Then this is the hour of our testing.

This hour, in this House of God.

Who were our ancestors and what did they teach us?

Search your hearts. Examine your own souls. For in you lie the seeds of Paith, of Hope, of Courage, which were planted there by our Forefathers.

Let the centuries unroll before your eyes. Then you will know who you are and how you are to live.

We stood with Abraham in his lonely vigil and read the destiny of Israel in the stars.

With Isaac, we built the altar of the patriarch's stern faith and ultimate sacrifice.

With Joseph we dreamed the dream of sheaves and stars and climbed the steps from the dungeon's pit to a prince's throne.

With Moses we knelt before a vision in the wilderness and heard God's Voice summon us to duty and to freedom.

We saw the lightning and the clouds at Sinai and witnessed the everlasting covenant between Israel and God.

Torah Zivah Lonu Moshe

We heard Samuel admonish our people to remain free.

We listened to the harp of the shepherd king, David.

We prayed with Solomon in the Temple at Jerusalem.

We marched with the resolute bands of the prophets ...

Amos!

Hosea!

Isaiah!

Jeremiah!

Ezekiel!

As they lashed out against oppression and injustice, against false gods and guilded idols...

Against blind leaders and lying prophets.

It was the prophet Amos who said: "Hate the evil and love the good, and establish justice in the gate."

Hosea, that noble prophet, defined the nature of God's true religion when he said: "For I desire mercy, and not sacrifice, And the knowledge of God rather than burnt offerings.

The prophet Isaiah, whose vision of a united humanity we shall never forget:

"And it shall come to pass in the end of days, that the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the top of the mountains, and shall be exalted above the hills; And all the nations shall flow unto it. And many people shall go and say: Come ye, and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob. And He will teach us of His ways. And we will walk in His paths." The U.S. Maccabi Association is now contemplating intensifying its activities in this country. Our immediate aims are:-To establish adequate facilities for an athletic program for the Jewish youth in America which would create new inducement and inspiration to the work of youth education, by development of strong healthy bodies, courage, competitive spirit, pride in Jewish achievements, and a feeling of individual responsibility as a representative of his or her people. To rebuild, physically and mentally, the morale of our brethren in the displaced persons camps, liberated countries, and come entration camps, by supplying them with gymnasium equipment and physical instructors. 3. To organize and finance a team of our athletes to represent America in the next Maccabiah (the Jewish Olympic Games) to be held in Tel Aviv in 1949 and to help rebuild the stadium for that purpose. To build and maintain in Palestine a training school for physical instructors of the Maccabi movement (the building site has already been acquired). I now take the liberty of asking you to please again join our committee of Sponsors and help us to fulfil the urgent tasks which we have set before us. November 9th, 1947 between the hours of 10:00 Test and 1:00 P.M. has been designated as S.DAY (Survivors Day) which will be the most concerted single effort in the two and a half month-drive to collect specifically canned foods such as canned milk and foods rich in protein such as meat, fish, canned fruit and fruit juices, oils, fats in time, chocolates or hard candy, cocoa, coffee, tea, and dehydrated foods.
- 3. An army of 2,000 to 2,500 volunteers will serve on S-DAY (Survivors Day),
  November 9th in a house to house canvass chiefly in the Jewish concentrated
  area.
- h. This area will cover approximately 70,000 to 75,000 persons included in approximately 20,000 to 23,000 families.
- 5. It is planned to distribute 30,000 grocery bags and throw away sheets a week in advance of Hovember 9th.
- 6. It is planned to distribute cartons or containers on approximately 600 to 650 blocks at certain corners known as Block Stations for the purpose of the canvassers to deposit contributions in these containers.
- 7. It is planned to have approximately 200 to 250 motor corps cruisers pick up these containers when they are filled and deliver them to a pickup truck at a designated loading station.
- 3. It is planned to have approximately h0 to 50 volunteer pickup trucks stationed at designated loading stations throughout the area.
- 9. It is planned that the pickup trucks, after each full load, will deliver

