October 25th, 1943 Dear Dr. Silver: I am very much interested in your letter of October 20th - as I always will be in your counsel and guidance in Jewish matters. I do not know who informed you that I placed a "suggested draft of a statement" before the President. As a matter of fact, the memorandum which I left at the White House in respect to the message to the "Night of Stars" included only some penciled suggestions that I wrote myself while in the office. However, the larger matter of the attitude of the government toward a Jewish Palestine must give any intelligent and thoughtful person cause for concern. If you believe that it would be helpful to talk to me when you are in New York, of course I will be happy to meet you at your convenience.
