Dear Abba:

Yesterday I received a letter from a Rabbi Hübacher, % Feigenbaum, 985 E. Boulevard, Cleveland, Ohio, asking me to help him in his straits. Dr. Philipson, who had been interested in this Rabbi, is not here as you know and Rabbi Heller is undertaking to raise some money for his return to Berlin where he wishes, I understand, to open a book stall.

I have gone about this morning and have collected \$75.00 and shall probably be able to get about \$100.00. Rabbi Heller is sending out some fifty letters and should raise much more than this amount -- possibly \$250.00. Doubtless Rabbi Hübacher has come to see you. What I would like to know is whether or not Rabbi Hübacher intends to return to Berlin and if so, when? And furthermore, I am interested in knowing what the Cleveland rabbis have done, are doing, or will do for him. It certainly seems to be more Cleveland's responsibility than our own for the simple geographical reason that Rabbi Hübacher happens to be stranded in Cleveland.

I am writing this note because one of the gentlemen who gave me \$25.00 for Rabbi Hübacher, Mr. Maurice Freiberg, believes this Rabbi to be a faker and suggests that no money be given him but that a passage be bought for him and he be placed on a ship to Germany. I do not believe this is fair to Rabbi Hübacher but I should like your own belief in his worthiness. No one knows better than I how hounded you are with work but please make an exception and find out what you can for me.

I shall look for a word from you in the near future. Many, many thanks.

The Shaare Zedek Hospital, is one of the oldest and best institutions in Palestine and enjoys an excellent reputation for the work that it has done in the Holy Land for more than a generation. It is the only hospital with a ward for contagious diseases.

This hospital used to draw its main support from our co-religionists in Germany. The War and its aftermath have reduced the value of that support to a minimum. Mr. Lehmann's father having been one of the founders of the Shaare Zedek Hospital, his son felt morally obliged not to forsake it in its difficulties, and so, he has brought the heavy sacrifice involved in the journey across the ocean and the separation from his family for several months, for the purpose of building up here an organization, a membership, an active committee to help the Shaare Zedek Hospital.

My dear Dr. Silver:-

Many, many, times since the World War have I thought of the remark you made to me in the summer of 1918 as we walked down the Champs-Elysées about the kind of a peace that would follow a peace with victory, no matter which side won. Those days with the Committee on Public Information brought me many visitors, but none that I remember more clearly than you. I have often heard of you since from Polly Lazaron. Every now and then I speak in Baltimore, and generally see Morris there.

You may know that I am the literary adviser of the Century Company, and that we have a large organization throughout the country for selling educational books. Most of our titles are suggested to definite people by us, and do not represent - as is commonly thought outside publishing circles - books we have accepted from MSS. submitted to us. Being a writer myself, my interest in a business association with a publishing house, is in the opportunity it affords me to see my ideas worked out.

Now I have thought of a book for young readers, which is very much needed, and which we feel would have a great success. We think, too, that it should be written by a rabbi with a distinctive gift of simple English prose. The title of this book will be JEWISH WORLD CITIZENS, and its object is to acquaint young people with the life and work, placed in simple form before them, of outstanding characters who were Jews, and whose influence has made them world figures.

On an accompanying sheet I have placed a tentative table of contents. This could be changed, of course, by the author. It is simply suggestive. Each of the sketches should be about 4000 words, in round numbers. In the book each would be illustrated by a portrait of the subject - in the case of ancient heroes, a reproduction of some famous painting.

Would you undertake to do this book for us? We believe it would be most interesting and stimulating, if you would write it as you would talk about these characters to the children of your Sabbath School.

There might also be included some general (Maccabus, for example), and some novelist or historian. There would be no rigidity about this list on the part of the publishers.

Of the older subjects the illustrations would be taken from famous statues or portraits.

1. At such special meeting, or in case such special meeting shall not be called, and no default giving rise to the holders of the preferred stock to elect directors shall have occurred prior to the time of the next succeeding annual meeting of stockholders, then at such annual meeting, the persons of either of the members of the then Board of Directors of the corporation, upon the election of their respective successors, shall cease and a new Board of Directors shall be elected by the holders of record of the common stock without nominal or par value.

6. The terms "dividends accrued or in arrears" and "full cumulative dividends" whenever used herein with reference to the preferred stock shall be deemed to mean the amount which will be equal to simple interest upon the par value thereof from March 15, 1928, to the date of computation at the rate of six per cent, (6%) per annum, less in each case, all dividends paid upon such stock.

7. No preferred stockholder of the corporation shall have any preemptive or preferential right of subscription to any class of stock of the corporation, whether now or hereafter authorized, or to any obligation convertible into any of the corporation's common or odd, nor any right of subscription to any class other than such, 1/2, 1/4, and at such price as the Board of Directors, in its discretion, from time to time may determine, and the Board of Directors may issue stock of the corporation or obligations convertible into stock without offering such shares of stock, either in whole or in part, to the preferred stockholders of the corporation, and no holder of preferred stock of the corporation shall have any preemptive or preferential right to receive any of such shares or obligations described by way of dividend. The Board of Directors may offer to the preferred stockholders any shares of stock of the corporation, whether now or hereafter authorized, or to any obligation convertible into shares of stock of the corporation, and offer shall not in any way constitute a waiver or release of the right of the Board of Directors subsequently to dispose of other shares of stock or obligations convertible into shares of stock without so offering the same to the preferred stockholders. The acceptance of preferred stock of the corporation shall be a waiver of every such preferential right which is the subject of this provision might otherwise be asserted by the preferred stockholders of the corporation in any of them.
