My dear Rabbi Silver:

Some of the best people in America are cooperating with each other through me in rendering a unique public service to this nation.

One group, as indicated in the column to the left, has each individually promised to imagine himself to be the dictator of the whole world, with unlimited power, and then write an article telling what he would do for the benefit of humanity under such circumstances.

A second group, which is growing from day to day, will write, for national syndication about December 15, 1935 to April 15, 1936, on the proposition that "The Kingdom of God Can and Should Be Built on This Earth Without Further Delay".

Of course it is easy to secure writers on this most challenging theme. The big problem comes in making the right selection of the best sixteen to eighteen persons in the entire nation for this series.

I am asking Jews, Protestants and Catholics to write. I am trying to have writers who will represent the several fields of business, education, politics, religion, sociology, science and women's activities.

It gives me pleasure to invite you to be one of the writers on this second series of articles.

The enclosed printer's proof of the text material which will be rearranged and worked into an artistic feature heading for a page in the Sunday Magazine or Feature Sections of the daily papers, and under which the several articles will be run from week to week, will give you a pretty good idea of

In preparing the text material for our feature heading I have had the counsel of outstanding Protestants and Catholics. Unfortunately, I was not situated so as to secure similar counsel from Jews at the time. When this proof of our heading was printed, my good friend, Rabbi Leo M. Franklin of Detroit, who originally inspired me with the idea for this series, was too sick to be seen.

I shall therefore be glad of your suggestions if you think this heading can be made more acceptable to both Jewish writers and Jewish readers.

You will notice that we have carefully avoided the use of the word "Christ". We have used the name Jesus and wish to have him regarded as a good Jew who was loyal to the Synagogue and to all of the Judaism of his day except the extraneous evils which had crept in. We regard him as one of the great Hebrew prophets who came to turn the minds of the people back to the true spirit and practice of the law of Moses.

I am asking that none of the writers prepare the articles until all writers have been chosen and the dates selected for the various articles to appear.

We expect to publish at least twelve and perhaps all of this second series of articles in book form.

I may tell you confidentially that Secretary of Commerce, Daniel C. Roper, seemed deeply interested in a possible world wide movement for actually building the Kingdom of God on this earth for which we hope this second series of articles may help prepare the way. He not only promised to write but also willingly agreed to personally invite President Roosevelt to write the opening article to appear in December, 1935.

I confidently hope and await your favorable reply.

In connection with the preparation of new statistics of the num-ADVISORY COMMITTEE ber of Jews in our country and their distribution, we shall need the following information with regard to your city:

- 1. The total number of children registered in the public schools and in the junior high schools, if any, of Cleveland, on October 3, 1935.
- 2. The total number of children marked "present" in the public schools and in the junior high schools of Cleveland, on October 3, 1935.
- 3. The total number of children registered in the public schools and in the junior high schools of Cleveland, on October 7, 1935.
- 4. The total number of children marked "present" in the public schools and in the junior high schools of Cleveland, on October 7, 1935.

Will you kindly make arrangements with the authorities to secure this information for us? Certain city regulations may make it difficult for the authorities to issue these data to outsiders, but not to you, since these data and the statistics of the Jews that we shall finally give you are needed for your own communal work.

It is nearly ten years since the writer prepared for the American Jewish Committee, the statistics of the number of Jews of our country and their distribution. These, have since been published annually in the American Jewish Year Book, and used as a basis for communal work. I need not emphasize here, the importance of new Jewish population statistics. I desire, however, to stress here the need for the school data we are seeking, if we are to have accurate statistics of your city. As the time is short, will you kindly make definite arrangements with the Board of Education, or one of the district superintendents, as you see fit, for securing the desired information, and let us know. Your cooperation will be deeply appreciated.

#### NATHANIEL PEFFER

Mr. Peffer who is an authority on Far Eastern Affairs is a graduate of the University of Chicago. He was at one time assistant editor and then acting editor of the China Press in Shanghai, and later correspondent of the New York Tribune. In 1921 he returned to the United States to attend the Washington Conference and was then sent to Turkey and Eastern Europe for two years by a group of magazines. He has spent in all, eight years in the East.

In 1927, on a fellowship from John Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, Mr. Peffer went to China for a period of special research in the field of the conflict of ancient civilization and western industrialism. The findings of these studies are published in his "China: The Collapse of a Civilization" which it is said will be regarded in the future as an authoritative exposition of this transition period in Chinese history. G. E. Sokolsky has called it "the best book on China written during the last decade." Other books, "The White Man's Dilemma", "Must We Fight in Asia" and many magazine articles are from Mr. Peffer's pen. In addition to courses at the New School for Social Research, Mr. Peffer gives a course regularly at Columbia University on the Far East.

## Nathan Ratnoff Anniversary Celebration Headquarters The Waldorf-Astoria New York City

My dear Rabbi Silver:-

You are no doubt aware that the American Jewish Physicians' Committee has been actively functioning, ever since 1921, when Professor Albert Einstein made a special visit to this country, for the purpose of arousing interest in the Hebrew University.

At that time, most of us were unable to visualize the great necessity for that project. It was Dr. Nathan Ratnoff who succeeded in convincing a number of his medical associates, and who organized the American Jewish Physicians' Committee for building the Medical Department of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Today the situation in Europe, and particularly in Germany, of itself, justifies the prognostications of the need for the Hebrew University. It is now the refuge for both Jewish students and displaced Jewish teachers.

Limitation of space precludes the recitation of all the details of the enviable record made by the American Jewish Physicians' Committee. Herewith enclosed find a sketch of some of its outstanding activities.

