My dear Rabbi Silver:

Let me congratulate you for your wonderful work you have done at the Pittsburgh Convention. I have not yet read the minutes (of) and the original text of your speech but what I have read of it in the papers shows me that you represented the policy which to my mind and to the mind of many others would be the right policy. A week before Pittsburgh I wrote in this matter a memorandum to Justice Brandeis and on the last Saturday on his way to Pittsburgh I had a long talk here in New York with Justice Brandeis. I tried to convince him that we must not lose contact with the European forces which are on our side - it seems to me all in vain. You can imagine my enthusiasm when I read that you are on the same opinion. I am almost sure that a few months will make it evident and the near future will prove that you was right. I told it a couple times to Mr. De Haas and

I am thoroughly convinced that there is young energie and enthusiasm needed in our future leadership - therefore I believe in your future

leadership of our movement in this country. I am inconsolable that I had not ^{have} an opportunity to talk over this things with you - but I believe nothing is lost as far as this people here will be kept together.

To come to my main point of this letter - it is a favor what I came to ask you, my first american friend and patron to whom my coming over to this country is due. I am without any position since I do not think that Mr De Haas for whom I worked for the last few months will have any use for my work any more. Judge Mack was trying to get for me a medical position in New York but notwithstanding the greatest efforts we had no success. There are too many native physicians working for nothing in the hospitals. If there is any possibility for you to get for me ^{in Cleveland} some medical work with a modest payment - you could save me from a great deal of worry. Any medical work which enables me to earn a living and to prepare for the State Board examination which I would take as soon as possible. I would gladly accept. I know your kindness and I am sure you will do your utmost to solve my present problem of life. I think it superfluous to tell you how glad I would be to render you my cooperation there in bringing the Hungarians of Cleveland into the service of our great

work of P. & rebuilding.

I understand you feel the necessity of keeping contact with our fellows of Europe and I think we could do some work-useful as to the future plans—in this direction from Cleveland since I am in contact with a great number of people abroad. I believe I could help you a great deal in upbuilding there your local group for the economical enterprisings.

I am practically useless and could not risk the journey unless I shall be assured in advance to get there a position. My medical record is. Medical diploma of the Budapest University of 1918. Two years army ^{medical} service 1 year practice in a Neurologic. Sanatorium in Hungary ½ year in Tuberculosis Sanatorium Switzerland. Any medical work with a ^{very} modest payment and entertainment will fit me.

Anything you will do in my behalf I will highly appreciate. I am awaiting your kind answer with great anxiety. I wonder whether I need to tell you that Mr. De Haas would have written a letter to you in my favor with regard to this matter. I assure you he will also appreciate your efforts in my behalf.

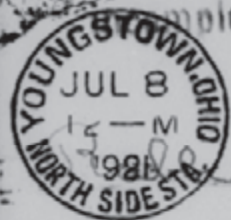

My dear Rabbi Silver,

Your letter received. I am very glad you have arrived at the Camp and have begun your much needed rest. The heat here has been almost beyond endurance. Today it is cooler than it has been for two weeks.

The attendance at the Friday evening Services continues very satisfactory. Last Friday morning, Mrs. Arnstine telephoned that because of the hot weather she could not prevail upon any of the choir to attend, but the heat did not effect the attendance to any marked extent. The Choir promise to be on hand tonight and future Friday nights. Mr. Feuer, I believe, called upon some of them personally.

A carpenter has been at work doing odd repair jobs, fixing windows. He finishes today. Mr. Abel has had three or four painters out here and the work will no doubt be given out today or tomorrow. Mr. Lowenstein has asked that he be allowed to choose the color for the Study- so you may hope to be in artistic surroundings next season, as to walls at least. Nothing else of importance came up at the Board Meeting last Tuesday night.



At a regular meeting of the Board of Directors of your Company, held on the 20th day of July, 1921, the Directors deemed it unwise in view of the general conditions in the oil business to declare the usual semi-annual dividend on the preferred stock for the first half of the year 1921, but deemed it advisable to conserve the company's resources.

These conditions were such, that for a considerable period, the pipe line companies took only a portion of the Company's production and that when they resumed taking the product, the price of oil had gone down from \$3 a barrel to \$1 a barrel. There was also a considerable recession in the price of gasoline from about 20 cents a gallon to 8 or 9 cents a gallon. These conditions have affected many of the oil companies.

As soon as the conditions in the oil business improve, the Board hopes to be in a position to pay the dividend on the preferred stock for the period mentioned above.



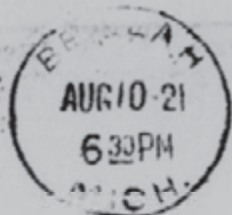

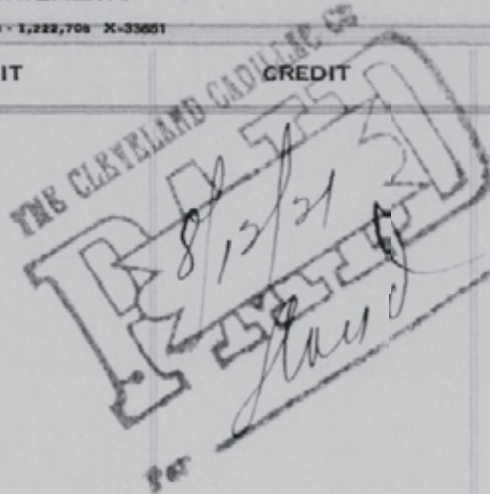

The services are coming along very nicely. The weather is cooler and more agreeable, and attendance is on the increase. Last Friday night we had a record crowd, both rooms being filled to capacity, and some standing. We tried something new. Mrs. Kaber prepared and sang a very beautiful solo between the Kaddish and Benediction which took very well, and she is to be highly complimented for her effort.

Mrs. Arnstine left for a two-weeks vacation, and so for the next two Fridays we will have to go along with just the two ladies singing, but they think that they will be able to do it allright.

In my last letter I forgot to mention a very important event in my young life. Yes, I had my first experience with a funeral. I need not describe my state of mind; you can imagine it. Although I was a bit nervous at the start, I managed to get through it somehow. Last Saturday night I had Experience #2. This was a very sad case. Perhaps you have already heard about it. A Dr. A. M. Lowenstein died suddenly from sleeping sickness which he was supposed to have contracted while serving with the American Army in Russia. He was only 36 years old, and left a widow and three months old baby girl. The body was shipped to his home town for burial, but the family requested a service here.

I understand from Miss Jones that you will be home the 1st of September, so I don't suppose I will hear from you any more until you reach home. However I surely hope you will drop me a line and let me know the Yiddish camp agreed with you. I surely expect to see you come home with a nice, tan skin.
