleveland playhouses.
6. Paul Green's Pulitzer prize play, "In Abraham's Bosom," acted by the Gilpin Players, one of America's foremost all-Negro dramatic organizations.
7. "Hell Bent fer Heaven," by Hatcher Hughes, another Pulitzer prize play.
8. "The Emperor Jones," by Eugene O'Neill, with Charles Gilpin, distinguished Negro star.

The Little Theatre Guild is in harmony with the country-wide urge and demand for a more vital, more significant, more intrinsically worthy theatre, and for better plays at popular prices. European cities for decades have had such Guilds. Many have sprung up in this country during the past ten years. SHALL NOT THE HOSTS OF LOVERS OF GOOD PLAYS IN CLEVELAND ENCOURAGE AND SUPPORT A SIMILAR MOVEMENT HERE?



My dear Judge Rosalsky:

I wish to make a suggestion that the "First Annual Field Day" of the "United Palestine Appeal of Greater New York" be inaugurated on the same lines as those followed in the "United Jewish Campaign Field Day" which Mr. Joseph Leblang organized and directed, producing for the United Jewish Campaign a sum in excess of \$100,000.

The scope of the collection system of federations of Jewish Charities in the United States has been enlarged to take in the social and sport inclinations of its leading members as a means of promoting interest in their programs. To this end, federations arrange for social teas, garden parties, etc., as well as tennis matches, golf days at country clubs, etc., even though it is not always the intention to solicit funds. During the summer days when all thoughts are concentrated on recreation and sports the atmosphere is right for launching the "First Annual Field Day of the United Palestine Appeal of New York."

The Yankee Stadium might be secured and Mr. Leblang's services commandeered in order to put over such a Sport Festival. The Sport Festival could be made the occasion for the gathering of leading amateurs and professionals in every department of sport recreation, with contests, matches, games, etc., in boxing, swimming, tennis, base-ball, etc.

With the return of the Jewish Agency Commissioners from London, it is very likely that Messrs. Warburg, Marshall, Dr. Frankel and scores of other prominent Jews would consent to join on a patron list and perhaps subscribe to patron boxes. This Field Day might be held during August or the very first part of September. Its publicity value would be enormous as it would reach, through the sport columns, the attention of hundreds of thousands, as well as provide excellent channels to the press for United Palestine Appeal propaganda.

A novel feature in this connection for such a United Palestine Appeal Field Day would be to induce Harry F. Guggenheim (with whom I am acquainted) to prevail upon Colonel Lindbergh to be present, and also invite America's foremost aviators to give demonstrations, etc. This may lead other large Jewish communities in the United States to arrange for a similar local field day, thereby securing throughout the country a large amount of money during the summer months, for the United Palestine Appeal and build up a favorable public opinion for the fall campaign.