Dear Dr Silver:

The Niagara Falls paper on Wednesday carried the headline that the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. was in favor of United States participation in the Olympics. Upon making inquiry I found that this decision had been reached by a sub-committee and the statement was not official. As all the early sessions of the Conference were of an executive nature it was difficult to get exact information, but it was plainly evident that the press had grasped at a straw and given out as a final decision the report of a single individual and that only in part.

At 7:30 this morning I was informed that Mr Teachout had been appointed chairman of the Conference Committee to decide on U.S. participation in the Olympics, and feeling that strong influence should be brought to bear I immediately wired you. I did attend an executive meeting this morning. There was much of understanding of our problem in Germany. The final committee meeting is being held tonight (Friday - so that I cannot attend, having to be at Temple) and tomorrow the question is to be brought before the Council as a whole. I do not know what the outcome will be, but I do know that the original statement will be softened. We have some genuine friends in the group and they are anxious to do what will serve us best - recognizing, at the same time, that human judgement is often faulty. For my part I attempted to point out that the issue is one of humanity and not purely a Jewish one. I can not tell you how much I appreciate your ready response to my wire, and I am of the opinion that you have rendered a real service to our people.

# A NATIONAL DAY OF ENROLLMENT OF PACIFISTS 1. Begin without delay plans for a nation-wide series of religious services on a favorable date, perhaps on Palm Sunday, which comes this year on the day before the anniversary of America's entrance into the World War. Perhaps Good Friday would be the most appropriate day of enrollment. Earlier this year at a service in Riverside Church, 254 clergymen solemnly covenanted together not to sanction or participate in any future war. At a similar service in Buffalo more than 80 clergymen signed such a covenant. The proposal is to make this a national movement, and to include laymen as well as ministers. 2. A preliminary necessity is the assembling of an up-to-date list of pacifist ministers. We therefore propose to send an inquiry to 100,000 clergymen, Protestant and Jewish. For three reasons we believe that the response will be much larger than in any previous project: (1) the world crisis is accentuating concern for international peace; (2) the questions asked will be simpler and fewer in number; (3) every person responding will receive a printed summary of results and a program of action. For these reasons we anticipate from 25,000 to 30,000 replies. 3. Secure widest possible publicity for a summary of the replies when ready. The press will undoubtedly feature the news of 15,000 or so pacifist ministers in its eagerness for war sensations. 4. As replies to questionnaire come in, even before the final summary is prepared, send pacifist ministers an outline of plans for April 5th and seek their cooperation in arranging local observance. Offer to send these ministers blank questionnaires with which to secure opinions from members of their churches. This would make possible the discovery of war-resisters among laymen. 5. Conserve results of April 5th by suggesting that local groups: (a) Compile city-wide list of pacifists, including all persons signing the covenant. (b) Send to each of these persons specific suggestions concerning action in behalf of world peace in which they can personally participate. (c) Arrange continuing community-wide program of pacifist action. SUGGESTIONS FOR APRIL 5 1. Mass meeting on Sunday evening, or afternoon if preferable, under the combined auspices of as many churches and religious peace groups as possible. Program of this union service to include: (a) Address by outstanding pacifist interpreting the significance of war-resistance. (b) Service of corporate penitence. (c) Service of consecration to the Prince of Peace. (d) Procession to the altar, where each pacifist will solemnly sign an appropriate covenant. Procession to include sections of (1) Clergymen (2) Fathers and mothers marching hand-in-hand (3) Youth 2. In metropolitan communities simultaneous meetings may be held in different sections of the city, with similar programs.

In looking at this morning's Plain Dealer I was surprised to notice my name listed as a speaker at the forthcoming meeting of the Jewish Consumptive Relief Society to be held on December third. As you know, I had not yet accepted your kind invitation to speak before that meeting.

From what I have said to you and to your group, you can have no doubt of my genuine respect for the work of your Society and for the sincerity of your many ardent workers. However, I feel that the project wich you now contemplate is one that concerns the entire Jewish community, and involves the question as to whether unity of propose and action can be achieved in community work. The latter, I believe, is the paramount issue.

I still feel that some agreement ought to be reached between the duly constituted authorities of the Jewish community, as represented in the Jewish Community Council, and any individual group that desires to attempt the amelioration of conditions affecting the entire Jewish community.

You are aware of the fact that the Bikur Cholim Society also plans a convalescent home. In view of all these circumstances, surely you would agree that you should not proceed as isolated groups, unmindful of each others' work. Certainly I should be reluctant to impose upon the community numerous individual projects which could be carried out far more economically by joint action. I shall be glad to be of any assistance that I can in co-ordinating these various efforts.

If you do not believe the Welfare Federation was justified in coming to the conclusion that the erection of a convalencent home for tuberculous patients is feasible at the present time, and if you are convinced that the information that you have does justify your efforts, undoubtedly the Welfare Federation will be glad to review the entire situation again.

The unity and order of the Jewish Community are at stake in this issue, and your consideration ought to prompt you to exhaust every means of achieving an agreement at the meeting at hand.

My dear Wolsey:

In answer to your letter of November 29, I am happy to give you the following information.

- (1) Parts are assigned on the basis of honor certificates received by confirmants during their years in the Religious School. The larger and more important parts are given to those who have the highest number of certificates.
- (2) The children do not write any of the parts. Our Confirmation Manual is in the nature of a religious service a ritual built into the ritual service of Shabuot. We therefore seldom vary the Service.
- (3) Only a small number of the class, say about twenty-five percent, have individual speaking parts. All the others participate in the responses, the hymne, the Declaration of Faith, etc.
- (4) The Shabuot Service, up to the taking out of the Torah, is read by the Rabbis.
- (5) Years ago, we followed the practice of giving every member of the class a speaking part. This was found to be very boring, needlessly protracting the Service and interfering with its dignity. We abandoned it. Today we distribute no more speaking parts than the Service calls for.
- (6) No one is consulted about the Service. The Rabbis have full charge of it.