TO THE EDITORS: October 28, 1947 Page 2 their contents to a large Interstate Truck stationed at the Slysium ready for shipment direct to the Central Warehouse of the Joint Distribution Committee in New York. 10. The sponsoring groups in the city of Cleveland for the S.O.S. (Supplies for Overseas Survivors) collection are: a. The Federation of Jewish Women Organizations b. The Jewish Community Council c. The Jewish Young Adult Bureau 11. Volunteers are being pledged from all of these supporting organizations and from the Jewish community at large. 12. The greater S.O.S. campaign in Cleveland extends from Movember 1st to December 15th and is aimed at collecting all kinds of supplies including clothing, medical supplies, foodstuffs, layettes, comfort items, books, and supplies of all kinds.





# "EAGLE FORGOTTEN"

JOHN PETER ALTGELD (1847-1902) is one of the great underground Americans. Like Charles Peirce and Albert Pinkham Ryder, Emily Dickinson and Brooks Adams, he was one of the lonely truth sayers in a time when most men believed that power brought wisdom. The independents of his time were spiritual exiles; Altgeld was a politician, neither an artist nor a revolutionary, and he was hated. Fifty years ago he was damned in this country as that "foreign-born Illinois governor who freed the Haymarket anarchists," an enemy of orthodoxy, and plainly the spawn of hell. Today he is only a dim name in the books. Vachel Lindsay called him "The Eagle That Is Forgotten," and spoke for those who mourned him "in silence and terror and truth." Yet perhaps many remember him with hatred still.

But Altgeld was a great man, if it is by any test of a man's devotion to truth and his hatred of oppression that we can know greatness. In a time when most men's values were purely acquisitive, he showed his countrymen that a passionate belief in human justice was more creative. In a time when, like so many in his generation, he seemed interested only in the main chance, he risked his political career and much else because he knew that eight radical immigrants who had been tried for murder had been convicted for their opinions. He was called a "bloody anarchist," a demagogue, and a destroyer. But he was not a radical, and always far less of an anarchist than Jefferson or Thoreau. He merely had that indefinable human valor that rises in some men like creation or love, and drives them to tell compelling truths about life and society in their time. Luther had said it when he cried: "Ich kann nicht anders!" ("I can do no other!") So Altgeld listened to men crying for blood (and they were important men) and he said "No."

Had Altgeld been a revolutionary, he would have stood outside existing society and perhaps have had an easier time. But to no one in his time could the American dream of success have been so sweet as to this German immigrant, for whom every prize in the American stakes meant a double victory. Everything in his early life had promised only crippling hardship and ignorance; his parents were impoverished farmers, and his father seems to have been a particularly coarse man. Altgeld never learned to please. He was blunt and ungainly, with a harelip and a dour thatch that cartoonists always seized on; unsure of himself and rigidly intense. His life had not taught him charity, and the Chicago politics at which he became adept never encousaged sweetness. But he had learned to rise and to win. It was for this that he had worked through the Middle West as a farm laborer and picked up his legal education in stray offices. Once he wandered for 100 miles through open prairie in his bare feet looking for work; while still a boy, he served in the Civil War. But by 1892, when he was elected governor of Illinois, he was a successful lawyer, a former judge, a power in the Democratic party, and a wealthy real-estate operator.

Altgeld had learned to rise and to win, but other men in Chicago had not. The great city, built on railroads and stockyards, wheat and steel, was a city for business and the feverish exploitation of the West; its laborers fixed at the bottom, and their protests were not always heard. There were thousands who lay huddled together in Chicago's ilums like animals, and the bitterness of the rising labor movement depth fire from the embattled Populist farmers in the West. Chicago was often on the brink of open class war. The storm broker with the Haymarket affair.

