

Report of Financial and Membership Re-Organization Committee of Oakwood Club

The Committee has had a number of meetings and has considered many matters in connection with the activities assigned to it. We believe the solution arrived at is practical, though probably subject to revision when tested by experience.

At the beginning of its deliberation, the Committee assumes two things: first, that the Club intends to proceed with additions and improvements to its present building along the lines indicated in the plans which are now being considered by the Building Committee which will provide Club House facilities for a greatly increased membership; and, second, that the cost of these improvements and the new furnishings and equipment based on present bids and estimates, is approximately \$200,000.00, but for safety, a fund of \$225,000.00 is to be provided.

CLASSES OF MEMBERSHIP:

The Committee recommends that the membership be divided into the following classes:

Full Playing:

Seniors—play golf at all times.

Associates—play golf except Saturday afternoon and Sunday and holiday mornings.

Juniors—play golf at all times.

Limited Playing:

Seniors—play golf except Sat. afternoons, Sun. and holidays.

Associates—play golf except Sat. afternoons, Sun. and holidays.

Juniors—play golf except Sat. afternoons, Sun. and holidays.

Non-Playing:

Seniors—no golf playing privileges.

Associates—no golf playing privileges.

Juniors—no golf playing privileges.

Special:

Play golf except Sat. afternoons, and Sun. and holiday mornings.

Privileges for themselves only.

Widows:

Playing—same golf privileges as playing associates.

Non-Playing—no golf playing privileges

Non-Resident:

Play golf at all times.

Privileges for themselves only.

The wives and children of Full Playing Seniors may become Full Playing Associates and Juniors. The wives and children of Limited Playing Seniors may become Limited Playing Associates and Juniors. The children of Full Playing and Limited Playing members not old enough to become Associate and Junior members shall have the same golf privileges as at present. The wives and children of Non-Playing Seniors shall have no golf playing privileges.

We suggest that the golf playing privileges of all classes of members, except Full Playing Seniors, should be defined in the By-Laws rather than in the Constitution so that the same may be regulated by the Board from time to time as deemed advisable without requiring an amendment to the Constitution.

NUMBER OF MEMBERS IN EACH CLASS:

Full Playing Seniors:

The limit of Full Playing Senior members should be fixed at 20 more than the number of present Seniors remaining after we

have determined how many of our present Senior members desire to go into the Non-Playing and Limited Playing classes.

Limited Playing Seniors:

The Limited Playing Senior membership should be limited to 50. Of this number possibly 5 will come from our present membership allowing 45 additional to come in.

Non-Playing Seniors:

The Non-Playing Senior members should be limited to approximately 120. This assumes that there will be 280 Full Playing Seniors. If there should be less,—then the limit of the Non-Playing class can be raised proportionately.

Total Senior Membership:

This makes a total Senior membership of all classes of 450 which means that the Club will take in 150 additional Senior members of the various classes.

Discussion:

Provisions should be made so that Limited Playing Seniors, in the order of their application, should have the preference in filling vacancies in the Full Playing membership and Non-Playing Seniors should have the preference in filling vacancies in the Limited Playing membership.

MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATES:

The new Senior members totalling 150 shall each purchase a membership certificate for \$1500.00, to be paid for in cash, and shall pay an initiation fee of \$150.00 as hereinafter provided. Some arrangement should be made so that those new members who come in from the Excelsior Club may use the money which they receive from the sale of the Excelsior Club property, for this purpose, even though there be some delay in receiving same. This will place the new members on an equal basis with the present members of the Oakwood Club and will create a fund of \$225,000.00 to be used as a building and improvement fund to be disbursed under the direction of the Board. After the increased membership of 450 Senior members is once filled, all new Senior members thereafter admitted shall purchase a membership certificate of \$1000.00, but shall pay an increased initiation fee as hereinafter provided.

Junior members when they become Senior members shall purchase a membership certificate of \$1000.00 to be paid for at the rate of \$100.00 per year for 5 years, with interest at 5% per annum on unpaid balances, and the balance at the end of the sixth year.

INITIATION FEE OF NEW MEMBERS:

Senior Members:

The 150 new Senior members shall pay an initiation fee of \$150.00 each. This will place them on the same basis as the present Senior members. After the increased membership of 450 Senior members is once filled, all new members thereafter admitted shall pay an initiation fee of \$750.00.

Junior Members:

Juniors shall pay an initiation fee as follows:

Joining 16 to 20 years of age.....	\$ 50.00
Joining at 20 and 21 years of age, both inclusive.....	100.00
Joining at 22 and 23 years of age.....	150.00
Joining at 24 years of age.....	500.00

Special Members:

The initiation fee of special members shall be \$100.00
(At present it is \$75.00).

