
I would consider a proper distribution of this printed discourse most effective. We would need nothing more in fighting for our cause.



3. Since the first day of school is an important Jewish holiday, kindly inform the Jewish pupils that when they report for school on Tuesday, (the orthodox pupils on Wednesday,) that they must report directly to their homeroom at 8 o'clock on the day they return to school for the first time, so that the homeroom teacher may give such pupils their individual programs.


Dear Rabbi Silver:

Dear Rabbi Silver: -

I hope you will not consider me presumptuous for Troubling you again, this time with a most urgent request. I am forced to appeal to you against my own will. The case has gotten to a stage where it requires immediate action; otherwise I am completely lost.

The Cincinnati District Attorney definitely stated that I must appear in court next Wednesday, June 20th. With Dr. Morgenson away from the city, the results of the trial will be alarming.

It is possible that Dr. Morgenson has already spoken to you about the matter. By this time he has in his hands a letter from me and the file of correspondence from Mr. Geismar.

Mr. Canny is willing to drop the matter or to consider it closed. But Keenan is obdurate again. Mr. Geismar is under the impression that the only thing left now is to plead with Mr. Keenan personally to leave the case alone or to approach the Attorney General Cummings, his superior officer.

Dr. Morgenstern has Keenan's letters and telegrams which will show that all conditions imposed by Keenan himself were accepted and complied with fully. Although you have never met him, he knows you. As you know, he is a Clevelandian.

I am aware of the fact that the trip to Washington will be an expense. I just received my remuneration from the Price Hill Congregation and I will gratefully reimburse you for any expense you may incur.

I know that justice requires judgment, but this time it is not prosecution but persecution.

My heart is aching so to trouble you. But I am quite despondent. All the years of work and effort seem now to be in vain. I am grateful to you

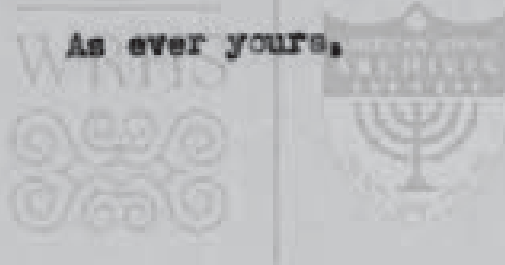

Dear Abba

I haven't heard from either you or Virginia in quite a while, and I am really lonesome for a few lines from you. I hope both of you and the children are well and looking forward to a pleasant summer. Do you plan to do some travelling or are you staying in Cleveland?

The here in Jerusalem are all well in spite of the very hot weather. The children will finish their school in about another month, and I will again have to make plans for the future. I hear regularly from Jack from Kansas City. He claims he is doing a little business with the small investment he made, but it is not enough to draw a living from it as yet. However, he claims that the store has good possibilities and he is confident that in time ^{it} will work up very nicely. His brother would like him to come in as a partner, which of course means an additional investment. I don't know if that is advisable even if he had the money. It all depends on the financial status of the

business right now. What do you think? Has Jack written you and acquainted you with the conditions out there? The folks are very skeptical about the proposition.

Another thing that is worrying him and also all of us here, is about my home-coming. Do you think my staying here any longer and waiting for things to develop would help matters any? Of course I haven't asked yet if I will get the government's permission to stay, but I imagine if I say it is to educate the children, I may get a further extension. I know it will benefit the children, and that the folks won't object, but of course it will be rather hard on Jack and myself. However, if it is advisable, we will just have to go through with it. On the other hand if I were there I could perhaps help in the store while Jack could get something else to do to supplement his income, perhaps some part-time work in a drug store?

I wish dear that you would communicate with Jack and find out just how things stand and advise and help him and us make some decision. If I have to stay on here I will make some effort to get a job here in some office.

if possible, to help defray expenses here at home a little.

I had always thought that my trip to Palestine would somewhat ease our many problems, but it seems that things have become even more difficult than ever. However, I shall never forget this year in Palestine. In spite of all its hardships, I have learned to love it here. It has a certain fascination that one cannot deny. It is just unfortunate that we came here under such poor circumstances, otherwise perhaps things would have been different. Right now I realize that we must huddle down ~~and~~ make a living wherever it may be, and I am ready to help along in whatever way it is possible. I only hope that conditions in the States will improve a little so that the struggle will not be as keen as it was in the last few years. I am sure what the children have gained here in the language and Jewish background will be an asset to them in their general make up. I shall try to have them continue their Hebrew studies in America, if it is at

all possible. The folks have become
very much attached to them and the
parting will be difficult, but that is

They all join me in sending love and
kisses to you and your dear ones. Let me

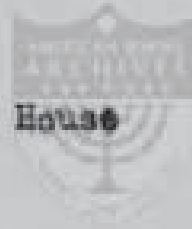



My dear Rabbi:

I am taking the liberty of sending you a play which calls upon all Americans to boycott the Nazis in order to cripple their attempt to arm for war before Germany awakes and destroys them.

As you are aware, the boycott has been almost entirely tied up with Jewish retaliation. As a result, there is an impression about that the Nazi menace concerns Jews only and that the fight is only between Jews and Nazis.

Naturally the Nazis have done their best to intensify this misconception. The play seeks to combat this situation. By showing how the Nazis are preparing for war, by showing the European conflagration which they finally manage to provoke, and the inevitable embroilment of America in this greatest of World Wars, it seeks to make the Nazi threat a direct threat to the American people. The boycott implements the call to all Americans to defend their lives and peace. It is a clear call to action, by using the boycott, to non-jews. There is not one single Jewish character in the entire play.

