RABBI MAXWELL SILVER
REINSTATED

The Association of Reform Rabbis of New York City and Vicinity, having heard with sorrow of the unhappy situation in Congregation Shaare Zedek of Brooklyn, N. Y., brought about by the relations existing between the Board of Trustees and the Rabbi, invited both parties to the controversy to a hearing. The Executive Committee of the Association of Reform Rabbis of New York City and Vicinity heard Rabbi Maxwell Silver and some of his friends and supporters, then, at a meeting held February 3, 1920, heard the Board of Trustees represented by Messrs. Max Reiss, President; George Barusch, Vice-President; Sigmund Cahn, Joseph Adler, John Bogart, and Abraham Brill.

The Executive Committee, after thoroughly investigating the matter, has concluded that an unfortunate misunderstanding occurred and, therewith, as a result of mediation, Congregation Shaare Zedek, in a spirit of fair play and good-will, has reinstated Rabbi Maxwell Silver. The Executive Committee of the Association of Reform Rabbis of New York and Vicinity, at the same time, takes pleasure in expressing its confidence in the worthiness of Rabbi Maxwell Silver as a Rabbi and in the good intentions of the Congregation, its officers and its Trustees to serve the cause of Israel.




