My Dear Rabbi Silver:

Am sending you under separate cover a complimentary copy of my book American Patriotic Devotions. I have been greatly encouraged by the constructive criticisims I have received for the coming edition to be printed before April. Page 6I I have used a verse from your Scriptures and have given credit only in the New Testament. This will be corrected. Also in reference to the Holy Scriptures following each verse I will give the version and not use the words Jewish, Catholic, Protestant. I shall also omit all prayers not definitely connected with great characters or outstanding incidents in our national life. The coming book will embody the judgment of our best historians north and south to aid teachers and clergymen in a chapel exercise to present a religious fact without offence.

I am making a special study of the prayers used in Chapel exercises in schools, colleges, universities, penal institutions, in the army and navy, and in the legislative assemblies. I find that more than seventy-five per cent of the prayers in Congress in Washington to be offensive not only to your own group, but to Universalists and Unitarians. They not only pay the Chaplain out of public funds contributed by all, but in the previous session theyprinted 5,0CD copies of Dr. Montgomeries prayers at a cost of \$1,900.00 My own Congressman has pledged himself to see that is never repeated.

Rabbis in New York City, Philadelphia, Baltimers, Pittsburg, and Columbus have my book. Also the Rabbi in Burmingham, Alabama, and in Macon, Georgia, and Rabbi David Phillipson in Cincinnati. I had hoped to have the new and perfected edition ready for the coming session of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, but so much is involved and the proof sheets are to be sent to all groups for their approval before final publication. If some word of approval could be given the Ploch Publishing Company of 3I west 3Ist street they would handle it for your people.

I carried a fourteen dollar add in Chio Schools a publication that had a more then 40,000 subscription list and received two orders. 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but twenty-three were opposed. That is my problem in spreading this idea throughout the nation.

I have many encouragements. Our State Senate of which I am Chaplain purchased from the printer 500 copies of the book at actual cost of printing, and they are destributed in 260 public libraries in Ohio, and in the state institutions where we have the different racial and religious groups and hold religious services. They will also send a book in leather binding to each state senate and house of representatives to be loaned to the Chaplains for their use during the session. I must carry out my work carfully as not to offend my own group.

Rabbi Samuel Schulman in New York, and David Phillipson in Cincinnati, and Rabbi Gup and Tarshish here have greatly encouraged me in this venture. And to my great surprise the Catholic Priests have been unusually kind in their response to my humble effort.

I am sure you will read enclosure with intense interest, not hesitating to extend to me your cooperation, as far as feasible.

In 1657, Manasseh ben Israel wrote his <u>Vindiciae Judaeorum</u> which was, to a certain extent, instrumental in Oliver Oromwell's readmitting our Dutch brethren to the British Isles wherefrom their ancestors had been expelled in 1290.

It is my hope that this Yankee XX. Century "<u>Vindiciae</u> <u>Judaeorum per Christianos</u> will at the psychological moment, in its turn, contribute to the reintegration of the poor victims of the Teutonic pogroms into their ancient civil rights.

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#### A COMMENDABLE RECORD

### An Editorial Appearing in the January 20th Issue of the CINCINNATI ENQUIRER

#### \*\*\*\*

Under the leadership of Chief Justice Carl V. Weygandt, the Ohio Supreme Court has made an admirable record for the year past. Its work increased 14 per cent over the previous year, and yet the Court succeeded in keeping abreast of the mass of litigation which descended upon it. Including cases and motions, there were some 935 matters decided in 1933, which compares with 822 matters in 1932. The sheer volume of work devolving upon the state's highest Court constitutes a real problem, quite apart from the challenging character of its labors. The problem of dealing with this ever-increasing burden of work has been met successfully.

This excellent record probably is due in great part to the harmony and willing cooperation of its members, contrasting sharply with the dissension which unhappily marred its efforts some years ago. In no branch of government is there so great a scope for individuality, and consequently no comparable opportunity for such inefficiency due to conflict and dissension. Despite the temptations of intramural disagreement, the Court has functioned as a harmonious unit.

The eventual result of this harmony and willingness to meet the increasing burden is certain to show in terms of a higher quality of judicial work. This, however, is an intangible factor that cannot be evaluated immediately at the close of a year. The prestige of a state supreme bench is not something that rises and falls like the mercury in a thermometer. It is a vague entity which responds after years of patient and sincere labor, and then endures in written opinions of significance and clarity. My dear Dr. Bradley:

I have a letter, signed by you as Chairman of the Citizens Welfare Sightless Committee for the Dunn Bill, inviting me to a luncheon meeting of those interested in the Bill, at the Chamber of Commerce on January 25th.

