My dear Rabbi Silver:

You no doubt know something about the School Luncheons Fund in Palestine. Under the fostering guidance of Hadassah, this fund has established a system of lunches in six schools in Palestine whereby the children are able to purchase lunches for a few cents. Not only do these luncheons have the primary physical value of properly nourishing the children, many of whom are sadly undernourished, but what is of more enduring value- in the schools where these luncheons are established the children in the upper grades are taught marketing, food combinations, scientific cooking, table service and table manners. The value of such training cannot be over-estimated, especially in a pioneer country where the immediate necessities of life are so exacting that there is no time for thought about the amenities of life.

We are enclosing a history of the luncheons in Palestine from their inception in 1922 up to the present time, which you will find interesting. If our budget of \$12,000 for the next year, is raised, it will make possible the extension of this system of luncheons to other schools in Palestine.

At Chanukah time Hadassah sends an appeal to the rabbis to urge the children in the religious schools throughout the country to contribute Chanukah gelt for the Penny Luncheons Fund in Palestine. We



Dear Rabbi Silver:-

You have been a loyal supporter of the work of the Consumers' League and we are writing to ask whether we can count on your continued interest and help through the coming year.

During the summer you received a copy of our new pamphlet, "Accidents to Working Children of Ohio," which is the result of the study on which we centered our attention during the last year. This study will be increasingly useful, we believe, in making clear the human side of accidents to children, and will furnish valuable data in the legislative conflict which is undoubtedly ahead in Ohio in regard to school and child labor laws.

At the present time we have under way a study of working mothers in Cleveland. In this study we are having the hearty co-operation of the Board of Education, the settlements, and other social agencies which with us are eager to know not only the social effects of the tremendous increase in the employment of mothers away from home, but also its underlying causes.

During 1926 you gave us \$200.; during 1927, \$100. At our October Board meeting it was decided to take as our budget for 1928 the sum of \$9000. This is more than we have raised in either of the last two years, but we need all of it to take care of our new study as well as our operating expenses. We wonder whether you feel that you could give us \$200 for 1928 as you did in 1926? If you can, we shall appreciate it deeply.


I was absent from the city and upon my return found yours of the 31st ultimo awaiting me.

בספר הגדול, הנינו אב" שחשאיך ומתבונים מר אבי המנוח ר' יצחק איווק ב"מטובים ז"ל המכיל גם תולדות אביו ופני הצדוק המפורסם ר' שמואל חסיד זצ"ל מרסיון סלר טובנה שחיה אחד משלושת החסידים המפורסמים שלסוף אע"כ הגאון והיו מבאי ביתו, מעאתי דברים אחרים קיים מאסו וחיוו של הגאון מוילנה כמובא להלן:

בידוע נסתלק הגדא ביום ג' החוש"ס תקנ"ח כמובא בס' עליית א"תו (הוא נולד ביום א' הפכה בשנת ת"פ 1730 בעיר סלץ הסמוכה לבריסק דליבא), בליכה התוא ישן ופניו בסוכה עם מי שהיה נאמנו רבי סיביל סופר ז"ל ואחר חצות הלילה העיר ופניו אורו ויהל לעעק אנו ואביו דנה שריפה גדולה ושפר גדול היו עתה בוילנה!

את כל המובא לעיל מעאתי במסרו של מר אבי המנוח והנני להוסיף עוד מלואים הנ"ל כי הוא חבר ספרים חלים אבל בחיו לא הדפוס אפילו

לפתיחת „אילם רפאלי“ בבית- הנכאת הלאומי „בצלאל“

WHITHER ARE WE STEERING?

November 18, 1927.

Dear Sir:

Although I am standing at the opposite side of Dr. S. M. Melamed's Judeo-national platform, I do not hesitate, in view of the gravity of the present situation, to go out of my way today in calling your attention to two deep-going surveys of American Jewish life in the November issue of his monthly magazine, "The Reflex", the one by the leader of the Jewish college youth of Canada, Lionel M. Gelber, entitled "The Melting Pot and After", and the other by Uriah Z. Engelman, under the heading, "What Price Rabbi".

It is useless to continue to indulge in our communal ostrich policy, faced as we are with the dilemma: Bend or Break!

"\$67,462,640 was spent in new synagogal structures in 33 of our 48 States for the last two years and eight months." (p. 54).

If the current expert diagnosis of the American Jewish psyche be correct, within fifteen to twenty years the overwhelming majority of those and the rest of our synagogal buildings, unless we immediately turn over a new leaf in our spiritual life, will stand half-empty even on Rosh-ha-Shanah and Yom Kippur.

A Rabbi's Warning of the Final Disappearance of Israel.

Let me quote to you the following remarkable passages from an address which was delivered on July 12th, 1905, at the annual meeting of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, at Rochester, N. Y., by the late rabbi of the Central Synagogue of Manhattan, DR. I. S. MOSES:

"Unless vigorous means are employed to arouse and vitalize the Synagogue with religious fervor, the disappearance of Jews and Judaism may indeed be predicted within a not altogether distant future, in the lands of Western civilization at least. This assertion will, of course, be greeted with an emphatic 'No' by our lodge orators. They will 'point with pride' to the asylums, hospitals, homes, the gorgeous temples whose gilded domes and shining pinnacles proclaim, according to their false interpretation of Jewish psychology, the wealth, the glory, the philanthropy of modern Israel. These outward demonstrations, however, are often nothing else than signs of inward decay, whitened sepulchres that testify to a buried faith.