I trust that information is what you want.

As you undoutedly know, defense of the nine Scotts boro boys, charged with attacking two white women on a freight train in Alabama in 1931, is being conducted nationally by a joint defense committee representing several national organizations interested in the case. New trials following the reversal of the Alabama courts last April by the United States Supreme Court were scheduled to begin on January 20th. New indictments were returned by a new grand jury in November.

My dear Wolsey:

In reply to your letter of January 21, let me say that it has been the practice of The Temple to permit only those who own pews in The Temple proper to worship there on the High Holy Days. All other members worship in Mahler Hall. Inasmuch as all of our pews in The Temple are not sold and the number of members who are not pew-owners is greater than the capacity of Mahler Hall, we have from time to time made certain exceptions to the above rule. We have allowed those who have been members of The Temple for a great number of years, say from twenty to thirty years, to sit in The Temple for the High Holy Days and we assign to them the unsold seats without any extra charge. For two or three years we also permitted those members who, under the above rule, sit in Mahler Hall and who would not be entitled to the courtesy extended to older members, to occupy seats in The Temple on the payment of \$10 per seat (over and above their basic dues, of course). This has been abolished by the Board this year.

You know, of course, that the basic dues of The Temple is \$50 a year and that pew owners pay an additional eight percent on the purchase price of their pews. Recently The Temple established a \$25 a year membership for unmarried young people under thirty years of age.

In answer to your fourth question, we have not found that the supplementary service works to the financial disadvantage of The Temple. We have been having such a service for a great number of years; in fact due to the

large membership, we are compelled to hold a branch service.

I trust that this will give you the information which you desire.

My dear Rabbi Silver:

I have been asked to chairman a sponsoring committee to stand behind a nation-wide series of peace meetings from April 22 to May 18. The persons who are being invited to act as sponsors are listed on the enclosed sheet.

The initiative in arranging these meetings is being taken by the Emergency Peace Campaign, which itself represents a cooperative endeavor on the part of Quakers and many other peace workers. The Acting Chairman of the Emergency Peace Campaign is Dr. William O. Mendenhall, President of Whittier College, and the Executive Director is Mr. Ray Newton, who is also Secretary of the Peace Section of the American Friends Service Committee.

The purpose of the Emergency Peace Campaign is to keep the United States from going to war, and to promote peace by carrying forward a program, which is indicated in some detail in the enclosed folder.

As one method of making effective this program, it is proposed to conduct conferences and mass meetings in some 300 cities throughout the nation this spring, and an enclosed sheet will give you some idea of the tentative plans on which these meetings will be built.

I am myself convinced that there are great possibilities in this proposed campaign, and already it has gathered around itself a gratifying and hopeful accumulation of personal and financial assistance.

I shall be happy if you will join me in sponsoring this important series of meetings.

Dear Rabbi Silver:-

A year ago, a group of young people, leaders of Hechalutz and the Young Poale Zion Alliance, laid the foundation for a new youth movement -- Habonim -- for the purpose of acquainting American Jewish children with Chalutz life in Palestine and inculcating an active personal interest in progressive and Jewish affairs. This organization embraces the Jewish children between the ages of ten to eighteen.

During the brief period of its existence, Habonim groups have been established in twenty-five cities numbering over a thousand children. Leadership courses have been organized in many centers, and educational material on Labor Zionism, contemporary Jewish life, social orientation, handicraft and scouting were prepared. A summer camp for the training of leaders in Accord, N. Y. aided greatly in educating capable leaders. A monthly publication called "Haboneh" was launched which presented current Jewish life in a novel manner. From the attached folder you will become acquainted in greater detail with the aims, activities and achievements of Habonim. Sufficient to say that Habonim, dedicated to the ideal of Chalutziut and fully aware of its role in the Jewish renaissance, is molding a youth movement which will take its place in the vanguard of Jewish life.

We, the undersigned, have had an opportunity to meet the leadership of Habonim and have become acquainted with its expansion program. We have learned that leaders in Jewish Community Centers and educational institutions have asked Habonim to organize children's groups throughout the country. We have every reason to believe that Habonim will become a great constructive force among American Jewish Youth. But the leadership of Habonim has carried on the work backed only by the personnel and limited finances of the Young Poale Zion Alliance. We feel that we can not permit the leadership of Habonim to carry the entire burden alone. We must aid them in their work.

Specifically, we can be of assistance in the following ways:

1) National Advisory Board: We deem it very important to form a

National Advisory Board of twenty-five prominent educators and

Jewish leaders. This Board, meeting once or twice a year, will

be in a position to advise the leadership of Habonim. It will

also encourage and render moral support to the young people who

are responsible for the founding and developing of Habonim.

2) Friends of Habonim Organization: With the aid of the Board, we hope to establish a Friends of Habonim Organization which will include Jewish leaders throughout the country who will render moral and material support both to the National administration and to the local units of Habonim.

The undersigned are certain of your sympathy to the Habonim organization and trust that you will honor us by serving on the National Advisory Board.

## HABONIM ITS AIMS AND PROGRAM

HABONIM is an educational organization for Jewish boys and girls between the ages of ten and eighteen. It aims to acquaint American Jewish children with Chalutz life in Eretz Israel and to inculcate an intense personal interest in Jewish life throughout the world. While focusing its program on Eretz Isarel, HABONIM also strives to create an understanding of and desire to participate actively in progressive Jewish and world affairs. HABONIM adopts the social elements of the HISTADRUT HAOVDIM, the Chalutz movement in Eretz Israel, as its welt-anschauung.

