My dear Dr. Wise:

I believe that you ought to be acquainted with the enclosed material. You will recall that last October, the Executive Board of the Union decided to refer action on the Palestine Resolution to the next Biennial Council in 1945. We were all happy at this decision. Since then, the Anti-Zionist Rabbis have been clamoring for an immediate reconsideration of the action of the Executive. Rabbi Eisendrath, who has been terrified by the clamor of the opposition, summoned a few weeks ago a rump conference of Rabbis which adopted the Resolution enclosed herewith. Rabbi James Heller, chairman of the Administrative Committee of the ZOA, was one of the Rabbis who voted for it. I am enclosing herewith a letter which I sent to Rabbi Heller and to some of the other "Zionist" Rabbis who attended this meeting, some of whom, by the way, have since recanted their action. You will see from the letter which Rabbi Eisendrath wrote me a few days ago that what is being contemplated at the next meeting of the Executive of the Union which is to be held the 18th of this month, is to proclaim to the country that the Union of American Hebrew Congregations dissociates itself from the Zionist program -- not that it is neutral on the subject, but negative.

I am afraid that the anti-Zionists will succeed in having their way at the next meeting of the Executive largely because this Resolution will have the blessing of an important official of the ZOA and of some other so called Zionist Rabbis.

I have had no reply to the letter which I wrote to Rabbi Heller as Chairman of the Executive of the Zionist Emergency Council.

My dear Dr. Wise:

I am enclosing a letter which I received from Mr. Sumner Welles. It is unfortunate that the illness of his wife will make it impossible for him to go to Washington at an early date, and to carry on with the task he had undertaken.

I was in touch this week with Mr. Nathan Strauss to learn whether he had heard anything further about the "good news" which Postmaster Frank Walker told us a few weeks ago would be soon forthcoming. Mr. Strauss said that he would get in touch with Mr. Walker immediately. Failing this, we will have to make a direct effort to reach the President, now that he is recovering from his illness. We should certainly not wish to introduce the Palestine Resolution into Congress before learning from him what the situation is. We must know, too, before our delegation leaves for London.

Our friends in Palestine are unwilling to take a stand on the subject, and our parties here seem to be opposed to the proposal. I am afraid that we are missing an opportunity and that we shall be severely criticized for having turned aside the hand of cooperation and unity extended to us. Our action may even bring about a reconciliation between the Revisionists and the Bergson group.



Dear Dr. Silver:

You are right in believing that I have come upon all that you mention in your letter of February 28th, in every sort of way and most especially through the radio and press reports, all of them alike, disconcerting and even terrifying. I am afraid that we should have foreseen what would happen and that our Bill gave our enemies just the opportunity they waited for, our enemies within and our enemies without.

Whether things can be patched ^{up} at all, it is difficult, at this distance from Washington, to say. I am not even sure that the Chief is in Washington at this time. I will write to him and tell him of my own deep unhappiness over the turn things are taking and try to make him decide that he ought to see us.

I assume that you will not try to push the Bill if it faces defeat in Committee or in the House. I hope to see you within a week and we can talk things over. I may say to you that if I were feeling well, I would go home at once but I have been far from well and suffering great pain because of the organic disease from which I suffer.