Non-Resident Members:

The initiation fee of Non-Resident members shall be \$100.00
(At present it is \$25.00).

Associate Members and Widows:

No initiation fee.

SINKING FUND:

The initiation fees from the 150 new Senior members and all other initiation fees shall go into a Sinking Fund to be used, first, to take up membership certificates of deceased or resigned members, and, second,

to apply on the balance of the bonds which are now outstanding and which are not taken care of under the present financial plan, and third, after funds have been provided to take care of all outstanding bonds and membership certificates awaiting redemption, for such other purposes as the Club may from time to time authorize.

Discussion:

There will be immediately created a Sinking Fund of \$32,500.00 from the initiation fees from the 150 new Senior members. To this will be added all other initiation fees which includes the \$750.00 from subsequent members and initiation fees from all other classes.

DUES:

The dues of the various classes of members shall be as follows:

*Full Playing Senior Members.....	\$250.00	per year

Limited Playing Junior Members.....	60.00	" "

Full Playing Associate Members.....	25.00	" "
Limited Playing Associate Members.....	25.00	" "
Special Members.....	\$100.00	per year
Golf Playing Widows of Members.....	75.00	" "
Widows—Non-playing	50.00	" "
Non-Resident Members.....	100.00	" "

*Members in these three classes have the right to vote.

Discussion:

The dues fixed for Full Playing Seniors are approximately what the members of the Oakwood Club have been paying during the past three years. This year the dues are \$175.00 and the assessment is \$75.00, and for the preceding year the dues were \$175.00 and assessment \$65.00. The dues fixed for Non-Playing members are the same as the dues now being paid in the Excelsior Club. The dues of other members were fixed on what was considered to be a proportionate basis. It is the judgment of the committee that this schedule of dues is necessary in order to meet the anticipated annual expense.



Due to the extraordinary amount of work in connection with the reorganization of our company and a reduced personnel, we have been unable to keep our customers advised as to the progress being made in the adjustment of delinquent bond issues. Hereafter we will endeavor to send out information periodically outlining the progress we are making in the adjustment of those situations in which you are interested.

Interest was defaulted on the Ulmer Building bonds February 1, 1930 and there will be no funds available for some little time yet for the payment of either the February or August, 1930 coupons. The delay in the payment of interest has been occasioned by the fact that there exists delinquent taxes in the amount of \$30,474.94, which includes the last half of 1929 taxes. The Trustee for land trust certificate holders has insisted that the delinquent taxes be paid before any further disbursement be made for interest on the bonds. It was necessary that the Trustee for the bondholders comply with this request.

All available funds are now being applied to reduce the delinquent taxes.

Ground rent is \$44,625.00 per year and is paid to August 1, 1930. Taxes amount to \$21,423.22 per year. The building produced for the year 1929, \$159,623.21, which included \$12,000.00 representing income from a lease calling for a large sign on top of the Ulmer Building which is at present in litigation. Attorneys for the building company give us their opinion that this item is collectible. The expense for 1929 was \$74,494.27, not including ground rent, taxes or interest. Cash on hand June 27, 1930 was \$4,957.87.

The building stands today approximately 75% rented, or about the same as for the year 1929. Rental conditions from now on should however improve, due to the opening of the Union Passenger Station on the Public Square in close proximity to the Ulmer Building and the consequent great increase of traffic in this section of the City.

It is our opinion that it will be some time in 1931 before the January 1, 1930 coupons can be paid, but you may be assured that just as soon as delinquent taxes are out of the way every effort will be made to pay the delinquent interest as quickly as possible.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I am turning to you for help through and
because of a most tragic situation, because I know
you will realize the full significance of it and
because I feel I can count upon your understand-
ing and real sympathy for my mother, Bertha Kalich.

My mother has been under a great
financial strain for some years past because
the transcontinental tour which she made in her
fine but expensive production of Sudermann's
Magda (which you will probably recollect as passing
through your city) brought us on the rocks.
Instead of waiting about with the usual Lucie and

Cry of the Broadway Theatrical Producer and rushing
into the bankruptcy courts, mother preferred to save
her name and labored two years to pay all the
deficits of the corporation. However the strain was
too great and it had its effect upon her health
and most seriously affected her eyes. I was
away in California. Last year when a telegram from
the hospital ^{last July} notified me that mother's eye was
operated upon. It was sudden and fearful
news to me as her eyes had always been in
good condition heretofore. I hurried East and
have been at her side every moment since, nursing
her through a period of convalescence, then saw
her comparatively well and ready to see her
public again. In fact mother's energy was
otherwise great and the urge to act was so strong
we could hardly hold her in leash. Then came the
promise of a production by Mr. Robert that would
permit her to appear in a fine play by Arthur Schnitzler.