PROGRAM

Its method is that of self-activity and individual participation in the work of the group. The program includes the live elements of our national culture, such as Jewish literature, history, music, festivals, folkways and Eretz

Jewish literature, history, music, festivals, folkways and Eretz Israel. Contemporary Jewish problems, general social orientation, and Tzofiut (scouting) are essential parts of the HABONIM program. In brief, the HABONIM program is based on a constructive social philosophy adjusted to the world of the boy and girl.

HABONIM The national administration has embarked upon the ACTIVITIES following program of activities:

### Training of Leaders

HABONIM is most vitally concerned with the training of qualified leaders to take charge of its groups. The national administration conducts leadership courses in the various Jewish communities and maintains a staff of travelling instructors. In addition, the national office is engaged in publishing a leaders' library, which includes a leaders' manual, programs for holidays, booklets on specific Jewish and social questions, and handicraft projects.

### Summer Camps

A living Jewish spirit, in consonance with the best that pioneering Eretz Israel has to offer us, is inculcated in the members of HA-BONIM during the summer months at the Kvutza, as our camp is called. Modelled after the collective colonies in Eretz Israel, our Kvutza (Accord, N. Y.) develops the maximum of self-reliance, sociability, love for the out-of-doors, genuine interest in things Jewish, besides affording the recreative diversions apropo of summer life. The Kvutza is operated on a non-profit basis, with the aid of volunteer workers.

### HABONEH Monthly

During the past year, the national administration has issued a publication called HABONEH. It has been acclaimed by educational

leaders as a most important contribution to Jewish juvenile literature. Its regular features cover the field of Eretz Israel, world Jewry, social problems, biography, playlets, book reviews, games, projects. The style of the HABONEH is lively; it is profusely illustrated and stimulatingly different from any other publication that has appeared thus far.

#### FRIENDS OF HABONIM

Leaders of the Jewish educational world have shown a great interest in the further development of HABONIM. In order to concretize this interest, the organization known as FRIENDS OF HABONIM has been formed. These FRIENDS are anxious to render moral and material support to HABONIM in the expansion of its program of activities.

Specifically the FRIENDS OF HABONIM have undertaken to aid in the preparation of leaders by enabling the enlargement of the leaders' library; they have undertaken to aid in the expansion of our Summer Kvutzot, the need at the present time calling for five additional Kvutzot in various parts of the country; and they are making possible the conversion of the HABONEH into a printed magazine, which will enable its circulation among thousands of children in the Jewish educational institutions and Community Centers.

## ENDRGENCY PEACE CAMPAIGN -- 20 SOUTH LETH STRING PRIDADELPHIA

### Nation-wide Series of Conferences and Mass Meetings

As one means of helping to prevent the United States from going to war and of promoting world peace, the Emergency Peace Campaign is conducting a nation-wide series of conferences and mass meetings during the period of April 21st to May 18th, 1936. The enclosed leaflet contains information concerning the principles and procedures of this campaign. Plans are being made to carry on similar nation-wide meetings in October, 1936, and in January, 1937, thus making three successive impacts upon a community within the year.

### National Radio Program

The campaign will be launched over a national radio broadcast, through W J Z and the Blue Network of the N B C on April 21st, from 10:00 to 10:30 p.m. Eastern time. The speakers will be Mrs. Eleanor D. Roosevelt and the Right Honorable George Lansbury.

### National Sponsors

Within a few days we expect to announce the names of a distinguished group of National Sponsors of these Spring meetings. Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick has agreed to act as chairman, and is himself inviting one hundred outstanding men and women of varied points of view to serve with him. Bishop Paul B. Kern and Dean Elbert Russell are acting as Co-Chairmen in assembling a similar group of Southern Sponsors.

### Tenns of Speciers

In order to cover the country as thoroughly as possible we are assembling a maximum number of outstanding speakers and are grouping them in teams. Wherever possible it is desirable to conduct a two-day conference, with delegates present from neighboring communities. A tentative suggested program is attached.

### Local Planning Committee

The Emergency Peace Campaign will make available a competent team of speakers, but full responsibility for planning and conducting the conference must be carried locally. Usually it is desirable to function through a community-wide committee embracing representatives of various peace groups, including churches, synagogues, young people's soci ties, trade unions, fraternal orders, service clubs, etc. In some places such a committee is already at hand. In other cities an existing committee may be enlarged for this purpose. Wherever necessary a new, temporary committee may be formed.

### Local Sponsors

The responsible committee may desire to invite a representative group of citizens to sponsor the conference and mass meeting.

### Place of Meetings

Usually it is desirable to secure the largest hall available for the mass meeting. Sometimes a large public auditorium or high school auditorium may be secured at a minimum cost. Often the largest church auditorium may be secured without rental cost. The local committee will, of course, consider the relative advantages and disadvantages of holding the mass meeting in a church building.

### Delegates from other Communities

It is desirable that systematic efforts be made to enroll delegates from a radius of fifty or one hundred miles. A special sub-committee can render effective service in securing attendance from neighboring cities and towns.

