

REDRAFT OF BUILDING LINE ORDINANCE.

Ordinance No. 54205-B.

An ordinance to amend and supplement Section 743a of the ordinances of 1907 as amended December 6th, 1920, relating to the building code and regulating front yard spaces and building lines. (As a substitute for ordinance No. 54205 and ordinance No. 54205-A).

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Cleveland, State of Ohio:

Section 1. Section 743a of the ordinances of 1907 as amended December 6th, 1920, relating to the building code and regulating front yard spaces and building lines is hereby amended and is hereby supplemented by the addition of sections 743b to 743k, both inclusive, as follows:

Section 743a. Front yards: building lines. For the purpose of establishing front yards and regulating the alignment of buildings in the interest of the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare, the City of Cleveland is hereby divided into two classes of building line districts termed respectively class B1 and B2; all as shown on the building line map which accompanies this ordinance and is hereby declared to be part hereof. The building line districts designated on said building line map are hereby established. The map designations

which accompany said map are hereby declared to be part thereof. No building shall be erected except in conformity with the regulations herein prescribed for the building line district in which such building is located: Except as hereinafter provided no building or portion of a building extending above the established grade of the street shall be erected between a building line as hereinafter prescribed and the street line.

Section 743b. Class B1 district. In a class B1 building line district, the location of the building line shall be as prescribed on the building line map but where the distance of the building line back from the street line is not prescribed on said map the location of the building line shall be determined as follows:

(a) On a street frontage on either side of a street where 50% or more of such frontage between two intersecting streets, but excluding the frontage along the side line of a corner lot or outside such B1 building line district, is improved with buildings that are set back from the street line or where all the buildings though occupying less than 50% but more than 20% of such frontage are set back from the street line, the alignment of the existing buildings shall be the building line. For the purpose of determining the percentage of the frontage that is improved with buildings that are set back from the street line, the frontage of so much of the open space adjacent to a residence building that is set back from the street as is used in connection with such building shall be included. Minor

irregularities in such alignment of existing buildings may be disregarded by the board of appeal in defining and applying this building line regulation or said board may, when in its opinion the general purpose and intent of this section will be better served thereby, determine that the average distance the existing buildings are back from the street line, either for such entire frontage or for any part thereof, shall be the building line.

(b) On a street frontage on either side of a street between two intersecting streets, but excluding the frontage along the side line of a corner lot or outside of such B1 building line district, where not more than 20% of such frontage is improved with buildings that are built at the street line and where the provisions of paragraph (a) of this section do not create a building line, the distance of the building line back from the street line shall be 15% of the average or normal depth of the lots having their front lines along such street frontage but such distance back from the street line need not be more than 30 feet. Where in any portion of such street frontage there are lots of markedly less depth than the normal, the board of appeal in defining and applying this building line regulation may, when in its opinion the general purpose and intent of this section will be better served thereby, divide such street frontage into sections for the application of the above 15% building line requirement.

(c) Along the side line of a corner lot the distance of the building line back from the street line shall be 10% of the average width of such lot, but such distance back from the street line need not be more than 10 feet. No building line shall be required along the side line of a corner lot where the rear of such lot adjoins a street frontage along which no building line is required by this ordinance.

Section 743c. Class B2 district. In a class B2 building line district, the location of the building line shall be as prescribed on the building line map but where the distance of the building line back from the street line is not prescribed on said map the location of the building line shall be determined as follows: On a street frontage on either side of a street between two intersecting streets, where not more than 25% of such frontage is improved with buildings that are built at the street line the distance of the building line back from the street line shall be 15% of the average or normal depth of the lots having their front lines along such street frontage, but such distance of the building line back from the street line need not be more than 10 feet.

Section 743d. Building lines; exceptions. An alley or court not exceeding 20 feet in width shall not be deemed a street for the purposes of sections 743a to 743d, both inclusive. In a class B2 building line district, the building line requirements shall not apply on the side line of a corner lot within 150 feet of the building line at the corner. In any building line district on a lot adjoining a street frontage

along which either no building line is required or a building line nearer to the street is provided, a building may be erected beyond the building line herein provided to a point midway between such building line and the building line along such adjoining frontage and extending not to exceed 50 feet from such adjoining frontage. In a class B2 building line district where a building existing at the time of the passage of this ordinance projects beyond the building line, an adjoining building may be built beyond the building line to a distance equal to one-half of the projection of such adjoining building for a distance of not exceeding 50 feet from such adjoining building. Lots separated by an alley not more than 16 feet in width shall be deemed adjoining.

Section 743e, Building lines: enforcement. The provisions of sections 743a to 743d, both inclusive, shall be enforced by the commissioner of buildings under the rules and regulations of the board of appeal. The board of appeal shall adopt from time to time such rules and regulations as they deem necessary to carry into effect the provisions of the said sections. Under rules adopted by the board of appeal, the relation of a proposed building to the building line as shown on the situation plan shall be checked and approved by the commissioner of engineering before a building permit shall be issued.

Section 743f, Building lines: appeals. Any decision of the commissioner of buildings made in the enforcement of the provisions of sections 743a to 743d, both inclusive, may be appealed to the board of appeal by any person adversely affected by such

decision. Whenever any parcel of land now separately owned or separately leased for a term of years and which was so owned or leased or the purchase or lease of which was contracted for prior to the passage of this ordinance is of such restricted area that it cannot be appropriately improved without building beyond the building line established by sections 743a to 743d, both inclusive, the board of appeal may, on application in a specific case after public notice and hearing, authorize the construction of a building beyond said building line to an extent necessary to secure an appropriate improvement of such parcel of land. On application in a specific case, the board of appeal may after public notice and hearing issue a conditional permit for the construction of a building beyond the building line established by the said sections, provided the public health, safety, convenience or general welfare will not thereby be injuriously affected or the appropriate use of neighboring property seriously injured. In a class B1 building line district, the board of appeal may authorize the construction beyond the building line determined by the alignment of existing buildings of a one story unenclosed porch as an addition to a dwelling house existing at the time of the passage of this ordinance provided the public health, safety, convenience or general welfare will not thereby be injuriously affected or the appropriate use of neighboring property injured. Where there are practical difficulties or unnecessary hardships in the way of carrying out the strict letter of any provision of the said sections, the board of appeal shall have power in a specific case to vary such provision in harmony with its general purpose

and intent so that the public health, safety and general welfare may be secured and substantial justice done. Application to the board of appeal for relief under this section shall be made in duplicate and filed in the office of the commissioner of buildings. One copy of such application with the time fixed for the hearing noted thereon shall be transmitted to the city plan commission by the commissioner of buildings.

Section 743g. Change of building lines. The city plan commission on application of one or more property owners or on its own motion may, after public notice and hearing, recommend to the council the change of any building line established by sections 743a to 743d, both inclusive, or the fixing of a building line on any street frontage where no building line is established by the said sections. Council may thereafter establish such building line by ordinance.

Section 743h. Building lines; parks and boulevards. Nothing contained in sections 743a to 743g, both inclusive, shall be construed to remove or render inoperative any building line adjacent to a public park or boulevard heretofore established by restrictive covenants running with the land.

Section 2. Invalidity of a part. Sections and subsections of this ordinance and the several parts and provisions thereof are hereby declared to be independent sections, subsections, parts and provisions, and the holding of any such section, sub-section, part or provision thereof to be unconstitutional, void or ineffective for any cause shall not affect nor render invalid any other such section, sub-section, part or provision thereof.

Section 3. Repeal. Original section 743a of the building code as amended December 6th, 1920, is hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor.