No one knows to this day who threw the bomb that killed several policemen in Haymarket Square on May 4, 1886. But Chicago's nerves were raw after many labor outbreaks, and the bombing drove it mad. The trial was virtually a lynching bee. The anarchists had been indicted not because there was any proof of their complicity in the bombing, but because their propaganda had presumably incited the unknown assassin. By the same logic the Abolitionists and Ralph Waldo Emerson might have been hanged with John Brown. Four anarchists were hanged, one committed suicide, and the other three went to prison for life.

When Altgeld became governor siz years later, Clarence Darrow tried to assure him that his career would be safe if he freed the anarchists. Altgeld knew better: "From that day I will be a dead man." Then he went ahead and pardoned them. It was his pardon message that brought out the real Altgeld, and the unparalleled abuse against him. For he was unable to please, just as he was unable to supply the usual favors to powerful men who now owned most of his beloved Unity Building and could ruin him financially (and they did). Another politician in office would have softened the message; other politicians in office would not have bothered at all. But all that suffering determination that had brought the immigrant boy and farm laborer so high now went to defend a principle.

Altgeld saw the democratic issue simply, as he had once seen success simply. In 1894 the country applauded when Cleveland sent federal troops into Chicago to smash the great Pullman strike. Altgeld procested bitterly in defense of states' rights, and the storm against him was greater than ever.

Altgeld had made a distinguished second as governor, was a prime fcrce in prison reform, and almost alone built up the University of Illinois. But all that was forgotten. To the respectable, Altgeld had become the archvillain of his time, and he was never again elected to any public office. Yet in the six years of life that remained to him he became a quiet evangel of progressive movements. Once, speaking in New York, the crowd cried: "We love you for your enemies!" But he was a poor man now, and often ill. One night he spoke up for the Boers at a meeting, fell to the floor, and died. He had spent his last day in Federal Court, pleading for some cabmen who had been excluded from a railway station where they sought passengers. Clarence Darrow said at his grave that he had become a voice "for the maimed and beaten, the sightless and voiceless . . . a flaming tongue crying in the wilderness for kindness and humanity and understanding." There were not many other tributes. There have never been too many since. For Altgeld was one of those men who really wrote his name in water: He merely had the courage to say "No."



It is in the form of an amendment to the Trading with the Enemy Act, and its net effect, if passed by both Houses of Congress, will be to empower the President to designate an appropriate successor organization to succeed to certain (by no means all) Jewish heirless assets in the United States, originally belonging to Jewish nationals of former enemy countries, and the application of the proceeds for the rehabilitation and settlement of victims of persecution.

The real importance of the Bill transcends the unknown amount of assets in the United States that may thus become available. A much larger amount of this type of property is supposedly available in Switzerland, and the Swiss Government has indicated it is waiting to see what America will do before it will take steps to pass legislation affecting such property in Switzerland.

The matter about which I am writing is one which has doubtless been brought to your attention frequently enough to try your patience. I refer to the United Jewish Appeal and the arrangement whereby one may not contribute to the JDC or to the USNA without contributing to the United Palestine Appeal; and one may not contribute to the UPA without contributing to all of the projects included in the UPA, even those which are under controversy.

The chief bone of contention has been that stressed by
the American Council for Judaism, namely, the use of UJA
funds to finance the spread of Zionism. Though a non-Zionist
myself, I have not been concerned about this as much as I have
been about something else. I happen to be a pacifist and am
unwilling to further military undertakings. Under governmental
compulsion, I contribute taxes to warmaking, but that is because
I am powerless to do otherwise. There I have no choice. I do
have some choice, at least nominally, when it comes to supporting the United Jewish Appeal. I wish to give and to give sacrificially for the purpose of helping. I am unwilling to give
for the purpose of killing. Palestinian war prespects have
actually been publicized as a talking point in the UJA.

Can not something be done to separate the debatable parts from the undebatable parts? Can it not be arranged that those who favor enlarging the Zionist organization and those who welcome Palestinian military ventures may thus designate, while those who are of a different mind may omit that designation?