As President of The Cleveland Society for the Blind, I think you will recognize that I have an interest in the welfare of the blind people so that what I have to say in regard to the Dunn Bill and the propaganda that is being put fewward in favor of it is not out of lack of sympathy for the blind.

I am advised by one of the officers of the American Foundation for the EX and that the Foundation has not only not endersed the Durn Bill but is opposed to it is present form. The letterhead, up a which your invitation was written, contains the statement that this bill has been endersed by the American Foundation, which is a misrepresentation to which I emsure you are not consciously a party.

I have not studied the Dunn Hill in detail, but I am advised that it would set up a separate bureau of the Postoffice Department charged with the duty of opening and operating magazine stands in federal buildings, to be conducted by blind persons. It is my understanding that the American Foundation for the Blind, and I think I as eafs in saying that the people in Cleveland who have been devoted to the cause of the blind for many years in conducting The Cleveland Society for the Blind, feel that the Dunn Bill in its present form sets up a very elaborate machinery, which is both unnecessary and inadvisable, and that it would establish another bureau in Washington for the spending of taxpayers' money and will accomplish no adequate results for the blind.

It was thought by the Foundation that a beginning could be made through an executive order of the President authorizing such stands in federal buildings, and that the placing of blind people in these stands should be left to the local authorities and not be managed from Washington for the very good reason that stands of this kind would not be successfully conducted by a vast majority of blind people. Such an arrangement as the Foundation favors can be carried out without any substandial expense to the Government by way of salaries to a director of the Bureau, his clerks, and suployees, and all of the incidental operating expenses involved.

For the reasons, which have seemed good to the Foundation, I think your committee should give further consideration to the matter before it seeks to support a campaign for the passage of the bill, and particularly for the raising of funds for that purpose.

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# **Future of Education**

With all the talk there is today about technology and the machine age, some clients may wonder what people are to do for a living when the dreams of the technocrats come true. (Let me add, moreover, that I believe that some lay these dreams will be realized.) We have only one stomach and can eat only a limited amount of food. We have only two feet and can wear only a limited number of shoes. There is a limit to what an individual can spend sensibly on food, clothing, shelter and even amusement. No one on this planet has more than twenty-four hours a day. America is gradually approaching a consumption saturation point.

On the other hand, altho we ourselves may have all we need of material things, we must not forget that hundreds of millions of other people are today barely existing. Therefore, before thinking about four-hour days, we should continue to raise crops and make goods for those less fortunate than ourselves. As this is a job of generations rather than mere years, we need not now worry about the dangers of the machine age. So long as one human being is in want of food, clothing or shelter, no right-minded and able-bodied person should be content to work only a few hours a day.

Yet I must grant that *theoretically* the technocrats are right. We are constantly approaching a time when everyone can enjoy a standard of living equivalent to an income of \$10,000 per year by working four hours per day for four days per week under proper organization. (This will come, however, thru the laboratory work by scientists rather than thru legislative work by radicals.) Therefore clients are justified in asking: What will take up the slack? Or, to state the question in another way: What will we do with our spare time? Is there some line of work which can be expanded as the demand for agricultural, construction and industrial workers declines? I believe that there is such a line, and here is my reason.

Altho people can, to their own advantage, consume only a limited amount of food, clothing, shelter and amusements, there is no limit to their own development, physically, intellectually and spiritually. Thru breeding, training and character, the possibilities of every race are beyond the dreams of the most visionary. These possibilities put the most progressive technocrat in the ox-cart class. Instead of one Edison, there can easily be a million; instead of one Einstein, there easily could be another million; and so on ad infinitum. It is merely a question of proper breeding, training and character.

This development to which I have referred will come about thru increasing the quality and numbers of the teaching profession. My grandson—now in school in Wellesley, Massachusetts—is one of a class of forty-three! Gradually, as parents and taxpayers have more sense, the size of these classes will be reduced to thirty, twenty, ten and even smaller. I forecast the time when each scholar will have one special teacher, and perhaps several specialists as did Helen Keller. Considering the results which her teacher, Miss Sullivan, obtained with this deaf, dumb and blind student, the possibility of universal independent tutoring becomes apparent.

