


Whereas the spiritual ministrations to the sick and the dying, services for the deceased, emergency calls, etc., of the clergy are an important and necessary part of public morale

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Under separate cover we are sending you the program of the Institute of Jewish Affairs and issues of its monthly bulletin. The Institute was launched last February under the auspices of the World and American Jewish Congresses to prepare scientific materials on the situation of the Jews since the last war. On the basis of its statistical and documentary data and its objective findings of fact, analyses will eventually be made leading to a legal brief formulating the claims of Jews for their rehabilitation and freedom in a general post-war adjustment. As the Rt. Hon. Arthur Greenwood, member of the present British Government, wrote to the Congress on August 9, 1940: "In the rebuilding of civilized society after the war, there should and will be a real opportunity for Jews everywhere to make a distinctive and constructive contribution; and all men of good will must assuredly hope that in the New Europe, the Jewish people, in whatever country they may live, will have freedom and full equality before the law with every other citizen."

Our Advisory Council is now in process of formation. Among those who have already accepted are the following: Louis Adamic, Joseph P. Chamberlain, Lloyd K. Garrison, Oscar I. Janowsky, Horace M. Kallen, Robert S. Lynd, Thomas Mann, Margaret Mead, Jerome Michael, Wesley Mitchell, Ralph B. Perry, Hans Simons and Leo Wolman. We earnestly and cordially invite you to become a member. No obligation will be involved, unless you would care to advise us in your special field should occasion arise. Essentially, the function of the Advisory Council is to serve as an endorsement by leading scholars and thinkers of the objectives of the Institute as an independent research enterprise. We all believe that you would wish to be associated with us and we need not say how much authority your name will add to our efforts.

Enclosed is a Resolution recently adopted by the Baptist Ministers Association. Please take a moment to read it as it has to do with that most important item - - - rubber.







I am enclosing a statement concerning some of the recent Axis anti-religious propaganda. Needless to say, this has come to me through certain connections in Washington, but it must be given out as all our former statements were given out, that is, as a statement from a group of citizens. I hope that you will feel like signing this and urge you with all the emphasis I can that you do so and return it to me immediately at the above address. I am sending this to approximately sixty ministers, rabbis, and priests and hope to get a good number of names before releasing it to the press.

It appears to me that the present Axis propaganda directed toward the division of the various religious groups in this country and their severance as a whole from South America is becoming increasingly dangerous and that we must do something to combat it immediately.

I trust that I may hear from you within a few days.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

It is with hesitation that I take the liberty of intruding upon your busy affairs. Only the urgency of the request and the deep desire for information suffice to overcome my reluctance.

At the request of our small congregation, I am writing to ascertain what demands the several Jewish organizations, as the B'nai B'rith, the American Jewish Committee, and others, have formulated for the Peace Conference to be held when hostilities cease. Further, we would like to know what steps are being taken to insure uniform demands by these various representatives of American Jewry. The experiences of the Paris Conference would seem to indicate that co-operation leading to unanimity of purpose should prevail now and not be delayed until the war's end. In short, what steps have been and are being taken to co-ordinate the efforts of the various Jewish organizations towards the formulation of definite demands and aims when peace comes, and what are these aims and demands?

Our members feel that the leaders of American Jewry must take an active part in coalescing the hopes and purposes of various individuals, lodges, committees and congresses into a unified Statement of Aims of the Jews of America for a better world.

I trust that you will find time to answer these questions, for I believe they are symptomatic of a general desire for exact information in our Jewish population. Thank you very much for your attention to this letter.

We are pleased to inform you that the International Relief Association and the Emergency Rescue Committee of which Frank Kingdon is chairman have merged. The name of the new organization is the International Rescue and Relief Committee and the officers are: Charles A. Beard, Honorary Chairman; Frank Kingdon, Chairman; Freda Kirchwey, Sterling D. Spero, Ingrid Warburg and L. Hollingsworth Wood, Vice-Chairmen; David F. Seiferheld, Treasurer; and Sheba Strunsky, Executive Secretary.

The boards of directors of the two committees have also been merged. The old IRA will retain its corporate identity in case it should be necessary for it to resume its activities at some future date. Under the present arrangement, however, all independent IRA activities are suspended and all of its work will be taken over by the new organization.

