

Sunday March 6 your brother Maxwell was in Newark to preach at the Free Synagogue. Change is Marked in Burlesque

BY HARLOWE R. HOY.

Seventeen years ago two young women applied to Frank Drew for a job.

Not to delve back too far into ancient history, let us say that the Frank show today is the manager of the Star theater, with Wood Campbell; and that the sisters who so applied were the Morrisseys.

Now, to repeat for a bit. Seventeen years ago two young women applied to Frank Drew for a job. They told of the little stage experience they had enjoyed—singly and individually—and, as a result, Drew decided to give them

a chance. They went out with the Tiger Lillies. This was one of the pioneer burlesque companies.

Taking them individually, the Morrisseys were:

Dolly and Stella.

This week the two are back again at the Star. Their angle of burlesque is an interesting one. In reminiscent mood, they discuss it; and the various turns and twists which they offer are more than interesting.

"A few years ago," so Stella said, "each of us could have been fitted out for a season for \$300."

"And how easy it would have been," added Dolly.

"We each have seven complete changes with the present show," Stella continued. "Our wardrobe costs us, on an average, \$2,500 a season. It is worth it. Seven changes at that price means a bit of outlay—but we are trying to give returns to burlesque. Why not?"

Now to look back on the Morrisseys.

They discarded burlesque for vaudeville. For a decade they traveled the Keith circuit. With an amount of acclaim they made good as comedienne, and now they are back on the burlesque wheel because they believe there is more opportunity for recognition for them there.

Burlesque has changed a bit since the Morrisseys started. Indications are that it will continue to do so. Just a short time since the head of a certain circuit revoked the franchise to his own show in order to uphold the standard which the wheel demanded. It wouldn't have been done some years since. It couldn't have been done had not demands upon the management required it. But managers in recent years have learned what is required and they are doing their best to put burlesque on the basis of musical shows.

"The curse of burlesque is the name," said Dolly Morrissey. "It isn't a bit different from musical comedy. Of the revues which are offered."

"I remember," Stella continued, "some years ago, when popular priced musical comedies were offered. That was back in the Stair and Havell days. Do you remember them? Well, many of these were nothing more or less than burlesque presented at different prices."

"I know of one," Dolly interrupted. "It was called 'Me, Him and I.' Before that, Watson, Bickel and Wrothe had played in burlesque with exactly the same line of entertainment. And following, they graduated to the Ziegfeld Follies."

No, after that, it seemed reasonable to assume that burlesque is progressing.





The Cleveland Graduate Club of ZETA BETA TAU

Dear Frater:-

A vote of confidence in Board of Governors and the approval of the suggested action pertinent to the purchase of the new chapter house, was the result of the special meeting at the Hotel Winton, March 14th.

The proposition is the purchase of the leasehold of property located at 11447 Euclid Avenue. The lot is 50 by 195 feet and is used at present by the Sigma Nu fraternity as a chapter house. We can purchase the lease for about \$8000.00 (not all in cash). This provides for a ground rent of \$1500 a year for the next four years and then \$1800 a year for the rest of the 94 year period. There is a building clause, calling for a \$20,000 building within 10 years and also a purchase clause exercisable within 10 years with a price of \$30,000.

From the budget, running and operating expenses, as well as repairs and incidentals would be approximately \$3600 a year, while the proposed income budget allows at least \$500 margin over the expenses. The income budget includes rent from the under graduates, who will live at the house, rent from the alumni living here, house dues of the two active chapters, alumni organization dues, interest from money in savings bank and the cumulative fund created by the signing of notes of all future initiates to the active chapters and affiliates to the Graduate Club of \$25.00 a year for 10 years following graduation. This is done to alleviate the burden on the Graduate Club.

There is enclosed herewith a return postal, allowing fraters who were unable to attend the meeting, the right of a vote. IF YOU FEEL THAT THIS PROPOSITION IS NOT WORTH GOING INTO, TELEPHONE TO BROTHER MAURICE SINGER AT MAIN 124 AND GET THE DATA ON THE HOUSE. OTHERWISE A VOTE AGAINST THE PROPOSITION IS WORTHLESS. OBJECTIONS, NATURALLY, MUST BE SOUND AND VALID AND THEREFORE IT IS DESIRABLE TO HAVE ALL FRATERS FAMILIARIZE THEMSELVES WITH THE PROPOSITION.

Attend to this matter right away and send in your card, because action must be taken before March 26th. *April 16th*.

REMEMBER, this is to be your house. Don't shirk your share of responsibility. The Board of Governors--at present--feels that this is a good opportunity, but it wants your point of view. SEND IN THE POSTCARD.