You have doubtless been told many times that the United Jewish Appeal may be injured by those undetachable portions, some of the objectors, persons of means whose participation is vital, threatening to withhold their contributions. My own decision has been to give to the United Jewish Appeal and to work for the United Jewish Appeal but, while doing so, to register my protest about the fraction of my contribution which is used for purposes of which I do not approve and to voice my hope that, as speedily as possible, something may be done to effect the desired change.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I wish to inform you that the American Committee for Yugoslav Relief is discontinuing its activities. This is pursuant to a decision taken by the Ecard at a meeting held December 15 of last year.

At that time, the directors felt that with the end of the war and of the immediate post-war period, the Committee had served its greatest usefulness and circumstances no longer warranted its continuance. Immediate steps, therefore, were taken to curtail our activities with a view to final liquidation this summer. We reduced our staff, discontinued financial support to our branch committees and with the completion of our Christmas 1947 clothing drive, ended our public solicitation of funds as of January 1, 1948.

A number of projects, the money for which is in hand, have yet to be completed. When these obligations have been fulfilled, we shall close our office and warehouse.

As of May 31, 1948 our committee had received in cash and con-\*ributions in kind a total of \$3,113,710.56. We have equipped and maintained, wholly or partially (in various parts of Yugoslavia), 23 children's homes, among them the Eleanor Roosevelt Home, the Dwight D. Eisenhower Home, the Mary McLeod Bethume Home and the Albert Einstein Eome. With our assistance, two children's clinics, one stationary clinic and fourteen mobile clinics are engaged in the fight against tuberculosis and other diseases. Among the projects yet to be completed is the purchase and equipment of nine additional mobile clinics, bringing the total to twenty-three. One of our earliest projects was the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Hospital for the treatment of bone tuberculosis in Rovinj, Istria, and we have helped to equip five general hospitals. The tons of food, clothing and medicines which we have purchased or collected have been distributed for us by the Yugoslav Red Cross, and fully half has been used for the care of destitute and tubercular children.

This, very briefly, is our record. Both personally and on behalf of the directors, I wish to thank you most deeply for the help and cooperation which have made it possible. I feel that it is a record of which all of us can be proud. We have lessemed the suffering of a brave people who, as Senator Kilgore points out in a message

> ". . . it is our ardent desire to usist the people of Yugoslavia to recover from the ravages of was. . . ."-President Harry S. Truman

to us, "was one of our staunchest allies and -- held twenty divisions while we mobilized and attacked" our common enemy. Furthermore, by fostering in the people of Yugoslavia goodwill and understanding of the American people, we have helped materially in laying the foundations for a peaceful world.

On May 29, 1948, the American Committee for Yugoslav Relief was subjected to a totally unwarranted attack. I refer, of course, to the unsupported accusation by United States Attorney General Tom C. Clark that our Committee was "subversive". There is no basis in fact for such a charge, and the Attorney General has made no attempt to present evidence in support of it.

I am enclosing copies of two letters to the Attorney General. Dr. Kingsbury, you will note, asks for an interview in which we may at least learn the source and nature of the Attorney General's misinformation. We have as yet received no acknowledgement from the Attorney General.

We are, of course, morally obligated to disburse the money and goods on hand for the relief purposes for which they were donated. The Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid, under whose authority the collections were made, shares in this responsibility. The accusation by the Attorney General in no wise releases it or any other government agency from the obligation to afford us full facilities to complete our program and ship the relief supplies to the Yugeslav Red Cross. We hope to avoid all difficulties on this score, but I wish to inform you fully of all contingencies.

I shall appreciate your comments on this whole matter.