### Financial Arrangements

The necessary expenses of these conferences will be taken care of from the procoods of the cash offerings and contributions made at the mostings. The Emergency Peace Compaign is now seeking to raise a million dollars with which to finance the various types of activities bein; conducted. This amount is less than one day's cost of the army and about one-fortieth of the cost of one battleship. This amount can be secured only through lifts from capital on the part of many concerned persons and by enlarging considerably the number of individuals contributing to the cause of peace. A recent estimate places the total number of separate individuals in the United States makin; a lift of any size to any peace society at less than 30,000. At special luncheons and in mass meetings the Emergency Peace Campaign expects to multiply many-fold the number of these contributors. Since it is imperative that the campaigns in the Spring, Fall and Winter strengthen local agencies of peace, it sound desirable to place half of the not proceeds of these conferences at the disposal of the local peace committee which arranged the meetings. That is to say, after all reasonable items, including rental of hall, publicity, a pro-rata share of the traveling expense of speakers, etc., have been paid, the amount remaining from local collections and contributions at meetings will be divided half and half between the responsible local committee and the Emergency Peace Compaign. It is suggested that the local committee make out a budget of anticipated expenses and submit it for consideration at the national office of The Emergency Peace Campaign.

# Emergency Peace Campaign

### ORIGIN

The Emergency Peace Campaign is being launched by a number of individuals who are very much concerned about the rapidly increasing international tensions which threaten to bring on large-scale disastrous wars in Europe and Asia with disastrous effects upon the United States. Realizing that the peoples of the world will be very fortunate if even another five years intervene before such conflicts break out, those at the heart of the Emergency Peace Campaign face the problem of what the peace-loving people of the United States ought to do in the meantime.

After much discussion and several conferences attended by outstanding peace leaders of various organizations throughout the Country it was decided to undertake a vigorous, nation wide campaign for two years. At the end of that time it will be decided what the next step should be.

### **PURPOSE**

## TO PROMOTE A CO-OPERATIVE NATIONAL CAMPAIGN TO KEEP THE UNITED STATES FROM GOING TO WAR AND TO ACHIEVE WORLD PEACE BY

- 1. Strengthening pacific alternatives to armed conflict
- 2. Bringing about such political and economic changes as are essential to a just and peaceable world order
- 3. Recruiting and uniting in a dynamic movement all organizations and individuals who are determined not to approve of or participate in war

### **PARTICIPATION**

Since the person determined to be through with war as a means of attempting to settle group disagreements, is the one willing to pay the most in terms of sacrificial giving of himself and his substance, it seems best that the core of this campaign should be composed of such persons—especially those who have reached this conviction because of religious loyalties. Also to be included are those who cannot approve of or participate in any war except to repel an unprovoked armed invasion of continental United States by a foreign foe. A third category of people whose earnest support is desired are those who, while they have not yet thought their way through the problems of peace and war, are determined to do everything they can to promote peace.

### WHAT MUST BE DONE

This country can be kept from going to war, when the next world war breaks out, only by the most strenuous efforts of its peace-loving citizens. Remember 1916-1917!

Furthermore, the country can be kept out of war only if far-reaching plans are laid, educational programs are undertaken in advance, and the will for peace so wide-spread today, is deepened and made more intelligent, articulate and effective.

Deepened so that it can withstand the tremendous pressure from special interest groups which for various reasons—some idealistic, some selfish—will try to get this country into war.

More Intelligent because unless we know what we must do to get world peace and are willing to pay the price of peace as individuals and as a nation, it will never be attained.

More Articulate and Effective because if mere wishing for peace were effective, we would have had it long ago.

Our neighbors and our government must be made to realize that war is the most threatening enemy of mankind and that we, as citizens, are determined to bless it no longer, to participate in it no more, and to do away with it altogether. This can be our greatest contribution to our country and to the world.

We must proclaim and abide by the better way-non-warlike means of settling disputes between nations.

### WHAT THE CAMPAIGN PROPOSES TO DO

Meetings and Conferences will be arranged in two hundred or more of the most important communities in all parts of the Country between Easter and Good-will Day (April 12-May 18). A similar series will be conducted in the Fall and again in January, 1937. Prominent, able speakers from this country and abroad, leaders in our religious, educational, and public life will participate.

Young Men and Women will be given an Opportunity to volunteer for peace through:

- 1. Work Camps where those determined not to participate in war will work during the day at some useful peace-time task and in the evening will develop the philosophy, and, if possible, the technique of non-violent social change.
- 2. Peace Education and Action in Rural Areas where, under mature leadership, groups of five or ten young men or women carefully selected and adequately trained, will spend several months in strategic rural areas discussing the complex problems of world peace, wherever the way opens, especially with other young people. They will also help the peace-minded people develop effective political action. It is expected that the expenses of those volunteering for these activities will be borne by themselves, their parents, the college or group from which they come, or their friends. The period of service will vary from three months to a year.
- 3. Peace Education and Action in their own Communities, in their colleges, in their churches, their young people's organizations, etc., and by means of deputation teams to the neighboring communities.

Churches, Synagogues, and other religious groups have within them many people determined to get rid of war because it undermines everything for which they stand. The campaign will seek to increase, unify and make more effective this will to peace.

Information Bureau, news releases to the press, pamphlets, leaflets, posters, will be distributed.

World Events, a small four page bi-weekly periodical dealing with the problems and progress of World peace, will be used to keep members of the Campaign in touch with developments.

Other Activities equally important will be developed as the Campaign progresses.

Co-operation of Other Groups which are in sympathy with the purpose of this campaign are invited to co-operate with it at any point consistent with their aim.

### THE NEED

Because the threat of war is so great today, there is no time to be lost. Many people must lay down their present tasks, important as they are, and throw themselves into this great struggle. They must give themselves for peace just as in 1914-18 millions gave themselves to war. Others must give their capital—not merely their income—just as throughout the ages people either freely, or under compulsion have laid their capital upon the altar of Mars.

If the people of this country catch the vision of such sacrificial giving on a large scale and sustain it over a considerable period of time, we can have peace, world peace—if not we shall have war, world war.

