WHY

THE JEWISH EDUCATION ASSOCIATION IS NEEDED

BECAUSE:

Throughout the country most of our Jewish children are desperately in need of religious teaching. The civic duty and religious responsibility for such spiritual influence rests with each and every Jew.

In New York City, the home of the largest Jewish community in the world, we are making provision for Jewish training for only about 20% of our children, and for a still smaller percentage of our youth.

ALL THE REST are growing up without the discipline and the inspiration of Jewish religious education.

The few Jewish schools that we have are inadequately supported. Many of them have waiting lists of children whom they cannot afford to admit.

Our schools must grow and new schools must be opened if more of our children are to be given a Jewish education instead of the education of the street.

The highest type of American citizenship grows out of the Ten Commandments and the spirit of religion. The records of the courts show, almost without exception, that the Jewish criminal class is recruited from those who have not come under the influence of Jewish religious schools.

We can save the community the far heavier costs of reformatory work, if we pay for the constructive and preventive work of our religious schools.

We can afford to train our children to be Jews and moral citizens, whatever the cost.

We cannot afford the shame of a godless generation, untrained in the moral and religious safeguards of Judaism.

THE JEWISH EDUCATION ASSOCIATION MUST TAKE 10,000 JEWISH CHILDREN OFF THE STREETS OF GREATER NEW YORK THIS YEAR AND PLACE THEM IN JEWISH RELIGIOUS SCHOOLS.

It does not ask how much Jewish education the particular school gives. It asks in God's name that our children shall get SOME Jewish training in a recognized school, and not be wholly lost to us.



Frank McGlynn may live to be 100 years old, but he never will have a finer part than the Rabbi Nathan Judah in "Steadfast," his new starring vehicle which, opening a week ago in Washington before a distinguished audience, last night repeated the huge success and bids fair to take New York by storm.

The play itself is one of the best constructed drames Providence has seen in many years. It is rather heavy and unrelieved by as much comedy as one might wish, perhaps, but of tremendous interest throughout. The story, as a story, is worked out logically and the central character, that of the rabbl, is one which was fitted to the abilities of a Mc-Glynn. Indeed it is doubtful if any other than the creator of "Abraham Lincoln" could do it.

Lincoln" could do it.

What adds to the deligh: of the play is the very able cast which has been assembled in support of Mr. Mc-Glynn. In particular are Marie Reichardt, who is "Mamma.' Judah, the kindly mother of the rabbi's family who is quite content to bask in the reflected greatness of her dearly beloved Nathan. This is not, to forget the excellent Cantor Maravitz of George Henry Trader nor the convincing and boyish Bennie of Billie Pearce. Leona Hogarth, who is Sarah, the erring daughter of the house, has a difficult role and does full justice to it. To her is assigned the task of depicting the double horror of the consequences of Sarah's own misstep and that of besmirching the bonor of a rabbi of her faith.

Confronted with the tracedy revealed by the suicide of his only saughter, and with the almost as great tragedy, to him, of the marriage of his eldest son to a daughters of another faith, the Rabbi Judah's trust in the God of Abraham is put to the test of fire, but it is not shaken by so much as a hair's breadth. Finely etched is the character of the rabbi. The writers have done a fine bit of work here, and full advantage of the opportunity is taken

He brings out the high lights and shadows, the kindliness, the stead-fastness to faith, the gigantic strength of will which can survive two such blows as must surely prove a man's faith in his religion. As a story it is not only of a gorfously woven texture but is interpreted in a way that cannot fail to bring home the power of it. Wholly as de from its entertainment value, and that is great, however, is the plea for bridging the gap between Jew and Gentile. The story might easily be another chapter out of the history of the Children of Israel, garbed in modish raiments if color and power alone are considered. One must admire Nathan Judah as man, priest, father and falthful servant of God. McGlynn's is the genius which sinks itself in the character and emerges in a triumphant reincarnation that holds an audience spellbound by the very imagery of its conception. If Providence has had a drama in the last decade worth seeing it is "Steadfast."

Hynn, as disintegrated into a physically weak man by the sorrors of his world, is forceful in his stermess and winning in his gentieness. Sharing with him in excellent characterization is Marie Reichardt, as Marzna Judah, the wife of Nathan, who embodies in her role all the kin-lly, lovable and gentle traits, well known in Jewish fiction, of the Jewish wife. Space nd nd prevents us from naming the virtues of the remainder of the cast which is well chosen. Reaford Kendrick as Morris Judah, however, should emember that he lives in the Bronx and not in St. John's woods and govern his accent accordingly. In the last ast, the dispute between the father and son over religion and science seems entirely too scademic and forced, coming as i does after a particularly effective sen-imental scene. It has too much the appearance of an aside and less down the centinuity. Also the play might have been more rue had the authors not compromised in the end to a well known public taste. Better the unyielding prices of Moses than the doubtful kindly old man. It is a touching, worth-while play.

Cleveland, Ohio Dear Rabbi: You said yesterday that the Legends of the Book of Genesis were doubtless borrowed from the Babylonian, and you mentioned the Gilgamesh Epic. You then, very admirably I thought, showed how our people had stamped these leginas with their own peculiar genius. Nevertheless, the cult of Pan-Babylonism has done some harm, since it has given the "Goyim" an opportunity to cast a clur on the authenticity of our claim to ancient ethical and moral leadership. It would appear that there is no foundation of fact for this Babylonian Cult. The Yale University Press has published a book by Dr. Albert T. Clay, "A Hebrew Deluge Story in Cuneiform and Other Epic Fragments in the Pierpont Morgan Library" I quote from a review of this book! -" For more than a decade Dr. Clay has devoted himself to the reconstruction of the early history of the ancient empire of the Amorites, and to the dislodgment of the prevailing idea that Israel's traditions were borrowed from Babylonia, a theory that is generally called Pan-Babylonism. The present work offers evidence of an important character to prove his thesis. It is based on a Babylonian inscription in the Pierpont Morgan Library, which he has been able to read and interpret to a far more complete extent than his predecessors; and he finds the key for its elucidation in the discovery of the presence of mary Hebrew words. That is, the story must have a Hebrew background, and in its passage into an Assyrian version, there have been carried over many of the words of the original language. Following farther this clue of Hebrew vocabulary, Dr. Clay discovers several similar cases in the Gilgamesh account of the deluge, and this increases the plausibility of the belief that the whole cycle of flood legends had its origin in a Hebrew speaking land, that is, Syria or Amurru, as the learned scholar prefers to call it."


