"The first selection of America's outstanding young men was made in 1934 by Durward Howes, founder and editor of America's Young Men -the Who's Who among young men of the nation. Howes, who had served as President of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1930-31, first selected twelve outstanding young men. Additional selections were made in 1925, 1936, and 1937, and the group was limited to ten. In 1938, the book was discontinued and in its absence, the U. S. Jaycees took over the task of picking the outstanding men."

This brief paragraph taken from a recent FUTURE Magazine article covers the brief history of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce Ten Outstanding Young Men program. It was felt that in too many instances, the meritorious achievements of young men went by relatively unnoticed. We honor these men and tell the people of the country, through all the media, of their accomplishments. Their age limit is the same as the members of our organization, 21--35, but they need not be members. They will be paid additional tribute at a ceremony in their honor to be conducted in Springfield, Illinois, on January 14, 1956.

The selection of the winning men has always been very capably handled by panels selected each year from the country's distinguished citizens. This policy is one we want to continue. Our entire organization would be honored if you would accept the responsibility of acting as one of the judges in this year's competition.

This organization will be responsible for the premotion of this contest, and your participation as a judge will not require you to travel, nor will it require a great amount of your time. We will ask you only to review approximately 40 nominations submitted on the enclosed type blank and make a choice of ten you feel most qualified. This is a most important responsibility and we sincerely hope you will be able to assist us.

# Nation's Ten Outstanding Young Men of 1955

There is at least one young man in your community or firm who, because of extraordinary talent and initiative, has made important contributions to his profession, and to the general welfare of the people.

A search for the Nation's Ten Outstanding Young Men of the Year has been made for more than a decade by the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce. The purpose of this program is to present the world with concrete evidence that success in our free enterprise system is still available to those individuals who strive to achieve. All Communists or those known to have Communist leanings are excluded from any consideration.

Any young man, 21 through 35 years of age, who has not reached his 36th birth-day at any time during 1955, who has been of service and an outstanding example of the above precept and personal development, is eligible to be nominated as a candidate for recognition as one of the Nation's Ten Outstanding Young Men of the Year.

A panel of distinguished American leaders representing all fields of endeavor will act as judges and their selections will be based on the answers to the two principal questions on pages two and three of this nomination blank. All information must be contained on pages two and three. Supplementary data may be sent but only title listings of the same will be forwarded to judges.

You as an individual and all organizations, educational institutions, industries, professions and Junior Chambers of Commerce are urged to nominate candidates for recognition as one of the Nation's Ten Outstanding Young Men of 1955. It is essential that this nomination blank, completely filled out and with a formally-posed glossy photograph of the nominee, and a photograph showing the nominee in action at his work, both at least 5 x 7, be attached. Mail to Internal Affairs, United States Junior Chamber of Commerce, P.O. Box 7, Tulsa, Oklahoma, no later than October 7, 1955. No nomination will be accepted that is postmarked later than midnight October 7, 1955.

The top ten young men named by the judges will be honored at the traditional barquet that is held each year during Jaycee Week, mid-January, in comme moration of the founding of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce on January 21, 1920. This year the banquet and ceremonies will be held in Springfield, Illinois, on January 14, 1956.

O What Outstanding Contribution has the nominee made in his work or profession?

Proceedings of the International Atoms for Peace Conference as Professor I.I. Rabi, the United States representative at the United Nations Geneva Conference negotiations, Dr. Charpie participated in many of the delicate international discussions which preceded the organization of the Conference. In these discussions Dr. Charpie often carried the responsibility of representing the U.S. as deputy spokesman. After spearheading the crucial planning of the Geneva Conference as Professor Rabi's assistant, Dr. Charpie served as a Scientific Secretary for the U.N. His qualifications and performance have been so outstanding that he is now General Editor of the 16-volume Proceedings of the International Atoms for Peace Conference.

Dr. Charpie's magnificent performance at Geneva was not at all unexpected by those who know him at the Cak Ridge National Laboratory. He joined the Laboratory, the largest American nuclear energy research establishment, as a theoretical physicist in 1950 at the gage of 25 and within 4 years has risen to the position of Assistant Research Director. In this capacity he has the responsibility for the scientific work of about 400 technical people. Many of these scientists are older than Dr. Charpie, nevertheless, he is so constanding that all members of the Laboratory lock to him for leadership and guidance.

