Dear Rabbi Silver:-

I had the pleasure of visiting your dear parents and must tell you how well I enjoyed being with them. They were so happy to see me, receiving a fine welcome from parents who are real Jews, needless to say, and a lovely couple. I don't have to write what a beautiful home they have and what a lovely bouquet of flowers your father gave me from his garden.

I felt as if I knew them all my life and will visit them often. Your dear mother feels much better now, although it was so hard to forget the misfortune of your Gotsagilah Sister. I could feel with her but God gives and takes. With your dear father's attentiveness to her and the doctors' instructions of nourishing her philosophy, the pain is lighter.

It would takepages to write you how happy I am here. Of all the talks I have heard of Palestine, I could never imagine how beautifully modern it was until I saw for myself. One feels so secure here and everyone is happy, we have more to live for here than in America. All the tourists want to remain here and I am expecting to stay here if I am fortunate enough. Our people are doing enough but England is not doing her part - you don't have to investigate you can see for yourself, but we must be contended.

I often think of your words "Dedicating your life to two things-"Hebrew Education and Palestine" and how I'm going to work here, so much I want to do. Palestine needs American element and we need more Jews here and everywhere I meet men and women who are just aching to remain here, but even in our own country we can't. It won't be long until they'll give us the credit that is due us.



I noticed by the Plain Dealer of May 2nd that you say that the Prohibition Law cannot be enforced.

One definition of the word "enforce", which I think applies to your meaning in this case, is, "to compel obedience to".

Under this interpretation of the word, which I think is meant in the general use of it, not a single law can be enforced for each and every one of them are violated continually.

If the Prohibition Law "ought to be repealed because it is impossible to compel obedience to it" then all other laws should be repealed for the same reason, for until human nature is changed it will be impossible "to compel obedience to" any law by all of the people.

The laws against murder, theft, gambling, kidnapping, etc., are not enforced.

According to your line of reasoning, and that of the wets, they should be repealed because they cannot be enforced.

I am sorry to see you throw your influence on the side of the wet element in a great moral question like this. Past sad experience has proven that the open and lawful sale of intoxicating liquor has brought nothing but disaster. It has been the cause of much suffering physically, mentally, morally and financially.

I do not think it can be denied that if liquor is sold openly, legally and cheaply, thousands of men who are not now drinking will start to do so. This will cause an increase in suffering and the worst of it is that, as a rule, innocent women and children are the ones who have to suffer the most because of the money spent for liquor which should have gone for the support and comfort of the family.





Rev. Dr. Abba H. Silver, The Temple, E. 105th St. at Ansel Road, Cleveland, Ohio.

My dear Abba:

I am sorry indeed that you will not be at the meeting of the Board of Governors next Tuesday, particularly since matters of extreme importance and affecting the future policies of the College are bound to arise. I remember, however, now, that you stated you would have to attend the National Conference of Social Work in Philadelphia, since you are scheduled to make an address there on that day. We shall miss you, but try to get along as best we can.

It was indeed an oversight on my part that I did not answer the second part of your letter of May 4th. I had just returned to Cincinnati after a ten-days' trip east, as you know, and no doubt because of the great mass of mail upon my desk, I was a bit hurried and overlooked it. I am glad indeed to know that you contemplate engaging one of the members of this year's graduating class to assist Feuer. There are in this class two especially capable young men who are available and whom I take pleasure in recommending to you.

First is Ralph A. Habas who comes from Trenton, N. J., and the second is Jerome Rosenbloom who comes from Pittsburgh, Pa. Both are capable, fine-spirited young men, of high ideals, excellent personalities, sound characters, and possess ability as students and as preachers. They have had a good training in Education this year under Franzblau, which will stand them in good stead in the work which you contemplate for them. I believe either of the two would be excellently qualified to serve you.

