To the Holders of First Mortgage
Fee and Leasehold 6½% Serial
Gold Bonds of Palace Theatre Corporation:

Your Committee is pleased to report that the Plan heretofore approved by you with reference to your bonds, involving the foreclosure and purchase of the property in South Bend, Indiana, and the sale thereof to Orpheum Theatre Company, has been fully carried out, and the new bonds which you are to receive in place of your old bonds are available for distribution.

As you have heretofore been advised, foreclosure proceedings were instituted by the Trustees under the mortgage in the District Court of the United States at South Bend, Indiana. As a result of the foreclosure proceedings, the Court ordered the sale of the property by a Special Master. Pursuant to the Plan, The Theater Corporation of South Bend was organized under the laws of Indiana by your Committee and acquired the property of Palace Theatre Corporation at the Special Master's sale. The Theater Corporation of South Bend having thus acquired the title to the property, proceeded to transfer the property to Orpheum Theatre Company in pursuance of the contract entered into by your Committee with Orpheum Circuit, Inc.

Before transferring the property, The Theater Corporation of South Bend executed an issue of bonds in the face amount of \$875,000.00, together with a First Mortgage Deed of Trust to Union Trust Company (of South Bend, Ind.) as Trustee, covering the South Bend property. These bonds are all dated as of August 15, 1930, and bear interest at 6% per annum, payable semi-annually on March 1st and September 1st in each year from September 1, 1930, the first coupon being payable on March 1, 1931. The bonds are all payable and become due on September 1, 1942. The Deed of Trust, however, obligates the owner of the property to retire on September 1st in each year for five years bonds in the principal amount of \$25,000.00 and bonds in the principal amount of \$35,000.00 each year for the next five years, and bonds in the principal amount of \$50,000.00 on September 1st, 1941, and the balance on September 1st, 1942. In order to comply with this obligation the owner must deposit cash with the Trustee sufficient to enable the Trustee to retire by lot bonds in the above amounts, or else the owner can purchase from the bondholders bonds sufficient to meet the above retirements and deliver the bonds so purchased to the Trustee for cancellation. The selection of bonds by lot by the Trustee for retirement will give to each bondholder an equal opportunity to have his bonds retired before maturity. In any event, to the extent that the bonds are thus retired each year, the equity in the property is increased annually for the benefit and protection of the remaining bondholders.

When the property was transferred to Orpheum Theatre Company, it specifically assumed and agreed to pay these bonds. Orpheum Theatre Company is a subsidiary company of Orpheum Circuit, Inc., which owns and operates a large circuit of theatres formerly known as the Orpheum Circuit, and is a subsidiary of Radio-Keith-Orpheum Corporation.

In the opinion of your Committee, the new bonds which you are receiving are sound securities and the interest and principal of same will be promptly paid when due.

An analysis of the operation of the property in South Bend for the past year shows decreased earnings due to the general depression in business conditions. This confirms the opinion of the Committee that the sale to Orpheum was most advantageous to bondholders, and justifies the recommendation of the Committee that the sale be approved.

In connection with the closing of the transaction with Orpheum Theatre Company, it was necessary, as provided in the contract, to pay the taxes for the last half of the year 1929, amounting to \$10,120.65, and further to allow taxes for the period from January 1, 1930, to September 1, 1930, amounting to \$13,493.40. It was also necessary to rebate to Orpheum Theatre Company the rental of the theatre for two months which it had paid in advance under the terms of its lease, which rebate amounted to \$6,666.66. It was also necessary to deposit with a Bonding Company the sum of \$6,500.00 in connection with two pending lawsuits involving the property, based upon mechanic's liens which were outstanding against the property. In addition to paying the above items, it has been necessary to pay various bills incurred in connection with the organization of the Committee, the deposit of bonds with the Depositary, foreclosure of the property, the purchase of the property from the Special Master and the sale of the property to Orpheum Theatre Company, the issuance and distribution of the new bonds in the amount of \$875,000 and the preparation of the First Mortgage Deed of Trust securing these bonds, including such items as printing, revenue stamps, charges and expenses of the Depositary, charges and expenses of the Trustees, charges and expenses of the Committee, and compensation paid for services rendered in connection with negotiating and accomplishing the sale of the property and for legal services in connection with all of the above matters. Unexpected delays and difficulties and complications in connection with the entire matter resulted in a great deal more expense than was originally anticipated by the Committee. Also, while the Committee anticipated that it would derive substantial revenue from the theatre during the entire period which has elapsed due to the fact that it was entitled to receive one-half of the profits of the theatre under the terms of the theatre lease, the theatre, because of the general business depression, made no profit and as a matter of fact operated at a substantial loss during that period. As a result of all these things, it will not be possible to make distribution to bondholders on account of accrued interest. However, the bondholders will receive new bonds in a face amount equal to the old bonds which were deposited, which bonds bear interest from September 1, 1930.

