With Miss Helen Keller's return to the United States scheduled for June 8, it occurs to us this might be the propitious time to apprise you, as a member of the Helen Keller 75th Birthday Committee and/or as a member of the Board of one of the two organizations mentioned above, of some of the activities planned in connection with this important anniversary.

- 1. President Eisenhower hopes to be able to send personal birthday greetings to Miss Keller.
- 2. The Honorable James Folsom, Governor of Alabama, has agreed to proclaim Monday, June 27, as Helen Keller Day in his State. Helen Keller is a native of Alabama.
- 3. The State of Connecticut, where Helen Keller now makes her home, is preparing, through Governor Abraham Ribicoff, an official statement or birthday greeting to Miss Keller.
- 4. The City of Tuscumbia, Alabama, Miss Keller's birthplace, will also observe Helen Keller Day on June 27.
- 5. The City of New York, where Helen Keller works in behalf of our two Foundations, has also agreed, through Acting Mayor Abe Stark, President of the City Council, to proclaim June 27 Helen Keller Day.

- 15. Reproductions of the Helen Keller Seal have been sent to approximately 1,600 weekly newspapers.
- 16. Arrangements have been made with the four major news services --AP, UP, INS and Reuters -- to carry extensive biographical stories on Miss Keller from the time of her arrival in the United States until her birthday.
- 17. Pictorial histories of Miss Keller's activities have been placed with many major newspapers in the United States. In addition, Mrs. Nella Henney, Miss Keller's friend and editor, has agreed to prepare an article for the New York Times Sunday Magazine of June 26. She has also written an article for the June issue of "The New Outlook for the Blind", an AFB publication, which will be devoted to an editorial and photographic tribute to Miss Keller.
- 18. A Foundation-prepared article on Miss Keller's life, illustrated with photographs, has been circulated on request to approximately 130 magazines in the United States and Canada.
- 19. Press kits, containing various biographical materials on Miss Keller, have been sent to all newspaper columnists, newspaper editorial page editors and many managing editors in the United States.

The Foundations have attempted to conduct a constructive and dignified campaign of publicity and public education in order that maximum attention might be focused on Miss Keller's anniversary and the ideals to which she has devoted her rich life.

We since zely hope these activities meet with your approval.

Our sincere thanks go to all of you for your cocperation with us in behalf of one of the great women of our time.

Yesterday I heard a broadcast of President Eisenhower's news conference in which he discussed the atomic powered commercial vessel carrying displays and exhibits of the peaceful use of atomic power in the fields of science, agriculture, medicine, and industry.

Realizing that Congress has failed to appropriate sufficient funds for this project, the thought came to me that here might be a wonderful opportunity for mobilizing all churchmen irrespective of faith for a good will mission to people throughout the world.

Since Hiroshima many of our elergy have felt conscience stricken and with the successive development of several larger bombs we have even wondered whether our country has the noral control to handle such power. Regardless of political connectations, it seems to me that if our Christian forces could cooperate in contributing funds for a peace crusade of this magnitude the churchmen of the United States could pay for this project. It further seems that were the "peace ship" to become not only a symbol of our state and industrial no-how but also a symbol of the spiritual aspirations of our country, it would become powerful towards the alleviation of fear and increase good will among all men seeking to advance human welfare.

If your office could spear-head such a crusade and secure the cooperation of men of good will in other faiths, this could be a mission project that would capture the imagination and support of all our citizens. If this idea be of God, as I believe, then by bearing witness to the hope it stirred in my heart perhaps other hearts will become inflamed until it becomes a flame in the land bearing witness to the light of the hope for the future. If it be not of God, no famning of the spark on my part will ever cause it to burst into flame, but I present the idea to you to see whether it be of God or man.
