My dear Mrs. Gries,

During the past few months many requests have come to me to assist in the support of various educational and cultural institutions, both here and abroad, which have suffered as a result of the war. Some academies of learning have been completely disorganized, and some great Jewish scholars, who have rendered inestimable service to the cause of Jewish literature, are unable to continue the publication of their monumental works.

Rather than make separate appeal for each and every one of these most worthy causes, I thought it best to raise a joint fund. I am writing to a limited number of those who, I believe, are interested in Jewish scholarship and in the preservation of the cultural activities of our people, to assist me. The institutions and individuals to be benefitted by the fund are:

1. Die Verein zur Gründung und Erhaltung einer Akademie für die Wissenschaft des Judentums . . . Germany
2. To assist one of the greatest living Jewish scholars, Dr. H. Heller of Odessa, to publish his epoch making researches in the Bible and in the Talmud.
3. To assist Oberrabbiner Reich of Werbow, Hungary, in the fine educational work which he is doing in his part of the world.
4. To assist the organization "Motsam: Mayon," whose object is the publication of four Hebrew books annually for our schools and colleges, and for the Hebrew reading public.



It is, as you know, a very worthy institution and if you could arrange to favor them I would also appreciate it very much. He is writing you to-day -



Dear Sir,

Yesterday, May 30th, Memorial Day - a day on which all unnecessary business is expected to cease, Jewish fish-peddlers, hucksters, paper-rag buyers, as well as bakers etc, drove through the streets of residence sections of this city, ringing bells, blowing horns, calling their wares, or their business, in open defiance of law, custom, and public opinion.

Not a dozen or a score, but scores of them were on the street on which I live, which is not an exclusively Jewish street yet. Last Thanksgiving the same thing was done by a few.

No other race of people attempted, or would think of attempting to ignore or override the sentiment and the institutions of the people among whom they have been permitted to come. It is not like articles in Mr. Ford's paper; it is not what Jews may have done nineteen hundred years ago; it is not the fact of their race or their religion, that prejudices people against Jews. It is what Jews do here and now from day to day. It is what Jews are, as shown in their dealing with non-Jews in business and as neighbors, that makes them the detested people that they are.

Some of the Jews referred to may have done what they did through ignorance, but their rabbis and other leaders are not ignorant; and if they preached obedience to law and respect for American principles and institutions to their people such things as those of Memorial Day and Thanksgiving Day would not be, I feel sure.





INTIMATE GLIMPSES OF THE RABBI'S CAREER

BY
HENRY BERKOWITZ, D. D.

This book contains a series of lectures on the functions of the rabbi, delivered before the students of the Hebrew Union College in April, 1918, by Dr. Henry Berkowitz, rabbi of Rodeph Shalom Congregation of Philadelphia, Pa. In these addresses the author gives the results of his experiences in an active ministry of more than thirty-five years.

In addition, the book contains a Centenary address "The Pioneer American Rabbi—Dr. Isaac M. Wise," delivered by Dr. Berkowitz. The author shows how the career of Dr. Wise illustrates and reinforces the principles of rabbinical service set forth in the lectures.

The book will be of great interest to students for the ministry, to rabbis and to laymen. For the rabbi it will prove a valuable guide for his work in the pulpit, in the religious school and in his communal activities. The general reader will obtain a better understanding of the tasks and difficulties with which the rabbi is confronted. A sympathetic and helpful spirit of cooperation between Pulpit and Pew will thus be promoted.

Dr. Berkowitz is well qualified to speak of the practical problems of the rabbi as minister, teacher and preacher. Dr. Berkowitz is a man of great force and originality in the pulpit, an educator of high standing and a leader of communal work in Philadelphia.

When the lectures were delivered at the College, they evoked great interest and enthusiasm on the part of the students, as was evidenced by many important questions addressed to the lecturer. These questions and the answers have been incorporated at the close of each chapter.

The book should find a place in every Jewish home.