As regards the salary which should be offered as "Internes", the primary consideration is that they be assured of a sufficient income to live on decently, in a manner compatible with the dignity of your congregation, which, in a way, they will have to represent. Just exactly how much will be needed for this purpose you ought to be able to say better than I. Do you think that \$1,500. would suffice? Or do you think that more is needed? I am quite sure that either of them would be satisfied with whatever might be offered to them, provided it be coupled with the assurance that it will suffice for reasonable living expenses for the year in Cleveland. The engagement should of course be for the full year, -2- Rev. Dr. Abba H. Silver.

because, as you know, they would be unable to secure any other position until September, 1933.

How do you want to proceed to consider them? Do you plan to come down here for a day, or do you want one or both of them to come up to Cleveland? Or if you want to initiate your contacts with them through correspondence, do you want to write to them directly, or to have me initiate the contacts for you? Anything you choose will be satisfactory. Only I ask you to keep me informed of what you do and the progress you make, so that I may not work at cross-purposes with you and perhaps recommend either of these two, or both of these, young men to other pulpits, should such come in while you are still negotiating with them. If you want to write to them yourself, you can address them care of the Hebrew Union College. Whatever method of procedure you decide upon will be satisfactory to me.

Dear friend:

Having waited two days for some criticism of our Program and seeing none, I feel that as President of the League of Jewish Voters Inc., some statement is due from me at this time in answer to such publicity as we have received.

The comment by Rabbi Brickner and the Cleveland News Editorial is sound reasoning and is well taken. We find them both very meritorius and instructive.

Believing however, that there was an honest difference of opinion as to our true Purpose, we conferred with Jewish leaders of this city. All agree these our purposes are honorable, and our Program sound.

We were advised that some of the work we have undertaken is being successfully carried on by other agencies. In this we agree, but we reserve the right as American citizens to participate in this work and as a unit if we so desire.

We find that the principal objection is to our name. This is a minor detail and we are calling a special meeting of our Board to effect this change.

We feel very keenly, the fact that we have incurred the displeasure of Cleveland's leading Rabbis. Our organization to be successful, must have their cooperation and guidance. We regret that we did not confer with them before this name was chosen, and hope we will have their good will and assistance in the future on all questions of policy.

I still feel, however, that People of any creed, religion, nationality, or district, have a right to organize in the interest of better Government. In Union there is strength and why should Jews be denied this right; especially when other groups are organized? MAIN 6788

If this calls for protest from some of our own People, the charge of bad faith and poor citizenship will prove a Boomerang. It is certainly being fired in the wrong direction.

Everyone knows that as voting citizens, our work will be more effective.

The Magnitude of our Program, advocating as it does several important governmental reforms, allows us no time for sham battles with those who seek only to destroy and not to build.

Messrs. Atkin, Walt on Altschuld, the three wise men of the East si e, all noble minied, unselfish gentlemen, whose feelings were so outraged and who claim their names were used without their consent, will gladly be permitted to withdraw. This charge is ridiculous. They do not seem to be able to grasp the entire picture anyway, and I think our Program will be materially strengthened by their absence.

I also regret that the calm, placid hom life of our community was disturbed by the birth of this new organization, but I sincerely hope and pray that through and because of this baptism of abuse we will all work harder and make easier the job we have undertaken.



Dear Rabbi Silver:

I really hate to bother you with problems of my congregation, because I know that your time is very valuable. But you are the only one who can help to solve our present difficulty by stating your opinion in this matter, because your word is law in our community. I, therefore, take the liberty to ask your assistance in the following matter.

Sometime ago, my congregation adopted a resolution that no boy or girl shall be confirmed without having attended "ebrew School for at least two years, in addition to regular Sunday School training. Nor. shall any boy become Bar Mitzvah without having attended Sunday School for at least two years, in addition to regular Hebrew School training. This resolution has brought new life into our educational system and has enlarged the ranks of our Talmud Torah. Now, there are two very influential members in my congregation who send their children to Sunday School, but refuse to send them to Hebrew School. Hebrew training, they say, means nothing to them. If I should admit them to the Confirmation Class, it would mean the annulment of our present educational system and perhaps, also, the ruination of the Talmud Torah. For many parents send their children to the Talmud Torah just because they want them to be confirmed. On the other hand, if I should refuse to admit them to the Confirmation Class, it will mean a great deal of trouble for our congregation, because, as I said, they are very influential members and liberal supporters of our Temple. I have pleaded with them. I tried my best to make them realize that their attitude harms, not only their children, but

Dear Sir, Anxious to help I write.