With renewed thanks for your generous support, to which I take the liberty of adding the thanks of the people of Yugoslavia who have, om many occasions, expressed their heartfelt appreciation of our help, I am

### DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION PROGRAM COMMITTEE GETS PLANK URGING FULL RECOGNITION OF ISRAEL

PHILADELPHIA, July 13. (JTA) -- The full 108-member Resolutions Committee at the Democratic National Convention hero today received a Palestine plank calling for full recognition of Israel and a revision of the arms embergo to permit the Jews of Israel to defend themselves.

The resolution which points to President Truman's immediate granting of recognition to Israel, approves the claims of Israel to the boundaries set forth in the U.N. partition resolution of last November and "looks forward" to the admission of Israel into the U.N. Also pledged are "appropriate aid" to Israel to develop its economy and resources and support of the internationalization of Jerusalsm.

It appears that the wording, as it now stands, will pass the full committee and go to the convention floor, although there is some feeling here that the White House may make a last minute request for further strengthening of the plank.

Proponents of a strong plank on Israel are generally satisfied with the results of the sub-committee in revising what the State Department wanted in the way of a Democratic policy statement on the Middle East crisis. However, some pro-Israel spokesmen here feel that the plank needs more toughening to make it specific enough for implementation purposes.

The only other change effected by supporters of Israel was over the arms embargo plank which now reads as follows: "We favor the revision of the arms embargo to accord to the State of Israel the right of self-defense, We pledge ourselves to work for the modification of any resolution of the United Nations to the extent that it may prevent any such revision."

The Resolutions Committee of the National Convention was today considering a request from the american Jewish Conference urging that the convention "pledge support for the adoption of an international treaty outlawing the crime of genocide." Declaring that "the Jewish people, the chief victim of this heinous crime, is firmly convinced that an internationally-recognized convention outlawing genocide is a matter of great urgency," the Conference message said "we firmly believe that the early conclusion of such a convention will mark a new milestone in man's struggle for justice and order in the family of nations."

### DR. SILVER ANNOUNCES AMERICANS FOR HAGAMAN WILL SUSPEND ACTIVITIES IMPEDIATELY

NEW YORK, July 13. (JTA) -- Declaring that "Haganah," as it existed in the past, has been dissolved by the action of the state of Israel," Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, chairman of the American section of the Jewish Agency today announced that Americans for Haganah which, he said, "has rendered excellent service in disseminating information about the work of the Haganah, will promptly suspend its activities."

Dr. Silver's statement added: "There has been in existence for some time an organization known as the Americans for Haganah, which has mobilized public opinion in the United States in support of the objectives of the Haganah, while not soliciting funds in its behalf. This organization has rendered excellent service in counteracting hostile criticism and misinformation spread by dissident groups. Now that the Haganah, too, as it existed in the past, has been dissolved by the action of the state of Israel, when it established one national defense army, the purposes of the Americans for Haganah have been fully served, and the organization accordingly will promptly suspend its activities.

"The task of disseminating information about the activities of Israel's Army of Defense will, in the future, be carried on by the Office of Information of the Israeli Government and by the various Zionist groups in the United States through their official publications and other channels of information," the statement concluded.



#### A Great Leader Realizes a Dream

"God Bless the United States of America

God Bless the State of Israel

God Bless all Humanity"

This heartfelt prayer was the restrained but exultant note of thanksgiving of Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver who had been privileged to live to see that day to see his dream a reality. Israel had declared its independence. Israel was now a state. That tall, slightly stoop shouldered and gray haired spiritual leader with his names upraised and his eyes closed gave voice to the surging emotional pride in the determination of a courageous people who had asserted their desire to be free. He shared with thousands of his brethren all over the world the joy of triumph, the pride of schievment, the glory of decision to live a free people. It was not the jubilant note of victory, it was the expression of a people who were prepared to give their lives for their Home Land.

As President of the Zionist Organization of America, Rabbi Silver had led the fight for a number of years. He had stood firm when storms raged around him. He had refused to yield when others were cautious and fearful. He accepted compromise only when there was no other alternative. He was

of the Yishab.