I am sending you this play because I believe you can help us.

We have so far received unanimous praise from many organizations interested in the boycott as well as in peace. All have agreed that the play should be produced, but no one so far has stepped forward with the necessary funds.

Is it possible, after you have read the script and approved it, that you can bring it to the attention of Samuel Untermyer? He has had this play over six weeks but has not yet got at it. And yet "Stop That War" does the very work for which he has used every medium except one of the most effective ones-the theatre. When the play is produced it will be known as-"Boycott".

I know you get to New York every so often. If I could see you we could discuss the whole matter. In the meantime, I hope you will read the play without delay and do all you can to expedite its production.

My dear Mr. Hayes:

In reply to your letter of June 21st asking for the opinion of the members of the Club concerning the new applicants for membership to the Oakwood Club, permit me to say that a scanning of the published list of contributors to the 1934 Jewish Welfare Fund will indicate that while some of these applicants have enough money to join the Oakwood Club and lay out hundreds of dollars for membership certificates, initiation fees and dues they seem to be completely impoverished when it comes to making their contribution to local, national and international philanthropic causes. I note that one applicant could make no more than a \$5 contribution to the campaign, another \$10, three others \$25 each. This is an amazing situation. I know that this is true not merely of these applicants but of others that have been admitted within the last few years to the Oakwood Club and of many others who are on the roster of the Club for a long time. It is indicative of a lamentable breakdown in the morale and self respect of our community.

I believe that the Oakwood Club has a distinct obligation to our community. It should not admit anyone to membership who does not fully discharge his responsibilities to the Community Chest and to the Jewish Welfare Fund. I know of no organization that is in a better position to exert moral pressure for the upbuilding of the standards of our community than the Oakwood Club. I recall that in olden days in the Excelsior Club much attention was paid to this matter. Unfortunately in recent years it has been completely overlooked.

By admitting to full participation in the social life of the community such men who are derelict in their responsibilities to the philanthropic and spiritual needs of the community an organization like ours indirectly encourages and sanctions such an attitude.

while at the Conference last week I heard that the wheeling pulpit was vacant due to the resignation of Rabbi Thurman. Knowing of your closeness to the wheeling congregation and feeling that you will be consulted as to Thurman's successor, I am taking the liberty of making a suggestion to you in case you are consulted in the matter of the future incumbency of the pulpit of the Eoff Street Temple.

I have reason to believe from what Bernard Dorfman has told me of several instances of kindness on your part toward him, that you would be interested in seeing him placed in a permanent position. At the present time as you undoubtedly know he is "circuit riding" between Sandusky, Lima, and Zanesville. I think that Dorfman should be shown some consideration on the part of his colleagues and having reason to believe that you are well inclined toward him, and feeling further that your influence in the situation would be almost compelling, I am offering the suggestion to you.

I have already written to Sig Front, the President of the Congregation, because I truly believe that Dorfman is worthy of a position and would do excellent work in any community that would elect him. with an experience extending over five or six years, his worth ought to be immeasurably greater in the organization and building of a congregation than one of the recent graduates of the college. Do you think that you can conscientiously do anything in this matter?






Dear Silver:

Dear Sir,

In a letter dated May 15th, we offered you, as a holder of land in Herzlia, some observations and opinions as to the existing situation. We pointed out the fact that a number of non-resident owners, particularly those from America, had been tempted to part with their land, due to the combined pressure of economic circumstances, loss of patience because of delay in receipt of Kushan (Deed) and the importuning by interested parties to sell their holdings.

We further stated that, in our judgment, it would be desirable to hold on to the land, if circumstances permitted. This opinion was arrived at through the fact that the colony of Herzlia is steadily growing and attracting more settlers. We added finally, that the most desirable procedure would be to cultivate one's land, preferably in person, otherwise through some competent agency in Palestine. We then submitted prices offered at the time for lands in Herzlia. These prices must now be revised and, fortunately, in most cases upward.

The major changes have taken place within Zones 1 and 2, which lie along the sea-shore, and for which several persons in Palestine are offering higher prices, at least for the present, because of the speculative possibilities of establishing a beach colony and summer resort in that area. These offers are made, of course, only where Deeds are available. The higher range of prices obtained are generally for lands in Zone 1. Zones 3 and 4 consist of agricultural land, with the exception of part of Zone 4, containing the colony proper. The greater part of this agricultural land is fit for orange plantation. As such, it will be valued at from LP.12 to LP.22 per Gunam, the variation being largely determined by distance from the colony.

Of the remaining lands, and apart from the factor of location, some consist of reclaimed swamps not worth more than LP.10 to LP.12 per dunam, and others though unsuitable for orange plantation, are highly desirable for vegetable gardening and as such, may be valued at between LP.15 to LP.22 per dunam. To recapitulate, we would quote present prices as follows:-


We can make no pretence of attempting to prophesy whether the sharp improvement in prices for Herzlia land may be expected to continue or not. A large part of the recent rise, we believe, has been due to some speculative interest following an actual increase in the population of this colony. Without, therefore, offering any opinion as to the future course of prices, we feel that it is our duty to keep you informed of the substantial change that has taken place within the last several months, both as a matter of information and because of the practical value it may have in the event that you contemplate the sale of your holdings.