We need help badly and a 4th xikitax winter of this depression will be much worse than the one just gond. Please see that by a short law our U S Congress can reverse the down trend of prices and start up prosperity all over the world. The wrong is due to the use of our standard of value as a debt payer. When gold is badly distributed as now, the debtors must bid its value up in their efforts to get it. As gold rises in value all other things lose value comparatively. This is the cause of the down, ever down, trend of prices.

We should hold the standard free from such influences and allow it to be stable. This #/ would stabilize business and employment. Surely this is underiable.

Then we must provide a debt-payer. (In the days when we had two metals, the chaper one was the debt-payer. In these days we had a detole money base so there was not the problem of scarcity there is now.) Make silver legal tender ALWAYS at its market ratio or price as expressed in terms of gold / A gold collar's worth of silver is just as good as a gold collar's worth of a nything else. This will at once ralieve gold of the debt-paying demands and allow it to fall back to normal resporting prices to normal. This is not only the right way but the only way to do it.

Next give silver a job. For a generation we have been discrediting silver. What for? To appreciate the value of our gold and to depreciate the value of the things we buy of the silver using lands. & religious men have stood for this practice.

We are being punished now. So we must rehabilitate silver. Stock it alongside gold as a money base. Doubling our money base will double the safety of our banks.

Finally to Complete the job, forbid gold contracts for monetary gold. Let the "standard" stand. It is a jumphard now.

If I can say more, command me.

Our U. S. Constitution gives Congress sole right to print & issue Money. But our laws pass it to a private class, who "manage it" for THEIR gain. BAD. No important public utility shud pay toll before it reaches those who make & use it. This is piratical & parasitical. THE great reason why consumers pay more & get less & why producers get so littl. Interest & gambling collect where they do not earn.

Money is a tool we make to facilitate business. Akin to a hoe. As lack of hoes hinders gardening so scarce money slows business but an excess does no harm. Lacking enuf money, we use "credit" a dangerous fiction. In good times, bankers lend it too freely, being human & working for profit. At first sign of troubl, they stop lending, call loans, & hoard money. To protect themselves & depositors. T System is bad. See clearly, "credit" is a bubbl. It bursts leaving nothing to use in business. Just when most needed, there is no money & bankers dare not lend "credit". If we used money, it could not thus disappear. It wud stay & fight like a good soldier & lessen or prevent t evil.

Panics begin with bankers. When they stop 'credit', business slacks, prices fall, buyers wait, merchants add no stocks, makers cease. Workers ar dropt & unable to buy. Each wrong breeds more. Due to wrong laws & methods, a panic is a 'bankers cycl''.

We rightly use one standard of value, --gold. But money-managers insist that we stock it, --40% or more, --behind our paper money, & pay inter-nation balances in it. There is not enuf gold for these variabl jobs even if wisely placed. This limits our paper money & forces us to use "credit." This varying demand for gold renders business unstabl. We shud separate the standard from the base. See this, it is vital.

War debts hav piled gold in U. S. & Frarce. Other lands ar bidding for it. Its price has more than doubled. As a heavier pound needs more goods to balance it, so a higher dollar buys more. As gold rises, prices fall. & will continue til gold stops or drops.

Let no one tell you there is ample gold. Foreign credits now due us call for more than others hav or will produce in many years. Lending our gold makes matters worse.

Be not fooled. This is THE cause of this panic, our worst. It is world-wide; no other cause is. No remedy is at work. It wil grow worse. Britain & others wer wise enuf to drop their money off gold. Confusing but more honest than we who let creditors collect doubl value from those least abl to lose. We ar pig-headly proud of "sound money" while it robs t weak & is not facilitating business. It is legal, not honest nor fair.