Therefore, as I visualize the future, I see the number of teachers increase as the number of agriculturists, skilled laborers and industrial workers decrease. Future generations will realize it will be far better for them to do a full day's work themselves and employ more people to develop their children physically, intellectually and spiritually. Christian teaching is an industry that can never be overdone, as it is turning out a product of which there can never be a surplus. Even today the safest and most profitable investment is in education. Whatever social or political systems may be tried in the future, children will always be the greatest assets. Stocks, bonds, bank accounts, insurance policies and real estate holdings may easily pass out of existence. Our children, however, will always be ours. Whatever happens to bankers, manufacturers and merchants, the efficient teacher will always be in demand. Moreover, as leisure time increases, the demand for those who can train others physically, intellectually and spiritually will rapidly increase. Even today many families are looking for such persons to come into their homes and guide their boys and girls.

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#### THE OHIO SUPREME COURT

(An Editorial Appearing in the January 24th Issue of the DAYTON DAILY NEWS)

When the people of Ohio elected Carl V. Weygandt chief justice of their supreme court they chose a highly regarded man. The court has now entered upon its second year under Justice Weygandt's leadership. The record of the year has justified the expectation which those who knew the new justice best have held. The court did its work last year under special difficulties. There was the illness and death of Judge Robert H. Day and the illness and resignation of Judge Kinkade. In spite of these handicaps the court performed the heaviest year's work in its 130 years.

The records show 935 matters decided in 1933, as compared with 822 in 1932. This was an increase of about 14 per cent in the quantity of work which the court handled in Judge Weygandt's first year. No one would be prompter than the ohief justice to deny that quantity of work done is any substitute for quality. The general impression seems to be, however, that the quality of last year's work by the court was at least equal to that of previous years.

The people of Ohio may congratulate themselves on the progress of their highest court.

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## THE SUPREME COURT'S RECORD

An Editorial Appearing in the January 24th issue, Youngstown Vindicator

An admirable record was made the past year by the Ohio Supreme Court, which kept up with the mass of litigation, despite the fact that the work increased 14 per cent over the previous year. During the year more than 935 matters were decided as against 828 in the year before Carl V. Meygandt of Cleveland, formerly on the Cuyahoga County Court of Appeals, become chief justice. The volume of work in the State's highest court had become a problem which in a year has been successfully met and justifies the change in leadership which resulted from the last state election.

In the campaign of 1932 it was argued that the election of the Cleveland judge would make an end of the dissension in the court which had hindered its work for some time, and harmony and cooperation might be looked for under a new head. The prediction has been made good as the record of the year's work shows. An increase of more than a hundred decisions in a year with an increase in the work shows that the court has been harmonious, and the record gives promise of a quality of judicial work that was not to be expected without cooperation.

### A RECORD OF INDUSTRY

An Editorial Appearing in the January 24th issue of The Toledo Blade

The official record of the Ohio supreme court for 1933 shows that under the first year of the leadership of Chief Justice Carl V. Weygandt, the seven judges disposed of 248 cases and some hundreds of motions and other matters - 935 in all as against 822 during the previous year. The judges kept well abreast with a thicker docket and completed the heaviest twelve months' work in the court's 130 years of history.

While mass production of decisions by the judiciary is impossible, and has not been attempted, the high court's record of accomplishment seems been to have/matched by the equity, courage, learning and research revealed in its opinions and rulings.

Certainly the black-robed judges lose mothing of dignity and public confidence by shirt-sleeve industry.



Dear Abba:

A group of Brooklyn Jews have organized themselves as the Brooklyn Jewish Democracy, Inc., stating that their organization is "frankly Jewish and undisguisedly political." In their incorporation papers, they announce their purpose "to unite and coordinate the Jewish citizens of Brooklyn in a solid, formidable phalanx so that, through united political action," they may accomplish their purposes. In speeches and articles made at meetings by the organizers, they indicate definitely that what they desire is "proportional political representation" on the basis of the Jewish population in Brooklyn.

Dr. Samuel Margoshes, Editor of The Day, speaking at their meeting on Sunday, said:

"We are being discriminated against, in and outside of our party. We are not getting the number of teachers, high-achool principals, and office holders that we proportionately rate. But this will end when we band together and become a power in this largest Jewish city of the world, where every one in three is a Jew."