We know you will be pleased to hear that rescue work has not been terminated by the war even though the difficulties have increased. United States visas are still being granted to aliens from neutral or friendly countries and in rare cases even to so-called "enemy aliens" whose loyalty can be proven. We are also able to obtain Mexican visas for those who cannot come to the United States and according to a cable just received both committees now have at least 60 people on board the steamers Serpapinto and Nyassa. Both of these ships have already sailed from Lisbon.

We enclose a copy of our certified accountant's financial statement for 1941.







It was with interest that I noticed your name as State Chairman of the White House Conference on Children in a Democracy.

Since Mr. Field suggests that communities list their resources for the welfare of children and since he very rightfully includes kindergartens among the educational services and also among the social services for children, you might like to have some of our material for your file. A few samples of our free leaflets are enclosed.

Whenever you hear of a community where a kindergarten is needed, we shall appreciate it if you will suggest to the community leaders to write to us, or send us the names of interested persons so that we may offer our free services to help arouse interest in the provision of kindergartens for the local children.

At no previous period has the American kindergarten been so necessary. In many communities mothers of young children are already working outside of their homes. The war has also brought an atmosphere of sadness and worry to many homes and very young children sense this. With a well-directed program of activities and a teacher trained to understand the age-group in question, a kindergarten provides the busy regularity and the sense of security so much needed in these troubled times. As of course you know, it also gives children an opportunity to learn and practise the democratic way of life.

In addition to providing free leaflets to arouse kindergarten interest, we can lend colored posters for display and a program on kindergarten values prepared for use at meetings. We also have a 16mm. kindergarten motion picture film for which we can book dates, without charge. Free advice and consultation with this office and with our Field Secretaries is also available. Do let us hear from you whenever we may be of assistance in your state.

They Laughed

*Florence J. Owens, Editor,

THE club members were appalled when J. Edgar Hoover stated that crime costs the United States 41 million dollars a day, they were vaguely surprised when they heard that only one child in eight goes to kindergarten, but they could find no connection between the two facts and laughed unbelievingly when told that more kindergartens would mean less crime. Psychiatrists, penologists, college presidents and superintendents of schools vouch for the contention, but to the average man it is like claiming that one may dam up Niagara with a chip. If it is true, what is the explanation?

The Aim of the Kindergarten

There are many "outcomes" which the kindergarten teacher purposes to bring about as a result of the daily class activities which are seldom apparent to the uninitiated visitor. To do this she must study her pupils from every possible angle. She must know something of each child's background. So she visits the child's home and has Mothers' meetings and Parents' days. Each child has been living and forming patterns of behavior, some valuable, some detrimental, for four or five years. There is now a tendency to repeat these behavior patterns as occasion presents itself. For the best interests of the child, his family and society, a continuance of the desirable patterns will be encouraged; those that are undesir-

able must be replaced. But how? Each pattern is a separate problem.

A Mere Matter of Manners?

Take a very simple case. Reuben is delightfully courteous. Praise for his courtesy to the teacher may make him conceited or priggish. It may cause his companions to react unfavorably toward him and so towards courteous behavior in general. Yet Reuben should be made to feel satisfaction regarding attractive manners, or he may gradually copy those less pleasing. So the wise teacher arranges a situation in which Reuben's natural kindness and courtesy is expressed toward Peter, a less refined member of the class, at a time when Peter is feeling unwontedly chagrined. Reuben receives from her a smile of approval in which all the class heartily concur. It is all the work of a moment, yet it bears a lifelong influence for many.

Developing Stick-to-itiveness

Unfortunately, Reuben has also, among his five-year-old behavior patterns, a habit of leaving his projects uncompleted. This troubles his mother. She says, "I've scolded and even punished him. He won't finish anything." The kindergarten teacher knows that scolding and punishing are likely to cause the formation of new undesirable patterns, such as resentment and deceitfulness. She attacks this problem with other pupils also in mind. She makes much of the dignity of being responsible for a project upon the satisfactory completion of which the success of some other work depends. She speaks of the airplane relying on every part of its motor, the locomotive helpless without the simple rails. She insists that Reuben, at first, undertake very short projects which involve

little or no responsibility. But Reuben soon wants to be cooperating with others. So she makes certain that he is really interested in the project he chooses, and that it has a very definite purpose when completed. She limits the time he may devote to it each day and encourages some of the other children to show interest in his progress. She manages to have the supervisor come in on the day when it is completed. What satisfaction for Reuben! A new pattern has been designed, and he likes it. Repetition will make it a habit.