If you dout, nead "The Book" of Arena Co., Aurora, Mo., 25 cts & "Evolution of Banking" by R. H. Howe, of C. Kerr Co., Chicago, 60 cts. Money history is simpl, banker ways complex.

As water against fire, so without delay, use inflation against deflation.

Demand newly printed money,—we print bonds. With 60% of it buy & retire warbonds. Stop interest, lessen t deficit & force that private money to seek new investments. It wil lower interest, help homes, farms, factories & hire all unemployd. T 20 billions in U. S. & foren bonds wud hav brought untold prosperity & prevented poverty.

Use t 40% to buy silver, etc., to stock insted of gold for redemption. Honest men wish only t agreed value for their paper money. Honest governments will offer no less. Pay out silver at its gold worth when called for. Let nations see they can be on gold standard without gold. Let gold drop to normal & boost prices promptly. In 60 days we can be seeking workers insted of doling charity. If your Congressmen will act. Stir them up.

Think not we can prosper alone. As Rome, so will the western world fall together. Jesus pointed t way. Matt. 6, v 33. Most peopl get so out of breath seeking t kingdom they neglect His rightness. Till other lands prosper, we will suffer. Giv silver a job.



Her family are very anxious to know whether he is a good living man, and in a position to make a home. He is engaged in sign-painting and show-cards. He says he is coming to London in the autumn, and wants to get married.

The brother who came to see me, whose home is in Manchester, has heard rumours which make him a little uncomfortable about this young man, and he came up in genuine anxiety lest his sister should be making any mistake. I shall be so grateful for any help you can give me in the matter.

I hope that all is going well with you and the members of your family. We remember with great appreciation the happy days we spent in Cleveland. I am afraid we have all gone through a rather terrible time since then.

I wish it might be possible for you to join us in the Hague on August 5th, when we are having a small gathering in connection with the Governing Body meeting. The Hague congregation is now definitely started, and we think that it will give it an impetus if some public meetings can be arranged while members of the World Union are in Europe. If you know of any representative people who are travelling, I should be very grateful if you would let me know.


I have a very unusual request to make and will give you the necessary information just as briefly as possible.

We have been members of The Temple for approximately ten years (still holding my seats). We have lived in Cleveland all our lives until just a year ago when we moved to Chicago. My oldest child, Shirley, went to your Sunday school, naturally, since kindergarten and finished her eighth year there when we were forced move.

She went to Sunday school here at Temple Sholom from September until the middle of January, and then went to California with Mrs. Unger. They returned here just a week ago. We find upon investigation that the graduating class at Temple Sholom is of a younger age. I give you this information so that you know what it may mean to her to go back to Temple Sholom another full year next year with these younger children when she is now almost 15.

The child, after attending school for eight and one half years, feels very, very badly about not being confirmed with her class. She has brought the subject to my attention many times during the past week. For fear, however, that it may have been a passing fancy of hers or that she was not really serious enough, I withheld writing you this letter until I had convinced myself that it was really uppermost in her thoughts.

It is quite refreshing in these modern times to find a child who has become imbued with the spirit of Judaism. Evidently your teachings over a period of eight years have had a more powerful effect than we parents realize. It occurs to me that if her confirmation is of so much importance to her now, its importance will surely be exaggerated in years to come - whenever she goes to Temple and whenever her children go to Temple. To use her own words, she wants to be confirmed in her class - by her own Rabbi and in the same Temple that her mother was confirmed twenty-four years ago. Can we deny such sentiment?

The change in our residence and the circumstances which have brought about this letter are, of course, no fault of the child, and Mrs. Unger and I would for many a year to come feel badly to cause her these future unhappy moments. Shirley has also shown a willingness to jeopardize her public school rating in order to come to Cleveland for this confirmation.

As mentioned in my first paragraph, I deeply appreciate the fact that this is an unusual request, but likewise do I think the circumstances are unusual and mitigating at least to the child. Of course, we would bring her to Cleveland in plenty of time for confirmation on the 10th, but if it would help you make a decision or help her in any preparatory work, either Mrs. Unger or I would bring her to Cleveland just as soon as you say.
