Dear Sir:

The other day as I was running over some old papers I came across some beautiful words of yours which appealed to me very much. Pardon my quoting those with which they began and ended:

"I am in the stream of life, and I cannot escape it. My life began with the life of the universe, and can only end with it. It has surged through infinite cycles and phases of being. It will continue its appointed course uninterrupted..... My comfort and my sustenance is not immortality, but God. His universe is perfect, and my destiny is part of his perfection..."

How true it is that when we grow conscious of the majestic rhythm of the universe our pettiness stands rebuked and our self-assertiveness is awed into silence. I too am a theist and have felt that whatever else there is finds its meaning and its dignity in what it is or can be to Him.

In the course of a few weeks now a book which I have written will be published, and I have written asking that a copy be forwarded to you. It was originally begun in a Punjab jail (in the days of the first non-co-operation movement initiated by Mr. Gandhi ten years ago) and has

been further developed in the quiet of the little village in the Himalayas where I live. Broadly speaking it is the outcome of twenty years of meditation on the mystery and meaning of life.

I know you will probably find much that will not appeal to you in it, but am confident - if you will bear patiently with its many faults of arrangement and presentation, and the repetitions which mar it - that you will find various lines of thought suggestive. The form which it first took when I wrote it in Lahore was unusual and I have not attempted to change it; I hope you will not allow this to put you off from reading it.

Unfortunately, it is not a book which will yield anything to casual 'dipping' as the theistic position it develops - and the hypothesis it builds up upon it - are quite off the beaten path. The former is the product of my own consciously noblest experience, whereas the latter is speculation - but speculation as to the nature of a Universe and a God in Whom the implications of that experience could find their relevancy.

May I add in explanation that I was born and educated in America but have lived more than half my life as an Indian and among Indians, mostly in the quiet of this mountain home, largely absorbed in a consideration of the problems which have in all ages exercised earnest thinkers in this land. You must hold this as my excuse if you think my book too speculative. I do hope you will read it despite its shortcomings which I have already mentioned.

Dear Rabbi Silver:-

I am interested in having the Board of Education of the City of Cleveland make provision for the education of mentally retarded children whose I.Q. is below 50. The class of children I am referring to are those who are not in the special class, and yet do not belong in institutions, because it has been proved that these children have a spark of intelligence that can be kindled by proper guidance and sympathetic leadership, and these children should be provided for in the school system. It is my understanding that no provision is made for the education of these children at the present time in this city.

Some of these children are in private schools today but their parents can not possibly afford the expense, and a great many of these parents are actually depriving their families of necessities.

You have no doubt had brought to your attention a number of cases of mentally retarded children, and I would very much appreciate word from you as to the number of cases of this kind brought to your attention, and as to whether or not you believe there is a real need for schools to take care of these children.

Any further information which you may be able to give me on the subject will be very greatly appreciated.



Replying to your communication of January 7th in referencnes to the present status of the Moffat Tunnel District Supplemental bonds ~~and~~ we might say briefly that the validity of these bonds and the assessments levied to pay them were sustained in the District Court of the State of Colorado in an opinion handed down on June 26, 1932. The case is now in the Supreme Court of Colorado on appeal from the District Court's decision. There is no telling when the Supreme Court will hand down its decision, but in view of the importance of the matter, there will be probably no undue delay.

The opinion of the District Court is so sweeping and favorable and the case for the bonds so strong that we can not help but feel that the Supreme Court will sustain the validity of the bonds. In its decision the District Court indicates that the Tunnel Commission has on hand over one million dollars, the proceeds of assessment collections, which will be applied to the payment of past due interest as soon as a decision is handed down by the Court, provided the final decision is favorable. This sum of money will be more than ample to pay all past due interest so you can see that there is no money question involved.

The Bondholders' Protective Committee tried to get the matter through the Federal Courts, but the United States District Court of Denver declined to take jurisdiction pending the final disposition of the matter in the State Court. You will find a reference to this in the Municipal Section of the August 1st, 1931 Financial Chronicle.





STORMERS OF HEAVEN

Solomon B. Freehof

Harper & Brothers - 1931. 220 p.p.

This book is merely a collection of the biographies of twenty-eight persons who, in the opinion of the author, have since the beginning of history most affected religious thought. Only a very foolhardy man or a genius would attempt in 220 pages to portray the lives of so many great characters, and Dr. Freehof, in spite of his educational advantages (he was formerly a professor at The Hebrew Union College) shows no great genius. Spinoza gets six pages and St. Francis four. It is the sort of book that could be written by any high school student with a copy of "Who's Who" before him. No research at all (I hope) was required on the part of the Chicago Rabbi in compiling this work. It contributes nothing to literature either by giving a new approach or by disclosing any particular insight into the characters and lives of the men discussed. Neither has it the charm or interest of such other books as "The Outline of History" and "The Microbe Hunters", which also attempt in summarized fashion to portray the influence of a large number of people upon modern thought.

Such biographical matter as is included in the book appears to be accurate, but many of Dr. Freehof's deductions and conclusions are open to debate. For instance, in his introduction he distinguishes between Science and Religion by stating that Science has no rebels but merely cumulates information progressively over a long period of years, whereas "Every forward step in Religion was a revolution - a sudden change forced on the past by the energy of exceptional men." (p. 2) Surely Columbus and Pasteur were as much rebels in their days as Martin Luther was in his, and a single genius, like Einstein, can and has revolutionized scientific thought.

The author also draws unwarranted conclusions from trivial and relatively meaningless matters. He claims Americans in general are money mad, because when we wish to know how rich a man is we sometimes ask "How much is he worth?" (p. 5). By this colloquialism the Doctor believes he proves we believe that wealth is the measure of personal worth.

The work might be useful as a text for the early Sunday School grades if the teacher wants to make a very general survey and only hit the high spots, but I cannot recommend it for any intelligent adult. There is an index but no bibliography.


Dear Colleague:-

I think our gas deposit of 10.00 has been with them 20.00. I then let the City build school + public buildings that they can afford to pay for. So they could pay Teachers - and not take so much off Taxpayers.

Some of the Tax payers would be glad to have a nice lawn & shrubbery. Like some schools have too.