In addition to his remarkable and demonstrated ability as a scientific a ministrator, Dr. Charpie is an able and productive scientist in his own right. He has made numerous independent contributions to nuclear science, one of the most useful has been the development of a method for computing the behavior of nuclear reactors by means of high speed accomputing equipment. He has also done important work on proton-induced reactions using

Dr. Charpie showed early promise of his great ability. He was awarded the Westinghouse National Science Scholarship in 1943, which enabled him to start his schooling at Carnegie Tech. After an interruption due to the war, he received a Bachelor's, Master's and Doctor's degree. He completed the usual 7 or 8 year course in only 5 years.

Few people in the U.S., or in any country, demonstrate at so early an age the remarkable capacity for mature judgement, unstinting effort, and brilliant scientific insight as Dr. Charpie. Even fewer have the opportunity to come into the public eye and to reach great neights so early. Dr. Charpie, as assistant Research Director at ORNL and by his brilliant scientific leadership in the Geneva Conference, has demonstrated the capacity for success commensurate with his innate ability.

	J. Ernest Wilkins, Jr. was born on November 27, 1923, the oldest son of
	J. Ernest and Lucille Wilkins. His early education was received in the public schools
	of Chicago. He entered the University of Chicago in 1937 and graduated in 1940 with
	a BS. in Mathematics, having been elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He received the M.S.
	degree in 1941 and a Ph.D. in 1942, majoring again in Mathematics. Dr. Wilkins was
	the youngest person ever to receive the doctorate in Mathematics from the University
	of Chicago. His work for the Ph.D. was partially supported by the Alvia K. Brown
	Fellowship. In 1942 he was elected to the honorary scientific fraternity Sigma Xi.
EZ	He received a Julius Rosenweld Fellowship in 19/2 to study at the Institute for
	Advanced Study, Princeton, which he held until 1943, when he went to Tuskegee

Thomas Schippers, 1955 conductor of the Hetropolitan Opera, is the youngest man ever to conduct the New York Philharmonic Symphony and the youngest American ever to conduct La Scala, in Milan, Italy. Now 25, Schippers began his formal career in music at age 6 with the study of the plane, and at age 7 to 10 he toured the midwest states making concert appearances. At 9, he joined the choir of St. Luke's Church in Kalamazoo, Michigan and, one year later, he became head organist - a position he held for three years. Following graduation from Kalemazoo Central High School as an all "A" student (at age 14), Schippers attended The Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, becoming the first student to be graduated in less than I years. He completed his studies ! in 2 years and was graduated at the age of 16. His formal training also included study at Yale University, Tanglewood and Julliard School of Music. Schippers' appearances at the organ include Christmas season performances PRINT at Wanamaker's Store in N.Y. (for the past three years), before the King of England on his visit to New York, at the departure and return of Walter OR Winchell's Freedom Train, and a dinner-dance given by President Truman. For two years he directed the choir and served as organist at the Bryn 四四 Marr Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia. At 19, he was one of 500 applicants to audition for the post of conductor of the Philadelphia Symphony. LEASE Reaching the audition finals with Eugene Ormandy, the youngster's age was believed to be a determining factor in his elimination. At age 20, he conducted, on special request of the composer, Gian-Carlo Memotti's operas "The Consul" and "The Medium" in New York. At Christmas 1951, he conducted "Amahl and the Night Visitors" on the Hallmark nationwide T-V program and has repeated this performance in 1952, 1953, and 1954. During the summer of 1953, he conducted two performences of the Chicago Symphony before a total of 40,000 people. In 1955 he made his 11th tour of Europe and North Africa, making countless personal appearances conducting foriegn prchestras and opera companies. May 10 and Oct. 16-17, 1955, on special invation, he conducted the La Scala in Milan, Italy. Rudolph Bing selected him to conduct the Metropolitan Opera this season. Schippers also conducted the first performance of Menotti's new opera "The Saint of Blecker Street" on Broadway, premiered and toured with it in Europe and returned to conduct it on Ed Sulliven's " Tonst of The Town" television program. 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## What Outstanding Contribution has the nominee made in his work or profession?