As provided in the Plan, a detailed statement of the expenses and disbursements in connection with the entire transaction will be filed with the Depositary as soon as all items have been taken care of and the entire matter completed.

New bonds of The Theater Corporation of South Bend are now available for distribution at the principal office of the Depositary, Central United National Bank of Cleveland, 308 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio. *In order to obtain your new bonds, it is necessary that you return to the Depositary the Certificate of Deposit issued to you for your old bonds and you will thereupon receive from the Depositary your new bonds.*

Your Committee wishes at this time to take the opportunity of thanking each bondholder for his co-operation in this matter which has resulted in the successful working out of the Plan and which will result ultimately in the full payment of the principal of your bonds. The Committee also wishes to express its appreciation for the co-operation and assistance rendered by The S. Ulmer & Sons Company in working out this matter.




My dear Rabbi: -







Dear Rabbi Silver,

Because of the fact that I did not greet you this morning - since you may have taken cognizance of it - I do not want you to think that I feel any personal unfriendliness to you who have been always kind to me.

Nevertheless there was a phrase of your address that called to my mind, however unequal the circumstances might be, the lack of results accruing from our connection

Now we called the names of
Jews who played their part
in German achievement of
the past. I have but little
information in these matters,
but was it not true, as I
venture to believe, that these
men in almost every instance
owed nothing of their achieve-
ment to their co-religionists?
If that is so, why was it
that Jewish solidarity did not
function for their advantages?

Some time ago when Max
Kallisch was finishing your
book, at a time I know when
you were giving him some
sitting he advanced an
argument to me which I felt

2. was not derived from his own thinking, much as I admire his personal force. I felt that the argument was developed (perhaps it was egotistical for me to think so) with some consideration of me.

He said that Jews were mistaken to try issues - though that may not have been the phrase - with the world at large. That they thrived on opposition, and that in those countries where they were not opposed they had failed to gain conspicuous place. I will not prolong this letter by giving my answer to that argument, but I will ask in inclosing the sum of Jewish-

ness, and in practising
solidarity, whether or not
a occasion for defense exists,
is not opposition in times of
national stress invited?

There is a better way and
I think that great Jewish
characters have practised it.
To ignore distinctions between
them and the peoples with whom
they live is not to deny their
birth-right. If Palestine (so
it seems to me) has any
meaning for living Jews it is
that there they may live their
native uniqueness, ^{not only} unashamed
but where it is supremely
fitting that they do so. With
Palestine a reality it is to my
mind an impropriety to fail

3. to participate to their fullest capacity in the fulfilment of the ideals of their native land i. e. their land of habitation.

To this proposition, if you like, it is to my mind to the Jews say that he is equal. If he writes and attempts to find answer to the woes of his native land is he any less writing and attempting to find answer to his own? Is he not rather saving the latter, in doing so, through new eyes and thus keeping them ever fresh in his own?

I feel that the means

of Jewish destiny are not so
simply to be won as by
flying to self-defense, but
however hard it may be, it
is by showing his willingness
to take up other people's burdens
that he may win and have
claim to consideration for
his own. It was, I think with
some such reaction that I wrote
a number of years ago "I think
not but that I'll do the
thing thou askst. Know I
whose liver heave spoke when
thine do in me?"