This made her Lappz and she set to memorizing. All details of contract were settled, two acts memorized when the stock exchange crash came which again affected theatrical conditions and her production was one among others to be cancelled. It was another shock to her but as by this time it was absolutely necessary for her to ~~provide~~ provide an income, she accepted a Yiddish contract to play on the East Side. However the worries attending the selection of a suitable vehicle, the shock of having lost the already memorized part up to now, the rehearsals and the fretting over the ever present financial situation entirely depleted her strength and she was an easy prey to bronchitis which developed the second week of her engagement. The play showed her at her best - she made a triumph - and brought packed houses to a heretofore languid theatre where only a week previous to her opening the

owner had committed suicide - because business was so poor. Yes she proved a mascot to the management, but for herself she lost rapidly in vitality - the cold spread to her eyes, an inflammation of the most serious kind and mother was again removed to the hospital.

My poor mother has suffered tortures - there was no help - three operations were performed, I had the greatest medical aid, but one eye had to be removed! Dr. Silver, can you imagine the agony of our suffering for her, with her, helpers to aid no matter what we did. It was a terrible situation that I cannot describe to you nor do I wish to bring you so much a picture of Sadness into your life. But my beautiful, wonderful mother whom critics described as telling the history of the world with the look of her eyes! And now, the expense of the illness, hospital, nurses and the present trying convalescence, it is so much to bear, coming at this worst possible

Moment! The success she had down town would have amply recompensed our fortunes if the Lord God had seen fit to permit it to continue - but this calamity came so suddenly - it has left us stranded and at a time when the theatrical people are all embarrassed by a terrible season of failure, so that we cannot expect help of them.

I write you therefore because you know how willing and ready my mother has always been to do anything in her power for her own people. She has no doubt inspired some fine individuals in your community who being apprised of her terrible affliction and her present difficulty will consider it a privilege to join a fund that will relieve the pressure of her financial difficulties and help to give her the proper care in convalescence so that she can return to her work when her

health permits. These months are very trying - though the sight of her second eye has been saved, it requires the greatest care and caution and we dare not risk her too soon for her strenuous labors.

Dear Dr. Silver: You will of course understand that we are trying to keep this as secret as possible in order that the general public will not learn of her catastrophe for fear of injuring her drawing power - such things do affect audiences. You see, in such a position we are in. - Will you help me nurse my mother back to health with your intervention - to quietly raise among your wealthier and kindly members a sum sufficient to carry us over? It is difficult for me to write more - it is the most difficult period of life and one I had never dreamed could happen - but I must do this to save my mother and I hope you understand me, I know I cannot fail in your sympathy for my wonderful mother. 



Dear Abba,

Hotx blasts from the middle west have brought the temperature on our porch to 101. But I'm immune have been baked for seveteen summers in Georgia heat! So I want to bring to your attention despite the heat a matter to which I have been giving considerable thought.

At the Conference Bernard Heller of Scranton - who by the way wrote a splendid paper, one of the best of its kind I've ever heard at the Conference - spoke to me about the possibility of going in with him in getting out a Jewish monthly magazine. He was here the other day and we went into the idea more deeply and would like to have you join us in its general management, if you are, as we hope you will be, interested.

There is nothing today between the destructive smirking of the Menorah and the imitation Jewish Mercury Reflex, except the host of inconsequential stuff which the Jewish weeklies put out. We need an authentic voice to give utterance to constructive Jewish criticism; a thing which should be popularly written but with sufficient substance to give it authority. I believe a monthly magazine of this type to be not only vitally necessary as a guide through our wanderings today but that it can exert a powerful influence in moulding American Jewish life in the right way..

I furthermore believe that the three of us could swing it quite acceptably. The details of management and the like can be left to a meeting between us. It may be advisable ~~to invite other men~~ from a purely practical point of view to invite other men geographically in key positions to serve as contributing editors. But the general control should be in our hands. I have in mind something in the nature of a Jewish Atlantic Monthly or Harpers.

So far as funds to start it are concerned I think there will be little difficulty in securing enough to project at least a year's edition. I am sure I could interest people here and Heller tells me he already has funds in sight in Scranton.

The purpose of this letter is to ask you if you would be interested, indeed to urge your interest and co-operation purely on the ground that we can perform I believe a real and needed service. Think it over and let me hear from you at your convenience.

We leave Shabbos after service for Rangeley where we shall arrive about August first. Address- Care Tom McGraw, South Rangeley, Maine. Should you care to do into it I would gladly run down to New York to meet you and have Bernard there too.

Am so sorry to have missed Jinks. There was no way out of it. You will have to tell me about the E.O.A. next time. Our love to you both and the youngsters.



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