The danger of such an organization, with such a political program under the Jewish name is, to our minds, obvious. You may recall that, on a similar occasion many years ago, the late Louis Marshall said:

"To my mind nothing can be more objectionable than to revert to such practise. It is undignified, it is un-American, it is un-Jewish .... Whenever I hear of any body of men who thus brand themselves politically, I immediately ask myself, what is their gime, whose political chestnuts are they seeking to pull out of the fire, what is their conception of citizenship and politics, whose collar are they wearing and what boss are they seeking to influence? Every decent minking man, when confronted with such a situation, recoils in disgust."

In the light of this and the evident danger that lurks in any political organization on the basis of religious alignment, we would appreciate

your opinion in the matter. Specifically, we would like to have a reply to the following questions:

- Can you reconcils Americanism in its truest sense with an attempt to achieve political ends through religious organization?
- (2) May it not be that the self-segregation of Jews on a political basis in a city like New York will affect the Jews throughout the United States?
- (3) Is not such an organization political dynamite which may be used by those in America and abroad who would segregate the Jews on the principle of minority, racial or national lines?
- (4) Would you sanction or oppose any such organization in your own community?

My dear Mr. Wallach:

I am returning under separate cover the proof sheets of your booklet "Towards An Understanding Of The Jews." Taken all in all, I think it will prove a very helpful and satisfactory compilation about things Jewish. I have made numerous marginal notes, some of which are quite important.

I believe that under the heading of "The Charges and the Facts", a statement should be included as to the reasons why the Jews are represented beyond their quota in the professions and in business etc. A brief historical statement would prove very helpful. You know, of course, that much of the anti-Semitic propaganda has been based upon the charge that the Jew is averse to manual labor -- so called productive labof, etc., etc.

Flease pay particular attention to my comment on the chapter "Jews and Communism." In an effort to protect ourselves against the charge of communism, we are in danger first of committing the Jewish people as such to one or another economic theory, and secondly to render anomalous the position of three million Jews who live today under Communism in Russia.

I believe that too much space is devoted to the doctrines of Judaism. The modern anti-Semite does not devote his energies to any extent to attacking the religion of the Jews. Furthermore the theology of this article is definitely orthodox or conservative, and many Jews, especially of the liberal wing, would not subscribe to it. You should either include a Mr. Sidney Wallach

statement outlining what the belief of reform or progressive Judaism is or you should indicate at the beginning of the article that what follows is the theology of orthodoxy.

In your statistics throughout you seem to stop at the mear 1926. It would be very helpful if you brought up your statistics to the year 1932 or 1933.

In conclusion let me say that I believe that a special chapter should be devoted to the way in which the American Jew cooperates with non-Jewish organizations for the common good, along the lines suggested in my answer to Dr. McAfee which as eared in the Jewish Daily Bulletin a few weeks ago and which is reprinted in this week's issue of the Christian Century. The belief that the Jew is isolating himself culturally and not giving himself completely to American life is widespread even among the liberal and intellectual curcles of America. Perhaps this statement should come after the 1 at paragraph under section LI --"The Charges and the Facts."

Under "Quotations", I would include a biographic note concerning the men whom you are quoting for the benefit of those who may wish to use those quotations. I would limit these quotations strictly to non-Jews.

#### MEMORANDUM ON "JEWS MUST LIVE"

Our attention has been called to a book which has just been issued under the title, "JEWS MUST LIVE," which is advertised as a statement of "the case against the Jews." This book has been written by a Jew who has apparently issued it to profit by the wave of interest in the Jewish question and especially the anti-Jewish agitation resulting from the situation in Germany.

The book is plainly written for the purpose of catering to anti-Semites and of stampeding Jews into hysterical donunciation of the book. Nothing could serve the author better to popularize the book and to sell it in large quantities than to have Jews attack it publicly or make an issue of it. Years of experience have shown that such books thrive only on the publicity given them by Jews themselves. We respectfully suggest that any action that would in any way fall in with the author's plans be avoided. Furchases of the book, public discussion of the book, sermons on the book, reviews of the book will only help to stimulate an interest in it and expand its sales.

Dear Dr. Silver -

I hope you will not consider it presumptious on my part if I ask your assistance in a matter which concerns me very deeply.

I have a younger brother in Montreal. Canada, who emigrated from Germany a few years ago. He is an electrician, educated, energetic and capable. In spite of all his efforts, he can not succeed in finding work which will yield even the most moderate livelihood.