Dear Dr. Silver:

I have much pleasure in introducing to you Dr. Chayim Heller. Dr. Heller is one of the great Jews of this generation. He is recognized as one of the greatest, if not the greatest, rabbinic authorities, and he is at the same time a man who has had a thoroughgoing scientific training, so that his published work, and more particularly, his work in manuscript, has made a very deep impression upon scholars, Jewish and non-Jewish, both here and abroad. The Cultural Committee of the American Jewish Relief Committee has just appropriated \$25,000 towards the establishment of an academy for higher Jewish learning to be conducted under Dr. Heller's direction, perhaps at Danzig. The primary purpose of this institution is to secure as students a number of men who are already authoritative rabbis, and who require scientific training in addition. These men will become, within the course of a short time, instructors and professors in institutions of learning. Dr. Heller is to be in Cleveland, and I hope that it will be possible for you to be of aid to this really wonderful man. His project is of

fundamental importance for the development of Jewish learning.

DISEASE IN MILK: THE REMEDY, PASTEURIZATION

REFERENCES ARE TO THE BOOK OF ABOVE TITLE, BY LINA GUTHERZ STRAUS,
PUBLISHED 1917, BY E. P. DUTTON & CO., NEW YORK

There is a MILK PROBLEM because milk is the only animal food taken in its raw state (page 28). There are six plagues—typhoid fever, diphtheria, scarlet fever, septic sore throat, tuberculosis and the summer complaints of children—that may be transmitted by raw milk (page 345).

PASTEURIZATION destroys all the germs of disease that may be in the milk, but does not impair the taste, digestibility or nutritive qualities of the milk (page 31).

PASTEURIZATION consists in heating milk to a temperature of 145 degrees Fahrenheit and holding it at that temperature for half an hour.

In the Nathan Straus Laboratory the best certified milk is used. It is filtered, clarified and modified in five different mixtures according to formulas prescribed by eminent physicians. These formulas are adapted to babies of various ages and conditions. The milk is then pasteurized in the bottle and quickly cooled to below 50 degrees (pages 33-39).

The PASTEURIZED MILK is sold in New York at eight stations in Winter, at eighteen in Summer, at a nominal price. *It is the only "ready-to-drink" milk for babies to be had in New York City* (page 41). In the twenty-five years of this work 42,873,181 bottles and 24,009,498 glasses of pasteurized milk have been dispensed at the Straus stations (page 77).

Coincident with the development of this work the death rate among children under five years of age has dropped from 96.2 per thousand per annum in 1892 to 34 per thousand in 1916, the mortality statistics of the City Health Department indicating the saving of 241,930 lives in these 25 years (pages 90-91).

The efficacy of PASTEURIZATION was mathematically demonstrated at Randall's Island, where the death rate among the city's waifs was cut from an average of 41.81% to 21.75% without any other change in diet or regimen than the substitution of Pasteurized Milk for raw milk (pages 51 and 204). Also at Sandhausen, Germany, where all the children under two years were supplied with Pasteurized Milk and the death rate was cut from 46% to 20% (page 96). Also at Karlsruhe, Germany, where one-fifth of the babies were supplied with Pasteurized Milk and the death rate among them was only 6.3%, while in the entire city the death rate was 17% (page 97). Also in Washington, D. C., where the death rate among Straus babies was only 6.2% (pp. 103, 209).

It was a long fight against prejudice that led to the adoption of Pasteurization by the City of New York (pages 51-59) and by the State of New York (page 60). Beginning with Chicago, in 1909, and New York, in 1913, the cities have fallen in line, until in 1917 Pasteurization is either required or encouraged in 46 of 52 largest cities of America (pages 70-71).

The first Infant Milk Depot in America was founded by Mr. Straus in 1893. Now there are 297 such depots in the 36 leading cities of the country (pages 75-79).

As a considerable factor in the suppression of tuberculosis, Pasteurization has demanded attention and acceptance. Dr. E. C. Schroeder, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, proved that "one of the chief, if not the most important source of infection is the tuberculous dairy cow" (page 29), and that "nothing as efficient or economical as Pasteurization to make milk safe has been discovered" (page 21).

Dr. M. P. Ravenel, who proved the communication of bovine tuberculosis to children, holds that "Pasteurization has been the means of saving the lives of many infants and children" (page 20).

Pasteurization has been endorsed by The American Medical Association, The National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, The American Public Health Association, The U. S. Public Health Service, and The National Commission on Milk Standards, which is made up of seventeen recognized experts.

In order that no baby may be deprived of properly Pasteurized milk, Mr. Straus in 1909 perfected a "fool-proof" HOME PASTEURIZER, which any tinsmith can make and any mother can operate. The plans and directions for manufacturing and for use are supplied free to anyone who applies (pages 85-88).

Professor Abraham Jacobi, dean of American medical men, in the introduction to Mrs. Straus' book, says:

"It is more than two dozen years since Nathan Straus began and carried out his life-saving practice. His methods are simple and direct; his results satisfactory to the infants. These are, after all, the best critics of what is being done for them. Long may they continue to live—Nathan Straus and his many babies in many lands" (page 19).

