My dear Rabbi Silver:-

I find that my letter of the 27th ultimo was mailed with an incorrect address. I am intruding upon your busy life to ask you several questions concerning Judaism.

In preparing a paper upon the liberal trend among religious groups in Europe and America I am desirous of finding to what extent the Orthodox wing of Judaism is being affected. Most of us in Protestantism are more familiar, of course, with the Reformed Synagog. Yet, I am aware that a congregation such as B'Mai Jeshurun at the Temple on the Heights, Cleveland, before whom I have spoken, is still clinging to forms and customs which other congregations have discarded altogether. Such religious bodies seem to be in the midst of a gradual reform.

Is the Reformed Synagog a dominate factor for Judaism in America? What percentage of the Jewish population is entirely outside of the church, having cut loose from all religious sanctions? Would you indicate to what extent the reform movement has affected doctrines and beliefs as well as ceremonies and forms?

I shall be grateful for your own opinion on these questions if you are inclined to give them and any references that you care to make as to current articles that might provide me with reliable data on the subject. I may say that I have been reading "The Legacy of Israel" with great interest.