Rabbi Silver's whole life was a devotion to the cause of Zionism.

He came from a whome whose atmosphere was charged with Hebraic Lore and a

love of Palestine. His father had been an ardent Zionist in Lithuania. He death of Theadore Herzl. His Zionist activity took active form

with the death of Theadore Herzl. At the latter's death in 1904, Abba Hillel

Silver, his brother Maxwell and Israel Chipkin organized the Dr. Herzl Zion

Club among their classmates at Mast Broadway on the lower East Side of New Hole.

It was the first Zionist Youth Organization organized in the United States. Even then he learned his first lesson that Zionism was not only a vision and a philosophy but a militant battle. The authorities of the school on the East Side where the members of the Dr. Herzl Zion Club studied were opposed to the Herzlian Zionism. This devotion to an ideal which necessitated struggle and battle was the pattern which prepared him for his many spirited coatests with congregations, conventions and opposing factions in later years.

He then gave evidence of his talents for leadership. He insisted that the young members of the group talk Hebrew and give dramatic performances

in the Biblical language. That same burning zeal, that strong devotion to the cause of his people accelerated his academic progress through high school, college and the Hebrew Union College at Cincinnati. In those days it was quite the exception for a student at Hebrew Union College to be identified with Eionist activities. He had been indoctrinated with an ardent devotion for the literature of his people and he excelled in the acquisition of the great literature store houses of Hebrew learning. He gave evidence of great oratorical ability and immediately after his graduation was invited to his first congregation in sheeling, west Virginia. He served there for two years and though -comperatively/ anyoun man he was honored by a call to succeed Moses Gries of the Temple in Cleveland where he has served faithfully for almost thirty-three years. Under his leadership the Temple in Cleveland gwew in strength and influence. The wealth of his Jewish tralore dition, the knowledge of Hebrew Lore, his great faith in his people directed his interest in many communal enterprises. His tremendous energy was accelerated by a vigor and drive and force which enthused others and inspired them to follow his lead. He was not content merely to participate, he took the position of leadership which came about as a result of a tribute to his great force and drive. He became the leading figure in the community. He was

called to serve in many capacities. His interest was wide but he had the discerning power which guided his valiant efforts in those directions where results counted and achievements were imperative. That same powerhouse of energy which his youthful companions admired as he led the Young Judeans on East Broadway in New York; that same courageous devotion which characterized the brilliant Rabbi of the Temple; that same zeal which he exercized as President of the Cleveland Jewish Welfare Federation, brough the demand for his acceptance of the Presidency of the Zionist Organization of America. This was not merely a title; this was not merely a nominal Presidency. He had had great Zionist predecessors. He accepted the responsibilities and he became the militant leader. His was the task to lead his people out of the 00 diagers to their own land. He saw the vision. He had faith and tope. He gathered his followers around him and the battle was begun. He was the diplomat, the ambassador of his people and the capable statesman when he had to confer with the diplomats of the world. His appearance before the Zionist conventions were the occasions for arousing the anthusiasm of all the Jews in the United States. He extended the field of operations. He wrestled with political action problems. He mastered the technique of diplomacy. His Committees, inspired by his firm resolve and courage, never relaxed

their energies and never ceased fighting for their objective. He accepted Partition reluctantly but the hope for a state never left him. He yielded to compromise only as a means of further achievement. He threw his energy. his talents and his brilliance into the furious onslaught for free iron for his people. During these years he never forgot that he was the Rabbi of the Temple and a spiritual leader in the community. He had faith in his America and his confidence in the ultimate decision of the United States never forsook him. Today at the age of fifty-five he is the leader of the Zionists in America, the President of the World Zionists and the great force in the battle of freedom for his people. As a great american he fought for democratic ideals. As a brilliant Jewish leader he struggled and hoped for the declaration of a state of Israel. The dream of the inspired young leader of Young Judea of East Broadway, New York City had become a reality.
