
In re COHEN v. SILVER.





I wonder if you would be good enough to give me what information you have or where I can obtain information showing Englands improper conduct towards Ireland & others.

I do not ask that question in any sense of sarcasm or criticism; I simply seek information.

Mr. Samuel Gross who is a friend of mine, will tell you of my expressed admiration for you as a man & a public speaker.

I still remember with considerable delight, your

fascinating talk on Palestine at the Unitarian  
Men's Club of the Unitarian Church, of which I  
am a member. I would be happy to hear  
that address again.



My dear Rabbi Alexander,

In my last letter to you, I did not mean to imply that it was not your bounden duty to speak to the Canton people as your conscience dictated. Every man is privileged to express himself as to the general fitness of a man for a position. I understand, however, that you made definite statements relative to Maxwell's accepting general rumors and hearsays about his Socialistic or Bolshevik tendencies, and presenting those to the Canton people as facts.

It was my thought that any minister should seek to verify such rumors at their source, before even lending his name to them. You say that I would have done exactly the same thing under similar conditions, but I am afraid that I must differ from you on that. I would, at least, have given my colleague the courtesy of writing to him and inquiring as to his exact position. Maxwell would have had no hesitancy nor fear in stating his position clearly and definitely. You may recall the saying of the Rabbis -

Dear Rabbi Silver:-

I suppose that you have been wondering why I have not written you for so long. I will not attempt to excuse myself by the old - standby alibi of the N. U. C. of lack of time, but because there was nothing really of interest which I could tell you.

My work at University and college are coming along in fine shape, and becoming more interesting every day. The work we are getting in Hebrew Grammar affords us very fine training especially as Dr. Marganeter is giving it. Dr. Englander's Exodus class is rather easy, but my most interesting courses are those in Pirkei Abot under Rabbi Marcus and Liturgy with Prof. Trechow.

I have made a good friend of Prof. Trechow whom I like very well and we talk a great deal to each other, especially as I have succeeded in getting some fairly  
(me)

good grades in his class. He is the most popular teacher at the college and has endeared himself to the heart of every student by his warm personality and ever ready, cheerful willingness to assist and to befriend. Dr. Fuefop told me today that he was speaking for you on Friday, Dec. 3<sup>rd</sup> when I will be in town.

At University I was chosen for the Debating Team and am now forced to resign because of the narrow prejudices which still exists against N. U. C. boys, and with which you may be acquainted. There were twelve N.U.C. boys trying out, and I was the only one to survive the trials, although in all fairness the entire team should have been made up of college men. After the tryout the teams met and chose an hour late in the afternoon for meeting which means that I am through. They displayed no willingness to meet me half-way.

At College several things of interest have happened. "Lou" Brown has left school and accepted a pulpit in Waterbury Conn. In a letter to the Monthly he announces that Robbi Wise's Seminary will be opened in the Fall of 1922. "Lou's" inimitable accent and rare humor are very much missed these days.



The element in school which were defeated last year in election have formed themselves into a secret fraternity whose purpose is ostensible. The prime spirit of the organization is "Duke" Margolis and the other men in it are Finkenstein, Meyerowitz, Berkowitz, Mark, Stemmer, Ulrich, Traubel and Korman. I am very much afraid it will result in a split in the Student Body.

The Board of Governors has ruled that the "Lit" must consult with it before inviting speakers hereafter. This is merely another method of supporting the great ideal of freedom of speech.

Alvin Fuchs preached last Saturday, and his sermon was so outspoken in its liberal tendencies that everybody is still wondering how it was ever approved of. Milton Ellis wrote a sermon three weeks ago which was not half as outspoken as Alvin's, yet it was rejected in its entirety.

I understand from reading the "American Oracle," that you will be

in Louisville the latter part of the month. I  
am wondering whether you will stop off in  
Cincinnati, as I would be very glad to be able to  
see you again.