### 12,854 CLERGYMEN ON WAR AND PEACE

Participation by the United States in a world economic conference for the purpose of formulating a procedure by which the superior economic advantages now enjoyed by certain nations may be shared more fairly with less fortunate peoples was favored by 11,431 clergymen and opposed by only 638 in a national poll just made public by Bishop James C. Baker and 26 associates.

A total of 8,890 clergymen replied yes and 2,415 said no to the following question: "In seeking to protect the lives of its citizens in foreign lands and on the high seas, should the United States Government refrain under all circumstances from resort to war and always restrict itself to pacific methods?"

If all obligation to participate in the use of armed sanctions against an aggressor nation were removed from the Covenant, 8,331 of these ministers would favor and 2,883 oppose entrance of the United States into the League of Nations.

against a nation which the Assembly of the League pronounces guilty of armed invasion of another country, if public opinion, diplomatic pressure and economic embargo prove inadequate as deterrents, was supported by 4,558 clergymen and opposed by 5,903, with 2,196 in doubt.

Another question was this: "Are you personally prepared to state that it is your present purpose not to sanction any future war or participate as an armed combatant?" To which 7,237 replied affirmatively, 4,010 negatively, with 1,423 registering doubt.

A total of 8,252 favored a mation-wide series of religious services in which individuals who have reached a mature decision not to sanction or participate in any future war may simultaneously proclaim this deep conviction, with 2,439 opposing and 1,773 in doubt.

My dear Rabbi:-

In reference to the attitude of our Hospital towards displaced German Jewish physicians, permit me to state that over a year ago our Board went on record as being sympathetic towards the movement and that it would do everything in its power to give it such aid as was within its power to do.

At that time the Emergency Committee in New York City advised us of one case, which, after due consideration on the part of the Board, we decided we could handle but when we so notified the Committee in New York we were advised that this physician had found a place in Cincinnati.

The next case that came up was that of Dr. Schiff. This occurred early this year, and I can best inform you as to what happened by quoting from the minutes of our Board meetings on March 24th and of our Medical Council meeting on April 13th, 1936. The Board minutes are as follows:-

"A letter from Dr. George Baehr, New York City, Secretary of the Emergency Committee in Aid of Displaced Physicians, received by the Director, was read, in which Dr. Baehr requested that Mount Sinai Hospital give Dr. Hans Schiff an opportunity to reside in the hospital for a few months. Dr. Baehr's letter stated that Dr. Schiff had arrived in New York from Germany on a permanent immigration visum, and desired to locate somewhere in this country, and that he would like to have an opportunity to reside in a hospital for a few months in order to learn our American customs and methods.

The Director stated that at the time of the receipt of the request from Dr. Baehr no quarters were available in the dormitories of the House Staff, and Dr. Baehr had been so advised, with the further statement that Mount Sinai Hospital wished it to be understood that it was sympathetic with the position in which Dr. Schiff finds himself, and that except for housing, any other courtesies possible would be gladly extended. The Director pointed out, however, that recently, due to the marriage of Dr. Reuben Strauss, who holds a Fellowship in the Laboratories,

Dr. Strauss will reside outside of the hospital, and his present quarters could be made available for Dr. Schiff until July 1st when the new House Staff will arrive, including the successor of Dr. Strauss as Fellow in the Laboratories.

Thereupon, on motion, the Board instructed the Director to advise Dr. Baehr of this opportunity and to offer Dr. Hans Schiff quarters until July 1st next if this should be agreeable to him."

The Medical Council minutes are as follows:-

"The Director also called attention to the recent correspondence with the Emergency Committee in Aid of Displaced Foreign Physicians, Dr. George Baehr, Secretary, whereby an opportunity was sought for Dr. Hans Schiff, a displaced physician who desired to reside in a hospital for a few months in order to learn American customs and methods. The Director stated that while at first, due to lack of quarters, no opportunity could be offered Dr. Schiff, that more recently a vacancy had occurred in the House Staff dormitories and that he had offered Dr. Schiff these quarters with the approval of the Board of Trustees, but meanwhile Dr. Schiff had found another location on the west coast."

From the above you will note our Hospital has not been unmindful of its responsibilities in respect to displaced German Jewish physicians, and while it is true that at the present time we are very much cramped for quarters to take care of any addition to our present force, we shall at all times hold ourselves ready and willing to co-operate in this important matter.

Dear Friend,

I am very anxious to get your reaction to the compulsory teaching of Hebrew on Sunday mornings in the Religious School. For the past twenty-two years Hebrew has been taught in the Religious School of Congregation Emanu-El on a compulsory basis. At the present time there is a movement on the part of my Religious School Committee to abolish compulsory Hebrew.

I still feel that although the children do not learn much Hebrew at a weekly session, nevertheless the little they do learn is valuable in developing in them a positive attitude toward the language, particularly as it is expressed in our ritual service in the Congregation. It seems to me rather inconsistent to preserve Hebrew in our prayer book and to make so much of the Kaddish in Hebrew, and at the same time to oppose any preparation on the part of the children to be at least a little familiar with the Hebrew language.

It would be very helpful to me if I could receive a statement from you as to your own opinion regarding the value of compulsory Hebrew instruction in the Religious School.

My dear Rabbi Glazer:

Please pardon the delay in answering your letter. I have been traveling around a great deal in connection with Welfare Fund Campaigns and I have also been extremely busy with the Cleveland Welfare Fund Campaign, of which I am General Chairman.

