Terrified Jews inside thought a pogrom had begun when disheveled men poured in wearing the emblem of the Stahlhelm, German veterans' anti-Semitic association. This was in Frankfort-on-Main, one day this week.

But the men who were banded together in hatred for the Jew had come to the synagog not to kill but to be saved from death. Outside, twice as many Communists were waiting to maul them. The members of the Stahlhelm, returning from an anti-Jewish meeting, had run into a militant band of Communists and been overpowered. In Germany, political parties take themselves very seriously.

The Jewish congregation received its enemies and gave them sanctuary. There must have been, in the minds of the rabbi and his flock, many memories of violent death and pillage inflicted on their race; memories of persecuted loved ones; thoughts of fear still hanging over them. But the enemy had been delivered into their hands and they were merciful.

It is hard to believe that the men of the Stahlhelm, having found refuge in the shadow

of a synagog, can ever violate that sanctuary when others cower there. In so many places in the world, old fires of hate are flaming up again. The Frankfort congregation has shown how they may be quenched, in a way we are accustomed to call Christian.



DIRECTORS OF CAMP WIGWAM

Mr. Arnold M. Lehman 666 West End Ave. New York City Mr. Abraham Mandelstam 40 West 72nd Street New York City Julian Rochelle is director of the Wigwam Players. Mr. Rochelle has graduated from the Department of Drama at Yale University under the direction of George Pierce Baker. At various times he has directed amateur groups in New York and New Haven, and has been Art director of the Crescent Country Club Players.

Sidney Simon is scenic art director of the Wigwam Players. He is a graduate of the Cleveland School of Art. He has designed sets for the Brickert Theatre and for several Little Theatre groups. He is a designer and works in batik, block printing on material and other decorative mediums. Mr. Simon has served on the Cleveland Camp Institute Staff, teaching art projects for camps. He exhibits annually at the Cleveland Artists' Exhibition and in other showings.

Lloyd K. Rosenmond is Associate Director of The Wigwam Players. Mr. Rosenmond is a founder of the Hall of Fame Players at New York University. He was the first student director of dramatics for New York City High Schools.

Arthur Bloch while at Columbia University, participated in the productions of the Morningside Players. Mr. Bloch is a student at Yale University in Professor Baker's Workshop.

Marion Green first made his debut in a solo appearance at the age of nineteen with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. This was followed by a transcontinental tour with Ovide Musin, violinist. Since then Mr. Green has sung as soloist with the outstanding choral and orchestral associations in America and Canada. He has also taught at the Cosmopolitan School of Music. He organized the Chicago Evening Choir in Orchestral Hall, and directed it for five years. In London he created the role of Monsieur Beaucaire in the operetta of that name. Subsequently he sang the role in New York, and later he either starred or was featured in America in twelve other operettas, among such being The Wild Cat, The Rose of Stamboul, Maytime, Love Dreams, Annie Dear, Greenwich Follies and Pinafore.

Carroll Hollister, distinguished pianist and accompanist for Mischa Elman, is well known to both the concert and radio audiences of the United States. He has played at the White House for both President Coolidge and President Hoover. Mr. Hollister matriculated at Amberst College, where he was official college organist; then he graduated from the Institute of Musical Art of New York City; and thereafter he appeared with Elena Gerhardt, Giuseppe De Lucca, Louis Grayeure, Martha Attwood, Anna Case, John Barclay, Augusta Lensha, Esther Dale, Marie Roemat-Rosanoff, Hugo Kørtschak, Phyllis Kraeuter, Bernard Ocko, Agna Enters, Ingeborg Torrup, the Marmein Dancers, the Metropolitan Opera Chorus School, the Adesdi Chorus conducted by Margaret Dessoff, and others.

Robert Norton, a son of Anna Selkirk Norton, one of the leading singers of the Pacific Coast, was trained from boyhood as a singer. He studied at the Cornish School in Seattle for five years, where his talent for operatic work was discovered by Vladimir Rosing, who brought him East to become a scholar-ship student at the Eastman School of Music. He studied dramatic work under Rouben Mamoulian, the director of "Porgy" and "Marco Millions", and sang in grand opera with the American Opera Company. Since coming to New York he has sung with Winthrop Ames' Gilbert and Sullivan Opera Company, has appeared on tour as soloist of the Gilbert and Sullivan Male Ensemble, and has been a member of Walter Hampden's company. He was graduated from law school of the University of Washington, and compiled the school code of the State of Washington.

Mr. Ralph Fabri, noted Hungarian artist, has designed and planned some of Mr. Theodore Dreiser's home extensions; he has illustrated most of Theodore Dreiser's books. He has exhibited extensively abroad, paintings and water colors, portraits and landscapes. He also designed and built sets for theatres. Mr. Fabri will advise, design and help execute settings for the productions of the Wigwam Players.

Mr. Thomas Voter graduated from Pratt Institute School of Fine and Applied Arts. Then he became assistant in the Art Department of Brown University. Thereafter he worked on a set of five mural decorations for the American Museum of Natural History in New York City, where he is now a letterer and designer. Various nature periodicals and books, including the "Stir of Nature" by William H. Carr, were illustrated by him.

Julius Roth, a member of the Art Department of Camp Wigwam, is on the art staff of the Columbia University "Jester". He has studied at the Students Art League and the Academy of Design.

Mr. Philip Santry is a young artist, who has been doing a great deal of landscape and portrait work in various mediums.