Respect for Property Rights

A group of children made some paper boats. George had been helping with a block house and had not made a boat. Later he saw the boats, liked them and—took one. Some weeks later another boy, Emmit, took a drawing that did not belong to him. What should have been done in each case? Some one says, "These children should have been severely punished." Another person suggests, "They should have been told how serious their faults were—how wicked it was to steal." In each case the teacher said gently to the culprit, "George," or "Emmit," "we take home only our own work—the work we do ourselves," and then she casually returned the stolen treasure to the owner. But—the treatments this teacher employed to overcome these faults, though the faults were apparently the same, were quite different, because the *causes* were different. George, not being strongly ownership-conscious, had merely succumbed to a sudden urge. This teacher, therefore, saw to it that George should have an opportunity to make a boat—that he *should enjoy* making it—that he then should enjoy helping another boy.

Harold, to make one. There was much said about *George's* boat and *Harold's* boat, and a greater respect for ownership began to be developed in *George's* consciousness.

Envy and Resentment Changed to Self-esteem and Friendliness

Emmit's case was different and more serious. The teacher knew something of his background. Emmit was jealous of Frank; that was why he had taken his drawing. Emmit's mother was constantly holding Frank up as a model to Emmit, and Emmit had stolen that drawing with the intention of destroying it. The treatment: First, Emmit's mother had to be shown the harm she was doing and persuaded to change her methods. Then Emmit's inferiority complex had to be gradually broken down. How? There were things, it was found, that Emmit could do much better than Frank could, and later, in cooperation, they were able several times to surprise the group with their achievements. Mutual admiration was developed.

Understanding and Appreciation

Dr. Elmer Ellsworth Brown, when United States Commissioner of Education, once said: "From the kindergarten to manhood is so long a span, that it is hard for many people to realize the full significance of kindergarten training for the adult life of our people." And Superintendent Doe of Massachusetts Reformatory, writes: "I believe that the kindergarten is one of our first lines of defense in the prevention of crime and deserves the attention, the help and the cooperation of all our citizens."

ONE IN EIGHT

Florence J. Ovens

In the alley there was daily strife. Seven or eight nationalities were trying to live together without having learned how. Silent contempt and suspicion changed often to noisy beratings, for they could no more comprehend each other's view-points than they could pronounce each other's names.



Now there was a kindergarten in this alley. Every morning the large, cheerful room was crowded with the little sons and daughters of this heterogeneous population, but here discord was reduced to a minimum. The children played and sang together like one happy family. They smiled ingratiatingly at one another. They helped each other in their little tasks, showing gen-

uine sympathy when one met with a difficulty. They learned each other's names too. It was really hard to be cross. To begin with, Miss Roberts didn't like it. Then there were so many lovely flowers, and the little goldfishes were so beautiful as they scuddled about in the sparkling water. Best of all there were so many wonderful things to do.

And were all the little children of the alley here? Alas, no. Had the parents objected to sending them or didn't the children want to go? Most of the parents wanted very much to send them and some of the children cried to go, but—there wasn't room. In the United States only one child in eight may go to kindergarten.

NOTE:

Our very little children are gathering impressions daily. What kind are they? Are we putting our children in the best possible environment? Do they attend kindergarten as soon as they are old enough?

A Superintendent Looks at The Kindergarten

LOOKING into the kindergarten room in September, one sees a large group of children from many different types of homes making first contacts with the world outside. A little boy sits silent and watchful; a homesick little girl weeps for her mother; half a dozen children, stimulated by the new environment, move restlessly about the room; others have begun to play together or to investigate the attractive equipment. In May the visitor sees a different picture. The child who was silent in September is now leading a group in a constructive activity; the little girl who was homesick is capably serving an imaginary meal to others in the doll house; instead of the aimless response of the unadjusted groups of September there is now the gentle hum of cooperative effort.

Many factors have combined to bring about this change and perhaps that of greatest importance is social adjustment thru common interests. It is but a step from the home environment to that of the school when that step is kindergarten, yet how much it involves. This venture out into the big world requires adjustment. A new set of habits must be formed in addition to, and perhaps in place of, those heretofore practised. These are some of the problems that confront the teacher in facing a new class, and her goal is to see that before the children leave her, they will have formed habits that fit them to face squarely any situation, in which they find themselves, with a feeling of self-confidence in meeting these situations and in attacking

new fields of endeavor. A little girl said of a habit, "It's something you get to doing and can't stop." This sums up rather successfully the thought in the teacher's mind when she plans to help children form habits that will fit them for worthy citizenship.