Denton A. Cooley is now in his fifth year on the full-time faculty of the Baylor University College of Medicine and is an Associate Professor of Surgery.

His professional activities are divided primarily among teaching and contributions to medical literature, including some sixty (60) original papers dealing with surgical corrections of disorders of the heart, blood vessels, lungs, esophagus and stomach (15 of these during the last twelve months).

Dr. cooley's particular specialty is cardiac surgery. He participated in the ploneer efforts in the famous "blue baby" operations at the John Hopkins Hospital with Dr. Alfred Blalock between 1944 and 1950. He has also performed cardiac and tuberculosis surgery in 1950 and 1951 with Sir Russell Brock, renowned heart surgeon of London, England. He has corrected surgically hundreds of congenital

and acquired cardiac disorders in his work in Houston.

His original experiments dealing with wounds of the heart have been recognized as significant contributions to the management of such injuries. Such recognition is attested by the number of professional societies before whom he has appeared to read papers on the results of such experiments and to explain the surgical techniques used. The societies include the American Association for Thoracic Surgery, the Western Surgical Association and the Pan-Pacific Surgical Association. His most widely acclaimed contribution to his profession has been the development of a successful means of treating aneurysms of the aorta. An aneurysm is a weakened area in a blood vessel produced by disease. Dr. Cooley has successfully corrected such fatal condition by the excisior of these lesions and the repair of the aorta or blood vessel by the transplanting of preserved segments of vessesl -taken from cadavers. This technique is the method of choice now used in all such cases. Recently, Dr. Cooley removed and replaced the entire acrtic arch successfully. This was the first time that such a procedure had been performed. Formal reports of these techniques have been made to the International Society of Angiology, the Southern Surgical Society, the Southwestern Surgical Congress and the International Surgical Society at Copenhagen, Denmark, in July, 1955.

In the related field of anesthesiology, Dr. Cooley has again been in the forefront of his profession by pointing the way to the use of low body temperatures as the anesthesia to prevent central nervous system damage during the long and involved surgical procedures. Such experiments and investigations have led to the wide spread use of this technique, hypothermia, during such operations. Movies of the technique used in the operations above described are on file in the film

library of the American College of Surgeons.

With Dro. M. D. DeBakey and Oscar Creech of the Baylor University College of Medicine staff, an exhibit on the surgical treatment of aneurysms and throabo-obliterative disease of the aorta was developed for the 1954 general session at the San Francisco convention of the American Medical Association. This exhibit received the Hekthen Gold Medal Award as the best among some 1500 scientific exhibits for original investigation and presentation. It is through such exhibits, films and presentations that the fruits of Dr. cooley's genius are distributed through the Medical Societies to patients all over the world.

What Outstanding Contribution has the nominee made in his work or profession? Accusations of graft and corruption and a general disrespect by the public of the St. Louis County Prosecuting Attorneys Office led Edward W. Garnholz to put aside a successful private law practice at great personal sacrifice and to seek the nomination for this office. He emerged victorious and undertook the duties of the Prosecuting Attorney of a County of over 500,000 people. The obstacles that faced him would have soon discouraged most young men of 32, the youngest to ever hold this high office in St. Louis County. He withstood the pressure of old line politicians seeking to dominate his appointments and instead peopled his office with young men dedicated to the law. He and his assistants devote full time to their duties and are now on call 24 hours a day to serve the people of his county. He sought and obtained, over strong objection, continuous Grand Juries for investi-Egation not only of actual crimes but of slip shod and careless governmental practices. Under his guidance and investigation, Grand Juries have investigated the St. Louis County Housing Authority which operates Oa development housing over 850 families. As a direct result of this minvestigation a saving of over 80,000 dollars a year has been effected through elimination of waste and the establishment of good business practices. For years the entire northern section of St. Louis County with over 150,000 people has been the victim of serious health hazards from raw sewage running through a creek over nine miles long. Within less than two months Mr. Garnholz, as a result of a searching inquiry, has given these people new hope and the assurance that construction of a trunk sewer line will commence in less than six months. Fe focused the public spotlight on tourist courts and motels engaging in illicit traffic in humanity and today these same establishments are catering to tourists, not locals. Through television and radic he has made parent; aware of the cancerous growth of juvenile delinquency and with them he has arrested this growth. This continuous devotion to the people of St. Louis County has brought him the award of "The Legion of Honor" of the National DeMolay. Ed Garnholz is truly the peoples attorney.

