"She read my 'Survey'", writes her teacher, "and wanted all the girls to enjoy it regularly. Incidentally, the cost of the Survey is probably somewhere near a month's salary."

Such letters as this from countrysides and city neighborhoods near and far, from men and women in all professions and walks in life, give us a tingling sense of high adventure, - of our stewardship of this living educational enterprise for spreading the craftsmanship of good will, - of the unknown and untapped reserves of cooperation that may be drawn into it, strengthen its constructive service and extend its reach.

It is in this spirit of discovering such unknown and untapped reserves of interest and convinced support (which will mean invigorated growth for the Survey and a task better done), that we have gone through our stencil trays of regular subscribers and selected the names to which I am sending this letter. Some of them are long time readers. 

Before coming to New York during the war period of 1918, I was Principal of the Eastern High School, Louisville, Ky., where my work brought me in direct contact with the growing girl.

In New York, for the past four years, I have been associated with the "Council of Jewish Women", New York section, as Executive Director. In connection with the work, I lectured to Jewish audiences on such topics on Americanization as "ssimilating the Foreign Born", "Overcoming Racial Prejudice", "That is markeanization, "etc.

Last year I founded a camp for girls from Jewish families who have a high standard of living for themselves and their children, and I am endeavoring to maintain these ideals in my camp, following the utmost simplicity in the open air, with the hours regulated for organized study and play.

In connection with the benefits I have mentioned for Camp Weyou-Wega and its 135 acres, its lake and beautiful surroundings in the most picturesque part of Maine, I have the enthusiastic good-will of the surrounding community. I have made arrangements with an excellent physiciam of national reputation in the immediate neighborhood and also with the hospital in Lewiston, a nearby city, so that if a case of necessity should arise, prompt assistance would be rendered.

It is my intention to have no more than 25 girls so that I can give personal attention to each one, in addition to the general care they will receive from the Councillors.

I have succeeded in getting a very excellent set of girls from the best Jewish families of the North and Scuth, but I need a few more to complete the quota and would ask whether you could recommend one or two to me?

In addition to the references I give in this letter, I shall be pleased to refer you to some New York families, who, after a very thorough investigation, are sending their daughters to my Camp. Under separate cover I am sending you a booklet of the Camp.

My dear Mr. Baker:

Pursuant of our last interview respecting the Sigal family, I would kindly ask you to satisfy yourself and to convince yourself of the fatal mistake mady by our paid official personal service examiner -- which resulted in the gradual impoverished condition of the entire family, who in their devotion, have sacrificed all they possibly could scrape together in order to save their poor father from starving to death -- to provide for him the necessary assistance, while twice under operation, and now being prepared to undergo a third operation.

I do not believe that our present board of twenty members whall be without function - shall have no interest in the welfare of our poor, as for us to depend altogether upon a staff of paid investigators.

I am sure we do not voice the sentiments of our Jewish community by discarding all of our Jewish principals in the distributions of our charity funds, and to change it to a soulless method at an expense from 25 to \$30,000 per annum for the support of job holders.

We need not be ashamed of our past record when you and Mr. Schlesinger and myself did the personal service work--we may look with pride upon those children who are today politically--commercially, and socially an aquisition to our community through the personal aid we have given their fathers and grandfathers.

The German and Hungarian Jewish immigrant never comes to our Relief Scciety for help. Why? Becuase he comes here when his sister, or his brother sends for him--receives him--embraces him with kisses and tears of joy, and makes it possible for

Different with the Russian and Polish friendless immigrant, who - driven from his country and landed here - not received by his sisters and brothers, - but by a brass-buttoned immigrant officer and shifted rudely from town to town, from one Charity Institution to another.

As Ex-President and honorary member of our Board, my judgment in such matters should not be permitted to be vetoed by any paid officer without offering to me and to cur Board their convincing argument against such applicants.

It is altogether beyond human comprehension and against the sentiment of ninety-live per cent contributors of charity as to close our doors against any applicant and to make it impossible forhim to get assistance elsewhere, as it is ruled and practiced under the system of the Community Chest Combined Charity Institutions.

You say, 'The Federation refuses to furnish you sufficient capital to defray all your needs?" Very natural! I guess they are right - I would do the same because I believe you should go back to the good old Jewish system and divide our work among our twenty inactive members - discharge all your paid officers, with the exception of your secretary, and treat the applicant as you would treat your owr brothers and sisters.

I have attended a few meetings at the Jewish Relief. They are doing the kind of work our society used to do - without expense and without exposure. Had they the money, our Relief Society is spending for administration service - our society would have no cause for existence.

The entire Sigel family, who in former years were members of our community of honorable standing, are today completely reduced to poverty, and unless humanely taken care of, must


My letter to Miss Katzenstein, of which I herewith enclose copy, was totally ignored by her until I appeared before your Board. - At that meeting you were totally ignorant of the case, as the letter to Miss Katzenstein up to that meeting was never delivered to you.

The letter was finally produced by Miss Katzenstein, and read by Mr. Buchman, your secretary. - I made my appeal as honest as I knew how and left with the expectation that you would appoint a committee from your Board; but a few days later I was informed that the decision of your office staff is final.

Again I made an appeal to Miss Katzenstein and submitted to her, by mail, evidences of proof that the family needs

You have but few members left on your Board who will remember the Associated Charities in former years under the McKissin and Ackers administration - how they lured us into their fold - made our Association to be subject to their investigation - made a political Wigwam of our Association made our poor people bring credentials from Ward healers in order to obtain coal or work - made our poor Jewish voters to deliver their votes to the ward healer who helped him to get work and aid when he was in distress? When McKissin and Ackers came to our annual meeting and threw bouquets at us, but which many of us repelled, and made the McKissin & Ackers fully to understand that we will have no further dealings with the Associated Charities. Ever since my health permitted me to give here and there my ears to appealing cases, I find the spirit of the McKissin and Ackers era arising again, -but in much monstrous form . in a most dangerous form - in a most inhuman form, unparalleled in history. The contrast of the wretched poor families who are totally neglected, like the Sigel family, with the poor families favored by influential officers of the various Charity Institutions - and lavishly provided for -and used by the leaders of our Community Chest Board as an example of their wonderful work under the heading of Scientific Charity - using those well taken care of families as advertisers of their method of solving the problem of charity and obtaining thereby five million dollars for their support. -- The contrast between the favored and the unfavored families is best demonstrated to us when we visit our criminal courts read the Legal Daily News - of the many families every day thrown out of their homes - sales made under the sheriff's harmer of poor families household.

The only solution of poverty is to widen the scope of opportunities when you can make an honest living; but that is not propagated by our Charity Institutions. You gentlemen are totally powerless. You have already subscribed to a policy which is doing altogether away with the Jewish spirit of doing Charity - a policy which has no principle and altogether opposed to every honest thinking man as familiar with Charity work as I am. Under such conditions, my conscience will not permit me to remain any longer an honorary member of your Board, and therefore I beg herewith to tender my resignation as such, to take effect at once.