I fully share your view in the matter of the teaching of Hebrew in our Religious Schools. Such teaching, as you know, is an essential and obligatory part of our curriculum from the kindergarten to confirmation. While the children do not master the language, they do gain enough of a working knowledge of it to be able to read it fluently, translate the simpler prayers in our Prayer Book, read the easier passages of the Bible, etc. Over one hundred and fifty children take supplementary Hebrew one afternoon during the week. This privilege is extended only to those children in the upper classes who have received excellence in their Hebrew during the regular school sessions. There are many children in our School for whom Hebrew is the most pleasant and interesting subject in the curriculum. The modern methods employed in teaching the language - through songs, plays, conversation, etc. - makes the study of the language far more interesting and attractive than it was years ago.

It is not advisable to make Hebrew an elective subject. With the little backing we have from the homes, on the part of parents who have never had any Hebrew instruction themselves, this means a practical elimination of Hebrew from our Religious Schools.

when I was with you last time I spoke to you about the German weekly newspaper I am connected with, and about the possibility of financial assistance. In the meantime things have changed: I am not any more only connected with the paper as a columnist - I became officially its editor, and I am now starting my career in the public life of the United States, having taken out my first papers. That sounds very ambitious, I know, but all I want to accomplish is a certain influence within the German-American element. In which direction - you know. There is no better way to get it than running a successful newspaper.

I am glad and proud being able to state that our paper in increasing in subscription and street sale; slowly but steadily. Now we have before us an unique opportunity: during the month of July most of the German organizations use to hold their General meetings; for instance a large group like the Workmen's Sick and Death Benefit with 48 000 members. We want to cover all these meetings with thousands of newspapers and hundreds of agents, and I am trying at present since we are short of time to get a certain financial contribution for this propaganda. To print one thousand copies in addition to our usual circulation, and to mail the thousand copies to individual addresses does require not more than \$ 11,-; therefore we could do a lot of successful work with a comparitively small amount.

You said last time you would try do get one or the other German-American in your community interested. I know you have to ask for contributions continuously, and of course for causes you are more closely connected with. Nevertheless may I take the liberty again of expressing this request? Could you find one or the other friend of such an undertaking? All we need is \$ 250. If the gentleman or lady to contribute would not like to have his or her name appearing on a check for a newspaper, the check could be amde out for Mr. Arnold Schroeder, the business manager of our paper, not known politically anywhere.

## Greuelpropaganda?

Am 30. Januar 1933 wurde Adolf Hitler zum Reichskanzler ernannt und schwor in die Hand des Reichspräsidenten v. Hindenburg, dass er sein Amt "unparteiisch und gerecht gegen jedermann" ausüben werde. Schon acht Wochen später begann die von ihm geführte Partei in ganz Deutschland Konzentrationslager einzurichten, in denen die früheren politischen Gegner der Nationalsozialisten auf eine unbeschreibliche Weise gequält wurden. Ein Lager nach dem anderen entstand, und die Opier des Nationalsadismus zählten bald nach Zehntausenden. Als die ersten Berichte über die Lager ins Ausland drangen, schüttelten viele Leute ungläubig den Kopf. Die Nazis spekulierten sofort darauf, dass es für anständige Menschen einigermassen unmöglich sei, sich derartige Gemeinheiten als wirklich existierend vorzustellen, und leugneten dem Ausland gegenüber alles ab, sie nannten die Beriehte "Greuelpropaganda". Im Inland freilich machten sie kein Hehl daraus, dass sie die Einrichtung der Konzentrationslager für eines nützliche Sache hielten; unzählbar sind die Drohungen, die in Nazizeitungen gegen die schweigende Opposition ausgestossen werden und die regelmässig den Hinweis auf die Konzentrationslager enthalten. Die Wahrheit hat sich aber im Ausland trotz des Ableugnens durchgesetzt; grosse, verantwortliche Zeitungen wie die London Times, die New Vork Times, der Manchester Guardian und andere haben im Rahmen der gegebenen Möglichkeiten die Berichte auf ihre Glaubwürdigkeit nachgeprüft. Die Schrift "Oranienburg des Verfassers dieser Zeilen, die der erste authentische Bericht eines aus einem Konzentrationslager Geflüchteten war, fand eine überraschende Verbreitung; sie wurde in sieben Sprachen aufgelegt, und die Auflageziffern (an der Spitze die schwedische Auflage mi: 86,500 abgesetzten Exemplaren, und die holländische mit 54,200) bezeugen, dass das Ausland nun in bemerkenswertem Umfange über die Konzentrationslagerschande des Hitlerreiches unterrichtet ist. Andere Bücher, wie das des Düsseldorfer Schauspielers Langhoff "Die Moorsoldaten" haben die Aufklärungsarbeit fortgesetzt, und inzwischen ist über das Thema Konzentrationslager eine ganze Lite-

Es handelt sich nun nicht mehr, wie manche wohlmeinende Ausländer zur Entschuldigung für Hitler anführten, um Ausschreitungen aus der Zeit des ersten Ueberschwanges der "nationalen Revolution"; diese Szenen spielen in einer Zeit, in der Hitler die Welt glauben machen will, dass er 98,72 Prozent des deutschen Volkes hinter sich habe und trotzdem dieser grauenhafte Terror! Die offizielle Einführung der Prügelstrafe nach mittelalterlichem Muster kennzeichnet das dritte Reich und seine Regierungsmethoden so hinreichend, dass man schon zu der gleichen moralischen Verkommenheit hinneigen muss, wenn man dieses System verteidigt. Alle Anwälte des dritten Reiches in der Welt. auch und besonders die hier in Amerika, verdienen deshalb nicht anders eingeschätzt zu werden, wie die Henkersknechte selbst, der vertierte Lagerkommandant, der offenbar moralisch völlig heruntergekommene Lagerarzt, die SS-Leute, die die Zerfleischung ihrer Opfer mit Alkohol feiern. Wer ist schuldig, wer ist mitschuldig?

