My dear Dr. Silver:

This will reply to your letter of September 12th.

I deeply hope that the majority report of the UN Palestine Commission may point the way to a successful settlement of this tragic conundrum. I have made it completely plain to our own Government that I think the majority report offers the only hope of settlement. As you know, I have repeatedly waid the same thing upon previous occasions because of my long-time belief that "viable partition" is the only answer. I agree with you that the United States Government should take a firm position in seeking to get agreement. It will do no one (including the Jews themselves) any good to order a decision (in the absence of agreement) which merely precipitates armed welfare with the Moslem world. This would simply substitute one tragedy for another and expand disaster into even wider areas. Therefore, my whole emphasis is upon agreement; and it seems obvious to me that the influence of the United States must be vigorously used if rival partisans are to be adequately impressed with the necessity of "agreement."

I am not advised as to the precise procedure which the Secretary of State intends to pursue at New York. Obviously he confronts a difficult task even if he pursues the viewpoint I have expressed. Before making a final decision as to whether I should make a public statement on the subject, I think I should confer with him again with this specific objective in mind. I would not want unwittingly to do more harm than good. Therefore, I will pursue the following course. I am temporarily "interned" here at Grand Rapids because Mrs. Vandenberg is to have a gall bladder operation the latter part of this week; and I am also moving into the hospital for a check-up which seems to be a necessity. I hope to be a "free agent" in ten days or two weeks. I shall immediately go to New York. I will talk this out with the Secretary and I will advise you of the result.

I want to add one wery earnest thought. Despite all the anti-Zionist attitudes chargeable to the British, and despite all the retaliations which are perfectly natural as a result, I think the Terrorist activities of the Jewish Extremeists (culminating in the recent Paris disclosures) are doing

September 17, 1947 - 2 -A. H. Silver almost irreparable damage to the Zionist cause. I know how vigorously you have denounced these Terrorist activities. I know they represent an utter minimum of Jewish sympathy. Nevertheless, they invite a rampant prejudice which is doing the cause great harm both at home and abroad. I fervently hope that there may be no untoward incident at this critical moment to completely nullify our aspirations. As usual, I have spoken with complete frankness to you on the basis of our usual personal and confidential discussions. With warm personal regards and best wishes, Cordially and faithfully,

FROM MANY SOURCES WE ARE RELIABLY INFORMED THAT OUR SITUATION HAS GREATLY DETERIORATED WITHIN THE LAST FEW DAYS AND THAT THE POSITION OF OUR GOVERNMENT IN RELATION TO THE MAJORITY REPORT OF THE UNITED NATIONS SPECIAL COMMITTEE HAS BECOME VACILATING AND EQUIVOCAL. THIS IS CREATING CONFUSION IN THE RANKS OF OUR FRIENDS AMONG THE UNITED NATIONS DELEGATIONS AND IF THIS IMPRESSION IS NOT QUICKLY CORRECTED, IT IS LIKELY TO LEAD TO A DISASTROUS STALEMATE WHICH WOULD NOT ONLY DO IRREPARABLE HARM TO OUR CAUSE BUT WOULD SERIOUSLY UNDERMINE THE PRESTIGE AND AUTHORITY OF THE UNITED NATIONS. ARAB THREATS AND THE EVIL MACHINATIONS OF BITTER ENEMIES OF OUR CUASE, LIKE GEORGE WADSWORTH, HAVE SEEMINGLY BROUGHT ABOUT A CHANGE THE FORTHRIGHT AND HEARTENING POSITION WHICH WAS TAKEN BY SECRETARY MARSHALL AT THE ASSEMBLY TEN DAYS AGO. IN THIS CRITICAL JUNCTURE, I APPEAL TO YOU TO USE YOUR GREAT INFLUENCE WITH OUR GOVERNMENT TO STAND SQUARELY BEHIND THE COMPROMISE SOLUTION OF THE MAJORITY REPORT WHICH HAS BEEN YOUR OWN STRONG CONVICTION FOR A LONG TIME. IN COURT THE CONVERSATION WITH MR. MARSHALL. WHICH YOU INTEND TO HAVE, I AM SURE THAT YOU WILL EMPHASIZE THAT ARAB THREATS AND UNWARRANTED ECONOMIC PRESSURES SHOULD NOT BE PERMITTED TO AFFECT THE SOUND AND MORAL JUDGMENT OF OUR GOVERNMENT. I SHALL BE MOST EAGER TO HEAR FROM YOU. I SHALL BE AT THE COMMODORE HOTEL, NEWYORKCITY, FOR THE NEXT FEW DAYS. WARMEST REGARDS AND ALL GOOD WISHES.

WITH YOU THAT OUR GOVERNMENT SHOULD NOT ACCEPT SOLE RESPONSIBILITY AND THAT TIMING MAY BE TACTICALLY IMPORTANT. HOWEVER NO SOLUTION WILL BE POSSIBLE UNLESS OUR GOVERNMENT ACCEPTS ITS PROPER SHARE FOR IMPLEMENTING IT BY MEANS OF A SMALL INTERNATIONAL POLICE FORCE UNDER SUPERVISION OF THE UNITED NATIONS WHICH WILL USE PRINCIPALLY THE MAN POWER AVAILABLE IN PALESTINE WHICH WILL BE READILY OFFERED TO THE UNITED NATIONS TO MAINTAIN LAW AND ORDER. THE CONTINGENT OF THE UNITED STATES SHOULD BE COMPOSED ENTIRELY OF VOLUNTEERS.
