

Pledge for Jewish Pacifists

1. I shall never use or threaten to use or do anything to encourage, urge or necessitate others to use any weapon upon any human being, whether countryman or foreigner.
2. I shall never maim or kill an animal in sport or approve of such acts in others.
3. I shall rigidly obey, to the best of my knowledge, all the laws of the city, township, county, state and nation, particularly the laws that can be violated in secrecy and with impunity.
4. Construing such acceptance as obedience to the law, I shall accept without resistance, complaint or appeal, non-combatant service, fine, imprisonment, exile or any other penalty including death if imposed by the government for my observance of any part of this pledge.
5. I shall keep myself fully informed regarding my financial affairs and shall make absolutely honest reports to all tax assessors no matter what may be the resultant privation for me and my dependents.
6. I shall never make, by speech, writing or legal affidavit any statement detrimental to any individual or group of individuals excepting all three of the following conditions obtain:
 - a. That the statement be true beyond any shadow of doubt.
 - b. That making the statement be certain to secure some preponderance of good or to avert some preponderance of evil for persons other than myself.
 - c. That there be no other way of securing the preponderance of good or averting the preponderance of evil for persons other than myself.
7. I shall, at least once a year, attend some meeting or conference assembled with the sincere aim of throwing light upon the question: What can I personally do to help avert war?
8. I shall, at least once a year, attend some meeting or conference assembled with the sincere aim of throwing light upon the question: What can I personally do to help improve industrial relations and other social conditions?
9. I consent that my convictions as a Jewish Pacifist and my subscription to this pledge be publicly known.

I understand there is a position open in your city with the Federation of Charities, and knowing Mr. Hyman as I do, I could not possibly recommend him too highly for social work of any kind.


He is exceedingly modest, and did not even present to Dr. Lowenstein of New York the hand-written letter of introduction, of which I send you a copy.



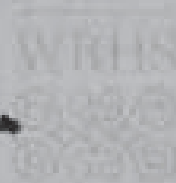

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Thank you very much for your kind and prompt telegram in answer to my inquiry of Jan. 29th regarding JOSEPH WOLF. The information that you have given me is helpful, but not sufficient. You stated "Goldman feels that he will do very well in social service". We understand that Wolf is doing social service at the present time and therefore were rather surprised at the statement.

As before indicated, Wolf does not know that we are considering him and it is somewhat embarrassing to be inquiring about a man without his knowledge or consent. Inquiry from another source, develops the fact that he is a young man of good character and fine integrity, youthful in appearance with a pleasing personality, also that he has done very excellent boys' work. Would it be asking too much of you, to request you to meet the young man and size him up for us?

For your information - our Committee undertook several years ago, the responsibility of looking after the interests of men and women in State hospitals, prisons, reform schools and the like. There are approximately 600 Jewish inmates in all of these institutions. Our representative goes there regularly; arranges an informal religious service where advisable, and also renders a personal service to the inmates and relatives of the unfortunate. He is also charged with the responsibility of doing after-care work for them upon their discharge. Our office is a sort of anchorage for these people, and if properly administered, it keeps them in line morally and otherwise. So that you may get some idea of our work, I am attaching hereto a copy of our last annual report, and if you can give us some additional light, it will be very helpful.

relief of Isaac M. Wise. He made two copies,
16 x 24 inches, one for the Hebrew Union Col-


lege and another which he consigned to my tender mercies for purposes of sale. I thought of selling it to a relative of Dr. Wise, but upon approaching him on the subject he stated that he lived in a rented house and that the only place where such a plaque could be put would be in the wall. Dr. Wise's Temple in Cincinnati does not wish to acquire it because there would then be two copies of the same plaque in the same city. I am wondering whether you have thought of any such ornamentation for your new temple.

I have an excellent photograph of the plaque which I will be happy to send you if you are at all interested in the subject. Prof. Schatz wants \$600 for this plaque. The Director of the Art Museum in Cincinnati told me that it ought to bring \$1,000.

Please let me have a line from you on the subject. If you are not at all interested in the matter I would like to offer it to someone else.



Dear Abba:-

As to the conference of which you speak in your kind letter of the nineteenth instant, only attended the morning session. Did not stay to lunch, nor did I go back in the afternoon, but Mr. David A. Brown, of Detroit, who stayed all the afternoon, came up to see me in the evening, and so have a pretty good line on it.

I gather that Mr. Marshall's idea is to collect a large sum of money, to be loaned to people who want to go to Palestine, buy land and develop it.

Then, of course, there will probably also be a certain amount of money allotted to these people to buy farming implements for them and give them enough money to live on until the halcyon day when they can become self-supporting.

At the Sunday morning conference, Mr. Marshall and Dr. Weizman delivered lengthy speeches, covering matters with which you are ever so much more familiar. I think, than either of them can possibly hope to be, altho this might be unjust to Dr. Weizman. Mr. Marshall, of whom I am personally very fond, finds time to do so many things, that I question whether he can do, any single one thing right.

When Mr. Marshall asked me if he could use my name, I told him that I did not know that my name was of any value particularly, but that I would not become identified with the movement unless Dr. Weizman and his associates would come out flatly and state that the original plan of creating a separate political entity for the Jews had been definitely abandoned.

The other day Mr. Marshall said he was sorry that I had not been there in the afternoon, because he thought Dr. Weizman's statement was very satisfactory. As that statement was repeated to me by Mr. Brown, it was not satisfactory but was carefully couched to please ante-zionists and to try and keep the Nationalists in line, at the same time.

It looks as if they want to use the old Joint Distribution Committee's machinery, (which is not yet dismantled) to collect money for this plan. I told Mr. Marshall and Mr. Brown that the main difficulty will be not so much in collecting but as in distribution personnel to be employed in Palestine, and that from what I had seen of the class of men that the Joint Distribution Committee had employed in Palestine, would not want to let them spend a five pound note of my money.

Would rather you would not say anything about this letter to anyone, as would not want to do the cause any harm. Think they will probably succeed in collecting a lot of money and some of it may do some good, and that far the effort is trustworthy and should not be discouraged by those who do not want to go along with it.

Give my best love to Virginia. The above is a bit gossip, but this is my reaction to the situation. Hope to see you this way soon again.

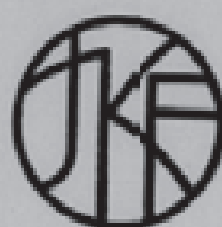
