My dear Rabbi Silver:-

Mr. A. W. Russell, editor of Case and Comment, enclosed me your letter of the 25th ultimo, together with copy of your poem "America", together with a letter from him in regard to quotation of part of my address before the Kentucky Bar Association in 1926.



My dear Rabbi:

In confirmation of the conversation the writer had with you in Elbert Hubbard's Barber Shop, may I state that some little time ago we had the pleasure of selling for Mrs. Silver's account, I believe, \$1,000 City Ice & Coal of Chicago 6 1/2% First Mortgage Bonds due November 1, 1936. Its area of 91,310 square miles, equal to that of New York and Pennsylvania combined, consists mostly of land especially adapted to stock raising and agriculture. The State leads all other Brazilian states in cattle and sheep raising, is the only State in which wheat is grown on a commercial scale, and is one of the three leading states in Brazil in manufacturing and in the value of its imports and exports. Population, which is predominantly of European descent, is estimated at 2,358,000. Capital and principal city is Porto Alegre, which has a population of about 200,000.

Finances: Ordinary revenues of the State in each of the last twenty years have shown a surplus over ordinary expenditures, the annual surpluses having been devoted chiefly to improvements and extensions of State properties and productive enterprises operated by the State.

There is no record of default on any funded obligation, either internal or external, of the State of Rio Grande do Sul or of any municipality within the State.

Security: The Bonds of this Loan are the direct obligations of the State of Rio Grande do Sul, which covenants that this Loan shall have a prior lien on any of its revenues or income which may hereafter be pledged to secure any future loan, unless this Loan shall at that time have been secured by a first lien on specific revenues acceptable to the Fiscal Agent sufficient to cover not less than one and one-half times the maximum interest and sinking fund requirements of this Loan. State of Rio Grande do Sul

Rio Grande do Sul, the southernmost state in Brazil, adjoins Uruguay to the south and Argentina to the west. The State has a coastline of 522 miles on the Atlantic Ocean; area of the State is 91,310 square miles, equal to that of New York and Pennsylvania combined. The land is low and sandy near the coast; the interior is rolling country. The highest altitudes are in the north, reaching 3,139 feet above sea level. The soil in the interior is exceptionally fertile and well watered, the southern part good grazing land, and the northern areas covered with forests. Climate is healthful and invigorating, similar to that of southern Europe or southern California.

The population of the State was estimated in 1926 at 2,358,000 and is predominantly of European descent, chiefly German, Italian, Portuguese and Spanish. Capital and principal city is Porto Alegre, which has a population of over 200,000; other important centers are Pelotas, population 82,500, and Rio Grande, a city of 53,600 people and the most important seaport in the State.

Rio Grande do Sul has the most diversified agricultural production of any state in Brazil; chief products are corn, wheat, beans, tobacco, fruits and vegetables, herva-matte, rice, alfalfa, potatoes and sugar cane. The number of farms, according to the census of 1920, was 124,990, their total area 45,890,000 acres and their value \$502,749,000. The State has an important lumber industry and leads Brazil in the mining of coal.

The live stock industry is the largest and most important in the State. Number of cattle in the State in 1926 was 10,585,610, hogs 5,917,580 and sheep 6,734,140. The herd is not only the largest in Brazil, but the quality of the live stock is said to be the best. Several large meat packing plants are located in the southern part of the State; their products include chilled and dressed beef, canned goods, lard, hides, etc., and are shipped to other states of Brazil and to foreign countries. Rio Grande do Sul is a considerable producer of wool, and is the only Brazilian state exporting that product; most of the wool exported is shipped through Uruguay.

The industrial development of the State has been rapid. In 1926 over 76,500 persons were employed in packing houses, canneries and in plants manufacturing cotton, paper, straw, felt and metal goods, tobacco, boots and shoes, furniture, leather goods, chemicals, etc.

The export trade of Rio Grande do Sul is proportionately larger than that of most other Brazilian states; value of exports in recent years, including shipments to other Brazilian states, averaged approximately \$48,000,000 per annum. Chief products exported are meat and meat products, hides and skins, wool, beans, tobacco, wine, herva-matte and lumber.