In September, the teacher encounters "I want to," "Let me do it," "It is mine," for the beginning kindergarten child is intensely individualistic. Gradually, however, he begins to recognize the part others must play. He eventually reaches the point where he says, "John can do that; he makes good ones." He has learned to subordinate his will for the good of the group and to take turns at being both leader and follower; in other words, to work harmoniously to accomplish the activity undertaken.

The "three R's" of the elementary curriculum are tangible means of measuring what education does for the child and are therefore held of the utmost importance, but those values of learning to live with others and of adjustment to the many human relationships are so subtle that they are apt to be overlooked or not understood by the taxpayer or other critic of the value of a kindergarten program in a public school.

The kindergarten itself is a source of inspiration. The kindergartner's attitude toward her children is one of cooperation and comradeship, and contains a sympathetic insight into their interests and needs. The children's

attitude toward their work is marked by spontaneity.

The school and the community in general profit from the kindergarten, not only from an increased cooperation on the part of the children in obedience to civic laws and interests, but in actual monetary savings. In cities in which the kindergarten is *not* a part of the public schools, a larger enrolment occurs in the first grade, making this grade an adjustment as well as an entrance grade. An experiment by an Atlanta teacher shows that the percent of nonpromotions of children in her own first grade with kindergarten experiences was 9.1 compared to 53.3 of pupils without kindergarten experiences. There has been a gradual decrease of first-grade failures in Atlanta since the kindergartens have become part of the public-school system.

The committee includes a small group of specialists we have invited to join us, and is headed by Dr. Raymond Leslie Buell, former President of the Foreign Policy Association, for the past three years director of the FORTUNE Round Table.

The purpose of this committee has been best expressed, I think, by Henry R. Luce in his Preface to its first study. He says here:

"With victory and defeat in the balance, our most essential job is to concentrate on winning this war. But at the same time it is scarcely less important to consider what to do with victory, once it is won. Far from injuring the war effort, a discussion of postwar possibilities, at once realistic and tentative, should create new hopes for a better future among our allies, our own citizens -- and among our enemies. It should thereby improve the incentives needed to prosecute this war to a successful close."

I know that you as a leader of a large and important part of the American people, must be vitally interested in sincere attempts to study the problems which will confront this country after the war and work out measures that can be taken now and in the future to meet and solve them. I am therefore asking you to help us in this study by sending me your candid opinion of the proposal put forward in the enclosed report.

It is, of course, a proposal -- a proposal for democratic discussion.

We are planning to publish this report not only in FORTUNE for May but in a booklet for special distribution to many more people than would otherwise see it. And we would like to include, as an integral part of this booklet, your comments on this program.

Unfortunately, our booklet must go to the printers Monday,
April 20 -- and all letters to be included must reach us before
then.

So I hope very much you will be able to read through this
report and send me your reactions to it as soon as possible.

This contribution of your time and thought will be sincerely
appreciated and will go a long way, I know, toward stimulating
national discussion of these vast postwar problems.



Dear Rabbi Silver:

More than a year ago I was strongly impressed with the address "Public Education and Religion" delivered by Dean Luther A. Weigle at the 1940 meeting of the International Council of Religious Education in Chicago. Thinking that this statement by a representative Protestant leader may interest you in view of the present controversy over the question of religious instruction in cooperation with public schools, I take the liberty of sending you the address in pamphlet form.

To many Christians who have sought to multiply bonds of friendship across religious and racial boundaries, it appears unfortunate that Jewish leaders in Cleveland and elsewhere are ① taking what appears to be an "obstructionist" attitude toward a program designed to strengthen the religious foundation of ② our nation. Surely when the militant forces of irreligion have reestablished the ghetto in Europe and are seeking violently to enslave that entire continent, the religious forces ③ of America should be in support of a practicable program which can aid in overcoming our enormous religious illiteracy and reversing the ebb of religion with which we are threatened. Assuming that all Jewish youth is adequately served in religious ④ instruction, surely their leaders should be concerned about the fate of religion amongst the masses of the Gentile population. Certainly the gradual de-Christianizing of this nation can mean only disaster both to Jews and to the entire American nation.