What Outstanding Contribution has the nominee made to the general welfare of the people? November, 1952, Edward W. Garnholz was elected to the Missouri State Legislature to represent the Sixth District of St. Louis County for a term of two years. He soon won the respect of seasoned Legislators who, in recognition of his abilities, appointed him to important committee work. Among those committees were the House Judiciary, House Investigating and the powerful House Appropriation Committee. In addition he was named Chairman of the Bi-Partisan Investigating Committee of Ecleomoserary Institutions. As Chairman of this committee, he soon made the people of the state aware that Missouri ranked 46th in the care provided for mental patients but 10th in the ability to care for these sick people. Fighting an up hill climb, he led his committee to hospital after hospital throughout the state, pointing out the dire needs that existed. He enlisted the aid of leading authorities on mental health to suggest improvements to be made and solutions to the existing problems. His work was not in vair for through his efforts, the Legislature voted an appropriation of \$29,000,000.00 , which is 12 M dollars more than had ever before been appropriated. His dedicated work in the field of mental health has brought new hope to the mentally ill of Missouri. It has given new inspiration to the hundreds of dedicated people working in this field. New buildings and facilities have been erected and completely new and adequate training programs have been instituted for hospital personnel. Today, as a result of his work, Missouri is rapidly moving forward in the care of the mentally ill. Succeeding Legislatures have carried on the improvements he started as a young freshman Legislator. In recognition of his outstanding work he received the Floralier Certificate of Award and the Distinguished Service Award of the Jaycees for 1953, but more than this, he was rewarded with meace of mind for the help he gave the minds of others.

Charles H. Smith, Jr., is known for his contributions to improving labormanagement relations. He is a pioneer in the concept that "If employees are given
an opportunity to have a better understanding of the company for which they work,
and a better understanding of the American economic system, then these employees
will approach their jobs and the problems connected with them with a spirit of
cooperation that will minimize labor disputes, and improve labor-management
relations".

He has applied this concept to his own business through an effective employee communications program. Although his company had many labor problems before his first efforts were made to solve them through this approach, there have been no serious labor difficulties since 1946. This relative harmony has been apparent despite the multitudinous problems of seven labor union contracts in his relatively small company. This achievement was recognized by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States as worthy of a detailed study, which has been printed in booklet form and distributed to business men throughout the nation. A copy of this booklet is attached, and special attention is directed to pages 1, 2 and 3.

He has been active in helping spread this concept to other business men throughout the nation, aimed at improving the general public's understanding of th∈ American economic system and the relationship betwen management, labor, and their mutual customers.

At the 1953 International Labor Conference in Geneva, Switzerland, he served as advisor to the United States employer delegate. Also in 1953, he was a member of the Committee on Manpower Resources for National Security which undertook to study this subject for President Eisenhower. He is a member of the Labor Relations Committee of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States; as well as the Industrial Relations Committee of the National Association of Manufacturers; and Chairman of the Economic Information Committee of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce.

As a business executive, his company has grown to become one of the nation's largest forge shops, during the 13 years he has been its president. His company has contributed to help the entire forging industry progress through its willingness to pioneer in the development of new techniques. During the Korean Emergency his company was asked to organize and build a plant in Canada to produce forged blades for jet engines. This large job was done in less than a year.

As a metallurgist in the 1940's, he guided his fellow workers in pioneering the way to forge the hi-density heat-resisting alloys that are necessary to manufacture turbo-jet engines.

• What Outstanding Contribution has the nominee made to the general welfare of the people?
This nominee has exhibited a willingness to find enough time to accept a
multitude of charitable non-paying jobs that aid public welfare, in addition to running
his own business and fulfilling all of his family duties of raising three children.
He has provided outstanding leadership in raising funds for community welfare
projects. In 1954 he was Metropolitan Division Chairman and Business-Industry
Chairman of the Cleveland YMCA multi-million dollar building fund campaign. He
is Chairman of a Division of the Cleveland Community Fund which is responsible
for raising over a million dollars. He is Chairman of the Finance Committee of his
church.