The transportation system of the State comprises 1,739 miles of railway (including 1,466 miles under State administration), over 27,000 miles of roads and several navigable rivers. The larger centers of population lie along the coast or on the rivers, and are reached both by rail and by steamer. The port of Rio Grande is one of the most modern and best equipped in Brazil.

REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

Ordinary revenues of the State in each of the last twenty years have shown a surplus over ordinary expenditures; the annual surpluses have been devoted principally to improvements and extensions of railroads, post works and other productive enterprises owned by the State. Total ordinary revenues and expenditures for a series of years have been as follows:

Revenues of the State are derived mainly from taxes on land, on transfers of real estate, on industries and professions, on exports, on inheritances and from excise taxes, also from the State-operated railways, tramways, electric light and power systems and from port works. Since 1920 receipts and expenses of the railways and other State-operated properties have been included in the financial reports of the State government.

DEBT

The existing debt of the State largely represents investment in railways, port works, water works and other revenue-producing properties. External debt of the State on December 31, 1927 was \$20,488,000, internal funded debt was \$6,704,700, and internal floating debt \$4,812,000. The total debt was equivalent to about \$13.50 per capita. In addition to its direct debt, as above, the State guarantees obligations of municipalities aggregating approximately \$18,000,000 principal amount.

There is no record of default on any funded obligation, either internal or external, of the State of Rio Grande do Sul or of any municipality within the State.

6% EXTERNAL SINKING FUND GOLD BONDS

The Bonds of this Loan are the direct obligations of the State of Rio Grande do Sul, which pledges its full faith and credit for the due and punctual payment of the principal, interest and sinking fund thereof. Total authorized amount of this Loan is \$42,000,000. The State covenants that this Loan shall have a prior lien on any of its revenues or income which may hereafter be pledged to secure any future loan, unless this Loan shall at that time have been secured by a first lien on specific revenues acceptable to the Fiscal Agent sufficient to cover not less than one and one-half times the maximum interest and sinking fund requirements of this Loan. The State covenants not to issue further bonds, internal or external, while Bonds of this Loan are outstanding, if as a result of such issue the total annual debt service of the State would exceed 30% of the annual average of the total revenues of the State during the preceding three years; this limitation, however, is not to apply to future debt contracted to provide for self-supporting enterprises owned or aided by the State so far as the service thereof is paid from revenues of such enterprises.

Principal and interest of the Bonds are to be paid in time of war as well as in time of peace, without deduction for any impost, contribution or other taxes or governmental charges now or hereafter levied or collected by or within the State or the United States of Brazil, whether national, state, municipal or of any other nature.

SINKING FUND

Cumulative sinking fund, calculated to retire entire issue by maturity, is to operate semi-annually by drawing Bonds for redemption upon thirty days' notice at 100% on interest payment dates, beginning on December 1, 1932. The Loan is redeemable also as a whole, at the option of the State, on any interest date at 100% upon thirty days' notice.

PURPOSE OF ISSUE

The Laws authorizing this Loan provide that the proceeds thereof shall be applied to the re-funding of internal and external debt, subscription to the capital of the Rural Credit and Mortgage Bank, and to specific municipal improvements.

All conversions of Brazilian milreis into United States dollars have been made at the rate of 12 cents to the milreis, approximately the current rate of exchange.

But when we consider religious matters in their purity the whole subject is postulation.

Religion has as a foundation the requirement of man of alimment to further his existence and it was not until he began to speculate on his senses that it became controversial.

Religion does not find a place in the daily life of the current natural human being.

His faith is sublime.

His sphere in life is limited by his powers and he knows that if

he uses them naturally his life will be as creation intended.

Current man is the resultant of two things. His civilization which is man-made nature for his purpose, and nature's nature of which man is but an infinitesimal any degeneration from which has its concomitant penalty. He is a parasite.

Religion is literature. It is not life, but considers undeniable matters that it puts into a doctrine the theologian expounds for purposes the natural man need not consider.

As the church is considered as of two the invisible with its clean heart and right spirit and the visible with its organization and gaudy observances, the atheist is a member of the invisible.