All that has been said for PASTEURIZATION applies with equal force to cream, butter, ice cream and cheese. All cream, including that used for ice cream and butter, should be properly pasteurized to be safe. There is nothing in the process of making butter, cheese or ice cream to impair the vitality of disease germs. Cold does not kill them; only by heat (Pasteurization) can they be destroyed (pages 109-110).



Are we taking the necessary steps to induce these people to become permanent savers and investors, or are we allowing them to drift back into their old habits and ways now that they are freed from the responsibilities temporarily imposed upon them because of our participation in the war?

Prior to the establishment of the Federal Reserve System, our banking system, including thirty thousand units, had been severely criticized at home and all over the world. We found, however, that by coordinating the units in one great system, operated under the direction of the Federal Reserve Board, the twelve Federal Reserve banks and their branches, we had the most powerful and efficient banking machinery of any nation in the world.

This great machine, however, has been unable to function to its maximum for the reason that the business people and banks had not so shaped their affairs to permit of their resources being utilized to the greatest advantage. On analyzing the holdings of the various member banks these holdings were found to be in very much the same condition as were the people being prepared for war service, when they were lined up for consideration for places in our Army, Navy and Government organizations.

It was found by throwing certain physically unfit individuals into training camps their defects could be readily overcome and they could be transferred into physically fit fighting men. The same was true in connection with much of the paper held by members of the Federal Reserve System. Some of it was improperly drawn, poorly secured, made for uncertain periods, when by a very slight effort it could have been transformed into absolutely sound, well-secured paper with a definite maturity that would serve as a basis for accommodation at the Federal Reserve bank.

The bankers of the nation, shortly after the Federal Reserve System was formed, turned their attention to getting their houses in order. They are deserving of great credit for what has since been accomplished. Our banking system has withstood the greatest shocks and responsibilities that have ever been thrown upon any banking system in the world.

In addition to caring for the commercial needs of the country, this great system has taken on a tremendous burden in the way of Government war financing and in the financing of our expanding foreign trade. The earning assets of the Federal Reserve banks include an aggregate of over \$1,100,000,000 of war paper carried under the head of rediscounts and advances to member banks; and our commercial banks are carrying the accumulated foreign trade balance of over \$4,000,000,000, representing largely credits of a character that cannot be liquidated within the time usually allowed on current commercial business. These two items are being carried largely to the exclusion of current commercial business.

With our Federal Reserve banks and commercial banks relieved of these two items, they would be in a position to comfortably and ade-

quately take care of any legitimate commercial and industrial demands that might be made upon them by domestic business. However, we would still be without the necessary machinery for financing our foreign trade which means so much, not only to our present, but our future prosperity.

The unstable exchanges and inadequate facilities for extending long term credits are slowly but surely closing the world's markets to us. Many of our worthy foreign customers, not in any way responsible for the tardy settlement of affairs among the great nations, are unable to make further purchases here because of their inability to pay cash or to settle on our customary trade terms. In the final analysis our prosperity depends upon the buying power of the people here and abroad. Failure to conserve that power means that our surplus goods, products, and raw materials will pile up, mills and factories will close and unemployment and stagnation of business must follow.

The people of other countries need our surplus goods, products and raw material. We need the goods they produce and we need their patronage in order to keep our own people employed. These needs do not balance. The requirements of other countries exceed our requirements from them. How can the balance be safely financed?

As indicated, the commercial banks under present conditions can finance this balance only by the diversion of facilities vitally needed for our domestic business. Some people will say that we cannot safely undertake further transactions with many of the European countries, that we cannot go on indefinitely supplying them with raw materials and manufactured products, for by doing so we would be making matters worse. Such people do not reason the problem through to the finish. It is certain that the people of these European countries cannot quickly revive and become good customers of ours unless we give them all the assistance that prudent business judgment will permit.

You will recall that during and immediately following the Civil War our own country was in a deplorable condition. It furnished to the world an example of how quickly and satisfactorily a broken down nation can revive. At the outset of the Civil War we had in circulation in this country about \$246,000,000 in gold and silver coin. This was quickly reduced to \$25,000,000, and with gold amounting to \$25,000,000 in circulation, we, during six years of time, financed imports aggregating over \$7,000,000,000. We established a free gold market in New York City. Gold went up to \$285. Figured in gold our good friends abroad collected interest from us on the loans we received from them at the average rate of about 22 per cent. Over a period of several years the 6 per cent. ten-year gold bonds of the United States could be purchased with gold for fifty cents on the dollar, thereby yielding to the purchaser 12 per cent. per annum in the way of interest, with another 10 per cent. per annum for appreciation.

Many of the nations abroad were involved in the recent World War for four long years, during which time their efforts were diverted from
