

Dear Dr. Silver,

I trust your stay abroad was both pleasant and stimulating. Unfortunately your homecoming was saddened by the tragic death of Mrs. Lazarow. Please extend to Mrs. Silver my sincere sympathy and condolence.

I am writing this to bespeak your kind interest in vol. II of my work "Texts & Studies in Jewish History & Literature" which has been ready in ms. for the last 6 months. It is a considerable volume of about 1200 pages full of new valuable material that throws considerable light on dark periods of our history. (I believe you possess vol. I and can gauge by yourself the quality of the work.) The powers-that-be here not only show no interest whatever in my research work but are opposed to any further use of the HUC Pres Fund for the printing of vol. II (as you know the Pres published vol. I). The argument is that the small fund available should accumulate for future work of other members of the faculty, although this is a ~~good~~ ^{yet} whereas mine is ready. I cannot

go into details, but one thing is obvious that, in order to publish my volume, I have to obtain outside help. Dr. Lenelow has kindly obtained for me the balance of the Littauer Fund of the C.C.A.D. to the amount of \$600. (You probably know that Mr. Littauer has stopped his annual contribution to this fund.) The cost of printing would amount to about \$3600, so I still need \$3000. Now I realise that this is a big order in these trying times. However another 1000 dollars or so, together with the \$600 I have, would pay for the printing of part 1 of vol. II. As it is, a volume of 1200 pages is too unwieldy and it is my intention to publish it in 2 parts (part 2 to have consecutive pagination so that the Index at the end shall be arranged on the basis of 2 volumes).

I should be very grateful for your help in this matter. I thought of approaching Mr. Ochs but I never met the gentleman. Needless to say I don't get a cent for all my labor. My work has literally been ~~done~~, my only desire being to see it in print in order to proceed with other research problems I am interested in.


- Thanks to both you and Mrs. Silver for your kind wishes to all of us.

After having read K.L.B.'s letter in your esteemed paper of Sept 12th I was almost moved to tears at the injustice and wrongs inflicted upon the Van Sweringens by this "tank-water, overgrown town" (I shall quote freely from K.L.B.'s eulogy.) But before breaking out in a good cry I thought I better first analyze the "substantial contributions" they made for which they "deserve the city's praise and gratitude."

It is true that the Vans "gave Cleveland something on the Public Square" which the national magazine Fortune characterized as Cleveland's White Elephant.

It is also true that they, "through companies controlled by them, many had millions on deposit in the Banks of Cleveland"; But K.L.B. does not mention that they had borrowed, taken, or had presented to them 12 - 15 millions of dollars more from those banks than they deposited, without any or adequate security. Millions which comprised the savings of 500,000 depositors, - scrubwomen, newsboys, cripples, widows and orphans, churches, Old Age Homes and Orphan Asylums and other charitable institutions, pennies and nickels saved up by schoolchildren ~~sav[ed]~~ up for tuition for higher education, trust funds and charity funds for the keeping of the lame and the blind, Community Fund moneys - - Money collected at a hundred branches established for the purpose of convenience for the thousands of the frugal and provident folks to deposit, with the object to be poured into a twenty million dollar receptacle or hopper, and from there to be distributed and divided among the officials, directors and favored borrowers, (among whom the Vans were not the least pretentious) ^{for excessive} ~~as~~ salaries, commissions, bonus's and unsecured loans.

Fake subsidiary companies were organized for the sole purpose of furnishing dummies for the officials and other big game hunters to be able to dissipate the funds with the least possible danger of criminal prosecution. But - as K.L.B. so aptly puts it: "Cleveland has been bilked in the past by many wild cat schemes."

"The Vans have actually done something for Cleveland"

Upon their advent they were handed the key to the city, and were given carte blanche to do what they chose. The Chamber of Commerce and other civic organizations, The Mayors, City Managers, County and City authorities, councilmen, commissioners, vied with each other to do their bidding. Old streets were closed, new streets were opened, traffic was diverted for their convenience, bridges and viaducts costing millions were built and located to fit into their plans and schemes, and the banks competed to do the bidding of the Vans, "to keep themselves (the Vans) and their various projects and enterprises alive".

Let us enumerate some of these:

The Terminal on the Square, (but is it?) to unite all the railroads of Cleveland, with the result that most of them are out.

The floating of a \$30 million loan on 5 year Gold Notes, fostered by local banks and recommended by them to their clients in 1930, Notes taken up few months later at 50¢ on the dollar with the implied bluff of a probable total loss; settlement recommended by same bank. Result: Loss of 15 million to investors, and a clear gain or profit, (not to use a more proper name for it,) of 15 million to the Vans.


Attempt to concentrate the retail downtown business district around their Terminal as a nucleus, disregarding the needs of the city for a greater area, to the detriment of all other retail trade in more convenient locations of the city.

even going so far as to divert transportation facilities of the shopp-
ers to that end.

The Cleveland Streetrailway System, - which under Johnson and the Taylor Plan, gave Cleveland the finest and cheapest car service in the country, with a full value to the investors, has deteriorated to ~~the~~^{er} that extent that the value ~~to~~ of the investor slumped to 35 - 40 % of its former value, the fare increased almost threefold and is furnishing an execrable service , since it got under control of the Vans.

Attempting to hog the realestate market for homes,rather than to permit a gradual healthy growth, the Vans sprawled over thousands of acres of good farmlands, thus destroying the legitimate realestate market,making the land useless for farming, needless for building for a half of a century, owing the county treasury hundreds of thousands for unpaid taxes.

Defaulting on taxes, interest and mortgage loans, unmolested by banks or authorities, while unemployed, unfortunate small homeowners with similar obligations are being dispossessed and sold out for taxes or interest.



Press space is too valuable to enumerate any more of the things for which "the city should give them credit, and give them a lifting hand" -

Yes, K.L.B. - this " tank-water, overgrown town "as you call it, was once The City On the Hill, with sound banks and business. It had the second largest auto industry, the second largest garment industry in the country, great foundries, rolling mills, brass works, woolen and knitting mills, machine and toolfactories - thousands of large and small shops, busy and growing, - assisted by the banker who knew and trusted his client, and whose client confided in him.

New enterprises came gradually, one brought the other. Of course there were periods of depression, but they passed and the city kept on growing. But there was no thought of industries leaving the city one after the other,

Since the advent of the Vans our Chamber of Commerce and other Civic organizations ~~were~~ and our bankers were too busy to look after the interest of the smaller merchant or manufacturer concentrating all their efforts on behalf of the Vans. ~~I sha~~

I shall close repeating what K.L.B. says: "Cleveland has been bilked in the past ", but not on such a large scale- and the Vans ! have actually done something for Cleveland - done it in such a way as will live for many generations"

Finally the Germans acquired it, and used it abundantly. They were employing it for ornaments at the end of the bronze period, and after their contact with the Romans they decorated elaborate plaques with it. In at least one instance, the Swastika and other symbols appear wit