The difficulty is not the question of financial support. My parents are able to belo him financially. But he is 34 years old and crushed by the thought that he is compelled to accept assistance when his healthy body and at least normal intelligence should enable him to support himself. He is not married.

He loves Palestine and is eager to go there. But his efforts to secure a "certificate" have been unsuccessful. I presume that you are molested with similar requests more often than you like. And I can only assure you that I have hesitated for a long time before approaching you in this matter. I am not motivated merely by my natural affection for my brother, but am convinced that his situation does deserve favorable consideration even from an impartial viewpoint.

My parents and other members of my family in Germany are making arrangements to go to Palestine. A young niece arrived there several nonths ago. Needless to say, they are very anxious to have my brother join them.

Would it not be possible for you to use your good offices and part of your influence to help procure for my brother a visa and residence permit for Palestine?

Through its achievements to date, its published series of historical, philosophical, economic, ethnographical and bibliographical volumes, through the extraordinarily rich material in cultural documentary evidence which it has accumulated through the erection of its own building in Wilmo, the home of Jewish Science, it has won the recognition of both the Jewish and the non-Jewish world and the warmest sympathies of the world's cultural institutions of the Jews.

By its activity the YIDDISH SCIENTIFIC INSTITUTE is rescuing from loss and oblivion the relics of the Jewish past and the gens of Jewish folk creation. It conducts research studies in Jewish history, and the Yiddish language and literature. It collects and works up the material for the comprehension of the economic condition of Jewish settlements. It is making researches into the peculiarities of the psyche of the Jewish child. This entire comprehensive activity of the Institute is being carried on through the collaboration of Jewish men of science.

In the Honorary presidium are included Professors Simon Dubnow, Albert Einstein and Siegmund Freud. In America has been organized an inter-university committee on Jewish social science for the Surtherance of the work of the Yiddiah Scientific Institute cansisting of 22 professors from various universities under the leadership of the prominent Professor Edward Sapir. ( A full list of the committee is attached.)

The Institute is supported itself partly by individual membership and contributions and in Europe, especially in Foland it has been supported by a number of Jewish community organizations such as the "Kahillahs". In America where there are no Kahillahs with a legal status, voluntary individual membership is the only source upon which we are forced to depend.

In the meantime the Institute is doing its splendid work under economic conditions which only the most selfless idealism can endure.

We feel that although individual membership is still the backbone of our income, organized Jewish communal life should be at least our second financial resource.

We appeal to you as to the organized Jewish communal life in Cleveland, to include the YIDDISH SCIENTIFIC INSTITUTE among those institutions worthy of your support and to appropriate a substantial sum for the work and activities of the YIDDISH SCIENTIFIC INSTITUTE.

We hope that you will give this matter your very kind consideration. We beg to remain.

Replica of letter sent by Professor Edward Sapir to Mr. Szur of the Yiddish Scientific Institute.

Dear Mr. Szur:-

I lea med from Dr. M. J. Earpf that you are in this country representing the interests of the Yiddish Scientific Institute in a drive for funds. As you know, the Inter-University Council for Jewish Social Besearch is not in a position at present to assist the Yiddish Scientific Instituted directly but is, naturally immensely interested in the program of the Institute. I would like, therefore, to make a brief statement in behalf of the Inter-University Council for Jewish Social Research, and for myself personally, by way of endorsing the work of the Institute.

It seems to me that there are few cultural enterprised today which are of greater scientific value than the work that the Yiddish Scientific Institute has launched in Wilno. The varied volumes and numbers which the Institute has already published are an excellent guarantee of the high standard of the work which the Institute is to do in the future and I can hardly think of any institution that is devoted to Jewish cultural pursuits that would be more worthy of support than the one which you represent.

Jewish scholarship has, in the main, concerned itself with philological, historical and religious topics. It has tended to neglect the basic fields of economics, sociology and social psychology. It is very gratifying to realize that the Yiddish Scientific Institute is seriously turning its attention to these fields, for this means that Jewish scholarship is trying to integrate itself with contemporary work in social science. The field of research a mong contemporary Jewish communiteis, both in this country and abroad, is a wast one and perhaps there is no more important segment of this field than that which is embraced by the Yiddish speaking communites. Yiddish is a do facto language of probably a majority of Jewish people and therefore it would be obvious that no serious work in the understanding of contemporary Jewish problems can be undertaken except through the specifically Yiddish approach. It is astonishing that this simple fact has not been clearly realized up to the present. The Yiddish Scientific Institute deserves our admiration for its clear-sightedness, energy and high competence and I take the greatest pleasure in commending it to the earnest and sympathetic consideration of all those who are eager to do something substantial for Jewish scientific research.