"The preservation of the Jewish people to this very day has often been adduced as a proof of their indestructibility. The inference is illogical and premature. The conditions that made the existence of separate ethnical groups within the national organism possible have disappeared.

"There can be no valid reason and there is no prospect for the continuance of Hebrews as such, or of any other nationality within the body politic of our nation. The Jew can survive only as the bearer of a religious idea, as the organ of a spiritual force. To be true to the spirit of our religion, true to the mission which Israel has received on Sinai, we must enter upon a course of active propaganda, do missionary work within and without."

A Religious World Revolution?

Exactly twenty years after Dr. Moses, i. e., October 24, 1925, REV. DR. ABRAM SIMON of Washington, D. C., took up the same thesis in his Presidential Address, delivered at Cincinnati before that same Central Conference of American Rabbis, at the occasion of the Golden Jubilee Celebration of the Hebrew Union College.

You will find an abstract of it on page 5 of enclosed folder, containing a number of significant documents, all of which echo the eloquent plea of the Rabbi of Washington to raise Judaism to the prophetic plane of an ideal world religion, resting on the three pillars of Truth, Justice and Peace.

Probably under the influence of Dr. Simon's inspiring entreaty, his immediate successor in the presidency over the C. C. A. R., Rabbi Louis Wolsey of Philadelphia, in his scathing Cape May message of July last, anew called the Jews' attention to the fact that there is, indeed, something radically rotten in the state of American Judaism. Only a Caesarean operation can save its life.

A Challenge to the Pulpit.

Well, can our rabbis pluck up the necessary courage to proclaim wholeheartedly and without the slightest mental reservation the teachings of our prophets, "a bold stroke, but possible without a renunciation, since it involves only a mounting to the fountainheads of Israel's faith"? Has the American Synagogue still sufficient vitality left to produce from its own midst a Jewish Monk Martin Luther, ready to prepare its spiritual transformation from a happy-go-lucky institution driven by its own inertia into an aggressive spiritual world-power, into a genuine guide of the perplexed souls of our time?

In a word: is the Synagogue which received its formulas from the prophets but has dissipated them into rhetorical metaphors prepared to recover their meaning? Is it ready to claim, now that it is free and strong, its full share in its prophetic legacy?

If so, its heart-throbs, vivified by new blood, could make themselves again felt to the ends of the earth, and, having thus taken a new lease of life, the Synagogue could be in a position to participate anew, directly and essentially, in the supreme spiritual leadership of humanity.

Israel could, then, once more become Jahveh's consecrated standard bearer, holding aloft the prophetic oriflamme as the world's main seeker and proclaimer of TRUTH; as its prime herald of social JUSTICE; as its chief apostle of PEACE.

Hothouse Judaism.

Such an all-embracing, cosmic program of vigorous, aggressive idealism rather than the shadowy schemes of an emasculated, so-called "religious education" on the one, and a visionary Judeo-nationalistic re-ossification on the other hand, could again gather our youth, led by its academic legions, around the sacred precincts of the Synagogue.

Will the latter grasp this, perhaps final, opportunity of self-preservation which is herewith being tendered to it by the neo-prophetic movement which was started in the City of New York in the month of August, 1923, under the aegis of the great prophetic genius of the 8th century B. C., the spiritual forebear of the immortal seers Isaiah and Micah?

Are the promoters of the above mentioned utopistic twin plan of Jewish salvation unable to grasp the simple biological fact that certain plants can grow and prosper only in their native soil? Old fashioned, Jewish religious life within the narrow ghetto walls of old, and Jewish nationalism within the borders of Eretz-Yisroel? This, provided, of course, that Great Britain makes it possible for the valiant Chalusim to create, not on brittle Anglo-Egyptian papyrus but in the solid, rocky soil of Palestine, a real Jewish Homeland, from Dan to Beersheba, with a well-equipped and richly endowed University at Jerusalem as its spiritual center.


Are our rabbis and communal leaders able to wake up to the fact that most of our synagogal and cognate Jewish institutions are nothing but Jewish hothouse plantations?

It is a question of life or death for the Synagogue. Will it close the path of life or will the fasality of its medieval traditions, shutting it up in a circle of impotent and superficial formulas, be stronger than its instinctive impulses of prophetic descent, driving it, finally, to enter a plea in voluntary spiritual bankruptcy?

On the answer to these questions depends the future destiny of American Israel, involving your own.

If you agree with the preceding argumentation, are you ready to take a seat on the hospitable veranda of the sturdy shepherd-farmer of Tekoa?

Your comments on the matter of my own habitual late arrival will be very much appreciated inasmuch as I very much dislike to be considered as one who would deliberately disturb the sanctity of our Temple.