Dear Rabbi Silver:-


I had the pleasure of listening to you last evening. I not only enjoyed every word which you had to say, but I am sorry that such a message could not reach every man and woman in Akron. Many thanks for all that it meant to me.

A few months ago, I found, back of an old family portrait, a piece of newspaper published in Frederick, Maryland, in 1843. In it, was an editorial taken from the "Bangor Whig", evidently a paper published in Bangor, Maine, about that time. I am sending you with this, a copy of that editorial.

It might have appeared in a 1950 paper or magazine. Not only is it interesting in that respect, but it shows that the manners, morale and outlook of youth travels in cycle of about 40 years. Note what it says about the youth of 40 years before the editorial was written. Then what it says about the youth of that day, 1843. Some of us remember very distinctly how we viewed life and liberty about 40 years, in the Mid-Victorian period. And most of us wonder a lot about what is going on today. Well, our comfort is that 40 years hence, around 1960, youth will be different. Or as you said, the parents of tomorrow will be more severe disciplinarians than those of the present time.



Dear Rabbi Silver,

This letter is not intended to add "cause" for that letter you are going to send me.

Even though you had power of mind reading - a thing that I do not mean to suggest that you by claim to - I should not presume that you know entirely for what I was thanking you on Sunday.

First I owed you a debt, as did every one else present for your address at the Zionist meeting. Particularly I owe it to you for your example of unswerving maintenance of a cause such as one may profess with his whole strength. Simultaneously I was conscious of a useless - or wasted - feeling on my part.

It seems to me that there is possible, what is not existent at present, in the terms I mean, - a substantiation of a noteworthy utterance and even of a cause of an organization for which it was delivered. I have tried to determine definitely of what that substantiation

consister. I would ask you first, in just
the outline of a program settle upon
priorities? What shall be so,
if it is, would tend to make it

I hold that apart from the individual



After the membership is once filled, new members will be required to pay an initiation fee of \$750.00 and purchase a Membership Certificate in the amount of \$1000.00.



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

Dear Rabbi Silver:-

I was present at the Sunday morning service, November 16th, at the conclusion of which you reminded the congregation of the urgent need by the Community Fund this year. Your earnest appeal causes me to write you of a recent experience I had with Mr. Stagis, Director of the Community Fund. I feel that something is wrong somewhere, and it would not surprise me that it is because I am a Jew.

Some weeks ago I called on Mr. Stagis and explained to him that I had been away from Cleveland for five years, and though Cleveland is my home town, my previous contacts were more or less broken now and I had to start all over again. Not being able to get located, and abhorring inactivity and to avoid mental idleness, I thought of the idea of volunteering my services gratis to the Community Fund where my 16 years of business training and experience would be of some help or possibly save some cost in extra help immediately preceding and after the campaign. There were no strings attached to my volunteer service offer.

Mr. Steigis was friendly and most cordial, and he remarked "usually when one comes in, it is to ask for something and here you are offering something, and therefore it was somewhat unusual." Mr. Steigis made a record of my name and address and telephone number. I was assured that he would get in touch with me later.

Not hearing from Mr. Steigis, I again inquired about 10 days ago, and this time Mr. Steigis sent word thru his secretary very curtly, I thought, that my name was turned over to one of the staff. I still am without word from Mr. Steigis' office! His change in attitude and a most discourtesy has puzzled me ever since. The best officials may have been coerced because I am Jewish!

In seeking employment, quite often I found that being Jewish seemed to be a fault. This is an old story. However, I did not think that an organization like the Community Fund would appear to discriminate against Jewish volunteer service, and yet it is perfectly willing to accept money from Jews. If I was told that for one reason or another my offer could not be accepted, I would have been perfectly satisfied.

The entire incident has bothered me to such an extent that I have concluded to write you of it, for what it may suggest to you!