Hitler ist, was wenig bekannt ist, selbst wegen Körperverletzung vorbestraft. Auf Seite 188 des ersten Bandes "Mein Kampf" erklärt Hitler, was immer zitiert werden muss: "Die allererste Voraussetzung zu einer Kamp-fesweise mit den Waffen der nackten Gewalt ist

### Der Elefantenkongress in Cleveland.

Die vier Jahre, die sich nun die republikanische Partei in Opposition befindet, scheinen, wie Cleveland zeigt, zu einer richtiggehenden Zersetzung ihres Personenbestandes geführt zu haben. Es sei zugegeben, dass sich die Republikaner in keiner beneidenswerten Position befinden: die Schwierigkeiten ihrer Wahlkampagne gegen Roosevelt hat Afred Smith mit dem erschöpfenden Wort gekennzeichnet: "You can't beat Santa Claus!" Dazu kommt. dass selbst in den konservativen Reihen der Republikaner der Oststaaten die Idee aufgetaucht ist, man müsse wohl etwas gegen die wirtschaftliche Krise tun, und es wird daher in Cleveland nach Planken für die Plattform gefischt, die so aussehen, als ob aus ihnen eine Art Lebensrettungsboot für die angeblich dem Untergang geweihte Nation gebaut werden könnte. Die Wahlplattform der Republikaner, deren Inhalt ausser von politischen Gesichtspunkten auch von den persönlichen Rücksichten auf den zu wählenden Kandidaten bestimmt wird, kann sicher nichts anderes sein als ein nicht sehr eindrucksvolles Kompromiss. Die Liste der Geldgeber für den Wahlfonds der Republikaner redet eine eindeutige Sprache: drei Rockefellers, zwei du Ponts, vier Mellons, ein Morgan. Solche Namen bürgen dafür, dass die Politik eines republikanischen Präsidenten, falls er gewählt wird, im extremen Sinne des Wortes kapitalistisch reaktionär sein wird, was auch immer an sozialen Phrasen in der Wahlplattform stehen mag. Die Eröffnungsrede des Senators Steiwer, die voller plump demagogischer Angriffe auf den gegenwärtigen Präsidenten war, liess erkennen, dass die gegenwärtige Führung der Republikaner mit derselben Wirtschaftspolitik, die das Land in die Krise hineingeführt hat, fortfahren will. Man macht in Cleveland dem Wahrzeichen der GOP, dem Elefanten, alle Ehre: was noch ganz ist in dem Porzellanladen der Wirtschaft, soll vollends zertrampelt werden, und wer sich, wie die Arbeiter in den Gewerkschaften,, dagegen wehrt soll keine Möglichkeit haben, durch die Sozialgesetzgebung des Staates oder des Bundes geschützt zu werden. Gewiss ist Leon Blum ein Jude; das Fragezeichen in der Ueberschrift soll nicht andeuten, dass die Tatsache an sich in Zweisel gezogen werden könnte. Unbeschadet des jüdischen und uns hier nicht berührenden Problems, ob Juden in ihrem Gastvolke aufgehen, sich assimilieren sollen oder nicht - es gibt Juden, die viel mehr typische Vertreter des Landes ihrer Geburt und Sprache sind, als Juden. Wenn es einen Franzosen gibt, in dem sich die Eleganz der Sprache, die Schärfe des Denkens und Argumentierens, die Liebe zur Literatur und Kunst, die gewinnende Höflichkeit im Umgang mit Fremden und die trotzdem ausgeprägte Zurückhaltung des Individualisten miteinander vereinen, dann ist es dieser Franzose Leon Blum. Dass er nebenbei auch noch jüdischer Herkunft ist, besagt garnichts. Walter Rathenau, der von national-sozialistischen Vorläufern ermordete demokratische Politiker, ist ein deutsches Gegenstück zu dem französischen Juden Leon Blum. Die besten deutschen Eigenschaften vereinigte Rathenau in sich: die grüblerische Neigung, den Dingen auf den letzten Grund zu gehen, die beinahe religiöse Art des Denkens, die unerschöpfliche Arbeitskraft, die Korrektheit der Argumentation, die Hilfsbereitschaft gegenüber Hifsbedürftigen jeder Herkunft, und vieles andere. Dazu beseelte ihn ein derartiger Patriotismus, dass er kurz vor Kriegsende noch die "Levée en masse" vorschlug, eine restlose Zusammenfassung und einen rücksichtslosen Einsatz aller menschlichen und ökonomischen Bestände Deutschlands, was tatsächlich ein ungeheures, aber nutzloses Opfer gewesen wäre. Dieser deutsche Patriot wurde auf der Höhe seiner Lebensarbeit für Deutschland ermordet, von denselben nationalistischen Verbrechern, die in Frankreich auf französisch Leon Blum mit Hitlerschen Ausdrücken anpöbeln und ihn ja sogar vor einiger Zeit tätlich angegriffen und verwundet haben. Leon Bum ist in erster Linie ein französischer Sozialist, wie Walther Ratheau in erster Linic ein deutscher Demokrat war, wie übrigens Disraeli, der spätere Lord Beaconsfield, in erster Linie ein englischer Konservativer war; dass alle drei daneben noch jüdischer Abstammung sind, besagt für ihre politische Tätigkeit und ihre nationale Zugehörigkeit garnichts. Man sieht, der Antisemitismus ist nicht nur gemein, er ist auch stupide. "Der Sozialismus der dummen Kerle", nannte ihn Bebel.