Personally I am convinced that the constitutional argument ⑤ is without foundation. Dean Weigle has important observations on this point. Where this argument is put forward, I am inclined to think that it is a convenient piece of armament serving a deep misunderstanding of the program proposed or a certain "parochialism", and exclusive concern with one particular race or faith. At any rate, week-day schools of religion in cooperation with public schools have been established in cities and towns of Ohio for nearly a score of years on the basis of statutory provisions, and have been widely employed in other states, as well.

For two years (until last week) I served as chairman of a committee of the Cleveland Church Federation to study week-day schools of religion. I write you in this manner and send the

enclosed document both in the interest of what I regard as a valuable reenforcement and extension of religious education and equally in the interest of inter-faith cooperation and understanding - both of which might be set back seriously by the present attitude of Jewish leaders. I am sending similar communications to a number of Jewish gentlemen of my acquaintance.

The greatest distinction that man can achieve is to leave to posterity an everlastingly bright memory of his life's work and of the ideals to which it was dedicated. Such is the achievement of Louis D. Brandeis, whose memory is enshrined in the heart and mind of the American people and of free mankind.

Louis D. Brandeis was endowed with a great intellect and a warm heart which, in the course of his full and rich life, he placed at the disposal of his fellow man. In the annals of the labor movement the name of Louis D. Brandeis will forever remain a lodestar pointing the way to decent standards of work and living. It was his strength, courage and foresight, while he served the nation on the bench of the Supreme Court and before, that laid the foundations for a more equitable relationship between capital and labor.

His great heart always gave a ready response to the suffering of the common people. The plight of the unfortunate victims of tyranny all over the world and especially the suffering of his Jewish brothers and sisters made him one of the outstanding supporters of the struggle for the liberation of oppressed Jewry abroad and the building of a Jewish National Home in Palestine.

The Dinner with which this invitation deals has been arranged by the National Committee for a Louis D. Brandeis Memorial with a view of establishing a fund to build a labor colony in Palestine to which thousands of persecuted and disinherited refugees may come, to find new hope and new opportunities for a life of service.

It is most appropriate that such a Dinner should have as its guest of honor the Honorable Robert F. Wagner, United States Senator from the State of New York. Few men in public life have been so devoted to the principles of social and economic justice to which Senator Wagner is dedicating his life and its work.







THE RABBI'S STUDY

As you may recall, I was given the privilege of making a brief statement on the European Jewish problem to the Seminary Presidents' Conference in Rochester on June 12th. At that time it was suggested by Dr. Albert W. Beaven that I send a communication to the men who were present stating the details of the plan for presenting this problem to the various Seminaries of the country. That is the purpose of this letter.

First, as to objectives, we are eager to build up in America, before the Peace Conference convenes, an informed and sympathetic public opinion concerning the basic realities of the Jewish problem in Central and Eastern Europe, and the role of Palestine in the solution of it. Rather than write at length about the problem, I take the liberty of enclosing a statement prepared by a Christian Committee that is working on it. It gives you a general idea as to our approach to the subject.

Concretely we should like to make available to the Seminaries for forum programs, chapel addresses, and student conferences some of the leading Rabbis of the country who are vitally concerned with this problem. I enclose a list of the Rabbis who have indicated their availability for such functions, gratis. Where the Seminaries have funds available for such purpose, their travelling expenses might be defrayed by them. However, where such funds are not available, we will be pleased to arrange for the appearance of these Rabbis without cost to the Seminaries.

If, as I hope, you will be interested in having such a presentation at your Seminary during the coming school year, I would suggest the following procedure: first, that you select from the enclosed list of available Rabbis your first and second choice with preference given, if possible, to the men closest to your Seminary; second, select a date or choice of dates; third, send this information to me c/o American Palestine Committee, 41 East 42nd Street, New York, N. Y.

I am to serve as Chaplain at Fort Devens during the summer. Therefore, I suggest that you write to this New York address where my colleague, Rabbi Milton Steinberg, and his associates will be able to follow through with the arrangements.

Thank you in advance for your cooperation and with all good wishes.

It is the work of a great historian and a seasoned scholar who illuminates everything he touches with a bright new light of insight and wisdom.
