
Dear Friend:

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

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Your letter of July 31st has been referred to me for answer.

Ohio Cities Telephone 6% bonds due 1945 are 98 bid. These bonds are not listed; however active bids for these bonds are maintained. This company was recently acquired by the Associated Telephone Utilities Company which is, we understand, the largest independent telephone company in the United States.

A letter was written early last week to the Secretary of the Moffat Tunnel Bondholders Committee for up to date information regarding the supplemental bonds but we were referred to the new Secretary of the Committee to whom we wrote immediately, but so far have not received a reply. This information will be sent to you as soon as received.

With reference to the Union Water Works 5 1/2% bonds due 1942, we find that bonds were offered recently at 45 and the last bid was approximately 40. According to the latest statements available which however are not very recent, these bonds were earning their interest charges with some margin to spare. We have been in correspondence and telephone conversation with the trust officer of the Central Trust Company of Illinois who is trustee. This matter is being checked by them and we shall communicate this information to you later.

It rather looks from the information we have on hand that the low bid for these bonds is due to the fact that the Atlantic Public Utilities Company who own the equity in this company has been in financial difficulty. We understand however that the receivership proceedings do not mention the Union Water Works Company.

We are endeavoring to get this information just as quickly as possible and Mr. Schultz will be glad to discuss these matters with you as soon as we receive the up-to-date information which has not as yet been given to the public.


During our conversation of last week I failed to mention several options that are available to you under your present policy with our Company.

Dear colleague:

May I intrude upon you to ask a personal favor:

Recently, while at the meeting of the CCAR, several rabbis who are engaged in Hillel Foundation work urged me to apply to the Hillel Commission and ask to be considered for Hillel work. They maintained that my training qualifies me for it. I acted upon their suggestion and sent in my name to Dr. Mann, chairman of the Commission. In his reply Dr. Mann tells me that he will present my name before the Commission at its next meeting. Knowing that you are a member of that Commission, I thought that it would perhaps be wise to write to you and ask you to take a personal interest in the matter.

I don't know how much you know of me. Let me, therefore, give you a few facts pertaining to my training and experience.

I received my secular academic training at the university of Minnesota. In 1923 I entered the Hebrew Union College as a student of advanced standing. My record at the College was a very good one. During my junior and senior years I assisted in teaching Biblical Commentaries. My training in biblical and rabbinic literature as well as in medieval and modern Hebrew literature has been thorough. During my college years I have also written several prize winning essays, one of which on "The Term Old Testament" was published in the Jewish Tribune of April 19, 1929. Upon graduation, in 1926, I was awarded the Felix Kahn Scholarship and pursued graduate work in Religious Education at Teachers College, Columbia University, for one year. In the fall of 1927 I was called to my present position.

While here, I have had some practical experience in student work. The university of Georgia which is located in Athens has an enrollment of about 100 Jewish students. I have

done some good work with them. I organised a class in Jewish History and Literature and also tried to hold the Jewish student body together in a social way, under rather difficult circumstances. I, therefore, believe that both my training and experience bespeak well for my success in Hillel work.


Because of the vital interest we have in this property, the undersigned and its officers have at all times devoted their best efforts toward assisting the management in obtaining tenants and in helping work out the problems which constantly arise in a property of this size and have willingly devoted a large amount of time to a constant supervision of the property.