Our nomination for one of the Nation's outstanding young men of 1955 is Dr. Ivan
Stewart, research scientist at the University of Florida. Dr. Stewart, who is now

34 years old, has made outstanding discoveries in the field of plant nutrition.

These discoveries have not only solved some of the most serious problems confronting
Florida citrus growers, but they are now being used world-wide with resulting notable
increases in the production of many crops.

The most important of these has been the introduction of chelated iror for the cure of iron deficiency in crop plants. Iron starvetion is a world-wide problem that has been studied for over 100 years, and about which over 1000 scientific papers have been written. It is a condition that cannot be corrected by simply adding iron compounds to the soil. Dr. Stewart found that it took more than 300 pounds of iron sulfate to correct iron deficiency in a citrus tree. For citrus growers this was a prohibitive solution. Continuing his work with Dr. C. D. Leonard, Dr. Stewart pioneered the first practical solution to the problem which is now being accepted the world over. This was done by using a chelating agent, ethylene diamine tetra acctic acid, called EDTA for short. EDTA holds iron and prevents it from reacting with the soil until plant roots can take it up. Only 2/3 of an ounce of iron in this form is needed to cure iron deficiency, even in the largest trees. By virtue of this, thousands of acres of citrus trees in Florida have once again come back into production.

Not only has the use of chelated iron brought about large increases in yield of citrus fruit, but it has also resulted in significant improvement in fruit quality, as evidenced by substantial increases in both sugar and iron in the juice. There has also been a noticeable improvement in fruit color, a critical factor in market acceptance.

As a result of these discoveries, chelated iron is being used to overcome iron starvation of apples in Ergland, grapes in France, pin-apples in Hawaii, vegetables and citrus in Florida, coffee in South America, and in roses and other ormamentals wherever iron nutrition is a problem.

What Outstanding Contribution has the nominee made in his work or profession?

While Dr. Rubon F. Nottler's single most conspicuous professional achievement has probably been his outstanding contribution to the defense capability of the United States as evidenced by the attached telegrams from Secretary Quarles, General Saville, General Putt, General George, and President Killian, it has seemed more appropriate to describe this on the opposite page. His additional professional contributions are outlined in the following paragraphs.

After enlisting in the Navy as an apprentice seaman in 1942, Rube Mettler graduated from California Institute of Technology, Navai Midshipman's School at Columbia University, and MIT Radar School. He then was assigned by the Navy as a field service engineer for shipborne radar and fire control equipment on all types of ships in the Pacific Ocean Area. At the end of the war, he was assigned to six months' duty in connection with the Bikini atomic bomb tests, handling instrumentation design and installation.

Returning to Cal Tech in 1946, he obtained the M.S. in E.E. in 1947, and a Ph.D., magna cum laude, in electrical engineering, with a minor in aeronautics, in June, 1949. As a graduate student, Rube taught applied mechanics in the Mechanical Engineering Department. During this period, he also was a consultant to the North American Aviation Aerophysics Laboratory, and to the Halliburton Dil Well Cementing Company. Together with a colleague, he invented and built an electronic system of oilwell logging with new and valuable characteristics.

Joining Hughes Aircraft Company in 1949, Rube began work in what has now grown to be the new field of "System Engineering" and in which he has achieved national recognition. Within six months, he and three associates completed the original analysis and systems invention which has subsequently led to the development and production of new and vastly more effective rocket fire control systems. Production orders for systems incorporating the basic concepts total several bundred million dollars. The great majority of American and Canadian all-weather interceptors produced during the past four years are equipped with this type of fire-control system.

Later, he was the leader of a group which did the analysis and planning for a completely integrated interceptor electronic system, including navigation, fire control for both rockets and guided missites, homing, landing, and automatic pilot functions. This system is now being placed in production for the newest supersonic Air Force interceptors. Subsequently he became section head responsible for the development of this system, and as the development progressed, he was made department head responsible for this system and several others. In this capacity, he demonstrated unusual skill at technical management, and achieved unusual success in system engineering and in system coordination between technical and contractual groups in the Air Force, the flight-testing organization, subcontractors, airfreme manufacturers, and the production organization. Several patent applications have been filed on his inventions. By 1954, when he left to serve as Special Consultant to the Department of Defense, Rube was Associate Director, Fader Research & Development Division, which was composed of about 1,000 engineers, technicians, and supporting personnel.