The school situation in the country has become so serious that a national Citizens' Conference on the Crisis in Education is convening in Columbus on April 5 and 6. In order to arouse public opinion we should like to publicize a series of resolutions at the end of the Conference, signed by prominent citizens of the entire nation.

Rightmire President We the undersigned citizens, observing the serious plight into which our schools have been forced because of the economic situation of the past four years, and sharing the conviction that the schools must be preserved as our basic democratic institution, submit the following resolutions in connection with the Citizens' Conference on the Crisis in Education being held at Columbus, Ohio, April 5 and 6, 1931;

- We call the attention of the people of the United States to these disquieting facts about our schools and their enforced curtailments of educational services.
  - a. 3,500,000 children of school age were on April 1 deprived of all schooling: 110,000 of these children had their educational opportunities taken away from them when 2,000 rural schools failed to open in the fall of 1933. 140,000 were affected at the end of December by the closing of 2,600 schools; and a million more were, on April 1, forcad to relinquish their educational opportunities by the closing of 20,000 additional schools. These groups in addition to the more than two million who have no educational opportunities even in normal times bring the total to three and a half million children who are today unable to share their traditional right to free education.
  - b. Even though the schools of the nation are responsible for 1,300,000 more pupils than in 1929-30, they are this year receiving approximately \$563,000,000 less for the education of their charges.
  - c. There are at the present time in the neighborhood of 3,000,000 young people between the ages of eighteen and twenty who are out of work and out of school and who are subjected to the influences that turn many of them to criminal tendencies. The United States Department of Justice has found that the majority of the 240,071 criminals whose finger prints were recorded last year were in the neighborhood of nineteen years of age.
  - d. It costs in the noighborhood of a billion and a half dollars each year for the people of the United States to incarcerate its 500,000 criminals, while it costs but two million more to educate its 26,000,000 school children.

- 2. We commend to the consideration of the citizenry of the country the stability, the sameness, the optimism, the patriotism of the American school teacher during these times of stress. Even though a third of the teachers of the mation have been reduced to salaries of less than the \$728 a year "blanket code" minimum established by the N.R.A. for unskilled laborers, and even though 40,000 of them are now owed more than forty million dellars in back pay and thousands of others are being paid in warrants cashable at high discounts, the teachers and school administrators of all the states of the union have devotedly continued to acrive the rising generation.
- 3. We urge that every citizen interested in the future of our children and in the destiny of our nation assume personal responsibility to keep in constant contact with the educational situation in his community and with the officers charged with keeping the schools open and effective. In this crisis we must depend upon an aroused public opinion to ensure to the children of the country educational advantages as adequate as those made available in past years to present-day adults. We must not for a moment forget that education is the bulwark of our democratic society and our surest guarantee for the future.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Inasmuch as April 13 marks the anniversary of the birth of Thomas Jefferson, and inasmuch as many of the peoples and mations of the world are displaying a concerted antagonism to the doctrines of our Country, it would appear that April 13 presents a most opportune occasion for reiterating Jefferson's appeal for religious freedom. To quote from his Bill (in the Virginia Legislature) for Establishing Religious Freedom:

"Well aware that the opinions and belief of men depend not on their own free will, but follow involuntarily the evidence proposed to their minds; that Almighty God had created the mind free, and manifested His supreme will that free it shall remain by making it altogether insusceptible of restraint;...... We, the General Assembly, do enact, That no man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever, nor shall be enforced, restrained, molested, or barthened in his body or goods, nor shall otherwise suffer on account of his religious opinions or belief; but that all men shall be free to profess, and by argument to maintain, their opinions in matters of religion, and that the same shall in no wise diminish, emlarge, or affect their civil capacities.

May we venture to suggest that you use your influence in urging prominent non-Jews either to broadcast a re-affirmation of the Jeffersonian principles on April 13, or to issue a proclamaticn upon that date endorsing the philosophy of Jefferson and our dire need for such philosophy in this era of turbulent transition.

We would appreciate hearing from you in the matter.