Recognition as the "Outstanding Young Electrical Engineer of 1954" was given to him by Eta Kappa Nu, national electrical engineering honor society.

Upon leaving the Department of Defense in 1955, Rube joined The Ramo-Weoldridge Corporation, where as Assistant Director for System Integration of the Guided Missile Research Division and as Director of Advanced Systems Planning in the central staff group of the corporation, he is continuing to make important contributions in the fields of System Engineering and Technical Management, particularly as applied to major military Weapons systems.

O What Outstanding Contribution has the nominee made to the general welfare of the people?

His balanced judgment between theoretical and practical aspects of involved problems of Systems Engineering should make this new instruction particularly valuable..."

The Trustees of the University of New Hampshire scked Mr. Eddy, then Assistant to the President, to assume the responsibilities of Acting President in June 1954, when the President resigned unexpectedly. At the time he was just 34 years old, making him by some years the youngest chief executive of a major university in the country. In this capacity he made many outstending contributions to higher education as well as to his own State of New Hampshire. For instance, he gave tremendous impetus to planning for the future by proposing an orderly program of expansion in order that a larger number of young people, now flooding the primary and secondary schools, could be educated in the future without sacrifice of quality. In this planning, he pioneered among the universities of the country. Another significant contribution was his leadership in guiding through the State legislature the University's request for better faculty salaries, additional equipment, and for the construction of a new dormitory and a \$1,400,000 library, badly needed on the University campus for over 20 years. His ability to convince an economy minded legislature of the needs of young people was widely hailed. Said the University's Alumni Magazine:

H "A commanding vote of confidence in the University was accorded by the legislature. From the standpoint of the University, it was probably the best session since 1925 for the tremendous amount of good will which was evident. Much of the credit goes to Mr. Eddy. His painstaking preparation and his ability in testifying before the various committees were w in large measure responsible for the University's legislation." A basic feature of Mr. Eddy's approach, illustrated in numerous instances, is his ability to inspire team effort among the faculty, staff and students. The Honorable Hugh Gregg, Governor of the State of New Hampshire, stated: "No one in State service has given more of himself to his career." He said that he had been continually amazed at what Mr. Eddy has been able to accomplish and "the excellent reputation built for the State through the administration of the University." His boundless energy and enthusiasm have led him to make significant contributions far beyond the usual scope of college administration. For instance, the first reciprocal agreement in the Northeast between two states providing for the education of medical doctors was concluded by him. When the Trustees elected a new President 14 months after the previous President resigned, they named Mr. Eddy to a new post of Vice-President and Provost. They thus promoted a man already assuming great responsibilities to a roll of top policy and planning usually occupied by a person 20 years his senior. The Trustees made the following public statement: "(Ne) have been grateful, indeed, to Mr. Eddy for his splendid achievements this year and his willingness to lay aside his personal plans in order to serve as Acting President. The University has made substantial progress under his able direction. We are fortunate to have a man of his

ability to serve in this new and highly important position."

What Outstanding Contribution has the nominee made to the general welfare of the people? In addition to Mr. Eddy's intense interest in education for all youth, he has been vitally concerned with the moral and spiritual well-being of the people as a whole. During the past 12 months, he has delivered 132 speeches to civic, industrial, religious and youth groups across N.H. as well as in neighboring states. In these speeches, he stresses the need for wise planning for education at all levels, the necessity of better human understanding, and the wisdom of right attitudes toward our national and common life. He has made the first exhaustive study ever undertaken of the philosophy of publicly-supported higher education. This November he will address the Council of Presidents of all the landgrant colleges in the nation. His deep religious convictions have made an impact on many New Hampshire communities where, as an ordained minister, he has preached in his extra time. (He has preached during the past few years in 42 different communities.) The following editorial from the Portsmouth, N.H., newspaper shows also his impact on the youth at the University: "As long as there are men like Edward D. Eddy to provide it, there is no need to worry about the quality of moral judgment being bestowed upon the young people of this State at the University of New Hampshire. He once again demonstrated this fact to our satisfaction the other day as he imparted his thoughts on religious understanding to a group of freshman students." The editorial comments that his remarks were "the essence of the democratic ideal in a land of liberty. And it is important that college youth, in the most formative years of their life, be put upon the right track in searching out their individual brands of idealism ... With heedful respect for the advice they receive from Dr. Eddy, we are sure this crop of University students will emerge as fine products indeed." His interest in educational opportunities for all people, regardless of age, has been demonstrated by his active participation on the N.H. Commission on Educational Television which has made exhgustive surveys of the possibilities of tri-state cooperation in this media. As example of his countless community and state activities, he served as Chairman of the New Hampshire State Committee for the International Farm Youth Exchange Program. this capacity, he provided impetus for raising funds so that youth from New Hampshire could have the experience of working on farms in a foreign nation, at the same time that a foreign Mr. Eddy is one of the most widely known youth lived among New Hampshire people. and respected men in his State. At a comparatively young age, he is constantly sought for service on important committees as well as to give guidance to many individuals as well as groups. His achievements thus far give ample promise of his being one of the nation's top educators within a few years.

What Outstanding Contribution has the nominee made in his work or profession? Howard W. 



## The Hall of Fame

Inspired by the memories of early youth in the Alliance and in appreciation for the many opportunities afforded them, these now successful business and professional men formed the Alumni Association of the Educational Alliance more than 30 years ago. To honor those distinguished Alumni who left an indelible impression on the community, the Alumni Association has established a Hall of Fame.

A criteria has been formulated standardizing the qualifications needed for election to the Hall of Fame. To be elected one is required to have been interested and active in the Educational Alliance, to have made a contribution to the life of the community, and to have achieved prominence in his special field. Each year an award is presented to one of its Alumni for outstanding achievement. This year we knoor Judge Joseph M. Proskauer who, early in his career was for a number of years a volunteer club leader at The Educational Alliance.

## HON. JOSEPH M. PROSKAUER A PROFILE

Judge Proskauer was born in Mobile, Alabama, on August 6, 1877. In 1896 he received a degree of Bachelor of Arts from Columbia College and in 1899, a degree of Bachelor of Laws from Columbia University Law School. In 1929 he received the degree of LL.D. from Columbia University and the same from Dartmouth College in 1953. The Hebrew Union College, in 1946, honored him with the degree of D.H.L. In 1923 he was elected a Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York. He was designated by the Governor of the State of New York in 1927 as an Associate Justice of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Department, which office he held until his resignation in 1930 to resume the practice of the law. He is a senior member of the firm of Proskauer, Rose, Goetz & Mendelsohn. In 1935 he was appointed by the Mayor of the City of New York as a member of the New York City Charter Revision Committee. In 1951 the Governor of the State of New York appointed him Chairman of the New York State Crime Commission. In 1553 he was designated by the Governor of the State of New York as Chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee for the Bicentennial of Columbia University in the City of New York and in 1954 he was designated by the Governor as Chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee for the American Jewish Tercentenary. He is a member of the Association of the Bar of the City of New York and at one time served as its Vice-President. He is also a member of the New York County Lawyers Association and served as its President in 1947 and 1948. He is also a member of the New York State Bar Association and served as President of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies from 1931 to 1934. He is an Ex-President of the Young Men's Hebrew Association of New York City and of the American Jewish Committee of which he is now Honorary President. We note that early in his career he was for a number of years a volunteer club member at The Educational Alliance and has always been interested in its service to the community.

## An Opinion By JUSTICE BENJAMIN N. CARDOZO

"We are concerned here with the work of one agency among many -the work of this Alliance. It is something which, so far as I know, has never been attempted in just this form by any other institution before. Almost everything that is done here, is done somewhere else, if you split up the work and treat the elements separately, but the great and original and the unique feature of this work is that here all these elements are brought together just as they are in life. Life is not education alone, nor religion alone, nor politics, nor social service. It is not work alone, nor, as we hardly need to be reminded, is it play alone. It is all these things and more. It is all of them fused together; and we are trying to show here, that all these things are important, that all have their appropriate ideals and standards, that there is a certain way of looking at them, a certain way of pursuing them, a certain way of attaining them, which is the American way and which will make him who follows it the American Citizen. What a force has gone forth from these walls, men and women who have absorbed the spirit of our land, and who will spread it and transmit it undefiled to the coming generation."




